## THIS WEEK IN THE NEWS

### MARINES ORDERED TO LEAVE BEIRUT

President Reagan on Tuesday ordered the gradual withdrawal of most U.S. Marines from Beirut to the relative safety of ships offshore. At the same time, he gave wider authority for American warships to retaliate against the foes of Lebanon's government. Reagan gave the U.S. fleet off Beirut free rein to provide naval fire and air support against any units shooting into greater Beirut from Syrian-controlled Lebanese territory, as well as against any units directly attacking American or multinational force personnel and facilities.

"This redeployment will begin shortly and proceed in stages. U.S. military will remain on the ground in Lebanon for training and equipping the Lebanese army and protecting our remaining personnel," Reagan said.

### ECONOMIC ADVISERS URGE DEFICIT SLASH

President Reagan's key economic advisers put aside their public squabbling Tuesday and presented a united front, urging Congress to slash the enormous budget deficits or risk sending the economy into a tailspin.

They issued their appeals less than a week after Reagan submitted to Congress a spending plan for 1985 that projects deficits of \$180 billion in each of the next few years, not far off the record \$195.4 billion posted in 1983. "We are in total agreement that we should get these deficits down," said Treasury Secretary Donald Regan.

### MOUNT SAINT HELENS CONTINUES TO RUMBLE

Earthquakes repeatedly shook the crater of Mount Saint Helens for a third day Tuesday and scientists warned explosive activity is likely during the next few days. Several small earthquakes occurred every hour and two approached a magnitude of 2 on the Richter scale. Scientists predicted an explosive eruption of the southwest Washington volcano would be only a fraction of the power of the enormous May 18, 1980 blast.

### ASTRONAUTS FLYING FREE IN SPACE

Astronauts Bruce McCandless and Robert Stewart donned jet-packs Tuesday, off their lifelines, and zoomed away from Challenger by the length of a football field. The venture turned them into human spacecraft, floating in tandem with the shuttle 175 miles above Earth. This is considered yet another milestone in man's conquest of space.

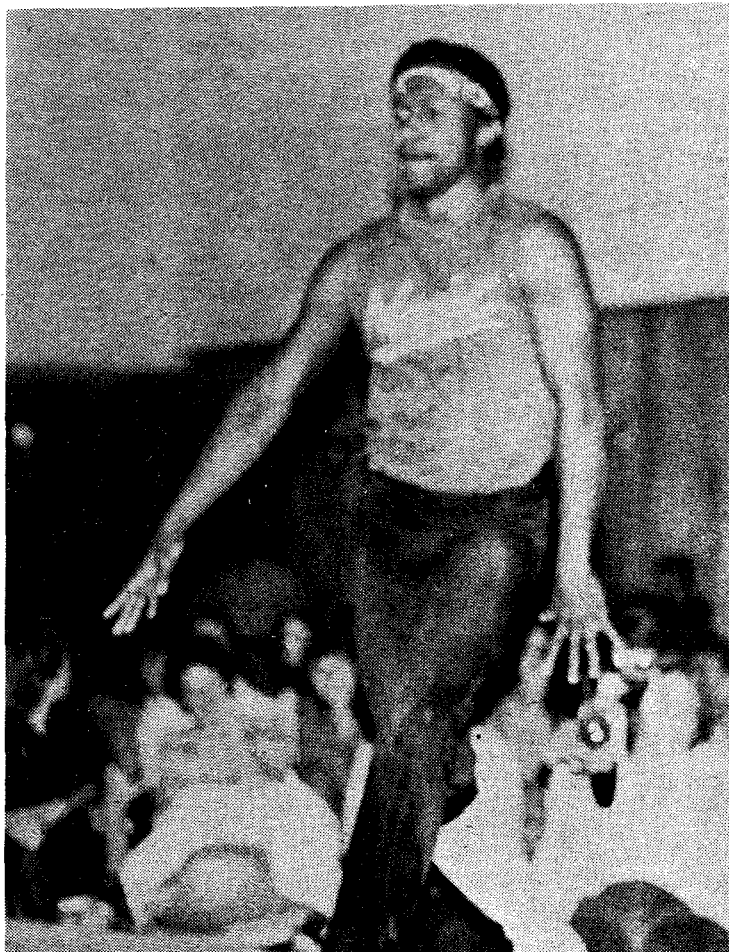

*The ability to genuinely forgive and forget is one of the finest qualities of human kindness. Whether this ability is inherent in one person or an organization, it is one which should be a moral standard and commands a lot of respect. I have been proud of this college and the fine education I feel I am getting here. I have respected the rules and decisions of the administration—until now.*

*I am witnessing, and to some degree am responsible for, the unjust conviction of someone I consider a friend, a fine person and an outstanding staff member of this paper. In essence, I asked this person to openly subject himself to a painful experience. I asked him to write an article concerning the food fight in the cafeteria on January 31st. Considering his feelings about the incident, he rightfully denied my request but chose to write a letter to the editor taking on the position as though he had participated in the event and expressing his views on the aftermath. He felt his letter would serve a positive function. The hope was that students, faculty and administration alike would accept a sincere apology on behalf of the active participants and generate the feeling that there does exist a mood of co-operation between the students and the administration. In my opinion, the letter was very well written and conveyed this feeling with genuine sincerity. I was impressed to read such an open and honest statement.*

*But obviously, the administration did not sense this. The result - this person will be appearing before the Judicial Board as some members of the administration apparently wish to end his career at Frostburg.*

*When I first spoke with him and found out what was to happen, I was, to say the least, shocked, hurt, and angry. I could only say I was sorry but I felt that expression was so weak. He had the guts to say what he did and to apologize. He sacrificed more than I feel most anyone would consider. And the administration wishes to beat a dead horse? Their actions will NOT cause this person to serve as an example to other students! And it will certainly not make him regret writing his letter. I feel it will only show the students a dark side of the attitude of the administration. I don't understand why one person should be penalized for the actions of a great number of people. It takes two (or many more) to have a food fight.*

*This brings us back to the idea of forgiving and forgetting. A mistake was made, an apology was given and so severe a punishment should not be the result. I only see the administration's actions as an indication of their inability to overlook what's wrong instead of finding the good. This may show how really distant they are from their students.*

*I am asking, as a representative of one of the largest organizations on campus and as a firm believer in the innocence of this person, that the administration truly examine the injustice they are inflicting on someone whose crime is not punishable. This surely would remind us of the respect we should feel for our college.*

programs, like group meetings, which are now taking place on a more individual basis. Dr. Cordts schedules a particular time once a week, when he goes to the cafeteria, sits down with the new student, visits with him and tries to find out what problems he may be having.

Beyond the committee, which acts as counselor to the newcomer, academic advisors are also assigned. FSC students who have gone through this exchange program are also asked to contribute their own experiences with the overseas student.

The exchange program for the foreign student has sites in 33 states of the U.S. Likewise, the North American student whose school is involved in ISEP has a number of choices. Over 50 institutions are located in

such places like Asia, Canada, Latin America, British Isles, Europe, Africa, and Australia. Students from FSC usually go abroad for a whole year. Presently there are 4 students overseas, including two in France, one in Columbia, and one in Costa Rica.

New Spring semester international students at Frostburg State College include four from France, one from Canada, a faculty exchange person from Costa Rica and a fall semester French student. Others at F.S.C. are in the graduate and undergraduate categories ranging from countries such as Kenya, France, Italy, Virgin Islands, Belgium, Venezuela and India.

Regardless of a student's major, ISEP provides a rich opportunity for those who want to be exposed to other cultures. After applying in February, the student is interviewed individually and nominees are selected in March. An ISEP directory is

available with the program's description and the available exchange institutions. Full catalogue information about the ISEP schools is available on microfiche at the library. This allows the student to discover whether the institutions complements his/her studies. A total of 30 credits for two semesters is highly recommended.

In conclusion, Dr. Cordts states, "Our primary thrust is to try to assist students so they don't lose any time toward graduation, have time to be abroad and experience a different culture."

Eligibility to qualify as an ISEP participant lies on only 2 criteria: (1) Having a full-time student status in good standing at an ISEP member school and (2) Having been in attendance at this institution for a specific given time (usually one year) before the beginning of the exchange.

This request was at first denied but later granted - with a ridiculously short time limit on his return to the police station. Later he was informed that he would stand trial before the J-Board within two weeks. In effect then we have the administration of this college allying themselves, at least implicitly, with hypocrisy. Whatever happened to professional ethics? Instead of being hauled before the J-Board, Kevin should be congratulated. It is not often

that you will find anyone with the courage and morals to say "I did it, and I'm sorry." For his ethical stance, Kevin is being scapegoated and could, as a result of the J-Board hearing, be expelled from school - a fine reward for honesty indeed. Perhaps the members of the administration should go back and read the story about George Washington and the cherry tree. They might learn something about honesty and ethics.

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Just A Thought: If a car is traveling at the speed of light, what happens when the headlights are turned on?

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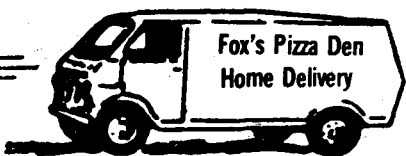

## Winter Driving: Staying Straight

Last week we examined some simple procedures which would reduce automotive problems associated with cold weather. This week we'll examine some common hazards and review some common sense.

Though most people rarely give winter driving any more consideration than any other type of driving, it really is deserving of much attention. Dynamic weather can change a dry road into a snow and ice covered skating rink in a matter of minutes. This type of change, along with static hazards, make winter driving the most important time to be wide awake, alert and perceptive. Reasonable speeds can become deadly in an instant.

These static hazards are aggravated by the coating of ice they may receive during an ice storm. Brick and cobblestone streets become slick particularly fast, as does mud on the pavement. On curves, even sand and gravel extra driver caution is required.

Ice patches are always dangerous, but one type appears without warning. Exposed bridges (such as the Route 48 bridge at Clarysville) have slightly lower temperatures than the air around them, and consequently will ice over before other road surfaces. Therefore, when temperatures are close to freezing, treat any bridge with the care and caution driving on ice dictates. Don't let the "Bridge Freezes First" sign be the last thing you see before you waste your car foolishly.

This brings us to the basic premise behind winter driving. Easy does it. Common driver errors are overpowering the car, oversteering, and overbraking. Rather than go through a whole spiel about how to extricate one's self from one of the above situations, it will suffice to say that driving with caution and thinking about the hazards around you should keep you from making a dumb mistake. Remember—the superior driver chooses a speed within the limit which is best suitable to prevailing conditions, even at the expense of a late arrival time. And please buckle up.

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unite women, not in hatred against men, but in an understanding and an empathy for a common experience.

As far as black women being portrayed as super-sexual creatures, I feel, again, that the author's intent was missed entirely. For so long, women, black as well as white, have been taught to suppress all sexual feelings. We have been expected to believe that sex is nasty, ugly, dirty, and virtually unpleasant. However, any mature, healthy women will admit that behind closed doors, when talking with women friends, we have the same desires, needs, and thoughts that men do, only we aren't supposed to let them know this, because we've been taught that we'll no longer be respected. Intentional suppression and denial of natural, sexual responses is deemed unhealthy and unnatural by most psychologists. Ntozake Shange realized this, and sought to hide nothing. Why must we always hide that which is not the most pleasant, or socially acceptable. Is it not time that people stood up and said what was on their minds, instead of hypocritically denying that it does not exist, simply for the sake of pleasing others and presenting a nice, pretty picture for society. For me personally, I would feel more self-respect if I admitted that I could really relate to the women in "For Colored Girls" and could share some of their feelings, than to stick my nose in the air, and say that it was too embarrassing or too degrading. For those of you who

watched and felt degraded or embarrassed, perhaps you need to re-evaluate your own personal perception of black life, your perceptions about women, and inhibitions about yourself. If you felt embarrassed, examine your maturity level again. If you felt Ntozake Shange is degrading blacks, be adult enough to realize that perhaps your insecurities about the strength and pride in the Black race did not start upon viewing "For Colored Girls" Tuesday night, but began a long time ago, within yourself. For those of us who love women and the black race, and who already know and understand problems of both, and can still feel the deepest sense of pride, we had no problems with this production. I am black and I am female. I also have the utmost respect for black men and women, and that Ntozake Shange for sharing her feelings with me—many of which we have in common. And here is one last note for these blacks who feel degraded: no one can degrade you if you are secure in your self-worth and self-esteem. You only allow yourself to be degraded. If you saw in yourself and in your race degrading qualities, then you probably did not like "For Colored Girls", because honesty was being thrown in your face, and that is always hard to accept if you feel guilty. However, if you feel love and pride within yourself and within your race, then even after you left the theatre, you would feel the same way, realizing that blacks are wonderful people, with faults like everyone else.

On February 6, Mr. Fred L. Hord, Assistant Director of Minority Affairs, spoke to the United Campus Ministry Student Group on "The Black Church in America." The remainder of the Art Department/Office of Minority Affairs' series was presented on February 8 & 9, highlighted by an oral interpretation performance by Mrs. Pansy S. Atkinson, Director of Minority Affairs, and Mr. Fred L. Hord, with the concluding films

"Aretha Franklin" and "Gwendolyn Brooks" to be shown tonight in the SAR Gallery. In addition, Mr. Gary Paul, Associate Director of The Library, has coordinated an exhibit on Alice Walker, black writer and winner of the 1983 Pulitzer Prize for fiction for the novel, "The Color Purple."

On February 7, 1926, Dr. Carter G. Woodson, the eminent historian, scholar, and founder of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, established Negro History Week. Then, with the civil rights movements and international struggles of the nineteen-sixties and the nineteen-seventies, there was a national mandate to extend Negro History Week to Black History Month.

The Black History Month theme for 1984 is Black Americans and the Struggle for Excellence in education.

not grasp the reasoning behind the poetry, I feel it is this person's duty to seek a firm understanding of the black experience and the female dilemma before making any concrete judgements that would tear the work to pieces.

The two major controversies concerning "For Colored Girls" surrounded the fact that Ntozake Shange's portrayal of black men and women were degrading, and that if those who saw it had no previous knowledge of Black life, they would only gain this one negative opinion. I feel, however, that the author covered herself when she entitled her artwork "For Colored Girls". To me this means that only those who are colored or who are willing to open their minds to encompass the ideas presented, should make judgements of any sort. As a Black woman, I have known black men of all kinds—some of whom have fit many of the characteristics presented to us Tuesday night, and some of whom I felt were the most wonderful men in the world. Black men, as well as white, yellow or red men are made up of a variety of personalities, and Ntozake Shange only intended to show one aspect, which is all that was necessary to explain her theme. Of course, all black men don't throw babies out of windows, want women simply for whoring purposes, or destroy them emotionally. Most of them don't but in every situation, there is always a rotten apple in the bunch. I think that all women, regardless of color, have experienced a few of those bad apples who may have hurt them deeply and drastically affected their outlooks on life. Ms. Shange, I feel, wanted to

In analyzing the play "For Colored Girls Who Have Considered Suicide When the Rainbow Is Enuf", There are two points one must consider. First of all, this presentation is not a play, but rather a choreo poem, and therefore it cannot be expected to conform to the restrictions set up for plays. Secondly, I believe that this piece was written as a mode for self-expression, and not to please the general public. With these two realizations in view, I feel we are being considerably more fair to the author. I did indeed appreciate the opinions of the two critics from Howard and Morgan, but in my opinion, they failed to understand the intention behind the work. "For Colored Girls" is one of those rare works of art in which nothing is hidden or held back. It is almost as if one is looking into the keyhole of a private bedroom, where the deepest most intimate feelings are displayed without censorship. Too many times, personal opinions are dressed up, edited, and turned upsidedown so that the public will not get offended, and in this manner no one is ever given an actual statement of what is really true. In order to appreciate this production, one must be of a mature and open-minded nature to realize that this is only one aspect of black life, and that it is not the author's intention to make society believe that all black males are unloving, abusive animals or that Black females are nymphomaniacs. Anyone, who from watching this production, is now of this opinion, apparently has neither the intellectual capacity nor a certain sense of objectivity to review anything this candid. If in watching this piece, one did



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

Frostburg State College Theatre's third production of the season will be Philip Barry's play HOTEL UNIVERSE. Performances are scheduled in Compton Auditorium on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, February 23, 24, 25. Curtain time is 8:15 p.m. The play is directed by Dr. Jack W. Vrieze. Roger Lipera is the designer and technical director.

Considered one of the most striking and original plays ever written by an American, HOTEL UNIVERSE is the most ambitious and brilliant play Mr. Barry attempted. It is concerned with the baffling problems which every adult human being is at some time forced to face. The characters seem hardly to exist at all in relation to other people, which is surely why Mr. Barry discovered (somewhat as Chekhov discovered) that to invent a plot for them would be to deprive them of the kind of real-

ity he was wanting. These people are essentially introspective, centripetal, literally self-seeking. And what are they after? Just an answer to the question that every thinking human being must ask himself - and vainly: What is life? What is death? Where are we going and why? What is the meaning of past, present, and future? Written in 1930, the play stands as a modern morality play filled with relevance for our society in the 80's. The noted theatre historian Arthur Hobson Quinn stated: "In my judgment it is one of the most profound studies of human nature carried out in the spirit of high comedy that has ever been given on our stage." The NEW YORK SUN described it as "a glittering play of unreality and magic to quicken the pulses and stir the minds . . . strange, enthralling and mysterious . . . a challenging and exciting play."
