—The Export of Bird Seed.

—Bird seed forms a considerable item in the export trade of some of the Moorish ports. Thus from Larache last year, in a total export valued at \$20,780, the bird seed export was valued at \$5,970 and the quantity was 3,457 tons. The vice-consul at that port states that this seed is never sown again by Moorish farmers, nor is any artificial attention paid to its cultivation. It is sown with wheat, and when reaped and threshed it is separated by the country women in sieves. The reasons of this practice is that there is a general superstition among the Moors that in very wet seasons the wheat is in part converted into bird seed, and hence they sow the two together.

John E. McGrath, in charge of one of the surveying expeditions to locate the boundary line between Alaska and British Columbia, has written to the superintendent of the coast survey giving an account of his operations since his arrival in Alaska. The letter is dated thirty miles above Chelyach, Aug. 18. The party had reached that point after some little annoyance and delay. They had observed several brilliant displays of aurora borealis, one of which was interesting because of its being attended by a noise, an unusual phenomenon. The letter relates the circumstances as follows:

One night while John Luis was on watch at Fort Yukon he heard a noise behind him which made him think a flock of geese was coming along. Turning to the north to see them, he beheld what looked like a rainbow flying up toward the zenith. It was divided into two parts, one going toward the east and one toward the west. The phenomenon was not high, and seemed to be about twelve feet wide. He was badly frightened by it at first. As John had never seen an aurora, and knew nothing of the dispute as to whether any noise accompanied or not, his positive testimony that the noise it made drew his attention to it will be of value. The next morning my magnet, erected at the station, showed a very strong magnetic field at that time, and there was no doubt of noise accompanying the aurora. It was heard five minutes at that station, and he has heard the sounds himself.—Washington Telegram.

Cremation in France.
It will certainly take a considerable time before the French become familiar with the system of burning instead of burying their dead; but cremation may, nevertheless, now be said to have a recognized position in France, and to be coming into vogue at all events with the humbler classes of society—everything has been done to make the process cheap. The prefect of the Seine has just given his sanction to a tariff for burning the remains of persons who may themselves, or whose relations may, prefer this system to burial. A uniform and moderate charge of fifty francs is made, this including the right of depositing the ashes in a columbarium which will shortly be built by the city of Paris, and leaving only the urn, in which the said ashes are included, to the cost of the relatives. Moreover, in the case of persons who are certified by the mayor of the commune in which they died to have been in very necessitous circumstances, no charge whatever will be made for cremating their remains, or for keeping, during a period of five years, what remains of the body after the burning process. Nothing is said as to what will become of the ashes at the expiration of the five years; but probably, as the bones of the dead are now every three, five, or ten years, according to the length of lease of the ground, removed from cemeteries to the catacombs, so the ashes will be collected and placed in some general repository.—London Standard.

"The Little Brothers of the Rich."
I notice that "The Little Brothers of the Rich" are now constantly and familiarly referred to. I am glad to hear that who make these flippant references do not seem to understand exactly who the "little brothers" are, and other people who understand after a fashion the significance of the reference, are evidently in the dark as to the origin of the expression. Mrs. Van Rensselaer Cruger is to be credited with having given a distinguishing name to a somewhat large and useful element in our society population; and she did so at a time and under circumstances that indicated that the name, like all of Mrs. Cruger's witty sayings, was quite as impromptu as it was brilliant. It seems that with some friends she went on board the Alva during the summer just past while Mr. Vanderbilt's handsome yacht was anchored in Newport harbor, and on entering one of the handsome apartments, of which there are several in the Alva, and which had served as a lounge room for Mr. W. S.
