Graham Colton Band to Perform Friday

Graham Colton Band, which has opened for Counting Crows, John Mayer, Jewel and the Dave Matthews Band, will perform at FSU on Friday, Sept. 17, at 9 p.m. in the Lane University Center's Manicur Assembly Hall. The concert, sponsored by the University Programming Council, is free and open to the public.

The band's beginnings can be traced to when singer/guitarist Graham Colton moved to Dallas to attend Southern Methodist University. There he met a local guitarist known as "Turtle." The two began writing songs together, and eventually added to the group another guitarist, Drew Nichols, a teenage

drummer named Jordan Elder and bassist Ryan Tallent. The Graham Colton Band built up a local following that eventually led to an invitation to open for Counting Crows. That exposure, along with other opening gigs, turned into an album contract, a recording session with producer Brendan O'Brien (known for his work with Pearl Jam and Bruce Springsteen) at Atlanta's Southern Tracks Studio. The group's debut album, "Drive," was released by Universal Records in May.

Visiting Writer to Offer Poetry Reading

FSU's new Center for Creative Writing welcomes its first visiting writer for the fall semester, Gregory Djanikian, who will give a reading on Thursday, Sept. 23, 7:30 in Lane University Center room 140-141.

The author of four collections of poems and director of the creative writing program at the University of Pennsylvania, Djanikian was born in Alexandria, Egypt, of Armenian parentage. He emigrated to the United States when he was 8 years old. His insightful work investigates intimacies and distances, quarrels and gifts, romance and illness. What is it like, Djanikian asks, to imagine vengeance against the neighborhood thug? To realize "by the time we were finished/ we didn't know/how far we had gone/ or where we had lost/ our own voices"?

Djanikian's probing and eventempered poems navigate between largeness of feeling and compression of style. It is his "sense of precision about distances," Alec Marsh of *The Boston Book Review* writes, "his awareness of engaging nostalgia, his willingness to step beyond cleverness, which makes his new book so valuable."

Points of Pride



Dr. Hongqi Li, Biology, published the paper "Early Cretaceous Archaefructus eoflora sp. nov. with bisexual flowers from Beipiao, western Liaoning, China," written with Qiang Ji, L. Michelle Bowe (formerly of FSU), Yusheng Liu, and David W. Taylor, in Acta Geologica Sinica 78, 883-896. August 2004. Archaefructus is currently considered to be the earliest known flowering plant. Two papers about this genus have been published, but they also caused a lot of arguments about the origin of flowering plants. Dr. Li found many important characteristics that can help in clarifying the issues. The paper is mostly done by Dr. Li, both in specimen-treating and paper-writing, and Prof. Judith Dieruf, from the Department of Visual Arts, drew a color restoration of the fossil plants.

During the summer 2004, Li went to the 5th Conference of International Carnivorous Plant Society (ICPS), June 17-22, Lyon, France, and presented his discovery of fossil pitcher plants from China. Pitcher plants are thought to be highly evolved flowering plants and no fossil plants have been found before.

Surprisingly, Dr. Li's fossil pitcher plants are found to be associated with the earliest known fossil flowering plant, Archaefructus. The detailed report astonished the audience and is considered the most important paper of the conference by some participants.

Li proposed to hold the next ICPS conference at FSU by June 2006, and it has been approved. He has begun to organize the conference. Carnivorous plants include the beautiful pitcher plants, Venus flytraps, sundews, bladderworts, water wheels, etc. Anyone interested in learning more about these plants or helping in organizing the conference, contact Li at x4168.

Dr. Joan DeVee Dixon, Department of Music, spent the last two weeks of August on a concert tour of England, where she performed concerts at Westminster Abbey and St. Dominic's Priory in London, Town Hall and Christ Church Cathedral in Oxford, and Tewkesbury Abbey. This was her second concert tour of Great Britain where she has also performed at Westminster Cathedral and The Temple Church in London and Worcester Cathedral.

Her programs featured music by American composers. During her tour, she was asked to return and perform next year and is making plans for 2005.

Dixon will repeat her programs from London and Oxford with concerts throughout this region this fall. She will be performing at First Presbyterian Church in Cumberland on Sunday, Sept. 19, at 4 p.m. and at Salem United Church of Christ in Frostburg on Tuesday, Sept. 21, at 7 p.m. Both programs are free and open to the public. Terry Tannacito, English, gave a presentation at the Computers and Writing 2004 Conference in Honolulu, Hawaii, in June entitled "Riding the Waves of Course Management Systems: The Effectiveness of Blackboard 6 Communication Tools in Online Professional Writing Classes."

For this eight-credit package, the total budget (airfare, travel in China, tuition, lodging, food, insurance, etc.) would be less than \$3,500 for in-state students and less than \$4,100 for out-of-state students. The enrollment is limited to 16 students, based on first come, first served for those students who meet the requirements.
