Mark Sterner: "DUI —A Powerful Lesson"

Losing someone close to you can be difficult. What's worse is if you not only caused one death, but the death of a few of your close friends.

Mark Sterner presents "DUI: A Powerful Lesson" Tuesday, Oct. 12, at 7 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center Recital Hall. Sterner was a member of Tau Kappa Epsilon at a Rhode Island college when he and four fraternity brothers took off for Spring Break.

The group also took a video camera and recorded the fateful series of events up until 15 minutes before the fatal crash. Sterner was sentenced to 23 months in a Florida prison for the deaths of three of his fraternity brothers.

Sterner doesn't appear odd in any way. Many are struck by how "normal" he was (and is). Sterner focuses on how careless choices can make such an impact, leaving many students to walk away with a new sense of reality.


