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National Campaign to End Campus Violence Returns to FSU

FSU will participate in "Enough Is Enough," the national campaign to end campus violence, from Monday, March 25, through Friday, April 5. Each day will have a different theme. Events, workshops and information will be offered throughout. All events are free and open to the public.

On Thursday, April 4, anti-racism author and activist Tim Wise will lead the annual Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration and Harmony Walk, the highlight of the "Enough Is Enough" campaign. The walk starts at 6:30 p.m. at the Wall Fountain in the lower lobby of the Lane Center. Then, at 7:30 p.m., Wise will speak in PAC Pealer Recital Hall. Wise has spoken before at FSU and on over 500 college campuses about combating racism. His published works include "Dear White America: Letter to a New Minority," "White Like Me: Reflections on Race From a Privileged Son" and "Between Barack and a Hard Place: Racism and White Denial in the Age of Obama."

The next session in the Sustaining Campus and Community Dialogue Series will be Tuesday, March 26, at 5:30 p.m. in the Lyric Theater at 20 E. Main St. in Frostburg. It will feature quest speakers from the Frostburg faith community, Pastor Everett Spence from God's Ark of Safety; the Rev. Tim Smith, senior pastor of the Frostburg Church of the Nazarene; and Ken Fisher, president of Neighborhood Friends Care, an ecumenical network of care based at the Frostburg Presbyterian Church.

Each day, an information table will be hosted in the Lane Center from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday, March 25, is kick-off day. Black and white ribbons along with Enough Is Enough explanation cards will be handed out. Tuesday is "Take the Pledge" day,

when members of the campus community can sign a pledge to take a stand against violence. On Wednesday, students from the V-Day committee will host the table to provide information about violence against women. On Thursday, for "Be the 1" day, participants can create visual displays with an anti-violence and/or unity message. On Monday, April 1, the information table will host a Random Acts of Kindness postcard display from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. This initiative builds a sense of campus community and unity by allowing students and community members to share positivity through postcards. On Tuesday, the table will host "These Hands Don't Hurt," in which students, faculty and staff can leave their handprints as a visible pledge to their commitment to being peaceful members of the campus community and the world.

A series of brown bag lunches will be held from noon to 1 p.m. in Lane 111. The first one is on **Tuesday**, March 26, and it will begin with an interactive presentation of "(No More) Violence in My Life" by Robin Wynder and the National Coalition Building Institute team. The next is on Tuesday, April 2. The BTGlass video "It Gets Better" will be shown.

Visual Arts Price Collection of Railroad Photos and Memorabilia



FSU will present the first major exhibit of the William P. Price Railroad Collection beginning on **Monday**, **April 1**, on the fourth and fifth floors of the Lewis J. Ort Library. Hours for public viewing of the exhibit are Monday through Thursday, 7:30 a.m. to midnight, Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., Saturday from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sunday from 1 p.m. to midnight. The exhibit is free and open to the public.

The exhibit contains selected photos featuring steam railroad engines, plus other railroad memorabilia, from the William P. Price Railroad Collection housed within the library's J. Glenn Beall Archives. The photos, 45 in all, were carefully selected from the collection of over 10,000 images. According to Dr. David M. Gillespie, library director, the Price Collection is one of the best photo documentations illustrating the Western Maryland Railroad and the B&O Railroad trains during the height of the steam engine era in the railroading industry in Western Maryland and West Virginia.

Price's photographic works from the 1940s to '50s are nationally recognized. Price, who passed away in 2002, retired in 1985 from the Cumberland Times-News after 43 years of service. He donated his collection to the Ort Library in 1999.

In addition to the Price photographs, there are several prints

on display from the recent Pinkerton Tunnel excavation and relocation of the CSX Line near Markleton, Pa. There are also photos of a recently discovered coal car in an underground mine dating from the 1880s to '90s on the Walker Coal Mining property in Midlothian, about three miles from the campus.

Dr. Kara Rogers Thomas, an associate professor in FSU's Department of Sociology, will be honored at the spring



meeting of the University System of Maryland Board of Regents with the Regents' Faculty Award for Public Service.

The USM Regents' Faculty Award is the highest honor that the board bestows to recognize exemplary faculty achievement. Rogers Thomas' honor marks the fifth time since 2007 that an FSU faculty member has been honored by the regents.

Among her contributions is the development of the annual Appalachian Festival that celebrates all that makes the region unique, including its history, culture, natural environment, musical and artistic traditions, and food. Each year, the vast majority of the featured performers, presenters and organizations come from Western Maryland and adjoining counties in Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Under Rogers Thomas' leadership, the festival, currently in its seventh year, has grown to become a major event, with more than 50 exhibitors and over 4,000 attendees in 2012.

In spring 2009, Mountain City Traditional Arts developed as an outgrowth of the Appalachian Festival and a product of Rogers Thomas' participation on the original steering committee for Frostburg's Arts and Entertainment District designation. The venue, located on Frostburg's Main Street, is dedicated to the education, sales, documentation and perpetuation of traditional arts in the mountain region. Housed in a formerly vacant storefront, the space has helped to revitalize Main Street. MCTA offers concerts showcasing traditional music and provides hands-on workshops and demonstrations of the traditional arts.

Rogers Thomas has been successful in cultivating a strong relationship with the Maryland State Arts Council, which supports many of her programming efforts, and the Maryland Humanities Council. She has twice partnered with the latter to host a traveling Smithsonian Exhibit. In 2008, she brought "Key Ingredients" to the Frostburg Science Discovery Center and, in 2011, served as the coordinator of "Between Fences" hosted by the Spruce Forest Artisan Village in Grantsville, Md. In addition to staffing the exhibit, she produced a series of six complementary weekly "Dinner Time Talks" at Penn Alps Restaurant exploring various dimensions of the exhibit.

She is also a founding member of the Appalachian Independent, a notfor-profit online news source dedicated to the promotion of citizen journalism. As the editor of the Appalachian Culture section, in 2011 she served as the chief advisor for a Mountain Traditions Film Project documenting those who carry on local traditions.

Students enjoy her emphasis on experiential learning, field trips, projects and outreach activities that introduce them to Appalachian culture and folklore. Rogers Thomas involves them in projects with the community, and they become actively involved in the community doing service because of her leadership.

She is also a successful grant writer who receives thousands of dollars to support her projects.

In all of her community endeavors, Rogers Thomas encourages residents to celebrate and find value in the culture and heritage of Appalachia while simultaneously striving to address its challenges and improve the quality of life for those residing in the region.

Malaria has been contained or eliminated in the Americas and Asia, but 3,000 people still die every day in Africa from this preventable disease. FSU student groups and departments will be buying lifesaving bed nets for malaria epidemic areas in Africa. One net cost \$10 and is treated with insecticide that protects a family for three years.

Duncan a Nebula Award Nominee



Andrew Duncan, an assistant professor in FSU's English Department, is a Nebula Award nominee this year. Nominated in the

Novelette category by the members of

the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America is "Close Encounters," first published in his 2012 collection, "The Pottawatomie Giant and Other Stories," and reprinted as the cover story of the September/October 2012 issue of The Magazine of Fantasy & Science Fiction. Set in 1977, "Close Encounters" is about an aging flying-saucer "contactee" of the 1950s who gets involved in UFO investigations in the Ozarks amid the hype surrounding Steven Spielberg's upcoming movie, "Close Encounters of the Third Kind."

This is Duncan's seventh Nebula Award nomination. His other fictionwriting honors include two World Fantasy Awards and the Theodore Sturgeon Memorial Award for best science-fiction story of the year.

Community Dialogue Series Features Faith Community Leaders



The next session of the FSU Sustaining Campus and Community Dialogue Series will be held on **Tuesday, March 26**, at 5:30 p.m. in the Lyric Theater at 20 E. Main St. in Frostburg. It will be free and open to the public.

To further build bridges within the community, this session will feature quest speakers from the Frostburg faith community: Pastor Everett Spence from God's Ark of Safety; the Rev. Tim Smith, senior pastor of the Frostburg Church of the Nazarene; and Ken Fisher, president of Neighborhood Friends Care, an ecumenical network of care based at the Frostburg Presbyterian Church. The dialogue sessions, initiated last spring, convene students, year-round residents, local officials and University leaders to discuss a variety of issues and create new opportunities for collaborative problem-solving and coalition-building in Frostburg.

In the February session, the progress of five action groups that have emerged in the dialogue series was reported, focusing on managing conflict and preventing violence, improving race relations, managing off-campus housing tensions, and discovering Western Maryland and Frostburg and FSU pride. For example, the Frostburg City Council is using a slogan for internal memos developed in the Discovering Western Maryland/ Developing FSU and Frostburg Pride group – "Frostburg: It's Just Cooler Here!" Paw prints should appear on city streets in April to promote Bobcat pride, short-term residents (students) and long-term residents (local families) are gathering via a church to get to know each other, Black Student Alliance is working to do more projects connected to the broader community to interact more with long-term residents and the Community Coalition continues its efforts to promote awareness and prevention of high-risk behavior. Also, students and community members are meeting with President Jonathan Gibralter to move toward a proposal for an off-campus housing office at FSU.

The project, funded in large part by Maryland Judiciary's Mediation and Conflict Resolution Office (MACRO), focuses on community-based action plans to support improved campuscommunity communication and a nonviolent culture in Frostburg. Nationally known conflict resolution scholarpractitioners Dr. Frank Dukes, lecturer and director of the Institute for Environmental Negotiation at the University of Virginia, and Dr. Marvin Johnson, founder and executive director of the Center for Alternative Dispute Resolution, continue to help facilitate the sessions.
