## Davis Placed On Probation

Former FSC football coach Mike Davis has been placed on probation for striking FSC student David Bentley following the Oct. ober 16th loss to Westminster College.
Davis was placed on probation before judgment in Allegany District Court on an assault battery charge filed by Bentley immediately following the incident. The coach admitted hitting Bentley, who allegedly made obscene remarks to Davis' wife in the stands during the game. "I just went to the dorm and confronted him. I just hit him and that was it," Davis said.

The Frostburg team took a vote after the incident on whether to finish their schedule and voted by a 3 to 2 margin to continue. "I wish they had voted not to play," Davis said. "It was the only chance I had to save some humiliation." He went on to say that it appears that his days at this school are over.

Athletic Director Harold Cordts said that there is no danger that Frostburg will drop football from its athletic program. Dr. Cordts said further that no statement regarding Davis' status as a faculty member would be made until later this week.

## IRC Attends Model UN

The International Relations Club recently attended the annual Univer-sity of Pennsylvania Model United Nations Conference held in Philadelphia. The conference, which ran from the fourth through the seventh of November, was a role playing experience in practical education. Each school which attended was given the role of a nation which is a member of the United Na .tions. ## Presidential Issues and Answers:

Fitzgerald, Keilholtz, Smith Reply

State - to - Date has changed this year's format for presentation of S.A. candidates' views on the issues to insure greater clarity. Every question is immediately followed by a set of responses fromeach candidate which should prove helpful for students wishing to compare the various opinions.
What issues do you intend to give the highest priority during this campaign?

## Tom Keilholtz:

During my campaign and if elected SA President, I will give highest priority to the major problems that affect the student body. I see these problems asthe elimination of teacher evaluations, Saga food, the health services, off-campus housing, the bookstore, procedure for appealing grades and a few others to be the major concerns of students. Other far reaching problems, such as teacher's rights for collective bargaining and rising. cost of higher education, must also be dealth with now to help future college students.

## Steve Smith:

My main campaign emphasis is placed on encouraging student interest and participation in SA. Along these lines, I am stressing reform of the House to provide greater communication and cooperation between the student body and the student government. I feel that by accomplishing this, we will be better able to do something about issues like teacher evaluations and getting a voting student member on the Academic Standards Board.

## Kevin Fitzgerald:

The issues I intend to stress are: pay for officers, faculty unionization, the repeal of student evaluation, the new grade appeals system which is being held in limbo, the reorganization of the SA House of Representatives, the new safety code in off-campus housing, the monopoly Canteen has on campus, the poor treatment of FSC students by Frostburg National Bank, the food service, and the Bookstore.
I am familiar with all these issues and have often
championed the students' rights through State-ToDace, so anyone who doesn't believe this is an issues oriented campus should pick up a copy of State-To-Date, or better yet, come and talk to me.

The ineptitude of SA has been discussed at great length this year, with specific regard to getting things done for the students. How are you prepared to lead SA more effectively next year?

Steve Smith:
The so-called "ineptitude" of SA over the past year is the result of a lack of student support and involvement. I feel that by motivating the student body to become interested and involved in SA affairs, I will be in a better position to make needed decisions regarding SA problems. With stronger student backing, I will be able to take a more aggressive approach in leading SA.
Kevin Fitzgerald:
I believe that the ineptitude of the Student Association this year stems from the current administration's obsession with pay for officers. believe the SA can be made a more viable organization with stronger leadership. I have served this past year in the capacity of chairman of the long-range planning committee, and in a meeting with Don Fry, set the possible and what should be the probable course of action the SA takes in the next year. I very much would like to work for the implementation of my plans, as SA president.
I believe that as SA president I would begin or continue a plan to reorganizing the house. The students are out there and they want to become active. In reorganizing the house I plan on allowing more of these students a chance to work for a better Frostburg State College. I also see a need to work more closely with the other major branches of Student Government; that being: State-To-Date, WFNR, and the College Center Board. Tom Keilholtz:
I am prepared to take the leadership role necessary to initiate actions to solve
the problems of che student body. I am prepared to go before the faculty, administration, the Dean, even as far as the State Legislature in order to try to solve the problems of the students at Frostburg.

What is your stand on "Pay for Officers" or perhaps more appropriately, on pay for any student involved in the performance of any major service to the student body?

## Tom Keilholtz:

I am against pay for officers or pay for any student involved in the performance of any major service to the student body. A student should not need a salary as an incentive to help the student body.
Steve Smith:
I believe that too much emphasis has been placed on the "Pay for Officers" issue. The amount of money involved is not great enough to influence my performance in office one way or the other. For the record, I favor pay for officers as a form of compensation for the time, ef fort, and responsibility involved.
Kevin Fitzgerald:
My stand on pay for officers is as it has been throughout my years at Frostburg. I am generally against pay for officers. More specifically, I feel it is a method of swindling students out of their activity fees. I also feel it is unfair to specifically just pay officers in SA and neglect those officers who work equally as hard in CCB, State-To-Date, or WFNR.

I feel that the general misconception that $S A$ is the all encompassing student government is a fallacy. I believe SA should stop looking on these three other organizations as step sisters and instead work for a more viable government composed of all four organizations. In doing that I feel the students win benefit for they will now have the strong and vocal voice needed in the Tripartite government. But to return to the original question- I am against pay for officers and in fact, I would like to state emphatically that I do not wish to be paid.

My mammy and pappy, my friends and non-friends and my conscience told me not to do it. So, here I am doing it. Disappointed with my three years of concerned over my future, I hesitant-ly take five and encourage students ( myself also) to votc. I must confess however, that I'm no angel at batting 1000 when it comes o voting. Nevertheless, we will have some impact on our leaders' requirements and on the vital task they will need to accomplish: insure us that the standards for a quality education are maintained. Serious elections are not a '"piece of cake." Everybody wants to be a potential gardener. Nonetheless, we must plant our future in a fertilized garden and not in a dusty desert. We must not rely solely on the candidates, statements, however sincere. We need to analyze the motives each candidate may have for seeking important positions in the Student Association (SA). Claims concerning radical vs. rational innovations ought to be noted. Aithough our decision will be based on limited exposure, our primary responsibility will be to evaluate each candidates, stance on important issues and not on his popular appeal (which is high-schoolish).

The candidate we elect must directly and devoutly emphasize the students welfare as SA's primary concern. We know very well that the quality of a government can drop rather quickly and shockingly if the 's unqualified are elected to lead the I faintly presume, mind you only presume, that we don't wish to be represented by a "lame-duck" ( or sterile ) government. We probably want an SA leader that will act vig-
orously and valiantly in spite of indirect faculty and administrative threats and other undesirable results. I believe we want a leader that will firmly and unequivocally state our concerns to anybody. Few qualified individuals are blessed with this quality ( maybe even one of the candidates.)

This long prelude leads me to my most important reason which prompted me to write this paper, however biased: quality education from a sincerely motivated staff. We want leaders that will unite students in an effort to insure maintenance of quality education. Putting restrictions by teachers on student cvaluations is not one of them. Nor is eliminating SE. We need a "checks

and balances" system. Only leaders who know and appreciate the present and distant value of quality education can help us. Students' rumors about being poorly prepared for tackling a task for which they are training frightens me. are trar that what they say is relatively accurate. I also have had class-experience which leads me to perience wr echo: "Four y similar ears in college and I still feel ill-prepared to meet a simple task of drafting an outline! Where did I go wrong (?)" The to-be-elected leaders must initiate serious programs what will emphasize quality education and eliminate you know what.
Experience "tells" me that relatively qualified and enthusiastic leaders can achieve results fair to students and teachers. The last troupe of troubadors we need is show-offs, limelight seekers, fanatics, or revolutionaries. We don't desire leaders who can give nothing and promise everything. When our future is in question, we should know that our "friends" ( who became friendlicr because of the election) may not be around to help us in future hardships. If they can't put out, than we should not endanger our future for their veiled zeal, especially when the 'sfri endship" is grounded on whether we vote for them. Our vote will only secondarily be for the candidates; primarily, it will be for our future ( however we may see it), which will be greatly based on the quality of our education. So, we need leaders that are responsive colleagues who know the impact and value of education.

## Dear Editor

Many of our country's problems are traceable to the response of legislat... ors to the whinings that "the , law is unenforceable." They point sanctimoniously to the lawlessness under Prohibition: over 250 gangsters were killed in Chicago warfare between 1920 and 1927. To what do they attribute the 818 incidents of murder and non-negligent manslaughter and the 291 incidents of manslaughter by neglegence in Chicago in the year 1975? The population hadn't even approached doubling that of 1920.
Legislators have been listening to sanctimonious whining about the unenforceability of anti-gambling laws and abandoned their backbones. Look at the results.
From 1966 to 1975 there was an increase of $316 \%$ in the number of incidents of crime per 100,000 population in the United States That parallels the $336 \%$ increase in gambling. My
estimate of the size of tho gambling increase by the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company that showed gambling as the cause of $23 \%$ of all stealing incidents and the most frequently cited motive for theft. I used that $23 \%$ as a yardstick on data from the American Bankers Association on reported cases of fraud and embezzlement in all financial institutions. They jumped from 3,030 in 10 10,181 in 1974 . 66 to 10,181 in $\$ 20.4$ million in 1965-66 to $\$ 188.7$ million in $1974-$ 75.

Now whinings are growing louder against laws hampering drug abuse.

Legislators have been acting like cruel parents of a toddler. When the toddler fusses about the protective fence at the edge of the precipice where he plays, they say, "We love you so much we can't deny you anything your little heart desires." So, they take down the fence and go in the house for an engrossing game of bridge. Later they tell people, "There wasn't a thing we could do to keep from failing." Privately, they fondle the insurance money and exalt about how much better off they are.

Our nation seems to be really asking for the curse on gambling that God delivers in Isaiah 65: 11-15.

## Conference Focuses on Local Government and Election

Williamsburg. va. Just being here in historical Williamsburg where our principles of self-government, individual liberty, vigorous dissent, and responsible leadership were developed is a rrip in itself.
The 82nd National Conference on Government sponsored by the National Municipal League is a national forum offering an opportunity for citizens, elected officials, and experts to exchange ideas about the best ways of improving their local and state governments. The Conference regularly attracts several hundred public administrators, political scientists, local and state officials, governmental researchers, city hall and statehouse reporters, and civic and business leaders from all parts of the country.

The State of Maryland was represented by the Cities of Frostburg, Baltimore, and Rockville, with the latter two competing for "All-American City" honors, an award cumberland so vigorously sought last year as a finalist.
Conference participants grapple with current problems, discuss new developments in the field of government and civic action, and look ahead to the challenges posed by new technologies and vast urban growth. Former governor of North Carolina Terry Sanford and former secretary of the U.S. Department of Housig and Urban Development Robert C. Wood urged conference participants to take a hard look at the present allocation formula for federal revenue sharing. Too much of the money is going to build tennis courts instead of attacking the real urban problems of inadequate housing and transportation.

Perhaps the highlight of the conference was an election post-mortem held by nationally recognized public opinion pollsters George Gallup , Richard Scammon, and Warren Miller. In a lively and often humorous style, these three observers of the
election process all indicated that preliminary survey findings fully support Jimmy Carter'sclaim that the debates played a significant role in the clec-

## tion. <br> "The upward momentum

 of the Ford campaign which brought him to a near tie with Carter on the eve of the second debate, came to a halt after this debate which dealt with foreign policy." It should be remembered that Carter registered substantial gains on four key issues relating to foreign policy and moved to a lead of six percentage points which he held until the final days of the campaign when this lead slipped to two percentage points.Conceding that economic issues provided the Democrats with a basic advantage, Gallup also said that, "President Ford's gaff on Poland cost him the election."

Warren E. Miller, an election analyst for NBC said he felt the election indicated a return to party loyalty. Scammon characterized the outcome as actually two votes---one in the south and the other in the rest of the nation. Interestingly, said Scammon, the white vote split in the South.
Although the speakers at the conference included some of the nation's foremost authorities on government, their language is non-technical and the solutions they proposed were practical ones. As a practicing political scientist this writer found it exhilirating as public administrators, and mayors and city managers swapped experiences and argued with political scientists and reserachers about some new idea in governmentand everybody benefits.
The subject of better and more effective government is a 'round-the clock' proposition during the Conference. Long after the formal sessions are ovr, the discussions continued in the hallways, parlors, snack bars and rooms of the inspring Williamsburg Inn.

## Students

Although we have been advising students to take Ed 307 , PE 308 , and Art 300 prior to student teaching, these courses technically have not been a part of any phase of the proof any phase of the pro-
fessional education sequence. An increasing number of elementary/ early childhood students have been student teaching before they have taken all of these methods courses. We believe that these courses should be completed prior to student teaching. Therefore, we propose the following: 1) Elementary/ECE majors must complete Ed 307, Arts 300 , and PE 308 as a condition for admission to Phase III (student internship). 2) Junior standing be added as a prerequisite to both Ed 307 and Art 300 (PE 308 already has advanced standing as a prerequisite). 3) This proposal be reevaluated in Spring, 1979 to see whether any unusual schedule complexities result. These requirements would become effective for those students entering the program (Phase I) after the proposal is passed
