UNITED STATES SENATE.

This body is composed of 49 members—two from each State—one-third of whom are chosen every two years. The names, places and manner of holding elections for Senators are prescribed in each State by the representatives thereof. And if vacancies happen, by resignation or otherwise, during the recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the Legislature, which shall fill such vacancies.

The constitutional term of 16 Senators will expire on the 1st of March next, to which

Death of Don Pedro.—The ship *Marchioness* from London, bound for Cadiz, lost her topgallant mast Sept. 31. The young Queen had in rams been delivered of a son, and had come into the Duke of Palma's to form a new family.
