### The Independent Movement, and its Consequences.

We regret that our old friends  
should deem it advisable to take the  
step they are now about to take,  
and we are sure that not one demo-  
crat out of a dozen has sufficiently  
counted the cost of this movement,  
and that when they see by whom  
they have been deceived into it, they  
will be swift to retrace their steps.  
Our reasons for making this state-  
ment are that no two of the discon-  
tented Democrats, give the same  
reason for the bolt. Some say that  
it is because one of the candidates  
was already in office, and rotation  
is the order of the day. Then why  
join with Grant's friends?

Others say that a bondman is on  
the ticket, why then go for the bolt  
which is lead by six bondmen? Others  
say the candidates are all  
straight out democrats with a single  
exception, and that the conservative  
element is not represented. Then to  
be consistent in your movement  
as you expect to get the colored  
vote in the main, you must have  
them represented on your ticket, or  
you may find that they have rights  
watch somebody ought to respect,  
especially such hair-splitters as  
these fault-finders with the regular  
Democratic ticket. The truth and  
the whole truth is, that the prime  
movers of this bolt are disappointed  
office seekers, who have agitated the  
thing till they have got some other  
people to believe that there is some  
cause for a bolt. We have only to  
say to those who are not aggrieved  
but have been persuaded to go into  
the movement, that they are lead  
by hook and by crook, and will be  
no lead, (unless they wake up,) into  
the Republican party. Some of  
them will regret the change, others  
will be where they desired to be all  
the while, but did not have the cour-  
age to go at once. Our readers are  
aware that an Independent ticket  
was spoken of long before the dis-  
trict meetings were called, why was  
this? Could not the party manage  
its own affairs? Why not turn out,  
and send delegates to the Conven-  
tion in your interest? We suppose  
that you know that you were not the  
choice of the people, and you dare  
not press your claims too strong in  
the face of the opposition that you  
knew would be raised against you,  
and because they would not choose  
you to be their leader for good, you  
will try to persuade them to go with  
you to the destruction of the old  
party. Well, we have only to say  
now, as to the consequences, if suc-  
cess should crown your efforts, it  
would be a Republican victory, and  
laugh in their sleeves and  
laugh out right after a time, and  
be disposed to give the Repub-

icans of this county a great deal  
of credit for their sagacity, even for  
what they have already accom-  
plished in taking so many along  
with them, and we would rejoice our-  
selves, if they can only be able to  
keep a number of their dupes with  
them. So that they will not trouble  
us any more. But we shall regret  
to see some innocent men who had  
confidence in such persons, and suf-  
fered themselves to be lead out of  
the fold. In conclusion we have  
only to say to our old Democratic  
friends before you commit your-  
selves to the action of a mongrel  
convention, which we are told will  
meet here on Tuesday next, retrace  
your steps, and stand by the old  
Democratic flag so gracefully born  
aloft by Jefferson, Jackson, Polk,  
Pierce and others, and will once  
more spread its broad folds to the  
breeze at the end of this adminis-  
tration.
