The Vernacular in Literature

Like the giant in ancient story, who renewed his strength in the embrace of his mother earth, literature gains a new impulse and increased power when it returns to its real source—the people—from whom it springs and for whose use it is

The faults and follies of incomplete civilization are exhibited in affectations of mind as well as of manner, and the semi-educated scholar despises his own vigorous vernacular, and servilely copies the style of some past age or foreign country, which he admires for its reputed acquirements. Thus the literatures of modern Europe have endeavored to build themselves upon Latin and Greek, while the mass of authors have weakly striven to dignify their platitudes with quotations from the classics, and have laboriously molded their upon models unsuited to the national modes of thought and expres-

The pedantry of the age of Elizabeth was destroying the simplicity of the grand old English tongue by imitating the complicated forms of the artificial authors of decaying Rome, when Shakspeare bold'y defied all the cumprous scholarship of his day. Fine gentlemen crowded upon the stage of the Globe Theatro with their euphuistic criticisms, but the sturdy actor laughed their scholarly affectations to scorn and made them join in the derision that greeted the learning of Holofernes,

and the hair-splitting logic of the fools.

In India, it was believed that the drama was bestowed by Heaven upon man for his improvement and delight; and even in the earlier plays, the vernacular held its due place, the inferior characters all being made to speak in the native dialects, while the sternest rules refused to permit the horse-boy to sport the same elegant

heroics as the star performer.
Five centuries ago, Dante, intending to proclaim the political doctrine of a United Italy and a Pope without temporal power although taking Virgil for his guide, clothed his great thoughts in a dialect familiar to the masses, and relied upon the cantas of his epic as the modern 'pol-

itician does upon a stump speech.
Chaucer did not magnify his calling by
mounting upon the stilts of Latinity, but
choosing a homely story, familiar to the most ignorant, strung upon it his pleasant tales in a language that all might under-stand, and by so doing has been honored by all later ages as

The well of English undefiled. There was a great deal of very nice writing in Scotland, plentifully adorned with Latin and sprinkled with Greek, when a true poet, recognizing that the fountain of poesy springs in the heart of the people, framed simple thoughts in the homely strains that glorify the name of Robert Burns.

Pedantry was stultifying the fictitious literature of France, and the preservation of the unities bade fair to destroy all that was worth preserving, when Beranger sang the familiar thoughts of the masses in unsophisticated verse, and Victor Hugo completed the revolution by putting the vernacular of the streets upon his pa-

Germany, unfaithful to the grand old language which swells with organ-tones through the pure cloquence of Luther's Bible, was narrowing itself to Voltaire's French and weighing itself down with foreign scholarship, when Schiller's beating in unison with the heart of his nation clothed his highest thoughts in simplest rhyme, and so won a laureate crown.

Pursuing the same task, Auerbach im-agined a scheme of stories suited to the taste of the multitudinous readers of an almanac, and has become one of the foremost authors of his time. English fiction had fallen from its high estate-the simplicity of Shakspeare-into

It is only among these great authors that the vernacular is found, for the lower range of literature ever relies for its effects upon a ponderous machinery of secret passages and bloody barons; and although he king may be very ungrammatical, the

bandit can never be colloquial.

To awaken mankind from a selfish absorption in their private interests is the ftiest aim of literature, and it is achieved by that touch of nature which makes the whole world kin. A man alone with na-ture and with God, made the story of Robinson Crusoe; Burns struck the re-sounding chord when he sang—

A man's a man for a' that, John Brodie, the Yorkshireman, teaches the same lesson as John Halifax, Gentleman; and the Vicar of Wakefield preaches the same sermon as Adam Bede or Rip

Van Winkle. Shakspeare portrayed the mob in all its dullness and brutality, and carping critics hard pressed to find a flaw, have accused him of being undemocratic; yet no author has ever done such honor to the instincts of humanity, and none has ever received from the world a more just or a higher reward. Boldly disregarding every unity of time and place, he ushers Snug, the Soiner, into the presence of Theseus, Duke of Athens; and makes Bottom, the Weaver, the lover of the Queen of the Fairies, confidently relying on that ab-solute fidelity to nature which would compel his audience to accept a true-born Briton, whether presented as Dogberry of Messina, Sir Toby Belch of Illyria, or as nurse to the hapless Juliet of Verona.

Perhaps no stronger denial need be arged of the claim of Bacon to the author ship of the dramas ascribed to Shakspeare than the fact that the most wise Verulam unwisely said that he wrote his great book

phrases the permanence of type; but to the services of one printer must especial gratitude be ever due. All lovers of our Eaxon English must hold in memory the work of William Caxton, his sincere love for his mother tongue, and his long years

of arduous labor in her behalf. Systematic Farming.

The true theory of agriculture is to regard it in the light of a manufacturing industry. The farmer is a creator of values. Whatever he produces, whether it be a bushel of corn, a pound of pork, a barrel of apples, an acre of roots, or a firkin of butter; in all these cases he converts raw materials into useful commodities through the intervention of labor and by the use of capital. He puts his products into the market in much the same way as other manufacturers. His success, like theirs, depends not alone on capital or skill or labor or machinery or science or ex-perience; on none of these separately and exclusively, but on all of them combined, and on the judgment with which they are blended in due proportion, and on the clear-sighted sagacity which is everywhere

applied to his operations.

There is no reason, then, why the business of the farmer, if conducted under right conditions, should not yield as fair a margin of profit as other manufacturing industries. In his case, as in theirs, whatever reduces the cost of production adds so much to the net results, and helps

to make him a prosperous man.

The problem for the agriculturist is, To get the highest agreeable product (not of quantity merely, but of value,) from the smallest cash investment, and the practical mode of solving this problem makes the whole difference between the

thriftless and the thrifty farmer. Just here there arises a very important inquiry :- Does the highest yield per acre necessarily give the lowest net cost of the article raised, or is there any relation between these two factors? The obvious answer is, that though the largest yield younger brother, the original Don Carlos does not always give the least cost, yet the hances are greatly in its favor if reasonable care and economy are used. There is, of course, a limit of outlay on every crop, beyond which it will not be profitable; but inside of this limit, it is safe to say that, as a general rule, the more bushels or tons you get from an acre, the less each bushel or ton will cost.

The reason of this is so perfectly plain, it seems incredible that our farmers do not give more attention to the principal and take advantage of it to increase their profits. The usual explanation with most of them is, that capital being limited, they cannot put more than a certain amount of expense on each acre, even though every additional dollar should bring back a hundred fold.

The recent unhappy events in the Spanish Republic have brought promin-ently before the world the name of Don Carlos, who pretends to have certain rights to the overturned throne of Spain, and is now the leader in the rebellion against the Republic. We are daily receiving telegrams of the progress of the civil war in Spain, and the air is filled with all sorts of rumors respecting the condition of affairs. The adherents of Don Carlos style him "Charles VII." For the second time in his life of but 25 years, he has headed an insurrection to an a pleasure tour, and will visitithe varobtain a restitution of his asserted rights. Let us see what these rights really are in the eyes of him who claims a divine right to rule the Spanish people, whether they

will or no: Ferdinand VII, died in 1833, leaving an only daughter, in whose favor he had induced the Cortes to abrogate the Salie law-the present ex-Queen Isabella. His however, would not recognise this abroga tion, and on Ferdinaud's death instituted that series of wars which has brought so much misery upon his unhappy country In 1839 Don Carlos returned to France in despair, and dying in 1855, left two sons Carlos and Juan, the former of whom, Charles VI., died childless. Don Juan, thus inheriting his brother's rights, re-nounced them in 1868 in favor of his son, the Duke of Madrid, the present Don Carlos. His first political act was the is-sue of a proclamation in 1868 to his party convoking them to a Congress in London whence was organized the insurrection which terminated so unfortunately in the disasters at Orosoquieta. In this insur-rection more than 20,000 mountaineers took part, but there were only sufficient weapons to arm 2,000 serviceably. 




