And it shall be the duty of the said commissioners to conduct every operation relative to the proposed institution, until they shall be superseded by the appointment of directors.

The books shall be opened at the places before mentioned by the commissioners, or any two of them, on Monday the third day of September, eighteen hundred and four, and remain open for three days, from ten o'clock antemeridian till five o'clock postmeridian, in each day, unless the allotted number of shares are sooner subscribed; and if there shall be subscribed, in any city or county, a greater number the subscriptions down to the number allotted, then they shall, by lot, determine whose subscriptions shall revail, or to whom the shares shall belong; and it shall be the duty of the county commissioners to return, as soon as may be, a list of the subscriptions, certified by them, to the commissioners for Annapolis and for Easton, but they are to retain the sub-

The number of directors is in no case to exceed eighteen for the western shore, or fifteen for the eastern shore, and as the state acquires a right to elect directors, by paying up on the reserved shares, in the same proportion the number of directors to be chosen by the stockholders shall decrease; but the state shall not have a right to elect more than two directors residing in Annapolis or Anne-Arundel county, or more than two directors residing in Easton or Talbot county, out of her whole number of directors. shares above sixty, and not exceeding one hundred, one vote; and for every ten shares above one hundred, one vote; but no person or body politic shall be entitled to a greater number than thirty votes. All votes at elections shall be by ballot, delivered in person or by proxy.

Article 9. No person can be admitted to take his seat as a director, unless he shall be at the time a stockholder, and if he shall at any time cease to be a stockholder, he shall cease to be a director.

Article 10. The president and directors first chosen re-elected at the regular annual elections. If the aforesaid, shall, before the same issues, make an oath, president shall be chosen out of the number of directors, his place shall be supplied by the directors from among the stockholders.

If a vacuncy shall at any time happen among the directors by death, resignation or otherwise, the directors shall elect a director to fill the vacancy for the residue of the year from among the stockholders.

Article 11. In case of sickness, or necessary absence, of the president, he shall, in writing, appoint among the papers in such suit. one of the board of directors to act as president pro

Article 12. The board of directors for the bank and branch bank shall respectively have power to appoint a cashier, and other officers and servants, for executing the business of the company, and the directors of the bank and branch bank shall jointly fix the compensation to be allowed the presidents for their extraordinary attendance, as well as the salaries to the above said officers and servants, which expences shall be defrayed out of the funds of the company.

Article 13. The board of directors shall have power to purchase, rent or lease, proper buildings for the bank and branch bank, and to have such houses fitted up and secured with vaults, &c. at the expence of the company.

Article 14. The board of directors at Annapolis and Easton, jointly, shall have power to make, revise, alter or annul, rules, orders, by-laws and regulations, for the government of the company, and that of their officers, servants and affairs, as a majority of them shall deem expedient, provided they are not contrary to law or the constitution.

Article 15. The company shall in no case be concerned in any article but notes, bills of exchange, mortgages, stock of the United States, or bullion, except in the case of debts due to the bank, then they shall be fully justifiable in taking any kind of security which they can obtain.

Article 16. Ordinary discounts may be made by the president and any four directors, but the president and six directors shall be necessary for the purpole of transacting the general business of the company.

Article 17. Stock in the Farmers Bank of Maryland may be transferred by the holder, in person or by power of attorney, at said bank, or at the branch bank at Easton, but all debts actually over due to the company by a stockholder offering to transfer, must be discharged before such transfer shall be made.

Article 18. Dividends of the profits of the company shall be made at the end of the first year, and half yearly thereafter, and at the end of every three years a dividend shall be made of surplus profits, which dividends shall be payable to the stockholders on the respective shores at the bank and branch bank.

Article 20. A majority of the directors of the bank and branch bank may, at any time, call a general meeting of the stockholders for objects relative to the interests of the company, they giving six weeks notice in the public prints, and expressing in said notice the points or objects to be deliberated upet such meeting.

Article 21. Should it happen that a part of the shares in this bank allotted to any county shall not be subscribed for, and shall be returned to the commissioners at Annapolis or Easton, the directors of each bank shall give public notice of the number of shares on each shore unoccupied, and shall notify the time when they will open books at Annapolis and Easton for the disposal of such shares.

Article 22. Whenever the state shall become a stockholder to an amount not less than fifty thousand dollars, she shall be entitled to appoint two directors, one for each shore; and for every additional hundred thousand dollars paid by the state, to amount of four hundred and fifty thousand dollars, she shall be entitled to appoint two additional directors in manner as aforesaid; and when the whole amount allotted to the state shall be paid up, then the state shall be entitled to elect eleven directors, say six for the western and five for the eastern shore.

Article 23. Before the president and directors shall act as such, they shall take an oath, or affirmation, " that they will faithfully, diligently and honestly, " perform the duties of their station;" and the cashier, the book-keeper and clerks, shall also take a similar oath, or affirmation, and shall besides give bonds, with security, to the satisfaction of the board of directors, for the faithful discharge of their duties in their several stations.

Article 24. That whenever any person or persons are indebted to the said bank for monies borrowed by him, her or them, for bonds, bills, mortgages, or notes given or endorsed by him, her or them, with an express declaration written in the body of the said bill, bond, mortgage or note, that the same shall be negotiable at or in the said bank, and shall refuse or neglect to make payment thereof at the time the same becomes due, and the president and directors of the

SWEDEN.

GOTTENBURG, May 25.

A RUSSIAN courier, with very important &c. patches for count Woronzow, at London, armed from St. Peterfburg yellerday and will take his pallage in the Earl of Leiceller packet, with this day's mail; he has been detained a fliort time on his journey by the breaking up of the ice in the gulph of Botha as have the Proffian mails, one of which reached this place to-day. The courier relates that the entrance of the French into the independent flates, in fearth of emigrants, and the murder of the duke d'Enghein, have given great umbrage indeed at the court of St. Peteriburg, and that fome ftrong measures will be taken in consequence.

The gun-boats destined for Stralfund are fitting out here with all possible expedition. They are formidable velicls, carrying each a 42 pounder in the bow, and another in the stern, besides a number of swivels and from 60 to 100 men.

COPY OF THE ORDER FOR COURT MOURNING.

On Saturday the 19th of May, his majefty's court is to go into mourning for eight days, for the late duke Louis Henry d'Enghein : fringes are to be worn until the 24th inclusively, and afterwards jewels and blond lace until the 26th inclusive, when the court is to be out of mourning.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, June 6.

Yelterday arrived the Hamburg mail of the 22 ult, with one from Gottenburg. The former bring little of importance in addition to that of the 23th which had previously come to hand. The Gotten burg mail confirms the accounts of the indignation excited at the courts of Peterfburg and Stockholm by the murder of duke d'Enghein, with intimation of certain firong measures to be adopted in confequence. Count Woronzow, the Russian ambassador. has received fome important dispatches by this conveyance, and a mellenger arrived at the same tim with a paper from J. B. Warren. General Stritted Ruffian officer, high in the confidence of his Imperis majefty, is also arrived in town, and is supposed to be the bearer of fome communications of the last in-

Yesterday Mr. Fox and Mr. Grey had an interview with Mr. Pitt, in Downing-Breet, before the meeting of the house of commons, and which lafte for an hour and a half. We do not pretend to know the subject of the conference.

Yesterday the king took an airing in the sam coach with her majelly, which is the first time find his first appearance abroad, and the report in the row circles was, that his majefly is confiderably amend in health within the last two days.

Several of the morning and evening papers have politively afferted that an expedition was on the point of failing against the Cape of Good-Hope, and the names, not only of the commander, but even of many of the inferior officers who were to be employed, last been mentioned with the greatest confidence;can affure our readers, that these statements are con pletely deflitute of foundation. There is no expetion in agitation against the Cape, of course no cers can have been appointed to the command. FROM THE ISLE OF FRANCE.

Capt. Bryant, who arrived at Salem on the 28th ult. from the Lile of France, whence he failed the 9th of May, left there seven vessels of war, to fail in a few days, viz. 1 ship of 80 guns, 5 frigates, and 1 corvette.- The morning capt. B. left the island, two frigates arrived, with a very rich prize from India. An embargo was to be laid the fame day .- Off the Cape of Good Hope, faw a fleet of 8 large ships standing to the westward.

Agentleman just returned from Edenton, (N. C.) Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Amsterdam to his friend in Boston, dated May 22.

" Last Tuesday, (15,) a fleet of French and Dutch veffels failed from Flushing for Oftend .- It confisted of two French ships of 16 guns, and 20 French sch'rs mounting 7 guns each, viza two on each fide of 36 pounders, one aftern and two alread of 30; 50 Dutch gun-boats of three guns, viz. one on each fide of 12 pounds and one ahead of twenty-four.

These vessels were manned principally by soldiers, and men who had never been on falt water before. The next day after their departure, (they being still in fight,) a firing began, which lasted with some little ceffation about 24 hours .- I have not yet heard of the number of the enemy nor the refult of the action; though from the filence of the papers I conjecture it has been rather unfavourable to the republican cause. Our London papers mention that Sir Sidney Smith fell in with this fleet, and drove several on shore, but the main body escaped towards Ostend, as the vessels firing grounds to suspect the villainous attempts at of his squadron drew too much water to get suffici-

> A private letter from Paris, dated May 18, has the following particulars :-

" Buonaparte will on the 14th July, be invested in the Champ de Mars, by the grand constable, with the imperial mantle, and receive from him the imperial fword, both of which will be previously confecrated in the cathedral church of Notre Dame by the cardinal, arch bishop of Paris. It is faid there will be no anointing or coronation.

" Buonaparte after receiving the mantle, will take the oath attached to his high dignity in presence of the members of the fenate, those of the tribunate, the legislative body, tribunals, and the other constituted

Another letter, dated May 22, fays-" Befides the known difagreements in our imperial family, between his majesty Napoleon and his brother citizen Lucien Buonaparte, his imperial highness, prince Louis Buonaparte, has narrowly escaped an affair of honour with citizen Beauharnois, brother to her imperial highness, the princess Fanny de Beauharnois, confort to prince Louis. This quarrel originated in the discontent of citizen Beauharnois, who, though his mother was faluted an empress, his father an emperor, his fifter made a princels, and his brotherin-law an imperial prince, and a conflable of the empire, in the fame day; he received neither rank nor promotion, but simply an annuity of 100,000 livers (40001) in the month, until he can be better provided for. In the challenge to pringe Louis, citizen Beaubarnois faid, that he was a viscount, when his imperial highness was only a sans culotte; and that he possessed property to the amount of 60,000 livres in the year, when the whole imperial Buonaparte family

together did not possess an acre of land, or a cottage.
"Cit. shares above sixty, and not exceeding one hundred, one vote; and for every ten shares above one hundred, one vote; but no person or body politic shall be entitled to a greater number than thirty votes. All votes at elections shall be by ballot, delivered in person or by proxy.

Article 9. No person can be admitted to take his seat as a director, unless he shall be at the time a stockholder, and if he shall at any time cease to be a stockholder, he shall cease to be a director.

Article 10. The president and directors first chosen shall hold their seats for twelve months, and may be re-elected at the regular annual elections, If the president shall be chosen out of the number of directors, his place shall be supplied by the directors from among the stockholders.

If a vacancy shall at any time happen among the directors by death, resignation or otherwise, the directors shall elect a director to fill the vacancy for the residue of the year from among the stockholders.

Article 11. In case of sickness, or necessary absence, of the president, he shall, in writing, appoint among the papers in such suit. one of the board of directors to act as president pro tempore.

Article 12. The board of directors for the bank and branch bank shall respectively have power to appoint a cashier, and other officers and servants, for executing the business of the company, and the directors of the bank and branch bank shall jointly fix the compensation to be allowed the presidents for their extraordinary attendance, as well as the salaries to the above said officers and servants, which expences shall be defrayed out of the funds of the company.

" Last Tuesday, (15,) a fleet of French and Dutch vellels failed from Flushing for Oftend,-It confisted of two French ships of 16 guns, and 20 French sch'rs mounting 7 guns each, viza two on each fide of 36 pounders, one aftern and two ahead of 30; 50 Dutch gun-boats of three guns, viz. one on each fide of 12 pounds and one ahead of twenty-four.

These vessels were manned principally by soldiers, and men who had never been on falt water before. The next day after their departure, (they being still in fight,) a firing began, which lasted with some little ceffation about 24 hours .- I have not yet heard of the number of the enemy nor the refult of the action; though from the filence of the papers I conjecture it has been rather unfavourable to the republican cause. Our London papers mention that Sir Sidney Smith fell in with this fleet, and drove several on shore, but the main body escaped towards Oftend, as the veffels

A private letter from Paris, dated May 18, has the following particulars :-

" Buonaparte will on the 14th July, be invested in the Champ de Mars, by the grand constable, with the imperial mantle, and receive from him the imperial fword, both of which will be previously confecrated in the cathedral church of Notre Dame by the cardinal, arch bishop of Paris. It is said there will be no anointing or coronation.

" Buonaparte after receiving the mantle, will take the oath attached to his high dignity in presence of the members of the senate, those of the tribunate, the legislative body, tribunals, and the other constituted

Another letter, dated May 22, fays-" Besides the known disagreements in our imperial family, between his majefty Napoleon and his brother citizen Lucien Buonaparte, his imperial highness, prince Louis Buonaparte, has narrowly escaped an affair of honour with citizen Beauharnois, brother to her imperial highness, the princess Fanny de Beauharnois, confort to prince Louis. This quarrel originated in the discontent of citizen Beauharnois, who, though his mother was faluted an empress, his father decreed an emperor, his fifter made a princefs, and his brotherpromotion, but fimply an annuity of 100,000 livers (40001) in the month, until he can be better provided for. In the challenge to prince Louis, citizen Beaubarnois faid, that he was a vifcount, when his imperial highness was only a sans culotte; and that he possessed property to the amount of 60,000 livres in the year, when the whole imperial Buonaparte family together did not possess an acre of land, or a cottage.
