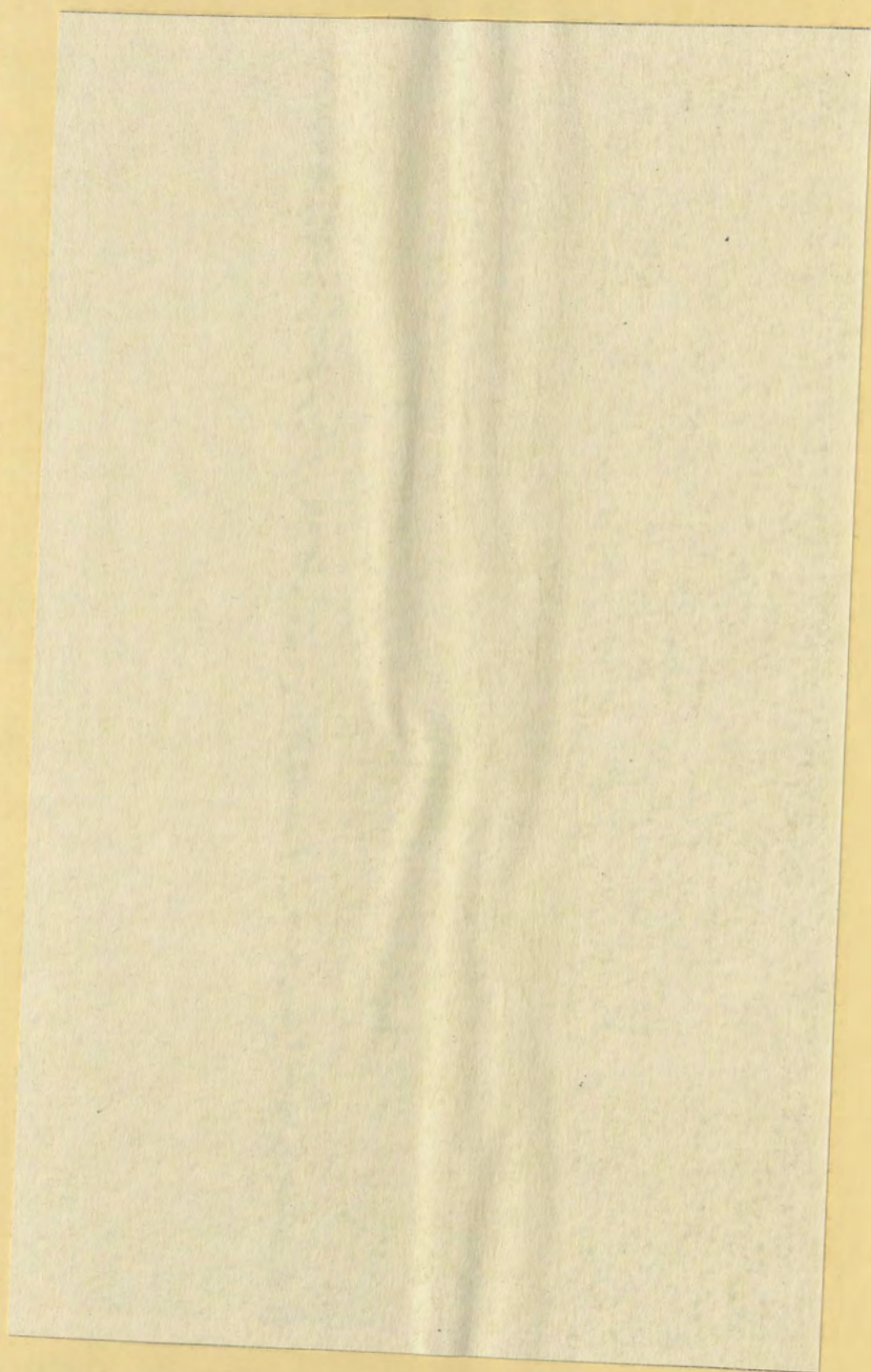



## FOREWORD

The Ohio Company had a post at Will's Landing, across from Fort Cumberland on Will's Creek. It was from this post that Thomas Cresap and Nemacolin, a Delaware Indian, set forth to blaze a trail to the banks of the Ohio River. This trail became a well-worn track over which General Braddock marched to Fort Duquesne to battle the French. The trail was called Nemacolin's Path; and today the National Highway, U.S. Route 40, deviates very little from it.





Nemacolin developed a great love for the Cresap family, and when his people moved West, he remained in the area, acting as guide for the white man.

Nemacolin and Dan Cresap often went bear hunting together. On one trip they separated to meet later; and when Dan did not appear at the appointed time, Nemacolin went in search of his friend. Nemacolin found Cresap badly injured from a fall on the rocky crags at the top of a mountain. The site of the accident became known as Dan's Rock and Dan's Mountain.

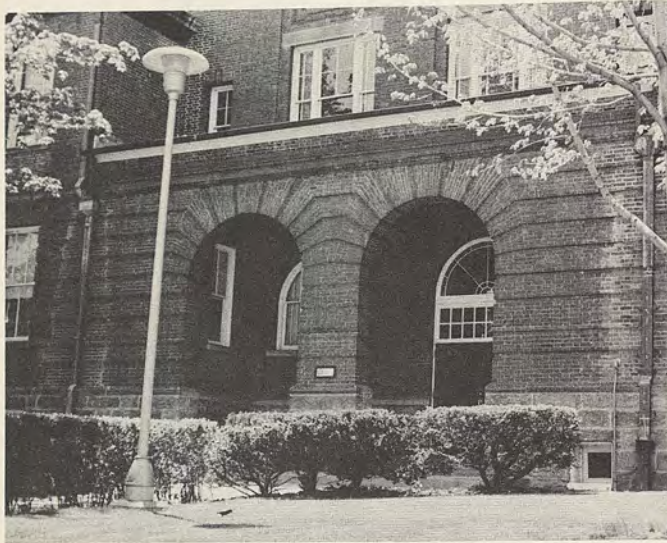
As the years passed, Nemacolin had a longing to rejoin his tribe. His loneliness became such that he left his small son with the Cresap family and followed the trails West to live again among his kinsmen. Nemacolin's son was named George by his adopted family. During his youth, he accompanied Cresap, as his father had, on hunting trips throughout the country-side. He established a hunting camp in the valley between Dan's and Savage Mountains, where a little stream ran from the rise at Frostburg to the Potomac River. The stream became known as George's Creek, and the area also took this name, by which they are known today. George lived his entire life with the Cresaps and died in their home.

And so goes the story of Nemacolin, guide and friend to the first white men in Western Maryland, the Indian for whom this book is named.





# FROSTBURG STATE COLLEGE



The year 1898 saw Frostburg as one of the most prosperous towns in the State of Maryland. Frostburg had many fine businesses, an abundance of churches and saloons, two opera houses, and her own newspaper, the Frostburg Mining Journal. It is the editor of the Mining Journal, J. Benson Oder, who can be called the Father of Frostburg State College. On January 8, 1898, Oder proposed to his readers that State Normal School No. 2 to be established in Frostburg. The idea was accepted by many of the townspeople, and in February a group traveled to Annapolis to support the proposal. The bill was introduced on the floor of the State Legislature, and things did not go well for the Frostburg Delegation. By March the bill seemed to be doomed. Suddenly, at the last possible minute, an official in the Comptroller's Office who had family ties in Frostburg suggested that the State furnish \$20,000 for the establishment of a school and \$5,000 annually, provided that the city of Frostburg provide a site for the school. The bill to establish State Normal School No. 2 passed with this amendment.

In August, 1898, a group of State School Board Officials, accompanied by Governor Lloyd Lowndes, traveled to Frostburg to select a site for the school. The site chosen was known as Beall's Park, and was located on Loo Street (Now College Avenue). The land cost \$2,000, and it was now up to the citizens of Frostburg to raise the money. A committee initiated a subscription drive, and through the contributions of the citizens of Frostburg, collected more than enough money to pay for the land.





# 1898-1978

On June 27, 1898, ground was broken and construction started on State Normal School No. 2. Despite the elaborate plans that had been drawn up, the contractor insisted that he could complete the building with the available funds. By January of 1899 it became apparent that this could not be done. The State Legislature was approached about the problem, but they were indifferent about it. For two years, the Normal School stood empty, while the State took no action. Finally, on March 5, 1902, a bill was passed in the last minutes of a legislative session to appropriate \$15,000 to finish the school and put it into operation.



State Normal School No. 2 opened its doors to students in September, 1902, under the direction of Principal Edmund Dandridge Murdaugh. There were 6 faculty members and 94 students. 151 elementary school children also attended "model classes" in the building. Thus, 252 people were crowded into the building that is today known as Old Main. The school had a four year program; The first two years were similar to high school and the last two were the teacher training program. Students at the school studied such topics as Latin, Rhetoric, History, Literature, and Pedagogy (Teacher Education). The school grew slowly, and in 1913 a small building (now Faculty Hall) was erected to house the model classes. In 1916 a dormitory (Now Frost Hall) was erected. The school soon outgrew these quarters, and a new lab school and auditorium building (now Allegany Hall) was erected. 1934 saw a major step in the college's history. The State Legislature passed a bill lengthening the teacher training program at the school from 2 to 4 years, and renaming the institution the State Teachers College at Frostburg. John L. Dunkle was President of the College at this time.



During the war years of the 1940's the State Teachers College struggled to stay alive. Enrollments dropped to the point, where, in 1947, the State considered abandoning the institution. It was only through the hard work and dedication of President Lillian Compton that the college survived those years. The 1950's saw an upswing in the college's enrollment. The campus grew in 1953-1956 when Allen Hall, Compton Hall, Garrett Hall, Lowndes Hall and Simpson Hall were constructed, forming the quad. In 1953 R. Bowen Hardesty assumed the Presidency from Miss Compton. The 1960's saw steady growth at Frostburg. By 1963 the enrollment had reached 1,600 students. The word "teachers" was dropped from the name of the school, giving us the name Frostburg State College. The 1960's also saw the college administration in turmoil. Dr. Hardesty and Dr. Thomas Pullen, State Superintendent of Schools, were engaged in a battle with the State to keep the University of Maryland from absorbing Frostburg. Hardesty earned the dislike of many faculty members and community leaders to the point where many groups were demanding an investigation of the college administration. The student body began to protest an administration that was resistant to change. In the fall of 1963, Hardesty resigned for "reasons of health". His successor, Dr. Rudolph Bremen, did not have much better luck. Bremen kept tabs on the campus by monitoring telephone calls and use of a spyglass from his office window. He was not liked by many people on campus.







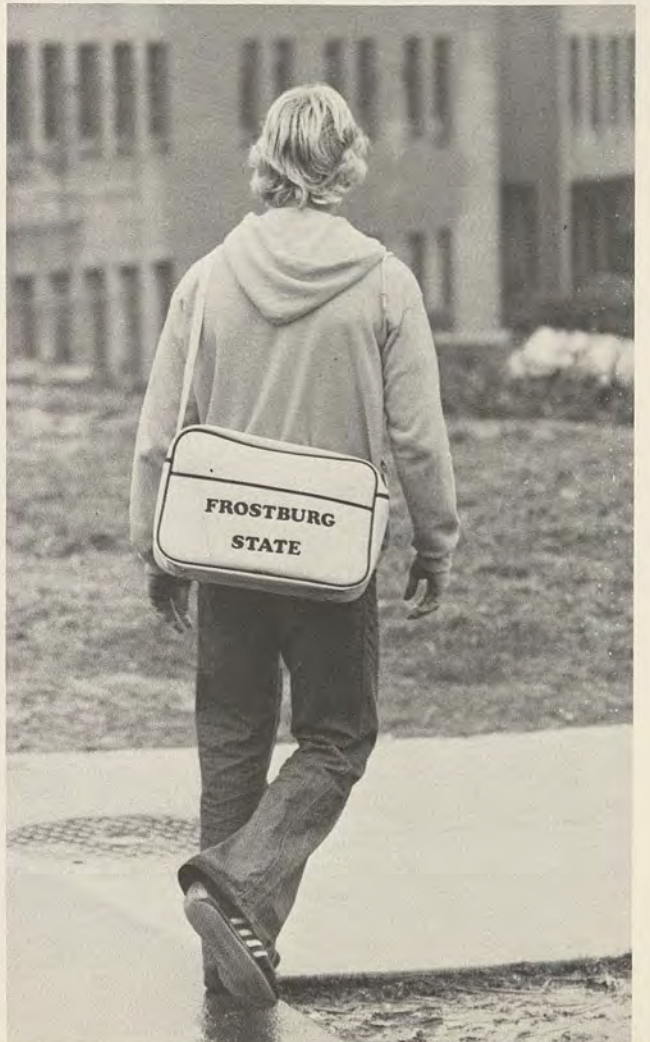
In 1965 Dr. John Morey was appointed as President by the Board of Trustees. Under him, and his successor, Dr. Nelson P. Guild, the college began a spurt of growth that has not yet stopped. Under Morey and Guild, the college has grown academically, physically, and in enrollment. The old teacher education program offered at Frostburg was diversified and the college began to offer business and other programs. The campus has gained 14 new buildings since Morey became President. The growth began under Morey continues today under Dr. Guild.

In 80 years of history, Frostburg State College has seen much change. The campus, the faculty, and the student body have grown and changed almost beyond recognition. Despite efforts to have it torn down in the early 1970's, Old Main still stands, changed very little from 1898. Just as in 1898, 1978 sees the college in a struggle with the State over adequate funding. Nevertheless, Frostburg State continues to grow, providing a higher education to thousands of students annually. Who can say what direction Frostburg will go in the next 80 years — Let us just hope that the next 80 years are as productive as the first 80 were.

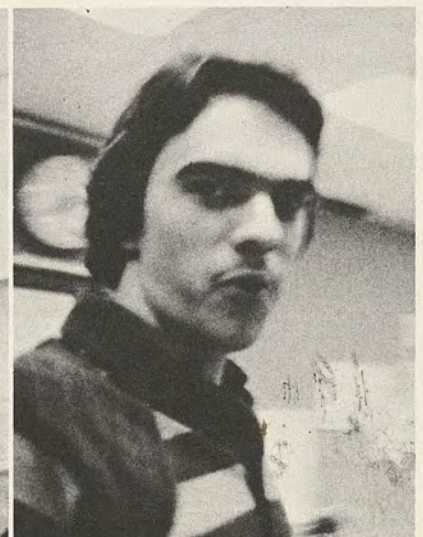
## Editors Notes —
