The publishing the following Piece, from a late Pennsylvania Chronicle, we hope will be acceptable to our Readers, as the Scheme therein proposed, if carried into Execution, may prove greatly detrimental to the Commerce of this Province, and therefore demands the Attention of every Person interested in its Prosperity.

It is a Fact, indisputedly certain, that what Port soever on this Continent can acquire the greatest Share of its inland Commerce, must proportionably advance in Riches and Importance; as whether Manufactures be established or not, it is evident that no civilized People ever existed, without having occasion both for Imports and Exports of considerable Value.

Altho' this City has hitherto had a large Share of the Trade of this Continent, yet the Continuance of those Advantages seems to depend on a vigorous Exertion of those Powers kind Providence has put in our Hands. The Vicinity of the navigable Parts of Potomack, &c. to the Ohio, and the extensive Navigation from New-York to Lake Ontario, seem to call loudly on us to exert ourselves to preserve the Advantages the Industry and Virtue our Ancestors have gained, and to prevent the important Commerce of the inland Parts of this Continent from taking a different Turn.

The Schuylkill is a Channel properly adapted, by Providence, for a Communication between the River Delaware and Susquehannah; and the making an easy and commodious Navigation, as far as possible, up that Stream, is an Object that deserves our serious Attention, and is certainly much more practicable than many seem to imagine.

It has been asserted, in the Chronicle, that the best Way into the Indian Country, is by Fort Augusta, as the West Branch of Susquehannah is many Miles navigable; and the straightening our Roads, and moderating the Rate of Ferriage, have been well recommended therein, as Measures absolutely necessary to preserve the Commerce of our Back Counties, to this City, from which they receive Protection. But the Project in Question would most effectually advance both these useful and advantageous Designs, for the Town of Reading, being only Fifty-three Miles from Harris's Ferry, is consequently nearer to a great Part of the Country beyond the Susquehannah, than Baltimore, or any other Southern Part; and had that Town a constant and ready Communication, by Water, with this City, it would be, I suppose, as good a Market in all Respects: And if some of the Principal Ferries on Susquehannah, were, at the same Time, made free, there is no doubt but most of the Commerce of those Counties would center there.

How important soever these Considerations may appear at present, they are extremely trivial, compared with what may probably be the Case in succeeding Ages, when all the Intervals of the Mountains, the Shores of Ontario and Erie, and the extensive Plains of Ohio, &c. &c. may be filled with People, whose Necessities, Conveniences, or Luxuries, must be a perpetual Fund of Employment and Wealth to the Sea-Ports with which they communicate. And, as many of the wide extended Branches of Susquehannah, are, or may be made navigable, a Communication may be thereby opened from this City, of greater Extent and Consequence than can be easily conceived. But were our Attention only extended, at present, to that Part of the Province, situated on this Side that River, the Country along Schuylkill and above Reading, is naturally very valuable, and would be more so, did not their excessive Distance from Markets reduce the Value of their Produce; and discourage the Improvements which Industry, constantly attentive to these Objects alone, would certainly and soon produce.

The taking our Farmers from their Habitations, to come long Journeys to Market, has, besides the Loss of Time and Expence, many Inconveniences; it often debauches their Morals, lessens their Industry; when at home, tempts their Servants to commit Disorders, and takes off that Decorum which the Eye of a wife Man always produces among his Dependents; so that every Attempt to facilitate Carriage, may be considered as a moral, as well as a political Advantage.

Our great and wise Founder was a Man of Views, sufficiently extensive, to be convinced of the Possibility and Utility of the Scheme. His Attempt to settle the City on the Banks of that River, is well known; and, though the short Day of his Life, and incumbered Situation of his Affairs, rendered his Design abortive, yet the Judgment of so great a Man, may, I hope, be a Means of procuring those Proposals a fair and impartial Consideration. The Navigation of Schuylkill, has already attracted the Attention of the Legislature; but their Attempt having consisted chiefly in clearing a Passage through the Rocks, at the Falls, the River is thereby rendered shallower above those Obstructions, and the Navigation rather less practicable than before, the Depth of Water being insufficient for Vessels of any Burden, except in great Freshes, and then the natural Rapidity of the Current renders the Passage downwards, very dangerous, and the Return almost impracticable; besides, as these Freshes seldom happen, but in Spring and Fall, and not always then, so precarious a Navigation is of very little Consequence. Some have thought that contracting of the Stream might be a Means of Improvement; but as that could

only be done by deepening the Channel, in the best of the Current; and as the Bottom of the River is hard, and in some Places rocky, and the Distance great, such an Attempt appears to me impracticable, and not likely to answer the intended Design; for the Velocity of the Current would be thereby vastly increased, and the Content of the Water proportionably lessened, and rendered too shoal and rapid to admit Vessels of any Burden going down, much less returning: And, as such a Channel would be very small, compared with the Body of the River, when raised by large Freshes, the Crookedness of the Stream would, at such Times, occasion its being filled up in many Places, and the Work be to do over again every Year. The only possible Method effectually to compass this desirable Event, is that which is so frequently practised in England, and elsewhere, viz. the moderating the Current, and deepening the Water by a Number of Dams across the River, accommodated with Sluices or Locks, to give Passage up and down to Flats, or Rafts, as often as Occasion requires.

It has been delivered, as the Opinion of good Judges, that the Surface of the Water at Reading, is not more than Sixty Feet perpendicular, above the Head of the Tide; but, admitting it should prove One Hundred Feet, yet Sixteen Dams, each Six Feet high, would reduce the Water to a sufficient Depth and Stagnation, as only Six Feet Descent, in near One Hundred Miles, must make the Current very moderate and passible, up or down, with the greatest Ease.

I am not much acquainted with the Charge of making Dams, but should think Six Thousand Pounds abundantly sufficient to erect one over the Schuylkill, with proper Sluices for the Purposes of Navigation; at which Computation, the Cost of Sixteen Dams, amount to Ninety-six Thousand Pounds. And, considering the Fertility of the Land along that River, and the very great Extent of Country above Reading, the Trade of which would certainly and soon center there; the Quantity of Goods transported downwards, annually, may be computed at Fifteen Thousand Ton, and Five Thousand Ton returned: Allowing therefore a Dollar per Ton, for Toll, to the Proprietors of the Navigation, it would amount to Seven Thousand Five Hundred Pounds per Annum; from which deduct Five Hundred Pounds for the Charges of collecting. The remaining Seven Thousand Pounds amounts to upwards of Seven per Cent. Interest upon the computed Charges of erecting the Works: And, as the Dams would produce very valuable Seats for Mills, the Profits arising from that Consideration, would probably exceed the Expence of Repairs.

I suppose the present Rate of Carriage from Reading, may amount to about Fifty Shillings a Ton, or more; whereas if a good hawling Road was cleared along the Banks of the River, and the Current moderated by the Means above-mentioned, and kept up to the Depth of Three Feet, or upwards, the Carriage by Water might be afforded for Fifteen Shillings per Ton; for a Flat of One Hundred Tons burden, might be navigated up and down the River, by Four Men and Two Horses, in a Week or Ten Days; the Charge of which would not amount to Ten Pounds a Week, whereas allowing a Dollar per Ton, for Toll, the remaining Dollar on One Hundred Ton downwards and Twenty-five Ton upwards, amounts to 46l. 17s. 6d. each Voyage; a Profit much more than sufficient.

But the Advantages derived to the Country by this Means, would be far more considerable; for, admitting the Advance on the Value of Wheat, at Reading, to be only Nine-pence a Bushel, and that only an Extent of Fifty Miles Square could receive the Benefit of this Undertaking, it amounts to One Million Six Hundred Thousand Acres, of which, supposing only a Twentieth Part in Grain, and to produce Twenty Bushels per Acre, Half of which to be expended in the Country, the Advance upon the Half exported, at the Rate above-mentioned, amounts to Thirty Thousand Pounds; to which if the profits arising from moderating the Carriage of Iron, Timber, Masts and Boards (which Three last should pay but half Toll) and also from the Goods returned, be added, the Account may be fairly doubled, amounting to Sixty Thousand Pounds per Annum, — a Sum probably equal to more than half the Expence of erecting the Navigation.

To this it will be objected, that the Freshes which arise at the breaking up of the Winter, are commonly so great, the Current so rapid, and the Bodies of Ice so forcible (accompanied with Logs and other Incumbrances) that no Dams could possibly resist their Force, but inevitably be torn down, and the whole Project be thereby rendered abortive.

I shall answer this, by observing, that the Rivers in England, in many Places, are more rapid and furious than Schuylkill; and though the Moderation of their Winters, in the South of that Kingdom, and near the Sea, may prevent their Rivers freezing, yet, in the mountainous Parts of the North, this is by no means the Case; they are frequently frozen over to a great Thickness; and as those Frosts mostly break up with heavy Rains, and the Country has a great Declivity, their Rivers swell to a Height, and pour down with a Rapidity vastly superior to Schuylkill, bringing Ice and Logs along with them; and yet many of those Rivers are made navigable by the Means here proposed, and those which are not, have Dams across them for the Benefit of Mills, as well as Bridges, many of which continue for Ages: And, if the trifling Profits of a Grift-Mill (seldom amounting to Fifty Pounds per Annum) can support the Expence of a Dam, how inconsiderable

must it be, compared with the Value of so important a Navigation as here presents itself. 'Tis true, few of those Rivers are as wide as Schuylkill; but, as Water acts not in Proportion to its Width, but to its Weight and Rapidity, there can be no Doubt but that if Dams were erected with equal Care and Judgment, they would continue as well as those in England; especially considering that the present Velocity of the Stream, would, by these Means, be much moderated, and its Impression upon the Dam proportionably lessened. — Admitting, therefore, the Property in this Navigation (computed at One Hundred Thousands Pounds) to be divided into One Thousand Shares, and vested by Law in the Subscribers; together with an Act of Incorporation, and the necessary Powers for putting the Project in Execution; each Subscriber to be reputed a Member of the Corporation, and enjoy as many Votes in the Choice of Managers, &c. as he subscribes Shares, the Payments to be made annually, at Five per Cent. The First Payment, by Way of Trial: After which, if the Design is approved (the Subscribers giving the Company proper Security for their Payments) Notes of Credit might be issued, under proper Limitations, whereby the Navigation might be expeditiously brought to Perfection; and the Profits arising therefrom being added to the annual Payments, the Money would probably be repaid in a few Years, and the Subscribers become possessed of a very valuable Property, at a trifling Expence.

STOCKHOLM, February 12.

BANKRUPTCIES become daily more frequent in this Kingdom. There has just happened such an one as we never before had an Example of, viz. that of an entire City (Nicaeleby, in Finland) the Magistrates of which, and all the Inhabitants, except a single Merchant, named Regratier, have declared themselves insolvent to the Parliament of Abo. Three-fourths of the Inhabitants of the Town of Vasa, are also reduced to the same Extremity.

LONDON, March 14.

We hear the Betts laid amongst the Nobility and Gentry, at the West End of the Town, is 500 Guineas to 500, that Mr. Wilkes will be returned a Member for the City of London.

Extract of a Letter from Glasgow, March 3.

"This Day the Model of a Machine was sent off to the Royal Society, London. This Machine is to be a great Saving to the Farmer, in Seed and Labour; as by it Corn and Plants may be sown or transplanted, at any given Distance, or Depth, in the Ground; and both Seed and Labour to cost only from Two to Five Shillings per Acre; it was viewed by several Gentlemen; and has the Appearance of great Saving and Value to the interesting Branch of Husbandry."

March 15. It is extremely remarkable, that the Motto of the Worshipful Joiners Company, in which Mr. WILKES has lately taken up his Freedom, is, JOIN LOYALTY and LIBERTY.

It is said the Members of the new Parliament will meet in May, for the Choice of a Speaker, to swear in the Members, and also to pass one or more Acts; which will be deemed one of the Seven Sessions; after which the Parliament will be prorogued till the usual Time for the Dispatch of Business.

Yesterday Lord Alston read his Recantation of the Errors of Popery, embraced the Protestant Religion, and received the Sacrament at St. James's Church.

We are told by Letters from Rome, that had it not been for the Intervention of Cardinal Albani, the Pope would have been lately irreconcilably embroiled with the Duke of Modena. That Prince, it seems, had presented a Petition to the Pontiff, for obtaining a Tax upon the Ecclesiastics, and a Reform of certain small Convents, in his Dominions; but the Court of Rome thought the Request improper, and did not vouchsafe to give the Duke an Answer. Upon this, the Minister of Modena soon received Orders to retire from Rome; and Things were running to great Extremity, when Cardinal Albani, whose Candour and Moderation are well known, interposed his good Offices, and engaged the Pope to consent to the Duke of Modena's Demands.

It is positively asserted, that last Night, and not before, Mr. Wilkes was complimented with the Royal Pardon.

It is said, that a noble Earl's Friendship for a certain popular Gentleman, is so great, that he has declared he would spend 50,000l. sooner than he should be disappointed of a Seat in an august Assembly.

Yesterday came on the Election at Aylesbury, where Anthony Bacon, Esq; the old Member, and John Durand, Esq; of Cashalton, in Surry, were chosen without Opposition.

'Tis conjectured, that the Cause of the extraordinary Procedure, of the City of Paris being surrounded by 40,000 Men, is owing to some treasonable Crime, like that of Damien's.

March 17. Mr. Wilkes waited on the Chamberlain at his House, on Tuesday Evening, and took up his Freedom; and Yesterday Morning, about Nine o'Clock went to Guildhall, and was in the Council-Chamber

from whence he proceeded, with the rest of the Candidates, upon the Hustings, and was received by the People with loud Acclamations. He made the following Address to the Livery:

Gentlemen,
"I am happy to find myself once more amongst the Friends and Patrons of Liberty. This Day makes me glorious Amends for the Rigour of a long unmerited Exile, in which the only Consolation remaining to me was, that from my sufferings you had an uninterrupted Enjoyment of your most invaluable Rights and Privileges: Since the Exertion of my Firmness in an important Moment, no Minister has once dared to issue a General Warrant against your Persons, or to sign an Order for the Seizure of your Papers; and I trust that such Despotism will never be again exercised over the Free Subjects of this Country."

"I stand here, Gentlemen, a private Man, unconnected with the Great, and unsupported by any Party. I have no Support but you: I wish no other Support: I can have none more certain, none more honourable. —If I have the Happiness, Gentlemen, of being returned to Parliament by your Favour, I shall be ready to pay the greatest Deference to the Sentiments of my Constituents on every Occasion, and shall dedicate myself to their Service, by promoting, to the utmost of my Abilities, the Trade and Commerce of this great Metropolis, by which alone it can maintain the First Rank it now enjoys, and I hope, with its Liberties, will ever enjoy."

All the other Candidates likewise addressed the Livery, previous to the holding up of Hands.

There was as full a Hall as ever was known upon the like Occasion, and so great was the Curiosity of the People to see Mr. Wilkes, that several Thousands surrounded the Hall, and King-Street was quite full, where they waited from Nine o'Clock in the Morning 'til the Poll ended.

This Day on closing the Poll, for Four Members to represent this City in Parliament, the Numbers were as follows: Sir Robert Ladbroke, 644. Right Hon Thomas Harley, 626. Mr. Alderman Beckford, 508. Mr. Alderman Trecothick, 506. Sir Richard Glyn, 486. John Patterson, Esq; 363. John Wilkes, Esq; 172.

Yesterday Earl Percy, and the Hon. Mr. Sandys, were unanimously elected Members to represent the City and Liberty of Westminster in the ensuing Parliament.

Yesterday came on the Election of Members for Guildford, in Surrey, when George Onslow, Esq; and Sir Fletcher Norton, Knight, were chosen without Opposition.

Yesterday John Radcliffe, and Richard Sutton, Esq's, were chosen Members for the Borough of St. Albans.

A Correspondent, who dates his Letter from the Smyrna Coffee-House, and signs Verax, says,—"The Affair, with respect to Mr. W——'s Pardon, so far as I have been able to learn, has no other Foundation than this: A noble D— delivered to a great Personage, a Letter from W——, which he condescended to read, and afterwards retired for a few Minutes, in order, as supposed, to shew it to his illustrious Consort; he then returned again into the Apartment where the Letter was first given him, but did not signify either Pleasure or Displeasure on account of the Letter; so that his Taciturnity, on this Occasion, was considered by W——'s Friends as a favourable Omen; and upon this they have pushed him on to declare himself a Candidate for the City of London, in Parliament; with regard to which Step, our different Opinions, in this Part of the Town, may be known, as usual, by our Wagers. Some have laid that Mr. W—— will be certainly chosen, others that he will be in *Durance vile* before the Expiration of the Week."

A Wager of 100 Guineas was laid Yesterday at a Coffee-House near the Exchange, that John Wilkes, Esq; would be elected for London, and the same Sum that he would have Twenty Votes more than any other Candidate.

It is said Mr. Wilkes has received a very kind Invitation from a certain Borough, to represent them in Parliament, should he fail of being returned for the City of London.

Saturday Evening John Wilkes, Esq; supped at the King's Arms Tavern, in Cornhill, with a great Number of the Nobility and Livery of the City of London.

It is thought that the Number of legal Pollers of the City of London, is about 8000.

TO THE PRINTERS.

AS the Reverend Mr. ALLEN, in several of his Papers, signed A BYSTANDER, and particularly in his *Third Letter*, has, without any Provocation from me, thrown out several Insinuations injurious to my Character, I can no longer forbear doing Justice to myself; and therefore submit the following Detail to the Judgment of the Public, by which they will be able to determine, whether he or I have been in the Wrong, in the Affair which happened between us. Let him speak Truth, and I shall deny nothing he says. As to myself, I am so fortunately circumstanced on the present Occasion, that I shall not advance a single Fact, but what I am able to establish by indifferent Testimony. I have been well inform'd, that he likewise drew up a State of the Affair for the Public Eye, but was so unfortunate as to be wrong in the most material Circumstances, in the Opinion of the very Person, whose Evidence he intended to avail himself of. He was rather anxious to draw up a Representation, at all Events, favourable to himself, than to have his Conduct deduced from a real State of the Case. But, after finding that the Gentleman was not to be deceiv'd by all the specious Colouring, and artificial Glosses of his Pen, into a Belief that what did not happen, did; and what did happen, did not; he threw aside his Paper, with this Declaration, memorable for its Modesty, and Love of Truth—"Sir, you have told your Story so often, that you seem to believe it yourself now."

Some Time in the first Week of November last, (as well as I can remember) the Reverend Mr. ALLEN was introduced to me, at my House at *Herring-Bay*, by Mr. ELISHA HARRISON. He was introduced as our new Minister, and, as such, I treated him, and asked him to spend the Day with us. He desir'd to be excus'd, his Affairs calling him to *Annapolis*, but begg'd I would favour him with my Company to dine with him on such a Day next Week, at his House in *Annapolis*, with all the rest of the Vestry, whom he had invited. Immediately after he took his Leave.

Some Business prevented my being in Town on the Day appointed, and therefore I did not wait upon Mr. ALLEN, in consequence of his Invitation; but, a Day or Two afterwards, he came to enquire for me at Mr. PACA's, where I was. From his Behaviour there, I thought he was an old Acquaintance of Mr. PACA's, but afterwards found he was almost as great a Stranger to Mr. PACA, as to myself. He soon, however, introduced the Subject of his Business, which was to procure my Consent, as a *Vestryman*, to hold our Parish, with that of *Annapolis*. He ask'd Mr. PACA's Opinion of the Matter, and he told him he had never look'd into the Books about it, or considered the Point with much Attention. Some Conversation pass'd between them about the Word *adjacent*, and I remember Mr. PACA told him, if that could be got over, the *Consent of the Vestries of both Parishes*, would be absolutely necessary. After this, he invited Mr. PACA and myself to spend the Evening with him, which we accordingly did. He began, with observing to me, how unhappy our Parish had been situated for a Number of Years, in being badly serv'd with Ministers, and how well we should be off in that Respect, upon the Success of his Scheme, for he would place a Curate there, and whenever he became disagreeable to the Parishioners, he should be immediately removed, and another placed in his Stead. To be serv'd with Ministers, who might be remov'd upon Misbehaviour, was, I confess, a very tempting Bait; and, for this Reason, principally, I promis'd him my Vote and Interest in the Vestry, not considering, that when once he got himself established, we should be entirely at his Mercy, and that he might perhaps think that Curate the most deserving, who would serve for the least Money, without consulting the Inclinations of the Parishioners. The next Day, being Saturday, we went down to *West-River* together, he being then on his Way to our Church. The Vestry were to meet on the Tuesday following, and I promis'd him to be there, and did attend accordingly. All the Vestry were not present, and Mr. ALLEN not being there as soon as myself, I hinted the Matter to some of them, but found, it was by no Means improv'd of. Soon after Mr. ALLEN came in, and, after a little Time, mention'd his Scheme to the Vestry, who for some Time would not hear of it. I then interpos'd, and urg'd every Argument I could think of in Favour of the Scheme, and insisted particularly upon the great Advantage it would be of to the Parish, to have a Curate, who might be dismiss'd, whenever he became disagreeable to the Parishioners. The Vestry were somewhat moved by my Arguments, but still insisted upon postponing the Affair, 'til they could consider it better, and have the Sense of the Parishioners upon it, and likewise a full Vestry. To remove the latter Difficulty, Mr. ALLEN publicly inform'd the Vestry, that he had been at the House of Mr. JOHN CHEW, who was one of the Vestry; that Mr. CHEW told him, he could not possibly attend the Meeting of the Vestry, being oblig'd to visit a sick Relation; but, that if he could be there, he would certainly give him his Vote, which, as I shall shew hereafter, was an absolute Falshood. Mr. ALLEN was then very pressing on the Vestry, to give him something, he did not care what, under their Hands, that he might shew it to the Vestry of *St. Anne's Parish*, and said he would draw up some-

thing for the Purpose. The Vestry intimated to him; that if they gave him any Thing, it should express that he should be bound by certain Articles, afterwards to be entered into; to which he consented. He retired into the Closet, and soon after returned with a Paper, which he said would be sufficient. Upon perusing it, the Vestrymen were much surpris'd to find, that the Paper he had drawn up for them to sign, express'd their *absolute Consent*, without the least Hint of any Condition, or any subsequent Articles to be enter'd into, according to his Engagement immediately before. After some Heat upon the Occasion, he said they might alter it just as they thought proper. Upon this the Vestry consented, that he should hold the Parish, provided he would enter into such Articles hereafter, as the said Vestry should think proper, and likewise procure the Consent of the Vestry of *St. Anne's Parish*. I remember I told him at the Time, that I thought such a Paper would be of no Service to him, and advis'd him not to shew it to the Vestry of *St. Anne's*, for that they would only laugh at it; to which he answer'd—"I know very well what I am about."

In a few Days, after this Transaction of the Vestry, I was inform'd that it gave great Uneasiness to the Parishioners; and, I must confess, when I came to consider the Consequences of this Affair, and what an ill Precedent it might be, I was convinced of the Rashness of our Proceeding, repented heartily of the Part I had taken in it, and resolv'd for the Future to oppose the Scheme, especially as I found the Blame was principally laid upon me by the Parishioners. I then declar'd that I would let Mr. ALLEN know my candid Sentiments of the Matter, on the next Meeting of the Vestry; tell him how disagreeable it was to the Parishioners, and that it would be to no Purpose for him to prosecute his Plan any farther. Some few Days after the Transaction above-mentioned, I call'd on Mr. JOHN CHEW, who told me, he had heard of our Proceeding in the Vestry, and that the Parishioners were much displeas'd at it, and determin'd to oppose it; and intimated likewise, that it was quite contrary to his own Sentiments. Upon which I told him, he certainly must be joking, for, that Mr. ALLEN had declar'd to the Vestry, that he (Mr. JOHN CHEW) told him he would have been there, and given him his Vote, had he not been going to see a sick Relation. Mr. CHEW, upon this, grew warm, and said it could not be so; but, upon my telling him, that Mr. ALLEN had certainly said so, he then solemnly declar'd, that Mr. ALLEN told a very great Falshood—that Mr. ALLEN had repeatedly requested the Favour of his Vote, which he as often refus'd, telling him, that he thought it was better to disoblige one Man, than all the Parishioners, and that one Parish was sufficient for any Minister—that Mr. ALLEN then ask'd him, what he thought might be the yearly Income of *St. James's Parish*? to which he answer'd, about £. 300 Sterling—that Mr. ALLEN's Reply was, it would hardly supply me with Liquors—Mr. CHEW, much amaz'd at such Extravagance, told him, that many Men lived very well, and raised large Families upon much less—Mr. ALLEN then ask'd him, what he might spend in a Year; to which he answer'd—about £. 60—But, says Mr. ALLEN, you enjoy many Advantages, that I do not; as, for Instance, you have a Wife: Now, it will cost me something considerable to enjoy the Pleasures you are possess'd of; and concluded, with saying,—"I wish I had never taken the Oath."

The first Time I saw Mr. ALLEN, after the above-mentioned Proceeding of the Vestry, was on Wednesday the 6th of January. The preceding Day the Vestry were to have met in course, but it was so very rainy, that they could not meet. Mr. ALLEN rode up to my Door, and ask'd my Servant, if Mr. EDMISTON was within; and if so, to tell him, that he should be glad to speak with him. Mr. EDMISTON went out immediately, and, after about Ten Minutes, they both came in, and I received Mr. ALLEN in a very friendly Manner. After the usual Compliments, Mr. ALLEN inform'd me, that he was going down to *Pig-Point*, to rent out his Glebe; to which I frankly answer'd, you had better not give yourself that Trouble, 'til you are sure the Parish is yours. He was surpris'd, he said, that I should hesitate, after the Paper he had received from the Vestry. I answer'd, that the Paper did not give him the Parish, that the Matter was become altogether disagreeable to the Parishioners, and that I was much blamed for promoting a Matter of this kind, so contrary to their Inclinations. Upon which he told me, he would take the whole Blame on his own Shoulders. I replied, that when I came to reflect upon the Nature of his Scheme, I was sorry I had ever engaged in it, and that if it should succeed, it might be attended with very disagreeable Consequences. I then gave him the Reasons particularly, which had induc'd me to alter my Opinion, and to retract the Promise I had made in his Favour. I told him, moreover, that it was impossible his Scheme should succeed, as it was directly against a Law of the Province, which I had not considered 'til lately. Upon my turning to the Law, he upbraided me with a Breach of my Promise, and that so repeatedly, that I told him he used me ill. He still persisted in his severe Reproaches, upon which I was resolv'd to go out of the Room, apprehending that I might not be able to restrain my Resentment; but, as I did not distinctly understand what he had just before

said, I walked back across the Room, and then he got up, and said, that he knew from whence the sudden Change had proceeded, and cried out, O DULCITY! I told him he had no Foundation for such an Insinuation, and further added, I assure you, upon my Honour, I do not know that Gentleman's Sentiments upon the Matter. I never have seen him since this Affair took its Rise, nor did I ever hear he was your Enemy from any Person but yourself. To which Mr. ALLEN answer'd, I should doubt that. I was much provoked at these Words, but yet turn'd about, and walk'd to my Desk, on which there was a Bible. I laid my Hand upon it, and told him, I then declar'd, on the Holy Evangelists, that what I had said, was true. He then came up to me, and said, Sir, notwithstanding that, I should much doubt your Word. I replied, what is that you say, Sir? There is the Door. He answer'd, No, Sir! I then told him, he was a Scoundrel, and seizing him by the Collar, with one Hand, I, with a Stick in the other, dragg'd him out of my Door. On my attempting to bar the Door, he put his whole Weight against it, upon which I aim'd a Blow, with a very good Will, I must confess, at his bald Pate; but unluckily, the Door took it, and thus he escap'd a broken Head, the best Part of his Deserts! I then went out, and drove him off the Steps, call'd him a d---d Rascal, and order'd him to go about his Business, and learn better Manners before he came to beg Favours. After all this, he had the Meanness several Times to attempt coming up the Steps, begging, in the most abject Manner, that I would suffer him to come in, and saying repeatedly, O pray, Mr. CHEW—Do, Mr. CHEW, &c. but to no Purpose, it had no other Effect than to add Contempt to my Indignation. The Reverend Mr. EDMISTON, who was present at this whole Affair, interceded for Mr. ALLEN, at his Request; but I told him I would have nothing to say to him, and, if the Scoundrel would not be gone, I would order my Servants to turn his Horse out of the Gate, whereupon he march'd off. Mr. EDMISTON went with him some Distance, and, as he afterwards told me, advis'd Mr. ALLEN to go to Mr. DAVID WEEMS's, telling him there was a good Understanding between Mr. WEEMS and me, and that Mr. WEEMS might perhaps bring about a Reconciliation. He likewise begg'd of Mr. ALLEN to write to Mrs. CHEW, and that he and Mrs. CHEW would do their utmost to accommodate Matters, all which he readily consented to, and, at the same Time, express'd great Concern and Sorrow for what had happened.

On the next Morning, Mr. WEEMS's Servant brought a Letter to Mr. EDMISTON, in which was inclos'd one for me. I ask'd Mr. EDMISTON from whom it came, and after a Pause, he told me, from Mr. ALLEN. I told him I would not receive a Letter from such a Scoundrel, and threw it, unopened, into the Fire, not dreaming, as it came from a Minister of the Gospel, that it contain'd a Challenge. In his Letter to Mr. EDMISTON, he desir'd he would meet him at Mr. WEEMS's, which he accordingly did, and immediately upon his going in, Mr. ALLEN gave him a Copy of the Letter he had sent to me, and told him, (after he had perus'd it) "I suppose you are surpris'd at so sudden a Change; this is not what you expected, but my Honour would not suffer me to do any Thing else." To which Mr. EDMISTON replied, I am really surpris'd, Mr. ALLEN, and did not expect any such Thing; but I beg you may drop it, as it is inconsistent with your Character, as a Minister; and besides, Mr. CHEW burnt your Letter, without opening it, and did not know what it contain'd. Mr. ALLEN inform'd Mr. EDMISTON, that Mr. WEEMS had advis'd him not to put his Letter in the Form of a Challenge, for that Mr. CHEW might take the Advantage of the Law, and make him pay a Fine of 50*l*. and therefore that it should be penn'd as cautiously as possible. Moreover, Mr. ALLEN inform'd him, that though his Letter was not a complete Challenge, yet he intended to tell Mr. CHEW, when they met at RAWLINGS's (which was the Place appointed) that he had us'd him very ill, that he must beg his Pardon, or, BY GOD, he must fight him!

Notwithstanding Mr. ALLEN knew that I had burnt his Letter, and therefore could know nothing of the Appointment, he, most heroically march'd up, on the Day appointed, to RAWLINGS's, the Field of Battle, where he was sure he could meet with no Antagonist. After being there, for some Time, Mr. WILLIAM STEUART, of *Annapolis*, happen'd to come in, and Mr. ALLEN told him, his Fingers were so cold he could not write, and therefore begg'd the Favour of him to direct a Letter to SAMUEL CHEW, of *Herring-Bay*, which Mr. STEUART did. After that Mr. ALLEN went to Mrs. THOMAS's, and before he came away, shew'd his Pistols to Mr. JOHN THOMAS, and ask'd him to unscrew one of them. Mr. THOMAS told him, he thought it strange, a Minister should carry Pistols; to which the Minister replied, "I not only carry them, but will make Use of them too," and from thence went to Church, with his Pistols, and a Cane, with a Spear in it, and preach'd a most impudent Sermon, upon these Words:—(And after they had looked a long Time, and saw no Harm come upon him, they changed their Minds, and said he was a God.)

The last mentioned Letter, I did not receive 'til the latter End of the Week following, and then, by a Per-

who delivered it to my Servant, and immediately
de off. The Letter was as follows:

S I R,

ACCORDING to the Intimation I sent you,
from Mr. WEEMS's, to whom I forwarded my Let-
ter, I expected to have met you on Friday Morning,
like a Gentleman, at Mr. RAWLINGS's, to settle the
Affair that happened at your House, in such a Man-
ner, as a Gentleman, tho' you insult me as a Stranger,
has a Right to expect, who has been treated in the
Manner I have been, by you, in Defiance of all
Laws, in breach of the Rights of Hospitality, and
even of common Humanity. I have done what my
Honour required, which I will defend, at any Time,
at the Risk of my Life; and, as I find you are only
valiant in your own House, I will lay the whole
Transaction before the Governor, by whose Advice I
shall be determined how to proceed, to obtain due
Satisfaction.

Upon receiving this Letter, I wrote him an Answer,
in these Words:

S I R,

Herring-Bay, Jan. 12, 1768.

I AM sorry that I did not open your first Letter.
If I had, I should have disapproved of the Place,
RAWLINGS's, as it was by no Means a proper Place
for our Business. But, to let you see, I am not only va-
liant in my own House, but you shall find I have Spirit
enough to meet you in a proper Place; therefore be
punctual to the Hour of 11 o'Clock, next Monday,
at a Place known by the Name of Painter's Level, it
being an old Field, opposite to Mr. JOSEPH GALLO-
WAY's old House; and be sufficiently provided with
a Pair of good Pistols, well charged, and no Questions
to be asked when we meet, but immediately go at
it, for I am determined that only one of us shall live,
to tell the Tale, therefore bring no one with you,
as we may not be interrupted; and when you see
your old Friend, Lord BUTE's Countryman, you
may tell him, I shall have no Objection to see him,
on the same Occasion.

I sent off the above Letter immediately, by my Ser-
vant, to Annapolis, and he brought me back the follow-
ing Answer, on Sunday Night, which was the Evening
before we were to have met.

MR. ALLEN's Compliments to Mr. CHEW, and
that he certainly meet him, to take Revenge,
for such Insults and Usage, as never were offered
to a Gentleman before, in any Country. Mr. ALLEN
knows Mr. SAMUEL GALLOWAY's House, but does
not know if he can find the old Field he mentions,
which he never took Notice of. There is a Gate
going into a Wood, just past Mr. SAMUEL GALLO-
WAY's House, where Mr. ALLEN will wait Mr.
CHEW's coming, and will be conducted by him,
where he pleases. As Mr. ALLEN's Pistols are small,
Mr. CHEW, who will act upon Honour, will have
no Objection to take his Choice of one of his, and
give him another in Exchange, if the Difference be
very great.

"P. S. The Distance from hence, is so much greater,
that 12 o'Clock will be the properest Hour."

Agreeable to our Appointment, I went, on Monday,
to Painter's Level; and, after being in the Field, for a
short Time, a Gentleman, being a Stranger, rode up,
and delivered me a Letter. At first Sight, I took him
to be Mr. ALLEN, and immediately put myself in
Readiness to receive him. Upon his delivering me the
Letter, and finding me in some Heat at the Contents,
which I communicated to him, he declared his Igno-
rance of the Matter, and that Mr. ALLEN had treated
him extremely ill, in sending such a Letter by him.
On his Way to my House, Mr. PATTERSON (that was
the Gentleman's Name) told me, he went to Mr.
ALLEN's, to enquire for Mr. EDMISTON. Mr. ALLEN
informed him, he was down at Mr. CHEW's, at Her-
ring-Bay, and asked him to stay and dine with him,
which the Gentleman would have declined, on Ac-
count of the Distance he had to ride, but at last con-
sented to, on Mr. ALLEN's great Importunity. Mr.
ALLEN sat down, wrote something, and shewed it to
a Person in Company, who, by his Description, must
have been one Mr. DAKEN, the Schoolmaster at An-
napolis. He shrugged up his Shoulders, and said, he
thought it might do. Mr. ALLEN then finished his
Letter, and gave it to Mr. PATTERSON, telling him,
that if he stayed to Dinner, he would not be able to reach
Herring-Bay that Night, and begging him to go off im-
mediately, and by all Means to deliver his Letter that
Night. Mr. PATTERSON took his Leave of Mr.
ALLEN, dined at REYNOLDS's, and proceeded upon
his Journey; but not being acquainted with the Road,
he got no farther than Mr. THOMAS SPRIGG's that
Day, and complained to Mr. SPRIGG of the ill Treat-
ment he had received from Mr. ALLEN, in being sent off
without his Dinner, after the pressing Invitation he had
given him to stay and dine; and he often made the same
Complaint, in public Company, with great Resent-
ment, declaring, that Mr. ALLEN deserved to have
his Nose pulled, for such base Usage. Be pleased to ob-
serve, Reader, for it is very material, that Mr. PAT-
TERSON staid with me for Ten or Twelve Days, before
he returned to Annapolis. But, tho' poor Mr. PAT-
TERSON went away dinnerless, yet he carried off, in
his Pocket, a very high seasoned Dish, tossed off with

the most exquisite Arts of Cookery, which I shall
serve up, for the Entertainment of the Public, only
premising, by way of Bill of Fare, that it is "the
Rev'd. Mr. B. ALLEN's Letter to SAMUEL CHEW,
Esq; by Mr. PATTERSON."—Here it is, Reader!

S I R,

ACCORDING to my Note, I had a determined
Resolution to have met you, but it is extremely
doubtful whether South-River is passable this Evening;
it is pretty certain it will not be To-morrow. You
have used me ill, and I am resolved to have some
kind of Satisfaction. I fight for Honour, not for Blood.
Tell me, should I have escaped with my own Life,
if I had had the FORTUNE, to have KILLED you
in the old Field. I am a Stranger, and you on your
own Ground: Let Seconds be named, the Ground
marked out, the Weapons paired, and a fair Chance
be given; and, I flatter myself, by what you have seen
of me, that you cannot doubt my Fighting, unless you
chuse to make some Concessions, for the Treatment

The Reader is left to his own Reflections upon this
curious Specimen of Heroic Genius of this Parson mili-
tant—Contempt and Silence, to borrow his own Ex-
pressions, are indeed the best Comments upon it.

From what has been premised, the Reader will now
be prepared to judge of the Propriety of some few
Observations I shall make upon a Note to Mr. ALLEN's
Third BYSTANDER, which is the main Subject of my
Complaint, and of the Appeal I now make to the Public.

The Charge against me, Mr. ALLEN grounds upon
the Information he pretends to have received from Mr.
PATTERSON, who is gone to England, and consequent-
ly cannot now be called upon to confront the Parson's
Fiducies. What is true, I shall confess; what is false,
I shall deny; and, in the latter Case, the Matter will
rest with the Public, upon the Foundation of our re-
spective Characters; for, I must observe, that altho'
an indifferent Person is mentioned, yet, what he has
said to have related, comes immediately from Mr. ALLEN,
and consequently is to be relied upon only in Propor-
tion to the Parson's Character of Veracity, which has
been pretty fully explain'd to the Public, as well in the
Course of this Narrative, as upon some other Occasi-
ons. I confess then, that we were to have met alone,
and provided with Pistols only, and yet that I carried a
Servant with a Blunderbuss upon the Field. I had not
the most distant Thought of carrying such a Weapon,
or any other, but a Brace of Pistols, 'til it was hinted
to me by a Friend of mine, that the Parson, besides
his Pistols, would appear with a long Cane, with a
Spear in the Head of it. I pretend not to be acquaint-
ed with the Law of Arms, and its nice Puntilios, tho'
such Knowledge, I confess, would become me as well
as a Minister of the Gospel, yet I thought it a Point of
Prudence to give my Antagonist no Advantage, espe-
cially as I had not the highest Opinion of his Honour.
I do, then, in the most solemn Manner, protest, that
I had no other View in carrying a Blunderbuss with
me, than to oblige him to give up his Spear, that we
might engage upon an equal Footing, according to the
Terms of our Appointment. Mr. ALLEN proceeds,
with this curious Observation, "Mr. PATTERSON
further added his Opinion, that Murder would have
been committed, had not the Minister, by the Pro-
vidence of God, and timely Intelligence, avoided the
Stroke."—Great Scope is left here to exercise the
Conjectures of the Reader upon the Sense of this Pas-
sage. What, will the Parson say, did Mr. PATTERSON
mean by Murder? That Mr. ALLEN was to be cut off
by unfair Means, or, as he insinuates in another of
his infamous Pieces, by being way-laid with a Blunder-
buss. If this be the natural Construction, then I must
say, it is extremely improbable, that Mr. PATTERSON,
who has the Character of being a Man of Honour,
should declare an Opinion so rash and groundless, but,
very probable, that the Parson himself should invent
it, who, we well know, is capable of saying any
Thing. Did Mr. PATTERSON mean, by Murder, (since
People in Conversation are not always precise in their
Terms) that one of the Combatants would fall fairly,
according to the Laws of Duelling? If this was the O-
pinion he express'd, why did the Parson give it such a
villainous Turn?—In this Opinion, I sincerely join
with Mr. PATTERSON, and gave a broad Hint of it
in my Letter to the Parson, where I say, that but one
of us should live to tell the Tale.—"What did
Mr. PATTERSON mean in the Passage above quoted,
"by the Providence of God, and timely Intelligence?"
Did he mean, by the Providence of God, the Rivers
being frozen over, so that Mr. ALLEN could not pass
it? This could not be his Meaning, because he past it
himself, and it is well known many People past it the
next Day likewise, notwithstanding the Parson's Pre-
diction in his first Letter. He must then have meant
the Parson's own Providence, which will always keep
him out of Harm's Way, and make him rather study
"the nice Puntilios of the Law of Arms," than ex-
pose his Person to the rude Practice of it.—Timely
Intelligence is another very merry Expression. You must
remember, Reader, that Mr. ALLEN was to have met
me on the very Day Mr. PATTERSON delivered me his
Letter; and I observed before, that Mr. PATTERSON
staid with me Ten or Twelve Days; after, and yet the
Parson says, the Intelligence was timely, altho' he did
not receive it 'til Ten or Twelve Days after the Time ap-
pointed for our Meeting.—It certainly would, upon
this Principle, have been as timely Ten Years hence,

as to any Effect it could have in forming the Parson's
Resolution. "Contempt and Silence," says he, are
"the best Arguments."—He has met with his full
Share of the former, I would advise him to practise a
little of the latter.—"A Revival," says he, of the
Subject, in the Public Papers, more clearly than ever
demonstrates from whence the Mischief took its Rise."
—Mr. ALLEN, I have been well inform'd, has ab-
solutely denied the Account I gave of his provoking
Behaviour to me; and particularly, that he mention'd
the Name of a certain Gentleman, by whom he alledg'd
I was influenced to change my Opinion; but this Pas-
sage more clearly than ever confirms my Account, and
demonstrates that he has not the least Regard to Truth,
for here he explicitly repeats the Charge. What a
Heart must this Man possess, who still persists in al-
leging, what I have declared, in a most solemn Man-
ner, upon Oath, to be absolutely false, altho' he can-
not produce the least Tittle of Proof to support his
base Suspicions? He has the Grace to acknowledge,
that I have done him many Acts of Kindness and Friend-
ship, for which I have been amply repaid in Cavalry
and Abuse.—Returns which he will never fail to
make for the greatest Favours, when he has got to the
ne plus ultra of his Expectations.—But it is Time
to dismiss this Subject, and I shall therefore leave him
to flounce and flounder on in the Mire of his Iniquity,
being well convinc'd, that the more he struggles, the
deeper he will sink.

PETERSBURG, February 9.



ACCORDING to the last Advices, the Bishop of Cracow is removed to Schlüsselbourg, and there shut up in the same Apartment as Peter the Third died in.

VIENNA, March 2. The Earthquake, which we had here on the 27th of last Month, was not so sensibly felt at Presbourg as in this City, but, as it was stronger at Newstadt, about Three Points from hence, in the Road to Italy, it is imagined it came to us from that Part of the World. There is scarce a House at Newstadt that has not suffered more or less, and the Royal Military Academy there, has been so much damaged, that it is computed the Repairs will amount to 30,000 Florins at least. There is no Account of any Lives having been lost. It is computed by the Astronomer of the Jesuits College here, who was at that Instant in the Observatory, that the Earthquake lasted with us Thirty Seconds, in which Time, he says, he felt more than an Hundred Shocks.

LONDON, March 17.

The following is a genuine Copy of a Letter sent by Mr. Wilkes, to Thomas Nutall, Esq; and Thomas Francis, Esq; the Solicitor and Deputy-Solicitor of the Treasury.

SIR, London, March 23, 1768.
"I take the Liberty to acquaint you, that in the Beginning of the ensuing Term, I shall present myself to the Court of King's-Bench. I pledge my Honour, as a Gentleman, that the very first Day [the 17th of April] I will there make my personal Appearance.

Yesterday came on the Election of Members for the Borough of Southwark; when, after the Three Candidates had paraded round the Boroughwick, in grand Cavalcade, who all, with their Friends, made a very grand Appearance, they drew up on St. Margaret's Hill; and the Majority appearing to be for Mr. Thrale and Mr. Belchier, a Poll was demanded for Sir Joseph Mawbey, which began Yesterday Afternoon. On the Close of the Poll, last Night, the Numbers stood as follow:

March 19. Yesterday, at Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, died the Rev. Mr. STERN, Author of TRISTRAM SHANDY, some Volumes of Sermons, and the Sentimental Journey.

Alas, poor YORICK! I knew him well, a Fellow of infinite Jest, most excellent Fancy, &c.

We hear that Two of the Men of War now fitting out for the Sea at Portsmouth, are to take on board a Quantity of Ordnance Stores, and Two Companies of Foot, for the Settlement at Placentia, in Newfoundland.

Yesterday a young Man, parading along Fleet-street, on Horseback, in Honour of Wilkes and Liberty, was flung from his Horse near Fetter-lane end, fractured his Skull, and died as he was taking to the Hospital.

On the 27th Ult. an Earthquake was felt at Vienna, which threw the City into great Conternation; but it was more violent in some neighbouring Places, particularly at Newstadt, where great Damage was done, and Part of the fine Castle, occupied by the Military Academy, thrown down.

By a Letter from General Paoli, which is handed about at Leghorn, it seems as if an Accommodation between the Corsicans and Genoese was still at a great Distance. Five Genoese Ships are taken by the Corsicans.

The general Review of the Prussian Troops, as some of the Regiments come several Hundred Miles, seems to portend something serious. When that Monarch entered Saxony, last War, he made a Feint of the same kind, and marched immediately.

'Tis supposed that 70,000 Fowls, upon an Average, to say nothing of other Articles, are now daily consumed in the City of London.

The Loss occasioned by Idleness, to the Metropolis, during a Week of a General Election, is estimated at 100,000 l.

The following Gentlemen were elected Members on Wednesday, the 16th, viz. The Right Hon. George Grenville, Esq; and his Brother, James Grenville, Esq; for Buckingham.

The Right Hon. General Conway, and John Drummond, Esq; for the Borough of Thetford.

John Bullock, and John Hulke, Esqrs. for Malden, who, in their Address of Thanks to the Freeman of that Borough, say, they were re-elected against a "bold, though unsuccessful Opposition—which will excite in them incessant Endeavours to deserve the Continuance of their Esteem, by an active Discharge of the Duties they owe their Country, their Sovereign, and their Constituents."

Voltaire, speaking of the English Nation, says, "The People of this Island are much subject to Madness; but at the End of every Seven Years, the Disease is epidemic."

March 20. Wednesday the 16th Inst. Lord George Sackville, and Major General Irwin, late Governor of Gibraltar, were elected Members for East-Grimshead in Sussex.

March 22. Private Letters from Lisbon mention, that the Portuguese Ministry have at length resolved to redress all the Grievances of the English Merchants, in his most Faithful Majesty's Dominions, according to the true Spirit of the Treaties subsisting between the Two Crowns.

By Letters from various Parts of Ireland, we learn, that it is expected the Number of contested Elections in that Kingdom this Summer will be Five Times greater than in Great-Britain, notwithstanding the former returns little more than Half the Number of Members to Parliament that the latter does.

A Letter from Oxford informs us, that on Tuesday a dreadful Riot happened there, on the Candidates for that Town canvassing. The Parties met the Candidates at their Head, and although Mr. Nares, and Col. Harcourt, did every thing in their Power to prevent their People from engaging; and likewise Mr. Craven, exercised all his Influence with his Party, yet so great was the Animosity of the People to each other, that they would not be withheld; a smart Engagement ensued, when Mr. Craven's Party prevailed, and drove their Antagonists out of the Town. We are well assured no Lives were lost.

Yesterday as Mr. Wilkes was coming out from Guildhall, after the Close of the Poll, he was followed by a great Number of People, some of whom stopped the Coach, took out the Horses, and dragged the Carriage themselves, with Mr. Wilkes; and another Gentleman in it, from the Mansion-House to the George and Vulture, in Cornhill.

We hear that a List of all those Liverymen, filed the Sons of Liberty, who have polled for Mr. Wilkes, will be printed.

It is said, that during the present Contest for the Town of Northampton, upwards of Sixteen Hundred Pounds have been expended in the single Article of Ribbons.

It having been reported that the Administration have interfered in the hitherto free Election for this City, by directing the Support of the Four old Members, close Enquiry has been made into the Matter, and, to our Grief and Astonishment, it is found to be strictly true.

Sunday the following printed Paper was stuck upon the Doors and Walls of several Churches in this City, viz. "The Prayers of this Congregation are earnestly desired for the Restoration of Liberty, depending on the Election of Mr. Wilkes."

March 24. Yesterday Afternoon, at Four o'Clock, ended at Guildhall, the Poll for Representatives of this City in Parliament, when the Numbers stood thus:

The Common Crier proclaimed the Poll ended, and summoned a Common-Hall, To-Morrow, at Nine o'Clock, for the Sheriffs to make their Declaration.

The Crowd was so great Yesterday at Guildhall, that several Persons were greatly hurt; the Iron Gates belonging to the Hall, were broke to Pieces, the Lamps therein, were likewise demolished, and other Damage done: Some of the Mob mounted the Hustings, bid Defiance to the Constables, and swore they would choose Representatives for themselves. Mr. Wilkes, upon this, departed the Hall, as soon as possible, in hopes that the Clamour would then cease; having first addressed the Livery as follows:

Gentlemen, and Fellow Citizens,

"The Poll being now finished, I return my sincerest Thanks to those disinterested and independent Friends, who have so steadily and generously stood forth in my Favour: The Want of Success, out of our Power to command, has not in the least abated my Zeal for your Service. You cannot be unacquainted with the various Circumstances which have contributed to it. My Friends were of Opinion, that I should wait the Dissolution of the last slavish and venal Parliament, while the other Candidates had been for many Months soliciting your Interest. Ministerial Influence, assisted by private Malice, has been exerted in the most arbitrary and unconstitutional Manner, and by Means of the basest Chicanery and Oppression.

"But, though disappointed, I am not in the least dispirited: On the contrary, I reflect with Pride and Gratitude, on the many Instances of Regard and Affection I have received from the Livery of London.

"I beg Leave to make my best Acknowledgments to the Sheriffs, who have shewn the utmost Candour and Impartiality, during the Election, accompanied with a Dignity of Character becoming their Station in this great Metropolis.

"And now, Gentlemen, permit me to address you, as Friends to Liberty, and Freeholders of the County of Middlesex, declaring my Intention of appearing as a Candidate to represent you in Parliament, and still hoping, by your Means, to have the Honour of being useful to you in the British Senate.

Gentlemen of the Livery,

"I recommend it to you, in the strongest Manner, to exert yourselves to preserve the Peace and Quiet of this City."

Several Dispatches of Importance, were sent away Yesterday for North-America.

His Serene Highness Prince Charles of Hesse-Cassel, is expected here some Time in May, on a Visit to our Court.

According to private Letters from Senegal, there is Advice, that the French had offered a powerful Prince on the African Coast, a very large Sum of Money, to exclude the English from trading in any Part of his Dominions.

A certain Lady of Quality, saying to her Daughter-in-Law, she hoped to see her have a Son; was answered—Never by your Son.

We hear the Right Hon. Lady, lately divorced, and lately again married, had 20,000 l. generously added to her Fortune, by the noble Duke, her Ladyship's Brother.

We learn from Geneva, that the celebrated Mr. Voltaire, lies dangerously ill at his Seat at Ferney, near that City.

The following is handed to us, as the Letter from J. Wilkes, to a great Personage.

SIR,

"I beg thus to throw myself at your M-----s Feet, and supplicate the Mercy and Clemency which shine with such Lustre among your Princely Virtues.

"Some former Ministers, whom your M-----, in Condescension to the Wishes of your People, thought proper to remove, employed every wicked and deceitful Art to oppress your Subject, and to avenge their own personal Cause on him, whom they imagined to be the principal Author of bringing to public View, their Ignorance, Insufficiency, and Treachery to your M-----y and the Nation.

"I have been the unhappy Victim of Revenge. I was forced, by their Injustice and Violence, into Exile, which I have never ceased to consider, for many Years, as the most cruel Oppression; because I could not longer be under the benign Influence of your M-----y, in the Land of Liberty.

"With a Heart full of Zeal for the Service of your M-----y and my Country, I implore, Sir, your Clemency. My only Hopes of Pardon are founded in the great Goodness and Benevolence of your M-----y; and every Day of Freedom you may be graciously pleased to permit me the Enjoyment of, in my dear native Land, shall give Proofs of my Zeal and Attachment to your Service.
J. WILKES."

March 24. By nothing transpiring from the numberless Expresses lately arrived from America, some People conjecture fresh Discontents in that Quarter.

Since the closing of the Poll for this City, Mr. Wilkes has made the following Application to the Freeholders of the County of Middlesex, viz.

"Gentlemen, Having ever gloriously distinguished yourselves as Englishmen, by preventing the Encroachments of arbitrary Power, despising ministerial Influence, and maintaining the Rights and Privileges of the free-born Subjects, in a Land of Liberty, I beg leave to offer myself a Candidate to represent you in the ensuing Parliament; and, to give you the strongest Assurances, that I shall, on this, and every other Occasion, exert that inflexible Steadiness and undaunted Perseverance in the best of Causes, which, I trust, have hitherto recommended my Conduct, and will ever constitute the most essential Part of my Character.

I am, Gentlemen,
with the truest Esteem and Regard,

JOHN WILKES.

Yesterday Morning Sir W. B. Proctor, Mr. Cooke, and Mr. Wilkes, the Candidates for the County of Middlesex, set out for Brentford, when the Election came on for Knights of the Shire of that County: The latter was in a Coach, drawn by Six long Tail Horses, and was attended by an amazing Number of People to the Place of Election, which was held in the Middle of Brentford Butts, a Temporary Booth being erected there for that Purpose, in which were Fifteen Poll Books, one for each Division.

The Candidates were put up at Half an Hour past Eleven o'Clock, when the Shew of Hands was almost general for Mr. Wilkes, and, for Sir William Beauchamp Proctor, there was a very great Shew, but for Mr. Cooke very few; whereupon the Two former were declared to have the Majority; but a Poll being demanded by the Friends of Mr. Cooke, the same began at One o'Clock, and it was agreed that the Books should be closed at Eight.

Last Night at the Close of the Poll, the Numbers were,
For Mr. Wilkes, 1213
Sir William Beauchamp Proctor, 750
Mr. Cooke, 646

This Morning the Poll was agreed to be open again, and finally to close at Two.

The Infatuation for Mr. Wilkes, was so great, that every Person was obliged to declare for him, and have blue Cockades, before they were admitted to poll.

The Mob behaved in a very outrageous Manner at Hyde-Park Corner, where they pelted Mr. Cooke, Son of the City Marshal, and knocked him from his Horse, took off the Wheels of one of the Carriages, cut the Harness, and broke the Glasses to Pieces; several other Carriages, with the Friends of Messieurs Proctor and Cooke, were greatly damaged. The Reason assigned for these Proceedings, is, that a Flag was carried before the Procession of Mr. Wilkes's Antagonists, on which was printed, "No Blasphemer."

A prodigious Concurrence of People assembled at Brentford, who would not suffer any Coaches to enter the Town, without "No. 45," and the Words "Wilkes and Liberty on them."

Several Flags were flying with the Motto, *Mors Mea, et Ferrer Cooks.*

A Liveryman of London, asking a Friend of Mr. Wilkes, whether he thought it would not have been more prudent for Mr. Wilkes to have thrown up the Poll sooner, as by carrying it on to the End, he shewed how small a Part of the Livery he had on his Side? He turned off with a Smile, and said, "Mr. Wilkes only wanted to have it in his Power to say, that there were above 1000 honest Men in London."

'Tis computed that no less than Forty-seven Lives have been already lost by the General Election.

The Election for the County of Middlesex was finished, as usual, in one Day, on Monday last, when the Poll was closed; the whole passed with the greatest Order and Regularity, at Brentford, where the Two Sheriffs attended in Person, as well as the Three Candidates, Sir William Beauchamp Proctor, George Cooke, Esq; the Two old Members, and John Wilkes, Esq; Sir William and Mr. Wilkes remained the whole Day on the Huffings, but Mr. Cooke did not appear there. At 7 in the Evening 3 Proclamations were made, and no more Voters appearing to poll, the Sheriffs declared the Poll to be closed, and adjourned to the next Morning at Nine, to cast up the Books. On the Tuesday Morning the Sheriffs again attended at the usual Place, in Person, as did Sir William and Mr. Wilkes. After the Books were all cast up, the Sheriffs proclaimed that the Numbers were,

For John Wilkes, Esq; - - - - 1292
George Cooke, Esq; - - - - 827
Sir Wm. Beauchamp, Proctor, - 807

and then declared John Wilkes, Esq; and George Cooke, Esq; duly elected. William Beckford, Esq; Sir George Colebrooke, Sir Richard Glyn, Sir Francis Blake Delaval, Mr. Alderman Shakespeare, Mr. Cooke's Son, and many other Gentlemen, were upon the Huffings. The Mob were remarkably quiet and orderly, owing it is generally imagined to the prudent Conduct of Mr. Wilkes, and his Friends, who besides the Advertisements in all the Public Papers, distributed 40,000 Hand-Bills, recommending to all the Voters to preserve the Peace and Quiet of the County. The Town of Brentford was illuminated on the Monday Evening, and the utmost Joy appeared on the Countenance of almost every Freeholder, but the Illuminations in London exceeded any Thing which has been known.

We are informed, that on Monday last, the House of Mr. Richard Wilkes, the Robinhood, near Great Turnstile, Holbourn, was opened at the Expence of 45 respectable Neighbours, who all met there in the Evening, and drank 45 Bottles of Wine; and when the News arrived in Town of Mr. Wilkes's having considerably the Majority of the other Candidates, 45 Candles were immediately lighted up in the Windows, 45 Gallons of Beer were given to the Populace; and the Evening was concluded with that Order becoming so respectable a Company.

March 29. We hear that Sir William Trelawney, Bart. will set out this Week for Portsmouth, to embark on board the Jason Man of War for Jamaica, of which Place he is appointed Governor.

Some Letters from Leghorn say, it was currently reported there, that a Body of English Troops were expected to arrive about the Month of June next, in Corsica.

Letters from Marseilles and Toulon, mention, that Orders had just been received there, for the immediate Equipment of several Ships of War and Transports, but the Place of their Destination was not yet known.

Letters from Amsterdam, of the 19th Instant, inform, that there will sail this Year, for the Whale-Fishery, in the Greenland Seas, 123 Dutch Ships, 24 Vessels from Hamburg, Two from Altena, One from the Coast of the Baltic Sea, and Five from Bremen; in all 155 Ships.

Letters from Leghorn mention, that a fresh Misunderstanding had happened between the Genoese and Corsicans, on occasion of the former refusing to deliver up certain Prisoners claimed by the latter.

They write from Paris, that a Number of Counterfeit English Guineas are now circulating there, so well executed, that it requires a great Art to discover the Fraud.

By Letters from Cheshire, Shropshire, and Lancashire, we learn, that there is as fine a Prospect of a plentiful Harvest, this Summer, as has been known in those Parts for many Years past.

This Morning an extraordinary Messenger was dispatched to his Excellency the Earl of Rochfort, Ambassador at the Court of France.

Last Saturday Lord Baltimore was tried at the Assizes holden for Surry, before the Hon. Mr. Baron Smythe, for a Rape upon Sarah Woodcock, and acquitted; and, at the same Time, Mrs. Griffinburg, and Mrs. Harvey, were tried as Accessories to that Felony, and also acquitted. The Trial began about Seven in the Morning, and continued 'til near Three next Morning.

The late remarkable Trial of —, and Two Women, came on exactly at Half past Seven in the Morning, and lasted 'til Three the next Morning. Twelve out of Twenty-four Jurymen were objected to, by the Prisoners. In the Course of the Trial, the Prosecutrix gave Evidence, that she was not prevailed upon, for the first Two Nights of her Confinement, to undress, or go into Bed; and that on her Arrival at the Country House, she was peremptorily told by the Two Women, that she must at all Events that Night go to Bed to —, that she was forcibly undressed by them, and put to Bed to him accordingly. That afterwards, in the State of Despair in which she found herself, she consented to whatever was desired of her, except what was criminal. Upon the Return of the Jury, — was ordered to hold up his Hand, and the Foreman answered to the usual Question, Not Guilty. Upon the same Question being put concerning the first Woman, the Foreman answered, Guilty; but their Verdict, of Not Guilty, including all the Three Prisoners, they were all acquitted.

Another Prosecution is carrying on, in the same Cause, for the Seduction only, which will be tried in the Court of King's Bench.

Miss W. — was under Examination Four Hours and an Half, and afterwards cross-examined Two Hours; during all which Time her Testimony was the most consistent, steady and sensible, that ever was known, which drew Tears from many of the Audience.

Whitehall, March 29. The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Sir Edward Hawke, Knight of the Bath, Charles Townshend, John Buller, Esq; the Right Hon. Henry Viscount Palmerston, of the Kingdom of Ireland, Sir George Yonge, Bart. Sir Percy Brett, Knight, and Charles Spencer, Esq; commonly called Lord Charles Spencer, to be Commissioners for executing the Office of High-Admiral of Great-Britain, and Ireland, and the Dominions, Islands and Territories, thereunto respectively belonging.

WHITEHALL, Council-Office, March 21. His Majesty having caused the Custody of the King's Seal to be re-delivered to the Right Hon. William Lord Chatham, a Council was this Day held at his Lordship's House at Hayes, where the Oath of Keeper of the Privy-Seal, was administered to his Lordship.

BRISTOL, March 19. We hear that there is so great a Demand for Provisions in a certain Borough in the West, that 300 Guineas have been given for Half an Ox, and it is yet expected to be at a more advanced Price.

DUBLIN, March 22. Such Attention is paid to the glorious Cause of Liberty in this Kingdom, and especially in this Metropolis, where it has been ever tenderly nursed, since its happy Fruits have been made known and understood, that we hear, in case that Martyr in the Cause, John Wilkes, Esq; (who has been exiled from his Country) should, by the illicit Influence of Power, lose his Seat for the Metropolis of the neighbouring Kingdom, he will be invited to stand a Candidate for the Metropolis of HIBERNIA, on the ensuing General Election: His Success, where the Essence of Freedom and Independence has been so clearly demonstrated, cannot be doubted.—Hear this, ye Sons of Liberty, and rejoice!

BOSTON, May 23.

In Captain Calf came Passengers Commodore Loring, and the Rev. Mr. Samson Occom, an Indian Teacher, who lately went from hence for England with the Rev. Mr. Whitaker, to solicit Contributions from charitably disposed Persons there, to support the Indian School at Lebanon, and for propagating the Gospel among the American Heathens; and it is said, have so far succeeded, as to collect about 11,000l. Sterling, which is deposited in the Hands of Trustees, to be appropriated to that pious Use.

Extract of a late Letter from London.

"Bating the unavoidable Bustle, occasioned by the Elections, we are in a State of perfect Tranquillity. No Talk of the least Change in the Ministry, or any material Alteration of any Kind in any Department."

By Letters from London, we learn, that the Bill brought into Parliament for the Recovery of Penalties and Forfeitures in America, establishes Four Courts of Vice-Admiralty on this Continent, viz. at Charlestown, New-York or Philadelphia, Boston, and Halifax, which are to have original Jurisdiction in and over the particular Districts of Colonies assigned to each; and in Cases of Proceedings had in the Admiralty Courts already established, are to hear and determine upon Appeal from the Judgments or Decrees of such Courts without the respective Jurisdictions assigned. The present Appointment of the Court at Halifax over all North America, is to cease and determine after passing the new Bill. Messieurs Garth, Charles, Montague, Franklin, Delancey, and other Colony Agents, had a Meeting, on the Bill being ordered to be brought in, when finding that no new Extension of Power was intended, but only to reduce the Extent of Jurisdiction of the Court at Halifax, giving to the others the same

Power, but more confined in Jurisdiction, for the Ease of both Crown and People, they concluded that any Application against it would be unnecessary, as well as improper. The Appointments of the Judges are to be such as to engage Gentlemen of Science and Abilities to execute the Office, and are not to arise from Fees or Condemnations.

ANNAPOLIS, JUNE 9.

On Tuesday, the 24th Ult. died, at Frederick-Town, in Frederick County, the Revd. THOMAS BACON, Rector of All-Saint's Parish, in that County, Author of a laborious and judicious Performance, entitled, A Complete System of the Revenue of Ireland, published in 1737, by Order of the Chief Commissioners and Governors of the Revenue, in that Kingdom. He also published several other valuable Pieces; and, in the Decline of Life, by several Years intense Labour, compiled a complete Body of the Laws of this Province, as lately published.—His humane, benevolent Disposition, and amiable Deportment, gained him the Love and Esteem of all his Parishioners. He was likewise an affectionate Husband, a tender Parent, a kind Master, and a most agreeable Companion; which renders his Death not only a Loss to his Acquaintances, but to Society in general.

W A R S A W, February 27.



HEN the States met on the 20th, they adjourned to the 26th. Yesterday Prince Radzivil, declared that the Commission had concluded all the Business which had been brought before them; and the Primate desired that the Diet, which was to break up on the 1st of March, might be allowed to sit Eight Days more.

Prince Repnin has consented that these Words shall be inserted in the Treaty which is going to be signed, "without Prejudice to the Treaty of Oliva, or that of Carlowitz, &c." The Russian Troops are soon to leave Poland, some Regiments being already in Motion.

Feb. 28. We are very impatient here to know the new Declarations which the Ministers of foreign Courts are said to be charged to make in a few Days. It is pretended that Prince Repnin, in particular, hath declared that he will not render public his last Orders for very important Reasons. It is also assured, that the Prussian Minister hath received some Dispatches which he is not to open, 'til a few Days hence, in full Session. The other Ministers have Orders not to sign any Thing but the Affairs of the Diffidants, and not to interfere in any Manner in the Affairs of the State and the Finances.

NAPLES, March 1. It is now imagined that the future Queen of Naples will arrive here about the 18th of May, and that the Marriage of his Sicilian Majesty will take Place at that Time.

LEGHORN, March 4. By Letters from the Isle of Rague, there is Advice, that General Paoli, after examining the Dock-Yards, was gone to San Pelligrino, where a Fort is now building, which will not be inferior to that of Balagna. The same Letters add, that a national Assembly will be held in the Easter-Week at Corte; and that in July, the Troops of France will be relieved by those of another Power.

GENEVA, March 11. The greater and lesser Councils presented this Day to the General Council a Plan of Reconciliation, which was accepted by 1204 Voices against 23. This Event has given great Pleasure, as it opens a Prospect of Tranquillity so long wished for in this City.

L O N D O N.

March 5. A few Days ago, one Jonathan Gregson, of Barrowfield, near Coln in Lancashire, a poor old decrepid Wretch, who had followed the Trade of Begging for upwards of 60 Years, having asked Alms of a worthy Gentleman at Clough, in that Neighbourhood; and he observing, with a compassionate Eye, the piteous Situation of the poor Creature, who was far from being covered, even with Rags, for he was really half-naked; this humane Gentleman ordered him to walk into his House; and he would give him some Clothes. Gregson seemed extremely backward of stripping off his old tattered Apparel; but the Gentleman insisting on his doing it, and in his Presence too, when he observed, with great Surprise, a Bag tied round this miserable Wretch's Shoulders, and hung on his Back; wherein was 30l. 10s. 6d. in Gold and Silver. The Beggar was extremely displeased, that this Mammon was discovered, and declared he had not counted it for upwards of 15 Years; being asked what Use he intended to put it to? He answered, "He designed it henceforward to support him, having (he thought) supported it long enough, for nothing; and it would now more especially be useful to him, as he had begged himself out of Credit."

Lord R-----m, we hear, has lost 1000 Guineas to 50, by betting against Mr. Wilkes.

March 30. An opulent Elector, in a certain Borough in the West, was lately offered 50 l. a-Year, and 700 l. in Money, for his Vote and Interest, which he nobly refused.

This Day his Serene Highness the Prince of Monaco, at whose Palace his late Royal Highness the Duke of York died, was introduced to his Majesty at St. James's, and graciously received.

About Nine last Night, upon the Return of the Pollers from Brentford, the Mobility grew extremely riotous and tumultuous; some Persons who had voted in favour of Mr. Wilkes, having put out Lights, the Mob paraded the whole Town, from East to West, obliging every Body to illuminate; and breaking the Windows of such as did not do it immediately. The Windows of the Mansion-House in particular were demolished all to Pieces, together with a large Chandelier, and some Pier Glasses, to the Amount of several Hundred Pounds. From thence they proceeded to the Lord Mayor's House, in Aldersgate-Street, but that being a back House, they could not get at it. They demolished also, the Windows of Lords Bute, Egmont, Sir Sampson Gideon, Sir William Mayne, and many other Gentlemen and Tradesmen in most of the Public Streets of both Cities, London and Westminster; at one of the above-mentioned Gentlemen's Houses, the Mob were in a great Measure provoked to it by the Imprudence of a Servant, who fired a Pistol among them. At the Duke of Northumberland's House, at Charing-Cross, the Mob also broke a few Panes, but his Grace had the Address to get rid of them, by ordering up Lights immediately into his Windows, and opening the Ship Ale-House, which soon drew them off to that Side. Last Night, a little past Eleven, a Party of the

Guards arrived from the Tower to quell the Mob before the Mansion-House, who thereupon dispersed.

Among the many Houses of Persons of Distinction, at the West End of the Town, that were illuminated on Tuesday Night, on account of Mr. Wilkes being elected Knight of the Shire for the County of Middlesex, were those of their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Gloucester and Cumberland.

April 2. It having been reported to a great Personage, that a Liveryman was threatened with the Loss of his Place, for not voting at the City Election agreeable to Order, asked, "If the Man had voted according to his Engagements?" Which being answered in the Affirmative, it was replied, "Had he voted contrary to his Engagements, he should certainly have been discharged."

One Day last Week, as a great Personage was going to Richmond, accompanied by his illustrious Consort, a Rabble in the Road thither, gathered round his Carriage, clamorously begging a Pardon for Mr. Wilkes, and they grew so numerous and troublesome, that the great Personages thought proper to return to Town, instead of proceeding to Richmond.

We also hear, that one of the Brothers of the above great Personage was stopped by the Mob, near Brentford, in his Carriage, and they insisted on his pulling off his Hat, and hallooing out, *Wilkes and Liberty*.

Among the other Pranks of their High Mightinesses the Mob, on account of the Middlesex Election, they stopped the French Ambassador in his Coach, and politely insisted on his drinking a Draught of Porter (which they offered him) to *Wilkes and Liberty*, to which his Excellency, with the greatest Affability, complied.

Wednesday Four Men were committed to the Compter, for being concerned in breaking the Windows of the Mansion-House.

We have it confirmed to us, that Mr. Wilkes will be enabled to discharge all his Debts, principally by the Assistance of an amiable and patriotic Nobleman.

The general Toast among the popular Party, now is, "May Liberty never want a Wilkes, and may Wilkes never want Liberty."

The celebrated Tristram Shandy was buried privately in a new Burying-Ground, belonging to the Parish of St. George's, Hanover-Square, at Twelve o'Clock at Noon, attended only by Two Gentlemen, in a Mourning Coach, and no Bell tolling.

It is said that a Gentleman of the first Eminence in the Law, has given it as his Opinion, that the Outlawry against Mr. Wilkes is not legal.

It is said that among the several Flaws in Mr. Wilkes's Outlawry, one is, that he was not declared an Outlaw in Three different Parishes in the County where he lived. And it is likewise said, that the Outlawry was not registered in the proper Office.

We hear that a Number of People will soon embark for America, at the Expence of the Government, to settle there, with their Families.

We hear, by a Gentleman who arrived from France, that on Tuesday Evening, when he landed at Dover, the whole Town was illuminated, and every Town he travelled through, till he arrived in London.

The Codicil of the Will of Sir Andrew Chadwick, Knt. in favour of Mr. Wilkes, is in the following Terms: "Item, I give and bequeath to John Wilkes, Esq; late Member for Aylesbury, 1000 l. as a Testimony of his intrepid Conduct in opposing a wicked, corrupt, and profligate Administration."

The following Toast is drank every Night, "May the Light of Liberty never be put out by a Scotch Extinguisher."

On Tuesday Night the Mob broke the Windows of his Grace the Duke of Argyle's House, in Soho Square; and also the Windows of his Son, the Marquis of Lorn's House, in Argyle Buildings, where they did considerable Damage; every Window belonging to the Earl of Bute's House in South Audley-Street were so broke, that scarce a Pane of Glass was left whole.

It is said the Damage done to Lord Bute's House, by the Mob on Monday Night last, cannot be repaired for less than 3000 l. a great deal of rich Furniture having been broke to Pieces.

A certain Nobleman being asked by the —, what he apprehended would be the Consequence of a late Election? replied, as the Gentleman was elected, he must take his Seat accordingly.

We have it confirmed to us, that by the Assistance of his Friends, (the Subscription being still open) and particularly a very amiable, patriotic Nobleman, that all Mr. Wilkes's Debts will be positively adjusted, settled, and satisfied, previous to the ensuing Session of Parliament.

We hear that it has already cost one Candidate for a Borough Northward, who, it is expected, will lose his Election, at least, upwards of Thirty Thousand Pounds.

Mr. Wilkes's Declaration of a Surrender, it is said, renders the Outlawry void, provided he surrenders according to the Declaration, the first of next Term.

April 4. It was remarked, that several of the Livery of London, who lately voted against Mr. Wilkes at Guildhall, were the first to poll in his Favour at Brentford.

The Expences of the Election for N. Hampton, amount to 60,000 l. at least, to both Parties.

Mr. Wilkes, during his Exile, enjoyed a Pension of 1200 l. per Annum, by a private Subscription of a few Friends, among whom are several Right Honourables of the present Ministry.

We hear that an Offer was made to Mr. Wilkes, by his Friends, that if he chose any one to join Candidate

with him, they would hold for them jointly; on which Mr. Wilkes replied, that he was infinitely obliged to them for the Offer, but as the Public had interferred itself so much in his Favour, he thought himself sufficiently honoured if they chose him, without presuming to dictate their Choice of any one else, and very politely declined the Offer.

Lord Baltimore's Defence, read to the Court and Jury, upon his Trial at Kingston in Surry, on Saturday, the 26th Ult. taken in Court by a Gentleman present.

My LORD, and GENTLEMEN,

"I have put myself upon my Country, confident that Prejudice and Clamour will avail nothing in this Place, where it is the Privilege of the meekest of the King's Subjects to be presumed to be innocent, until his Guilt has been made appear by legal Evidence. I wish I could say, that I have been treated abroad with the same Candour; I have been loaded with Obloquy; the most malignant Libels have been circulated, and every Method that Malice could devise, has been taken to create a general Prejudice against me. I thank God, that under such Circumstances, I have had Firmness and Resolution enough to meet my Accusers Face to Face, and provoke an Enquiry into my Conduct. *Hic murus abacus esto, nil confite fidei*."

"The Charge against me, and against these poor People, who are involved with me, because they might otherwise have been Witnesses for me, is, in its Nature, easy to be made out, and hard to be disproved. The Accuser has the Advantage of supporting it by direct and positive Evidence: The Defence can only be collected from Circumstances."

"My Defence is composed of a very great Variety of Circumstances, all tending to shew the Falsity of this Charge, the Absurdity of it, the Impossibility that it can be true. It will be laid before the Jury, by Evidence, under the Direction of my Counsel; and I have the Confidence of an innocent Man, that it will manifest to your Lordship, the Jury, and the whole World, that the Story told by this Woman, is a Perversion of the Truth, and a mere Invention."

"What could induce this Woman to make such a Charge I can only suspect. — Very soon after she came to my House, upon her Representation to me, that her Father was distressed, I sent him a considerable Sum of Money: Whether the Ease with which that Money was obtained from me, might suggest this Idea, as a Means of obtaining a larger Sum of Money; or whether it was thought necessary to destroy me, in order to re-establish the Character of the Girl with the World, I know not; but I do aver, upon the Word of a Man of Honour, that there is no Truth in any Thing which has been said or sworn of my having offered Violence to this Girl. I ever held such Brutality in Abhorrence. May I be allowed to add, without offending against that Decorum which ought to be observed here, that, as a Man of Pleasure, I am in Opinion against all Force. I should not have introduced this Sentiment, if it had not been pertinent to the Subject. Other Opinions on other Subjects, no Way relating to this Charge, have been imputed, and falsely imputed to me, to inflame this Accusation. Libertine, as I may have been represented, I hold no such Opinions; and considering the Debility of my Constitution, it is not only a Moral, but a Physical Impossibility for me to have ravished this Woman, who is stronger than I am. Much has been urged against me, upon that of having seduced her from her Parents and Friends. Seduction is not the Point of this Charge; but I do assure your Lordship and the Jury, that this Part of the Case has been aggravated exceedingly beyond the Truth. If I have been in any Degree to blame, I am sure I have very sufficiently atoned for every Indiscretion, which a weak Attachment to this unworthy Woman may have led me into, by having suffered the Disgrace of being exposed as a Criminal at the Bar, in the County which my Father had the Honour to represent in Parliament, and where, if this Sort of an active Life had been my Object, my own Rank and Fortune gave me some Pretensions to have attained the same Honour. I will take up no more of your Lordship's Time, than to add, that if I had been conscious of the Guilt now imputed to me, I could have kept myself and my Fortune out of the Reach of the Laws of this Country. I am a Citizen of the World, and could have lived any where; but I love my Country, and submit to its Laws; and resolving that my Innocence should be justified by the Laws, I now, by my own voluntary Act, by surrendering myself to the Court of King's-Bench, stake upon the Verdict of Twelve Men, my Life and Fortune, and, what is dearer to me than either, my Honour."

PHILADELPHIA, June 1.

A few Days ago arrived in Town from Pittsburgh, JOHN ALLEN, and JOSEPH SHIPPEN, Jun. Esquires, Commissioners from this Province, at the Conferences lately held there with the Western Indians, under the Direction of GEORGE CROGHAN, Esq; Deputy-Agent for Indian Affairs. At this Meeting were present upwards of One Thousand Indians, besides about Three Hundred Women and Children, consisting of Six Nations, (chiefly Senecas) Shawanese, Delawares, Munies, Mohickons and Wyandots. After the Commissioners had conduced with the Indians in Behalf of this Government, on Account of their late, as well as former Losses, buried the Bones of all their deceased Friends, and covered their Graves with Presents of Condolence, according to the Indian Custom; they,

In like Manner, went through the same Ceremonies of burying the Bones of such of his Majesty's Subjects as have been killed by their People since the Peace. In the Answers they returned to the Speeches delivered to them, they expressed the utmost Satisfaction in meeting Commissioners from the Government of Pennsylvania, and having an Opportunity of renewing the Peace and Friendship which formerly subsisted between them and the People of this Province. The several Tribes being earnestly desired to open their Minds fully, by disclosing every Thing which gave them the least Discontent or Uneasiness; they publicly acknowledged, that their Hearts were now made easy, with respect to the several Losses they had sustained, and that they entirely buried in Oblivion all past Misfortunes, so that their Children might never remember them hereafter. They then acquainted the Commissioners, that the only Matter which they had still reason to complain of, was, the Settlements made on their Lands. But, before the Conference ended, during which the Indians behaved in the most orderly and friendly Manner, they were made to fully sensible that the Government had taken every Step to remove those lawless People, who had settled on their Lands, and to apprehend and bring to Justice the Villains *Stamp and Ironcutter*, that they expressed great Satisfaction at our Public Conduct. They afterwards, according to their Custom, cleared and made smooth the Road of Peace, so as to be travelled by all People with Pleasure and Safety, brightened and strengthened the ancient Chain of Friendship, and engaged, in the most hearty Manner, to unite with their Brethren the English, in holding it fast for ever, and to live with them in the strictest Harmony for the future.

At the Conclusion of the Treaty, the Commissioners delivered considerable Presents of Goods to the several Tribes, in behalf of the Province of Pennsylvania; to which Mr. Croghan made an Addition on the Part of the Crown. The whole ended to the entire Satisfaction of all the Indians, who parted with the Commissioners in so friendly a Disposition, as promises to us the fairest Prospect of a lasting Peace.

We are assured that Mr. Croghan discovered the greatest Knowledge and Address in the Management of the Indians on this Occasion, and gave Proofs not only of his Attachment to his Majesty's Service in general, but the most sincere and earnest Desire to promote the particular Interests and Welfare of this Province.

HALIFAX, (Nova-Scotia) May 2.

In Capt. Brown came a Commission, appointing Lieutenant Governor Franklin, to the Settlement of St. John's in Bay Fundy.

Mr. Franklin has appointed Isaac Deschamps, Esq; Chief Justice of St. John's, with a Salary of 300 l.

Orders are received for carrying on the Settlement of the Island of St. John, and for establishing a Civil Government there immediately. Three Towns are to be laid out by the Names of Charlotte-Town, George-Town, and Prince-Town; and a Number of Noblemen and Gentlemen in England are to have Grants of Townships in the Island, and there is the greatest Prospect of its becoming a flourishing Settlement.

WILLIAMSBURG, June 2.

We hear that in the Night of Wednesday the 23th Ult. Capt. Waterman, from London, for York-River, ran ashore about 40 Miles to the Northward of the Capes; and it is said both Vessel and Cargo are lost; but the Crew saved.

ANNAPOLIS, JUNE 16.

Two Petitions having been preferred to the Honourable the Lower House of Assembly, by sundry Inhabitants of Baltimore County, complaining of an undue Election, and Return, of Four Delegates to serve in the General Assembly of this Province, for said County. VENICE, March 30.



WE have just received Advice from Rome, that 1800 Neapolitan Troops have taken Possession of Benevento, which Place, though situate in the Kingdom of Naples, belongs to the Pope, and therefore this Proceeding of the King of Naples occasions various Conjectures.

WARSAW, March 26. Since Advice has been received of a Confederacy being formed in Podolia, where 5000 Men have been enlisted, several Conferences have been held in the King's Presence; and the Troops that are quartered near that Province, are ordered to assemble. We do not yet know whether this new Confederacy is supported under Hand by any foreign Power, and though Prudence directs that proper Measures should be taken to support it, we have no Reason to be uneasy about it, especially as the Russian Troops are still in this Kingdom, and Prince Repnin has declared to the King, that as the Empress, his Sovereign, has guaranteed all that was settled by the Great Commission, he is persuaded that her Imperial Majesty will, if necessary, make Use of her Arms to abolish this new Confederacy.

PARIS, April 1. It is reported that the Propositions for an Accommodation between the Genoese and the Corsicans having proved unsuccessful, and the Treaty between our Court and the Republic of Genoa being near expired, that Treaty has been lately renewed, in Consequence of which 8 or 10,000 of our Troops are going to be sent to Corsica, under the Command of Lieutenant-General Count de Vogue, and Major-General Count de Narbonne.

VIENNA, April 6. The Pope's Nuncio made his Entry last Monday, and had his Audience Yesterday, that he might be in Public, in order to be able to perform the Marriage Ceremony To-morrow. The Archduke Ferdinand will be the King of Naples's Proxy. The Queen of Naples will set out a few Hours after.

Yesterday the Neapolitan Ambassador went to Court with a great Retinue, and had an Audience of their Imperial Majesties, to demand her Royal Highness; after which she was betrothed with the usual Ceremonies. To-day her Royal Highness signed and swore to the Act of Renunciation of all Pretensions to Allodial, &c. and every Claim whatever, in the Form that has always been practised on these Occasions.

PARIS, April 8. It is assured, that the Ambassadors from France, Spain, and Naples, at Rome, have received Orders to join in demanding of the Pope to withdraw his Brief concerning the Dutchy of Parma, and likewise a Satisfaction for this Insult; and it is presumed that his Holiness is disposed to come to an Accommodation.

L O N D O N.

March 2. A Letter from Lisbon, says, "it is strongly reported that the Dutch Ships are returned without landing their Presents at Algier; and that the Dey had declared War against Holland. He has made great Preparations by Sea; and one of his Ships of 36 Guns, which was sent out on a Cruise, was lately lost off Bona."

March 31. A Letter from Tregony, in Cornwall, mentions, that at the contested Election there, Nine People were killed in the Mob.

It is said, that Orders are given for building several Fire-Ships and Bomb-Ketches at Plymouth and Chatham.

April 2. It is said that several Petitions have lately been presented to the Boards of Treasury and Plantations, for opening a Trade to the Island of Corsica, and for appointing a Consul to reside in that Island.

We hear that Sir Edward Hawke, and other Lords of the Admiralty, will set out early in the ensuing Summer, to make a Survey of all the Men of War at Portsmouth and Plymouth, with the Royal Arsenals and Dock-Yards.

They write from Brest, that the Valeur Frigate, and Three Transports, with Artillery and Troops on board, had just sailed, and it is said for Goree Island, to be employed in establishing a Factory and Settlement near Cape Verd.

April 5. Saturday the Purser of the Lord Holland East-Indiaman, Capt. Nairne, from Bengal, came to the East-India House, with an Account of her safe Arrival at Falmouth; she brings the agreeable News that all is quiet and well there; that the Revenues of that Kingdom have come in beyond Expectation, and it is assured that there will be more Ships, and richer Cargoes, this Year, than ever came from that Country. She likewise brings Advice that Col. Smith, who commands the Troops in the Five Northern Provinces, on the Coast of Coromandel, and who, as was some Time ago mentioned, had marched against Hyder Ali, has defeated him in Two Engagements, and is pursuing the Advantages of his Victories.

Some Letters from Constantinople mention, that a dangerous Conspiracy was discovered among several of the Grandees of the Empire, during the Illness of the Grand Seigneur, but that proper Measures had been taken to prevent the threatened Mischief.

A Correspondent says, "Tho' the French retired Fifteen Hundred of their Troops from Corsica last Year, they intend to set quite on a different Plan this, and are to have Twenty-one Battalions there before July (Twenty Battalions make above 30,000 Men.) It is publicly said that Monf. de Navarre, Major General,

is to go with the first Embarkment of Fifteen, and that the Prince of Beauveau, Lieutenant General, and in every Respect of the highest Rank, is to follow with the other Six, and take the Command. Politicians are left to settle the Consequences."

They write from Dresden of the 21st Ult. that the Camp of Electoral Troops which is to be formed the ensuing Summer in the Neighbourhood of that Capital, will consist of 30,000 Men at least.

Several Sets of Gentlemen, in different Parts of this City, animated with universal Ideas of Liberty, and being desirous of meeting together happily, chose Yesterday for that Purpose, it being the Birth-Day of the illustrious Paschal Paoli, General of the Corsicans; in particular there was a very respectable Company at the Queen's Arms in St. Paul's Church-yard, where James Boswell, Esq; was President, when the following Healths were drank: The King, Queen, and Royal Family, Paschal Paoli, Success to the brave Corsicans, May the Corsicans be countenanced by every State, which has a just Value for Liberty, Lord Halifax, Lord Shelburne, Lord Lyttleton, General Conway, Horace Walpole, Dr. Franklin, Mrs. Macaulay, with many other Toasts, and a Society is formed to meet annually on that Day.

Some Letters from Leghorn, mention a Report prevailing there, that the Court of Versailles had engaged to dispossess the Corsicans of all the strong Holds taken from the Republic of Genoa, during the Course of the late War.

Private Letters from Corsica mention, that in a late Council of the States, it had been resolved to make no Opposition to the Landing of the French Troops in that Island, but that a great Number of armed Militia should be held in readiness to take the Field on any Emergency.

From Corsica, we are told, that General Paoli has lately sent one of his Nobles, a Person of great Abilities, to execute an important Commission at the Court of Berlin.

Extra^d of a Letter from Genoa, March 23.

"The Rebels every Day gain Ground of us; and if the fresh Succours that we have been flattered with from France do not quickly arrive, we shall probably be soon obliged to renounce the Dominion which the Republic has exercised over those People, and make a firm and solid Peace with them, the Basis of which will be their Liberty."

Private Letters from Genoa inform, that several Maritime Powers had lately entered into Treaties of Commerce with the People of Corsica.

It is now confidently asserted, that if the French shall send Twenty Battalions of their Troops against the brave Corsicans, another great Nation will at last step forth as the public Guardian of Liberty; so that important News may be expected.

This Day several Colony Agents attended at Lord Hillsborough's Office, Whitehall; with some Dispatches lately received from the American Colonies. It is said, if any Changes should take Place, as has been reported, his Lordship will be continued in his present Office.

April 9. Letters from Warsaw confirm the Accounts of a Confederacy forming in Poland, on the Score of Religion, with these Additions, that the Starost Wareski is raising all the Cossacks and Tartars he can; that a Carmelite Friar animates the People in his Discourses to take up Arms; that all who join them are sworn to Fidelity; and that, besides the Motto mentioned in a late Paper, they have also set up the following on some of their Standards (*Pro Religione & Libertate*) "For Religion and Liberty." In the mean Time, these Advices say, that no Orders have yet been given by the Court to put the Crown-Troops in Motion, excepting a few light armed Pulks; it being judged better to endeavour to bring the Associates to Reason by Lenity and Kindness, than to use Rigour against them; though, on the other Hand, some are not without Apprehensions, that the Malecontents are supported by a foreign Power (the Turks) and should the Crown-Troops be ordered to march out, they would only add to the Number of the Insurgents by Deserters.

A grand Council was held this Day at St. James's, at which the Earl of Chatham and Lord Camden assisted; the former came to Town for that Purpose Yesterday, and the latter this Morning.

Several Lifts of approaching Changes in the Administration are handed about; but we are credibly informed they are none of them authentic; and further, that no immediate Changes are expected in any of the great Offices of State.

April 12. Letters from Genoa of the 12th Ult. advise, that a Courier has just passed through that City, for Rome, with Dispatches for the Pope, on the Part of the King of France, importing, that if his Holiness did not forthwith withdraw his Bull against the Court of Parma, and discard the Cardinal Torregiani, his Secretary of State, the Ambassador of his most Christian Majesty, would immediately leave Rome without taking Leave.

The last Advices from Spain, we hear, are very unfavourable, and it is thought we are upon the Eve of a Rupture with that Court.

It is reported, that Orders will soon be given for the Artificers in the Dock-Yards at Plymouth, Portsmouth, and Chatham, to be augmented, in order to fit out several Ships of War, which are to make their Appearance this Summer in the Mediterranean.

Letters from the Hague mention, that in a late Council of the States-General it was unanimously resolved to prevent, if possible, a Rupture with the Algerines.

They write from Gibraltar, that a Dutch Frigate of War lately put into the Bay, having on board several Pieces of Brass Ordnance, Gunpowder, and Naval Stores, together with some valuable Articles, intended as a Present to the Dey of Algiers.

April 14. Some late Advices from Holland inform, that the Empress Queen has forbid her Subjects of the Austrian Netherlands to carry on any Intercourse or Trade with the Dutch; the Reason for this unexpected Procedure is not assigned.

They write from Lisbon, that some great Persons there express much Dissatisfaction at the intended Cession of Paraguay in South-America, to his Most Catholic Majesty.

April 16. Yesterday arrived a Mail from New-York, brought by the Cumberland Packet-Boat, Capt. Bunker.

Yesterday there was a great Council at St. James's, at which Lord Gower, President, the Duke of Grafton, the Two Secretaries of State, and the Earl of Hillsborough, Secretary for the American Colonies, assisted; said to be in reference to Dispatches received from the said Colonies.

It is said the Earl of Chatham has had several private Conferences with his Majesty since his Arrival in Town. His Lordship enjoys a tolerable State of Health at present.

April 19. A Letter from Lucca, dated March 19, says, "According to the last Advices from Rome, the King of Sardinia has offered his Mediation to terminate the Differences subsisting between the Holy See and the Infant Duke of Parma; but with what Success we know not."

They write from Warsaw, that a Report prevailed there, that the Confederates of Podolia had blocked up the Fortress of Kamienick, in order to reduce it by Famine.

This Morning a Packet with Dispatches was sent off from the Secretary of State's Office, for his Excellency Francis Bernard, Esq; Governor of New-England.

A Letter from Golport, dated April 5, says, "This Day Orders were sent on board all the Ships in ordinary in the Harbour, for them to be thoroughly cleaned, and got ready for a Survey by the Lords of the Admiralty and Commissioners of the Navy; the Commissioner of Portsmouth Dock is expected to visit the Ships To-morrow."

The following remarkable Affair lately happened at a Village in Norfolk:—A Gentleman's Coachman having frequently lost his Corn, Brushes, and even his Horse-Rubbers, for all which his Master used to make him pay, was determined to fit up all Night and watch the Thief; when a Person came in and began to take out some Oats out of the Bin with a Sieve, when the Coachman seized him by the Collar, and, to his great Surprise, found it was his own Master; but being of true athletic Mould, gave his Master a very hearty Drubbing, who cried out, Sirrah! I am your Master. It is a d—d Lie, replied the Coachman, still keeping drubbing on; do you think my Master would be such a Rascal and Villain to rob himself?

The Mob in their late Extravagancies stopped the Count de Seilern, the Imperial Ambassador's Coach, insisted on his huzzing Wilkes and Liberty; after which they chalked No. 45, on each of his Excellency's Shoes.

It is reported that Sir William Baker has not only declared his Intentions of resigning his Gown, but is actually making Interest in his Ward for Mr. Wilkes to succeed him.

It is said to be certain that Mr. Wilkes proposes to stand Candidate for an Alderman of the City of London, the first Vacancy that may happen.

Such is the great Zeal of the Fair Sex for that most adorable Goddess, LIBERTY, that it is assured Four young Ladies at the West-End of the Town, having just received their small annual Stipend for Pocket-Money, immediately lodged it in the Hands of the Banker for the Use of Mr. Wilkes.

It is now said that there is no Flaw in Mr. Wilkes's Outlawry.

It is expected that Sentence will be passed on Mr. Wilkes the 20th of this Month at Westminster-Hall.

'Tis thought that there will be at least an Hundred and Fifty new Members in the ensuing Parliament.

It is said, that there will be more Petitions presented to the House of Commons next Parliament, complaining of undue Elections and Returns, than has been known since 1727.

April 21. Yesterday Morning Mr. Wilkes came from his Apartments in Prince's Row, near Great George-Street, Westminster, in a Chair to the Parliament Coffee-House, in Old Palace-Yard, being preceded by Three Gentlemen, who most pressingly recommended Silence and good Order to the Populace, as did Mr. Wilkes also from the Chair. He staid at the Coffee-House till the Court was set, when he went the Back-way into it, in order to surrender himself; and the following is

Mr. WILKES's Speech to the Court of King's-Bench:

"MY LORDS,
"According to the voluntary Promise I made to the Public, I now appear before this Sovereign Court of Justice, to submit myself in every Thing to the Laws of my Country."

"Two Verdicts have been found against me. One is for the Re-publication of the North Briton, No. 45, another for the Publication of a ludicrous Poem."

VENICE, March 30.



WE have just received Advice from Rome, that 1800 Neapolitan Troops have taken Possession of Benevento, which Place, though situate in the Kingdom of Naples, belongs to the Pope, and therefore this Proceeding of the King of Naples occasions various Conjectures.

WARSAW, March 26. Since Advice has been received of a Confederacy being formed, in Podolia, where 5000 Men have been enlisted, several Conferences have been held in the King's Presence; and the Troops that are quartered near that Province, are ordered to assemble. We do not yet know whether this new Confederacy is supported under Hand by any foreign Power, and though Prudence directs that proper Measures should be taken to support it, we have no Reason to be uneasy about it, especially as the Russian Troops are still in this Kingdom, and Prince Repnin has declared to the King, that as the Empress, his Sovereign, has guaranteed all that was settled by the Great Commission, he is persuaded that her Imperial Majesty will, if necessary, make Use of her Arms to abolish this new Confederacy.

PARIS, April 1. It is reported that the Propositions for an Accommodation between the Genoise and the Corsicans having proved unsuccessful, and the Treaty between our Court and the Republic of Genoa being near expired, that Treaty has been lately renewed, in consequence of which 8 or 10,000 of our Troops are going to be sent to Corsica, under the Command of Lieutenant-General Count de Vogue, and Major-General Count de Narbonne.

VIENNA, April 6. The Pope's Nuncio made his Entry last Monday, and had his Audience Yesterday, that he might be in Public, in order to be able to perform the Marriage Ceremony To-morrow. The Arch-duke Ferdinand will be the King of Naples's Proxy. The Queen of Naples will set out a few Hours after.

Yesterday the Neapolitan Ambassador went to Court with a great Retinue, and had an Audience of their Imperial Majesties, to demand her Royal Highness; after which she was betrothed with the usual Ceremonies. To-day her Royal Highness signed and swore to the Act of Renunciation of all Pretensions to Allodial, &c. and every Claim whatever, in the Form that has always been practised on these Occasions.

PARIS, April 8. It is assured, that the Ambassadors from France, Spain, and Naples, at Rome, have received Orders to join in demanding of the Pope to withdraw his Brief concerning the Duchy of Parma, and likewise a Satisfaction for this Insult; and it is presumed that his Holiness is disposed to come to an Accommodation.

L O N D O N.

March 4. A Letter from Lisbon, says, "it is strongly reported that the Dutch Ships are returned without landing their Presents at Algier; and that the Dey had declared War against Holland. He has made great Preparations by Sea, and one of his Ships of 36 Guns, which was sent out on a Cruise, was lately lost off Bonas."

March 31. A Letter from Tregony, in Cornwall, mentions, that at the contested Election there, Nine People were killed in the Mob.

It is said, that Orders are given for building several Fire-Ships and Bomb-Ketches at Plymouth and Chatham.

April 2. It is said that several Petitions have lately been presented to the Boards of Treasury and Plantations, for opening a Trade to the Island of Corsica, and for appointing a Consul to reside in that Island.

We hear that Sir Edward Hawke, and other Lords of the Admiralty, will set out early in the ensuing Summer, to make a Survey of all the Men of War at Portsmouth and Plymouth, with the Royal Arsenals and Dock-Yards.

They write from Brest, that the Valeur Frigate, and Three Transports, with Artillery and Troops on board, had just sailed, and it is said for Goree Island, to be employed in establishing a Factory and Settlement near Cape Verd.

April 5. Saturday the Purser of the Lord Holland East-Indiaman, Capt. Nairne, from Bengal, came to the East-India House, with an Account of her safe Arrival at Falmouth; she brings the agreeable News that all is quiet and well there; that the Revenues of that Kingdom have come in beyond Expectation; and it is assured that there will be more Ships, and richer Cargoes, this Year, than ever came from that Country. She likewise brings Advice that Col. Smith, who commands the Troops in the Five Northern Provinces, on the Coast of Coromandel, and who, as was some Time ago mentioned, had marched against Hyder Ali, has defeated him in two Engagements, and is pursuing the Advantages of his Victories.

Some Letters from Constantinople mention, that a dangerous Conspiracy was discovered among several of the Grandees of the Empire, during the Illness of the Grand Seigneur, but that proper Measures had been taken to prevent the threatened Mischief.

A Correspondent says, "Tho' the French retired Fifteen Hundred of their Troops from Corsica last Year, they intend to act quite on a different Plan this, and are to have Twenty-one Battalions there before July (Twenty Battalions make above 30,000 Men.) It is publicly said that Monf. de Navarre, Major General,

is to go with the first Embarkment of Fifteen, and that the Prince of Beauveau, Lieutenant General, and in every Respect of the highest Rank, is to follow with the other Six, and take the Command. Politicians are left to settle the Consequences."

They write from Dresden of the 21st Ult. that the Camp of Electoral Troops which is to be formed the ensuing Summer in the Neighbourhood of that Capital, will consist of 30,000 Men at least.

Several Sets of Gentlemen, in different Parts of this City, animated with universal Ideas of Liberty, and being desirous of meeting together happily, chose Yesterday for that Purpose, it being the Birth-Day of the illustrious Paschal Paoli, General of the Corsicans; in particular there was a very respectable Company at the Queen's Arms in St. Paul's Church-yard, where James Boswell, Esq; was President, when the following Healths were drank: The King, Queen, and Royal Family, Paschal Paoli, Success to the brave Corsicans, May the Corsicans be countenanced by every State, which has a just Value for Liberty, Lord Halifax, Lord Shelburne, Lord Lyttleton, General Conway, Horace Walpole, Dr. Franklin, Mrs. Macaulay, with many other Toasts, and a Society is formed to meet annually on that Day.

Some Letters from Leghorn, mention a Report prevailing there, that the Court of Versailles had engaged to dispossess the Corsicans of all the strong Holds taken from the Republic of Genoa, during the Course of the late War.

Private Letters from Corsica mention, that in a late Council of the States, it had been resolved to make no Opposition to the Landing of the French Troops in that Island, but that a great Number of armed Militia should be held in readiness to take the Field on any Emergency.

From Corsica, we are told, that General Paoli has lately sent one of his Nobles, a Person of great Abilities, to execute an important Commission at the Court of Berlin.

Extract of a Letter from Genoa, March 23.

"The Rebels every Day gain Ground of us; and if the fresh Succours that we have been flattered with from France do not quickly arrive, we shall probably be soon obliged to renounce the Dominion which the Republic has exercised over those People, and make a firm and solid Peace with them, the Basis of which will be their Liberty."

Private Letters from Genoa inform, that several Maritime Powers had lately entered into Treaties of Commerce with the People of Corsica.

It is now confidently asserted, that if the French shall send Twenty Battalions of their Troops against the brave Corsicans, another great Nation will at last step forth as the public Guardian of Liberty; so that important News may be expected.

This Day several Colony Agents attended at Lord Hillsborough's Office, Whitehall; with some Dispatches lately received from the American Colonies. It is said, if any Changes should take Place, as has been reported, his Lordship will be continued in his present Office.

April 9. Letters from Warsaw confirm the Accounts of a Confederacy forming in Poland, on the Score of Religion, with these Additions, that the Starost Wareski is raising all the Cossacks and Tartars he can; that a Carmelite Friar animates the People in his Discourses to take up Arms; that all who join them are sworn to Fidelity; and that, besides the Motto mentioned in a late Paper, they have also set up the following on some of their Standards (*Pro Religione & Libertate*) "For Religion and Liberty." In the mean Time, these Advices say, that no Orders have yet been given by the Court to put the Crown-Troops in Motion, excepting a few light armed Pulks; it being judged better to endeavour to bring the Associates to Reason by Lenity and Kindness, than to use Rigour against them; though, on the other Hand, some are not without Apprehensions, that the Malecontents are supported by a foreign Power (the Turks) and should the Crown-Troops be ordered to march out, they would only add to the Number of the Insurgents by Deserters.

A grand Council was held this Day at St. James's, at which the Earl of Chatham and Lord Camden assisted; the former came to Town for that Purpose Yesterday, and the latter this Morning.

Several Lifts of approaching Changes in the Administration are handed about; but we are credibly informed they are none of them authentic; and further, that no immediate Changes are expected in any of the great Offices of State.

April 12. Letters from Genoa of the 12th Ult. advise, that a Courier had just passed through that City, for Rome, with Dispatches for the Pope, on the Part of the King of France, importing, that if his Holiness did not forthwith withdraw his Bull against the Court of Parma, and discard the Cardinal Torregiani, his Secretary of State, the Ambassador of his most Christian Majesty, would immediately leave Rome without taking Leave.

The last Advices from Spain, we hear, are very unfavourable, and it is thought we are upon the Eve of a Rupture with that Court.

It is reported, that Orders will soon be given for the Artificers in the Dock-Yards at Plymouth, Portsmouth, and Chatham, to be augmented, in order to fit out several Ships of War, which are to make their Appearance this Summer in the Mediterranean.

Letters from the Hague mention, that in a late Council of the States-General it was unanimously resolved to prevent, if possible, a Rupture with the Algerines.

They write from Gibraltar, that a Dutch Frigate of War lately put into the Bay, having on board several Pieces of Brass Ordnance, Gunpowder, and Naval Stores, together with some valuable Articles, intended as a Present to the Dey of Algiers.

April 14. Some late Advices from Holland inform, that the Empress Queen has forbid her Subjects of the Austrian Netherlands to carry on any Intercourse or Trade with the Dutch; the Reason for this unexpected Procedure is not assigned.

They write from Lisbon, that some great Persons there express much Dissatisfaction at the intended Cession of Paraguay in South-America, to his Most Catholic Majesty.

April 16. Yesterday arrived a Mail from New-York, brought by the Cumberland Packet-Boat, Capt. Bunker.

Yesterday there was a great Council at St. James's, at which Lord Gower, President, the Duke of Grafton, the Two Secretaries of State, and the Earl of Hillsborough, Secretary for the American Colonies, assisted; said to be in reference to Dispatches received from the said Colonies.

It is said the Earl of Chatham has had several private Conferences with his Majesty since his Arrival in Town. His Lordship enjoys a tolerable State of Health at present.

April 19. A Letter from Lucca, dated March 19, says, "According to the last Advices from Rome, the King of Sardinia has offered his Mediation to terminate the Differences subsisting between the Holy See and the Infant Duke of Parma; but with what Success we know not."

They write from Warsaw, that a Report prevailed there, that the Confederates of Podolia had blocked up the Fortrefs of Kamienieck, in order to reduce it by Famine.

This Morning a Packet with Dispatches was sent off from the Secretary of State's Office, for his Excellency Francis Bernard, Esq; Governor of New-England.

A Letter from Gosport, dated April 5, says, "This Day Orders were sent on board all the Ships in ordinary in the Harbour, for them to be thoroughly cleaned, and got ready for a Survey by the Lords of the Admiralty and Commissioners of the Navy; the Commissioner of Portsmouth Dock is expected to visit the Ships To-morrow."

The following remarkable Affair lately happened at a Village in Norfolk:—A Gentleman's Coachman having frequently lost his Corn, Brushes, and even his Horse-Rubbers, for all which his Master used to make him pay, was determined to fit up all Night and watch the Thief; when a Person came in and began to take out some Oats out of the Bin with a Sieve, when the Coachman seized him by the Collar, and, to his great Surprise, found it was his own Master; but being of true athletic Mould, gave his Master a very hearty Drubbing, who cried out, Sirrah! I am your Master. It is a d—d Lie, replied the Coachman, still keeping drubbing on; do you think my Master would be such a Rascal and Villain to rob himself?

The Mob in their late Extravagancies stopped the Count de Seilern, the Imperial Ambassador's Coach, insisted on his huzzing Wilkes and Liberty; after which they chalked No. 45, on each of his Excellency's Shoes.

It is reported that Sir William Baker has not only declared his Intentions of resigning his Gown, but is actually making Interest in his Ward for Mr. Wilkes to succeed him.

It is said to be certain that Mr. Wilkes proposes to stand Candidate for an Alderman of the City of London, the first Vacancy that may happen.

Such is the great Zeal of the Fair Sex for that most adorable Goddess, LIBERTY, that it is assured Four young Ladies at the West-End of the Town, having just received their small annual Stipend for Pocket-Money, immediately lodged it in the Hands of the Banker for the Use of Mr. Wilkes.

It is now said that there is no Flaw in Mr. Wilkes's Outlawry.

It is expected that Sentence will be passed on Mr. Wilkes the 20th of this Month at Westminster-Hall.

'Tis thought that there will be at least an Hundred and Fifty new Members in the ensuing Parliament.

It is said, that there will be more Petitions presented to the House of Commons next Parliament, complaining of undue Elections and Returns, than has been known since 1727.

April 21. He staid at the Coffee-House till the Court was set, when he went the Back-way into it, in order to surrender himself; and the following is Mr. WILKES's Speech to the Court of King's-Bench:

"MY LORDS,

"According to the voluntary Promise I made to the Public, I now appear before this Sovereign Court of Justice, to submit myself in every Thing to the Laws of my Country.

"Two Verdicts have been found against me. One is for the Re-publication of the North Briton, No. 45, the other for the Publication of a ludicrous Poem.

WE have just received Advice from Rome, that 1800 Neapolitan Troops have taken Possession of Benevento, which Place, though situate in the Kingdom of Naples, belongs to the Pope, and therefore this Proceeding of the King of Naples occasions various Conjectures.

WARSAW, March 26. Since Advice has been received of a Confederacy being formed in Podolia, where 5000 Men have been enlisted, several Conferences have been held in the King's Presence; and the Troops that are quartered near that Province, are ordered to assemble. We do not yet know whether this new Confederacy is supported under Hand by any foreign Power, and though Prudence directs that proper Measures should be taken to support it, we have no Reason to be uneasy about it, especially as the Russian Troops are still in this Kingdom, and Prince Repnin has declared to the King, that as the Empress, his Sovereign, has guaranteed all that was settled by the Great Commission, he is persuaded that her Imperial Majesty will, if necessary, make Use of her Arms to abolish this new Confederacy.

PARIS, April 1. It is reported that the Propositions for an Accommodation between the Genoese and the Corsicans having proved unsuccessful, and the Treaty between our Court and the Republic of Genoa being near expired, that Treaty has been lately renewed, in Consequence of which 8 or 10,000 of our Troops are going to be sent to Corsica, under the Command of Lieutenant-General Count de Vogue, and Major-General Count de Narbonne.

VIENNA, April 6. The Pope's Nuncio made his Entry last Monday; and had his Audience Yesterday, that he might be in Public, in order to be able to perform the Marriage Ceremony To-morrow. The Archduke Ferdinand will be the King of Naples's Proxy. The Queen of Naples will set out a few Hours after.

Yesterday the Neapolitan Ambassador went to Court with a great Retinue, and had an Audience of their Imperial Majesties, to demand her Royal Highness; after which she was betrothed with the usual Ceremonies. To-day her Royal Highness signed and swore to the Act of Renunciation of all Pretensions to Allodial, &c. and every Claim whatever, in the Form that has always been practised on these Occasions.

PARIS, April 8. It is assured, that the Ambassadors from France, Spain, and Naples, at Rome, have received Orders to join in demanding of the Pope to withdraw his Brief concerning the Duchy of Parma, and likewise a Satisfaction for this Insult; and it is presumed that his Holiness is disposed to come to an Accommodation.

L O N D O N.

M a r c h 4. A Letter from Lisbon, says, "it is strongly reported that the Dutch Ships are returned without landing their Presents at Algier; and that the Dey had declared War against Holland. He has made great Preparations by Sea; and one of his Ships of 36 Guns, which was sent out on a Cruise, was lately lost off Bona."

M a r c h 31. A Letter from Tregony, in Cornwall, mentions, that at the contested Election there, Nine People were killed in the Mob.

It is said, that Orders are given for building several Fire-Ships and Bomb-Ketches at Plymouth and Chatham.

A p r i l 5. It is said that several Petitions have lately been presented to the Boards of Treasury and Plantations, for opening a Trade to the Island of Corsica, and for appointing a Consul to reside in that Island.

We hear that Sir Edward Hawke, and other Lords of the Admiralty, will set out early in the ensuing Summer, to make a Survey of all the Men of War at Portsmouth and Plymouth, with the Royal Armaments and Dock-Yards.

They write from Brett, that the Valeur Frigate, and Three Transports, with Artillery and Troops on board, had just sailed, and it is said for Goree Island, to be employed in establishing a Factory and Settlement near Cape Verd.

A p r i l 5. Saturday the Purser of the Lord Holland East-Indiaman, Capt. Nairne, from Bengal, came to the East-India House, with an Account of her safe Arrival at Falmouth; she brings the agreeable News that all is quiet and well there; that the Revenues of that Kingdom have come in beyond Expectation, and it is assured that there will be more Ships, and richer Cargoes, this Year, than ever came from that Country. She likewise brings Advice that Col. Smith, who commands the Troops in the Five Northern Provinces, on the Coast of Coromandel, and who, as was some Time ago mentioned, had marched against Hyder Ali, has defeated him in Two Engagements, and is pursuing the Advantages of his Victories.

Some Letters from Constantinople mention, that a dangerous Conspiracy was discovered among several of the Grandees of the Empire, during the Illness of the Grand Seigneur, but that proper Measures had been taken to prevent the threatened Mischief.

A Correspondent says, "Tho' the French retired Fifteen Hundred of their Troops from Corsica last Year, they intend to set quite on a different Plan this, and are to have Twenty-one Battalions there before July (Twenty Battalions make above 30,000 Men.) It is publicly said that Monf. de Navarre, Major General,

is to go with the first Embarkment of Fifteen, and that the Prince of Beauveau, Lieutenant General, and in every Respect of the highest Rank, is to follow with the other Six, and take the Command. Politicians are left to settle the Consequences."

They write from Dresden of the 21st Ult. that the Camp of Electoral Troops which is to be formed the ensuing Summer in the Neighbourhood of that Capital, will consist of 30,000 Men at least.

Several Sets of Gentlemen, in different Parts of this City, animated with universal Ideas of Liberty, and being desirous of meeting together happily, chose Yesterday for that Purpose, it being the Birth-Day of the illustrious Paschal Paoli, General of the Corsicans; in particular there was a very respectable Company at the Queen's-Arms in St. Paul's Church-yard, where James Boswell, Esq; was President, when the following Healths were drank: The King, Queen, and Royal Family, Paschal Paoli, Success to the brave Corsicans, May the Corsicans be countenanced by every State, which has a just Value for Liberty, Lord Halifax, Lord Shelburne, Lord Lyttleton, General Conway, Horace Walpole, Dr. Franklin, Mrs. Macaulay, with many other Toasts, and a Society is formed to meet annually on that Day.

Some Letters from Leghorn, mention a Report prevailing there, that the Court of Versailles had engaged to dispossess the Corsicans of all the strong Holds taken from the Republic of Genoa, during the Course of the late War.

Private Letters from Corsica mention, that in a late Council of the States, it had been resolved to make no Opposition to the Landing of the French Troops in that Island, but that a great Number of armed Militia should be held in readiness to take the Field on any Emergency.

From Corsica, we are told, that General Paoli has lately sent one of his Nobles, a Person of great Abilities, to execute an important Commission at the Court of Berlin.

Extrast of a Letter from Genoa, March 23.

"The Rebels every Day gain Ground of us; and if the fresh Succours that we have been flattered with from France do not quickly arrive, we shall probably be soon obliged to renounce the Dominion which the Republic has exercised over those People, and make a firm and solid Peace with them, the Basis of which will be their Liberty."

Private Letters from Genoa inform, that several Maritime Powers had lately entered into Treaties of Commerce with the People of Corsica.

It is now confidently asserted, that if the French shall send Twenty Battalions of their Troops against the brave Corsicans, another great Nation will at last step forth as the public Guardian of Liberty; so that important News may be expected.

This Day several Colony Agents attended at Lord Hillsborough's Office, Whitehall; with some Dispatches lately received from the American Colonies. It is said, if any Changes should take Place, as has been reported, his Lordship will be continued in his present Office.

A p r i l 9. Letters from Warsaw confirm the Accounts of a Confederacy forming in Poland, on the Score of Religion, with these Additions, that the Starost Wa-recki is raising all the Cossacks and Tartars he can; that a Carmelite Friar animates the People in his Discourses to take up Arms; that all who join them are sworn to Fidelity; and that, besides the Motto mentioned in a late Paper, they have also set up the following on some of their Standards (*Pro Religione & Libertate*) "For Religion and Liberty." In the mean Time, these Advices say, that no Orders have yet been given by the Court to put the Crown-Troops in Motion, excepting a few light armed Pulks; it being judged better to endeavour to bring the Associates to Reason by Lenity and Kindness, than to use Rigour against them; though, on the other Hand, some are not without Apprehensions, that the Malecontents are supported by a foreign Power (the Turks) and should the Crown-Troops be ordered to march out, they would only add to the Number of the Insurgents by Deserters.

A grand Council was held this Day at St. James's, at which the Earl of Chatham and Lord Camden assisted; the former came to Town for that Purpose Yesterday, and the latter this Morning.

Several Lifts of approaching Changes in the Administration are handed about; but we are credibly informed they are none of them authentic; and further, that no immediate Changes are expected in any of the great Offices of State.

A p r i l 12. Letters from Genoa of the 12th Ult. advise, that a Courier has just passed through that City, for Rome, with Dispatches for the Pope, on the Part of the King of France, importing, that if his Holiness did not forthwith withdraw his Bull against the Court of Parma, and discard the Cardinal Torregiani, his Secretary of State, the Ambassador of his most Christian Majesty, would immediately leave Rome without taking Leave.

The last Advices from Spain, we hear, are very unfavourable, and it is thought we are upon the Eve of a Rupture with that Court.

It is reported, that Orders will soon be given for the Artificers in the Dock-Yards at Plymouth, Portsmouth, and Chatham, to be augmented, in order to fit out several Ships of War, which are to make their Appearance this Summer in the Mediterranean.

Letters from the Hague mention, that in a late Council of the States-General it was unanimously resolved to prevent, if possible, a Rupture with the Algerines.

They write from Gibraltar, that a Dutch Frigate of War lately put into the Bay, having on board several Pieces of Brass Ordnance, Gunpowder, and Naval Stores, together with some valuable Articles, intended as a Present to the Dey of Algiers.

A p r i l 14. Some late Advices from Holland inform, that the Empress Queen has forbid her Subjects of the Austrian Netherlands to carry on any Intercourse or Trade with the Dutch; the Reason for this unexpected Procedure is not assigned.

They write from Lisbon, that some great Persons there express much Dissatisfaction at the intended Cession of Paraguay in South-America, to his Most Catholic Majesty.

A p r i l 16. Yesterday arrived a Mail from New-York, brought by the Cumberland Packet-Boat, Capt. Bunker.

Yesterday there was a great Council at St. James's, at which Lord Gower, President, the Duke of Grafton, the Two Secretaries of State, and the Earl of Hillsborough, Secretary for the American Colonies, assisted; said to be in reference to Dispatches received from the said Colonies.

It is said the Earl of Chatham has had several private Conferences with his Majesty since his Arrival in Town. His Lordship enjoys a tolerable State of Health at present.

A p r i l 19. A Letter from Lucca, dated March 19, says, "According to the last Advices from Rome, the King of Sardinia has offered his Mediation to terminate the Differences subsisting between the Holy See and the Infant Duke of Parma; but with what Success we know not."

They write from Warsaw, that a Report prevailed there, that the Confederates of Podolia had blocked up the Fortrefs of Kamienieck, in order to reduce it by Famine.

This Morning a Packet with Dispatches was sent off from the Secretary of State's Office, for his Excellency Francis Bernard, Esq; Governor of New-England.

A Letter from Goisport, dated April 5, says, "This Day Orders were sent on board all the Ships in ordinary in the Harbour, for them to be thoroughly cleaned, and got ready for a Survey by the Lords of the Admiralty and Commissioners of the Navy; the Commissary of Portsmouth Dock is expected to visit the Ships To-morrow."

The following remarkable Affair lately happened at a Village in Norfolk:—A Gentleman's Coachman having frequently lost his Corn, Brushes, and even his Horse-Rubbers, for all which his Master used to make him pay, was determined to fit up all Night and watch the Thief; when a Person came in and began to take out some Oats out of the Bin with a Sieve, when the Coachman seized him by the Collar, and, to his great Surprise, found it was his own Master; but being of true athletic Mould, gave his Master a very hearty Drubbing, who cried out, Sirrah! I am your Master. It is a d—d Lie, replied the Coachman, still keeping drubbing on; do you think my Master would be such a Rascal and Villain to rob himself?

The Mob in their late Extravagancies stopped the Count de Seilern, the Imperial Ambassador's Coach, insisted on his huzzaing Wilkes and Liberty; after which they chalked No. 45, on each of his Excellency's Shoes.

It is reported that Sir William Baker has not only declared his Intentions of resigning his Gown, but is actually making Interest in his Ward for Mr. Wilkes to succeed him.

It is said to be certain that Mr. Wilkes proposes to stand Candidate for an Alderman of the City of London, the first Vacancy that may happen.

Such is the great Zeal of the Fair Sex for that most adorable Goddess, LIBERTY, that it is assured Four young Ladies at the West-End of the Town, having just received their small annual Stipend for Pocket-Money, immediately lodged it in the Hands of the Banker for the Use of Mr. Wilkes.

It is now said that there is no Flaw in Mr. Wilkes's Outlawry.

It is expected that Sentence will be passed on Mr. Wilkes the 20th of this Month at Westminster-Hall.

'Tis thought that there will be at least an Hundred and Fifty new Members in the ensuing Parliament.

It is said, that there will be more Petitions presented to the House of Commons next Parliament, complaining of undue Elections and Returns, than has been known since 1737.

A p r i l 21. Yesterday Morning Mr. Wilkes came from his Apartments in Prince's-Row, near Great George-Street, Westminster, in a Chair to the Parliament Coffee-House, in Old Palace-Yard, being preceded by Three Gentlemen, who most pressing recommended Silence and good Order to the Populace, as did Mr. Wilkes also from the Chair. He staid at the Coffee-House till the Court was set, when he went the Back-way into it, in order to surrender himself; and the following is

Mr. WILKES's Speech to the Court of King's-Bench.

"MY LORDS,

"According to the voluntary Promise I made to the Public, I now appear before this Sovereign Court of Justice, to submit myself in every Thing to the Laws of my Country.

"Two Verdicts have been found against me. One is for the Re-publication of the North Briton, No. 45, another for the Publication of a ludicrous Poem.

"As to the Re-publication of the Number of the North Briton, I can only say that there is the smallest

Degree of G—. I have often read and examined with Care that famous Paper. I know that it is in every Part founded on the strongest Evidence of Facts. I find it full of Duty and Respect to the Person of the King, although it arraigns, in the severest Manner, the Conduct of his Majesty's then Ministers, and brings very heavy Charges home to them. I am persuaded they were well grounded, because every one of those Ministers has since been removed. No one Instance of Falshood has yet been pointed out in that pretended Libel, nor was the Word *faulx* in the Information before this Court. I am therefore perfectly easy under every Imputation respecting a Paper, in which Truth has guided the Pen of the Writer, whoever he was, in every single Line; and it is this Circumstance which has drawn on me, as the supposed Author, all the Cruelties of Ministerial Vengeance.

"As to the other Charge against me, for the Publication of a Poem, which has given just Offence, I will assert that such an Idea never entered my Mind. I blush again at the Recollection that it has been at any Time, and in any Way brought to the Public Eye, and drawn from the Obscurity in which it remained under my Roof. Twelve Copies of a small Part of it had been printed in my House, at my own Private Press. I had carefully locked them up, and I never gave one to the most intimate Friend. Go—t, after the Affair of the North Briton, bribed one of my Servants to rob me of the Copy, which was produced in the House of Peers, and afterwards before this Honourable Court. The Nation was justly offended, but not with me, for it was evident that I had not been guilty of the least Offence to the Public. I pray God to forgive, as I do, the Jury, who have found me guilty of publishing a Poem, I concealed with Care, and which is not even yet published, if any precise Meaning can be affixed to any Word in our Language.

"But, my Lords, neither of the Two Verdicts could have been found against me, if the Records had not been materially altered, without my Consent, and, as I am informed, contrary to L—. On the Evening only before the Two Trials, — caused the Records to be altered at his own House, against the Consent of my Solicitor, and without my Knowledge, for a dangerous Illness, arising from an Affair of Honour, detained me at that Time abroad. The Alterations were of the utmost Importance, and I was in Consequence tried the very next Day on Two new Charges, of which I could know nothing. I will venture to declare this Proceeding un—nal. I am advised that it is i—l, and that it renders both the Verdicts absolutely void.

"I have stood forth, my Lords, in Support of the Laws, against the arbitrary Acts of Ministers. This Court of Justice, in a solemn Appeal, respecting *General Warrants*, shewed their Sense of my Conduct. I shall continue to reverence the wife and mild System of English Laws, and this excellent Constitution. I have been much misrepresented, but under every Species of Persecution, I will remain firm and friendly to the Monarchy, dutiful and affectionate to the illustrious Prince, who wears the Crown, and to the whole Brunswick Line.

"As to all nice, intricate Points of Law, I am sensible how narrow and circumscribed my Ideas are, but I have experienced the deep Knowledge, and great Abilities of my Counsel. With them I rest the legal Part of my Defence, submitting every Point to the Judgment of this Honourable Court, and to the Laws of England."

NEW-YORK, June 13.

Dear Sir, Detroit, May 11, 1768.
You'll be much surprized to find, by the following Paragraph of a Letter, wrote to me by an Officer at Michilimackinac, the 24th of February last, that the formerly very famous and much esteemed Major Robert Rogers, is now capable of such horrid Villainy:—The Letter is as follows.

Dear Sir,
"I now take this Opportunity to congratulate you on your Escape from Murder and Plunder; Major Rogers, that experienced Chief to all Manner of Wickedness and Treachery, had formed a deep and horrid Plot to kill me, send Captain Spicemaker, and Lieut. Christie, Prisoners to the Indian Country, plunder this Garrison, and put all the Soldiers to Death, who were not in the Plot, and who would not comply with his Silence; this was to be executed by a numerous Party of Indians, some Soldiers, and French Inhabitants, that had consented to it: He then, with the Indians, and what Part of the Troops that would follow him, were immediately to set off to surprize the Garrison of Detroit, and give it up to Plunder to his Followers, for their Service, and then proceed to Old France (via New Orleans.) As he was pretty well convinced of the Abilities and Watchfulness of the Commander, and other Officers of Detroit, and doubting his being able to take it by Surprize, he had pitch'd upon some Pieces of Brass Cannon for laying a regular Siege to it. He is now in heavy Irons, with an Accomplice, and as there are many King's Evidences, no Part of this Account can be doubted."

I herewith inclose you another Letter to me, on the same Subject, thinking that these Accounts from the Gentlemen on the Spot, may be more satisfactory to you than Hearsay.

SIR, Michilimackinac, Feb. 24, 1768.
"At this Season you'll be surprized to see an Express from this; it is with the joyful News of Michilimackinac preserved, or the Plot discovered, a dismal Treachery carried on by its late Commandant, to massacre the Garrison, especially those who should oppose him in making his Escape; to head the rest with the Indians in his Interest, plunder this, and march against Detroit afterwards; make the best of his Way to Capt. Hopkins, on the Mississippi, who he had invited with a few Men last Spring, to deliver this Fort to him on his Arrival; making Interest, in his Confinement, with a Frenchman here to join him, and to get Capt. Spicemaker, and me, massacred, or taken by the Indians, before he was to attempt any Thing, was the Means of this Discovery:—We sent him to Rogers, to know what he was to do for him for so great an Undertaking; he went, and returned to us with the Villain's Note, Hand, for 100 Pounds Sterling, per Year, for Years."

On the Evening of Friday last, Mr. THOMAS RICHARDSON, late of this City, Merchant, was instantly kill'd by a Flash of Lightning, which melted his Watch, Shoe, and Knee Buckles.—He was sitting in a Room at Mr. ADAIR's, in BALTIMORE-TOWN, with another Person, at a small Distance, who was struck down, but soon recovered. The Damage done to the House, is inconsiderable, except in the Roof.—Mr. RICHARDSON was a young Man, in the Prime of Life, and possess'd many good Qualities, which justly entitled him to the Esteem of a numerous Acquaintance.

P A R I S, March 25.

LETTERS from Rouen advise, that there was a terrible Insurrection of the Populace last Tuesday and Wednesday, on account of the high Price of Bread; that several Persons were killed, and Three or Four Houses burnt by Means of this Tumult.



WARSAW, March 26. An Express is arrived with Advice, that the Re-confederates of Podolia had formed a Scheme to carry off the Commander of the Troops belonging to the Republic; but that the latter, having been informed of it, had retired into the Fortrefs of Kaminiack, which he was obliged to do, with so much Precipitation, that all the Polese Companies, consisting of Two Thousand Men, were made Prisoners. Immediately after this Expedition, the Re-confederates laid Siege, with all their Strength, to the Fortrefs, the Garrison of which is composed of only one Regiment of Artillery, and a few small Detachments from the other Regiments, without Provisions or Ammunition. It is reported, that the Place has surrendered.

The Russian Army commanded by General Kreschetnikow, is on its March towards Zamoff, which Town is Fifteen Leagues from Bar, the Head Quarters of the Confederates. This Army is to form a Line in the Palatinate of Cracovia, to observe the Motions of the Podolian Confederates, and to prevent the neighbouring Palatinates from entering into any Associations.

FRANKFORT, March 26. Our last Letters from Italy advise, that the Jesuits will not only be banished from the States of Genoa and Modena, but likewise out of the Austrian Lombardy. These Letters add, that Cardinal Spinola is appointed Secretary of State at Rome, instead of Cardinal Torregiani; and if this News is true, the Society of the Jesuits will soon be abolished, the last mentioned Cardinal being their principal Support.

L O N D O N.

April 13. A Coalition of Parties is said to be forming under the Sanction of Lord Chatham, which, it is said, will render strong the late so greatly relaxed Fibres of Administration.

It is currently reported that George Grenville, Esq; will soon be appointed Secretary of State. General Conway, Paymaster of the Forces, and Major-General of the Ordnance.

Duke of Northumberland, first Lord of the Treasury. And also that there will be some material Changes in his Majesty's Governors in America and the West-Indies.

Letters from Paris advise, that 50 Houses, with the Church and Parsonage, had been destroyed by Fire, in the Town of St. Paterno, near Tours; and that several Persons perished in the Flames.

It is said that Two Forts are to be erected this Summer on the Banks of the River Medway, some Miles above Sheerness.

April 21. This Morning a Board of Plantations was held at the Earl of Hillsborough's Office, Whitehall, at which several Agents for the American Colonies gave their Attendance.

The 8th Regiment of Foot, commanded by Major-General Webb, and the 28th, commanded by Lord Viscount Townshend, now quartered in Kent, are ordered to be completed forthwith to their full Complement, being to embark speedily for New-York.

April 26. It is rumoured, that some material Changes will quickly take Place in Two great Boards.

We hear that a late Election in the North has actually cost one of the Parties 70,000 l.

They write from Lisbon, that several stout Ships are now sitting out in the Tagus, belonging to the Mercantile Company, who last Year received the Permission of Government, to trade to the Coasts of Bengal and Comorandell.

They write from Copenhagen, that a very terrible Eruption of Fire had lately happened at Mount Hecla, in Iceland, that the Ships Decks, several Miles distant in the Road, had been covered with Ashes, and that the Effects of the Volcano fell all over the Island.

It is remarkable, that when Mr. Wilkes was brought from the Tower, by *Habeas Corpus*, to the Court of Common Pleas, Earl Temple was on the Bench the whole Time; and, on Wednesday, when our Patriot surrendered in the Court of King's Bench, Earl Winchelsea sat on the Bench next to the Judges during the whole Argument *pro* and *con*; and several other Persons of Rank were also present, some of whom took Minutes of the Proceedings.

April 27. A certain Gentleman at Poplar, the Friend of the patriotic Wilkes, had last Tuesday a very elegant Dinner; the Company consisted of 45 Gentlemen; at 45 Minutes past One, there were drank 45 Gills of Wine, with 45 new-laid Eggs in them; precisely at 45 Minutes past Two, a very genteel Dinner was served up, being Five Courses, Nine Dishes each, which made the No. 45.—In the Middle of the Table, the Figures 45, were inlaid with Mother of Pearl, on which was placed a noble Sirloin of Beef, weighing 45 Pounds; the Table-Cloth and Plates were marked 45; on the Back of every Chair those Figures were carved; and exactly 45 Gilt Nails in a Chair, which, with the 20, on each Person's Hands and Feet, made up the Number of Nails in every Chair, 45.—The whole concluded

with a Ball, in the Evening, when 45 Ladies entered the Room; then the Dances immediately began, and each Lady was saluted at the End of every Dance, which were Nine Minuets, Nine Rigadoons, Nine Cotillions, and Eighteen Country Dances, being in the whole 45. After the Ladies had been kissed round 45 Times, and 45 Couple of Jellies were eaten, the Company retired, with great Mirth and Festivity, at 45 Minutes past 3 o'Clock.

April 28. It is said that a certain Election in the North, has cost one of the Candidates not less than 120,000 l. and that he drew on his Agent in Town for 95,000 l. at one Draught.

Some Letters from Warsaw advise, that the new Confederates of Podolia have made themselves Masters of the Castle at Bar, as well as the Fortrefs of Kaminiack; and that the Number of Gentlemen who have joined them, is estimated at 8000. It is added, that all the Members of the Confederacy have engaged themselves by the most solemn Oath, not to discover any of their Projects; that their Conduct seems to be very regular; and that they pay ready Money for every Thing they stand in need of.

It is said a great Personage is determined not to pardon a late Exile, so that it may be expected he will be obliged again to leave his Country.

It is remarkable, that the Marquis of Rockingham's, was the only House in Grosvenor-Square, that was not illuminated on a late Occasion.

From the LONDON GAZETTE, April 27.

Extract of a Letter from Fort St. George, in the East-Indies, dated October 2, 1767.

"We have received from our Camp the following Account of the Defeat of the joint Forces of Nizam Ally and Hyder Ally, near Trinomallee, on the 26th of September last, by the Company's Forces, under the Command of Col. Smith.

From the Field of Battle at Erroor, near Trinomallee, Sept. 27, 1767.

Yesterday Evening, after several Manœuvres on both Sides, we brought the Enemy to an Action, and have effectually routed them. They endeavoured at first to turn a warm Cannonade upon our left, and as we could not well come at their Guns, on account of a Morass in Front, we were ordered to endeavour to turn their left round some Hills which lay in our Front. We did so, and presently brought them to an Action, which, after a very smart Fire, ended in their Defeat. Our Loss is small, the Rapidity with which our Troops advanced upon them, allowing them to do us little Harm, every Thing considered. We lay on the Field all last Night, and as soon as we could distinguish Objects, we marched this Morning in Pursuit of them; they made a faint Show of Resistance, but are gone entirely off, as it is thought, through the Changama-Pass into the Baharah-haul Country. We followed them 'til the Strength and Spirits of our Army were quite exhausted, and obliged us to halt on the Spot where we are now encamped, which is about Eight Miles on the Road to Changama from Trinomallee. Last Night we seized Nine of their Guns, and are now in Possession of about Fifty Pieces of their Cannon, which they could not carry off in their precipitate Retreat. Both our Officers and Men behaved with the greatest Resolution. The Enemy's Loss must be great, but cannot be ascertained, as the Moment a Man is killed or wounded, his Companions carry him off. The Prisoners inform us, that our Cannon made great Havock among them.

We learn since, that Fourteen more Pieces of the Enemy's Cannon have been found among the Bushes."

Extract of a Letter from Madras, dated Nov. 5, 1767.

"Hyder Ally, and the Subah of the Ducan, are totally routed, and we have taken 70 Pieces of Cannon: Every Thing is now quiet again, and we have by Treaty (since their Defeat) obtained ample Compensation for the Damage occasioned by this Rupture; so that this Event is likely to produce very advantageous Effects through the Settlements, the Natives being thoroughly depressed by their repeated ill Successes."

Some Letters from Leghorn mention, that the Senate of Genoa begin to doubt much whether France would send a Body of their Forces to Corsica; and it was said, the Republic intended to make Application elsewhere, for Troops to occupy their Garrisons in that Isle.

From Berlin we are informed, that great Part of the King of Prussia's Time is at present employed in endeavouring to improve and extend the Commerce of his Subjects throughout all his Dominions.

Extract of a Letter from Berlin, April 2.

"There has lately been a grand Review of a great many of our best Troops, all of whom, besides their usual Arms, have been furnished with large Hatchets, and with such strong shoes, as the Croats wear, when climbing their rugged Mountains. Orders have been given them to prepare for a very long March. No Mortal can say with Certainty what our Sovereign intends. It has long been rumoured that he is resolved to crown his glorious Days, by rendering the brave Corsicans entirely free and independent. It is affirmed as a Certainty, that the other Day, while he stood upon the grand Place, before the Palace, leaning upon the Lord Marischal's Arm, he turned to the Chevalier Mitchell, the British Ambassador, and said, "*Elevez je ferai vous autres Anglois.*" "By and by I shall make you Englishmen blub."

PAISLEY (in Scotland) March 24. We have often been amused in the Public Papers with Accounts of Mobs and Combinations of Journeymen of different Trades in London, Edinburgh, and Glasgow, refusing to work unless their Masters advanced their Wages; but we have gone a Step beyond them, by forming a female Combination, which has been entered into by young Women of this Place, employed in clipping of Lawns, who refuse to work, unless on higher Wages. They, in Number betwixt Two and Three Hundred, mostly clothed in White, drew up this Day at Maxwelltown, and marched in Procession, Four in a Rank, to this Place, and paraded through the Streets: This white Regiment was escorted by great Crowds of Journeymen-Weavers and others.

Gravesend, April 25. Passed by, the Charlotte, Cooper, from New-York.

B O S T O N, June 11.

Last Friday Evening the Officers of the Customs for this Port, made a Seizure of a Sloop lying at Hancock's Wharf, and which they ordered to be carried off under the Guns of his Majesty's Ship Romney. This Affair occasioned a Dispute between the Officers and some of the People who happened to be on the Wharf, in which Mr. Harrison the Collector, Mr. Hollowell the Comptroller, and Mr. Harrison's Son, were all pelted with Stones, and wounded. Soon after which, a Number of People assembled, went to the House of Mr. Williams, Inspector-General, broke some of the Windows of his House, as also of the Houses of the Collector and Comptroller; but were prevented doing further Damage by some Gentlemen of the Town. After which they burnt a Pleasure-Boat, belonging to the Collector, in the Common. Mr. Irvine, Inspector of Exports and Imports, was also attacked the same Night; he had his Sword broke, and with some Difficulty made his Escape, with the Assistance of some of the People present.

KITTERY, June 2. This Day, in the Afternoon, we had a Storm of Thunder; when Mr. Joseph Fry of this Town, and several others, were struck with Lightning (being in a House which is much shattered) it made a Breach thro' Mr. Fry's Cloaths on his Shoulder the Bigness of a Dollar, set his Shirt on Fire, split the Seam of his Coat, broke some Skin on his Arm, and left it black, and past into the Seam of his Breeches, and split it open, marking the same as it went, cut off his Garter, tearing his Stocking to Rags, and leaving a sulphurous Matter on it, taking away one Quarter of his Shoe, and leaving the like Mark all the Way.

N E W - Y O R K, June 20.

The London Papers mention, that the last Advices from Spain were unfavourable, and that it is thought we are upon the Eve of a Rupture with that Court. We also hear that private Letters by the last Vessels, agree in the same Account, and mention the Manilla Ransom as the immediate Cause. The Crisis of many important Events seems to be near at Hand.

By some late Accounts from the Streights, we learn, that the French and Spaniards, in that Part of the World, are very busy in preparing for War; and that several Transports, with Troops on board, lately failed from Cadiz, for the Spanish West-Indies.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, June 23.

Extract of a Letter from Lancaster County, June 20, 1768.

"I now sit down, under the Shade of a friendly Oak, in the Country, in order to give you some Account of the late dreadful Storm here, the Effects of which I have taken Pains to examine, having rode several Miles for that Purpose.

"On Friday, the 17th Instant, about 2 o'Clock P. M. the Sky was overpread with flying Clouds, apparently charged with heavy Rain. The Wind blew pretty fresh from the S. E. and thickened the Clouds in the opposite Quarter; so that about 4 o'Clock there was "Darkness visible" in the N. W. attended with a distant rumbling Thunder, and now and then a small Gleam of Lightning, without any Explofions. The Clouds deepened more and more in the N. W. and there seemed to make a Stand, being opposed by the Wind from the opposite Points. At Half after 4, they assumed a frightful Appearance, and at last formed a large Crescent, with its Concave Side to the Wind, and its inner Edges tinged with a dusky Violet Colour. About 5, the Wind veered about to the N. W. which immediately gave Motion to the Clouds, and discharged a most dreadful and destructive Volley of Hail. The Storm then proceeded in a S. E. Direction, at the Rate of about 12 Miles in an Hour, attended with a most dreadful Noise, something like the Sound of Cannons, Drums and Bells, mingled together. The Hail Stones were of various Dimensions, Shapes and Forms. Some

measured 9 Inches in Circumference, some 7, whilst others were no larger than Peas. As to their Forms, some were globular, some spheroidal, surrounded with small Excrescences or Knobs; some elliptical, and some irregular and imooth, like Pieces of broken Ice. Such as were globular, were endowed with so much Elasticity, that they rebounded from the Ground like a Tennis Ball. This Storm divided into several Branches or Veins (if I may use such Terms) all which kept the same Course, but bent their Fury most towards the Mountains, Hills and high Lands. At Susquehanna the Hail was as large as Pigeons Eggs. At Lancaster, about the Size of Peas. at Dunker-Town, and in the Valley, between the W. and Reading Hills, they were as large as Turkeys Eggs; in some other Places still larger; and at Reading no Hail appeared. The Damage done by this Storm is very great; the County of Lancaster alone, it is thought, has suffered several Thousand Pounds. In many Places there is not a single Ear of Wheat, Rye, Barley, &c. but what is cut off; and nothing left but the green Straw, bruised and beat to Pieces. It is melancholy to see fine Plantations, and extensive Fields, which, a few Days ago, waved with luxuriant Crops, now lying waste. Many able Farmers, who expected to carry several Hundred Bushels of Grain to Market, will be obliged to buy Bread for their Families; and many of the poorer kind will be ruined, and reduced to Beggary. All these People are now mowing their late promising and rich Crops, as Fodder for their Cattle. Their Distress is truly moving and alarming. At Dunker-Town, it is said (with what Truth I cannot say) that Cattle were killed by the Hail; but certain it is, that about Muddy-Creek, in this County, Calves, Pigs, Fowls, &c. were killed in that Settlement; the Ground in the Woods, is as thick covered with green Foliage, beaten from the Trees, as it is with the fallen Leaves in the Month of October; and in many Places the Birds are found dead in Woods and Orchards. The N. W. Side of the Fruit Trees are barked, and all the Glass Windows on that Side, that were not secured by Shutters, are demolished; and even the Rails of Fences visibly shew the Impressions of the Hail upon them. In short, this Storm threw every Person, who saw it, into the most dreadful Consternation; for the oldest Man here never saw, or heard of any Thing like it."

THE King, our most gracious Sovereign, having been informed, that a Circular Letter, a Copy of which hath been communicated to his Ministers, was, in February last, sent by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, of the Colony of Massachusetts, to the Speakers of other Houses of Assembly in North-America, hath been pleased to order it to be signified to me, that he considers such Measure to be of a most dangerous and factious Tendency, calculated to inflame the Minds of his good Subjects in the Colonies, to promote an unwarrantable Combination, to excite and encourage an open Opposition to, and Denial of the Authority of Parliament, and to subvert the true Principles of the Constitution; but, while I notify to you, his Majesty's Sentiments, with respect to this Matter, I am also to tell you, that the repeated Proofs which have been given by the Assembly of this Province, of their Reverence and Respect for the Laws, and of their faithful Attachment to the Constitution, leave little room for his Majesty to doubt of their shewing a proper Repentment of such unjustifiable Attempt to revive those Difficulties which have operated so fatally to the Prejudice of both the Colonies and the Mother-Country; and, I flatter myself, that in case such Letter has been addressed to the Speaker of your House, you will confirm the favourable Opinion his Majesty, at present, entertains of his Maryland Subjects, by taking no Notice of such Letter, which will be treating it with the Contempt it deserves.

IN Answer to your Excellency's Message of the 20th, we must observe, that if the Letter from the Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Colony of Massachusetts-Bay, addressed to, and communicated by our Speaker to this House, be the same with the Letter, a Copy of which you are pleased to intimate hath been communicated to the King's Ministers, it is very alarming to find, at a Time when the People of America think themselves aggrieved by the late Acts of Parliament, imposing Taxes on them, for the sole and express Purpose of raising a Revenue, and in the most dutiful Manner are seeking Redress from the Throne, any Endeavours to unite in laying before their Sovereign, what is apprehended to be their just Complaint, should be looked upon "as a Measure of most dangerous and factious Tendency, calculated to inflame the Minds of his Majesty's good Subjects in the Colonies, to promote an unwarrantable Combination, to excite and encourage an open Opposition to, and Denial of the Authority of Parliament, and to subvert the true Principles of the Constitution;" we cannot but view this as an Attempt in some of his Majesty's Ministers to suppress all Communication of Sentiments between the Colonies, and to prevent the united Supplications of America from reaching the royal Ear. We hope the Conduct of this House will ever evince their Reverence and Respect for the Laws, and faithful Attachment to the Constitution, but we cannot be brought to resent an Exertion of the most undoubted Constitutional Right of petitioning the Throne, or any Endeavours to procure and preserve an Union of

the Colonies, as an unjustifiable Attempt to revive those Difficulties which it is said have operated so fatally to the Prejudice of both the Colonies and the Mother-Country. We have the warmest and most affectionate Attachment to our most gracious Sovereign; and shall ever pay the readiest and most respectful Regard, to the just and constitutional Power of the British Parliament, but we shall not be intimidated by a few sounding Expressions, from doing what we think is right.

The House of Representatives of the Colony of Massachusetts-Bay, in their Letter to us, have intimated that they have preferred an humble, dutiful, and loyal Petition, to the King, and expressed their Confidence, that the united and dutiful Supplications of his distressed American Subjects, will meet with his royal and favourable Acceptance; and we think they have asserted their Rights with a decent Respect to their Sovereign, and a due Submission to the Authority of Parliament: What we shall do upon this Occasion, or whether, in consequence of that Letter, we shall do any Thing, it is not our present Business to communicate to your Excellency; but of this be pleased to be assured, that we cannot be prevailed on to take no Notice of, or to treat with the least Degree of Contempt, a Letter so expressive of Duty and Loyalty to the Sovereign, and so replete with just Principles of Liberty; and your Excellency may depend that whenever we apprehend the Rights of the People to be affected, we shall not fail boldly to assert, and steadily endeavour to maintain and support them, always remembering, what we could wish never to be forgot: That by the Bill of Rights, it is declared, "That it is the Right of the Subject to petition the King, and all Commitments and Prosecutions for such Petitioning, are illegal."

RESOLVED, That all Petitions, upon every new Assembly, relating to Elections and Returns, be presented to the Honourable Speaker of this House, for the Time being, within Five Days, from the First Day of the Session of such new Assembly, inclusive, and not after. And, if any Election shall be made, by Virtue of any Writ, issued by order of the Lower House of Assembly, That no Petition be received against such Election or Return, unless such Petition be presented to the Speaker, as aforesaid, within Five Days, from the First Day of the Session, inclusive, after such Writ shall be returned, or within the same Time, after the actual Return of such Writ, if the same shall be returned in Session Time.

RESOLVED, That Treating Electors is highly injurious, tends to corrupt and debauch the People, and may, if not timely prevented, be destructive of that Freedom, intended to be maintained in Elections, by our excellent Constitution.

It is therefore unanimously RESOLVED, That on any Petition for Treating, this House will not take it into Consideration, or regard the Greatness or Smallness of any Treat; but will, in all Cases, in which any Person or Persons, hereafter to be elected, to serve in Assembly, for any County, within this Province, at any Time after the Test, or issuing of the Writ of Election, or after the Place of any Member becomes vacant, hereafter, in the Time of this present, or of any other Assembly, shall, hereafter, by himself, or themselves, or by any other Ways, or Means, on his, or their Behalf, or at his, or their Charge, or with his, or their Privilege, or Consent, before his, or their Election, directly or indirectly, give, present, or allow, to any Person, having a Voice, or Vote in such Election, any Money, Meat, Drink, Entertainment, or Provision, or make any Present, Gift, Reward, or Entertainment, or any Promise, Agreement, Obligation, or Engagement, to give, or allow any Money, Meat, Drink, Provision, Present, Reward, or Entertainment whatsoever, in order to be elected, or for being elected, will declare the Election of such Person void.

Also RESOLVED, That, if any Person whatsoever, shall, hereafter, after the Test, or issuing of the Writ of Election, or after the Place of any Member becomes vacant, directly, or indirectly, on the Behalf of, or with the Privilege, or Consent of any Person, or Persons, hereafter to be elected to serve in Assembly, give, present, or allow to any Person, having a Voice, or Vote, any Money, Meat, Drink, Entertainment, or Provision, or shall make any Present, Gift, Reward, or Provision, or make any Promise, Agreement, Obligation, or Engagement, to give or allow any Money, Meat, Drink, Provision, Present, Reward, or Entertainment whatsoever, in order to procure the Election, or for the Election of any Person, or Persons, hereafter to be elected, to serve in Assembly; such Person shall be deemed guilty of Bribery, and this House will punish the same accordingly.

ORDERED, That the above Resolves be standing Rules in this House.
