Wednesday, October 13 "Nixon in Salisbury" Lecture

Dr. Dean Kotlowski, of the Salisbury University History Department, will discuss Senator Richard M. Nixon's visit to Salisbury in October 1952. Nixon was the Republican Party's nominee for vice president and the brief stop was part of a "southern swing" through Virginia and Maryland. Beginning at 7 p.m., Kotlowski's talk is free and open to the public.

The Nabb Research Center has gratefully received several priceless items from board member emeritus John E. Jacob Jr., a resident of Seaford, DE and long-time supporter of the Center. This past August, Mr. Jacob donated a watercolor of Long Hill located in Wicomico County, three historical maps pertaining to Delmarva and a collection of historical postcards from Frederick County. Over the years Mr. Jacob has also been fea-

tured in *The Daily Times* of Salisbury. One article, titled "History: Capturing Life on the Peninsula in Cards," highlighted Mr. Jacob's extensive collection of postcards, which offer glimpses of life in Salisbury and on the Delmarva Peninsula after the Civil War. Mr. Jacob is a retired attorney, but he has spent most of his life pursuing interests in history, special collections and genealogical research. 📖

Spotlight On Collections: The Louise Brittingham Taylor Collection

Mrs. Louise Brittingham Taylor taught for 40 years in Wicomico County. A native of Pittsville, she attended the Maryland State Normal School in Salisbury and after graduating in 1928, taught in a rural school from 1928-1931. Mrs. Taylor returned to what was then Salisbury State College in 1934 to get an advanced teaching certificate, went back to teaching in 1935, and completed her B.S. in 1943. She retired in 1972. Mrs. Taylor's archival material, located at the Nabb Research Center, traces her education and teaching career in Wicomico County and is a valuable education resource for researchers and historians. Included in the collection are letters from Mrs. Taylor's mother during her college years. 📖
