

Mid-semester warnings were mailed Tuesday, Oct. 12. Warnings indicating that a student currently is earning a D, F or FX will be issued for all 100- and 200-level classes and for Advanced Composition classes that meet the Basic Requirement in the GEP.

Warnings are no longer required in 300- and 400- level courses, so you

should ask the instructor if you are concerned about how you are performing in these courses. If you receive a warning, you should speak to the instructor immediately to see if you can change the situation. If not, you should withdraw from the course no later than Oct. 22, the last day to withdraw with a W (without a grade penalty).

#### In Case of Fire

Fire Door Facts: The Office of Human Resources would like to share information on a fire prevention item used as the first line of defense during a working fire: the fire door.

A typical fire door opens into a corridor and has automatic door closers. Once closed, a fire door will help prevent fire, smoke, heat and toxic gases in one area of a building from spreading to another for up to three hours.

But fire doors aren't magic. They must be in proper operating condition and have unobstructed space around them to be able to close in case of fires.

When a fire starts, you may have only seconds to evacuate. An unobstructed exit path is critical. Look around your area and the hallway that leads to the nearest exit. Make sure that fire door openings and the area surrounding them are clear.

Don't let anyone store equipment or furniture near them. Not even temporarily. Never prop open fire doors or allow doorstops to be used.

Double-whammy! When you see a fire extinguisher being used to prop open a fire door, not only is the fire door out of commission, but a fire extinguisher is not mounted properly and won't be where people will look for it when it's needed. Keep an eye out for small articles (a strip of lumber, a piece of plastic, a paper cup) that could get wedged unnoticed underneath a door and prevent it from closing properly. Report it at once if you notice a fire door isn't in good operating condition, such as if the self-closing mechanism has been dismantled or disconnected.
