# **FSU Foundation Gives Pinnacle Award to Leonard Schwab**

The FSU Foundation, Inc., has honored Leonard Schwab with the Pinnacle Award, its highest honor, in recognition of the decades of counsel and spirit he has offered to the Foundation. The award was granted at a banquet in his honor held at Bedford Springs Resort on Friday, March 20.

Schwab, only the fifth person to receive the Pinnacle Award, is a founding member of the Foundation and one of the longest-serving members of the Board of Directors and a longtime leader on the Executive Board. Now an emeriti member, he has helped guide the organization through many important transitions in the Foundation's mission and scope.

He and his wife Jane established the Leonard and Jane Schwab Theatre and Speech Scholarship for sophomore, junior or senior theatre majors in 1996, which has helped numerous students since then and supports the art form about which both Schwabs care so much.

"It is his service to Frostburg State University and its students, his leadership of the S. Schwab Company and his dedication to his community overall that has inspired the FSU Foundation to award him the Pinnacle Award," said B.J. Davisson II, vice president for University Advancement and executive director of the FSU Foundation.

"Your vision ensures that our institution can provide an exceptional education for our students and that the Foundation will continue to uphold its mission: to foster, encourage and promote the growth, progress and general welfare of Frostburg State University," said FSU President Jonathan Gibralter.

Leonard and Jane Schwab were presented with a book of letters of gratitude from past recipients of their scholarship.

Created in 1993, the Pinnacle Award recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions of time, talent or treasures in support of the educational mission of FSU through the Foundation. Categories of support may include board membership, financial contributions, service or other acts of leadership and service to the Foundation and FSU. Previous recipients are Ralph Race, Lillian Wellner, Al Boxley and Walter Hedrick.

# 'X-formation' to Be on View at FSU

"X-formation," an exhibition that culminates four years of work by FSU seniors Josh O'Rourke, Sara Otto, Trayshia Rogers and Amiyn Ross, will be on view through Wednesday, April 8, in the Stephanie Ann Roper Fine Arts Gallery.

O'Rourke's sculptural design emphasizes the rhythmic flow of static objects and the geometric simplicity of dynamic objects portraying the basics of life. # **FSU Presents Spring Concert With Boys Like Girls and Vedera**



Rock to the music of two up-andcoming national rock groups when FSU's CES Concerts and UPC present emo-pop group Boys Like Girls, with opening act indie-band Vedera Sunday, April 26, in the Cordts Center Main Arena. The spring concert kicks off at 8 p.m. with doors opening at 7

The Boston-area band includes Martin Johnson, lead singer and guitarist; John Keefe, drums; Bryan Donahue, bass; and Paul DiGiovanni, lead guitar. An early demo version of "The Great Escape" and acoustic spin on "Thunder" were the sparks that ignited a firestorm of attention to the band's MySpace and purevolume.com pages. By the end of 2005, the band was topping the purevolume.com New Artists chart and gathering thousands of MySpace friends.

Boys Like Girls embarked on its first nationwide tour in 2006. Following that tour, the group entered the recording studio to record the debut album, "Boys Like Girls." The album eventually went gold, and tracks like "Thunder" helped "Boys Like Girls" maintain a presence on the Billboard charts. They have been touring and recording ever since.

"I like to listen to music that makes me feel a certain way - either it reminds me of something important that happened or a certain time in my life," says Boys Like Girls frontman Martin Johnson. "If kids are feeling that way about our songs. I couldn't ask for more." Stylistically, the band lists its musical influences as a variety of contemporary pop rock groups like Jimmy Eat World, Blink-182, Story of the Year and Dashboard Confessional.

Opening for Boys Like Girls is the indie/art rock band, Vedera. Hailing from Kansas City, Mo., the band was formed in 2004 by singer and quitarist/pianist Kristen May and lead guitarist Brian Little, with drummer Drew Little and bassist Jason Douglas.
