C O R K, April 26.

**A**BOUT 30 of the Levellers have been examined before Godfrey Lill, and John Morrison, Esqrs. four of whom, who were committed on suspicion only, have been admitted to Bail; the rest were remanded to Prison.

Last Monday Night, at 10 o'Clock, a Party of Lord Drogheda's light Horse went out of Town on an Expedition; and Yesterday Evening they returned, and brought in with them, and lodged in Goal, James Brown and Daniel Sullivan, two Priests, whom they apprehended in Consequence of Information given against them.

We hear from Ardrian, by a Party of Dragoons, charged with being Levellers, and lodged in the Goal of that Town.

Thursday last one Stackpole, said to be a Captain among the Levellers, and two others of inferior Rank, were brought to Town from Kilworth, under a strong Guard, and lodged in the County Goal. Stackpole was taken some Days since at Kilworth, and having attempted to fire at the Officer who took him, received two Balls in the Thigh, which disabled him from travelling otherwise than on a Car.

May 3. Yesterday arrived at Cove, His Majesty's Ship Albemarle, Capt. Graham, from a Cruise, and brought in with her the N. S. de Pieda Alafiga Loocierina, a Spanish Privateer, which took about 20 Leagues South of Cape Clear, mounting 10 Carriage Guns, 16 Brass Swivels, and 75 Men; who, a few Days ago, had taken the Brayton, Jakays, of Whitehaven, from South-Carolina for Portsmouth, laden with Rice, which she also retook and brought into Cove.

Tuesday last, seven Men and Women, apprehended on Information of being concerned in the present Insurrection, were carried from the Neighbourhood of Ardrian, and lodged in Clonmell Goal.—One Doyle, of Ardrian, and one Sheehy, of Clogheen, two Popish Priests, guilty in the same traitorous Scheme, are fled from Justice.

D U B L I N, May 1.

Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman in Lifford, in the County of Antrim, dated April 18, 1762.

"We are much concerned to hear of your Disturbances in the South, and are not a little surprised here, that any People among you should be so unaccountably insatuated and deluded by France (reduced to the low Flk she is at present) or yet by Spain, a much more important and insatiable Nation, as to trust to their perfidious Arts, rashly to engage in an Attempt, which, in the End, must involve them in certain Ruin and Destruction: Have they forgot the memorable Year 1746, when France, to serve her own Purpose, by large Promises, first instigated the Highlanders to a Rebellion, and then, without giving, or intending to give them any real Assistance, left them in the Lurch, to suffer the just Punishment of their Folly and Madnest? Can the deluded Wretches of your Country expect any better Treatment from them at this Time? But if, from any vain Hopes of Assistance from the Enemy, they should still continue to disturb you, remind them, that when Thurst, two Years ago, landed at Carrickfergus, in less than three Days Five Thousand of the Protestant Militia of Down, Armagh, and Antrim, appeared in Arms, marched forward, and offered him Battle; and, by the remarkable Spirit and Resolution they showed, stopped his Progress and saved the Town of Belfast, and Country adjacent, from being plundered. And your Disturbances, Insurgents, Rebels, or whatever Title they bear, may be assured we have, in those three Counties, 20,000 Men of the same Spirit, as well disposed to chastise their Insolence at their Fathers at Derry and Inniskilling did formerly, whenever his Majesty shall think proper to command them upon that Service. It is with infinite Pleasure we are informed, that the same Spirit of Loyalty is descending amongst you; pardon the Expression, for, from the Representations we have had, the Inhabitants of Yourball alone have distinguished themselves upon the present Occasion, which laudable Example will, we hope, rouse greater Bodies to an Exertion of that Duty we all owe to our Country, and to our King. Let those Motives excite you to an Activity and Vigilance becoming the Sons of Freedom and Liberty, laying aside all Superstitions and Indifference: Power you cannot want, if it is not lost by Loss of Time; remember also that yours is the Cause of Virtue, opposed to Treason and Rapine.—I hope to hear from you the agreeable Account of an End to your Troubles, and am, &c."

May 3. Letters from Cork mention, that every Thing appeared there in the greatest Tranquillity; that the Price of all Sorts of Provisions were greatly fallen; and that the Proclamation made there for engaging the poor deluded People to return to their Duty, had been attended with very good Consequences, Numbers of them having returned to their respective Habitations.

Extract of a Letter from a Person of Note in Cork, May 4.

"We are pretty quiet here at present, and our Apprehensions are lessened with Regard to the Levellers. It was a serious Affair, and had not the Light Horse exerted themselves as they did, taken many, and terrified the rest, I don't know to what Pitch they might have carried their Scheme by this Day, which how turns out to have been deeply laid."

N E W F O U N D L A N D Intelligence.

Extract of a Letter from Halifax, July 1.

This Day arrived here his Majesty's Ship Syren, of 20 Guns, commanded by Capt. Douglas, in 8 Days from Newfoundland, who brought Advice, that a Fishing Schooner

arrived at Fish-Holt, in Newfoundland, before she failed, who gave Intelligence, that about the 19th of June the said Schooner was chased by six Ships, who fired one Shot at him, on which he brought to; that they then ordered him to come under their Stern, which he did; that a Fog coming on, he hoisted his Sails and escaped; and that he believed them to be five Spanish Men of War of the Line, and a Frigate; that they fired above 100 Shot at his Vessel, when he came to make Sail: On which he went to Fish-Holt, where he gave a Deposition, which was forwarded to the Captain of the Syren, who immediately proceeded to this Place, to give Information of it to Lord Colville."

Yesterday arrived here the Schooner Hope, Edmund Freeman, Master, in about 17 Days from Quebec: The Captain informs us, That on the 15th of July he saw 5 Sail of Ships off Cape Rosier, bound up to Quebec, supposed to be Merchantmen from England: That on the 9th of the same Month he spoke with a Brigantine belonging to this Place, William Cochran, Master, who informed him, they had been 5 Days from Newfoundland, and were bound for Halifax, being then about 12 Leagues S. E. from that Place; there were a considerable Number of People on board the Brig, who informed him, that two Sail of Line of Battle Ships, and three Frigates, both French and Spanish, had taken the Bay of Bulls, Ferriand, and St. John's, in Newfoundland: Capt. Freeman also spoke with a Schooner the Day before, who had likewise given him the same Account. The Wind blew very high when our Informant spoke with the Brig, and is not certain whether it was said they were 5 or 9 Days from Newfoundland.

July 19. On Monday the 5th of this Instant, about Two o'Clock in the Afternoon, a terrible and destructive Fire broke out in the Town of Scarborough, in the second Parish called Dunston, in the County of York, at the Eastern Parts of this Government. The Fire began about three Miles above the Meeting-house, N. W. the Wind being N. blew excessive hard; the Flames extended before the Wind with rapid Force about six Miles in Length, and about one Mile wide, which destroyed every Thing before it, and seemed like the last Conflagration. There were six Houses, seven Barns, and three Mills burnt. Several Persons of good Estates are almost ruined; the greatest Sufferers are Capt. John Fabyan, and his Brother Joseph Fabyan. They have lost at least 500 l. Sterling. Mr. Ebenezer Sevey's Farm is all laid waste. Daniel Merrick saved his Building, but lost all his Cattle and Sheep. Several Families are destitute of either House, or any Thing to support Nature; two Widows in particular. The least Computation in the whole Loss must be about 3000 l. Sterling. This Destruction was in the Space of two Hours, notwithstanding the speedy Assistance of Two Hundred People. Abundance of Corn, Grass, and several Orchards, are entirely destroyed by the same.

On Friday last arrived here the Schooner Dolphin, Capt. Silas Atkins, in 17 Days from Newfoundland, and hath made the following Declaration, viz. That he left the Harbour de Grace in Newfoundland, the 27th of last Month, and that before he failed from that Place, Advice came that there were about 3000 French Troops landed on the 24th at the Bay of Bulls, who marched in two Days to St. John's, and laid Siege to it, and that it was supposed it would be taken, but that a great Firing had been heard there that Day: The French Force in the Bay of Bulls consists of 3 Ships of about 70 Guns, one Frigate of 40, and a Bomb: That there were out at Sea, off the Bay of Bulls, 5 more Ships of the Enemy, some of which were of 70 Guns, but how many they could not say: That the French General had published a Manifesto, a Copy of which he had procured and compared with the Original: That many Boats came into the Harbour of Grace with Inhabitants, many of which he knew, and had brought about 50 with him: That he believes many had returned to their Habitations, in Consequence of the French General's Manifesto: That they seemed disposed to preserve the Place, and keep it: And that he could not learn they had done any Mischief upon the Banks.

The next Day arrived here Capt. Philips, in 19 Days from Trinity Bay, in Newfoundland, and informs, that a Shallop came in there, which had escaped from the Harbour of John's, and brought Advice, that that Place certainly surrendered to the French Troops, said to be about 1500, on Sunday the 27th Day of June, at Noon, having made little or no Opposition; firing, it was said, only one Gun, though a Piece of considerable Strength, having upwards of 60 Cannon mounted, but were poorly garrisoned.—That the Gramont Frigate, with a Number of the Fleet which lately arrived from England, were in the Harbour of St. John's, and must have fallen into the Hands of the Enemy, as none of the Vessels were suffered to leave that Place after that Advice came of the French being in the Bay of Bulls.—And that it was the general Opinion there, that it was the Enemy's Fleet from the West-Indies, as the Ships appeared to be very foul.

The same Day another Vessel arrived from Harbour Grace, and brought several Families, with their Effects. The following is an exact Copy of the MANIFESTO published by the French General.

**W**E Count De Hoston Ville, French General, do declare to all the Inhabitants of the Island of Newfoundland, That the French Grenadiers landed on the said Island, shall not do them any Harm, but shall protect them; if they do not take up Arms, if they give necessary Succours;

we bound them expressly as well of those Justices of the Peace and principal Planters, do not leave their Houses or Settlements, neither to defend themselves; if they do any Thing against the said Declaration, they shall be treated according to the Laws of War.

Saturday, June 26, 1762.

(Signed) Le Compte De Hoston Ville.

We hear that upon Advice being received at St. John's of the Enemy's Ships being at the Bay of Bulls, one or two Vessels were immediately dispatched from thence to England, with an Account of it.

On receiving these Advices, His Majesty's Council were immediately called together, and several Expresses dispatched; and two Vessels were hired by the Government, to proceed immediately to Admiral Pocock, in the West-Indies.

N E W - Y O R K, July 22.

Tuesday last an Express arrived here from Boston, with a Confirmation of the Advices mentioned under the Boston Head, in Relation to the Enemy's attacking some Places at Newfoundland: And 'tis further said, there are three Ships of the Line, and two Frigates, who immediately caused a Manifesto to be spread over the Country, informing the Inhabitants, that if they would come in, and swear Allegiance to the French King, they should remain unmolested, otherwise they should have their Places and Substance destroyed; but as the Accounts are in general imperfect, we can say little; but are assured, in Consequence of this News, the Halifax Packet, Capt. Bouderson, was ordered to sail directly for Falmouth, and she is already under Sail for that Purpose.

Monday last his Majesty's Ship Gosport, Captain Jervis, of 44 Guns, arrived at Sandy Hook, from England, last from Virginia, whither she had been as Convoy to the Virginia Fleet. She has brought over about 150,000 Pounds Sterling, said to be chiefly for the Army's Pay; which Money was the next Day landed in this City, and Yesterday the Gosport sailed again, said to be in Pursuance of some Orders she received since the Arrival of the above-mentioned Express, from Boston.

There is a Report that the General Wall Packet-Boat is taken and ranfomed in her homeward bound Passage.

We hear that about a Month ago, 14 Merchantmen, under Convoy of a Letter of Marque Ship of 20 Guns, sailed from Cape-François for Old-France.

July 26. When Capt. Jervis left England, which was the 6th of May, they were in daily Expectation of a Visit from their French Neighbours at Dunkirk; for which Purpose it was said, they had collected a vast Number of Flat-bottomed Boats, and about 30 or 40,000 Men; that Commodore Moore had proposed a Scheme for entering the Harbour of Dunkirk, and destroying every Ship and Vessel there; that 30 English Frigates, and 20 Ships of the Line, were daily cruising off that Place; that his Majesty had given Admiral Hawke a special Commission, whereby he was empowered to dispose of all the Ships in the different Harbours of England as he pleased; that Admiral Anson was dying at Bath; that the Duke of York had hoisted his Flag on board his Majesty's Ship the Blenheim, and that Lord Howe was to accompany the Duke (in case he went to Sea) in said Ship; that Advice was received in England that four French Men of War had got out of some Port of France, and were destined for America, and that 6 English Men of War were immediately sent in Pursuit of them; and that his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland had offered his Service, to command all the Troops in England. [We leave our Readers to judge whether the above-mentioned French Ships are not those that have taken Newfoundland.]

Thursday Evening last the Ship Jenny, Capt Jarrold, and Ship Befsey, Capt. Waite, arrived here from Cork, in 60 Days, loaded with 2700 Barrels of Pork, and 1000 Firkins of Butter, &c. for the Use of his Majesty's Troops on this Continent: They sailed from Cork the 23d of May, in Company with 19 other Ships, all loaded with Provisions for Quebec, under Convoy of his Majesty's Ship the Aldborough, of 20 Guns, Capt Graham, and the Tamar Sloop of War of 16; from the latter they parted 150 Leagues off the Coast of Ireland; and from the whole Fleet, with the Aldborough, the 13th of June, in Lat. 44, Lon. 33, 15, all well.

Friday Evening last the Sloop Henry, Robert Craig, Master, arrived here in 26 Days from Jamaica: The 10th Instant he came past the Havannah, at about two Leagues Distance, and the same Day spoke with a small Privateer called the Black River, Capt. Miller, who informed him, that the English Army had then been above three Weeks landed at the Havannah, and had kept a most incessant Fire most of that Time against the Moore Castle, in which he said they had made some Breaches, and that the Spaniards continued to make a very gallant Defence.—Next Day Capt. Craig fell in with Capt. Stewart, in another Privateer, who confirmed the Account given by Capt. Miller.

The 7th of July Capt. Craig met with the Jamaica Fleet, consisting of 100 Sail, bound for England, under Convoy of Sir James Douglas, and left them steering N. N. E.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, July 29.

By Captain Philippon, in the Ship Royal Ann, from Guadaloupe, we are informed, that the Enemy's Privateers are very thick about that Island and Martinico: That Captain L'Estach, in a French Privateer, had cut out of the Harbour of Petit Plain the Sloop Resolution, Capt. Patterson, bound to this Port: That the People on board the Privateer said, they had taken two Brigs belonging to Philadelphia: And



that said L'Estach had also taken, about that Island, near Twenty Sail of Vessels, large and small; one of which the Government Sloop, with Soldiers, going to shift the Garrison.

Captain Philipson was chased off the Capes of Virginia by a Sloop, which he took to be a Privateer; and spoke a Vessel from Virginia, by which he learnt, that there were a Privateer Sloop, and Schooner on the Coast, which had taken a Snow from Virginia, and ransomed her.

On Saturday last one of our Pilot Boats came up, with the disagreeable News of a Privateer being on the Coast. And on Thursday Morning, as Captain Magnus Miller, in the Brig Lovely Lass, bound to Barbados, went out of the Capes, he was attacked by a Sloop, who gave him her Broad-side; upon which he immediately hauled his Wind, and fired his Stern Chace Guns, the Privateer pursuing, and firing her Bow Chace, and continued in that Manner as long as they could be seen; but as it was thought the Lovely Lass gained on the Privateer, we are in Hopes she has got clear.

Captain File, in a Brig belonging to Poole, is arrived here. She was bound to London from Antigua, and sailed the 6th of June from St. Christophers with the Fleet, but was soon after taken by a Spanish Privateer, and retaken by Captain Scull, in a St. Christophers Privateer, and the Diana, of Rhode-Island.

Captain Tillage for Jamaica, and Captain Sutherland for Barbados, both from Virginia, are taken.

Yesterday arrived here Captain Simonton from Jamaica, but last from the Havannah, in thirteen Days, by whom we are informed, That our Army had been then landed about a Month; did not lose one Man in Landing; had been a little sickly, owing to the wet Weather they had when they went ashore; but that they were well recovered, and in high Spirits: That they took two of the Enemy's Batteries, before they began to play upon the Moore Castle, which they did with three Batteries, and on the 15th Inst. opened a Fourth, of Eight Guns, within 100 Yards of the Castle; from all which they fired incessantly, Night and Day, by which several Breaches were made, and it was almost tore to Pieces: That the Spaniards had made a Sally, and were repulsed with Loss: That the General had some Thoughts of Storming the Place, but set that Design aside, on learning that the Enemy had laid some Mines, in order to blow up our People: That the Pipes, which conveyed the Water into the Moore Castle, had been effectually destroyed by our Men, which greatly distressed the Enemy; but that, in Return, they had found Means to poison the Water with which the English Army was supplied; so that they were obliged to go four or five Miles from the Havannah for it: That three of our Ships of the Line, the Cambridge, of Eighty, and two others, of Seventy Guns each, were ordered to batter the Moore Castle, which they did for five Hours, damaged it greatly, and dismounted a Number of its Guns; but the Capt. of the Cambridge, and 100 of her Men being killed, and about 50 of the other two Ships Companies, the Admiral ordered them off: That the English employed a Number of their best Marksmen, in order to pick off the Enemy, as they came out to load their Guns, by which they killed a great many, and had themselves received but very little Loss: That the Moore Castle was so surrounded by the English, that its Communication with the Town was quite cut off, and no Person could go in or out of it: That our Fleet had taken a Spanish Frigate; and also a Ship from Cadiz, loaded with Warlike Stores of all Sorts: That the Fleet from New-York was not arrived, but looked for every Hour: And that the Jamaica Fleet, under Commodore Douglas's Convoy, was at the Havannah, and ordered, by Admiral Pocock, to remain there for eight Days.—Captain Simonton was, on board the Cignet Frigate of War for some Hours, where he received this Intelligence; and was further told, that the Moore Castle was in such a shattered Condition, that it could not hold out above four or five Days after he left the Havannah.

#### ANNAPOLIS, August 5.

On the 26th of last Month, about eight Miles from Frederick-Town, in Frederick County, Mr. George Jacob Poe, was shot at his own House, by a Dutch Servant Man of his, with 2 Bullets and 5 Swan Shot, thro' the Body just below his Navel, of which he instantly Died, and has left a Widow and several Children to lament him. The Villain who shot him, is confin'd in Irons in Frederick County Goal, where his Wife is likewise

confin'd, as she has confess'd she had often heard him say he intended to Kill his Master, but never mentioned it to prevent the melancholly Catastrophe. Just before he committed the Murder, he took the Gun and run after his Wife, as if going to shoot her, but on Mr. Poe's speaking to him, he turn'd about and shot him as above. He appears to be a harden'd most abandon'd Wretch, and only says that he was Drunk at the Time.

Saturday the 24th ult. a Barn belonging to Mr. Richard Waters at Seneca in Frederick County, was Fired by Lightning, and burnt down, with a Quantity of Grain and Tobacco, to the Value of 150 Pounds.

Sunday last Afternoon, some impudent Thief, enter'd a House in this Town, when no Body belonging to it happen'd to be within, and broke open a Desk, wherein it is suppos'd was a large Sum of Money; but the Sum cannot be ascertain'd as yet, the Gentleman who own'd it being gone to St. Mary's County. They left in the Desk near Twenty Pounds Maryland Currency, and one single Piece of Silver in a large Bag.

On Tuesday the 27th ult. the Schooner Peggy, William Grymes Master, from Hampton for Great Choptank, was taken off the Spit of York River, by a French Privateer of 8 Carriage and 12 Swivel Guns, and 75 Men. She was called La Marlene, Don Pedro Ordoguer Commander. The Schooner was loaded with Dry Goods, to the Value of 6000 l. Sterling, from on board the Ship Argyle, Captain Alexander Murray, just arrived from Glasgow. A few Days before she met with the above Schooner, she took a Sloop from Wilmington, John Beard Master, off the Capes of Delaware; after taking out some Rum, &c. they skuttled her, and she drove ashore on Chincoteague Island. There were Passengers on board the Schooner, Mr. John Glasfell, formerly of Talbot County, and Two young Gentlemen, who all came Passengers in the above Ship; and after carrying them about 4 or 5 Leagues to the Eastward of the Capes, the Privateer gave Capt. Beard a Two Mast Boat, which they had pick'd up in Rapahannock, with Two Negroes on board, in which the above Passengers got on Shore, near Sanpaucent. The Privateer was very short of Provisions, so that, after plundering the Passengers of every Thing, they gave them only 5 Gallons of Water to 6 Men for Subsistence, until they should get on Shore. During the 48 Hours these Passengers were on board, the Privateer's Crew made a Descent on Cape Charles; but they met with so warm a Reception, that they were obliged to make the best of their Way on board, without getting any Plunder. They had an English Pilot on board, well acquainted with all the Rivers and Creeks in Chesapeake Bay, and their Intentions were to plunder Col. Air's House, of which they were well inform'd, had they not met with the above valuable Schooner. There were but Five Frenchmen on board, the rest Spaniards, &c. with a French Commission. The Captain behaved like a Gentleman; the Crew were Scoundrels. The Passengers arrived at Oxford last Tuesday Night.

# M A R R L A N D G A Z E T T E,

*Containing the latest Advices foreign and domestic.*

THURSDAY, August 12, 1762.

By the Duke of Cumberland Packet-Boat, Capt. Goodridge, arrived at New-York, in six Weeks from Falmouth, we have the following Advices, viz.

M A D R I D, May 11.

**T**HE last Advices from Ferrol import, that the Squadron equipped there set sail the beginning of this Month, but they do not mention its Destination. Some Ships of the Carthagenia Squadron have also weighed Anchor, but they only cruise in Sight of that Port. Perhaps both Squadrons have Orders to wait for an Opportunity to slip away safely to Cadix. We hear that Admiral Saunders is gone to cruise before Lisbon with 15 Sail of the Line, and 7 Frigates.

The small Squadron of M. de Ternay (the Department not mentioned) has had the most favourable Wind for three Days, when on the Evening of the third Day an Officer arrived with only three Domesticks, and on going on board of one of the Ships, the Squadron sailed directly. M. de Courval is gone in this Squadron as a Volunteer; he is an excellent Pilot, and perfectly well acquainted with the Possessions which the English have on the Side of Newfoundland, and particularly Placentia.

Brill, May 2. Pursuant to Orders sent from the Court, they have begun arming here three Ships of War, viz. the Palmier, the Minotaur, and the Altier, of 74 Guns each. On board the first will be embarked some Companies of Foot. The Day before Yesterday three Flutes set sail for Bourdeaux, in order to take in Provisions there, to be transported to St. Domingo, for the use of the Marquis de Blenac's Squadron. That which has been lately equipped here, consisting of two Vessels of the Line, and two Frigates, is destined likewise, as they say, for the same Island.

Paris, May 21. The little Squadron from Brest is sailed as an Escort to a large Supply of Provisions that it has been found necessary to send to the Marquis de Blenac's Squadron at St. Domingo; upon the safe Arrival of which, not only his Success, but his very Subsistence must depend. The Squadron at Toulon, under M. Bompard, is equipping with all possible Diligence, and indeed it is high Time, for the two little Spanish Squadrons, from Ferrol and Carthagenia, came out and shewed themselves; but, after cruising for a Day or Two in Sight of those Ports, judged it most expedient, for fear of Accidents, to return.

From the LONDON GAZETTE.

Petersburgh, May 8. On Wednesday last the Treaty of Peace between the Emperor of Russia and his Prussian Majesty was signed by the Chancellor and Baron Goltz, Plenipotentiaries named by the two Courts for that Purpose.

Hague, June 1. The Marquis of Granby arrived here this Afternoon, in his way to the Army.

Brillau, May 19. The King of Prussia continues at Bettlern, and his Army remains in their Quarters of Cantonment. Part of the Austrian Army are said to be encamped, with their Right at Kaltenbrunn, and their left at Hohen Pörsitz; by which Position they cover Schweidnitz.

Hague, June 4. By the last Letters from Madrid, which were of the 17th of May, the loss of Miranda, by the Accident of a Powder Magazine taking Fire, is confirmed. The Garrison consisted of 350 Men, regular Troops, with some few Militia. The Count de Cifuentes, Lieutenant Col. of Horse, carried the News to the King of Spain, and was rewarded with the Rank of Colonel. After the Spanish Gen. had got Possession of Miranda, he sent a Detachment of 4000 Men to invest Braganza, which was done the 10th of last Month; but there is no News yet of the Surrender of that Place.

Hamburg, May 25. We have received Advice, that since the considerable Advantage which Prince Henry of Prussia obtained on the 12th Inst. over an advanced Post of the Austrian Army near Dobeln in Saxony, the Austrians have abandoned Dippoldswalda: That the Army of the Empire has separated from the Austrians, and is retreated into Bohemia; but that the Prussian General Seidlitz was in Pursuit of the Enemy.

The Treaty of Peace, between their Prussian and Swedish Majesties, was signed here the 22d Inst. by Mr. de Hecht, Minister Plenipotentiary on the Part of the King of Prussia, and by M. de Olthoff, on that of the King of Sweden.

Hague, May 28. Accounts are just arrived, that Prince Henry has had further Advantages in Saxony. He sent Gen. Seidlitz to attack the Austrians at Dippoldswalda and Maxen; and General Hülßen to Kesseldorp, and the Plunfche Grond: They were both successful, and drove the Austrians on all Sides, who have lost above 4000 more Prisoners. A Battalion, and two Regiments of Austrian Horse were taken at Dippoldswalda by Gen. Seidlitz, besides 2500 Horses, 365 Waggon, and several Pieces of Cannon, Standards, and other Trophies. The Austrians encamp near Pirna; and the Prussian Hussars make Excursions to the Frontiers of Bohemia, and the Gates of Dresden.

Brandenburg, June 2. It is assured that, besides the Peace with Russia and Sweden, the King of Prussia has just settled his Differences with the Duke of Mecklenburgh-Schwerin, in Consequence of which that Prince will soon return to his Capital.

L O N D O N,

June 1. The Earl of Halifax is to be appointed principal Secretary of State, in the Room of Bute.

June 3. The Right Hon. the Earl of Bute is to be appointed First Lord of the Treasury, in the Room of his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, who has resigned, on Account of his great Age.

Letters from Paris say, that the little Squadron which has lately slipped out of Brest, is going to join that which sailed from thence in January last, and which is said to be at St. Domingo.

Yesterday the King, after giving the Royal Assent to 67 public and private Bills, was graciously pleased to express himself to the two Houses of Parliament in the following Terms:

MY LORDS, and GENTLEMEN,

**T**HE public Business, for which you were assembled, being now happily concluded, the advanced Season of the Year calls upon me to put an End to this Session of Parliament; which I cannot do, without expressing the highest Approbation of the Zeal, Unanimity, and Dispatch, which have so signally appeared in the Course of your Proceedings.

At the Opening of this Session I informed you, that it had been my earnest Wish to restore the Blessings of Peace to my People; but that it was my first Resolution, with your Concurrence and Support, to carry on the War in the most effectual Manner, till that desirable Object could be obtained upon equitable and honourable Conditions. My Sentiments in both these Respects continue invariably the same, and I have the Satisfaction to find them confirmed by the unanimous Voice of my Parliament.

The Declaration, which Motives of Humanity have engaged the Emperor of Russia to make to all the Courts in that Alliance, and the great and happy Change in the Situation of my Ally, the King of Prussia, give us just Reason to hope, that the other belligerent Powers may be induced to entertain the same pacific Dispositions. On the other Hand, our Rupture with Spain, notwithstanding my utmost Endeavours to prevent it, and the violent and unprovoked Attack with which the Dominions of my ancient Ally, the King of Portugal, are threatened, sufficiently evince the Wisdom and Necessity of that Firmness and Resolution in my Parliament, which have enabled me to continue our military Operations without the least Interruption or Delay; and considerably to augment my Fleets and Armies in those Parts, in which our Enemies can be most sensibly distressed. The signal Success of my Arms, in the Conquest of Martinico, and the Acquisition of many other valuable Settlements in the West-Indies, have, under the Blessing of God, been the happy Consequences of these Measures. I trust in the Divine Providence, that they will be attended with still farther Advantages, until the Powers at War with us shall be disposed to such Terms of Accommodation, as the Dignity and just Rights of my Crown, the future Security and commercial Interests of my Subjects, will permit me to accept.

GENTLEMEN OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS,

When I consider the ample Supplies which you have granted, I cannot but lament the heavy Burdens, which the Necessities of the public Service have obliged you to impose upon my People. From this Consideration, I have endeavoured, in every Instance, to restrain my Demands within as narrow Bounds, as the Difficulties, in which I found myself involved, would allow. From the same Motive, my utmost Care shall be employed to exert the most exact Oeconomy, consistent with the Safety of my Kingdoms, and the good Faith and Honour of my Crown.

I return you my particular Thanks, for the Proof which you have given of your Regard to me and to my Family, in the ample Provision you have made for the Queen; whose Virtues, and Affection to this Country, will, I am confident, be found to deserve it.

MY LORDS and GENTLEMEN,

I have the fullest Persuasion that you will continue to diffuse in your several Counties that Spirit of Concord, which you have yourselves so steadily exerted in Parliament: And you may be assured that I will, on my Part, return your Zeal and Affection for my Person and Government, by a constant Attention to whatever may contribute to the Ease of my Subjects; and that it is my ardent Wish, to found the Glories of my Reign on the Union of my People, and on the Welfare and Prosperity of these my Kingdoms.

June 5. A Letter from on board the Leofosse Man of War, Capt. Stirling, dated off Graveling, May 31, says, 'Since my last we have destroyed two large Row Gallies or Prames off Dunkirk; several of the Crew of the Gallies were killed and wounded.'

We learn by Letters from Paris, that the Spaniards have at Length entered the Portuguese Territories, and taken two small Forts, in both which they made about 300 Prisoners, with very little Loss on their Side.

There is Advice that all the Portuguese Vessels in the Ports of Spain are kept.

On Sunday Morning last, about Nine o'Clock, died at Moor Park in Hertfordshire, the Right Hon. Lord Anson, of Soberton, First Lord of the Admiralty, Admiral and Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Fleet, one of his Majesty's most Hon. Privy Council, an Elder Brother of the Trinity House, a Governor of the Charter House, and Fellow of the Royal Society. His Lordship, after walking a little in the Garden for the Air, came into the House, complained of being ill, and lying down on his Bed, expired without a Groan.

June 7. On the 20th past Count Schwerin, Adjutant

to the King of Prussia, arrived at Breslau, preceded by several Postillions, with the Treaty of Peace concluded and signed at Petersburgh on the 5th of May N.S. On the 11th his Prussian Majesty gave a grand Entertainment at his Head Quarters at Betterien, to all the General Officers of his Army; at which the Health of the Emperor of Russia was drank, under several Discharges of Artillery. On the 24th, the Peace was proclaimed at Berlin, amidst the cordial Acclamations of a vast Concourse of People. All that was published on this Occasion of the Concerns of the Treaty was, that Prussia and Pomerania are restored to the King.

A Letter from on board his Majesty's Ship Chichester, dated May 11, 1762, says, 'We are now cruising at the Back of Gibraltar Hill. Our Fleet consists of 17 Sail of the Line, under Sir Charles Saunders, and Sir Piercy Brett, all fine Ships, well manned, in good Health, and in high Spirits.'

June 9. It is said that by the Treaty between Russia and Prussia, the Emperor of Russia guarantees to the King of Prussia, all the Dominions he was possessed of before the Commencement of the present War.

We hear from Berlin of the 21st inst, that a Body of Russian Troops, consisting of 15 Battalions, 4 Regiments of Cavalry, and 5000 Cossacks, were to join the Prussians forthwith; but from Vienna they write, that they are no Way apprehensive of such an Event.

We have no Accounts as yet of any Motions of Consequence, neither in the Allied, or French Armies.

His Britannic Majesty's Troops in Portugal will shortly be augmented with 6000 Foot, and about 750 Horses, for the Reception of which Transports are preparing.

June 10. The Canadians are universally persuaded that there is a North-West Passage, and that of no great length, behind their Country, into the South Sea; and positively assert, that the Indians affirm the same Thing. As we are now in Possession of this Country, and of those that lie to the North of it, sure the Discovery of that Passage may, if it is really intended, be accomplished at a very moderate Expence.

A Paragraph in a Letter from Calcutta, in Bengal, dated Dec. 16, 1761, says, 'We met with a severe Shock last August. There were 460 Men sent from Madras, on board a large Country ship, bound to this Place, most of them belonging to Col. Coote's Regiment. The Ship foundered four Days after, and only 27 People were saved, out of the Ship's Company and Soldiers.'

The Transports which carry the new-raised Regiments to Belleisle, are to take the Troops now in that Island to Portugal.

Private Letters from Berlin of the 29th ult. advise, that by a Letter from Freyberg they were assured, that the Prussians left in the Disfiles and Passes near Chemnitz in the Month of the 21st, seven Pieces of Cannon, and between four and five Hundred Men; but that the Austrians had not taken Chemnitz.

The successful Attacks, made by Prince Henry with such Vigilance and Dexterity upon the Post of Dobeln and Freyberg are of greater Consequence than has been imagined, and are likely to be followed by substantial Effects, as by that Means the Communication of the Austrian Army with Dresden is, or must soon be, entirely cut off.

Tuesday an Express arrived from Ireland, which was immediately carried to Lord Halifax, and it is said, a great Part of the Army are encamped in different Parts of the Kingdom.

The Report of a Spanish Register Ship's being taken, as mentioned in some of the Papers, is without Foundation.

The Pallas Frigate in her Passage from Gibraltar to Villa Franca, off Carthagenia, fell in with 8 Sail of Spanish Men of War of the Line, who immediately gave Chase to her, but though the Pallas, when first discovered, was within Gun-shot, she soon run them out of sight. The above Ships are since arrived at Toulon. The Pallas left Admiral Saunders, and the Ships under his Command, all well at Gibraltar.

The Venus Frigate has brought into Plymouth the N. S. de Begona of Bilbao, a fine privateer, of 16 Guns, and 195 Men.

The Salamander Fireship is arrived from Gibraltar, with some Dispatches from the Governor, upon which it was reported that the Spaniards were in March against that Fortrefs, but it gained no credit; as it is known that the Place is made almost impregnable, and they were never understood to be a people who could take a place by Assault.

June 11. On the Entrance of the Spanish Troops into Portugal, M. de Sarris published a Manifesto, announcing to the Portuguese, 'That his Orders were to release them from the Yoke of Great-Britain; that all his Actions, if they did not oppose his Designs, would be favourable to them; but that in Case of Resistance, he would employ against them the Forces which were only destined against the English.'

Immediately after Publication of this Manifesto, M. de Flobert, Quarter-master-general, was sent to Miranda, with a Letter for the Governor of the place, demanding to know how he intended to receive the Troops which would soon appear at his Gates. The Governor went to meet the Officer, accompanied by the principal People of his Garrison, received him very politely, and took him into the City and regaled him: But his Answer to the Demand in the Letter was, 'That he had no Instructions from his Court whereby he could dispense with doing the Duty he was obliged to do by his Oath; that he would defend the place to the



"last Drop of his Blood." The next Day the Accident happened of the Powder Magazine taking Fire, to which the sudden loss of the Place was owing.

June 12. They write from Petersburg, of the 17th ult. that a Courier had been dispatched a few Days before to Breslau, and it was confidently asserted, carried a Declaration to the following Purport: "That in Case his Prussian Majesty's Enemies refused any longer to listen to reasonable Terms of Accommodation, the Emperor of Russia would immediately order a Body of 25 or 30,000 of his best Troops to act in Conjunction with the Prussian Army." The like Declaration, it was said, had been sent to Vienna.

They write from Hanover, of the 4th of June, that, in Consequence of Orders received from London, they began on Whitunday to put up Prayers in all the Churches for the Queen's safe Deliverance.

By a Man of War from Lisbon there is an Account that the Transports with Troops from Cork, arrived there in four Days and a half.

His Majesty's Ship Active has taken and carried into Gibraltar, a French Privateer of 22 Guns, and 240 Men.

Private Letters from France by the last Mail inform us, that the Camp near Dunkirk, will consist of 45,000 Men; these Advices add, that with such a Force in Flanders, it is not probable that the Court of Vienna will detach themselves from their Alliance with France.

Last Monday the King George Privateer, Capt. Read, Commander, belonging to Bristol, arrived at Falmouth, and carried in with her Le Grand, a French Privateer belonging to Rochelle, mounting 16 Guns, and carries 127 Men, which she took in Lat. 46, Long. 6, from London.

Letters from Madrid say, the Carthagea Squadron sailed the 29th of April, and the Ferrol Squadron the first of May: It is thought, say they, that the first will wait for the Toulon Squadron off Minorca, and the other will endeavour to join the Men of War lately armed at Brest, and then go together to set free the Rochefort Squadrons, which the English block up in the Charante.

According to some Letters from France, by way of Amsterdam, the Carthagea Squadron has taken two English Frigates that were returning from the Levant, richly laden.

On Tuesday the 16th ult. was married at Guifbrough in Yorkshire, by the Rev. Mr. Hyde, Robert Lawrence, aged 90, to his Fourth Wife, Jane Edderfon of the same Place, aged 100. The Morning was ushered in with Bells ringing, Drums beating, Trumpets sounding, French Horns playing, and Colours flying. A Company of Yorkshire Militia attended this Couple to Church, and after the Ceremony was over, a Feu de Joye was fired to upwards of 1000 Spectators, who likewise accompanied this Couple in their Return Home, while a Discharge of Brass Cannon was fired as they passed. Two Men ran twice for Ribbons, (according to the ancient Custom of the Place) and were so nearly matched, that no Person could declare the Winner. At Night a Posset was introduced, in a Vessel provided on Purpose, holding 100 Gallons, answerable to the Age of the Bride. A general Invitation was given to the young People of both Sexes, who provided for themselves Spoons to empty this large Vessel; and the Stocking was thrown when the Couple were in Bed. [Where we leave them to take their quiet Repose.]

BOSTON, July 22.

Captain William Lillie, of the Sloop Contract, left Harbour Grace on the 29th of June; that before that Time they had received certain Advice, that the French Forces landed at the Bay of Bulls amounted, as it was said, to 3000; that they marched across the Land to St. John's; that the Forces at St. John's went out to meet them, but on seeing the great Inequality, returned to the Garrison: That upon Sunday the 27th, about 2 o'Clock P. M. French Colours appeared to be hoisted at the Garrison, and that they fired a Shot at the South Battery to make them haul down their English Colours: That the Fleet which came into the Bay of Bulls consisted of a 74 Gun Ship, a 64, and a 40, and a Bomb: That he spoke with one Emanuel Lawrence, Master of a Brig, in Lat. 47, who told him that there were 4 more French Men of War at Placentia, having taken it: That there were not 40 Families in the Southern Parts of Newfoundland, but what were got off: That the Man of War at St. John's, of 20 Guns, before the Garrison surrendered, flung his Guns overboard, and run his Ship ashore: That it was reported, and generally believed, that this Fleet was the same that sailed from Brest for Martinico, and that they had

Orders, in case they failed there, to infest the Coast of North-America: That, in general, they had behaved very well to the Inhabitants, and professed to pay them for what they took: That they said they came for the Ransom Money of St. John's, when it was taken in Queen Anne's War, which had never been paid: That they had not done, as he could hear, any Damage on the Banks of Newfoundland.

Captain Evan Potts, Master of the Brig Beckford, arrived here on Monday last, faith, That he sailed from Waterford, in Ireland, with about 20 Sail of Vessels, most of which bound to Newfoundland, under Convoy of the Gramont Frigate; on the 26th of June he arrived off St. John's: That the French took Possession of St. John's on the 27th, at 11 o'Clock, without Resistance, where they took the Gramont Frigate, which had arrived there the 25th with the Cork Trade, consisting of about 15 Sail of Vessels: That seeing the People run away, they told them they need not go away, for they should have the same Usage that the French had from the English in the West-Indies. They had done no Damage, except driving a Ship or two ashore. That it was generally agreed, that their whole Force consisted of 9 Sail, 4 of which were in the Bay of Bulls: That the Land Forces were estimated at 2000.

Yesterday arrived here a Schooner from St. John's, in Newfoundland: The Master of her informs, that he left that Place on the 27th of June, in the Morning, in Company with a Brig, who were permitted to sail with the Women and Children of the principal Families of that Place, when it was invested with the French Troops, which he heard consisted of 4000, that marched from Bay of Bulls by Land:—The Brig was bound to Halifax: In the Schooner came the Family of—Thomas, Esq; Mr. Thomas, and the other Gentlemen of the Place, were detained to assist the Garrison.—A few Hours after the Schooner came out she was becalmed, and the Master says he saw the French Flag hoisted on the Walls of St. John's, and a Shallop passed by him in the Afternoon, which told him that it was surrendered to the French. The whole Number of Vessels in that Harbour, consisted of between 20 and 30 Sail, including the Gramont Frigate, with Part of the Cork Fleet.—None of the French Men of War were there, being all at Bay of Bulls, which he heard were 7, and a Bomb Ketch.

The following is the Copy of a Manifesto sent to the Inhabitants of St. John's, the Morning the above Schooner sailed from thence.

WE Comte De Horion Ville, General, commanding all the French Army, composed of Grenadiers and Pickets of the Regiments of Marine, Mont. Revel, Beauvois, Penhievre, Royal Artillery, Gunners, and Royal Marines, summon and give Notice to all the Inhabitants of the Island of Newfoundland not to go out of the Town, neither to go into the Woods, nor to Sea, under the Penalty that is inflicted by the Laws of War.

We promise and assure all the Inhabitants, that if they surrender themselves with their Arms, we will use them as Frenchmen, and we shall not do them the least Molestation, but, to the contrary, we will protect them. Given at the Camp before St. John's, on Sunday, the 27th of June, 1762.

N E W - Y O R K, August 2.

Extract of a Letter from Halifax, dated 15th July.

"The Martial Law has been published here; a Company of Militia mounts Guard every Day; and an Embargo is laid on all Shipping for about 10 Days.—We are putting the Town in the best Posture of Defence possible, and should the French pay us a Visit, we shall be in a Condition to give them a very warm and suitable Reception.—We are all in good Spirits, and you need not give yourselves any unnecessary Trouble and Concern about us.—Our Harbour is now filled with Topfail Vessels and Schooners from Newfoundland, but no Advice is received from Authority of the Particulars of St. John's being taken, but in general it is said, that the Inhabitants had 8 or 9 Days allowed them to dispose of their Effects to the best Advantage they could.—The French Commander had weighed the Gramont Frigate, and fitted her for the Sea."

P H I L A D E L P H I A, August 5.

By two of the Jamaica Fleet arrived here, but last from the Havanna, in fourteen Days Passage, we have the following Advices, viz. That the above mentioned Fleet was detained there for Eight Days, in which Time about 3000 Bags of Cotton were taken out of the different Vessels for the Use of the Army: That we had two large and strong Camps at that Place; one to the Eastward, the other to the Westward of the Havanna: That our

Batteries were but about 50 or 60 Yards Distance from the Moore Castle, and played so incessantly upon it, that its Walls were beat level with the Rock; and that the Spaniards had not fired above three or four Cannon from it for 48 Hours: That the Enemy had got all their Sailors and Ships Guns into the Castle, and were supplied daily with 1600 fresh Men from the Town; where, it was said, there were some Thousands continually under Arms: That to the Westward of the Town a Battery was erected of Four 32 Pounders, and two Mortars, in order to play upon a Castle called EL FUERTE, or THE FORT, on the West Side of the Harbour; and to drive, from her Station, a Frigate, that had killed a Number of our Soldiers, as they passed to relieve the different Posts; this Battery began playing two Days before these Vessels sailed: That the above Battery likewise commanded the Town, but they had not fired at it, their Orders, it was thought, being to the contrary: That it was reckoned there were about 1000 English Sailors ashore, who were of great Use in serving the Batteries, hawling Cannon, &c. That the Enemy had sunk 5 of their Ships of War in the Harbour, and it was believed there were four others still remaining there: That the Waters had not been poisoned, as we were informed: That on our Army's first landing, and erecting a Battery, the Spaniards made a Sally, and took that Battery; but before they had spiked any of the Cannon, it was retaken, with the Loss of 200 of the Enemy; since which they had not fallen again: That Deserters reported, the Spaniards lost about 200 Men every Day in the Moore Castle: That it was said our Loss was but small; and that the Army was in high Spirits; had been pretty well supplied with Live-cattle, and had Greens in great Plenty, which must contribute greatly to keep the Men healthy: That two Days before our Fleet arrived, two Dutch Ships had got in, laden with Warlike Stores of all Sorts: That two Spanish Frigates had been sunk in a Harbour, a few Leagues to Leeward of the Havanna, which the English were weighing: That our Troops took two Waggons loaded with Money, going from the Town to the Mountains, where all the Nuns, Priests, and usefess People, had retired: And that the Troops from New-York were not arrived.—In short, it was hoped, that in a few Days we would be in Possession of the Moore Castle, but that it must be taken by Storm, as it was imagined the Enemy would not listen to any Terms of Capitulation that might be offered them; and which, it was supposed, might be put in Execution about the 22d or 23d ult. when six 74 Gun Ships, we are told, had Orders to be ready to go into the Harbour, if our People succeeded in the Storm.—We are likewise informed, that the Firing of the English upon the Castle was so excessive, that what Negroes or Malattoes were in it, were obliged to be chained to the Guns to keep them to their Duty; and that at one particular Time, 18 Bombs were thrown into it, in the Space of four or five Minutes.—And all Accounts agree, that the Siege was carried on with the greatest Resolution and Bravery; and that the Place was defended with equal Firmness and Courage.

On Monday last arrived a Brig from Newfoundland, by which there is a Confirmation of the taking of that Place.

A N N A P O L I S, August 12.

We have a Report, that a Ship is arrived in Virginia, which left the Havanna all in Flames; but we cannot give it as a certain Fact.

Those Goods which were taken in a Schooner by the French Privateer, as mentioned in our last, were taken from on board the Argyle, Capt. Morrison, and not Capt. Murray, as we were wrongly informed.

This Day his Excellency in Council, was pleased to Prorogue the General Assembly of this Province (which stood Prorogued to the 13th Day of September) to Monday the 7th Day of March next.

**I**T is no new Thing to find that Interest blinds  
the Person affected, and even often biases the  
Judgment. The late Advertisement of the *Rock-  
Hall Ferry*, Mr. Callister thought would be a  
Means of Strangers and Travellers finding out the  
Place, tho' it did not tell them that it was situate  
on a Creek that makes in from the Mouth of  
*Chester* opposite to *Sivan-Island*, on the Kent Coun  
ty Shore, and this brought his Fears on him that  
he should lose a Shilling now and then by Travel  
lers taking the Road to *Rock-Hall*, and avoiding  
his Ferry. This Interest then, I imagine, produ  
ced all that Justice that is done the Public in his  
Letter of the 14th of July, which you were pleased  
to publish, wherein he is so blinded as to insinuate  
that the Traveller would carry his Horse over 25  
Miles of Water, to save 4 Miles Riding, when  
by his own State of the Matter he would ride 47  
Miles from *George-Town* to *Kent-Island*, and but  
30 to *Rock-Hall*: This must save 17 Miles, and  
as it is but 16 Miles from *Chester* to *George-Town*,  
and he says 18, it must save 19 Miles at least (and  
I am apt to believe he is a few Miles short of the  
Truth in the 18 Miles from *Dockery's* to *Townside*)  
besides the Crossing Two Ferries, which causes  
Expence, Delay and Trouble. To *Rock-Hall* is  
a very good Road, clear of Ferries or Obstructions,  
a good Stage at *Chester-Town*, and a good Harbour  
at the Place for the Boats, Water enough to go off  
at all Tides, and that directly from a Wharf into the  
Boat, when sometimes People have been detained  
2 or 3 Days together with low Tides at *Kent-Island*,

For who would bear the Taunts of longing Maids, The Harlot's Impudence, the Prude's Disdain, The Pangs of Love despis'd, Coquette's Delay, The Infatuation of Beauty, and the Spurns Which Merit bears, when Fools become their Fav'rites, When he himself might his Quietude make With one kind Woman?—Say, what Youth could bear To with, and sigh alone the weary Night, Or dangle after Belles, Coquettes and Wenches, But that the Dread of Something after Honey-Moon, (That gaily-fleeting Period, whose sweet Joys Few Loves, alas! survive) puzzles the Will, And bids us rather linger in the Path, The well-known, simple Path of single Life, Than tempt the dark perplexed Ways of Wedlock? Thus Forethought does make Batch'lors of us all: And hence the Face of many a willing Maid Is sickly'd o'er with the pale Cast of Languishment, And many a Youth of no small Pitch and Moment With this Regard, spends all his Days in Wh'r-r-g, And damns the Name of Husband.

LONDON, May 27.

THE Duke of Newcastle hath written a Letter on the Occasion of his Resignation, to the Lord Mayor of London, and another to the Chairman of the East-India Company, expressing his Grace's grateful Sense of the City's Readiness to support the Government on all Occasions during his Administration.

Commodore Moore, who commands in the Downs, has so ordered his Ships, that he has Advice from the Coast of France every 48 Hours.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, May 24.

"We hear that Sir Edward Hawke is to bombard Dunkirk."

May 29. They write from Portugal, that Barracks are built for 15,000 English Troops, about 3 Miles from Lisbon, on as beautiful a Spot of Ground as any in that Kingdom.

A Letter from Lisbon informs us, that 1000 young Gentlemen of Fortune have embodied themselves, and are provided with Horses and Accoutrements, with which they propose to attend their King as Volunteers, without any Pay.

The Officers belonging to the Train at Woolwich, destined for Lisbon, have received Orders to set out directly for Portsmouth, to embark for Portugal.

The Embargo upon all Ships and Vessels laden with Provisions in and of the Ports of Ireland, is ordered to be further continued until the 30th Day of June next.

An Embargo is laid upon all Ships in the Ports of Norway, and other Ports in the King of Denmark's Dominions.

June 1. Yesterday the Right Hon. the Earl of Bute attended for the first Time at the Treasury. His Lordship had the greatest Number of the Nobility to compliment him upon the Occasion that was ever known.

June 3. The Peregrine Sloop of War, Captain Knowles, Son of Admiral Knowles, who failed some Months ago with the Declaration of War against Spain, was bound to Lisbon and the West-Indies, and was taken going over the Bar of Lisbon by a Ship belonging to the French Fleet, which failed from Brest the 23d of last January, and carried with them to St. Domingo. As she had not been heard of before, it was supposed that she had foundered at Sea.

Yesterday considerable Wagers were laid at the West End of the Town, that the British Flag was flying on the Walls at the Havannah the 29th of May last.

June 10. The Nueira Senora de Begona, a fine Spanish Privateer of Bilbao, of 16 Guns, and 195 Men, is taken by the Venus Frigate, Captain Harrison, and brought into Plymouth.

June 12. A Nursery, and several other Apartments are fitting up at St. James's where the late Queen Caroline's Apartments were in that Palace.

A Letter from Gibraltar, dated April 14, says, "The Spaniards—and we are as yet upon very good Terms, taking no more Notice of one another than if it was a profound Peace; and we are deprived of little else, save the Pleasures of riding in Spain. There are now in this Bay 18 Sail of the Line, two 50 Gun Ships, besides Frigates. There are only 10 Sail of the Line in Cadiz, and they cannot get manned."

The Czar and the King of Prussia have agreed to have an Interview, as soon as possible, at Konigsberg.

Yesterday his Majesty came from Buckingham-House to St. James's for the first Time since his late Indisposition.

Admiralty-Office, May 14. His Majesty's Ship the Phoenix arrived in Basque Road the 17th of last Month, with the Duke de Fronzac armed Ship, taken by the Mermaid on the 9th. There was on board her a Company of the Regiment of Bigores Grenadiers, consisting of 48 Men, Officers included; and one of Angoumois, of 41 Men, Officers included, bound for Louisiana: This Ship, with about 6 others (one of which of 250 Tons, was taken at the same Time, and is since arrived) sailed from Bourdeaux on the 7th. The Phoenix left the Mermaid in close Pursuit of a third.

His Majesty's Ship the Royal William has also taken and carried into Basque Road, a Spanish Packet Boat, of 180 Tons, 14 Guns, and 59 Men, bound from St. Sebastian, with Iron and Flour for the Havannah; and two French Privateers belonging to Rochelle, one called Le Bailien, of 14 Guns, and 160 Men; and the other La Minx, of 10 Guns, and 68 Men.

St. James's, May 28. His Majesty hath been pleased to appoint the Right Hon. George Grenville, Esq; to be one of his Principal Secretaries of State.

May 29. The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Hon. John Earl of Bute, Knight of the most noble Order of the Garter, the Right Hon. Sir Francis Dashwood, Bart. Frederick North, Esq; commonly called Lord North, James Oiswald, Esq; and Sir John Turner, Bart. to be his Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of his Majesty's Exchequer.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Hon. Sir Francis Dashwood, Bart. the Offices of Chancellor and Under Treasurer of his Majesty's Exchequer.

The King has been pleased to grant unto the Right Hon. William Viscount Barrington, the Office or Place of Treasurer of his Majesty's Navy.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Gilbert Elliot, Esq; the Office of Treasurer of his Majesty's Chamber.

Limerick, May 10. Thursday were brought in, under a strong Guard, two of the Levellers, Carvan and Leo, who were lodged in his Majesty's Goal, on Information of their breaking down Standish Grady Esquire's Deer-Park Wall, killing several of his Deer, and being of the Set of Villains who formed a Scheme to seize the Militia Arms, which were at Bulgadin Hall.

BOSTON, July 29.

In the Morning of the 25th sailed from Portsmouth, in New-Hampshire, his Majesty's Ship Launceston, of 40 Guns, Captain Affleck, having a large Quantity of Money on board, sent by some of the Merchants of this and the neighbouring Governments trading to Great-Britain: The three Mast Ships, and a Number of Merchant Ships, bound to Europe, sailed under her Convoy.

The Report published in Monday's Papers, that a Fleet of 8 Sail of the Enemy's Ships had left Newfoundland, and were seen standing to the Westward, is without Foundation; nor were there any Expresses with such Accounts: The Packet, brought at that Time, contained Duplicates of Letters from the Hon. Governor Belcher, to his Excellency our Governor.

Since our last several Vessels arrived here from Newfoundland, by the Master of one of them we have the following Account; That he left Ferryland the first of July, that he was at Halifax on the 14th, and was informed by a Gentleman who left Ferryland in the Afternoon of the first of July, that he saw on the said Day, four French Men of War come out of the Bay of Bulls, and steer, as he judged, for St. John's, that two of the Ships were of 74 Guns, one of 40 Guns, and a Frigate; and it was generally thought there were no other French Ships on the Coast; but that the other four French Ships which were supposed to have been seen off, were judged to be English Ships bound up the River St. Lawrence: It was generally said the French landed 1500 Men, 2000 of which were disembarked from the two large Ships, and the Remainder from the other two Ships, there being no Transport Ships in Company with them.

We have Advice from Halifax, that Captain James Brooks, Master of one of the Vessels that was taken at the Bay of Bulls, which he left on the Appearance of the Enemy's Ships, has deposed, That having got to Ferryland, on the 13th of June last, a Man came there, and declared to him, that he was in the Fort of St. John's when it surrendered to the Enemy, which was on the 27th; that he left the Fort that Day; and that the Number of the Enemy who invested the said Fort, were said to be from 12 to 1500 Men; that they marched by Land to St. John's from the Bay of Bulls, where the Ships lay; that they brought no Cannon with them against the said Fort, and that they had not at the Time of his Departure destroyed any of the Houses at St. John's; but he knew not any of the Particulars of the Capitulation.

Several Accounts agree, That the Enemy had destroyed the Vessels at the Bay of Bulls, and burnt the Houses there, a great Smoke being seen over that Place on the 29th of June; that they destroyed all the Vessels they took, and that the Enemy declared they intended to destroy every Thing on that Coast.—That the Enemy marched across the Country 25 Miles from Bay of Bulls to St. John's; after they had taken this, they gave the Inhabitants 9 Days to sell their Effects, after that, what remained undisposed of was to become the Enemy's Property.

Extract of a Letter from Halifax.

"I herewith enclose you a Notification which was sent to the Inhabitants of Bay of Bulls, viz.

WE the Commander of his Most Christian Majesty's Fleet in the Bay of Bulls, make it known to all the Inhabitants of the same Place, that they may come to their Habitations without being molested.

"A board of his Majesty's Ship the Robuste the 25th of June, 1762. (Signed) LE CH. DE TURNAY."

Extract of another Letter from Halifax.

"The Antelope of 50 Guns, with her Convoy from England, are thought to be upon the Coast of Newfoundland at this Time; but hope they will receive some Advice of this sad Affair before they get too near, and are taken by the Enemy."

August 2. Yesterday Evening arrived here Capt. Cochran in a Brig from Newfoundland, but last from Halifax in six Days, in whom came Passenger the Master of a Vessel who was taken at St. John's, and made his Escape from thence the 4th of July, six Days after that Place surrendered, who informs, that the French Force which marched from the Bay of Bulls to St. John's consisted of 1600 fine Troops, and that the Garrison submitted without making any Opposition, or any Articles of Capitulation: That the French were erecting new Fortifications at St. John's, and were determined to keep the Place: That they had also fitted out 14 Sail of Privateers, which were all failed on a Cruise before he got from thence: That they had destroyed the Bay of Bulls, but had done no Damage at St. John's, the Inhabitants remaining in quiet Possession of their Houses; but that a Guard of French Soldiers were placed at all the Stores: That the French Fleet consisted of but two Ships of 74 Guns, one of 44, and two Frigates, the latter of which kept constantly cruising off the Harbour; and that they all came from Old France.—

Captain Cochran informs, that no English Men of War were arrived at Halifax, neither had they received Advice of any being on that Coast; so that the Fisherman's Account, who arrived at Marblehead last Week, of 11 Sail being there, is without any Foundation.—The Embargo was taken off at Halifax two Days before Captain Cochran sailed.

NEW-YORK, August 5.

Extract of a Letter from Madeira, dated June 18, 1762.

"By late Advices from Portugal we hear that the Spaniards had entered the Frontiers, and taken Miranda, Chaves, and Braganza; the Portuguese have a very numerous Army, and with the Assistance of the English Troops, it is imagined, will make a noble Stand, and soon free their Country of the Spaniards."

By Captain Robertson in six Weeks and two Days from Madeira, we have Advice, that the Ship Mary, of Philadelphia, Captain Gardiner, arrived there from Lisbon 3 Days before he sailed, and reported that a Danish Ship arrived at Lisbon, giving an Account that in his Passage, coming thro' the Straights, and off Cadiz Bay he saw 50 Sail of Ships closely engaged, 25 of a Side, from about three in the Afternoon till Evening, when he lost Sight of them, keeping a continual Firing, but could not distinguish who they were: That the Spaniards had taken 7 Towns on the Frontiers of Portugal; and that General Crawford in an Engagement he had with the Spaniards obtained a complete Victory, though the Enemy were five to one. That the Queen of Hungary was dead, which the said Capt. Robertson assures the Public for Truth. N. B. General Crawford had no Forces but raw Militia.

IT is no new Thing to find that Interest blinds

L O N D O N, May 12.

**D**R. Wollaston, of Bury, near Ipswich, has published the following Account of the afflicted Family at Wattisham.

John Downing, a poor labouring Man, living at Wattisham, in January last, had a Wife and six Children; the eldest a Girl of 15 Years of Age, the youngest about four Months. They were all at that Time very healthy, and had not any of them been ill for some Time before. On Sunday the 10th of January the eldest Girl complained in the Morning of a Pain in her left Leg, particularly in the Calf of the Leg. Towards Evening the Pain grew exceedingly violent. The same Evening another Girl complained of the same violent Pain in the Leg. On the Monday the Mother and another Child: And on the Tuesday all the rest of the Family were affected in the same Manner; some in one Leg, some in both Legs. The little Infant was taken from the Mother's Breast: It seemed to be in Pain; but the Limbs did not mortify: It lived a few Weeks. The Mother and five other Children continued in violent Pain a considerable Time: In about four, five, or six Days, the diseased Leg began to turn Black gradually, appearing at first covered with blue Spots as if it had been bruised. The other Leg of those who were affected at first only in one Leg, about that Time also began to be affected with the same excruciating Pain, and in a few Days that Leg also began to mortify. The mortified Parts separated gradually from the sound Parts, and the Surgeon had in most of the Cases no other Trouble than to cut through the Bone, which was black and almost dry. The State of their Limbs at present is this:

"Mary the Mother, aged 40, has lost the right Foot at the Ankle, the left Foot also is off, and the two Bones of the Leg remain almost dry, with only some little putrid Flesh adhering in some Places. The Flesh is found to be about two Inches below the Knee. The Bones would have been sawn through at that Place if she would have consented to it.

"Mary, aged 15, both Legs off below the Knees.

"Elizabeth, aged 13, both Legs off below the Knees.

"Sarah, aged 10, one Foot off at the Ankle. The other Foot was affected, but not in so great a Degree, and is now found again.

"Robert, aged eight, both Legs off below the Knees.

"Edward, aged four, both Feet off.

"An Infant, four Months old, dead.

The Father was attacked about a Fortnight after the rest of the Family, and in a slighter Degree: The Pain being confined to his Fingers.—Two Fingers of the right Hand continued for a long Time discoloured and partly shrunk and contracted; but he begins now to have some Use of them.—The Nails of the other Hand were also discoloured.—He lost two of them.

It is remarkable, that during all the Time of this Misfortune, the whole Family are said to have appeared in other Respects well, eat heartily, and slept well when the Violence of the Pain began to abate.—The Mother is now emaciated, and has very little Use of her Hands.—The eldest Girl has a

superficial Ulcer in one Thigh, and seems also ill. The rest of the Family are pretty well.—The Stumps of some of them perfectly healed."

May 18. By Letters received from Gibraltar, by the Anglicana, Steward, and the Anna Maria, Shaw, from Turkey, last from Gibraltar, there is Advice that Admiral Saunders, with 18 Men of War, 4 Bomb-ketches, and 2 Fire-ships, sailed from Gibraltar the 20th of April, to intercept 12 Spanish Men of War that were coming out of Cadiz, as the Admiral had been informed.

May 22. We hear that the Warwick East Indiaman, lately arrived from China, found two fine Islands, very far to the Southward, not discovered before.

It is reported, that in Pursuance of Directions given by the Hudson's Bay Company for the Discovery of a North-west Passage, the Strait called Chesterfield's Inlet has been very carefully examined, and found to prove wider and deeper; from whence great Hopes are formed that this important Discovery will be speedily completed.

Part of a Letter from Dunkirk, May 5.

"A Fortnight ago we began to arm two Frigates, six cannonading Sloops, and 16 flat-bottomed Boats. Each Frigate carries Twenty 24-Pounders and Twelve 18-Pounders; each cannonading Sloop carries Three 24-Pounders; and each flat-bottomed Boat carries Two 24-Pounders. All these Vessels have been fitted out in the Space of 8 Days: Last Year, an Armament of the same Force employed a whole Month."

May 25. Orders are given for all Officers of the Army to repair to their Posts.

She had on board, among other Effects, a large Quantity of Rags for making Paper; which took Fire, and burnt so furiously, that it was impossible to extinguish the Flames: All they could do, was to throw the Powder overboard, to prevent the Vessel from being blown up. She burnt to water Edge. Only her Guns, and some Provisions were saved. The greatest Part of the Crew, which amounted to 72, including the Captain and a Lady, who was a Passenger, perished."

June 10. According to Letters from Paris, never were Murders and Assassinations so frequent in that City as they have been for some Time past. The Vices, Distresses, and Despair that arise from the Miseries of the Times, and the unnatural Mixture of craving Luxury and extreme Poverty, are justly supposed to occasion many of these horrid Events. In the mean Time, the Rumour of Peace is renewed, and it is imagined that the Count d'Estaing, who was lately Prisoner in England (and who was treated there with the greatest Civility and Distinction, notwithstanding the Breach of his Parole) has been the Instrument of renewing the Negotiations. It is said, that the polite Treatment of that Officer drew a very genteel Letter from the Duke of Choiseul to the E. of B. which offered a natural Opportunity of Transition from private to public Matters. Certain it is, that the Language of that Duke is remarkably changed, and that his high Tone of Voice has contracted a Mixture of Suavity, that indicates an approaching Accommodation of Matters between the two Crowns.

June 12. The Postscript of a Letter from the Hague of the 8th Inst. says, that a Report was just spread, that the Spaniards had made themselves Masters of Braganza.

Extract of a Letter from Paris, June 4.

"The Inaction of our Armies, as well as those of the Allies, which some attribute to a Want of Forage, was really due to another Cause, even to the Renewal of the Negotiations for Peace, which succeeded the generous Proceedings of the Court of London towards Count d'Estaing, and were in a great Measure owing to the Intercession of the King of Sardinia. This Monarch sent express Orders to his Minister at London, Count Viri, to use his utmost Endeavours for renewing the Negotiations that had been unhappily interrupted by the ill-timed Demands of Spain.—This Minister executed his Orders with Integrity and Zeal; but, as it appears, hitherto without much Success; for fresh Orders have lately been sent from this Court to the Count d'Estaing and the Prince of Conde, to push the warlike Operations with the utmost Vigour. The great Change, however, that has now taken Place in the English Ministry, revives our Hopes of Peace. The Removal of the old Continental Minister, as it will naturally diminish the Force of those Foreign Connections that constituted the Essence of his political System, must consequently produce a Change of Measures in Germany, and greatly strengthen the Party that has hitherto opposed the German War. The humane and pacific Character of the British Monarch; the Spirit of the new Ministry; the Voice of

the People, who are fatiated with Laurels that are so Expensive; every Thing, in short, contributes to make us look for a short Campaign, and a final One."

Admiralty-Office, May 12. Captain Richard Knight, of his Majesty's Ship the Liverpool, hath brought with him to Cork, the Grand Admiral, a French Privateer Snow, of 10 Guns, and 85 Men, which he took the 24th of last Month off Mizenhead: The Privateer had been out from Bayonne 48 Days, and taken nothing.

Captain Mitchell Graham, of his Majesty's Ship Aldborough, in his Letter dated at Cork the 2d Instant, gives an Account, that on the 28th past, off Cape Clear, he fell in with and took the Neufra Seniors de la Piedade, alias Gollondrina, a Spanish Privateer Schooner, of 8 Guns and 65 Men; and also that he retook the Ship Brayton, of Whitehaven, from Carolina, which had been taken by the above-mentioned Privateer.

BRIDGE-TOWN, BARRADOS, July 1.

On Sunday last was sent into this Port, by the Privateer Brig Maynard, Capt. Campbell, of this Island, the Sloop La Maria, from Cape-François, bound to Coracos, loaded with white Sugar, Indico and Coffee, which they took on the 27th of May, after a Chase of 6 Hours, in Lat. 18: 30. She mounts 10 Carriage and 10 Swivel Guns, with Small-Arms, &c. had upwards of 40 Men, 30 of which are Negroes. The Day after they took this Prize they fell in with three other Sloops, two of which mounted 10 Guns each, and the other 12. They sailed from the Cape in Company with the Prize, were bound to the same Place, and all engaged the Privateer, who, being weakly manned, was obliged to leave them. The Captain of the Prize is a Spaniard, the Merchant and Doctor Frenchmen, and the rest of the white Men a Mixture of both Nations.

ST. JOHN'S (in Antigua) July 14.

Letters from Guadaloupe, and the other conquered Islands, continue to complain very much of the Mischiefs done on their Coasts by small Privateers. These insulting Enemies, in which there is great Reason to suspect that some of the French Inhabitants are themselves concerned, have several Times plundered Houses, carried off Negroes, and sometimes even taken Sugars from the Plantations.

We hear his Majesty's Ship the Amazon, has taken a French Ship from Bourdeaux, and carried her into St. Kitts.

B O S T O N, August 5.

Extract of a Letter from Halifax, July 23, 1762.

"It is imagined here the French Fleet consists of the following Ships, viz. Robuste, of 74 Guns, Eveille 74, Amphitruon 46, and the Licorne Frigate, of 28 Guns. Altho' Martial Law is taken off here, the Militia of the Town do Duty every Day, and it is likely to continue till we have more favourable Accounts from Newfoundland."

Monday Morning arrived here Captain Maddicks, in the Ship Anne, from Dartmouth in England, who failed in Company with a Number of Vessels bound to Newfoundland, under Convoy of his Majesty's Ship Antelope, of 50 Guns.—Capt. Maddicks, on his standing in for St. John's, was becalmed, and a Shallop came off with some English People, who informed him that the French were in Possession of that Place; whereupon he stood away for this Port.

Unless the Antelope and the rest of her Convoy should likewise get Intelligence, it is feared some of them will fall into the Enemy's Hands, as they were bound to St. John's.

By Vessels from Halifax we have an Account, that one of the above Fleet, a Snow from Dartmouth, laden with Provisions, went into St. John's, where she was seized by the Enemy, and a Midshipman and some Hands out of one of the French Men of War were put on board her, and stripped her of her Sails: But the Matter of the Snow taking an Opportunity, when some of the Frenchmen went ashore, to procure a Number of Englishmen who belonged to the Gramont Frigate, he cut her Cable, and stood out of the Harbour; there being a Suit of Sails on board, they kept bending them the whole Time the Enemy were firing on her from the Shore. The Snow was arrived safe at Halifax, with the Midshipman and some of the Frenchmen on board.

We also hear, that a Vessel belonging to Rhode-Island, deeply laden, went into St. John's with all her Colours out, seeing English Colours flying at the Forts, and on the Ships in the Harbour, not knowing the Place was in the Enemy's Hands, till he went on board the Admiral's Ship.

We hear that at Louisbourg they are preparing to prevent the French getting Possession there, if they should attempt it from Newfoundland.

August 9. On Thursday last arrived here a Sloop from Newfoundland, with about 50 Men Passengers, 16 of whom made their Escape from St. John's in a Boat, a Fortnight after that Place surrendered to the French; they inform that the Enemy had already erected three new Fortifications there, and had also greatly strengthened the old Fort on the Land Side: That they had sent to England, in two small Vessels, the English Garrison which they took there, consisting of about 80 Soldiers; and that other Vessels were preparing to carry Home the Merchants and Seamen: That they were fitting the Gramont Frigate for the Sea; and that no English Vessel had come into that Harbour since the French had Possession of it.

That the Antelope Man of War having received Intelligence of St. John's being in the Hands of the Enemy, landed her Marines on the Isle of Buoy, at Ferriland, where there is a good Fort, and the only Place that held out when the Island



was taken by the French in Queen Ann's War, and that the Antelope afterwards went to St. Mary's Bay: That the French had fired out no Privateers of any Consequence, but only a few small Crafts, which were gone to the Northward, and had destroyed the Settlements at Conception Bay, and were proceeding to Trinity, to do the same there; both of which Places the Inhabitants had deserted, with most of their Effects: That the French General had issued a Manifesto, signifying, that such of the Inhabitants who did not come in and submit themselves before the 25th of July, should, if taken, be treated with great Severity: That the French gave out they expected to be joined by 6 or 8 Spanish Men of War, and also a Number more from France, and that they were determined to keep Possession of the Place.

Extract of a Letter from Louisbourg, July 30, 1762.  
 "This Moment we had a Cartel arrived here with 2 Officers, and a Number of Men, from St. John's, and are bound to England; they put in here for Want of Provisions, having only enough for 11 Days; but they are to proceed from hence to Halifax, not having only sufficient for ourselves: These Officers inform us, that the French have two Ships of the Line and two Frigates, and 1600 Grenadiers, very fine Troops, they have picked them out of 20 Regiments; they are busily employed in fortifying the Place, which they say will be completely done; and that there is 500 Men to garrison it this Winter; they have no Thoughts of proceeding any farther, and the Remainder are to return from whence they came: They oblige the Inhabitants of St. John's to work, and pay them nothing for it; and they are greatly afraid of our Fleet soon coming to them, they having constantly Reports of that Kind. One of the Gentlemen told me that they spoke with a fishing Schooner, who informed them that he saw 4 English Men of War, who spoke to him, and told him that they were going to block up St. John's Harbour: The French treat their Prisoners very ill, putting them on board with fasting Provisions, and Blubber Casks filled with Water; this is all I can learn at present."

ANNAPOLIS, August 26.  
 Capt. McCauley is just arrived at Philadelphia, from the Harbours, which he left the 6th of this instant August, and brings Advice, that the 28th of July, the Moor-Castle was taken by Storm, with the Loss of about 50 Men on our Side, and about 1500 of the Spaniards; That the Spaniards then bent all their Force against the Moor-Castle, or the Remains, as it was reduced to a Heap of Rubbish only: That our Troops were erecting Batteries against the Town, &c. which were to be opened the 10th of August, at which Time 8 Sail of the Line were to enter the Harbour, after which our People soon expect to be in Possession of the whole: Colonel Howe was burning most of the Villages about the Country: Five Sail of Transports, and the Enterprize Man of War of 40 Guns, were lost, going through the Old Straits of Bahama, but all the People saved, these were of the first Division: Five Ships of the second Division were taken by some French Men of War, viz. Captain Cimin, Captain Smith, Captain Dawson, Snow Polly, all of Philadelphia, and a Brig belonging to New York.

We hear that an Expedition is immediately to take Place, for the Recovery of Newfoundland, under the Command of Colonel Amherst, to be composed of the recovered Troops from Martinico, now in the Neighbourhood of New York, the Troops from Halifax and Louisbourg, and a Detachment of Artillery from Halifax.

On Tuesday Night last, during the Time that it thundered, lightened and rained, another Attempt was made by some audacious Villains, to break into that Part of the Paper Currency Office where the Iron Chests are deposited, by undermining the Foundation; but their Attempt proved abortive, although they are supposed to have wrought at it with Crows, or Pick-axes, as well as Spades.—We hear that Two Men are in Goal on Suspicion of being concerned in this Affair.

ROUSEY-HALL, August 16, 1762.
