WHEREAS by a Statute made in the Ninth Year of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, Entitled, *An ACT for Establishing a General-Post-Office, for Her Majesty's Dominions, and for settling a Weekly Sum out of the Revenues thereof, for the Service of the War, and other her Majesty's Occasions*, It is Enacted, That no Person or Persons whatsoever, in any Part of these Kingdoms of Great-Britain and Ireland, or the Plantations and Colonies, in the West-Indies and America, other than the Postmaster-General for the time being, and his Deputies and Assigns, shall presume to Receive, Take up, Order, Dispatch, Convey, Carry, Recarry or Deliver, Letters, or Packets of Letters (Except such as shall respectively concern Goods sent by Common Known Carriers, and which shall be delivered with the Goods such Letters do concern, without Hire, Reward, or other Profit, or Advantage for Receiving or Delivering such Letters; And except Letters of Merchants and Masters, Owners of Ships, or Vessels of Merchandise, or the Cargo or Lading therein sent, whereof such Merchants or Masters are Owners, and delivered to the Persons to whom directed, without Hire or Reward, Advantage or Profit for the same in any wise: And except Proceedings issuing out of any Court of Law; and Letters sent by any Friend or Friends in their Way of Travel; or by a special Messenger sent on purpose on the private Affairs of any Person.) Nor shall make any Collection of Letters, or Set up or Employ any Foot-Post, Horse-Post, Packet-Boat, or other Vessel or Boat, or other Conveyance or Conveyances whatsoever, for the Receiving, Taking up, Ordering, Dispatching, Conveying, Carrying, Recarrying, or Delivering Letters, or Packets of Letters, by Sea or by Land, or on any River, within Her Majesty's Dominions, (Other than as before excepted) on pain of forfeiting the Sum of 5 l. for every several Offence against the Tenor of the said Act. And also the Sum of 200 l. for every Week that any Offender against this Act shall continue such illegal Practices; one Half to the King, the other Half to the Informer. And by the said Act it is provided, that nothing in the above recited Exceptions shall extend to authorize any Common Carrier of Goods, or his Servants or Agents, to Receive, Collect, or Deliver, Letters or Packets, (with or without Hire or Reward) that do not concern Goods then in his Cart, Waggon, or on his Pack-Horses; Nor any Owners or Drivers of Stage-Coaches; Nor any Owners, Masters, or Commanders of Boats called Passage-Boats, Sailing between any Part of Great-Britain or Ireland, and any Parts or Places beyond the Seas, or their Servants or Agents; Nor any Passenger or Passengers on Board such Boats or Vessels; Nor the Owners or Watermen on Board of any Boat, Barge, or Vessel, passing or repassing on any River or Rivers to and from any Parts of Great-Britain and Ireland, North-America, or the West-Indies, or other His Majesty's Dominions and Territories; although they do not receive any Hire or Reward, or other Advantage for the same: But that all such Persons Collecting and Delivering Letters as aforesaid, though without Hire or Reward, shall be deemed and taken, and are declared to be Persons offending against the above recited Act, and shall forfeit and pay such Sum and Sums of Money as Persons Collecting, Receiving, Taking up, Conveying, and Delivering of Letters for Hire, or Setting up, Employing, and Maintaining any Post contrary to the said Act, are Enacted to forfeit and pay. And to the end that the Revenue arising by the Postage of Letters may not be longer injured by unlawful Collections and Conveyances, His Majesty's Postmaster-General, do hereby give Notice, That all Persons hereafter acting in any thing contrary to the said Law, shall be proceeded against and punished with the utmost Severity.

Post-Master General for North-America, having by the last Packet, received express Orders to see the above mentioned Act of Parliament fully enforced and executed in the American Colonies, all Persons are hereby cautioned not to offend against the said Act, as such Offences will henceforth be strictly prosecuted.

And whereas great Numbers of Letters are privately collected and delivered contrary to Law, to the Prejudice of the Revenue; Notice is hereby given, that all Carriers, Coachmen, Waggon-Drivers, Skippers of Stage Boats, Watermen, Wherry-men, Dispersers of News-Papers, and all other Persons whatsoever, hereafter detected in the illegal collecting, conveying or delivering of Letters and Packets, will be prosecuted with the utmost Severity. The Penalty is, as aforesaid, Five Pounds Sterling for every Letter so collected or delivered, contrary to Law, and one Hundred Pounds Sterling, for every Week such Practice is continued.

B O S T O N, July 12.

PPRIVATE Letters from London, say, That Lord Bute is radicated in the Ministry: That his Brother the Hon^{ble} Stuart McKenzie is to be Ambassador to the Court of France, upon the Return of the Earl of Hertford: That the R^h Hon^{ble} the Marquis of Granby is to have the 1st Regiment of Guards, in the Room of Lord Ligonier, who retires with a Pension of 3000 l. per Annum: His Grace the Duke of Richmond is to have the Blues, in the Room of the Marquis of Granby.—Dr. Warburton is to be Bishop of London.—The Ministry were busy in appointing Civil Officers for the [some of the] Colonies.

N E W P O R T, July 16.

The following Affair, which, at the Beginning, seemed to indicate a tragical Issue, happened here last Monday, viz. Some Men belonging to his Majesty's Schooner St. John, then in this Harbour, commanded by Capt. Hill, had been guilty, several Days before, of some Irregularities in Town, of which Information was given by one concerned in the same, who had made his Escape, and being observed to be on a Wharf nearly opposite to her, a Boat, with some Men armed, came in Quest of him, or, as is said, to impress Men at Work on board a Vessel. But, whatever were their Motives for their coming ashore in that Manner, this is certain, that a smart Skirmish was the Consequence, by which, it is said, the Schooner's Men were considerably bruised, and very expeditiously went off, leaving their commanding Officer behind, who was immediately taken into Custody. The defensive Party, it is also said, received some slight Wounds. This Transaction, with the Men, who had been guilty of the Disorders, being detained on board the Schooner, after they had been demanded by Authority, greatly incensed the People of the Town.—But it may be proper to observe, that B. Smith, Esq; Commander of his Majesty's Ship Squirrel, (who, since his Residence here, by a Conduct becoming the Spirit of a Gentleman of Honour and Generosity, has justly merited the Esteem of the Inhabitants) and the Captain of the Schooner, were absent, otherwise the

Affair might probably have been amicably adjusted.—But it being apprehended that the Delinquents might make their Escape, Orders were sent over to Fort George to stop the Schooner, in case she should attempt going out of the Harbour. Towards Evening she got under Sail, intending to come to under the Squirrel's Stern, who lay without the Fort, and was endeavouring to beat out, (the Wind being a-head) when she was hailed from the Fort, which she disregarded. Soon after the Gunner, pursuant to his Orders, fired a Shot, which being ineffectual, was repeated, to the Number of 8 or 10, none of which had any Effect, and the Schooner got safely moored under the Squirrel's Stern.

Capt. Smith has since ordered the Men, who was the Cause of the above Disorder, to be delivered up, to be dealt with agreeable to Law.

The Night ensuing, about 12 o'Clock, the Town was alarmed by the Cry of Fire; but it proved to be nothing more than a Scheme contrived by some idle and inconsiderate Persons, thus to affright the Town, by that dismal Sound, in order to gratify their own wanton Fancies.

P R O V I D E N C E, July 7.

A Gentleman in a neighbouring Province, writing his Correspondent in this Town on the Scourges we are to suffer (by the late Acts of Parliament) from our MOTHER COUNTRY, in Recompence for that Loyalty and Obedience for which this Country is so eminently distinguish'd, says, "Jealousy, that Bane of Society, has been the Cause of passing these Laws at Home; which will so embarrass Trade, that they will be under a Necessity to repeal what they have done in a few Years, but the Destruction will be dreadful till their Eyes are opened.—In Virginia they already feel it, Tobacco at Home, fetches little or nothing; most of their Bills are come back protested, and the Planters have no Money to pay with.—Tho' every one is convinced of the Necessity of Unanimity amongst the Colonies, to ward off any Burden that may be intended for us; yet no Steps are taken, and all complain, that they see with great Perspicuity, the Destruction that must befall us. I still flatter myself some fortunate Event will change the Face of Things, and relieve us from our Anxiety."

N E W - Y O R K, July 23.

Extract of a Letter from Oswego, dated the 23rd June, 1764, of the best Credit.

"The 27th Infant Sir WILLIAM JOHNSON, and myself, with about 550 Indians arrived here, and were received on our Landing by upwards of 100 Cayenewagas, and others, whom he had sent forwards some Days ago. They drew up in Two Lines, and fired three Volleys, as a Salute; which was answered by the Indians who came up with Sir WILLIAM; after which, we encamped. We are to be joined this Day by 300 Indians of Oneida, Tuscaroras, and adjacent Villages; so that on Sir WILLIAM's Setting out for Niagara, there will be at least 900 Indians to accompany the Troops; which, with 140 now at Niagara, and those who are expected to join us there, from the Upper Nations, will make a larger Body than has ever been known to take the Field in our Favour.—A Party of Indians have brought in two Scalps from the Shawanese, and all our Indians express a great Desire to go against these People.—The Senecas have sent a great Number of English Prisoners, who are to be delivered to us on our Way to Niagara, agreeable to their late Engagements." [It must give great Pleasure to most of our Readers to know, that by Sir William Johnson's Interest, so many of our friend Indians have attended Him, and the Army, in Order to reduce the Western Nations to Terms of Reason.]

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PHILADELPHIA, July 25.
Extract of a Letter from the Camp at Lake Ontario, July 25.
 "We have just received Orders to take in Prisoners for Niagara, and believe we shall set off tomorrow. Sir William Johnson is here with 1300 Indians, Men, Women and Children, of whom there are above 600 Fighting Men, who, 'tis said, are to go with us. The Senecas have sent Word to Col. Bradstreet, that they will deliver up to him all the Prisoners; and last Night he sent Boats off, with some Indians and Whitesmen, to receive and carry the Prisoners to Niagara. The Hurons and Mississaugas are now at Niagara, waiting for Sir William; and we hear several other of the distant Nations are to be at the Congress there. It is thought there will be a general Peace. The Troops are in good Health. We have Boats that row with 26 Oars, but they do not appear to me quite strong enough for the Service they are intended for."

From Newfoundland we have Advice, that Captain Palliser, in His Majesty's Ship *Guernsey*, was arrived there as Governor of the Place; that four King's Frigates were likewise arrived, to guard the Coast, and prevent Encroachments from the French; and that two of His Majesty's Sloops were hourly expected from England.

All was well at Pittsburgh the Sixth Instant, and the Communication clear.

ANNAPOLIS, August 2.

Extract of a Letter from Hanover, near York, dated July 25, 1764.

"Col. Bouquet, and the Troops, are expected at Loudoun about the latter End of this Month, and to proceed soon after to the Ohio. By the latest Accounts we have had, all is quiet on the Communication."

"On Monday Night the 23d ultimo, after a short Illness, Died at his House in Anne-Arundel County, in the 48th Year of his Age, YATE PLUMMER, in whom was found the indulgent Husband, tender Parent, humane Master, and officious Neighbour; whose Death is much regretted by his Friends and Acquaintance, more particularly by a disconsolate Widow, and nine Children. In all human Probability, his End was effected by the taking something as a Vomit, administered as White Vitriol, but from the violent Operation, it is doubted something of a much stronger Nature was given by Mistake, he having almost instantaneously large Discharges of a bloody Substance, with a Continuance several Days, and survived this Operation, eight Days only."

C A D I Z, May 4.
THE extreme Drought we have had in this Country, ever since the Commencement of the Year, joined to the Scarcity and high Price for Corn, has caused a great Number of Inhabitants in the Country to quit their Habitations, and seek Relief in this City. These

Strangers are so very numerous, that the Governor has thought it necessary to publish an Ordinance, by which they are all enjoined to leave the City in 24 Hours, on Pain of being taken up, and obliged to work in the King's Arsenals. Yesterday public Prayers were offered up to implore Rain. The Mortality among the Poultry continues to rage here.

Berlin, May 10. All that has hitherto transpired concerning the Stipulations of the Treaty signed the 13th of April, between Russia and Prussia, imports, 1st a definitive Alliance, and formal Guaranty of all the Possessions of the two Sovereigns. 2^d A reciprocal Promise, in case of War, to assist each other with 25000 Foot, and 5000 Horse; excepting the Wars which Prussia may have in Westphalia, and that Russia may have with the Turks; in either of which Cases, the stipulated Succour is to be in Money. 3^d As to what regards the present State of Poland, the two Sovereigns jointly engage to pursue the same Measures and Principles they agreed upon in a former Convention.

Hague, May 26. Our Politicians here are wholly at a Loss to account, why, in the midst of a profound Peace, the naval Armaments, both of France and England, should be carried on with such uncommon Vigour. They think they see in the extraordinary Activity exerted by both Sides on this Occasion, some thing more than the bare Restoration of their Marine, or even the prudent Precautions usually taken in Times of Tranquillity not to be unprepared for another War, by suffering the national Strength to decay. They never remember so much Vigilance displayed by the great Officers at the Head of these Departments before. The Duke de Choiseul's second Visit to all the Sea-Ports of France alarms them. The many new Ships of War already built, with the Orders issued out for Construction of more; the Reparation of their Fortresses, the Reviews in the Plains of Sabons, the great Attention paid to their Finances, the Demand just made from Sweden, for her stipulated Subsidy of a Thousand Men, the military Preparations making in the principal Ports belonging to the other Branches of the united House of Bourbon, are by several considered as many Indications of a rankling Jealousy, which may shortly break forth into an open and extensive War. The Report of a misunderstanding, and the present critical State of the Affairs of Poland, in their Opinions, confirm these Conjectures, and may soon blow up the kindling Embers into a violent Flame.

L O N D O N, May 1.
Saturday Evening died, at his House in Bury-street, St. Mary-Axe, Benjamin Mendes da Costa, Esq; a Gentleman of the Jewish Profession; but whose Practice, as it adorned human Nature, would do Honour to the purest Religion. His Love for Mankind in general, was unbounded; which won him universal Reverence and Esteem. Firmly persuaded that Riches are sent, not to gratify the grovelling Views of Pride, Luxury, or Avarice; his Wealth was as a mighty Reservoir of Water, whence issued a Thousand salutary Streams, to cherish, relieve and support, weeping, distressed Virtue, of all Persuasions and of all Denominations.

Besides the 3000^l. per Annum given to charitable Uses by the late worthy Mr. Da Costa, by a Codicil to his Will, he has ordered that all the Bonds, Securities, &c. he had by him, should be immediately on his Death destroyed; and that the Annuities he had given to distressed Families should be continued during the Lives of the Persons to whom they were granted.

May 15. We hear that a Grant is making out to Denny Rolle, Esq; Member of Parliament for Barnstable, of a Tract of Land of many Thousand Acres, near St. Mark's, in East Florida; and that he is preparing to embark in a few Days, with some Gentlemen, Artificers, and Families from Bristol. Many young Men and Women are going in the Ships from thence, and several Families propose to go over from the Ports of Barnstable and Bideford, in the Autumn, sufficient, it is supposed, to settle the whole Grant in a short Time. As soon as the Settlers arrive, and are provided for, that Gentleman intends to return at the Meeting of the Parliament.

Cochineal, Silk, and Cotton, are the Produce of that Country, and will be a very profitable easy Employment for the Women and Children; as Indigo, Rice, and other valuable Commodities, will be raised by the greater Strength of the Men.

May 17. Yesterday arrived a Mail from New-York, brought by the Pitt Packet, Brigstock, in 27 Days. Green Peas were on Thursday sold for a Guinea and a Half a Quart.

We hear that four Guineas were given on Thursday Se'night for a Quart of Peas, for the Use of his Excellency the Spanish Ambassador, who that Day gave an elegant Entertainment to the foreign Ministers, and many of the Nobility and Gentry.

May 19. Some Gentlemen, eminent for their Skill in the Profession of Engineering, are now preparing to embark for the Grenadoes. They are to take an accurate Survey of all our late acquired Islands in the West-Indies, with the most convenient Places to erect Fortifications, which are with all Expedition to be put in a proper State of Defence.

Lord Clive gives Capt. Mills, of the Kent, a Thousand Pounds for his Passage to Bengal.

A great Quantity of Artillery is now preparing, in order to be sent to the Islands of Tobago, &c. together with some Engineers, to direct the Building of the Fortifications.

May 24. Yesterday at Half past Twelve came on before Lord Mansfield, and the other two Judges of the Court of King's Bench, at Westminster-hall, the Trial of Philip Car-

teret Webb, Esq; Member of Parliament for Haslemere in Surrey, Solicitor to the Treasury, and Fellow of the Royal Society, for Perjury, which continued till 7 o'Clock in the Evening, when the Jury, which was a special One, after an Absence of half an Hour, brought in their Verdict, *Not Guilty*. It was with no little Difficulty that a Jury could be impanelled to try this important Cause, some of the Gentlemen who had been summoned neglecting to attend, notwithstanding the pressing Necessity for their Appearance. One of them, however, was fined 30^l. for his Remissness, which it is hoped will have a salutary Effect upon every future Occasion.

Yesterday the Commissioners of the Navy contracted for 500 Tons of Hemp of British Growth.

We are credibly informed, that a Pension of 1500^l. per Annum for Life is granted to the Right Hon. Lord Sandys.

The State of the National Debt, as it stood on the 5th Day of January last, being Christmas Day O. S. amounts to 129,586,789^l. 10s. 1 half-penny, and the annual Interest, or other Charges payable for the same, amount to 4,688,177^l. 11s.

The Society for Encouragement of Arts, &c. last Night resolved to offer a Premium of One Hundred Pounds for a Secret to Tan Sheep and other Skins without Bark.

The same Society has lately received a valuable Treatise from Italy, (in Consequence of a proposed Premium) pointing out a very salutary Invention to empty Water out of Ships.

Notwithstanding the Island of Grenada was supposed by many, at the Conclusion of the Peace, to be barren, and of little Value, 9397 Cwt. of Sugar, and 774 Cwt. of Coffee, have been imported into this Port from thence within Three Months last past.

Extract of a Letter from the Grenadoes.

"The Trade of this Place is more considerable than could be expected in an infant Settlement. Great Numbers of English daily arrive here, both from Europe and America; Provisions are very plenty, by Reason of the Ships resorting here from Virginia and New-England with Bread, Flour, Peas, Pork, Butter, Cheese, and Hams; a House is knocked up presently, all the necessary Materials of Beams, Boards, Rafters, Joists ready framed, being imported from North-America; which, with the great Number of French settled here as Subjects, render this Place by far more considerable, for Commerce, than any other of the new ceded Caribbee Islands."

Yesterday a large Quantity of Small Arms were shipped on board the Fleet going to the different Settlements on the Coast of North-America.

May 25. It is reported that an additional Number of Forces will be sent to all our American Colonies.

By an Estimate lately made it appears, that the Produce of the Revenue of his Majesty's Customs has increased at the Rate of upwards of a Million per Annum since the Peace.

May 26. They write from Brest, that the Court of France have lately ordered the Number of Seamen on the marine List, to be augmented with 15,000 Men.

It is rumoured, that Enquiry has been made at a public Office, to know in what Time they could victual out 20,000 Men, in Case of Emergency.

In Consequence of the prudent Measures now taking, the State of the British Navy is in a Way of being vastly superior to what has ever been experienced in former Years. Exclusive of a thorough Survey of all his Majesty's Ships of War, Contracts have been entered into with every Province, Island, and Settlement in America; where Men of War may be supplied with Provisions, Rigging and all Manner of Naval Stores, on any Emergency; the same Contract is also in Force in most foreign States in Europe, so that let a King's Ship put in any where, she is sure of being supplied.

June 2. The great Manila Prize, left 50 Leagues to the Westward by the Lenox and Grafton Men of War, arrived at Portsmouth, is larger than any of our Men of War; she draws 34 Feet Water.

On Saturday the Chace, Smith, sailed from Cowes, with Palatine Passengers, who are going to settle in Pennsylvania.

This Week several Workmen, in the House-building Branch, were engaged for the new Settlements: They are to embark on board the Grampus for Pensacola, which Ship sails in about ten Days.

Portsmouth, May 21. The Lords of the Admiralty, who are making the Tour of all the Yards belonging to his Majesty, went on Tuesday last to Woolwich, where Lord Egmont, accompanied with three other Lords of that Board, together with their Secretaries, took a View of most of the Ships that are building and in ordinary there, mustering the several Artificers and Ships Companies as they went;—enquiring into the Nature and present State of all the Stores;—Condition of the several Ships of War;—necessary Repairs, &c. and whatever else their Lordships were pleased to think worthy their Notice, was ordered to be minuted forthwith. Their Lordships returned to Town in the Evening, and were expected to view Deptford, and the other Yards.—As nothing can be more pleasing to the Enemies of Great-Britain, than to hear that her Ships are suffered to rot in her Harbours, and her naval Affairs totally neglected; so can there be no Sounds more grateful and harmonious in the Ears of all the true Friends thereof, than those that result from Accounts of so really interesting and political a Concern as the above, to wit, a timely Attention to what constitutes the great Bulwark of the Nation, the Nerves of the State, so much recommended and taken Notice of in his Majesty's late most gracious Speech from the Throne.

An additional Number of Hands are ordered to Sheerness, to be employed in that Yard for fitting out several Ships there for Channel Service.

Orders are given for several armed Sloops and Cutters, to sail for the Coast of Scotland, for the Protection of Trade, and the Prevention of Smuggling.

St. James's, May 19. The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint William Young, Alexander Grange, John Hunt, Robert Stewart, and Robert Wynn, Esquires, Commissioners for the Sale of Lands in the Islands of Grenada, the Grenadines, Dominico, St. Vincent, and Tobago.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, June 4.

"Lord Clive (with a large Retinue) arrived here between 10 and 11 last Night, embarked on board the Kent, for Bengal, this Afternoon, at one o'Clock, and sailed at four with a very fair Wind."

An Instance how industriously the French carry on their Fishery, a Correspondent from Bourdeaux writes, that since the first of March last 29 Sails, full loaded, have arrived in that Port from Newfoundland, all belonging to Merchants of that Place; and they have had equal Success at Rochelle and Havre.

The Right Hon. the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have been pleased to appoint William Spry, L. L. D. and one of the Advocates at Doctors Commons, to be Judge of the Court of Vice Admiralty over all America.

June 6. It is reported that a Squadron of Ships of War, with an Admiral, will be sent speedily to the East-Indies, to relieve those already there.

A Printing Press, and all necessary Materials, are now getting ready to be shipped for Pensacola.

June 7. Yesterday Morning the Success, Peterson, from Virginia, arrived off Dover.

They write from Toulon, of the 17th ult. that they were fitting out, with great Expedition, the Heronelle Ship of War, two Frigates, and three Xebecs, supposed to be against the Salatinas.

The Reverend Mr. Entick's Trial with the Messengers is put off until the Sittings after next Term, occasioned by the Defendants moving the Court on Monday last to amend their Plea, which was granted.

June 9. Yesterday a great Quantity of Ammunition and War-like Stores were shipped at the Tower Wharf for Pensacola, as was also a large Quantity of Household Furniture of all Sorts, for the Use of the new Settlers going thither.

Letters from Leghorn, by the Wednesday's Flanders Mail, bring Advice, that 18 Ships were arrived there in 10 Days with Grain, which had reduced the Price greatly, and would occasion considerable Losses by its Fall to the Merchants.

By the extraordinary Preparations now making on board the two Frigates fitting out at Deptford for Sea, each of whom is to carry ten Anchors, besides a Number of Iron Chains and Cables, several Copper Ovens, a large Quantity of Flour, and Tents, with several Watches of a new Construction; it is thought they are going to make joint Observations for determining the Longitude. It seems they are intended for a long Voyage, being both steeved with Copper.

The Hon. Col. Tryon is appointed Lieut. Governor of North-Carolina, and will soon embark for that Place.

B O S T O N, July 19.

Dr. Richard Terrick, Bishop of Peterborough, not Dr. Warburton, is translated to the See of London.—Dr. Lamb, Dean of Peterborough, is nominated Bishop of Peterborough.—Dr. Tarrant, Dean of Carlisle, is appointed Dean of Peterborough.—Dr. Bourn (Author of the Complete Justice of Peace and Ecclesiastical Law) is to succeed to the Deanry of Carlisle.

There are now in the Harbour of Boston, the following Vessels in his Majesty's Service, for the Protection of Trade, viz. The Fortune, of 14 Guns, Capt. Bishop. The Cygnet, of 18 Guns, Capt. Leslie. The Jamaica, of 14 Guns, Capt. Burden. The Magdalene, of 8 Guns, Capt. Douglass. We hear that six other Frigates are ordered for America, besides those which are already here, and were soon to sail from England, for Halifax, to join Lord Colville.

PORTSMOUTH (in New-Hampshire) July 13.

A more exact and circumstantial Account of the Death of Mr. Shirley, who was killed by Lightning about a Fortnight ago, is as follows:—

Mr. James Shirley of Chester, aged 32 Years, a Batchelor, walking by the Side of his Horse, which was led by one Mr. Miller, was instantaneously struck dead by a Flash of Lightning, which proceeded from a small Cloud then rising: The Electric Stream was observed by Persons who were a few Rods distant to fall on his Head: It tore his Hat into many Pieces, singed some of his Hair, then entered his Head just over his right Temple, opened an Orifice to the Skull Bone of about half an Inch diameter; (the Skull Bone not broke) it discoloured the right Side of his Neck, and then proceeded in a right Line across his Breast, down to his left Pocket in his Breaches. It is worthy of Notice, that he had two Dollars in his Pocket, by which the Fire was attracted; the Edges of which were melted, and the Paper which lay near them scorched; from thence it ran down his Leg, scorched the Inside of his Stock, broke his Buckle which was Steel, tore a small Hole in the Foot of his Stocking, and thro' the Sole of his Shoe, and from thence furrow'd the Ground, and split a small Rock near by.—The Horse above-mentioned was killed. Mr. Miller, who led him, had the Bridle on his Arm, which was gouged, and much torn in many Places; yet said Miller was sensible of no Hurt excepting in his Knee and Leg. Mr. Shirley's Countenance was not much altered, nor was the Smell of Sulphur very perceptible. Man knows not his Time.

N E W - L O N D O N, July 20.

By a Vessel from Antigua, we hear that Admiral Tyrrel, was gone from thence to the Islands ceded to the French by the late Treaty, to facilitate the Departure of the English Merchants from said Island.

Twelve Men of War, besides Admiral Tyrrel, were at Antigua about 30 Days ago.

The Account of an English Men of War's going into Turk's Islands, demolishing the Fortifications which the French had erected there, and killing 28 of them, is lately published, is, we hear, premature.

N E W P O R T, July 21.

One Day last Week, a Shark of a very large Size, was

taken by a Number of Whalers, up the River, who went off from Mr. Bower's Ship-Yard. It is said to be 45 Feet in Length, and that the Liver of it will make 10 Barrels of Oil.

NEW-YORK, July 30.

On Tuesday last, in the Ship John, from Newry, Luke Kiersted, Master, there arrived about 300 Passengers; the Rev. Doctor Clark, and 140 of which, on Saturday last embarked, with their Stores, farming and manufacturing Utensils in two Sloops, for Albany; from whence they are to proceed to the Lands near Lake George, which were lately surveyed for their Accommodation. As their principal View is to carry on the Linen and Hempen Manufactures, to which they are all well bred, doubtless they will meet with the good Graces of every true Friend to this Province, especially at this Juncture, when their Encouragement is so absolutely necessary; and it is said there are many others who will soon follow their laudable Example.

ANNAPOLIS, August 9.

By Capt. Thompson we are informed, That on Wednesday the 25th of last Month, Two Women were killed near Fort Loudoun, in Cumberland County. On Thursday the 26th, at a School-House, near Capt. Potter's in Conococheague, Robert Brown, and Nine Children, were scalped, and Four Children were carried off Prisoners. Two of the Nine Children that were scalped, are yet living, and say, that Four Indians did the Damage at the School-House. The School-Master was shot, and the Children killed with Tomahawks.

The Ship Eagle, from London, is arrived in Choptank, after a Passage of Thirteen Weeks; But Capt. JOHN LEWIS, late Commander, Died on his Passage.

DANZICK, May 16.

POLAND is now divided into three Parties, and there is great Reason to fear the Election of a new King will not pass without Bloodshed. The three Parties are, that of the Grand General of the Crown, that of Count Poniatowsky, and that of the Neuters. The first may be called the Party of Saxony, which is very powerful, having at its Head a Man of great Abilities, who will probably be supported by the Crown Troops; and he talks of holding another Dyet, in Opposition to that which has been sitting since the 7th of this Month at Warsaw. As to the second Party, Count Poniatowsky's, he has the Russians on his Side, and all the Interest of the Czartorinsky Family. The third, called Neuters, do not make so much Noise at present as the two Others; but, according to Appearance, that Party will have its Day, and sooner or later the Balance may turn on which Side they take, when they see a proper Moment.

P. S. We just now hear, that the Great General of the Crown has assembled the greatest Part of the national Army at Kosenice, and that he is well supplied with Arms and Artillery. The Russians keep their Position round Warsaw, and are entrencing, to secure themselves against a Surprise.

Warsaw, May 10. The Senators, to the Number of 22, drew up and signed the 7th Inst. a Manifesto against the Dyet, the principal Articles of which are as follow:

1. The Dyet cannot be held in Presence of the foreign Troops that surround the City.
 2. The Senators did not engage the Russians to come; they gave no Thanks for their being sent, and have not any way given Occasion for their Arrival.
 3. The Russians have committed an Act of Violence in Lithuania, by favouring a pernicious Confederacy made for disturbing the public Tranquillity.
 4. It is against all Justice, that in the Memorial of the Russian Ministers, delivered to the Primate the 4th Inst. the Troops of the Crown are accused of having meddled in the Dyetines, and other public Acts.
 5. It is by the unjust Proceedings of the same foreign Troops, that the General Dyetine of Prussia has proved abortive; and this is another Motive for protesting against this Dyet.
 6. All good Patriots, who love Justice, are invited to unite for the Support of Liberty.
- At the End of this Manifesto there is an Adhesion to the Protests of the Senators, signed by 45 Nuncios.

LONDON, June 2.

Letters from the South of France say, that within a few Months 2077 Persons from Germany have been shipped off, from Marseilles, for the French West India Colonies to settle there.

The Giant which is arrived at Dresden from Trent, to make a Show of himself, is five Ells of their Measure; at 27 Inches to their Ell, he is 11 Feet 3 Inches tall.

Extract of a Letter from Dublin to a Friend in London, May 19, 1764.

"Lord and Lady Northumberland have just left this Kingdom, to the universal Regret of all Ranks and Degrees of People. I never saw any thing like it: I happened to mix among the Populace at the Water-side, and the Prayers, Ejaculations, and fervent Wishes poured forth for their safe Voyage and long Continuance in the Government, had such an Effect on me.—It was too much for a Mind of the least Sensibility. I quitted the Crowd, retired Home, and watched the Wind 'till it was dark.

"In the Memory of us now alive, or of our Fathers, there have been but four Vice-roys of Ireland, distinguished with Honour among us. The Duke of Ormond won the Affections of the People, by Liberty; the Duke of Dorset gained the Confidence of Men by a steady Adherence to his Word; and the Lord Chesterfield merited the Esteem of this whole Kingdom, by his equal and impartial Conduct towards all Parties, whether of Court or Country, Protestant or Papist.

"Lord Northumberland has equalled the two latter, has exceeded the first, and to their valuable Characteristics, has added an infinitely higher one of his own, namely, a most extensive Charity. He was not content alone with being the best Vicegerent of the best of Kings, but he would be the Almshouse also of the King of Kings."

June 5. An eminent Tradesman is now setting a Quantity of Jewels for a Lady of Quality to appear in on his Majesty's Birth-Day, said to be worth One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Pounds.

Last Monday, Mr. Arnold, Watchmaker, in Devereux Court, Temple Bar, waited upon his Majesty with a curious Repeating Watch, set in a Ring, which was made by his Majesty's Command: Mr. Arnold had the Honour of being introduced to their Majesties, the Princess Dowager of Wales, and the Prince of Mecklenburgh, who were all graciously pleased to show their Approbation to so excellent a Piece of Mechanism.

The Size of the Watch is something less than a Silver Two-pence; it contains One Hundred and Twenty different Parts, and all together weighs no more than 5 D^{ms}. 7 G^{rs}. and 1/2th.

Thursday Se'ennight a shocking Murder was committed in the Parish of Stanton Quington, near Malmesbury, in Wiltshire, by William Jaques, otherwise Spencer, a Sailor, on the Body of George Hartford, a Black. The Murderer being born in the Neighbourhood of Malmesbury, enticed this poor Wretch (George Hartford, a Negro, who had been formerly a Servant to William Liffon, Esq; of Acton, in Wiltshire, but late his Shipmate on board the Stag Man of War, and had been discharged at the same Time) to accompany him to see his Friends, and having consumed the Money he had received, the generous Negro, who had near 40l. left of his Wages and Prize-Money, bid him freely partake of it while it lasted, or till he could have Employment, and supplied him with whatever he wanted: But, lost to all Sense of Gratitude, this execrable Wretch, under Pretence of going to Bristol for Employment, led him into a Wood belonging to Lord Viscount Polkstone, near Malmesbury, where he murdered his Friend with a large Oak Stick which he cut in the Wood, and left it there as an Evidence of his Guilt. The Skull of the Deceased was fractured in many Places, one Eye beaten out of the Socket, the Bones of his Nose were beaten to a Mash, and under his Head, in an old Wheel Rut, was a great deal of coagulated Blood, which had issued from many large Wounds in his Head. In this Condition a poor Woman found him, being led to the Place where he lay by his Groans, which she thought might come from a Horse or a Cow that could not get up. Finding her Mistake, she hastened back to the Village, about a Quarter of a Mile from the Place, and brought some People time enough to see him expire. The Officers of the Parish sent immediately to the Devoizes for the Coroner, and on the Road the Messenger happened to meet the Rev. Mr. Shergold, Rector of Stanton, on his return home, he presently recollected that about an Hour before, he had met a Sailor, who answered the Description given of Jaques, and recommended to the Man to make Haste to the Devoizes, and inform the Coroner thereof. Mr. Clary, the Coroner, being thus prepared, kept a sharp Look-out for the Villain, and in the Evening met with him in the Market-Place, apprehended and committed him to Salisbury Goal. The Negro had been indentified, and part of his Clothes (all that were missing) were found upon the Villain when taken. He denies that he committed the Murder, but says that he stood by while Charles Morgan, another Sailor, did it; and that he received a Share of the Money and Clothes from Morgan. Jaques had washed his Stockings which he had on an Hour before the Man was killed, but could not get the Blood out of them. From this, and other strange Circumstances, it is generally thought he had no Accomplice.

June 9. We hear that Captains Alexander Hays and Broadstreet have each obtained Grants of 5000 Acres of Land, on the Dartmouth Side of Halifax in Nova-Scotia; on which it is said there are valuable Coal Mines, that will turn out to a large Account.

BOSTON, July 30.

The Surveyor General has appointed William Jenkins, and Thomas Oldfield, Esqrs. of his Majesty's Ship Maidstone, and William Roberts, Esq; of his Majesty's Ship Romney, to be Officers of the Customs, to seize prohibited and uncustomed Goods, in North-America.

We hear from Rocky-Hill, in Connecticut, that a Negro Fellow belonging to Mr. Brandybee, having been offended, took a Knife, with a Flint, and ran up to the Garret, where was a Half Barrel of Powder open, and struck Fire therein, which blew the Negro and the Roof of the House, into the Air, and tore him to Pieces. A Man in the House saw him strike Fire once, which did not catch, and saved himself by running down Stairs just before the Explosion.

NEW-YORK, August 6.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint the following Gentlemen on the Staff of North-America: The Hon. Richard Maitland, Deputy Adjutant General. The Hon. William Harvey, Thomas Moncrieff, Esq; and Philip Skene, Esq; Majors of Brigade.

We hear Monsieur de Boulemaque, Governor of Guadaloupe, died in that Island, and that he is much lamented by the Inhabitants. He distinguished himself as a General Officer in Canada.

The 29th ult. in the Evening, Capt. Hunt, arrived here from Turks Island, in 12 Days: He says the French have erected there two Monuments of 80 Feet high, one of which is on the Grand Key, and the other on the Sandy Key; they are built entirely of Stone, and the Materials were brought from Old France: The 64 Gun Ship, Brig and Xebeck, after leaving a few People to keep Possession of their Works went to Cape Francois, and from thence were to proceed for Cape Nicholas, in order to erect some strong Fortifications on the Mold; after which they gave out they were to return with Settlers for Turks Island, and that they were fully determined, in case of another War, to cut off all Supplies from the Island of Jamaica.

PHILADELPHIA, August 9.

From Carlisle we have the following melancholy Intelligence, viz. That on Sunday the 22d ult. 2 or 3 Indians were seen near Fort Loudoun: That on the Wednesday following, a Woman, named Cunningham, big with Child, was going from her own House to one Justice M'Dowell's, about two Miles below Loudoun, she was met with by the Savages, who murdered, scalped, and otherwise most horribly abused her, ripping her Belly open, and taking out the Child, which they left lying beside her: That another Woman, named Jamieson, was missing, supposed to be carried off: That on the 26th of July, in the Forenoon, the Boatman came upon a School-house, on Conococheague Creek, about 12 or 15 Miles from Fort Loudoun, in the very Heart of the Settlement, where they killed and scalped the Master, one Brown, and Nine of his Scholars: That there were four more belonging to the School, who, it is thought were made Prisoners, as they had not been heard of: That this bloody Massacre was first discovered by a Man passing by, who, hearing no Noise in the School, went in, and saw the Master lying scalped, with his Bible under his Arm: That one of the Scholars was then alive (but died soon after) who told him, there were four Indians, who were not seen till they entered the House: That two of the Children then murdered, belonged to an unhappy Man, who had four others carried off by the Savages last War: That several small Parties of the Enemy were said to be seen in that Settlement: And that a Stroke struck so far in the settled Part of the Country, it was feared, would occasion many of the Inhabitants to leave their Places.

We have likewise Advice from Carlisle, that one Ensign Smith (a brave young Man, and who had been Prisoner some Years among the Indians) went out, with 7 Men, as a scouting Party: That they travelled 70 Miles below Fort Pitt, till they came to a Place called Crow's Town, on the Ohio, which they found abandoned, and the Houses burnt: That the Houses on Beaver Creek were likewise deserted, but not destroyed: And that they found a few Tracks, but did not see an Indian but

but one, during their fatiguing March, watching a working Party at Fort Pitt, who they tried to come up with, but could not.

Tuesday the Ship Chance, Capt. Smith, arrived here from Rotterdam with Palatines.

L O N D O N, June 6.

YESTERDAY between Twelve and One in the Morning, a dreadful Fire broke out in the House of Mr. Bayley, Book-Binder and Stationer, near the Devil's Gap, at the Top of Wild-Street, Drury-Lane, which soon consumed that House, with the other three lesser Buildings adjoining. The back Part of the House of Mr. Aden, Stone-Cutter, also in Wild-Street, was burnt, and the House greatly damaged. The Wind being Easterly, between One and Two, the Flames reached the Houses of Mr. Johnston, Shoemaker, and Mr. Hunt, Haberdasher, in Drury-Lane, which are also entirely burnt down; and the Houses of Mr. Archer, Cheesemonger, Mr. Doyley, Silversmith, Mr. Wall, Pork-seller, and Mr. Coney, Chandler, all in the said Street, are so much burnt and damaged, particularly in the back Parts, that they are rendered unfit for Service till rebuilt. The back Offices of the White-Horse Ale-House, are burnt down, but the Fore-House was saved by the back and partition Walls; as was the House of Messrs. Horth and Comp. Painters, which stands next the Devil's Gap. The Flame was so strong, that it thrice set on Fire the House of Mr. Hearne, Apothecary, on the East Side of Wild-Street, and opposite to Mr. Bayley's; and had it not been for the Assistance of four Engines, which kept playing on that and Mr. Fryer's House, they, and others adjoining, had been burnt down. On the first Alarm, several Engines and Fire-men attended, so that in a little Time there were no less than 16 or 18 Engines present; but what added to the general Confusion, several Fire Plugs, particularly opposite to Mr. Fryer's, were paved over; however, some of the Fire-men knowing the Place, caused the Pavement to be dug up, and luckily discovered the Plug, otherwise it might not have been found, as the Mark was off the Wall. We don't hear of any Lives being lost, tho' one elderly Gentlewoman was so much bruised, that her Life is despaired of; and as it was in the Dead of the Night, and People mostly asleep, many lost most of their Effects and Furniture. It is reckoned between 20 and 30 Families are burnt out.

The Holy Trinity, a Spanish Ship of great Burthen, taken at the Manillas by Admiral Cornish, is arrived at Plymouth. She came Home under Convoy of the Grafton and Lenox Men of War. It was with great Difficulty they steered her, being very foul. Many People go on board out of Curiosity, to see the Ship and a fine She Tiger. There is also come in her a Serpent, said to be 14 Feet long, eats only once a Month, and then changes its Skin. Some affirm that this Snake is quite harmless.

Between Twelve and One o'Clock Yesterday Morning, a Fire broke out at the Horse and Groom Public House, at the End of Willow-Walk, Tothill-Fields; which in a short Time entirely consumed the whole House, together with all the Furniture, and Stock in Trade, to a considerable Amount. It was first discovered by some Night-men going by with their Carts, who gave the Alarm; and the Family saved their Lives by jumping naked out of the Windows. A young Woman, just come out of the Country, Sister to the Master of the House, lost all her Cloaths and Money, to the Amount of 50 l. The Man of the House saved his Child by jumping out of the one Pair of Stairs Window with it under his Arm, and happily received very little Hurt.

June 11. It is reported some more Ships will soon be put into Commission, to be stationed at Newfoundland, for the Protection of the Fishery.

We are informed, that those French Settlers on the Island of Grenada have chosen to retire from it, have sold their Lands to the Amount of Twelve Thousand odd Hundred Acres, with the Buildings, Slaves, &c. thereon, to English Purchasers, for Sums that amount to between Eight and Nine Hundred Thousand Pounds Sterling; which surely makes that Island rather a Purchase than a Conquest.

The Empress of Russia has issued an Ordinance against Usurers.

The Election Day of the King of Poland is appointed for the 20th of August next.

They write from France, that 4 Vessels having been lately bought up in the Port of Brest, loaded chiefly with Ammunition and warlike Stores, by a Person who afterwards appeared to be an Agent from the Malcontents of Corsica, who had also engaged several foreign Seamen at high Wages, an Order was dispatched from Court to stop them, but arrived two Days after the four Ships had put to Sea, on which a Frigate of 36 Guns was sent out in Quest of them, but it was thought as they were all clean Ships, and apparently designed for War, it would be difficult to overtake them.

As soon as his Excellency Governor Johnston arrives at Pensacola, a thorough Survey is to be taken; how far several Plans lately brought over for the Erection of Towns, Ports, and other Places convenient for Trade and Security, agrees with the Truth; after which the Inhabitants, assisted by the Military, are to set about completing such Works as may be found more immediately necessary for the above Purposes.

A great many Bags of different Sorts of Seeds, the Growth of England and foreign Parts, have been shipped aboard the Grampus Store Ship for Pensacola; in order to ascertain how far the Culture of these Vegetables will correspond with the Climate of Florida.

Friday a Cause came on, in the Court of Common Pleas, Westminster Hall, before Lord Chief Justice Pratt, wherein Mr. Brackstone, of Covent-Garden, was Plaintiff, and one of those young Gentlemen, styled Bucks, Defendant, for assaulting Mr. Brackstone in his own Shop; when, after two or three Evidences were examined, the Defendant, by his Council, offered to ask Pardon in the open Court, and pay Costs: It was then asked Mr. Brackstone, if that would be making him Satisfaction.—But as the Outrage was so great, and attended with bad Consequences to the Plaintiff's Wife, Mr. Brackstone told the Court, that he came there as an Englishman, and was desirous it might be made appear, that our Laws were made to protect the Innocent, and punish the Guilty; and that he cheerfully submitted his Cause to the Verdict of his Twelve worthy Countrymen, the Jury. Accordingly after the Charge was given by the Judge, the Jury (which was special) withdrew for about ten Minutes, and brought in a Verdict of 200 l. Damages, with Costs.

They write from Hamburg of the first Instant, that by Letters from Poland, they had an Account, that the Empress of Russia had ordered her Forces, which were on the Frontiers, amounting to 40,000 Men, to march into Poland, in order to join those Troops, that are in the Neighbourhood of Warsaw, to support them, in case of a Rupture, they being too weak.

It is remarkable that Count Branicki, who so strenuously opposes the Elevation of the Count Poniatowski to the Crown, is married to Count Poniatowski's second Sister. They are both of them Noblemen of great Courage, Eloquence, Fortune and Abilities; and Poniatowski, whose House has flourished upwards of 600 Years in Poland, besides a most liberal Education, is said likewise to have travelled much. His eldest Brother is Great Chamberlain of the Crown, and his Father was distinguished for the Part he acted in the Wars of Charles the Twelfth of Sweden, by whom he was much esteemed.

June 12. It is said that some Difficulties have lately arisen with respect to the Ransom Money to be paid for taking the Manillas.

Translation of the Duke de Choiseul's Letter to M. de Kaubereil, concerning the Pension settled on him.

S I R,

"The King having caused a particular Account of the Affairs of Canada to be laid before him, for an Enquiry into which you have been confined in the Baskie; his Majesty has with Pleasure found, that your Conduct in the Administration entrusted to you, has been clear of all Reproach: On my acquainting his Majesty that your Disinterestedness and Probity had brought you into Circumstances that required some Relief; he has been pleased to

grant you, as a Mark of his Satisfaction for your Services, a Pension of Six Thousand Livres on the Revenues of the Colonies, exclusive of another of the like Sum before granted to you, as usually belonging to the Grand Croix of the Order of St. Lewis, with which his Majesty was pleased to decorate you. I hereto annex the Brevet for the Pension which you are to enjoy out of the Fonds of the Colonies, and which you will receive by yearly Payments, to begin from the first Day of January last. It is with Pleasure that I have contributed to procure you this Recompence from his Majesty. I have the Honour to be most perfectly, &c.

The Duke de Choiseul. We are told from Paris, that his Most Christian Majesty, in Return for the Hotel d'Evreux, which was bequeathed him by Madam de Pompadour, has presented the Marquis de Marigny, her Brother and principal Heir, with the Hotel de Belle Isle, and 500,000 Livres, by way of Equivalent.

It is reported that his Majesty, on his Birth Day, was most graciously pleased to order the Lords of the Admiralty to confirm the Commissions of Sea Officers who acted as Captains in the late War, as Vacancies should happen by the Death of Captains at Home. It must give great Joy to those Lieutenants who had the Misfortune to want Friends, that their King has thus engaged himself on their Behalf.

B O S T O N, August 5.

Capt. Smith, who arrived here a few Days ago from Liverpool, informs, that off Cape Clear, on the South West Coast of Ireland, he spoke with a Vessel bound from North-Carolina to the Isle of Man, who told him, that a few Days before, they took up the Crew of a Ship belonging to Mr. Gould of that Place, that had foundered at Sea; but as the Wind blew very hard he could not understand the Master's Name, nor where she was bound. Capt. Baker lately sailed from hence in a Ship for Bristol, belonging to Mr. Robert Gould; and Captain Cullam, in another Ship, owned by Mr. John Gould, it is said was on her Passage from the West-Indies to London; so that it is uncertain which of them is the unfortunate Vessel mentioned above.

N E W P O R T, August 6.

The General Assembly of this Colony at their last Session, taking into Consideration the numerous Distresses this Continent is likely to labour under, from the late Act of Parliament, respecting Trade, and the proposed Stamp Duty, if it should take Effect, have appointed a Committee, to join with any Committee or Committees, that shall be appointed, by any of his Majesty's Colonies, in such Measures as they shall think most proper and effectual for the obtaining a Repeal of the said Act, or, at least, for procuring the Duties to be lessened; Also to prevent the levying a Stamp Duty in the Colonies: And, generally, for the Prevention of all such Duties, Taxes, or Impositions upon the Colonists, as are inconsistent with their Rights, Liberties, and Privileges as British Subjects.

N E W - Y O R K, August 13.

Yesterday Se'enight the Brig Dispatch, Capt. Gifford, arrived here in 29 Days from Dominico.—The following are the Particulars of the Affair relating to Messieurs Forsley's Brig of New-London, on the Coast of Africa, viz. On the 19th of June came into St. Domingo, the Boat and Crew that belonged to the said Brig, Capt. Gould, late Master, who gave this Account: That on the 13th Day of May, as they were weighing Anchor at Senegal, bound to Gorree, and having on board 43 Slaves, they suddenly rose and killed Captain Gould, and two of his Men, on the Quarter Deck: That on the Remainder of the Crew's running aft, thinking to secure the Arm Chest, the Negroes fled below, where being instantly confined, the Vessel came off the Coast, designed for the West-Indies, under the command of George Taggot, who then commenced Master, the Mate having been turned out by Capt. Gould, soon after they left New-London. That the Negroes rose a second Time, at Sea, and killed the Carpenter, when the Whitemen were obliged to fire, killing eight Slaves downright, then doubly

barricaded the Rest. That they afterwards put into St. Thomas's, where Taggot was encouraged by a Spaniard to go down to Porto-Rico to sell the Negroes, and he set sail directly; but on his Arrival the Spaniards put the Trick on him, by first going on board with a Number, under Pretence of Trade, seizing the Vessel, and carrying the Crew into his Boat, with Intent to imprison them on Shore: That on their way thither the Englishmen ran off with the Boat down to Mona, where they landed the Spaniard who gave the Encouragement; from thence they went to St. Domingo, and some of them afterwards proceeded to Jamaica to give Information; but the Brig and Cargo, we are told, are confiscated by the Tenor of Treaties.

A Sloop, Campbell Master, of Jamaica, bound to the Grenades with King's Stores, having sprung a Leak on her Passage, and not being able to beat up, fell to Leeward, and designed for Jamaica, but was drove on Shore, on the South Side of Hispaniola, where the Vessel and Cargo were lost, and ten Persons drowned.

ANNAPOLIS, August 23.

Tuesday last about Noon, a Quarrel happened in our Jail, between two Prisoners about their Dinner, which came to Blows; and after exchanging a few Knocks, one of them, Robert Yiddall, fell down and instantly Expired. He has left a poor Widow and Eight Children.

Monday last arrived here from Bristol, the *Albion*, Capt. Thomas Spencer, after a long Passage, with about 100 Passengers, sent in by his Majesty to tarry in his American Colonies for the Term of Seven Years. It seems they were very loth to leave their Native Country, and endeavour'd, soon after sailing, to conquer the Ship's Company, and take the Vessel under their own Command; but after the Company's Firing among them, and Gripping some, they were subdued.

A few Days ago, a Barn belonging to Mr. James Dickson in Talbot County, Rented to a Tenant, was burnt to the Ground, with about 700 Bushels of Wheat in it; and is supposed to have been set on Fire by some very ill disposed Person, as no Fire was near it, except what must have been carried for so Wicked a Purpose.

The Brig *Free-Mason*, of this Place, lately sail'd, had one of her Hands Drown'd in the Bay; his Name was John Foul, a Lad who lately belong'd to Mr. Middleton.

Extract of a Letter from Islamabad, in the East-Indies, December 2, 1763.

COSSIM ALY, about the 6th of October last, committed the most barbarous Massacre at Patna, on our People, to the Number of about 58, chiefly military Officers and covenanted Servants, who were unfortunately his Prisoners, dragging them out one after another, and butchering them all in one Day, in the most cruel and unheard of Manner. Unfatiated with this he continued the Massacre to every private European in his Possession, and even of his own Subjects; he left not a Man alive of either Power or Substance in this Country. As soon as the melancholy Tidings reached Calcutta, a Cloud of Sorrow overspread the whole Settlement for the Loss of so many valuable Men, a general Fast was observed, and a mourning of 14 Days.

"The Army continued their March to Patna, which they took by Storm, November 6, after a very obstinate Defence, in which the Enemy had 1000 Men killed. About 30 Europeans and 150 Seapoys were killed or wounded on our Side. The Nabob Cossim Aly is retired into the Subah of Oude's Dominions, with the small Remains of his Army, and a Treasure more than Three Millions in Specie, besides Jewels and other valuable Effects, which will still make him formidable.

"Among those who suffered by the Massacre, were Messieurs Ellis, chief of Patna; Hay, of the Council of Calcutta; Lethington, second of Patna; Gentlemen of great Merit, who had formerly survived the Black Hole, after that accompanied Lord Clive in his Success, now fell by the Hands of a common Executioner. Much about the same Time were put to Death, Seat Motchray and his Brother, two Bankers, esteemed the richest Subjects in the World.

"Mr. Fullerton, Surgeon to the Patna Factory, was the only Person that escaped the Massacre."

June 18. Wednesday his Majesty in Council was pleased to order 25 Grants, to different Persons, of a great Number of Acres of Land in the Country of Florida, in America.

Yesterday his Majesty was pleased to appoint his Royal Highness Prince William Henry to the Command of the Coldstream Regiment, in the Room of Lord Tyravley, who has resigned.

It is said a Disturbance has been issued out against a great Personage, and three of the King's Messengers, at the Suit of Mr. Beadmore's Clerk, who was several Days confined on Account of the Monitor.

Yesterday the Purser of the Orderly, Vincent, arrived at the India-house, with the News of that Ship's being arrived in the Downs, from Bengal; she has brought Advice, that every Thing was re-settled there on its former Footing, and Peace and Tranquillity restored since the taking of Mongear and Patna, from Cossim Aly, in the former of which Places 2000 of the Enemy surrendered at Discretion.

It is said 80 non-commissioned Officers and Soldiers, suffered at Patna, besides the Gentlemen of the English Factory there.

The Diet is now sitting at Warsaw, for the Choice of a King, where the Disputes run high; when the Affair of Religion came upon the Carpet, Sabres were drawn, because there seemed to be a Design to favour the Protestants. It has therefore been resolved that the Person to be chosen King ought to be, both by Father and Mother, a Descendant of a Polish House, and of the Roman Catholic Religion.

Some Advice from Warsaw remark, that there has been several Rencontres between the Armies of the contending Parties for the Crown.

Advices from Warsaw say, that the Crown Army have elected Count Branicki their General, to be King of Poland, and alledge as a Reason for it, that it was done in order to be before hand with the Diet.

It is said that a common Seaman's Share of the rich Spanish Prize, the Santissima Trinidad, will amount to 600 l.

Yesterday was brought to the Bank from Portsmouth, in two Waggon, guarded by a Party of Sailors, about three Tons of Money, among which was a considerable quantity of Gold, brought home in the Deptford Man of War from the Havannah. The above Ship brings Advice, that the English Affairs in that Island will not be so soon finished as was expected.

A CASE to the Gentlemen of the Law.

WILL WEBSTER, of Stamford, sold as good a Cup of Ale as ever mantled or nitted in a Beer-Glass. He was bred a Baker, and as it is common in the Country, he also sold Bread; and it was as usual for Working People to call for a Penny Loaf, as a Penny-worth of Ale, at his House.

A Man came to Webster's one Day, and wanted six Penny Loaves—Webster served him as he sat in the Drinking-Room; but after six Loaves had been sold out to the Fellow, says the Man, Master Webster, take one of your Loaves back, I'll have but few, and bring me a Penny-worth of Ale, that will make up Six-pence all the same.

The Man drank up his Penny-worth, called for another Cup of Ale, returned the Landlord a Loaf, and so on, until he had exchanged all the six Loaves for six Penny-worth of Ale. Then rising up to go, the Landlord demanded his Reckoning: For what? quoth the Man—For my Bread, replied the Landlord. Have you not had it again? was the Customer's Answer. Then pay me for my Ale, replied the Publican: I gave you Bread for it, answered the Defendant. Upon what can the Landlord bring his Action?

B O S T O N, August 13.

English Cheese is now hawk'd about the Streets of this Town at 2 d. Sterling per lb. so as to see the People from purchasing any Manufacture, Remittance for which is likely to be so difficult, if not impossible to be made.

We are informed that large Demands are made upon this Province from New-York for Wool, the People there being determined immediately to set forward that Manufacture with the utmost Vigour.

We are credibly informed, that a Subscription will be set on Foot within six Months, for no Person to wear British Manufacture of any Kind, above 6 s. Sterling Price, and 'tis said it will certainly be effected.

A WHITE NEGRO is to be seen at the White-Horse.—This is thought by some to be a Specimen of what may be very common a few Years hence, tho' at present a great Curiosity.

Extract of a Letter from Quebec, May 30.

"We have Chief Justice Gregory, with some Attorneys at Law, &c. lately arrived here, but it is thought that the Civil Government will not take place till some time in September, at which Time, by the Treaty of Peace, all the Inhabitants that do not go to France must become British Subjects; but the Number which we shall lose on the Occasion will be very inconsiderable, as we have by every Ship from England, French reduced Officers of the Colony Troops, and those that have Connections in this Country, coming over to take up their Quarters and settle, who are generally very much dissatisfied with their Reception and Treatment in France.—Every Thing remains quiet in the Upper Country, though it is said by some late Letters that the Savages are making Preparations to open the Campaign. The 300 Canadian Volunteers which were raised and went from hence, are arrived some time past at Oswego. The several Nations of Indians about this Place have taken up the War-Hatchet in our Favour. Sixty Warriors are already gone to join Sir William Johnson, and about 60 more are preparing to set out."

N E W - Y O R K, August 20.

Extract of a Letter from Niagara, dated July 15, 1764.

"Last Sunday Afternoon the Snow Johnson arrived here from Ontario, with Sir William on board; who since his Arrival has been much busied in holding Councils with the Indians, of whom there are now at this Place above 1000, of different Nations, some to join and proceed with the Army; some with Peltry, expelling Trade to be opened; and others to treat of Peace. This Morning 105 Men of the Polles Avoines, arrived here, and are now in Council in the Fort. The Senecas have been expected for several Days past, but are not yet come in: We are informed that there are about 900 of them and the Delawares assembled together. It is whispered about, that if they don't come in, in a few Days, the Army will march against them. The Army in the Boats was 8 Days in the Passage from Fort Ontario hither, having met with some violent Storms, in which four of the largest Boats were cast away and wrecked to Pieces; the Men's Lives were all saved, and most of the Provisions and Baggage. About two-thirds of the Army, with their Boats, &c. are got over the Carrying Place, and the Remainder will be over in two or three Days. We have now four Vessels on Lake Erie; the last of which set out for Detroit Yesterday. A few Days ago, a Soldier was fired at by an Indian on the Carrying-Place; the Ball struck his Haversack, the things therein prevented its entering his Body; he returned the Fire, and made his Escape to one of the little Posts. If Sir William's indefatigable Diligence and Influence over the Indians does not prevent it, we'll be at Loggerheads with them in a few Days."

Extract of a Letter from Niagara, August 2.

"We are here, attending the Congress Day after Day, with about 1200 Indians of different Nations, some of whom have come 600 Miles. They have concluded a peace with Sir William Johnson, except the Delawares and Shawanese, whom we have, near a Month, waited for, as they are to bring their Prisoners, in order to be delivered up. We expect to set off for Detroit in a few days, having every thing ready for that purpose."

Another Account of Indian Affairs.

Our Advices from Above, relating to Sir William Johnson, his Expedition to Niagara, are of several dates, equally of good Authority: They affirm, That there are upwards of 2000 Indians of different Tribes attending the Treaty, some to join and proceed with the Army, some with Peltry expelling Trade to be opened, and others to treat of Peace, some of whom it is said came the Distance of 600 Miles: That Sir William, having made Peace with all the Nations of Indians that were there, on the 6th of August left Niagara, and on the 7th returned safe to Fort Ontario. That by this Peace the Delawares are to give up two of their principal People, for the Performance of which three Seneca Chiefs are now Hostages at Fort Ontario. And, That Col. Bradstreet, with his Army, left Niagara the 6th of August, on his Way to Detroit.

A N N A P O L I S, August 30.

Malcom of this Place, and made Oath before the Secretary. That he was lately at Turks-Island, one of the Bahamas, when a 64 Gun French Ship of War, and four Frigates came there, and burnt and destroyed all the Settlements there belonging to the English, to the Amount of about 150 Families, and carried off all their Effects: That some of the Inhabitants went to the French Governor at Cape-François, for Redress, but he told them, his Orders from the King his Master were, to suffer no English to settle there: We imagine here, from what the Captain reports, that the Spaniards lay Claim to that Island, and have given it with Part of Hispaniola in Exchange for Louisiana; however, there are some Men of War gone in Quest of them, and I hope will give a good Account of them. I think they begin full early.
