NEW-YORK. April 11.
SATURDAY last His Majesty's PACKET-BOAT the HARRIOT, Capt. ROBINSON, arrived here from Falmouth, which she left the 5th of February. From the Public Papers to Feb. 18, are collected the following Advices, viz.

RATISBON, December 27.

THE King of Prussia will not consent to a Suspension of Arms in the Empire unless the Army of the Circles immediately leave Franconia, and return to Bohemia.

Rotterdam, January 4. The Weather continues very severe; and the Entrance of the Maeze and Gores are so full of Ice, that several Ships, that were coming in, have been obliged to put back to Sea.

Berlin, January 1. The King will agree to no Cessation of Arms with the Army of the Circles, but on Condition that the Troops of that Army be called home in the Spring, and that the Austrians consent to an immediate Exchange of Prisoners.

Paris, Jan. 3. The Number of Infantry to be kept on Foot in Time of Peace is fixed at 89,476, including 22,240 for the Service of the Colonies.

Cologne, Jan. 7. The 5th Instant, at 4 in the Evening, 1600 Prussian Troops took Possession of Keyserwerth; when two Companies belonging to the Elector of Cologne, who were in Garrison there, marched out.

Petersburgh, Dec. 7. The Frost was so severe in the Night of the 1st Instant, that next Day the River Neva was passable on the Ice.

Madrid, Dec. 31. Orders are given to disarm all our Ships of War except such a Number as may be sufficient to curb the Barbary Corsairs, and escort the Flotillas and Galleons.

Upon Enquiry into the Conduct of our Sea and Land Officers, during the Siege of the Havannah, it has appeared that none of them were in Fault.

Ratisbon, Jan. 13. On the 10th the Dyets resumed its Deliberations, when the Minister of Mentz proposed the Neutrality, and desired thereupon the Sentiments of the Assembly. The Minister of Brunswick declared, that his Britannick Majesty would support with all his Force, such of the States of the Empire as were desirous of restoring and preserving the Public Tranquillity. The Minister of Brandenburg renewed his Proposition of immediate and absolute Neutrality, and expatiated on its advantageous Consequences; the Ministers of Mentz, Treves, and Cologne, reserved their Opinions; but the Ministers from the Electors of Bavaria and Palatine declared roundly, that the Miseries of the War were such as could be no longer endured; and that if Peace did not immediately ensue, they were for settling, without Loss of Time, a Neutrality with his Prussian Majesty. The Minister of Bohemia declared, that he could give no Opinion for Want of Instructions.

Hamburg, Jan. 21. The two principal Difficulties that retard the Accommodation between the Courts of Vienna and Berlin, are the indemnifying of the Elector of Saxony, and the Possession of the County of Glatz, which is, as it were, the Gate between Bohemia and Silesia. This last retarded for some Weeks the Treaty of Breslau in 1742.

Franconia, Jan. 15. Though Letters from Saxony still Talk of Peace, we are informed that the King of Prussia flatly refuses to indemnify Saxony, as he did not begin the War; but that if the House of Austria, or its Allies, will indemnify Saxony, he will not oppose it.

Erfurt, Jan. 17. According to all Appearances, the Negotiations for Peace do not promise the Success expected; and according to the Behaviour of the Prussian Troops, there is little Reason to expect any Thing in Favour of the Saxons. The severest Threats, and actual Executions, are carried on without ceasing; and universal Misery increases daily. On the 13th the subaltern Officers in Leipzick were sent round to acquaint all the Inhabitants, that unless they brought, within the Space of 48 Hours, their Quota of the Contributions demanded of them, the Plundering, to which they were liable, should of a Certainty be inflicted on them upon the 16th.

Hague, Jan. 25. Some Letters tell us, that an Armistice between the Troops of the Empire and the King of Prussia, was signed the 11th Instant.

Dungarvan, Dec. 31. This Morning a Ship from Newfoundland was wrecked on the Gainers, two Miles from the Quay, the Master, Crew, and 62 Passengers miserably perished; 12 Passengers were saved, who are greatly maimed and bruised. A Virginia Man, of about 300 Tons, bound to Bristol, laden with Tobacco, was stranded this Day, about two Miles from us, where it is greatly feared she will be beat to Pieces: The Captain died at Sea, and the first Mate was washed overboard Yesterday; the Remainder of the Crew are safe here.

Cork, Jan. 6. The Grand Charles Privateer of Bilbao, of 24 Guns, and 200 Men, has taken within these 14 Days, the Elisabeth, Capt. Heysham, from Martinico for Lancaster, with Sugar and Coffee; a Vessel from Waterford for Jamaica, with Provisions; a Sloop from Newfoundland for Pool, with Oil; a Snow from Piscataqua for Bristol; and a Brig from Maryland for Cork. The Privateer was to cruise to the Westward of Cape Clear to the third Instant, and then Westward of the Canary Islands, for the Remainder of the Time stipulated by Treaty to make Prizes. There are a great Number of Spanish Privateers cruising to the Westward, who have met with extraordinary Success.

L O N D O N.

December 30. The Thames in many Places is frozen in such a Manner as to prevent People getting to and from the Ships, and the Watermens Boats are quite froze in; and should it continue to freeze but two Days longer, it is feared the Navigation of the River will be quite stopped. It is said by many People, that the Frost has been equally intense as it was in the Year 1739.

January 1. The River is in some Places frozen over. It wears nearly the same Aspect as in the Year 1740, resembling a great Number of Ruins, the Tide in going down, and coming up, having heaped great Quantities of Ice upon each other.

The Work on the Thames is intirely ceased, which is a melancholy Affair to some thousand poor Families.

Jan. 4. The severe Frost, and floating Ice in the River, has caused a Stagnation of Business at the Custom House.

The Water-Works at London-Bridge are intirely stopped by the Severity of the Frost; and Water, in general, is now very scarce.

We are informed that the Dyers are intirely at a Stand for want of Water.

Jan. 6. The Dutch Packets are now all on this Side, and cannot sail from Harwich, on Account of the severe Frost on the Dutch Coast; so that no Advices from that Quarter can be received, unless by a Schevening Vessel.

Yesterday a great Number of Watermen, with a Wherry on their Shoulders (with one of them sitting in it with Oars) whom the Severity of the Frost has disabled from working, went to the Royal Exchange, and about the Streets of this City, soliciting the Assistance of charitable People.

Jan. 7. For several Mornings past, a good many Sheep have been found in the Fields, froze to Death, in different Parts.

Yesterday a Fair was kept on the River Thames, opposite to Richmond, for Sale of divers Commodities, in the same Manner as was kept at Whitehall in the last great Frost in 1739.

It appears beyond a Doubt that the Elector of Bavaria is disposed to a Neutrality. The Austrian Minister, by Order of his Court, applied to the Elector's Ministers for a Body of 6000 Men to join the Army of the Empire; but he met with a flat Refusal.

Jan. 8. On Saturday the River Thames was frozen over so hard at Isleworth, that a Fair was kept on it all Day. A large Booth was erected, in which was sold Beer, and other Liquors, and in which a Leg of Mutton was boiled for the Company. There was a Roundabout for Children to ride in, and all Sorts of Toys sold as at other Fairs. Great Numbers of People came from the adjacent Parts to see it.

Extract of a Letter from Cork, Dec. 27.

"A large Spanish Privateer has taken and destroyed the following Vessels, viz. The Basilisk Bomb, from the Havannah, taken; the Charming Polly, from Newfoundland to Pool, taken and ransomed; two Ships from Virginia to Glasgow, taken; the Intrepid, from Liverpool for Africa, of 20 Guns, blown up, after engaging three Hours, and all her Crew, except three, perished. Whilst the Prisoners, who give this Account, remained on board the Privateer, they saw five more French and Spanish Privateers, who were provided to cruise till the Expiration of the Time allowed for Captures. The Spaniards informed the Prisoners, that a large Ship from London for the Havannah, was also taken by another Privateer, and carried into St. Sebastian; they valued her at upwards of 50,000 l."

Jan. 11. The Empress Queen is endeavouring to borrow at Florence 300,000 Florins, on the Revenues of the Tyrol, at 7 per Cent.

The India Company having put up Invitations for Seamen to enter into their Service, in order to pick and choose their Men, from the Multitude discharged out of the King's Ships, give rise to a Report that Press-Warrants were issued out again, and that the Navy was not to be laid up.

The great Quantity of Water that runs through the great Arch of London-Bridge, has prevented the Ice joining, and so has kept the Communication open by the Boats between Gravesend and Billingsgate.

Sunday some hundred Sea-Gulls came up the River as high as London-Bridge; a Sight never seen before in the Memory of the oldest Man living, and is a plain Proof of the extreme Severity of the Weather.

From Paris they write, that to prevent future Broils, a King of the Romans will soon be elected, and that the Archduke Joseph will be the Person. Three Camps are talked of to be formed in the Spring, for disbanding the Troops; one in Alsace, another in Flanders, and the third in Provence. The Sons of those employed in Husbandry will be sent Home, and only those kept who have no Home.

Letters from Saxony tell us, that the Prussian Soldiers are permitted to choose Wives among the young Women of Saxony, and the Magistrates of the Place to which the Girl belongs, are compelled to give her 300 Crowns for her Fortune. In this Manner between 20 and 30 Men in a Company take Wives.

Jan. 13. We hear that on Monday last Orders were given to discharge 38 more Men of War at different Ports.

A Reduction is ordered to be made in the Artillery at Woolwich; in several marching Regiments, and in the three Regiments of Foot-Guards.

Extract of a Letter from Gloucester, Jan. 10.

"By an Officer who arrived here on Saturday Night from Milford Haven, we have the following Intelligence: That on the Third of November he sailed from the Havannah, on board the Adventure Transport, with the Fleet under Sir George Pocock; and that for three Weeks they had a fine Passage, and were got within 200 Leagues of the Land's End, when the Wind coming about to the East, they were driven out of their Course, and have been obliged to beat the Seas for this Month past, not being able to make any Land; that the Ships were in the most crazy Condition imaginable, and their Bottoms like Honeycombs from the Worm; that the Adventure foundered at Sea, but that the Crew were all taken up by the Culloden. Seven or eight other Transports shared the same Fate, but the Men were all saved. A fine Spanish Register Ship, and the Temple Man of War, are gone to the Bottom. The Devonshire had six Pumps going, and had thrown all her Guns overboard. The Culloden, on board of which this Officer was taken, was obliged to hoist over 26 of her Guns, and with great Difficulty Yesterday she got into Milford. Sir George Pocock is put into Ireland, as he found it impracticable to weather the Lizard Point, with Ships in such a disabled and shattered Condition."

They write from Hamburg, of the 31st ult. that the River Elbe was quite frozen up the 28th ult.

and that People, Horses and Carriages, passed and repassed over the Ice between that City and Harburg.

It is reported that a Looking-Glass of curious Workmanship is now in the River, intended as a Present from the French Queen to the Queen of Great-Britain.

Private Letters from Holland advise, that a Person of Distinction will be sent to Leipzig from Versailles, to labour to bring about a Peace between the Courts of Vienna and Berlin.

Jan. 15. They write from Vienna, that the Empress Queen hath received repeated Assurances from the Court of France, that they will not only deliver up to her Troops the Provinces belonging to the King of Prussia on the Lower Rhine, but also support those Troops in keeping Possession of them; and for that End keep a large Body of Forces in Flanders ready to fly to their Assistance.

Mean while Letters from Hamburg pretend to say, that the principal Articles of an Accommodation between the Courts of Vienna and Berlin are already agreed on.

The Right Hon. the Earl of Bute, in Consideration of the rigorous Season, which has deprived the industrious working Watermen of their natural Subsistence, has been pleased to give One Hundred Pounds to be distributed among them by the Rulers and Clerk of the Company.

By a private Letter from Paris by the last French Mail, there is Advice, that all the Differences between Great-Britain and France, about the Affairs of the East-Indies, were adjusted.

Jan. 18. Letters from Madrid say, that the King of Spain had ordered his Troops to be reduced to the same Number they were at before last War.

Letters from Holland on Saturday say, that the Frost is so severe, that the like has not been since the Year 1740, and that Carriages of Five and Six Tons Burthen pass over the Ice on the Rivers.

Many Insurances are daily made on common Coasting Vessels, the present hard Weather having rendered the River Thames more hazardous than the Ocean.

On Thursday Sir George Pocock, in his Majesty's Ship Namur, of 90 Guns, arrived at Plymouth. He parted with his Fleet a Fortnight since off Scilly.

Jan. 20. Monday the Council sat Seven Hours, upon the Breaking up of which another Messenger was sent to Plymouth, with Dispatches for the East-Indies.

The Antigua Factor, Wheeden, from Piscataqua to Bristol, is arrived at Cork. She was taken the 30th ult. by a Spanish Privateer, of 24 Guns, and ransomed for 425 l.

The Nelly, Johnston, from Virginia to London, who sailed after the Fleet, was well the 9th Instant off Scilly.

Jan. 22. Spanish Passes are now delivering out Gratis, only paying a Trifle to the Clerks.

Extract of a Letter from Falmouth, Jan. 16.

"The Account you gave us from London, of the Severity of the Weather, surprises us here, as we have had no Frost at all, the Weather being remarkably mild; the Wind indeed has blown very strong from the East for some time. Having some Business the Beginning of the Month in the North-East Part of the Country, I found the Frost pretty smart there, but not sufficient to bear a Horse."

Extract of a Letter from an Officer on board the Culloden Man of War, to his Father in Bristol, dated Milford Haven, January 16.

"We arrived here, after a disagreeable and melancholy Passage of nine Weeks, in the first Part of which we lost Company with the Marlborough, and a Spanish Man of War of 70 Guns, one of our Havannah Prizes; one of the two had lost all her Masts, but, as it was Night, could not distinguish which; neither could we lend them any Assistance, as we expected the same Fate."

"The latter Part of our Passage was worse, as every Morning presented a new Scene of Horror; Signals of Distress were repeated by almost every Ship of the Fleet. A Signal was made by the Admiral for us to assist him, till we could hardly help ourselves; for, on the 25th of December, we laboured, and made so much Water, that it was with the utmost Difficulty we kept her above Water. The Captain thought it Prudent to ease her, by heaving 24 of her Guns overboard, which had its desired Effect, otherwise we must infallibly have suffered the same Fate as the Temple Man of War, of 70 Guns, and six Transports, whom we saw go down, and very fortunately saved all their Hands, except one Transport, that went down so suddenly, and so far off from any Ship, whom we are afraid sunk with her. When we bore away from Sir George Pocock, to the Westward of the

Lizard, in a hard Gale of Wind at South, we could not weather the Lizard on one Tack, nor Scilly on the other; but going round the Land's End, Captain Barker intended to have run up to Kingroad, but off Lundy the Wind came about to the East, and obliged us to run for this Place, where we with much Difficulty arrived, but in a very sickly Time, for we have scarce any Men left, such a Number having died, and others now lying sick, when we remain here to recover."

Jan. 25. Letters from France by Saturday's Flanders Mail, contradict what has been published about some Men of War sailing from Brest with 5000 Troops, &c. on board, for the East-Indies.

The St. George, Bowman, from Virginia to London, is put into Kinsale.

The William and Mary, Hardy, from ditto to London, is put into Scilly.

The Harriot, Duncan, from Virginia to Aberdeen, is put into Scilly.

Sunday Evening Sir George Pocock arrived in Town from the Havannah, and Yesterday waited on his Majesty, by whom this very great Commander was most graciously received. He is the only Admiral, of our Days, that has fought three pitched Battles with the French, always inferior to them, and yet always obliged them to a precipitate Flight; by which he entirely reduced all the Settlements on the Main of Asia; and if the Peace had not put an End to his Conquests, had most gloriously begun to reduce those of the Spaniards in America. We hear his great and unequalled Services are to be rewarded with a Peerage of Great-Britain, and that he is to be put at the Head of that Service he has ever been an Honour to.

Letters from Holland mention, that their Sea Ports, and those in Flanders, are stoped in such a Manner by the Ice, that their Trade is almost at a Stand.

On Thursday last there was a great Cricket-match on the Ice at Poplar Gut by the Gentlemen of Limehouse. There were present upwards of 1000 Gentlemen and Ladies.

Part of a Letter from the Hague, Jan. 18.

"The Suspension of Arms proposed by the Prince of Stolberg has been rejected by the King of Prussia: His Majesty alleges, that as he was not at War with the Empire, he cannot enter into any Negotiation for a Cessation of Hostilities with Troops that call themselves the Army of the Empire. We hear for certain, that all the Saxon Troops that were in the Pay of France are gone into the Empress Queen's Service. The Account of Preliminaries being signed between the Empress Queen and the King of Prussia, was premature."

All the Transports that are to bring over the Troops from Germany remain at the Nore, till the Frost breaks.

The Liverpool Frigate is sailed from Plymouth for the East-Indies.

By proper Returns of each Regiment in his Majesty's Service, it appears, that the Loss of Men has been so great in the last Campaign, that upwards of 20,000 Men are wanting to make each Regiment complete.

Jan. 27. We hear, that in Gratitude to the English Nation, for their speedy Assistance, and gallant Behaviour against the Spaniards when they invaded Portugal, his most Faithful Majesty has promised to grant more Indulgence and Countenance to the British Trade, and to treat the Subjects of Great-Britain and Ireland with greater Favour than other Nations.

Extract of a Letter from an Officer on board the Namur at Plymouth, dated Jan. 14.

"I have the Pleasure of informing you of our Arrival here this Day, after as disagreeable a Passage from the Havannah as ever was known; being so short of every Species of Provisions, as to have had only 3 or 4 Days Allowance left. We sailed from the Havannah the 4th of November last, with a Fleet of 60 Sail of Ships. Never greater Distress hath happened to one Fleet than to this; and the Ships proved so very leaky, that not being able to keep them above Water, we sunk the Temple, and 12 Sail of Transports; the remaining Part of our Fleet were separated from us at different Times by hard Gales of Wind, but we hope they have got safe into Ireland. Our Ship has been very sickly during the Voyage, having buried near 230 of our Ship's Company. We have been beating upwards of a Month in the Chops of the Channel, where we learnt the first News of the Peace."

We hear that all the Articles of the Definitive Treaty are finally adjusted, except what regards the Demolition of Dunkirk; the French Court insisting that the Report of the State of the Fortifications of that Place, made by the two English

Engineers, brought from Milford Haven, is sent to Dunkirk, is not just.

The following Transports drove ashore on Mero Rocks, and were beaten to Pieces, viz. General Wolfe, of 400 Tons; the Providence (third of the Name) 370; the Lion (third of the Name) 290 Tons. And the following Transport that came out from the Havannah with Sir George Pocock, foundered in the Passage, viz. the Adventure (second of the Name) 362 Tons; the William and Anne, 278; the Lark, 138; the Prett Betsey, 176; the Strickland Castle, 235; the Richard, and Pitt Galley, Tonnage not mentioned. The Loyalty parted from the Fleet, and bore away for Antigua.

Jan. 29. The Hazard, Coxon, one of the Fleet from Virginia, is arrived at Scilly. This is the last of the Ships which were missing.

They write from Vienna of the 10th Inst. that the Cessation of Arms between the Austrians and Prussians, was prolonged to the latter End of May next.

The Hartwell, Cook, from Virginia to London, was taken the 29th of November, by the Audacious Privateer of 24 Guns, belonging to Bayonne, and carried into that Port.

Letters from Amsterdam of the 21st Instant say, that good Water was then sold there at 15 Stivers, or 14d. Sterling, a Pail.

Wednesday the King was pleased to send to the Bishop of London, to be distributed among the Poor of London and Westminster, 1000 l.

The Peggy and Elizabeth, Tunstall, from Virginia to London, is retaken by the Coventry Frigate, and carried into Castlehaven.

Feb. 1. The Prize Goods at the Havannah, and which are expected to arrive on board the Fleet, consist of Sugar, Cocoa, Jesuits Bark, raw and tanned Hides, Tobacco, Snuff, Logwood, Fustick, Timber, Cedar Planks, Cochineal and Tortoiseshell. The Whole valued at upwards of 300,000 l.

Sir George Pocock did not know of the Preliminaries of Peace, till he got into the Channel.

We hear that the Pension of a certain Lady of high Distinction is stopped.

It is said the Value of all British Ships taken by the French before the Declaration of War, will be made good by the Government to the Owners.

This Morning the Workmen began again to work at Blackfriars-Bridge, from which they had been prevented for five Weeks past by the severe Frost.

Admiralty-Office, Jan. 18. By Letters received late last Night from Cork and Kinsale, from Capt. Barton, of his Majesty's Ship Devonshire, and others, there is an Account of the following Ships (Part of those which sailed from the Havannah with Admiral Sir George Pocock) being arrived at those Places, viz. Devonshire, 66 Guns, Capt. Barton; Infanta, 70 Guns, Capt. Elphinston; St. Janero Prize, Capt. Dickson; Assumption Prize, Capt. Randell; with eleven Sail of Transports.

Forney, Jan. 18. We have had the Wind at East near two Months, with hard Gales and very cold; but not frost; which seems very remarkable, as it is so great in other Places.

Boston, April 4.

We have Advice from Jamaica, that some of his Majesty's Ships, belonging to Admiral Keppel's Squadron, on that Station, had taken three Spanish Register Ships from Lagaira, upon the Coast of Caraccas; two of the Prizes were arrived at Jamaica, and the other hourly expected; they were loaded with Tobacco, Hides, Cocos, Specie, &c. and the least of them is said to be worth 65,000 l. Sterling. Four sailed together from Lagaira, and some British Ships of War were in Quest of the Fourth.

New-York, April 11.

Two Gentlemen, lately arrived at Antigua from Montserrat, reported, that two Spanish Pyrate Sloops had been for some Time hovering about those Islands, and had taken three Vessels, murdering every Person on board, except the last, which they took in the Night, from which two Men swam on Shore to Guadaloupe, one of whom had two Stabs with a Knife; and that a Frigate was sitting out to be sent after them.

The Pitt Packet, Captain Goddard, has Orders to prepare for sailing at a Moment's Warning.

I parted from the Fleet, about 10 Leagues West from Scilly, after having been buffeting with South East Winds above a Month; it was very fortunate I separated from the Fleet, for not one Ship but myself, that I hear of, has reached England; by the Papers, I see, they bore away for Ireland, and arrived at Cork, with 60 Sail, which were all the Fleet for some Time before I left them; many of them were in bad Condition, being leaky, &c. The Man of War took great Care of the Fleet indeed, and assisted some with Men. Our Ship behaved extraordinary well, but we were very weakly manned, having only 19 in all. Capt. Montgomery had the melancholy Prospect to see the black painted Brig, which took in Tobacco at Annapolis (Capt. Burges's) overfet, and all the Crew perished. Capt. Bowlings in a Snow from Rappahannock, foundered, but the People all saved; the Squall was very heavy, our Ship, and many of the Fleet broached to, and lost every Sail they had aboard, and several Men were Drowned. Capt. Byrte's Ship lost her Head, but made no more Water than before. We knew nothing of the Cessation of Hostilities, till the Day before we arrived. The Winds have blown Easterly for near Three Months, and now no Likelihood of a Change. The Thames is full of Ice, and great Damage done to the Ships there."

L E Y D E N, January 28.

ONE of our Botanists has remarked, that the Frost has penetrated the Ground deeper this Winter than in 1740. He found his Garden thus frozen 22 inches and 3 Lines deep, whereas it is at present frozen upwards of 22 inches deep; which is attributed in a great Measure to the Want of Snow.

Colin, Dec. 24. It is said by some People, that our Court has resolved to purchase our Ships of War that were taken at the Havannah; and that the Minister we shall send to London will be charged with this Commission, when those Ships come to Europe.

Paris, Jan. 21. Melancholy Accidents happen every Day in this City from the Frost. The Seine is no longer cleared of Ice, than it is again frozen over. A young Gentleman of Fortune in crossing the River on the Ice, by Way of Bravado, fell in, and was drowned; upon which his Footman, who he ordered to follow him, prudently turned back. The Arrival of all the Mail is retarded by the badness of the Roads. Nobody gains by the hard Weather but the Wood Merchants who supply us with Firing.

We learn from Avignon, that the Rhone is frozen over in several Parts; and that if the Frost continues, both in that Country and in Provence the Olive and other Trees will suffer severely.

L O N D O N, Dec. 7.

A few Days since died at Holt in Norfolk, aged 75, one Robert Smith, who for near 34 Years rode Post from that Place to Thetford, (which is 46 measured Miles) six Days in every Week, and never missed but one Day in that long Period, till he left off about Twelve Days before his Death; it is remarkable he always rid one Pace, and yet out at such an Hour, and returned at the same fixed Time, which Practice he never once deviated from. [In the whole above 480,000 Miles, which would extend about 20 Times round the Globe.]

A short Time ago, one John Pilkington, a Scotch Sailor, got upon the Tower of Bolton Church in Lincolnshire, which is reckoned the highest and finest Tower Steeple in England; on the Top of it there are eight Vases or Weather-Cocks, all which he went round, and coming to the last, to show his Courage, went round that twice, but the Vase giving Way, he fell down and broke his Neck.

Dec. 17. It is said that about 100 Ships of War will be kept in Commission at their lower Complement of Men, and that they will be at various Stations, to see the Treaty lately concluded is strictly and literally adhered to.

Yesterday a Wager of a Thousand Pounds against Fifty, laid some Time ago by two Gentlemen of Note in the City, was determined and paid. The Fact in Question was, whether the Preliminaries were signed the 2d or 3d of November. He that betted 1000 l. opined for the 2d, and was to possessive as to lay against 50; but the Matter being proved against him, he has generously paid. It is probable his Possitiveness in this Wager, arose from his Correspondent's wrong Information by Twelve Hours. The Plenipotentiaries, as well as we can recollect, did agree about all the Preliminaries the 2d of November, at Night, over a Bottle, but did not sign them till the next Morning.

Jan. 4. On Friday some Gentlemen, dining at a House near Bathor Heath, tried the following Experiment, to show the Intemperance of the Frost: They put a Glass of Water on a Table in the Bowling Green, and in six Minutes it was froze over so hard as to bear five Shillings put on it, one after the other. They then tried a Glass of Red Port, and a Glass of Brandy, when the Wine was froze over in two Hours, and the Brandy in six, both with hard Ice. It has not froze so hard since 1739.

They write from Florence, that a Party of Shirts, on Sherif's Officers, happening to call at the New Castle, on the Coast of Tuscany, and the Garrison of Rome, to refresh themselves, the Innkeeper's Son, as soon as he saw them, came out, in a great Fright, "It was not I that killed out, the Traveller, but my Father, who threw him in-

"to the Well, after taking his Money." The Father, Son, and all the Servants, were immediately seized, and carried to Goal.

They write from Paris, that a young Woman having accused her Lady, of attempting, in Concert with a Man-Servant, to poison her Husband; and the Charge being groundless, the Girl was burnt Alive.

Jan. 6. Letters from Lisbon, of the 23d of last Month, say, that the King of Portugal had ordered our King's Speech to both Houses of Parliament to be translated, and publicly fold through his whole Kingdom.

Jan. 8. The East-India Company are going to raise Recruits, who are to be sent by the next Fleet for the better Protection of their Settlements.

The Kisko, Thomas, from Virginia, one of the Fleet bound to Bristol, is arrived at Millford.

Jan. 11. The 8th Daughters of the Empress Queen, named Jane Gabrielle, died at Vienna the 2d inst, aged 12 Years and 10 Months.

We hear from Portugal, that every Officer (employed in the Detachment of 300 English Troops, the 6th of October last, in crossing the Tagus at Night, under the Command of Col. Lee, and attacking 1500 Spaniards, with an Intrepidity not to be equalled but by Britons, killing every Man of their Advanced Guards, taking Possession of their Camp, spiking their Cannon, bringing a considerable Body of Mules and Horses over the River to their own Camp before Day-Light) had the Distinction paid him, to receive in Writing the particular Thanks of Count La Lippe; and that Lieutenant Woodford Rice, of the Royal Volunteers, has been presented with a Company of Portuguese Grenadiers, with an Indulgence to keep his Lieutenantcy in the Royal Volunteers, and with full Rank of Captain in both Services, for his gallant Behaviour in that Action.

Jan. 18. It is said that the Right Honourable William Pitt will be created a Peer, and be made President of the Council.

We hear that a Pension of 3000 l. per Annum, is, or soon will be, sent upon Prince Ferdinand, Commander in Chief of all his Majesty's Forces in Germany.

Jan. 20. A Letter from Rome, dated Dec. 26, says, "We had a great deal of Snow here in the Night between the 27th and 28th. The Wind

also hath been very violent. It hath likewise frozen to such a Degree, that all our public Fountains are stopped: A very extraordinary Event, in as much as in the Memory of Man the Waters of them have always been, at least, only of a gentle Cold. It is feared, that our Olive, our Orange and Citron Trees, will be frozen to the very Heart."

Wednesday Evening the Gentlemen belonging to the Lodge of Free and Accepted MASONS, held at the Jerusalem Tavern, Clerkenwell, raised a genteel Collection for the Relief of indigent Persons at this Season, and each Member is to recommend a proper Object.

It is said the King of Portugal has proposed to pay an annual Subsidy to our Crown for keeping up a Number of Troops, to be always in Readiness to embark for the Defence of that Kingdom.

We hear that Mr. Mooney, a Gentleman Farmer in Ireland, hath made some important Discoveries towards finding out the Longitude, which have been laid before the Lords of the Admiralty, who, it is said, have referred the same to the Earl of Macclesfield and Dr. Bluff.

Feb. 1. The Frost has done very great Damage to both Shores of the River Medway, from the new Basin downward to the Nore; and, besides stopping the Navigation, has damaged several of his Majesty's Ships moored there.

Near Woolwich, the Bodies of two Men have lain on the Ice on the River for several Days, no Persons being able to get near them.

Another melancholy Sight, near the same Place, is that of a Boy in a Boat, which is seen driving up and down among the Ice every Tide.

February 10. It is said the eight Waggon which came to the Bank on Monday, contained 10 Tons of Silver. It is hoped a large Quantity of this will be coined into Money, for the Sake of those concerned in retail Trade, as the Want of it is much felt by all of them.

Monday 73 Cwt. of Gum Seneca was entered for Holland, from whence, a few Years ago, we used to purchase it at 12 l. per Cwt.

The Spanish Court is giving great Encouragement to the Proposals of their Merchants, for settling and cultivating their Part of the Island of Domingo; and it is said the Spanish Garrison and Negroes in Florida, will be transported thither.

Yesterday Morning early arrived a Courier from Leipzig, with an Account (as it is said) that the Preliminary Articles were signed between the Empress Queen and the King of Prussia.

By Letters from Madrid we are told, that an Order was gone to Cadix for the Sailing of an Express Vessel to St. Angustine, with Orders for the Governor and his Garrison to hold themselves in Readiness to embark for St. Domingo.

As the Cessation of Hostilities takes Place in the West-Indies on the 22d Instant, no more Convoys will sail for the Sugar Islands.

Feb. 12. Private Letters from Madrid inform us, that his Most Christian Majesty's A.D. of Cadix, in Respect to the Countries Westward of the Mississippi, is expected, and will make the Conclusion of the Definitive Treaty highly acceptable.

It was said Yesterday, that the Definitive Treaty between Great Britain, France, and Spain, was actually signed.

Yesterday a Wager of 100 Guineas was laid at a Coffee-House near the Royal Exchange, that the Definitive Treaty was signed at Paris or Versailles on Thursday last.

A few Days since the Gentlemen who have passed their Examinations for Lieutenants of the Navy, presented a Memorial to the Lords of the Admiralty, and a Plan for providing and employing them when discharged his Majesty's Service.

Wednesday, Jan. 21. Tuesday last, being a very clear Day, a Gentleman here procured a circular Piece of Ice two Feet nine Inches Diameter, and five Inches thick, which he reduced to a leafy Form, spherically convex on both Sides, and having exposed it to the direct Sun Rays of the Sun, about 11 in the Morning, the Rays transmitted through the Ice, now to be seen by its Figure as to converge to a Focus at 7 Feet Distance, where, in an Instant, it fired Gunpowder, Paper, and other combustible Matter.

NEWPORT, April 18.

The Brig *Manhood*, Captain Trotter, belonging to Chichester, in England, and bound from London to Virginia, in Lat. 35. 51. N. Lon. 73. 20. W. on the 27th of March, at Nine in the Morning, laying to under a Foresail, the Wind blowing hard at N. W. thipt a large Sea, which cleared the Deck, carried both Masts by the Board, stove the Boat to Pieces, and damaged the Vessel, so that she made considerable Water: At Six the next Morning she fortunately fell in with the Sloop *Nancy*, Capt. Wright, from Guadeloupe, bound to this Port, and in the Evening Capt. Trotter, with his People, were all taken on board the *Nancy*, and arrived here last Tuesday. There were 4 Horses, valued at 1200 l. Sterling, left on board the Brig.

NEW YORK, April 14.

Yesterday the Pitt Packet Boat, Capt. Goddard, failed with the Mail for Falmouth, and about 3 o'Clock passed the Hook, when there was no inward bound Vessels in Sight.

April 18. Fort St. Mary's, on Lake Superior, being the most advanced Post the French ever had in the Indian Country, in Canada, was, by some unknown Accident, on the 20th of December last, in the Night, reduced to Ashes, with the Barracks, and every Thing that was in the Fort; and the Commanding Officer, an English Gentleman (the Fort having been in the Possession of the English since the Reduction of Canada) was much scorched in endeavouring to avoid the Flames.

PHILADELPHIA, April 21.

In Letters from Lisbon, dated the Twenty-third of February, by Captain Kidd, it is mentioned, That that Day an Express arrived there to Mr. Hay, the English Envoy, from the Duke of Bedford at Paris, with Advice, that the Definitive Treaty was signed at Fontainebleau the Tenth of that Month.

We hear likewise, from the same Place, that the Spanish Ports were opened about the End of that Month.

ANNAPOLIS, April 28.

A GOOD PIECE OF NEWS, NEWS OF A GOOD PEACE!

We are informed by Mr. Wallace, of this City, who left *New-York* on Tuesday, last Week, that the Day before, arrived there from *England*, (which she left the beginning of *March*) the Packet, Capt. *Boulderston*, with a certain Account, that the Definitive Treaty of Peace was concluded on and Signed: And that his Majesty of *Prussia* had come to a Reconciliation with the Empress Queen. But for further Particulars, we must wait till next Week.

We have an Account that our Fleet sail'd from *Cork* for *London* on the First of February, under Convoy of the *Goffart*, and several other Men of War.

Last Thursday the Purse of Fifty Pistoles was Run for on the Race-Ground in this City. Six Started for it; but it was Won by Mr. *Calvert's* *Jolly Chester*, who got the two first Heats: The Entrance Money was Won by Capt. *Chapman's* *Creeping John*.

Next Day the Twenty-five Pistoles was Won by Mr. *Bullen's* ———. Mr. *Carroll's* Horse *Nimble*, won the Two first Heats; but in running the Third to save his Distance only, the foolish Rider endeavoured to get Before, and ran within one of the Poles.

In the *NEW-YORK GAZETTE* of the 18th Instant, is the following Paragraph: "Saturday last the great Race at *Harlem* was Run between 'the *True-Briton* and *Old-England*, when the latter was Distanced."
