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‘Bloody Bloody Andrew Jackson’ to Star FSU Alum Matt Merchant



FSU’s Department of Theatre and Dance will present “Bloody Bloody Andrew Jackson,” a rock musical by Alex Timbers with music and lyrics by Michael Friedman, on **Friday and Saturday, April 18 and 19**, and **Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 24, 25 and 26**, at 7:30 p.m., with a matinee **April 19** at 2 p.m., all in the Performing Arts Center. Referred to by Newsday as “90 thoroughly audacious, politically savvy, politically incorrect minutes,” FSU’s production will star guest artist and FSU alum **Matt Merchant** in the title role.

Directed by **Darrell Rushton** with musical direction by Chris McCabe, “Bloody Bloody Andrew Jackson” reinvents the seventh president of the U.S. as an emo-rock star rebel. The story follows Jackson from his childhood on the wild frontier to his aggressive rise to power battling the British, annihilating Native

American territories and dominating the presidency. This high-energy concert examines the populist movement of “Old Hickory,” drawing parallels to today’s political culture.

Merchant, a Los Angeles-based actor, returns to Western Maryland after performing on FSU’s stage nearly 20 years ago. A member of the California-based and award-winning Troubador Theatre Company, Merchant is credited for helping to create original pieces with the company. Through a collaboration with Garry Marshall and Paul Williams, Merchant created characters for the national tour of “Happy Days: A New Musical.” In addition to performing in “Bloody Bloody Andrew Jackson,” Merchant will work side by side with faculty and students on a series of workshops during his residency. The performance is recommended for mature audiences ages 18 and up.

FSU to Focus on Sustainability at Focus Frostburg



FSU will be fully focused on sustainability during its upcoming Focus Frostburg event, an annual day of learning on sustainability and climate awareness, on **Wednesday, April 23**, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. The event, free and open to the public, will feature green activities for everyone, including presentations in the Lane University Center, poster displays in the Compton Science Center and a sculpture garden on the front lawn of the Ort Library.

Learn all about sustainability from a range of presentations topics at the Lane Center, including art, climate, energy, ethnobotany, food, history, religion and FSU policy.

Art presentations will include **Jennifer Brown** and **Sam White’s** “Wilderness in American Literature,” which addresses American identity through wild spaces. Food presentations will include **Dr. Kara Rogers Thomas** and FSU sociology students’ “Studying Sustainable Foodways in Mountain Maryland,” which discusses techniques and practices to forge sustainable food systems.

History presentations will include **Dr. Gregory Wood’s** “With All the Wealth of the World at Hand: Industry, Ecology and the Ford Empire, 1914-1939,” which discusses how the expansion of the Ford Motor Company during the early 20th century depended on the wholesale transformation of local ecologies and green spaces on three continents. Religion presentations will

include Rogers Thomas’ “Religion and Environmental Activism,” which features a documentary project “Renewal,” the first feature-length film to capture the vitality and diversity of today’s religious-environmental activists.

Climate presentations include **Dr. Francis Precht’s** “The Vortex, and Cold and Snow, Oh My! The Winter of 2013-14: Why Was It so Fierce ... or Was It?” which discusses this past winter season’s “polar vortex.” Energy presentations include **Dr. Peggy Biser** and **Matthew Crawford’s** “Personal Kinetic Energy Generation and Storage for a Sustainable Future,” which discusses generating and storing personal kinetic energy into usable energy; and **David Puthoffs** “My First Year Leasing a Solar System in Frostburg: Electric Bills and Electric Production,” which discusses solar-powered electricity generation systems.

Ethnobotany research projects include **Ruth Lacourse, Hanna Goodmuth, Alexander Cathcart, Joe Lisalata** and **Mary Kruger’s** “Herbarium Revamp: Sorting, Displaying and Digitizing the FSU Herbarium Collection,” which reorganizes the FSU Herbarium to improve ease of access for students and researchers; **Gabriel Echeverri, Ben Brown** and **Ian Cheek’s** “Tree Species and Traditional Uses of the Eastern Band of the Cherokee Nation,” which presents eight-year results collected by FSU students of planting butternuts within an established cane stand and at a control site; and **Kerry Messick, Megan Carr, Michael McCampbell** and **Matt Tillet’s** “Establishment of White Oak, ‘Quercus alba,’ Seedlings for Cherokee Basketry,” which presents the establishment of experimental plantations on the KITUWA site in cooperation with the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians.

Visit the Discovery Center on the first floor of the Compton Science Center to learn about opportunities for students of any major to get involved with the Frostburg Grows project, a native tree nursery, local food production, composting, renewable energy and training center on a former coal mine near the FSU campus. Then, help plant and transplant native tree seeds and seedlings, including black gum, red oak and black walnut.

From noon until 1 p.m., enjoy environmental music from the FSU Chamber Choir, plant trees, declare Arbor Day and join FSU at the Clock Tower as it celebrates its second year as a Tree Campus USA.

From 3 to 3:50 p.m., see poster presentations of student sustainability projects. Student-designed and student-run projects cover topics, including food, medicine, health, feral cats, a native tree nursery, impacts of de-icing salt, student perceptions and mindsets, improved recycling and the psychology of sustainability.

Throughout the day, have a look at the informational displays at the Compton Science Center. Displays include the “Frostburg Arboretum Display,” providing information about the current status and history of the campus arboretum; “Frostburg State University’s Sustainability Initiative,” detailing the current progress of FSU’s sustainability initiative plan; and “Bottled Houses,” revealing some of the uses for recycled bottles.

Make your way to the sculpture garden on the front lawn of the Ort Library as creatures created from recycled aluminum make their way toward the University’s center for learning. The project was created to display site-specific sculpture that engages the landscapes, create art with an ecological theme and work with the theme of education.

Roots Music Series Concert to Feature ‘Queen of Bluegrass’

The Spring 2014 Roots Music Series concert will host Rhonda Vincent and the Rage **Saturday, April 26**, at the Allegany High School auditorium at 616 Sedgwick St. in Cumberland. Presented by the Allegany Arts Council, WFWM Public Radio and Dr. Ken Roberts, the concert will begin at 8 p.m. with a performance by Jimmy Gaudreau and Moondi Klein. Tickets are available from the Allegany Arts Council, the Book Center in Cumberland, Main Street Books in Frostburg and at the door the night of the concert.

Having won more than 70 awards, Rhonda Vincent and the Rage is one of the most respected and popular bands in bluegrass. Vincent, known as “the Queen of Bluegrass,” has won the International Bluegrass Music Association “Female Vocalist of the Year” award seven times in a row between 2000 and 2006. She was also awarded “Entertainer of the Year” five times from the Society for the Preservation of Bluegrass Music in America.

Vincent began her career as a child in her family’s band, the Sally Mountain Show, and released her first solo album in 1986.

Following a short stint in country music, she returned to bluegrass in 1999. In 2010, she formed her own label and management company, Upper Management, with her husband, Herb Sandker. Her recent two-disc set, “Only Me,” contains both bluegrass and country songs. Vincent’s band, the Rage, features Josh Williams on guitar, Hunter Berry on fiddle, Mickey Harris on bass, Aaron McDaris on banjo and dobro-player Brent Burke.

Gaudreau and Klein are respected veteran musicians themselves, having played in bands like the Country Gentlemen, Seldom Scene, Tony Rice Unit and Chesapeake. Together, their duets offer a modern version of the classic country duets of the 30s and 40s. They have released two albums, “2:10 Train” in 2008 and “Home From The Mills” in 2012.

The Roots Music Series encourages and sustains traditional music in the community and showcases a variety of musical traditions (such as bluegrass, folk, country, blues and gospel) to entertain local audiences and increase awareness and interest in these important art forms. FSU will present its 32nd annual Spring Festival of Children’s Literature on **Friday, April 25**, and **Saturday, April 26**. Each year librarians, educators, parents and students come to the campus of FSU to share their love of children’s literature and learn more about successful ways to share that love with children.

The theme for the weekend will be “Building the Passion for Lifelong Reading.” Melissa Sweet, Steve Jenkins, Floyd Cooper and Ben Mikaelson will be the award-winning authors and illustrators headlining the event, which this year will be streamed online via a live webcast. Each of these writers has created stories that inspire in children the passion to be lifelong readers.

The agenda for the festival includes informative small group sessions and large group presentations offered in a personal and relaxed environment. Topics range from “Bringing Literature to Life Through Technology” to “Informational Texts for Students K-8 That Address Common Core Needs.” Participants mingle with fellow educators and exchange ideas, purchase books and embrace the wisdom and experience that the visiting authors have to share. An extensive book selection will be available for purchase, as well as autographing opportunities.

A prolific author and illustrator, Sweet has illustrated nearly 100 children’s books in various genres and formats. Her recent foray into the world of writing has been successful as well. Sweet has been honored with the 2012 Sibert Medal, the NCTE Orbis Pictus Award, an ALA Notable Book, the Flora Stieglitz Strauss Award and the Cook Prize.

As a child, Jenkins had a strong interest in reading and science. Instead of studying to be a scientist, he chose to go to art school to study graphic design, then went on to work in his own small graphic design firm with his wife, Robin Page, who is also an author and illustrator. Jenkins and his wife have written and illustrated four children’s books together. He is an author and illustrator of dozens of award-winning titles, including the Caldecott-honored “What Can You Do With a Tail Like This?”

Cooper wanted to be an illustrator since he was a young child, drawing on pieces of plasterboard left over from his father’s work as a builder. He began his career while still a student at the University of Oklahoma, where he earned a degree in fine arts. After working in advertising, he took a job at Hallmark, designing greeting cards in Kansas City. In 1984, Cooper moved to New York City to pursue a career as an illustrator. He is the recipient of a Coretta Scott King award and two Coretta Scott King Honors.

Mikaelson has won many awards, including the International Reading Association Award and the Western Writer’s Golden Spur Award. He has also received many state Readers Choice Awards. When not writing, Mikaelson spends his time exploring the world. He has traveled to the North Pole, Mexico and his home country of Bolivia. These adventures provide him with opportunities to explore and interact with various cultures and animals. He is also a sky-diving champion, can fly a plane and taught himself to swim and dive.
