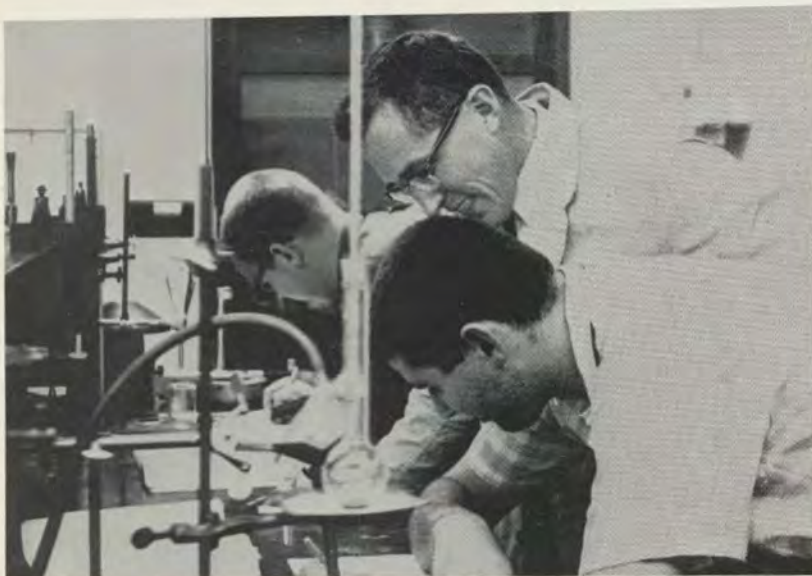


## Chemistry Department

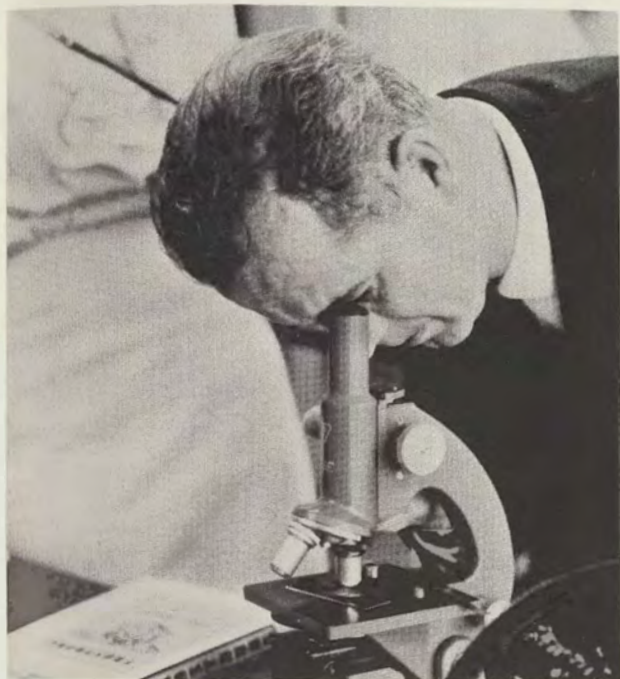

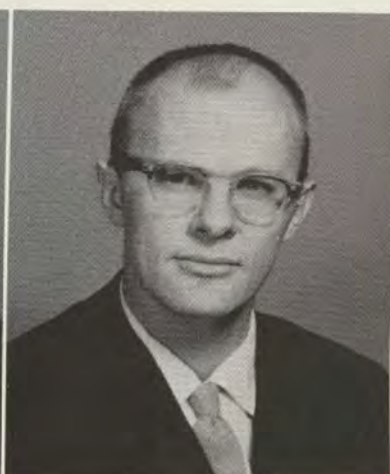

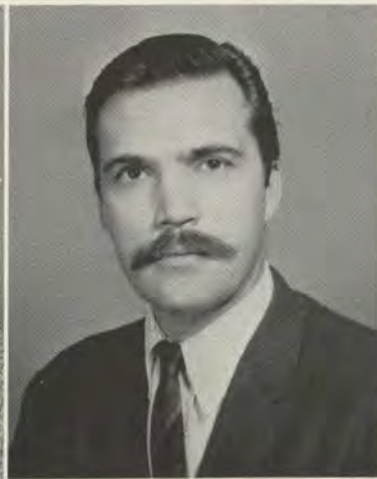

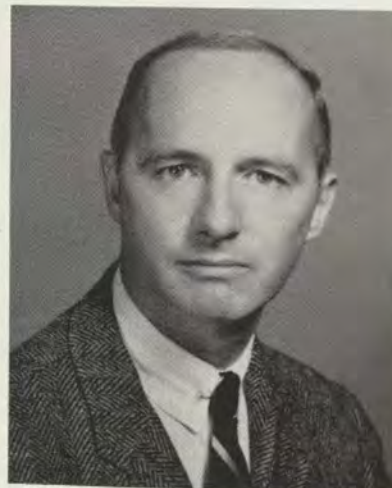

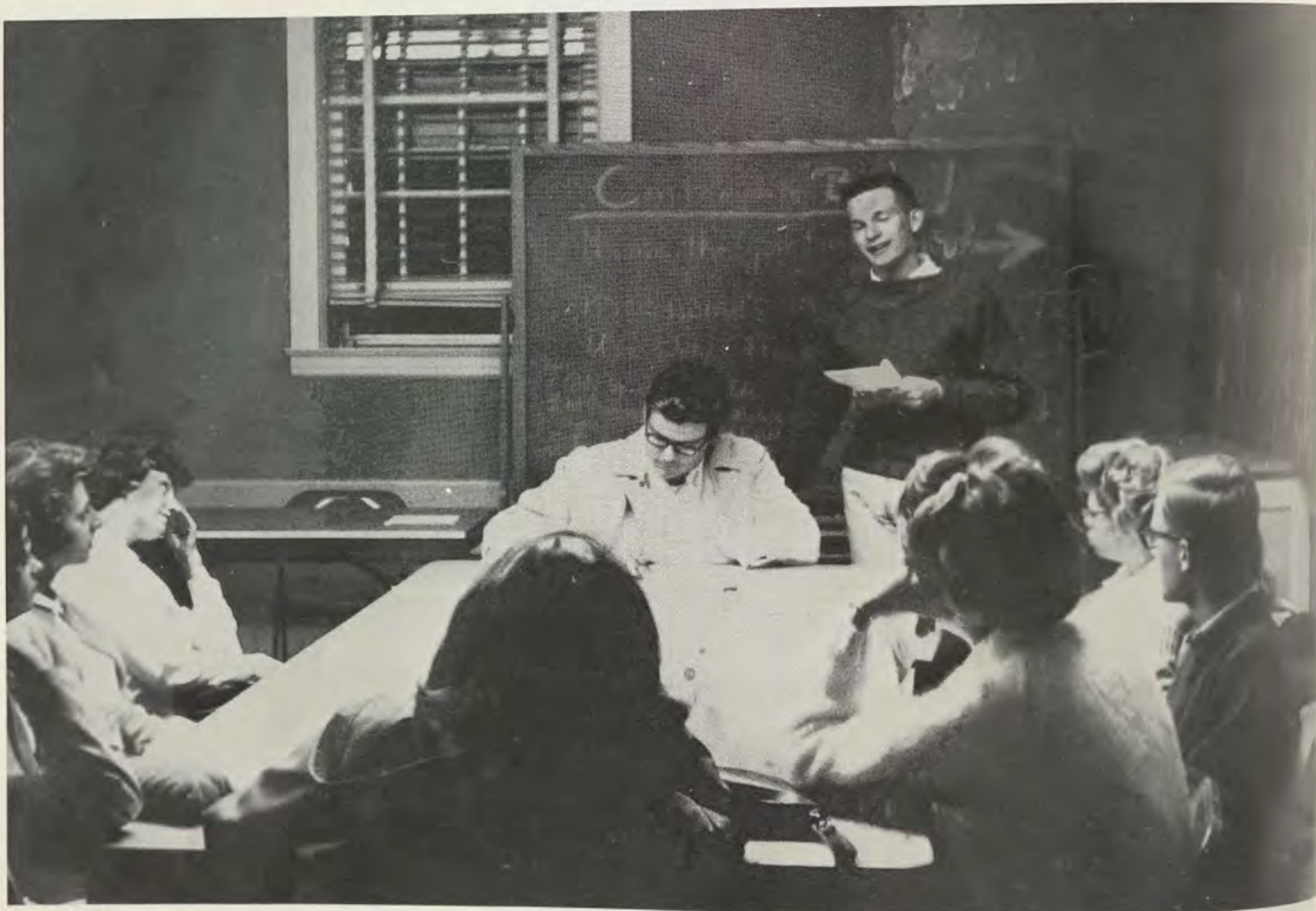

## *F.S.C. Basketball*

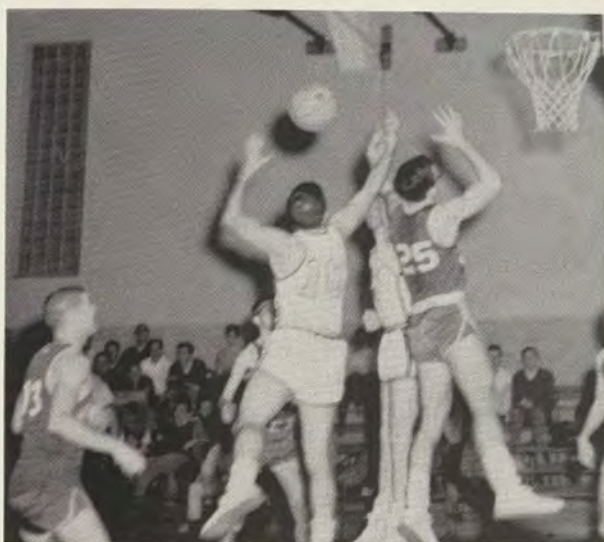

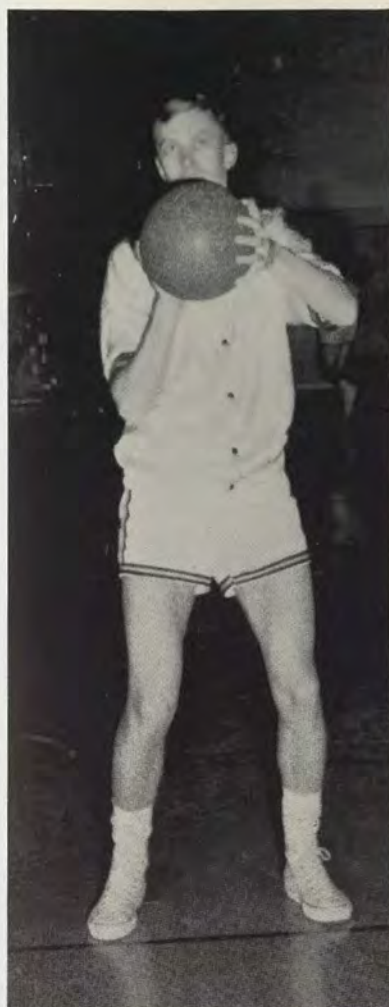

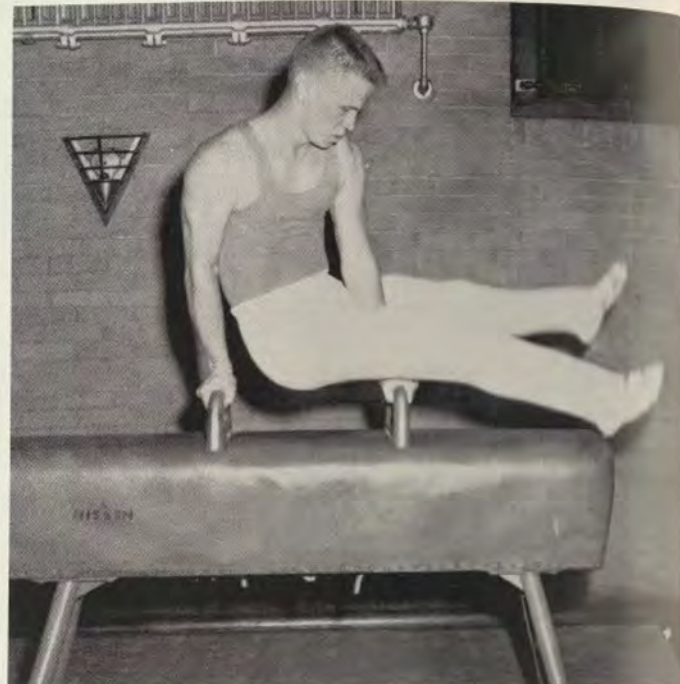
# Gymnastics

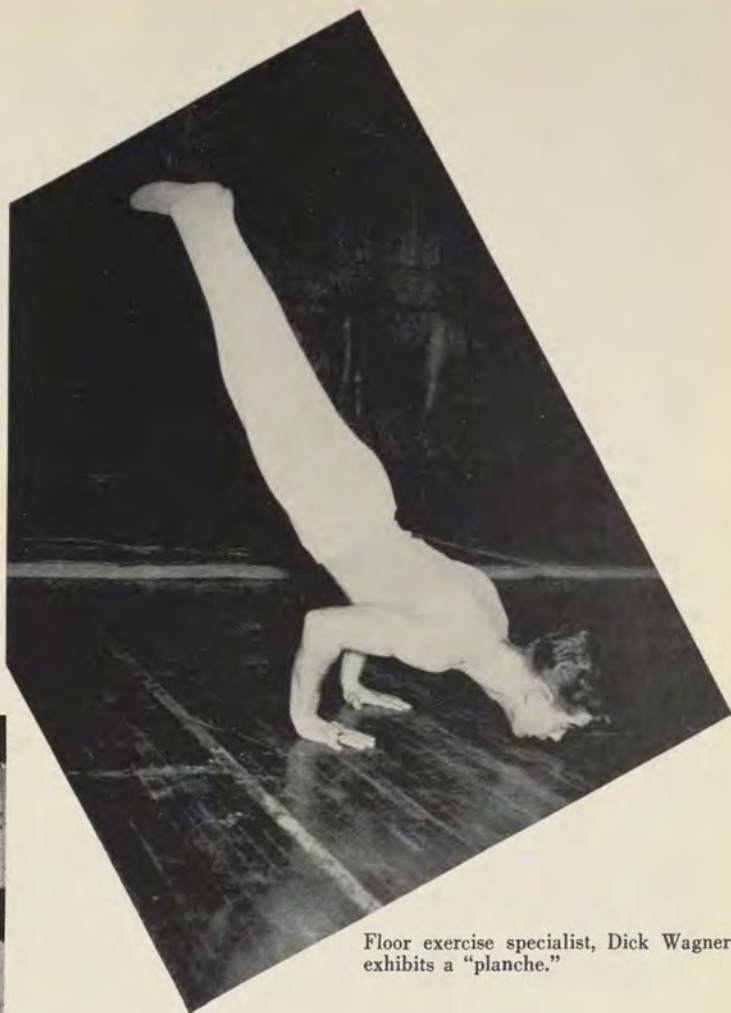

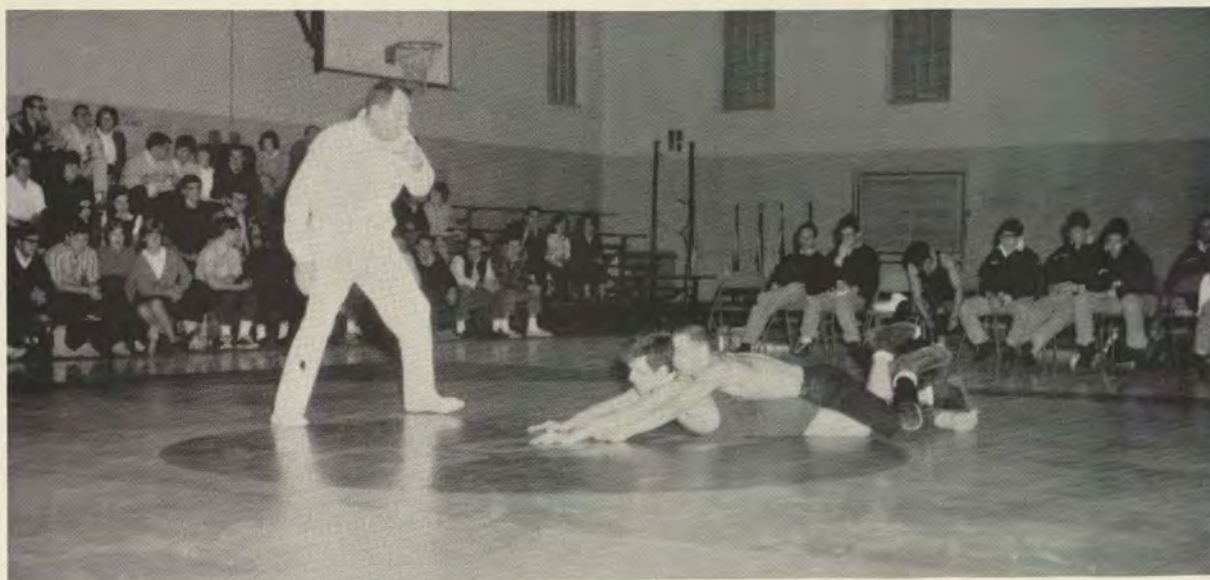

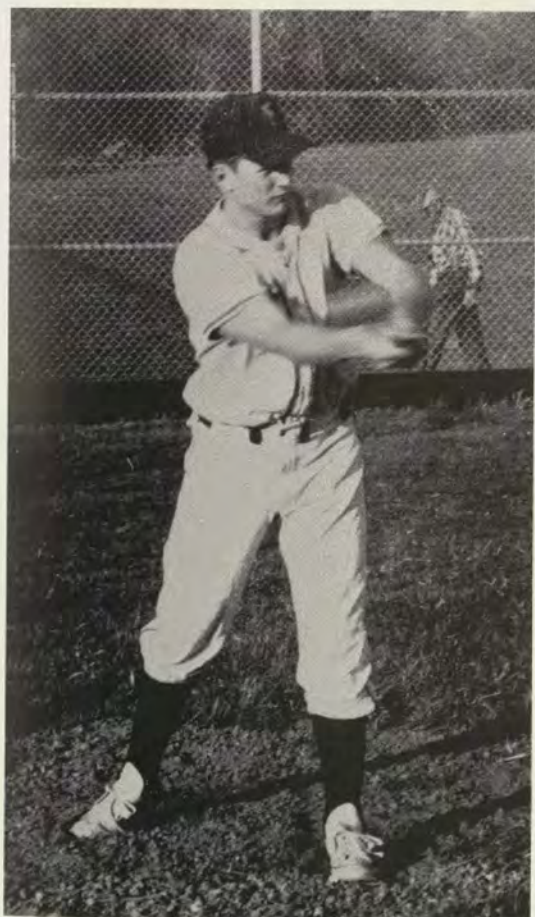
