## **Fifteen Seniors** Make Who's Who

Who's Who nominees were selected by a committee of thirteen people who were elected by the Student Senate. The committee consisted of three juniors; Claudette Walton, Van Gardner, Steve Printz; three sophomores: Bob Sobus, Hazel Hermann, Al Nathewitch; six faculty members: Mr. Richard Sloop, Mrs. Eileen Steele, Dr. Robert Grooms, Mr. James Cotton, Dr. Harold Cordts, Dr. William Carroll; and one administrative member: Mr. John Allison. The faculty members represented various departments and have been at Frostburg State College for at least two years.

There were 147 seniors who qualified for Who's Who on the basis of academic standing. The scholastic qualification required an overall accumulative average of no less than 2.5 and an average per semester of no less than 2.0.

The three main criteria upon which the committee decided to base its selection of nominees for Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges were: academic standing, leadership and service to the college.

In order for the committee to justly evaluate each candidate according to the main criteria, a letter was sent to each candidate asking him to send the committee a letter indicating his service and leadership rendered to the college since he has been enrolled here.

Each of these Who's Who candidates will receive a certificate of recognition from the Who's Who organization which will be presented to him at the Honors Convocation. He will also receive recognition in the 1966-1967 publication of Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges and will receive the benefits of the Student Placement Service provided by Who's Who.

These are the nominations made by the Who's Who Committee and confirmed by the Who's Who Among Students In American Universities and Colleges:

Susan Badger is presently the treasurer of Students Association. She was treasurer of her junior class, secretary-treasurer of the Canterbury Club in her freshman and sophomore years, and secretary of the Gray Hall House Council. Susan has been a member of Theta Delta Pi for four years and is this year's historian. She is also a member of Gamma Theta Upsilon, Honorary Geography Fraternity.

Vincent Catania is vice president of Tau Kappa Epsilon and is also a member of Sigma Zeta, National Math and Science Honorary Fraternity. He has served the student government as a day student senator, as chairman and member of numerous committees. and as a school representative at an Associated Student Government Convention in Oklahoma and at the National Student Association Conference in Baltimore. 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### **Editorial Comment**

### **On Who's Who**

The Editorial staff of this paper would like to comment on one facet of the selection of students for the WHO'S WHO. The sense of responsibility of some members of the Who's Who Committee is very questionable as far as this newspaper is concerned. According to tradition, the winners of the Who's Who Awards have been announced in the paper prior to any other publication of these names. However, this year the staff of this newspaper gravely considered eliminating any coverage of the Who's Who due to the serious leak of the winners' names. A portion of the student body, namely Greeks and Student Government members, was aware of at least some of the winners prior to this publication. Some of these students were aware of some of the winners as far back as two weeks ago. This leak, which could only come from one or more members of the committee is certainly a poor reflection upon the trust and confidence of the committee. The leaking of information of this type is far more serious than one may normally realize.

The fact that names of winners were divulged to members of the student body prior to today degrades the entire process of picking winners for this award. Students who thought they might win this award can justifiably cast doubt on the whole process of picking winners when the names of the winners could be learned with such ease. We would suggest that future committees be picked with greater care. We would also suggest that the Senate of the Student Association seriously consider not appointing to next year's committee anyone

#### Senior Finals May Be **Optional, All Terms Of Uniform Duration**

At a recent Student Senate meeting, Mr. John W. Neal, registrar, announced that Drexel's tentative future plans include optional Spring finals for seniors and a shorter calendar year.

Seniors who are doing well in a course will not have to take the final. Those who feel that they would like an opportunity to pull up a grade will be able to take the final.

Mr. Neal also told of plans for a shorter calendar year with four even terms which will allow teachers to plan their courses in the same way for any term of the year. Under the present circumstances a teacher must either delete his notes to fit the shorter terms or plan a new outline. Fall term will start one week earlier and end one week earlier. This means that Christmas vacation will be a full week longer.

There will be no change in Winter term. Spring term will start the same time and will end a week earlier. Commencement will be pushed up a week. This earlier commencement will allow the Drexel graduates to begin work at the same time as other graduates. Most job training courses and summer schools begin while Drexel's future graduates are still in school. Graduates are either out of a job or forced to wait until the next training period.

Under the present system, graduates and undergraduates alike are forced to either take their extra courses at Drexel or not at all, since most courses start before the end of Drexel's term. Summer term will begin
