

MUSCOVITE Man of War, of 72 Guns, entered our Port the Day before Yesterday, and another of 60 Guns arrived here this Day. We learn from the Crew that the Russian Ad-miral had dispatched several

Frigates from Port Mahon for the Archipelago, and that he himself departed, in order to follow them, the 3d Instant. Some Vessels are still at Mahon, waiting for the Arrival of Admiral Elphinflone; after which they are to join the Russian Fleet, at the Isle of Wisdom, and proceed on their Route to the Archipelago.

CAGLIARI, Feb. 14. We have a Report just spread here, that a Russian Frigate, of 22 Guns, has perished on the Coast of Barbary. In the late Hurricane, 120 Ships, of different Nations, have been lost on the

Venice, Feb. 28. The Inhabitants of one of the Cyclades having lately rifen against some Ottoman Troops who had landed on the Island, the Grand Signior, in Revenge, immediately fent thither a Detachment of Janizaries, who first massacred some hundreds of the richeft Jews, and afterwards put the rest of the Inhabitants to the Sword.

March 1. We are informed from Barcelona, that ten Spanish Men of War are cruizing in the Streights of Gibraltar, to observe the Motions of the Russian Fleet; and the last Letters from Provence assure, that there are actually in the Ports of that Province 22 new Ships of the Line, 10 Frigates, and fix Chebecs, ready to put to Sea.

March 3. The Arrival of the Russian Fleet gives a great deal of Uneasiness to the Divan. All the Greeks, who inhabit the Morea, have just been difarmed anew; and the Pacha of Salonica has fignified to the Inhabiand the racha of balonica has lightled to the inhabi-tants of Macedonia, that if they give Room for fuf-peting that they carry on the least Correspondence with the Russians, they shall be directly put to the Sword, their Effects conficated, and their Houses de-throyed from the new Toundation

Broyed from the very Foundation. From the Frontiers of ITALY, March 6. The last Letters from the Levant mention that the Russian Fleet had appeared at the Mands of Cephalonia and Zante, in the Ionick Sea; and that they had failed, with a fair Wind, for the Morea. We expect therefore foon

to receive some important News from thence.

DANTZICK, Feb. 14. Though Letters have been received here, that Brigadier Prince Gallitzin had entirely dispersed the Confederates some Miles from Warfaw; yet other Accounts declare that the Confederates, to the Amount of 3000, having marched towards that Capital, the Ruffians advanced to attack them, and engaged with 1800 of them near the Village of Terpilow, but were obliged to retreat to Gnatowie, which they burnt, with feveral other Villages, and continued registing will they took Shelter in the Church continued retiring, till they took Shelter in the Church and House of the regular Canons at Blonia, which the Consederates attacked with two Pieces of Artillery. On this the Muscovites sallied out Sword in Hand, in order to cut their Way through the Enemy, but the

greatest Part of them perished in the Attempt.

MADRID, March 6. The King has made several military Promotions. His Majesty has ordered the Expences of his Houshold to be greatly diminished. A Man of War of 80 Guns has been entirely destroyed by Fire in the Port of Carthagena; and the other Ships, as well as the City, narrowly escaped the Conflagra-tion. We continue sending; from the Ports of this Kingdom, Troops and warlike Stores to our different American Colonies.

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

THE Attempt now making by a few People, who have Lands bordering on the River Patowmack, to, monopolize the whole Herring Fishery on that River has been the Oceasion of much Contention, and has given very great discontent here, especially amongst the pooransort, who have hitherto been supplied with any Quantity of Fish they wanted, at the most reason-able Rates, and very often by their Friends, without paying any thing; and who have by that means, in a great Measure, been able to raise and support their Children in a comfortable manner, upon the very meanest of our Lands: Whereas it is clear to me, that should the Fishery on that River get once engrolled by a few People, we should soon see the Price of Herrings raifed to fuch a Degree, as would preclude Numbers of the Poor from that Advantage, which God in his great Wisdom and Goodness has given, and cer ainly in-tended should ever remain, in common to all Men, even as he has given the Fowls of the Air, as in them likewife no Property can be acquired, but by taking them, nor any Bounds fixed to their Flight; for which Reason I am really at a Loss to know under what Law or Gospel it is, that the Landholders on the said River derive that separate Right. The Law of Nature is clearly against them, as is also, in my Opinion, the Charter of this Province, under which I am told it is that they claim that separate Authority. By that Stipulation, an open and free Fishery is equally referved to all his Majesty's Subjects of the Kingdom of England, as may be feen in the Words following : " Saving always to us, our Heirs and Succeffors, and to all the Subjects of our Kingdoms of England and Ireland, of us, our Heirs and Succeffors, the Liberty of fifting for Sea Fish, as well in the Sea, Bays, Straits, and na-vigable Rivers, as in the Harbours, Bays and Creeks of the Province aforesaid; and the Privilege of salting and drying Fish on the Shores of the same Province; and for that Cause, to cut down and take Hedging, Wood and Twigs there growing, and to build Huts and Cabins necessary in this Behalf, in the same Manner as heretofore they reasonably might, or have used to do: Which Liberties and Privileges the said Subjects of us, our Heirs and Succeffors, shall enjoy, without notable Damage or Injury in any wife to be done to the aforefaid Baron of Baltimore, his Heirs or Affigns, or to the Refidents and Inhabitants of the fame Province, in the Ports, Creeks and Shores afore-faid, and especially in the Woods and Trees there growing. And if any shall do Damage or Injury of this kind, he shall incur the Peril and Pain of the heavy Displeasure of us, our Heirs and Successors, and of the due Chaftisement of the Laws, besides making Satisfaction.

I think it only remains now to be proved by the fame Charter, that the People of England and the People of this Province are inseparably united, and made native born Subjects of the same Kingdom; wherefore they must be inseparably meant, and were inseparably taken Care of in the abovementioned faving Article; which I shall do, by citing the tenth Article of that Agreement, in these Words: "We will also, and of our more abundant Grace, for us, our Heirs and Succeffors, do firmly charge, constitute, ordain and com-mand, that the said Province be of our Allegiance; and that all and fingular the Subjects and liege Men of us, our Heirs and Successors, transplanted, or hereaf-ter to be transplanted into the Province aforesaid, and the Children of them, and of others their Descendants, whether already born there, or hereafter to be born, be and shall be Natives, and liege Men, of us, our Heirs and Successors, of our Kingdom of England and Ireland; and in all things shall be held, treated, reputed and esteemed; as the faithful liege Men of us, and our Heirs and Successors, born within our Kingdom of England. land; alfo Lands, Tenements, Revenues, Services and other Hereditaments whatfoever, within our Kingdom of England, and other our Dominions, to inherit, or otherwise purchase, receive, take, have, hold, buy and possess, and the same to use and enjoy, and the same to give, sell, alien and hequeath; and likewise all Privileges, Franchises, and Liberties, of this our Kingdom of England, freely, quietly and peaceably, to have and pos-fels, and the same may use and enjoy, in the same man-ner of our liege Men born, or to be born, within our said Kingdom of England, without Impediment, Moleftation, Vexation, Impeachment, or Grievance, of us, or any of our Heirs or Successors; any Statute, Act, Ordinance or Provision, to the contrary thereof notwithstanding." a general evil I endency and has already been productive of feveral bloody Battles, and, as I am informed, is likely to bring on feveral expensive Lawfuits, I should be very glad to see all Parties set to Rights, by a full Discussion of it in your Paper; for which Reason it is that I now exhibit my

Notwith-itanding this, he faid, he could not arraign his Majesty, but his M-rs: Who, on this, as well upon every other Occasion, treated the Opinions of the Peo-ple with Insolence and Diffespect." As a Proof of the Affability of the King, he urged their having all had the Honour to kifs his Hand.

He mentioned " the Danger he had run in supporting the last Resolutions of the Livery in a certain As-fembly, on which Occasion (he said) he had been threatened with Confinement, Sequestration of his Effects, and even with Banishment; and which Threats he really believed would have been put in Execution but for the spirited support of another of the City's Representatives, Mr. Trecothick, and the Two worthy Sheriffs, with fome other Gentlemen."

In regard to the Refolutions of the Goldsmiths, Weavers, and Grocers, he faid, "That their Reflections were as illiberal as untrue, as that, as well as every Act of the Livery, was not done clandeftinely or infidiously, but in the Face of open Day, and with the joint Concurrence (only one excepted) of the most re-spectable Citizens in the World."

BELIEVE there is no Man, however indifferent about the Interests of this Country, who will not readily confess, that the Situation, to which we are now reduced, whether it has arisen from the Violence of Faction, or from an arbitrary System of Government, justifies the most melancholy Apprehensions, and calls for the Exertion of whatever Wildom or Vigour is left among us. The K—'s Answer to the Remonstrance of the City of London, and the Measures fince adopted by the Ministry, amount to a plain Declaration, that the Principle, on which Mr. Luttrell was feated in the House of Commons, is to be supported in all its Consequence, and carried to its utmolt Extent. The farm Spirit, which violated the Freedom of Election, now invades the Declaration and Bill of Rights, and threatens to punish the Subject for exercising a Privilege, hitherto unuisputed, of petitioning the Crown. The Grievances of the People titioning the Crown. The Grievances of the People are aggravated by Infults; their Complaints not merely difregarded, but checked by Authority; and every one of those Acts, against which they remonstrated, confirmed by the K-s decisive Approbation. At such a Moment, no honest Man will remain filent or inactive. However diftinguished by Rank or Property, in the Rights of Freedom we are all equal. As we are Englishmen, the least confiderable Man among us has an Interest, equal to the proudest Nobleman, in the Laws and Constitution of his Country, and is equally called upon to make a generous Contribution in sup-port of them; -whether it be the Heart to conceive, the Understanding to direct, or the Hand to execute. It is a common Cause, in which we are all interestad, in which we should all be engaged. The Man, who deferts it at this alarming Criss, is an Enemy to his Country, and, what I think of infinitely left Value, a Traitor to his S—n. The Subject, who is truly Loyal to the Chief Magistrate, will neither advise nor submit to arbitrary Measures. The City of London have given an Example, which, I doubt not, will be followed by the whole Kingdom. The noble Spirit of the Metropolis is the Life-Blood of the State, collect-ed at the Heart; from that Point it circulates, with Health and Vigour, through every Artery of the Con-Ritution. The Time is come, when the Body of the English People must affert their own Cause. Conscious of their Strength, and animated by a Senfe of their Duty, they will not furrender their Birth-rights to Ministers, Parliaments, or Kings.

with Freedom and Firmness; they have spoken Truth boldly; and, in whatever Light their Remonstrance may be represented by Courtiers, I defy the most subtle Lawyer in this Country to point out a fingle Inflance, in which they have exceeded the Truth. Even that Affertion, which we are told is most offensive to Parliament, in the Theory of the English Constitution, is strictly true. If any Part of the Representative Body be not chosen by the People, that Part vitiates and corrupts the Whole. If there be a Defect in the Representation of the People, that Power, which alone is equal to the making of Laws in this Country, is not compleat, and the Acts of Parliament, under that Circumitance, are not the Acts of a pure and intire Legislature. I speak of the Theory of our Constitution; and whatever Difficulties or Inconveniences may attend the Practice, I am ready to maintain, that as far as the Fact deviates from the Principle, so far the Practice is vicious and corrupt. I have not heard a Question raised upon any other Part of the Remonstrance. That the Principle, on which the Middlesex strance. That the Principle, on which the Middlefex Election was determined, is more pernicious in its Eifects, than either the levying Ship-Money by Charles the First, or the suspending Power assumed by his Son, will hardly be disputed by any Man, who understands or wishes well to the English Constitution. It is not an Act of open Violence done by the King, or any direct and palpable Breach of the Laws attempted by his Minister, that can ever endanger the Liberties of his Minister, that can ever endanger the Liberties of this Country. Against such a King or Minister the People would immediately take the Alarm, and all Parties unite to oppose him. The Laws may be grossy violated in particular Instances, without any direct Attack upon the whole System. Facts of that Kind Attack upon the whole System. Facts of that Kind-fland alone; they are attributed to Necessity, not de-fended upon Principle. We can never be really in Danger, until the Forms of Parliament are made Use of to destroy the Substance of our civil and political Liberties;—until Parliament itself betrays its Trust, by contributing to establish new Principles of Government, and employing the very Weapons, committed to it by the collective Body, to stab the Constitution.

As for the Terms of the Remoustrance, I prefume it will not be affirmed, by any Person less politized than a Gentleman Usher, that this is a Season for Compliments. Our gracious - indeed is abundantly vi-vil to himfelt. Instead of an Answer to a Petition, his very graciously pronounces his own Panegyric; and I confets that, as far as his perional Behaviour, or the royal Purity of his Intentions is concerned, the Truth of those Declarations, which the Minuter nas drawn up for his Maiter, cannot decently De disputed. In every other Respect, I adirm that they are absolutely unsupported, either in Argument or Fact. I must add too, that supposing the speech were otherwise usexceptionable, it is not a direct Aniwer to the Petition of the City. His - is pleased to fay, that he is always ready to receive the Requelts of his Subjects; yet the Sherins were twice fent back with an Excute, and it was certainly debated in Council, whether or no the Magnitrates of the City of Landon thould be admitted to an Audience. N authentic Account of a Bill, ordered to be A N authentic Account of Commons, to repeal brought into the House of Commons, to repeal fo much of an Act of the 7th of his prefent Majefly, as impofes a Duty on Paper, Glass, and Painters Co-lours, imported into the British Colonies in America, occasions this Address to you.

It is with the deepest Grief we observe the Oppresfions of America fo little regarded, as, that Duties on a few Articles, more ruinous in their Precedent, than fatal in their present Operations, should become the ferious Objects of Parliamentary Attention, while the grand Evils, which affect the Life and Soul of Ameri-

can Happiness, are totally difregarded. When the Resolutions were formed (surrounded with Difficulties as we were) on the only Plan we had left for the Recovery of our ancient Liberties (and which, we are convinced, will ultimately have their defired Effect, if we have but Virtue enough to refift the Allurements of present Gain, in Favour of the inestimable Blessings of our envied Constitution) for Want of a Communication with each other, the Colonies adopted Plans, various in Extent of Matter, and Limitations of Time: This Province, as it was among the last, so it has been the most comprehensive; and, well confidering that Liberty in Retail is but another Term for Slavery, they have included every Object which tends to fap the Foundation of their Freedom.-While the Board of Commissioners are permitted to riot with fuch an Extent of unrelenting Power; while our Property is subject to be dragged from Colony to Colony, under the Controll of an oppreffive Admiralty, we are not free : And while these Acts continue in Force, we are chained down by our Resolutions: Such is our present Situation, in which we glory. The Day of Trial is but approaching: Unanimity is absolutely necessary: And we are positive nothing but an Exer-

tion of the pureit Virtue, in the Profecution of one generally adopted Plan, can possibly revive our expring Conttitution. Should any of our Sifter Colonies take an Advantage of the Repeal of thele trifling Duties, we think it had been infinitely better to have fubinitted quietly to the Yoke, than to have discovered the deepett Knowledge of our Constitution, and a most ardent Defire of preferving it : Yet, when a Variety of Circumitances combine to infure our Succels, we think it would be nighly dishonourable to fink into a slavish Inactivity, when a spirited and steady Conduct can

alone crown our Hopes.

The People of this Province have bound themselves, in the general Cause of American Libert,, by extend-ing their Resolutions, until the Whole of their Com-piaints are removed. It would be a capital Crime in us to Juspect the public Virtue of our Countrymen; nor can we even suppose, in the most diftant Manner, this Province will fail a Sacrifice to the Purity of her Intentions. The Security of our inherent injured Rights, was the Foundation of our Agreements; until that Security is amply obtained, nothing can be raid to be done. The principal Arguments in the House of Commons were founded on the Division of the Coldnies; the Impracticability of manufacturing, and the Impossibility of continuing firm in our Non-importation. Let us convince them of our Unanimity, and the Faluty of those dishonourable Reports, which declare any Breach of Confequence in our facred Engagements, and we may be certain of Success. That Individuals will be found in every Colony, who, dead to ale tire warm Emotions of the Heart, even when Liberty is at Stake, will facrifice the only Beffings, which make Life comfortable, to the dirty Confideration of prefent Emolument, is nothing extraordinary. Worthless Men are the Produce of every Chinate; They ferve only as a Foil to fet off the Caule; and, unleis we become Traitors to our own Liberties, we have little to lear.

Our Countrymen in Great-Britain are equally engaged in the Detence of the Conditution. Surrounded on all Sides with the Minions of Government, the best Men in the Nation have piedged themselves for its Defence. These Patriots are equally the Objects of our Admiration and imitation; and, as our Blood and our Rights flow equally from the fame Source, we should scandalize the rough unremitting Virtue of our Anceitors, did we not follow their Example. Let us fuppole the worst that can befas us, that the Iron Hand of Power will at last prevail, and trample upon every Right of American Liberty; yet we think it an inditpentable Duty, which we owe to our Country and Deicendants, inflexibly to perfevere to the laft, and let Posterity record, Force obtained a Triumph over Pub-LIC VIRTUE; and though we ren, we felt with a Dignity and Spirit becoming the Sons of GREAT-BRITAIN. The favourable Opinion you were pleased at first to enterwere endeared to me, as well as r tain of my Integrity and Fortitude, has been confirmed on a Variety of Occasions, and I have experienced ed on a Variety of Occasions, and I have experienced as frequent Proofs of your unwearied Zeal for your Country, and steady Regard to me. I will go on with the same Spirit, in the Cause of a brave and free People. To their Service, to the Defence of the Laws, and to the Preservation of the religious and civil Liberties of the whole British Empire, the Remainder of my Life shall be dedicated. I rely solely and entirely on your Protection, and I will form no Connection, which may in the smallest Degree warp me from my Duty to you, either as the Dependant of a Minister, or even as the Servant of the Crown; for I think a Representative of the People ought to be perfectly free Representative of the People ought to be perfectly free and unbiaffed, in order more effectually to keep every Minister in Awe, and to oppose every Encroachment of the Prerogative, against which the House of Commons was established as a firm Barrier. I will therefore know no Influence in Parliament, but that created by the Conftitution, that of the Conftituents over their Representative, and I do not mean to acknowledge any other Conftituents, than those patriotic Friends, by whose Favour I am the legal Member for the County

I reflect, Gentlemen, with great Satisfaction, that the many tedious Months of my harsh Confinement were not uselessy employed in the common Cause of public Freedom. I have enjoyed in Priton the Fruits of my long Labours, the Glory of destroying that dreaded Engine of Arbitrary Power, so cruelly employed of late, and so often fatal to our Countrymen, a General Warrant. After every Delay of Privilege and Chicane from May 1763, an upright Jury in last No-vember declared a late Secretary of State Guilty. No Punishment, however, has reached that first and great Offender. The Treasury paid the Fine, and the whole Expence of the Profecution, and he has been even rewarded with the Cuftody of the Privy Seal. The very superior Abilities of my worthy Colleague Mr. Serjeant Glynn, were exerted through the whole of this important Caule. To his indefatigable Zeal, and Love of legal Liberty, every Subject of this Empire has the most effential Obligations. I have taken Care, that all the Proceedings in this great Struggle of the People against the usure Power of Ministers, shall be entered in the proper Court, and I hope the Record will lemain unaltered to our latest Posterity, as a compleat Triumph of Liberty over Description. compleat Triumph of Liberty over Despotism. I feel with indignant Sorrow, that I have not been equally specesful in another national Concern, which I had at Heart, I mean a strict Parliamentary Enquiry into the horrid Maffacre of our Countrymen in St. George's Fields, on the fatal 10th of May, 1768. I gave to the Public all the original Papers respecting that wicked the dding of innocent Blood, by which the Land is defiled, and I offered to bring the Evidence to the Bar of the House of Commons. The only Hope which now remains to us is, that the Virtue of a future Parliament, faithful to the Truit repoiled in them by the People, will foon purfue the Murderers, that Justice will at length overtake them, and that the most shock-ing of all Crimes will not be left unpunished. The Horror of the Action is still fresh in the Mind of every Man of Humanity, and I hold it to be the greatest Reproach of our Age and Nation, that so many of our Fellow Subjects have been basely murdered by an inhuman Soldiery in St. George's Fields, and other hired Ruffians at Brentford, without a fingle Victim to the public Justice of our Country, to the future Security of our Lives, or to the violated Laws of God and Man.

The State of this County, Gentlemen, is truly alarming. They have openly affumed the whole Legislative Power. By their Vote they have declared an Incapacity, where the Law of the Land, and common Right, rendered the Party eligible to Parliament. This Proceeding is a direct Attack both on the Form and Effence of the Constitution, a flagrant Violation of the fundamental Privileges of Englishmen, and a Robbery committed on every Elector of the Kingdom, even in the most invaluable of all his Poffeffions, the Right of Representation in the House of Commons. I feel no Paffion, but that of Gratitude to my Friends, and my only Enemies shall be those of my Country, those who still manifest a rooted, unrelenting Malice against the Liberties of this Kingdom, and who endeavour to entail Slavery on us and our Posterity. If my Profecutions are not yet ended, I will continue to bear up as a Man, firm and determined in the best of Causes; nor for your Sakes will I scruple to dare all the Vengeance of those wretched Ministers, who are now the Rulers over us, wretched Ministers, who are now the Rulers over us, but possels neither the Considence, nor the Esteem of the People. If his Majesty be graciously pleased to listen to the Cries of a loyal, but injured Nation, and to remove a most corrupt and despotic Administration, who are every Day basely and desperately stabbing the very Vitals of the Constitution, I shall then hope to live among you in the Enjoyment of the first Blesing, and the most sovereign Good, Liberty, both personal and political; and when I can no longer be useful to my Country, to die happy, in the Applause of the Friends of Freedom, and of England.

And therefore that we will renounce all Commerce, Connexion, and Intercourse with them: And as the Inhabitants of Newport in general, have not expressed that Detestation and Resentment of such base and perfidious Behaviour, which their Sifter Colonies had just Reason to expect, we will break off all Trade and Commerce with the Inhabitants of faid Town of Newport, until they shall have given full Satistaction for their base Duplicity of Conduct towards their Brethren on the Continent. And we rely upon the public Spirit and Virtue of the Inhabitants of Salem, Nantucket, and other trading and fifting Towns in this Province; as alio of the Provinces and Colonies of Connecticut, New-York, New-Jerfey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia, the Carolina's, &c. that they will heartily concur with us in this Refolution. And further voted, That we will view in the fame

odious Light, and treat in the same contemptuous and resentful Manner, all those, who shall hold Commerce with the faid Merchants and Inhabitants of Newport, as we do those who are wicked and hardy enough to have Communication with the few Importers reliding in this Province.

VOTED, That the Standing Committee of Merchan's be, and hereby are defired to transmit a Copy of the for egoing Vote to the late Standing Committee of Mer-chants in Newport; who in their Letter have expressed the Sentiments of public Spirit, and a just Abhorrence of the Perfidy of the aforesaid Importers, and the mer-cenary Disposition which their Conduct has evidently discovered.

NEWPORT, Rhode-Island, June 4. Last Week the Merchants and I raders of this Town had Two Meetings, at which they concluded to renew their former Agreement of Non-importation, and appointed a Committee of Inspection; who waited on all those who had received any Goods contrary to said Agreement, and received all such Goods under their Care, as were then on Hand, which they put into Chests, Tranks, &c. and secured them properly; which Goods the Committee are determined to visit at least once every Week, 'til the Duty on Tea is repealed, and expose every Person who shall be so base as to offer to open any of the Packages; and to render it impossible for the Owners of faid Goods to commit any Fraud without being discovered, the Committee took an exact Invoice of each Perion's Goods.

ANNAPOLIS, JUNE 21. The COMMITTEE OF INSPECTION, appointed at Annapolis, request the Importers of Goods into Annabelis and its Neighbourhood, which have been already landed, to lay their Papers before the Committee, at their Meeting, on Tuesday the 26th Instant.

And, as to Goods hereafter imported, the Com-mittee defire the Papers may be submitted to Inspection before the landing of the Goods.

HE impolitic Behaviour of fome People, in fome Parts of this Province (and I wish it may not be the Case in other Governments on this Continent), with Respect to the Act of Parliament, imposing Duties and Taxes on his Majetty's American Subjects, I think ought and must give every Well-wisher to the Rights, Liberties, and Privileges, of the People, on this Continent, great Concern and Uncasiness.

We hear of Letters being received from a neighbouring Government, intimating, that the Merchants and Traders in that Government are inclined to import Goods, as usual, excepting the Article of TEA. It is possible, the Merchants and Traders in that Government may receive Letters, to the fame Purport, from fome of the Merchants and Traders in this Government. It may be the Practice of the Tools of (or those who would willingly be such) to fend Letters of the same Kind, from Government to Government, throughout the Continent; by which Means, the People may be duped into an entire Neglect of their Resolutions, throughout his Majesty's Dominions in America; and the M y and P to of Britain thereby obtain their Ends; in taxing the American Subjects at their Will and Pleafdre.

Certainly a Moment's Reflection mult convince every thinking Man, how unwilling the Mitty and their -t are to part with their favourite Scheme of taxing, or preferving a Precedent for tax-ing, the Americans, as they shall think fit bereafter. We are told they have repealed the Duties on every Article but TEA: Can fuch a partial Repeal be any ways fatisfactory to the Americans? No. It bught to put them more than ever upon their Guard, and, inflead of increasing, we ought rather to curtail both the Importation and Consumption of British Manufactures; especially as it is well known, that the whole Duties, imposed by that Act, would not defray the Expence to the Nation for collecting them: And how much greater must the Expense be to the Mation, for collecting the Duty on TEA ONLY.

This ought to convince every British Subject, that it was more for the Sake of supporting a Pack of M-Tools, than for any real Good to the Nation, toat such a Law was ever thought of. This ought to convince every American Subject, that it was more for the Sake of laying heavier Burdens on them hereafter, than for any real Benefit or Advantage to the Nation, that fuch a Law was ever attempted to be enforced on the Ame. ricans, who have the whole and fole Right, by their Charters, of taxing themselves by their own Representatives.

Discord and Division in the Community has proved the Ruin of many a State and Nation. Those Commotions have generally been raised by a Set of Wretches, who, either through Thirst of Power to tyrannife over their Fellow-Creatures, or Want of Money to support them in Luxury and Debauchery, would even facrifice their own Souls. And what Regard can fuch miferable Wretches have, for the temporal Happiness and Welfare of their Fellow Mortals in this Life?

It therefore behoves every Member of Society here, who has any Regard for the Freedom and Privileges of themselves and their Descendants hereafter, to use every Means in their Power to detect and expose any such Person (let his Rank and Condition in Life be what it will), who pursues any Measures destructive to the Rights and Liberties of ourselves and Posterity, either by violating the Resolutions, or attempting any Thing that may tend to the difuniting the People on this Continent. By those Means we may be able to preserve our Liberty, and, with that, our Layalty to our Sove-reign; which I hope can be no Ways doubted, espe-cially if the Mother-Country would look a few Years back, and confider how willingly the Americans spent their Blood and Treasure, not only in defending, but in gaining new Conquests to their Sovereign's Domi-

Liberty and Loyalty, my Countrymen, must either stand or fall together. Tyranny may destroy Liberty, and has done it in many opulent Nations; but what have been the Confequences attending it? The Sovereign and his Subjects have fuffered a mere Hell upon Earth: The Sovereign, in continual Doubts of the Loyalty of his Subjects, and daily perplexed in finding out new Schemes of Oppression, to keep them in a State of Obedience; the Subjects, on the other Hand, daily

feeking, with Anxiety of Mind, an Opportunity to re-leafe themselves both from their Sovereign and Slavery. This has cost some Sovereigns and many Subjects proved the Overthrow of Kingdoms and Nations. Some Tyrants and their Successors have continued to rule with a Rod of Iron; but how wretched must the Fate of those be who are ruled by them ! That it may never be the Cafe in America, I fincerely wish that every Subject in it would unite, as one Man, and purfue every reasonable Mea-fure, to preserve the Rights and Liberties of themselves and Posterity to future Ages, by a firm and steady Adherence to our Resolutions for Non-importation and Consumption of British Manufactures, which may possibly be a Means of restoring us to our former State and

This being obtained, I should be forry to think, and much more to to know, that there was One American, who would not hold their Loyalty facred to their Sovereign, or as chearfully as ever risque their Lives and Fortunes, in supporting the Honour and Dignity of the Crown, and the Interest of the Nation in general.

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

Convince him, that the higher he is elevated, the less he can be concealed; that the more Power he is invested with, the more cautiously he should act; that a King should be less conspicuous from the Ensigns of State, than the Splendor of his Virtues. Let him never think himself a Prince till he has banished Calamity from his Kingdom, reedified its Ruins, annihilated Tyranny, and established Freedom. A Stare should ever be pre-fent to the Mind, of its Sovereign. Love to his Subjects alone can fecure their Affection to him. Arms and Treasures are insufficient Guards for Kings : Friends are their best Defence, and these are to be acquired neither by Force nor by Riches, but Fidelity and good Offices. In the Choice of his Counsellors let him accurately deliberate; when determined, let him confide in the Men of his Choice. To diftinguish between a Friend and an Enemy in Difguife, is a Quali-fication of the highest Worth, and which few Princes have ever possessed. Deserved Praise will be an Incitement to Virtue, Flattery its most baneful Poison. To fuppose that those love us, whom we do not esteem, is an Error; and to demand what they will not give is Injustice. Nothing is less restrained than the human Heart; it acknowledges no Master, it knows no Subjection. Let his Breast be never opened to Suspicion, nor his Ear inclined to Calumny. Let him never mask his Designs to others, nor pry into what they would hide. It is by him they will regulate their Conduct. He therefore becomes responsible for the Crimes they commit from his Example. How irreproachable then should be his Manners! Teach him to contemn Luxury and to trample upon Pleafure

Let him fludy the Lives of those who have dignished Humanity, that he himself may add to their Number. Them he should consider as Guides in the Road to Glory. Let him compare his Conduct with theirs, and this will elevate his Soul. How facred is that Emulation which arises from the Love of Virtue! Let him, with equal Attention, confider the Misconduct of his Predecessors, and that shall secure him from Destruc-

Such, Sir, are the Outlines of your Duty. Accom-plish what you have undertaken. He who partakes of the Glory should share likewise the Toil.
