The FSU Homecoming Weekend will come to a close with the President's Concert on Sunday, Oct. 24, at 3 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center, Pealer Recital Hall. This year's concert features alumnus Baritone Eugene Galvin, outstanding student musicians, the FSU Jazz Ensemble, the Percussion Ensemble and the Chamber Choir

The FSU Jazz Ensemble, under the direction of James Moore, will open the concert with John La Barbera's "Fly Me to the Moon," featuring soprano Belita Williams.

The Percussion Ensemble, Ronald Horner, director, will perform "Head Talk" by Mark Ford.

Alumnus Eugene Galvin will perform Rossini's Alidoro's Aria from "La Cenerentola" and selections by Franz Schubert. Galvin holds a D.M.A. in Opera Performance from the University of Maryland, an M.M. degree from the Catholic University of America, and a B.A. from FSU. He currently teaches voice at The Catholic University of America and University of Maryland, where he also directs the Opera Workshop. Galvin has sung with the Washington, Wolf Trap, Cincinnati, Sarasota and National operas, Opera New England, Opera Theater of Northern Virginia and Summer Opera Theater companies, at Constitution Hall as Sarastro in "Magic Flute" under the baton of Victor Borge, and as the title character in "Marriage of Figaro" with the New York Grand Opera. His roles also include Basilio, Don Giovanni, Colline, Dulcamara and Alidoro. Most recently he created two roles in Wolf Trap Opera's critically acclaimed world premiere of John Musto's "Volpone."

The Chamber Choir, under the direction of Dr. Karen Soderberg-Sarnaker will conclude the concert with "Fabodpsalm fran Dalarna" featuring Lauren Spinnenweber, soprano and Lisa Wenzel, flute. Lecturer to Discuss Tarantino, Other Films

The English Department and the Faculty Development and Sabbatical Committee will present a public lecture by Professor Alan Manton on two Quentin Tarantino films ("Kill Bill" and "Kill Bill 2") and Pedro Almodovar's 2002 film "Talk to Her."

The lecture, with film clips, will be given on Thursday, Oct. 28, in Compton Science Center, room 226, beginning at 7:30 p.m. Munton, currently senior research fellow in English, University of Plymouth, U.K., will discuss the hyperactive and violent film "Kill Bill" as it draws upon earlier films, and, despite its innovative techniques, pursues

known narrative tropes. "Talk to Her" revolves around two characters, each in a coma, like the protagonist of "Kill Bill"; the narrative direction is strikingly original. In this illustrated lecture, Munton sets the film cultures of the U.S. and Europe against each other, yet finds in these films unexpected convergences in method and intention. Audiences should be aware that the presentation will include film clips from the three films discussed. One clip parodies a fictional silent film, "The Shrinking Lover," and contains imagery that some viewers might find disturbing. Other scenes are also graphically violent.

FSU housekeeping employee *Wallace J. "Wally" Beery*, a resident of Cumberland, received the 2004 Staff Award in the category of Outstanding Service to Students from the University System of Maryland Board of Regents.

Beery, who is a housekeeper in Frost Residence Hall, was nominated by FSU's Assistant Director of Residence Life Elizabeth Frost for his devotion to both the university and its student population.

The Regents' Staff Award is the highest honor bestowed by the Board of Regents to recognize the achievements of salaried and hourly employees of the USM. Each reward recipient receives a certificate presented during a ceremony at a Board of Regents meeting and a monetary prize of \$1,000.

Beery's honor gives FSU the distinction of having an award winner for three consecutive years.
