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## Clapsaddle, Forrester to Be Awarded FSU Distinguished Alumni Achievement Awards

FSU will present the 2015 Distinguished Alumni Achievement Awards to **Mary Clapsaddle**, a community planner for the city of Baltimore, and **Col. Ron Forrester**, retired senior military analyst, at its 146th commencement ceremony on **Thursday, May 21**. Clapsaddle will be honored during the 9:30 a.m. ceremony for the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and Forrester will be honored at the 2 p.m. ceremony for the Colleges of Business and Education.

Clapsaddle, a member of the class of '83, joined the Baltimore City Department of Planning in 2014, where she serves as a community planner in the northwest area of the city, working to revitalize communities and build healthy, vibrant neighborhoods. Previously, Clapsaddle was operating budget manager with the Department of Legislative Services, the nonpartisan staff agency to the Maryland General Assembly, where she supervised a team of analysts supporting the General Assembly in its oversight of fiscal policy and review of agency budgets and performance outcomes. She has also served as assistant state superintendent for Business Services with the Maryland State Department of Education and director of Policy Development with the Maryland Department of Business and Economic Development. Clapsaddle began her career in Maryland government as a budget analyst with the Department of Legislative Services after six years as assistant to the Chatham (N.C.) County Manager. She also holds a master's in regional planning from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Forrester, a member of the class of '67, dedicated 45 years to the U.S. military, for which he served in a variety of roles with increasing responsibility and status. He spent 26 years in the U.S. Air Force as a missile and space operator, had two tours as a detachment and squadron commander, was chief of the Global Forces division and retired in the grade of colonel in 1993 while serving at the Pentagon. As a civilian, he served as senior systems analyst/project manager and then director of Operations at Science Applications International Corp. before becoming a senior military analyst there. Forrester graduated cum laude with a bachelor's degree in secondary education. In 1976, he earned a master's degree in public administration from the University of Oklahoma. He is the president of the FSU Alumni Association Board of Directors and is a strong financial supporter of the FSU Annual Fund and the FSU Foundation.

The Distinguished Alumni Achievement Award is one of the most prestigious honors bestowed on FSU alumni. Consideration is based on outstanding professional career growth; community involvement; demonstrated interest in their alma mater; philanthropic commitment to FSU; special achievements, awards, honors and distinctions; and/or educational background, which includes honors and involvement in special activities.

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# Headlee Named FSU College of Business Alumnus of the Year



The FSU College of Business has named **Terry Headlee** of Martinsburg, W.Va., Alumnus of the Year. Dr. Cathy Ashley-Coteleur, MBA coordinator and one of Headlee’s faculty members, presented Headlee with the honor at FSU’s annual College of Business Honors Reception on May 8. The event also recognized the top business faculty and students of the year.

A member of the MBA class of 2003, Headlee is managing editor of The Frederick News-Post and chair of the Editorial Committee for the Maryland, Delaware and D.C. (MDDC) Press Association. While a student in Frostburg’s MBA program, he served on the newly formed Student Advisory Council, implemented as a key constituent group for the accreditation of FSU’s College of Business with AACSB International. Upon graduation, Headlee was asked to then serve on the College of Business Advisory Board, which encompasses alumni from various backgrounds who aid in supporting program recommendations and decisions. Headlee has been an active member of this board for 10 years.

In accepting the award, Headlee said that the principles he learned in the pursuit of his MBA have been invaluable as he took on the leadership of newsrooms in Hagerstown and Frederick, where he found that he needed a strong background in the foundations of business as well as journalism.

“I know you all know that I’m in a very turbulent industry right now. It’s undergoing change all the time, and to keep up with that you not only have to have strong journalistic standards and knowledge, but you also have to have a keen sense of the business world, everything from marketing to troubleshooting and problem solving as well as human resources,” Headlee said.

Headlee previously worked for the Hagerstown Herald-Mail for nearly 23 years, including as executive editor from 2000 to 2008, and was a reporter for the Journal in Martinsburg before joining the Herald-Mail. He has won 35 writing awards.

In his work with the MDDC Press Association, he chairs the committee responsible for editorial contest recommendations, coordinating regional or statewide initiatives that improve access to public documents and providing recommendations for professional development and training. As chair of the student internship program, he selects candidates and places interns with member papers.

A native of Dublin, Ohio, Headlee earned his bachelor’s degree in journalism from Kent State University.

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## Value Colleges Lists FSU’s Online MBA Among Top 50 in the Country



Another online organizations focused on identifying best values in online MBA programs has ranked FSU’s program among the top 50 in the nation in recent weeks.

In addition to Affordable Colleges Online, which ranked FSU number 12 of the Best Online MBA Programs in the country, Value Colleges, an online resource of accredited programs, rated FSU’s MBA number 41 among its Top 50 Best Value Online MBA Programs of 2015.

“Ever since 2012, when we moved our MBA program to an exclusively online delivery format, we have made a strong commitment to ensure that our MBA students can benefit from an online learning environment that provides them with a high-quality graduate program at the most affordable cost, said Dr. Ahmad Tootoonchi, dean of FSU’s College of Business. “We are truly proud of our MBA program, because it is accredited by AACSB, taught by a team of highly qualified faculty and supported by outstanding academic and technological services. This has all been made possible due to strong teamwork among our MBA coordinator, our outstanding faculty and the Office of Graduate Services.”

Value Colleges considered and evaluated all AACSB-accredited business schools in the U.S. according to their complete cost, average return on investment and average starting salary for graduates to find the right balance for value-conscious students. Its website guides students to the most trustworthy programs with the lowest student debt and highest returns with fully researched rankings and FAQs.

To build its list, Value Colleges used national ranking (2015 U.S. News & World Report Online MBA), tuition cost (per non-resident credit, reported from the institution’s website) and median salaries for graduates of each respective institution (through reports on [www.payscale.com](http://www.payscale.com)). Its method ranks these schools by each metric, then finds which of them hit the right balance to produce the best overall value for a student’s time and money.

In addition to low cost and AACSB accreditation, Value Colleges pointed out FSU’s global perspective in the world of business, in which online learners can take advantage of international learning experiences offered through the University. The College of Business has been very involved in setting up international trips recently, including to China, Ecuador, Peru and Brazil. Both undergraduate and graduate business students traveled for a portion of the summer session, meeting business managers, government officials and ordinary people in their exploration of the topics of economic development and leadership. They then finished up with online coursework.

Value Colleges also noted that the online MBA program is between 36 and 42 credits in total (depending on academic background) and can be completed in as little as 12 months going full-time.

### FSU Wildlife Society Students Place Third in Southeastern Wildlife Conclave

A team representing the FSU Student Chapter of the Wildlife Society placed third in the Southeastern Wildlife Conclave this spring at Virginia Tech University.

FSU placed third among 20 regional colleges and universities and 400 students who competed. The Southeastern Wildlife Conclave is an intense competition of mental and physical feats showing mastery and knowledge of wildlife skills. University of Tennessee Knoxville placed first and University of Georgia placed second.

In addition to receiving a plaque to commemorate FSU's accomplishment, it is customary at the event for the top three winning teams to receive framed wildlife paintings. FSU received a painting featuring a deer passing through autumn foliage lining a gravel road leading to a barn.

FSU's top-three finish demonstrates both the commitment of the students to excelling at the competition as well as showing off the quality of FSU's Department of Biology and Natural Resources, said **Dr. Frank Ammer**, associate professor and faculty adviser for the student chapter.

"It makes our University look outstanding and our biology students strong," Ammer said.

Students had to identify plant and animal specimens, navigate an obstacle course and an orienteering course, demonstrate sharp-shooting skills with rifle and bow, display precision of fly casting, show off artistic skills with field photography, free-form art, drawing, game calling and then square off in a Quiz Bowl – a "Wildlife Jeopardy" of sorts.

The Quiz Bowl team included captain **Kenny Weaver**, **Becca Hiller**, **Sarah Pesi**, **Sean Knox** and alternate **Meta Griffin**. Individual award winners included **Aaron Bishop**, third-place free-form art; **Amanda Boisvert**, third-place photography; and **Ian Cheek**, third-place dendrology.

The event, hosted by the Virginia Tech Student Chapter of The Wildlife Society, also featured workshops and field trips, including a visit to the Virginia Tech Black Bear Research Center and a tour of the Roanoke Wildlife Rescue Center.

FSU students spend countless hours preparing for the competition.

"These students have been working for months dedicating themselves to this," Ammer said. "The Quiz Bowl team has been preparing for a year."

Eight media reports by students in **Andy Duncan's** ENGL 355 class, Socially Networked Journalism, have been published online by Project Censored ([www.projectcensored.org](http://www.projectcensored.org)), a California-based nonprofit watchdog organization for which student volunteers highlight unjustly overlooked news stories.

This is the third year that Duncan's ENGL 355 students have contributed to Project Censored; a search for "Frostburg" at the Project Censored website yields 27 published reports. Moreover, two FSU students, **Skye Pinney** and **Dylan Scherpf**, have had their work published in Project Censored's annual compilation volumes.

While students of any major or minor are welcome in ENGL 355, offered each fall, it is one of the courses that counts toward FSU's minor in journalism and minor in public relations, which are excellent complements to such majors as communication,
