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FSU Faculty Member Dr. Yan Bao Honored With USM Award for Teaching



Dr. Yan Bao, an associate professor in FSU's Department of Accounting, has been awarded the Regents' Faculty Award for Teaching, the highest honor that the University System of Maryland Board of Regents bestows to recognize exemplary faculty achievement. She will be honored at the **April 10** meeting of the board.

Bao's honor marks the seventh time since 2007 that an FSU faculty member has been honored by the regents.

"Dr. Bao has been one of the most dynamic faculty members at the FSU College of Business since 2002 at both the undergraduate and graduate levels," said Dr. Ahmad Tootoonchi, dean of FSU's College of Business. "She has routinely earned one of the highest evaluation ratings in the College of Business for the past 10 years – especially in the area of teaching. This has been due to her student-centered teaching philosophy and her commitment to innovative and engaging teaching approaches."

Her students' comments have consistently reflected her caring attitude and devotion, regardless of the mode of course delivery, whether it be face to face, blended or online.

"Some students learn better through lecture, others through reading or PowerPoints and others may learn better through trial and error. In Dr. Bao's class, you were never at a disadvantage if you learned better through a certain method because she literally made ALL of them available for students," said current MBA student Lauren Martin.

One of Bao's recent accomplishments in teaching is a successful design of the MBA Financial Accounting online class. The College of Business experienced a significant enrollment increase when the online MBA program was launched in fall 2011. Bao carefully designed her online delivery model by incorporating various technologies to provide a quality learning environment similar to that in a face-to-face class.

She uses an online homework system to enable students to receive instant feedback; an online conference room to help students ease their fears, ask questions and participate in discussions; and a project to challenge students to learn how to make financial statement analysis using annual reports of publicly traded companies, which enables them to apply the knowledge they acquire to real-world settings.

In addition, she coached other faculty at the University to help them improve their online teaching skills by conducting workshops in online class design and effective utilization of technology in distance education.

Further, Bao has been one of the first few faculty members who took on the leadership of incorporating global-experiential learning into FSU's curriculum by organizing two College of Business-sponsored study abroad programs called "Impact China," a hallmark of the University's experiential educations initiatives. These projects turned out to be highly valuable global learning experiences for students.

Courses are offered in the first six-week session of every summer starting from 2012, with two-week travel and four-week online instruction. During the two-week travel, students have opportunities to appreciate different cultures, understand diversity and complexity in the changing world and investigate issues in the increasingly globalized society through hands-on learning and living experience.

Impact China inspired many students to explore the educational opportunities abroad as well as many faculty members to lead

customized study abroad programs, witnessed by an increasing number of such programs campuswide since 2012. Recently, her efforts in incorporating global experiential learning in the College of Business have been expanded to direct communication with universities in China for establishing collaborative academic programs in undergraduate degrees such as a program in accounting between FSU and some prestigious institutions of higher education in China.

Finally, Bao has been a board member for the Chinese Immersion program in West Side Elementary School in the Allegany County Public Schools. This noteworthy program has gained excellent results and accompanying publicity and is an outstanding example of the University's PK-20 collaborative efforts.

"Bao's extensive work with College of Business and University outreach, collaboration and international education have gone far above and beyond required faculty duties," said FSU Provost Dr. William Childs. "These actions have brought recognition to the University with our China initiatives."

Scholar-in-Residence to Share Contemplative Practices for Personal and Organizational Leadership With Faculty, Staff and Students



Dr. Annette M. Holba will serve as the Leadership Scholar-in-Residence for a full day of sessions on **Tuesday**, **April 7**, at FSU.

Holba is an associate professor of rhetoric at Plymouth State University in Plymouth, N.H., where she teaches communication/media studies and philosophy courses. She serves as the editor of "Qualitative Research Reports in Communication," and her books include "Transformative Leisure: A Philosophy of Communication," "An Overture to Philosophy of Communication: The Carrier of Meaning" (co-authored with Ronald C. Arnett), "Philosophical Leisure: Recuperative Praxis for Human Communication" and "Lizzie Borden Took an Axe, or

Did She? A Rhetorical Inquiry." She also co-authored and co-edited four other books related to the philosophy of communication, rhetoric and women's leadership, including "Communicative Understandings of Women's Leadership Development: From Ceilings of Glass to Labyrinth Paths" (Lexington Books, 2011), co-edited with **Dr. Elesha Ruminski** of FSU's Communication Studies and Leadership Studies programs.

Before receiving her doctorate, Holba worked for 11 years in law enforcement as a county detective with the Burlington County Prosecutor's Office in New Jersey, where she was assigned to the Sexual Assault and Child Abuse Unit as well as Major Crimes. During her service in law enforcement, she primarily investigated sex crimes and homicide, as well as held special assignments in other divisions. Additionally, as a certified police instructor, she trained other detectives in forensic child interviewing and the NJ Title 2C criminal code annual updates. Holba's scholarly interests include philosophy of communication, communication ethics and mindful leadership. Recently, her research interests have led her to explore contemplative practices through PSU's Personal Approaches to Transformation and Healing (PATH) Institute, which focuses on organizational transformation. Holba takes and teaches courses in the master's program in Personal and Organizational Wellness within the PATH Institute, which provides experiential and academic opportunities to study integrative health and healing concepts. Based on the growing awareness of mind, body and spirit interactions in holistic healing and wellness, this program builds on the movement that influenced Congress in 1992 to establish what is now the Center for Complementary and Alternative Medicine within the

National Institutes of Health.

President Gibralter's Budget Testimony Before the General Assembly

President Jonathan Gibralter testified on behalf of FSU at the House Appropriations Education and Economic Development Subcommittee on Thursday, Feb. 19, and again before the Senate Budget and Taxation Education, Business and Administration Subcommittee on Monday, Feb. 23. He urged passage of Governor Hogan's FY 2016 budget, and, in recognition of the ongoing budget reductions even with a proposed tuition increase, to consider passage of any supplemental budget that may be proposed to assist USM.

Gibralter briefly described how FSU has progressed since his last testimony in 2013, including a record headcount enrollment; improved academic credentials of new students as well as improved retention and graduation rates; and new programs at the undergraduate, graduate and doctoral levels designed to meet market demands and needs. He emphasized FSU's economic impact on the state, especially in Western Maryland, where the construction of FSU's new Center for Communications and Information Technology meant more than 400,000 labor hours for predominantly Maryland-based construction workers and Western Maryland-based subcontractors.

The Frostburg Community Coalition encourages members of the Frostburg community to use the 301-687-STOP (7867) tip line to provide anonymous information about crimes, disturbances or other issues of concern.

On calling the tip line, the caller will listen to a recorded message for instructions and be directed to leave a message containing the information he or she wishes to share. Exactly 5 minutes after a message is recorded, the message is automatically sent to FSU Central Communications to be routed immediately to the appropriate agency. The messages are completely anonymous, without numbers or names connected to them.

This unique tip line allows tip-givers to share information without needing to reveal their identity, and is intended for students and members of the campus and local Frostburg community. The coalition also encourages students and parents from Mountain Ridge High School and Mount Savage and Westmar middle schools to use the tip line. Callers are still welcome to contact University Police, Frostburg City Police or other offices directly.

If you see violations of law in your community, look out for your neighborhood and make the call. Callers should still call 911 in an emergency.
