FROM THE VOTES OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Mercurii 18 Die Martii, 1761.

Resolved, Nemine Contradicente,

THAT the Thanks of this House be given to Mr. Speaker, for his constant and unwearied Attendance in the Chair, during the Course of above Thirty-three Years, in five successive Parliaments; for the unshaken Integrity and steady Impartiality of his Conduct there; and for the indefatigable Pains he has, with uncommon Abilities, constantly taken to promote the real Interest of his King and Country, to maintain the Honour and Dignity of Parliament, and to preserve inviolable the Rights and Privileges of the Commons of Great-Britain.

Upon which Mr. Speaker said, *I WAS never under so great a Difficulty in my Life to know what to say in this Place, as I am at present. I can stand against Misfortunes and Distresses; I have stood against Misfortunes and Distresses, and may do so again; but I am not able to stand this overflow of Good-will and Honour to me. It overpowers me; and had I all the Strength of Legions, I could never express the full Sentiments of my Heart, upon this Occasion, of Thanks and Gratitude. If I have been happy enough to perform any Services here, that are acceptable to the House, I am sure I now receive the noblest Reward for them; the noblest that any Man can receive for any Merit, far superior, in my Estimation, to all the other Emoluments of this World. I owe every Thing to this House; I not only owe to this House, that I am in this Place, but that I have had their constant Support in it; and to their Good-will and Assistance, their Tendency and Indulgence towards me in my Errors, it is, that I have been able to perform my Duty here to any Degree of Approbation: Thanks therefore are not so much due to me for these Services, as to the House itself, who made them to be Services in me.*

When I began my Duty here, I set out with a Resolution, and Promise to the House, to be impartial in every Thing, and to show Respect to every Body. The first I know I have done, it is the only Merit I can assume: If I have failed in the other, it was unwillingly, it was inadvertently; and I ask their Pardon, most sincerely, to whomsoever it may have happened. I can truly say, the giving Satisfaction to all has been my constant Aim, my Study, and my Pride.

And now, Sirs, I am to take my last Leave of you. It is, I confess, with Regret, because the being within these Walls has ever been the chief Pleasure of my Life: But my advanced Age and Infirmities, and some other Reasons, call for Retirement and Solitude. There I shall spend the Remainder of my Days; and shall only leave Power to hope, and to pray, and my Hopes and Prayers, my daily Prayer, will be for the Continuance of the Constitution in general, and that the Freedom, the Dignity, and Authority of this House, may be perpetual.

Resolved, Nemine Contradicente, That the Thanks of this House be given to Mr. Speaker, for what he has now said to the House, and that the same be printed in the Votes of this Day.

Resolved, Nemine Contradicente, That an humble Address be presented to his Majesty, humbly to beseech his Majesty, that he will be graciously pleased to confer some signal Mark of his Royal Favour upon the Right Hon. Arthur Onslow, Esq; Speaker of this House, for his great and eminent Services performed to his Country, for the Space of thirty-three Years and upwards; during which he has, with such distinguished Ability and Integrity, presided in the Chair of this House; and to assure his Majesty, that whatever Expence his Majesty shall think proper to be incurred upon that Account, this House will make good the same to his Majesty.

Mr. Vice Chamberlain reported to the House, that their Address of Yesterday had been presented to his Majesty: And that his Majesty was pleased to give the following most gracious Answer:

That his Majesty has the justest Sense of the long Services and great Merits of Mr. Onslow, present Speaker of the House of Commons; and has already taken the same into his Consideration; and that he will do therein what shall appear to his Majesty to be most proper, agreeable to the Desire of his faithful Commons.

By the KING. A Proclamation for dissolving this present Parliament, and declaring the Calling of another.

GEORGE R. WHEREAS we have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the seventh Day of April next; we do for that End publish this our royal Proclamation; and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on Tuesday the said seventh Day of April next. And we being desirous and resolved, as soon as may be, to meet our People, and have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all our loving Subjects our royal Will and Pleasure to call a new Parliament; and do hereby further declare, That with the Advice of our Privy Council, we have this Day given

Orders to our Chancellor of Great-Britain, to issue out Writs in due Form, for calling a new Parliament; which Writs are to bear Test on Saturday the 21st Day of this Instant March, and to be returnable on Tuesday the 19th Day of May next.

GIVEN at our Court at St. James's, the 20th Day of March, 1761, in the first Year of our Reign. G O D Save the KING.

L O N D O N. March 14. We are informed, that in the eight large Store-ships which were some Time ago sent to Quebec, where they are safe arrived, there were, among other Articles, 7000 Barrels of Gunpowder, 75 Pieces of Cannon, and Cloathing for 12 Regiments; from which there is little Reason to doubt, but the Intention of the Government is to keep Possession of those valuable Acquisitions in America, which have cost the Nation so much Blood and Treasure to acquire.

The King of Prussia has assigned a large Sum of Money to purchase Bread for the Poor of Berlin.

St. James's, March 17. The King having this Day thought fit to dissolve the Privy Council, and at the same Time, to appoint a new one, consisting of the same Members with the former Council, together with Anthony Earl of Shaftesbury, all the Lords and others present were there-upon sworn of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy-Council, and took their Places at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty was then pleased to declare the Right Hon. John Earl Granville, Lord President of his Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

March 19. It is said the Earl of Holderness will have a Pension of 2000l. per Annum settled upon him, and the Reversion of Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, for himself, his Son, and Grandson.

Portsmouth, March 10. This Day about Noon, arrived at Spithead, Sir Edward Hawke, in his Majesty's Ship the Royal George, and Sir Charles Hardy, in the Union, from Quiberon, with two French Frigates of 14 Guns each, a Vessel from Martinico, and two or three smaller Prizes, taken by different Ships of the Quiberon Squadron.

March 21. There was the greatest Number of Ladies of Quality and Persons of Distinction at the House of Peers Yesterday, ever known on any Occasion.

It is said that Triennial Parliaments will soon be revived. Last Night great Rejoicings and Illuminations were made at all the Goals of this City, on Account of his Majesty's signing the Insolvent Act.

The Supplies granted for the present Year amount to 18,816,119 l. 19 s. 9 d. three Farthings.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, March 22.

"Saturday Afternoon the Hon. Commodore Keppel arrived here from London.

"Sunday Morning Morgan's Light Infantry, and Rufane's Regiment, marched from Hilley Barracks to the South Sea Beach, from whence they embarked with the greatest Cheerfulness. The flat-bottomed Boats took them off the Beach, and put them on board Cutters, which lay a little way off. The Cutters took them to Spithead, and put them on board the Transports.

"To-morrow we expect the two Regiments that are in Hilley Barracks, to embark in the same Manner as the above.

"The same Morning sailed into the Harbour directly from Sea the two missing Transports, with two Companies of Rufane's Men on board.

"Our Expedition is in Reality taking Place. It will be a grand Armament. Such Emulation and Unanimity have hardly ever been known between our Sea and Land Forces as at present."

A Gentleman at the Court End of the Town has laid a Wager of 1000 Guineas that he will produce 29 Horses that shall run 2900 Miles in 29 Days successively; that each Horse shall run 100 Miles a Day, and the Whole to be rode by one Man.

Orders have been given, that no more Contributions should be raised in the Bishopric of Osnabrug.

The Candidates for the Bishopric of Cologne are, the Prince Bishop of Liege, an Austrian Archduke, a Prince of Saxony, and the Count de Manderscheid-Blankenheim, Grand-dean of the Chapter of Cologne.

It is supposed that Prince Charles of Lorraine will succeed the late Elector of Cologne as Grand Master of the Teutonic Order.

The 14th Day of next Month is appointed for the Formality of electing a new Prince for the Bishopric of Osnabrug.

March 17. We hear that fourteen Commoners were created Peers of the Realm Yesterday; among whom were Sir Richard Grosvenor, by the Title of Lord Grosvenor, of Eaton, in Cheshire; Sir Thomas Robinson, Lord Grantham; Sir Nathaniel Curzon, Lord Scarfale; the Hon. George Doddington, Lord Melcomb-Regis; the Hon. Mr. Spencer, Lord Spencer; Sir William Irbys, Lord Boston; the Hon. Mr. Carpenter, Lord Tyrconnell; and Sir John Turner, Lord Winterton.

March 24. On Saturday Evening, about 10 o'clock, a Party of Horse Guards went for Portsmouth, with 150,000 l. mostly in Foreign Silver, for the Use of the Forces going on the intended Expedition; and Yesterday Morning Charles Bambridge, Esq; the Deputy Paymaster, set off for the same Place.

March 26. General Hodgson set out Yesterday for Portsmouth, to take on him the Command of the Forces going on the Expedition.

Orders have been issued for expediting the Embarkation of the Troops going for Germany; in Consequence, it is said, of a late Express from Prince Ferdinand and the Marquis of Granby.

And the Transports are sailed down the River to Gravesend, in order to receive them on board.

The Comete Frigate, of 3 Guns (who took the Marquis of Granby, Scott, from Bristol for Lisbon) was cruising at or near the Mouth of Bristol Channel, in Company with two French Men of War, one of 74, and another of 64 Guns, who had taken five Prizes, and the 74 Gun Ship was gone with them for France.

Private Letters by the last Mail say, that a few Days ago sailed from Brest two of the King's Frigates, which are lent to the Merchants, and by them fitted out; one of them mounts 32 Guns, the other 22; they were soon after they sailed joined by another of 16 Guns from St. Maloes, and are to cruise in Confort, in order to intercept some of our outward bound Ships.

By a Letter from Rotterdam we are informed, that there were several French Prisoners on board the East-India Ship the Ajax, taken by the Prothee, a French Man of War of 64 Guns, and carried into Brest, among whom was the famous Monsieur de Buffly, accounted the richest Subject of his Most Christian Majesty, and the Colonel of Lally's Regiment.

'Tis strongly reported that the Prothee French Ship of War, which took the Ajax Indiaman, has also taken an Advice-boat, which was dispatched with an Account of the Surrender of Pondicherry; and that Monf. d'Apche, with six Ships of War, was returned from the Isle of Bourbon to France.

March 28. It was reported at St. James's Yesterday, that the King of Sardinia had declared War against the Queen of Hungary.

Private Letters by the Flanders Mail say, that Marshal Duke de Broglie had received an Express from the King his Master, to give Prince Ferdinand Battle at all Events. These Letters further say, they hourly expected to hear of a general Action.

The King of Prussia has augmented his Army with 50,000 new Recruits.

It is said, that the Box of Diamonds on board the Ajax Indiaman, was the Property of Monf. Buffly, who proposed to settle in England, the French Constitution not agreeing with his Circumstances, as some Complaints were preferred against him long since; these, if at first small, will, no doubt, be heightened now against him, especially when we consider the immense Riches M. de Buffly is said to be possessed of, and the present low State of the Finances of France.

Admiralty Office, March 26. His Majesty's Ships the Magnanime, Chichester, and Niger, being on a Cruise, at the Mouth of the Channel, gave Chase to a small French Privateer Snow, which they saw in the Morning of the 10th Instant, and in the Evening the Niger took her. She is called the Marquis de la Chartres, of St. Maloes, of 6 Guns, and 76 Men; had been out but two Days, and had not taken any Thing.

March 27. His Majesty's Ship the Vengeance, of 28 Guns (Nine and Four Pounders) and 200 Men, commanded by Captain Nightingale, is arrived at Plymouth with two Prizes; one named the Entreprenant, pierced for 44, but now carrying only 26 Guns (Twelve and Six pounders) 203 Men, being equipped for War and Merchandize, and loaded with various Kinds of Goods for St. Domingo, with which she sailed from Bourdeaux on the 8th Instant: The other a small Privateer of St. Maloes, carrying four Carriage and four Swivel Guns, with 45 Men, commanded by Joseph Mervin, which the Vengeance fell in with off the Lizard on the 23d Instant: She came from Abbrevrak the 21st, and had not taken any Thing. Captain Nightingale gives the following Relation of his Engagement with the Entreprenant; that he got up close along side of her at Five o'clock in the Afternoon of the 13th, when the Action immediately began, and continued for three Quarters of an Hour, in which Time the Vengeance was five Times on Fire (twice, as was imagined, from the Enemy's Wads setting Fire to the main Rigging;) That the Vengeance's Rigging and Sails being then so much shattered, that the Ship was not un-

der Command, the Enemy ran his Boltspirit under her Taffarel for boarding: That he was therein prevented, and the Vengeance stood off to repair her Rigging and Sails. As soon as the Ship was in Condition, Captain Nightingale got up again close to the Enemy, when the Engagement was renewed for an Hour, when the Entreprenant sheered off, and bore away: That the Vengeance being a second Time disabled in her Masts and Rigging, was some Time in wearing: That at length she wore, and Captain Nightingale got again within Pistol Shot of the Enemy, and renewed the Engagement, which continued for an Hour and an Half, when the Enemy called for Quarter. The Entreprenant had 15 Men killed, and 24 wounded. The Vengeance had 6 killed and 27 wounded, most of them dangerously; and two of them are since dead.

His Majesty's Ship the Bedford, of 64 Guns, commanded by Captain Deane, has taken and sent into Plymouth the Comete French Frigate of War, of 32 Guns, and 250 Men, which the Bedford fell in with on the 16th Instant, 30 Leagues S. W. from Ushant, and after a Chase of nine Hours took her. She sailed from Brest on the 9th Instant.

B O S T O N, May 18. Last Thursday a Vessel arrived at Marblehead in a short Passage from Lisbon, by whom we have Advice, that on the 31st of March, at 10 o'clock in the Morning, they had there a terrible Shock of an Earthquake, said to be little inferior to that which happened in November 1755. It shook down the Prison, and many other Buildings, by which the Prisoners got at Liberty, and made off; among whom were many Jesuits, who were confined on Account of the late Conspiracy, some of which had been again taken and secured; and it was thought an Embargo would be laid on the Shipping, in order to prevent others from escaping: At St. Ubes (a flourishing Town, 21 Miles South of Lisbon) the Earthquake was more severe than any ever known there, by which the Town was nearly destroyed, and many Lives lost, both there and at Lisbon, but as yet we have no Particulars, though a more circumstantial Account is hourly expected.

We learn from Portsmouth, that last Week arrived there Captain Coodmin in the Brig Deborah from Salteruda, who informs, that on his Passage from that Place, he was taken by a French Frigate, in Company with the Captains Hooker and Guppy, both of Piscataqua, the Day after they parted with the Man of War who was their Convoy; the whole Fleet was in Sight when they were taken, but by Cover of the Night they got clear. It cost 1300 l. Sterling to ransom these three Vessels.

On the 9th Instant the Province Sloop Massachusetts, sail'd from hence with a fair Wind for Cape Bona-Vista, on the North East Part of Newfoundland, having on board JOHN WINTHROP, Esq; Hessian Professor of Mathematicks and Natural Philosophy at the College in Cambridge, with the College Apparatus and other Necessaries, in order to observe the Transit of Venus over the Sun's Disk, on the 6th of June next. The Sloop was fitted out by the Order and at the Expence of the Government.

N E W - P O R T, May 19. In Lat. 32, to the Westward of Bermuda, the Beginning of this Month, George Hopkins, in a Brig from Barbados to Providence, was taken and ransomed by a French Privateer Brig of Force, well manned. She had before taken a Ship from Philadelphia, a Sloop bound to this Port, and several other Vessels. These are all the Particulars we could learn.

N E W - Y O R K, May 25. On Monday last arrived here the Sloop Dolphin, Capt. James Hoyt, in 15 Days from New-Providence, by whom we hear, that about the 20th of April Captain Palmer, in a Privateer Schooner of 10 Guns, belonging to that Place, had brought in there a Letter of Marque French Brig, which he had taken coming from the Cape, bound to Bourdeaux; her Loading consisted of 22,000 lb. of Indigo, and Sugars: That on Sunday the 3d Instant, a Privateer Ship of 22 Guns, belonging to Philadelphia, Captain M'Pherson Commander, arrived at Salt Key (about two Leagues to Windward of Providence) with five French and Dutch Sloops, Prizes from Cape-François: That several Vessels had lately been condemned at Providence, viz. the Brig Catherine, Captain Henhaw, taken by Captain Koffler; a Sloop, Captain Wilson, and a small Sloop, Captain Caldwell; which last, after Condemnation, was given to the Captain, and sailed for New-York two Days before Captain Hoyt. The Weather on this Coast had been for

some Time remarkably thick and hazy, and on Monday, off Cape-May, in about 12 Fathom Water, Captain Hoyt saw a Top-mast with some Rigging on it, and sundry broken Pieces of Trunks, &c. and he took up a Cask of Currants, which had not been long in the Water, being not much damaged, mark'd S. G. on the Head; he saw no Vessels on the Coast.

Last Wednesday Night was sent in a Prize Tartan, from the Granades to Old France, with Coffee, Sugar, &c. taken by the Privateer Brig Mars, belonging to Antigua, Captain Anson, who was left in Chase of another large Vessel.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, May 28. From the Antigua Papers by Captain Porter we have the following Advices, viz. That a new Lumber loaded Ship, from Piscataqua, was run ashore at Barbuda, having been first taken by the French, who got ashore, but the Vessel, and the greatest Part of her Cargo, was intirely lost: That Captain Middleton, of his Majesty's Ship Emerald, had taken a French Privateer Brig of ten Guns: That Captain Taylor, in the Griffin Man of War, had sent two French Privateers to Guadaloupe, of 8 and 10 Guns: That two French Privateer Schooners, taken by the Antigua, ran foul of each other, and were both lost: That two Piscataqua Ships had been taken, but retaken by the Echo and Bienfaisant Men of War: And that Captain Barton, of the Ship Christian, from Bristol, fell in with 7 Privateers to Windward of Antigua, but that none of them made a close Attack but one, which he soon obliged to sheer off, in the best Manner she could.

Captain Porter informs us, that the Captains Irwin and Todd, from Maryland to Antigua, were both taken; but that the first was retaken, and sent to Guadaloupe; the latter ransomed for 1000 Dollars. He further advises, that the Captains Cooper and Hatton, both from Virginia to Antigua, were taken by a deep loaded French Frigate, homeward bound, and ransomed; the first for 260, the last for 450 Pounds Sterling: And that the same Frigate had also taken two Boston Men, and a Schooner belonging here; their Names not known.

THE Capital of this Country is still in the Hands of the Enemy, who fire every Day an innumerable Quantity of Cannon on the Besiegers with little Effect. Had the Roads permitted the

Allies to bring up their Artillery as quickly as they wished, Cassel would have surrendered before this Time. However, its Fate must soon be determined, for both Sides act with great Vivacity. The Garrison lost a good many Men in the last Sally, so it be true that we suffered in the Beginning.

Ziegenhayn is cannonaded very briskly; and hath been several Times set on Fire. The Garrison have infired more than once on marching out to join their Army; which hath been constantly refused.

The Enemy seem to have taken a Resolution to assemble between Hanau and Frankfurt, and leave a separate Corps near Bergen. The Allies are employed in drawing an advantageous Line, for Reasons which may be easily guessed. The French have left eleven Battalions in Friedberg.

Eimbeck, March 15. The Cannonade of the Allies upon Cassel is heard here very distinctly. They have been reinforced by four Hanoverian Regiments. Col. Colignon has joined our Line beyond the Leine, with some Battalions of Prussian Grenadiers.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Schweinberg, March 15. The continual Rains during the last Month have prevented the Siege of Cassel's being pushed so vigorously as we could have wished. The Enemy, consisting of the greatest Part of the Garrison, who made the Sally in the Night between the 6th and 7th, were so soon driven into the Town, that they had not Time to fill up the Trenches; the little Mischief they did was easily repaired the next Day; and even the Cannon having been too hastily nailed up, were soon made serviceable again. We had 50 Men killed on this Occasion, and 130 Wounded. The Enemy's Loss was at least as great.

The Operations of the Siege have been naturally retarded by the extreme Badness of the Roads, and more especially in a Country which is radically eaten up. However, we have Room to hope, from the Arrangements taken by the Count de Lippe, that Abundance will succeed to Scarcity, and that by Favour of the fine Weather, which has been set in for some Days, we shall meet less Difficulties in the further Progress of the Siege.

The Inundation which surrounds Ziegenhayn, not having permitted our Troops to open the Trenches, they have endeavoured to destroy the Fortifications by Bombs; but, with all their Precautions to spare the Houses, they could not prevent some being burnt.

Frankfort, March 15. As the French, in executing their last Retreat, have been obliged to destroy many of their principal Magazines, to prevent their becoming a Prey to the Allies, they are at present employed in establishing new Ones; for which Purpose they have received within these few Days, by the Rhine, several Boats laden with Grain, Hay, &c.

Schweinberg, March 15. After all the Boasting of the Enemy, and their Insinuations in Holland, that M. Broglie had with great Address got the Allies between two Fires, we shall bid fair to give a decisive Blow at the Entrance of the Campaign. The Garrison of Gottingen is again blocked up; the second Parallel is actually finished before Cassel, and that Place will fall in a few Days. Our Troops have again taken Post in the Suburbs of Ziegenhayn; and a Bombardment of 48 Hours will infallibly reduce it.

This Morning we had Advice, that his Prussian Majesty has made a great Impression on the Army of the Empire, and will speedily open the Campaign with the Siege of Dresden.

We are so posted that the Enemy may fight if they please, but it must be in a Plain, which to them is no favourable Situation.

Frankfort, March 17. The Head-Quarters of Marshal Broglie are at Butzbach. Count Broglie made a vigorous Sally from Cassel on the 7th, in which he possessed himself of four Haubitzers, and nailed six Pieces of Cannon. The Enemy suffered besides the Loss of 5 or 600 Men. It is, however, whispered here, that the Place cannot hold out beyond the 19th, unless the Marshal hazards a Battle, for the Event of which it is probable he will not be willing to render himself responsible.

It is said that 700 Men of the Army of the Empire have been made Prisoners by the Prussians in the Neighbourhood of Wurtzburg.

Cadix, Feb. 24. The King having resolved to send some Troops and Warlike Stores to America, has assured the Merchants that they may be perfectly easy upon that Head, his Intention being only to secure his Frontier Places in America, and not to break with any of the European Powers.

Cologne, March 13. There has been a very brisk Action between two Detachments of the Allies and the French, to the Disadvantage of the Latter, who were obliged to make their Retreat as well as they could to Wefel. The Allies have a very strong Body of Troops in Westphalia, and a numerous Garrison at Munster.

Brunswick, March 20. Some Letters from the Camp before Cassel of the 17th mention, that the Enemy had made a considerable Sally the Night before, in order to destroy a Battery, which was erected near the Town; but that they had been repulsed with great Loss.

M. de Belsunce, who has for some Time past held the Post of Northeim with Part of the Garrison of Gottingen, has been forced, by some Troops sent from hence and Hanover, joined by a small Body of Prussians, to quit the Possession of it.

L O N D O N, March 26.

This Day came on at Guildhall the Election of Representatives to serve in Parliament for this City, when Sir Robert Ladbroke, Knt. Sir Richard Glynn, Bart. William Beckford, Esq; and the Hon. Thomas Harley, Esq; were declared by the Sheriffs to have the Majority of Hands; but a Poll was demanded by the Friends of Sir Samuel Fluyder, Bart. which began this Afternoon.

Bristol, March 28. Yesterday came on the Election for Members to serve this City in Parliament, when our worthy Representatives, Robert Nugent and Jarrit Smith, Esquires, were re-chosen without Opposition.

The same Day, Lord Ligonier, and the Right Hon. William Pitt, Esq; were re-elected for the City of Bath.

Newcastle, March 10. The Disturbance in our Neighbourhood about Balloting for a few Vacancies in the Militia, hath already been mentioned. The Deputy Lieutenants and other Magistrates prevailed on the Rioters to go quietly home that Night; viz. Saturday the 28th ult. Since which the Pit Men, Waggon Men, Husbandmen, and Servants, in the County of Northumberland (for of such the Mob mostly consisted) having taken it into their Heads, that the Durham People of their Station had all got clear of the Militia, by the Rife they had made; on Monday the 2d Inst. assembled in great Numbers at Morpeth, and not meeting with such Indulgence as they expected, obliged the Deputy Lieutenants and Justices to quit their Duty for their own Safety, no military Force being at Hand. Then the Rioters got all the Lists and Books relative to the Militia from the Constables, and tore or burnt them before their Eyes. The next Day they went to Whittingham, 20 Miles up the Country, and acted in much the same Manner. Flushed with Success, and reinforced to 4 or 5000, they attempted the like Usage at Hexham Yesterday: But the Justices finding gentle Methods would not avail, had ordered Sir

Ralph Milbank's Battalion of the Yorkshire Militia up to Hexham the Day before from this Town. About 11 o'Clock the Mob assembled, and the Militia were all drawn out before them. The Gentlemen still intreated the Rioters to be quiet, but all to no Purpose, for they assaulted and struck several of the Militia, tho' they had their Pieces loaded, and their Bayonets fixed. In short, the Justices were obliged to read the Riot Act, and tho' they allowed the Mob near an Hour after to disperse, the Militia were at last ordered to fire among them three Times. The first Fire they sent into the Air, the next among their Legs; but the Mob being not yet intimidated, they were ordered to level the third Fire. Nineteen Persons were killed on the Spot, and about fifty wounded. Ensign Hart of the Militia, and a private Man, were also killed. There has not been such a Scene of Blood-shed this Century in this Country. However, it is to be hoped the worst is over, as they are now pretty well settled again. Major Crow, who commanded the Militia, is much commended for his gallant, as well as his humane Behaviour, on this Occasion.

Admiralty-Office, March 24. Capt. Howe, Commander of his Majesty's Ship the Biddeford, gives an Account, by Letter dated the 14th Instant, that he had taken the Chamillant, a French Sloop Privateer, of 4 Carriage and two Swivel Guns, and 15 Men. She had been out of Port two Days, was going to cruise off Harwich, and had taken nothing.

Capt. Brograve, of his Majesty's Sloop the Albany, gives an Account of his having taken on the 16th Instant, off the Isle of Wight, and brought into Spithead, the Hazard Privateer of 6 Swivel Guns and 22 Men, which came out the Day before from Cherbourg, and had taken nothing.

Commodore Sir Piercy Brett gives an Account, that the Grace armed Cutter, commanded by Lieut. M'Bride, arrived in the Downs the 20th Instant, having the Day before off Calais, taken a French Shallop Privateer, with 24 Men, mounting 2 Carriage and 6 Swivel Guns, which failed that Day from Dunkirk.

CHARLES-TOWN (South-Carolina) May 6. His Excellency General Amherst has given Orders to Colonel Byrd to complete his (the Virginia) Regiment with all possible Dispatch, and to march immediately against the Cherokees. His Excellency has likewise given Orders to supply the said Regiment with Provisions, &c. at his Majesty's Expence.

Camp at Congarees, Sunday, May 3. The last Division marches at Four this Morning, for the Fort at Ninety-Six. Col. Middleton's Regiment, with which Col. Grant expresses great Satisfaction, amounts in the whole to about 520 Rank and File: The Regulars are not quite 1300. We hear the Rangers are at Ninety-Six, and are complete; about 400 of them it is said will join the Army, while the remaining 200 are to be employed in Scouts, and ranging for the Protection of the Settlements against any Inroad of the Enemy. Capt. Colbert, with his Chickesaws, is arrived at the Camp at Ninety-Six, and has delivered to Major Moultrie two Cherokee Scalps, which they took near Old Keowee. The Colonel saw every Thing in the best Order before he set off, plenty of live Cattle, Flour, & every other Necessary for the Campaign.

On Monday the 4th Inst. about half an Hour past Two P. M. an Hour and an Half after new Moon, and very near the Time of Low Water, a most violent Whirlwind of that Kind, commonly known under the Title of Typhoons, passed down Ashley-River, and fell upon the Shipping in Rebellion-Road with such Fury and Violence as to threaten the Destruction of the whole Fleet. In the Ship News below is an Account of the Damage done there by it.

This terrible Phenomenon was first seen by many of the Inhabitants of Charlestown coming down Wappoo-Creek,

Wappoo-Creek, resembling a large Column of Smoke and Vapour, whose Motion was very irregular and tumultuous, as well as that of the neighbouring Clouds, which appeared to be driving down in nearly the same Direction (from S. W.) and with great Swiftmess; the Quantity of Vapour which composed this impetuous Column and its prodigious Velocity, gave it such a surprising Momentum, as to plough Ashley-River to the Bottom, and lay the Channel bare, of which many People were Eye-witnesses. This occasioned so great and sudden a Flux and Reflux as to float many Canoes, Boats, Pettiugres, and even Schooners and Sloops, which were then lying dry, and at a Distance from the Tide. When it was coming down Ashley-River, it made so great a Noise as to be heard by most of the People in Town, which was taken by some for a constant Thunder; its Diameter at that Time has generally been judged to be about 300 Fathoms, and its Height to a Person in Broad-street to be about 35 Degrees, though it increased as it went towards the Road; when it came down towards White-Point, though it was then nearly in the Middle of Ashley-River, it impelled such a vast Body of Water out of its Place, as to make the Tide run for an instant several Feet perpendicular in all the Docks along the Bay, and even up Cooper-River, above Mr. Gadsden's. About this Time it was met by another Gulf which came down Cooper-River; this was not of equal Strength or Impetuosity with the other, but upon their meeting together, the tumultuous and whirling Agitations of the Air were seemingly much greater, inasmuch that the Froth and Vapour seemed to be thrown up to the apparent Height of 35 or 40 Degrees towards the Middle, while the Clouds that were driving in all Directions to this Place seemed to be precipitated, and whirled round at the same Time with incredible Velocity: Just after this it fell on the Shipping in the Road, and was scarce three Minutes in its Passage; the Distance is near two Leagues; five Vessels were sunk outright, and his Majesty's Ship Dolphin with many others lost their Masts. All this great Damage to the Shipping, which is alone reckoned at Twenty Thousand Pounds Sterling, was done almost instantaneously, and some of those that were sunk, were buried in the Water so suddenly as scarce to give sufficient Time to those that were below to get upon Deck. Whether was this done by the immense Weight of this Column pressing them instantaneously into the Deep? Or was it done by the Water being forced suddenly from under them, and thereby letting them sink so low, as to be immediately covered and ingulphed by the lateral Mass of Water? The strong Gulf from the N. E. which checked the Progress of this Pillar of Destruction in its Way from Wappoo-Creek, seems to have been sent by Providence for the Preservation of Charles-Town, which, had it kept its then Direction, must have been driven before it like Chaff. Another memorable Instance of the Divine Favour is the small Number lost that were on board the Vessels in the Road, of whom we cannot learn there were more than Four, viz. Mr. Nathaniel Polhill of Georgia, a Passenger in the Polly and Betty, Capt. Muir, and Robert Kay, Captain Muir's Nephew, a Sailor on board the Elizabeth, Captain Mallard, and a Boy belonging to the Success, Capt. Clarke.

From the Shortness of the Time we cannot give a particular Account of the Rise and entire Progress of this tremendous Column. About Noon it was seen near Spoon-Savannah, upwards of 30 Miles W. by S. from Charlestown. It destroyed Mr. George Sommers's Houses on his Plantation at Stono, and on James-Island carried away a large new two Story House, with two Stacks of Brick Chimnies, belonging to the Estate of the late Mr. Hutson, and all the Negro-Houses, and other Buildings, on the Plantation: Mr. William Glen's Buildings, &c. were served in the same Manner, and it carried off the Roof of Mr. Henderson's House, and all the Out-Houses. Many, both white People and Negroes, were killed or hurt; nor did the Cattle escape, Numbers of which were found dead in the Fields. In several Parts of its Course it left an Avenue of a great width, from which every Tree and Shrub was torn up; great Quantities of Leaves, Branches, and large Limbs of Trees were seen furiously driven about and agitated in the Body of the Column as it passed along.

The Sky was over-cast and cloudy all the Forenoon of Monday, and about one o'Clock it began to Thunder, and continued more or less till after three. As soon as the Damage done in the Road was perceived, the Governor sent Orders to the Commissary to provide and get down as many Boats and Hands as possible; every Body seemed to vie with each other who should give the first and most effectual Assistance. The Fleet, as it was the largest and finest, was likewise thought to be the richest that ever was cleared out from Charlestown. By four o'Clock the Wind was quite fallen, the Sun shone out, and the Sky was clear and serene; we could scarce believe that such a dreadful Scene had been so recently exhibited, were not the sinking and dismantled Vessels so many striking and melancholy Proofs of its Reality.

A Storm of this Kind has seldom or never been known in Charlestown; but the Vestiges of such are to be seen in the Wood in more Places than one, both in this and the neighbouring Provinces.

Vessels in Rebellion Road, on Monday, May 4, destroyed or hurt in the Storm.

Sunk 5, viz. Snow Polly and Betty, William Muir, for London. Ship Daniel, James Lake, for Portsmouth. Snow Success, Thomas Clarke, for Cowes. Snow Britannia, Thomas Wilson, for Bristol. And Sloop Patty, arrived that Day from New-Province.

Disasted 6. His Majesty's Ship Dolphin, Captain Marlowe, the Convoy. Ships, Thomas and Sarah, John Jackson; Elizabeth, John Mallard; Tyber, Peter Crombie; and Queen of Portugal, John Simpson, for Cowes. Snow John, George Evans, for London.

Lost both Topmasts 2. Snow Eglington, Archibald Robertson, for Bristol. Brig Two Friends, Alexander Young, for Orkney.

Lost Mizzen-mast 2. Ships, Manchester, James Chambers; Thornton, Richard Gilchrist, for London.

Lost Foremast 1. Ship Heron, Patrick Craw, for Portsmouth.

Lost Main-top-mast 1. Ship Harrietta, John Raines, for London.

Sunk 5. Disasted, &c. 12. Safe, or received little Hurt, 25. Total in Rebellion-Road 42 Vessels.

No certain Estimation can as yet be made of the Damage done the Vessels and Cargoes; the whole Loss it is feared will much exceed 20,000 l. Sterling.

Fort Prince George, Keowee, April 27. "We have got in several more Prisoners. Captain McIntosh, since his Arrival here, February 10, has redeemed 113 of those unhappy People from Slavery; above 70 are Men, and the rest Women and Children. The Indians say they have above 50 or 60 still in their Possession, who they pretend are either sick or out hunting with their Masters, but promise to bring them in to Captain McIntosh as soon as possible. Tiftoe would have settled again at Keowee, about a Month ago, if we could have spared him any Provision; but instead of Plenty, the Women and Children now in this Fort have been on short Allowance ever since they were redeemed. On the 21st Instant an Indian Woman was killed and scalped, and a Boy wounded at Keowee, supposed to be done by the Chickasaws: The Woman and Boy were left by Tiftoe to take Care of his Horses and other Effects, till his Return from the Middle-Settlements and Overhills, whither he is gone to collect and bring down his People, with some Corn to plant. We have not above a Month's Flour, tho' no Scarcity of Meat.

From the first Moment the Cherokees knew of Captain McIntosh's Arrival here, none of them have gone out against the Settlements, nor have they carried any white Prisoners to the French.

B O S T O N, May 25.

Tuesday last put into this Port the Ship Bayard, of 500 Tons, Joseph Cheeleman, Master: She sailed from Virginia on the 19th of April last, bound to Hull, in England; but on the 16th, 17th, and 18th Instant, met with violent Gales of Wind, and sprung a Leak, so that she made two Feet of Water every Half Hour, and they were obliged to throw overboard 4 or 500 Barrels of Tar, Turpentine, and other Parts of her Cargo, to prevent her foundering; being then in Lat. 41: 30, and Long. 61, they stood away for this Port to refit.

Saturday last a Vessel arrived at Marblehead, in 39 Days from Lisbon, the Master of which confirms the Account of the Earthquake mentioned in our last.

N E W - Y O R K, June 1.

Thursday Night last three Vessels with King's Stores on board, arrived at Sandy-Hook, in 16 Days from Halifax: They came out, with two others, under Convoy of his Majesty's Ship the Penance of 44 Guns, John Boyd, Esq; Commander. Major Merry, now of Montgomery's Regiment, came Passenger in one of the above Vessels, and we hear he soon sets out for his Regiment that lately sailed from hence for the West-Indies.

The Day that the above-mentioned Vessels sailed from Halifax, a Battalion of the Royal Americans failed from thence for Quebec, under Convoy of a Man of War.

We have an Account from Lisbon, of the 20th of March, of Captain Kennedy's having taken, after a smart Engagement, a new Ship of 400 Tons, from Bordeaux bound to Hispaniola, laden with Wine, Brandy and Flour; Captain Kennedy had only two Men wounded, and the French two Men killed, and six wounded.

We hear from New-Jersey, that notwithstanding the Bounty for Volunteers is something less than it has been for two or three Years past, and the Scarcity of Men there, the Number agreed on by that Government will probably be raised; for, by the indefatigable Industry of the Officers concerned therein, their new Levies are very near completed.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, June 4.

Captain Banning, late of the Schooner Friendship, of Maryland, writes from Martinico, April 23, that he was taken on his Passage to Barbados, and sent in there, the 16th of that Month: That a Privateer Brig was then fitting out, designed for this Coast: That Two of our Men of War had appeared off St. Pierre's, one as a Flag of Truce, and sent in her Boats with the Prisoners, which were detained, on Pretence that she was cruising with the other Man of War, who had taken a Ship going in there: And that they expected the English Fleet daily, and were making what Preparations they could against an Attack.

Captain Pyne, of the Dreadnought, belonging to St. Christophers, writes from Virginia, That he was taken by a French Frigate in Lat. 26: 12, which had also taken Capt. Williams, in a Privateer likewise of St. Christophers; Captain Baldwin, in a Schooner bound to New-England; and 2 Vessels from Monto Christi for New-York. And that a Brig of 14 Guns, and 175 Men, in Lat. 32: 33, took Captain Jones, in a Ship from Carolina; two Vessels belonging to New-York; and was in Chase of a Ship.

Extract of a Letter from Winchester, May 26, 1761.

"We are now on the March to the Southward; but how far we shall proceed against the Cherokees, is not known. They received a Stroke lately from the Northern Indians, within a Mile of Fort Chiswell, our advanced Post. They attacked their Camp in the Night, killed six on the Spot, and wounded a great many. Next Morning the Cherokees delivered up their Women and wounded Men into the Hands of Major Lewis, and begged he would take Care of them, until they should look who had hurt them."

We have Advice from Barcelona in the Mediterranean, that the 11th Man of War of 50 Guns, had fell in with a French 74 Gun Ship, with only 40 Guns mounted, bound to Martinico with Stores, which the 11th took after a small Engagement.

A N N A P O L I S, June 11.

We hear that a Discovery has lately been made in Calvert County, of a Parcel of Negroes Poisoning a Gentlewoman, their Mistress, who Died some Years ago.

Last Friday, the Negro Man, in St. Mary's County, for the barbarous Murder of Mrs. Booth, &c. was Hang'd, and afterwards hung in Chains.

On Wednesday Evening, last Week, Died, at his House near Upper-Marlbrough, aged a little above 40 Years, after a long Indisposition, Mr. JOSEPH BELT, junior, a Gentleman who was deservedly esteemed by a numerous Acquaintance. By his Death, his County has lost a good Magistrate, his Father's most dutiful Son, his Wife a very loving Husband, his Children a most indulgent Parent, and his Friends a most agreeable Companion.

We hear the Ship Betty, Capt. Strachan, on her Passage from London to Halifax, was taken by a French Privateer, and afterwards retaken by a Bristol Letter of Marque Ship, and carried into Lisbon.

HIGH AND MIGHTY LORDS,

Y OUR High Mightinesses have been informed of
what passed on the 24th ult. with regard to
the French Frigate the Felicite, which being
pursued and attacked by three English Ships of
War, was forced to shelter herself, by running
on Shore off Gravesande.

It was before the Eyes of a Multitude of the Inhabitants
of this Country, whom Curiosity carried to Gravesande, that
the Captain of the English Frigate the Richmond, behaved
in this Occasion in an unheard of Manner. The Captain of
the French Frigate being called to strike, made Answer,
that he would surrender on no Terms, as he counted upon
the Safeguard of the Neutrality observed by your High Mighti-
nesses in the present War. Regardless of this Declaration,
and in Contempt of the most sacred Laws, the Captain of
the Richmond took Possession of the Frigate, after cannon-
ading her in such a Manner, that several of the Balls came
up a great Way in the Downs. He hoisted English Colours
on board the Felicite, took away every Thing that could be
removed, destroyed the Masts and Rigging which his Cannon
did spare; and finding he could no longer continue his
Outrages with Impunity, determined to set Fire to the Fri-
gate, which was done accordingly.

Upon the Notice I sent to the King my Master of these
Things, his Majesty commanded me to ask your High Mighti-
nesses to procure him Restitution of the Felicite Frigate,
with her Cargo, and Indemnification for the Loss which his
Majesty and the Owners have sustained by this unjust Violence
of the English.

His Majesty is not only persuaded, that your High Mighti-
nesses, considering what you owe to yourselves, and to the
Honour of the Republic, will require from the Court of
London Reparation, not less authentic than just, for the In-
sult offered to your Sovereignty, and to your Neutrality, and
for Violation of your Territory on this Occasion.

But his Majesty further expects, from the Equity and
Friendship of your High Mightinesses, that you will take
efficacious Measures in England to procure him due Satis-
faction. I must not omit informing your High Mightinesses,
that the King my Master is extremely sensible, not only of
the Orders given to prevent, if it were yet Time, the Insult
offered them, and the Pillaging and setting Fire to the
French Frigate; but also of the Behaviour of the Subjects
of the Republic on that Occasion, and the Assistance his
People received from them.

The King my Master hath the more Ground to expect
that the Republic will take the most serious Steps in this
Affair, as they have great Reason to be pleased with that
singular Protection which the Trade and Navigation of their
Subjects enjoy in France. Your High Mightinesses have a
fresh Proof of the King my Master's Favour towards you, in
his ordering the Ship Endeavour, with her Cargo, to be re-
stored, with Damages and Costs.

PHILADELPHIA, June 22.

By several Letters from Lisbon, of the 29th and 30th of
April, there is Advice, that the Packet Boats betwixt Dover
and Calais, have a free Passage; by which it was imagined
that a Treaty of Peace was on the Carpet, tho' all military
Preparations, and intended Expeditions, were prosecuted with
the utmost Vigour. Also that a French Man of War, of 60
Guns, and a Frigate of 36, had been cruising off the Rock
of Lisbon, and had chased in there two English Frigates;
and that Captain Kennedy had failed (for Gibraltar, it was
thought) for some of our Men of War to come and endea-
vour to take them.

We likewise hear from Lisbon, that some Vessels had ar-
rived there, which parted with the Expedition Fleet off of
Cape Finisterre, steering to the Southward.

The Captains Alison and Thurman, from this Port for
Lisbon, were both taken, and ranfomed for 1000l. Ster-
ling each.

We have Advice from Cadiz, that six Sail of Spanish Man
of War of the Line, with about 4000 Land Forces on board,
failed from that Place two Months ago, said to be bound for
the West-Indies: And that some French Privateers were
cruising off of that Port, and had taken several English
Vessels.

Monday arrived here the Captains Taylor and Arthur
from Lisbon, by whom there is Advice, that his Majesty's
Ship Isis, Captain Wheeler, had taken the Orisamme, a
French 64 Gun Ship, tho' she had but 40 mounted, being
loaded with Stores, &c. for Martinico. Capt. Wheeler was
killed in the Engagement.

Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, April 16.

"The 31st ult. we had a severe Earthquake, which lasted
five Minutes; but, thank God, was attended with no other
Consequences than alarming the Inhabitants.

"Capt. Johnston, of the Hornet, spoke with a Vessel
bound for Gibraltar, that informed him, he had fallen in
some Days before with the Venus Frigate, that had under
her Care a French India Ship outward bound, pierced for
64 Guns, and a Privateer; and that the Hero continued the
Chase of another Indianman that was in Company, which
the Officers of the Venus concluded was then in their Pos-
session.

Yesterday came to Town Captain Nuttle, in seven Weeks from
Liverpool. By him we have a Paper of April 10, and
London Advices to the 7th of that Month, the Purport of
which is as follows, viz.

That his Majesty, King GEORGE the Third, de-
clared in Council, the Third of April, his Intention of
marrying the Princess of Brunswick, Sister of the Hereditary
Prince: That the Duke of York was appointed Admiral
of the Blue, and was to bring over to England the designed
Consort of the King: That the Expedition Fleet failed the
30th of March, having 9000 Land Forces on board, con-
sisting of 12 Ships of the Line, 7 Frigates, 3 Sloops, 2
Bombs, and 2 Fireships, said to be designed for the Island of
Bourbon: That a second Fleet was fitting out, thought to
be going on another Expedition: That on the 21st of March
the Prince of Brunswick, in his Retreat from Heimbach,
to join Prince Ferdinand, was attacked by the French, as
he was entering a Defile, when the Enemy got an Advan-
tage, and, according to their Account, the Allies lost 2000
Men, with 23 Standards and Colours, 14 Pieces of Cannon,
and several Chests of Ammunition and Provision: That on
the 25th the French attacked a Body of the Allies, and
made Prisoners 2 Colonels, 1 Major, 6 Captains, and 9
other Officers, with 400 private Men, and took 2 Pieces of
Cannon, and 3 Colours: That in the Night, between the
27th and 28th of March, the Allies raised the Siege of
Castel: That the King of Prussia had marched for Dresden;
and Letters from Saxony mention his having invested that
City on the 24th of March: And that Marshal Daun set
out from Vienna the 21st of that Month to join the Army.

ANNAPOLIS, June 18.

Thursday last arrived here the Ship Princess Caroline,
Captain James Cole, from Ferrol in Spain, which Place he
left in Company with the Ambers, and Happy Return, for
Virginia. Capt. Cole, on the 30th of April, about 5 in the
Morning, in the Latitude of 30: 00, and Longitude 22: 23
W. from London, fell in with a Fleet of 17 Men of War,
which proved to be a Portugal Fleet bound to Brazil, then
all lying to, but they soon after made Sail.

Last Thursday an unhappy Accident happen'd near the
lower End of Church-Street; some Children lying down and
playing there, a Cart loaded with Wood, went on the Bod-
y of one of them, a little Boy about 3 Years old, and crush-
ed him to Death.

Last Week Died at Baltimore-Town, aged about 60, Mr.
William Rogers, one of the first Settlers of that flourishing
Town, one of the County Magistrates, and an eminent
Planter.

Since our last arrived here from Lisbon, Captain James
Harrick, in the Ship Dragon, who was there at the Time
the Earthquake happen'd on the 31st of March past. The
Earthquake was likewise felt at Ferrol.

His Majesty's Birth-Day, the 4th of this Instant, was
observed here by Firing of the Guns at the Half-Moon Bat-
tery, and from on Board the Vessels in the Harbour, and
other Demonstrations of Joy and Loyalty: And in the
Evening there was a grand Ball.

B O S T O N, June 1. Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman in Bermuda, dated April 28, 1761.

"It is now, and has been for a Month past, very hot in this Island, there being scarce People enough well to take Care of the Sick.—It is a violent inflammatory Disorder, never known in this Country before, and seizes upon all Ages, Constitutions and Complexions, and proves very mortal, especially to old People; and as many have died in one Fortnight, as at another Time in a whole Year.—There are four stout Privateers from Old-France cruising in these Parts, and probably may pick up many Vessels from your Parts, bound to the West Indies: Out of the Privateers is a Brig (as she appears to us) and has been in Sight of this Island for a Fortnight past; and last Week the Captain Bailey, in a Schooner, from Cape-Bay, with Lumber, as near the Shore as she could do, without running on the Rocks: Captain Bailey escaped being taken, by running his Vessel among the Rocks, in a very hazardous Manner.

Thursday Morning last several Vessels arrived here in 23 Days from Quebec, by whom we learn, That the Garrison at that Place were in good Health, and had been so all Winter; having Plenty of Provisions and other Necessaries.

N E W - L O N D O N, May 29. Extract of a Letter from Mr. Andrew Thompson, late of this Town, to his Father here, dated London, March 9.

"Four Weeks after our Departure from New-York, in the Brigantine *Audrey*, Capt. Lawrence, we were taken by a French Privateer of 14 Guns. Our Captain and Passengers were immediately carried on board the Privateer, leaving in our Brig a young Lad, who was a Passenger, and myself: They then put 12 Frenchmen on board us, and two English Seamen, Prisoners, to assist them to carry the Vessel to Dayona, to which Place the Privateer belonged. After being in their Possession 14 Days (with the Assistance of 1500 men, which made in all 4 of us) we fell upon them about 9 at Night, with an Axe, two Axes and a Pistol: We soon gained the Possession of the Cabin, leaving that of the Deck to them; they barred us down all Night; about 9 next Morning, we put a Brace of Balls through one of their principal Seamen, on which they immediately called for Quarters, which was granted; at the same Time ordered them all up in the Foretop, and so bound them one after another as we allowed them to come down. After having them in Possession 10 Days, we, to our great Joy, arrived safe at Plymouth. In this Action we killed 3 of the Frenchmen, and wounded six. There were none of us hurt but myself, by being a little too forward in the Beginning of the Attack; however, I am in a Manner recovered, except a Cut over my left Eye with a Cutlass. We brought 9 Frenchmen into Plymouth, who are now all alive and well. When we were first taken, the Frenchmen stripped us of every Thing even to my Shoe-buckles, so I have lost Chaps, Mugs, Clothes, &c. as they were all carried on board the Privateer: However, I expect our Loss will soon be made up, having already had the Offer of a Lieutenantcy, which I thought proper to refuse."

Besides the above, a Gentleman writes Mr. Thompson from New-York, That the Four were introduced to the Lords of the Admiralty, from whom they received Thanks, and a Gold Medal, for their Gallant Behaviour. Likewise that the Under-writers had made them a Present of a Quarter Part of the Vessel and Cargo.

His Royal Highness Prince William Henry will shortly be created Duke of Gloucester.

By a Letter from Portsmouth, dated the 12th Instant, we have Advice, that they have received an Account there, that the Troops which went out on the Expedition have made good their Landing on the Island of Belleisle, and only wait for some large Pieces of Cannon to reduce the whole Island to his Majesty's Obedience; also, that the Troops are embarked for the second Expedition, and will sail the first fair Wind.

It is said that 3000 Troops are coming from Ireland, to go on the 2d Expedition; and that Orders are issued out to raise forthwith 3000 Men.

Portsmouth, April 13. The Light Horse are all embarked, and the Transports are just now going out of the Harbour.

April 4. It is said his Majesty hath been pleased to order the Right Hon. Arthur Onslow, Esq; and his Son, a Pension of 5000 l. per Annum, during each of their natural Lives.

April 14. The Accounts that have been given of his Majesty's intended Marriage, and the Ladies appointed, are inventions, without the least Foundation. [Lloyd's Chronicle.]

Admiralty-Office, April 10. Vice-Admiral Saunders, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, gives an Account, in his Letter of the 5th of March last, that Capt. Pownall, of his Majesty's Frigate the Favourite, had taken and sent into Gibraltar a French Privateer, fitted out at Mahon, of 12 Guns, and 84 Men.

His Majesty's Sloop the Albany, of 16 Carriage Guns, and 125 Men, commanded by Captain Brograve, is arrived at Spithead, with a French Frigate, called the Pheasant, commanded by M. la Coudray, which the Albany fell in with on the 6th Inst. at Daylight, off Plymouth, and chased till the 7th at ten in the Morning, when Captain Brograve getting along-side of her, and firing a Broadside, she hoisted French Colours, and then struck: She was at first of equal Force with the Albany, carrying 16 carriage Guns, and 125 Men; but during the Chase, she had thrown 14 of her Guns overboard. She had been three Days from Havre de Grace, and had not taken any thing.

B O S T O N, June 8.

The Prince George, from London, left Portsmouth commanded by Capt. Blake, in Company with Capt. M'Taggart and Ball for this Place, and other Vessels under Convoy of a Frigate bound for Newfoundland: She was taken on her Passage by a French Privateer Ship, after a running Fight of 3 Glasses, whereby each Vessel received much Damage: The Privateer ran down the Ship for 9000 l. Sterling, and took on board Capt. Blake, and one of the Passengers, viz. Mr. Edmund Quincy, tertius, of this Town, Merchant, as Ransomers, and carried them to Bayonne.—They spoke with a Vessel bound for Bristol, who informed them that a new French 74 Gun Ship, but had only 40 mounted, bound to the East-Indies, was taken by an English Man of War.

A Gentleman in London writes, the 4th of April, That he had received such Information relative to a Peace as may be depended on.—That France had consented to relinquish to us all North America, if we would make Peace, and restore to her all our other Conquests made this War. That a Congress was agreed upon, and that it was to be held at Aulburgh [a large and elegant City in Germany].—The French perceive, and are afraid of the Cloud that is gathering in Italy; and the Russians and Swedes seem to be heartily tired of the War; the Spaniards are arming; the Sardinians are not idle.—Mr. Pitt still continues triumphant, and doubtless will see that we have an honourable and lasting Peace.—Our new Parliament will soon meet.

The Supplies granted by the late Parliament for the Services of the Year 1761, amount to the Sum of £. 18,816,119 10s. 9d. 3 Farthings, in which Supply there is a Grant of £. 200,000 to certain Provinces in North America; £. 10,595 12s. 9d. for Nova-Scotia; and £. 4,057 10s. for Georgia:—The Ways and Means for raising the Supplies amount to £. 19,101,067 10s. which is near £. 300,000 more than the Expenses of the Year 1761 will amount to.

Yesterday arrived here from London, the Letter of Marquis Ship Happy Return, of 20 Guns, Captain M'Taggart. He sailed from Portsmouth with several others for America, under Convoy of a Frigate; but a few Days after they came out, the Fleet was dispersed by a French 64 Gun Ship, since which he has seen nothing of them.

A N N A P O L I S, June 25.

Since our last, our Fleet from England has all arrived safe, except Two. They came out under Convoy of a Sixty and a Twenty Gun Ship, and parted with the Sixty Gun Ship within the Capes.

We are informed that several People were taken up in England, and confined, for Publishing false Reports of the King's intended Marriage.

On Monday last the Honourable Daniel Dulany, Esq; was sworn in Secretary of the Province.

And on Tuesday the Honourable John Ridout, Esq; was sworn in Commissary-General of the Province.

Yesterday being the Festival of St. John, the Brethren of the Ancient and Honourable Fraternity of FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS, of this Town, accompanied by some of their visiting Brethren, met at the Lodge Room, from whence they proceeded in regular Order, all properly Cloathed, to their Brother Middleton's, where was an elegant Dinner provided, and every Thing conducted with the greatest Decorum and good Order.

We have as yet received but one English Print, which bears Date the 23d of April, from which we have taken the following Articles:

L O N D O N.

April 23. Capt. Rook, Aid de Camp to General Hodgson, arrived on Sunday about Noon with an Account that a Detachment of the Forces landed the 8th Instant at Port d'Andre on the Island of Belleisle, under the Command of Brigadier Carlton, and found the Shore so defended by the Batteries and Entrenchments, that, after having sustained a severe Fire for some Hours, they were obliged to return on board the Transports, with the Loss of about 500 Men killed, wounded, and taken Prisoners. Major Purcell of Grey's Battalion, and Captain Osburn of Sir Harry Erskine's, are killed. Brigadier Carlton is wounded in the Thigh.

Extract of a Letter from an Officer on board the Expedition Fleet, dated off Belleisle, April 12, 1761.

"On Sunday the 29th of March we sailed from Spithead, and next Day from St. Helen's. On Tuesday in the Afternoon it was known we were destined for Belleisle, and we bore away for it: From that Time till Sunday the Wind was against us. On Monday the Wind was fair, and at Night we sent our Cutters to make the Land; in the Morning we found ourselves within eight Leagues of it. About 12 o'Clock the whole Fleet came to an Anchor, and the Afternoon was spent in making dispositions for Landing. By Four o'Clock on Tuesday Morning, the Troops were ordered to be in the Flat-bottom'd Boats; at Five they were under the Direction of those Captains who were to command the Landing. The Wind blew fresh, and it was very Cold; the Troops continued in the Boats, without the Ships or them moving, till 12 o'Clock. At that Time the Sandwich and another Ship made a Feint, as if going to the Citadel; while the Dragon and Achilles fell down to the southernmost Part of the Island, and were followed by the Boats. The Achilles anchored with her Broadside within Musket-shot of the Place we intended to land at. We were assisted with a Bomb Vessel, and immediately began to fire; which the French only returned with one single Cannon, which was fired but seldom. This gave us Courage, and the Boats pushed for Shore; but much too soon, as some of them were above a Mile behind.

"No sooner were the Men got out of the three Boats which first came to land, than the French showed their Heads above the Entrenchments, and gave them three Fires, which did great Execution, and threw them into Confusion. About 200 of the Scotch Fusileers were ashore with Major Purcell, when one Boat of Erskine's Grenadiers, commanded by Captain Osbourne, landed at a Point, and drew up undiscovered. His Situation was such, that he flanked the Enemy; but would you believe it? No other Boat followed him! A few Paces brought him on the high Ground. The French immediately came out, and the Captain advanced with Intrepidity to meet them. In landing he lost his Fuzee, therefore he drew his Sword, when a Shot brought him down; he immediately got up, and advanced, when a second made him fall again; this he recovered, but still he advanced. He was now so close to the Enemy, that he exchanged several Thrusts with their Officers; the Men fired and then pushed their Bayonets. The Commanders on both Sides were killed, when our Men (about 60 landed at this Place) having nobody to head them, and seeing no Succours, threw down their Arms; a few of them took to their Heels, and not being perceived, they were taken in by a Boat, and carried to the Ships. The Boats were now retreating as fast as possible. A Number of Men were killed and wounded in the Boats; among the latter was Brigadier Carlton, but not dangerously. Our whole Loss, in killed and Prisoners, may be about 400. The Night and next Day the Wind blew very hard, which damaged our Boats, and drove some of the Transports to Sea. Yesterday and To-day it is fine and calm, and we are em-

ployed in repairing our Boats. How we are to proceed I cannot inform you, but the Place is extremely well fortified."

By the French Account printed at Paris the 13th, of the Affair of Belleisle, they make the Loss of the English to amount to 800 Men, killed, wounded and Prisoners; and their own Loss only 10 Men killed and 60 wounded. The above happened the 8th Instant.

Admiralty-Office, April 21. His Majesty's Ships the Hero, commanded by Capt. William Fortescue, and the Venus, commanded by Captain Thomas Harrison, on the 2d Instant, in the Latitude of 43. 30 N. and Longitude 11. 4. W. fell in with and took a French East India Ship, called the Bertin, pierced for 64 Guns, mounting 28, and manned with 353 Men, 93 of them Soldiers, belonging to the French East India Company, from Port L'Orient, bound to the Isle de France and Pondicherry, laden with Ordnance and Naval Stores and Merchandize, and 24,000 Dollars. She sailed in Company with the Valliant East India Ship, of the same Size and Force, and the Fidelle Frigate of 24 Guns, belonging to the Company, on the 28th past. Captain Fortescue sent the Venus with the Prize to Plymouth, where they are arrived, and went in Quest of the other India Ship and Frigate.

The Venus has also brought to Plymouth the Lion Privateer of Bayonne, of 6 Carriage Guns and 12 Swivels, and 85 Men, which she fell in with and took the 6th Instant, in Latitude 46: 50, and Long. 15: 50 W. The Privateer had been out six Days, and had not taken any Thing.

The Captain of the Bertin French East-India-man, declared after she was taken, that the whole Cargo on board the said Ship was valued at 50,000 l. and that on her arrival in East-India, she was to be fitted out as a Man of War of 64 Guns.
