NAPLES, February 4.

THE Dearth of Grain still continues; and Disorders, in Consequence of it, are daily committed even in the Capital. Several Waggon's laden with Bread for the Soldiery have been pillaged. The Means taken to prevent these Inconveniences having been impeded by those who conceal their Stock of Corn; to sell it dearer as the Scarcity increases, the Government have given Orders for the Importation of 200,000 Tomoli of that Commodity.

Cadix, Jan. 31. Among other Vessels arrived here this Month, ten Dutch and English ones were laden with Corn for this Place, where it is excessive dear, notwithstanding the Prospect of a plentiful Harvest.

LONDON, March 28.

The Exports of all Sorts of Merchandise for North-America, was never known to be half so great as at present.

Capt. Hugh Palliser, of his Majesty's Ship Guernsey, lately put in Commission, is stationed at Newfoundland, for the Protection of the Fishery; and he is also appointed Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Ships on that Station.

March 29. A Proclamation is published in this Day's Gazette, for the Sale of the Lands belonging to the Crown, on the Islands of the West-Indies which were ceded to us by the late Treaty of Peace; which Lands are to be sold by Auction in the Month of June next, if the Surveys can be made so soon. Each Person to pay immediately Twenty per Cent of the Purchase Money; the Remainder by different Installments, viz. Ten per Cent within the first Year of the Purchase, Ten per Cent more within the second Year, and Twenty per Cent within every succeeding Year, until the whole is paid. That in Case of Failure of Payment of the Purchase Money, in the Manner above directed, the Purchaser shall forfeit all Right to the Lands purchased, &c.

Orders are given for the immediate issuing out Exchequer Bills, to the Amount of 800,000 l.

Sunday some Officers began to beat up in Westminster for Sailors, to man the Ships going to North-America.

We hear the Cries of the Poor and middling Sort of People, occasioned by the Dearth of Provisions, have ascended so high as to pierce the Hearts of the Great, and that soon after the Rise of the Parliament, a Royal Proclamation will be published, for the free Importation of the Necessaries of Life from the Kingdom of Ireland.

We hear the Indians are exceedingly fond of our Copper Money, which they string round their Necks, as the Negroes do coarse Shells on the Coast of Africa, which has lately occasioned Commissions for large Quantities to be shipped for New-York and Halifax.

Letters from Paris of the 19th inst. say, that the Marchioness de Pompadour lay at the Point of Death, being given over by her Physicians, and that she had received extreme Unction and the Viaticum, which were administered to her by the King's Confessor.

March 30. Copper Money has not been so plenty of late as usual, owing to the large Quantities exported abroad.

It is said there are 50 English Families now ready to embark for and settle in Canada.

During the late Transactions of our East India Company, to which some Dutch Agents in this City have been peculiarly attentive, it is said, regular Dispatches have been sent to Holland, with a minute Detail of what passed at each Meeting; but their Disguist and Apprehensions have exceedingly been augmented since the Report of Lord Clive's going again to India, being afraid that his Lordship's Penetration will not fail of bringing to light some extraordinary Proceedings in that Part of the World.

It is said that his Majesty proposes to set out to visit his German Dominions on Monday after Easter Week.

'Tis said a noble Person has sent his Answer to a great Company, that he cannot think of going abroad on any other Condition, in the first Place,

than the Removing a certain eminent Gentleman from all Manner of Power.

The Price of Silver being reduced, it is hoped a Coinage in that will soon take Place; and the old Sixpences, which are very much worn, be called in.

This Week a Gentleman, well experienced in the Growth and Culture of Silk Worms, had an Audience of a Nobleman of great Distinction, relative to the Utility of Establishing this valuable Branch of Commerce in Florida; and it is said his Lordship, from the Information he received, has engaged the said Gentleman to embark for the new Settlement, in order to begin and carry on the Undertaking at his Lordship's Expence.

It is now said, that Capt. Byron will have the Command of a small Squadron for a Service, supposed for the East Indies.

Copies of several Regulations have been sent from our Government to the Courts of France and Spain, relative to the Possessions of North-America, and of which the Subjects of those Two Nations are to be acquainted with.

It is expected the Parliament will rise the 16th of April.

BOSTON, May 17.

By Letters from London, we find that the Merchants trading this Way have greatly interested themselves in our American Affairs: They write that our Agent Mr. Mauduit has been indefatigable in his Labours upon this Occasion, but they fear that all their Endeavours will fall short of the Success they hoped for: That divers Affairs, it is added, are now in Agitation in the Parliament, which will affect the Interest of the Colonies, against which we are assured the Endeavours of our Friends at Home will be continued to the last.

We hear that the Bill for laying a Duty of Three Pence Sterling per Gallon on foreign Mellasses, imported into the Colonies, was resolved upon, and passed the House of Commons the 22d of March last.

Captain Gillise, from Glasgow, spoke with the Pitt Packet, bound Home from New-York, 18 Days ago, which had been out 13 Days.

May 21. A Gentleman lately arrived from Surinam, informs, that just before he left that Place, certain Advice had been received from Berbicia, that by Means of the Succour they had received, and the Distress of the rebellious Negroes, for want of Provisions, (which was so extreme, that they were obliged to kill every Horse upon the Plantations they were in Possession of) they had intirely brought them under Subjection; but they had almost ruined the Settlement by their Ravages. Upon this Intelligence, a Day of Public Rejoicing was appointed by the Governor, which was celebrated accordingly.

NEWPORT, May 21.

Captain Allen, in 34 Days from the Grenades, gives us the following Piece of Intelligence, viz. That a Polacca belonging to some Port in England, bound from Gambia to Barbados, arrived off that Island the latter End of March last, when the Slaves, upwards of 100 in Number, unhappily found Means to fall upon the Crew, and killed the Captain, Mate, and some others, leaving only two Men and two Boys alive; one of these they placed at the Helm, and stood over him with a Cutlass, ordering him to steer every Morning towards the Rising of the Sun, lying by the latter Part of the Day and Night. The Negroes chose one of their Number as Captain, who having taken the Command, and dressed himself in the Captain's Clothes, maintained the strictest Order, in particular with Respect to the Allowance of Provisions, distributing the same Quantity to the white Men and Boys, as was allowed to the Rest. To Windward of Barbados a Vessel hoisted out a Boat, in order to go on board her, which they beat off, and afterwards a Vessel from thence was sent in Pursuit of her, which proved ineffectual. In about ten Days, from the Blacks taking Possession of the Polacca, she was found to be near the Grenades, when a Sloop, properly fitted, went in Quest of her, which soon came up and began an Engagement, which the Negroes, with Swiftness and Small Arms, maintained with Firmness and Vigour, 'til between 20 and 30 of them were wounded, 2 of whom died. The Sloop then

ran up and boarded her, when they were obliged to submit, and were accordingly taken and carried into the Grenades. No Lives were lost on board the Sloop.

NEW-YORK, May 18.

We hear, That on the 27th of February last, Major Loftus was ordered with the 22d Regiment, consisting of about 300 Men, from Mobile, to proceed up the Mississippi, and take Possession of the Illinois, 500 Leagues distant; that he found the Passage up the River very difficult, owing to the Rapidity of the Current, which retarded their March so much, that they could scarce proceed 10 Miles a Day; and that on the 20th of March, having only got 70 Leagues up the River, their foremost Boat was attacked by the Indians, and in a few Minutes they had 6 Men killed, and as many wounded; that all the other Boats immediately attempted to land, but were also very smartly fired upon; that Major Loftus having a few Days before lost 57 Men by Desertion, not knowing the Number of the Enemy, and being then at a Place called La Roche Davoine, about 400 Leagues from the Illinois, thought it impracticable to fulfil his Orders, and therefore returned to Pensacola.

Extract of a Letter from Montreal, dated May 9.

"As a Well-wisher to this Continent, I own to you that I am particularly inquisitive into every Step taken by our Commanders, and Governors, to punish the blind Spirit of Rebellion, that has been nursed up, in the Minds of some unthinking disaffected Tribes of Indians, and thereby put an End to the present unnatural War, so hurtful to Trade, and the Welfare of our Fellow Subjects.

"Capt. Clafe, the Director of Indian Affairs, in this Province, arrived here lately from Johnson-Hall, hearing that a numerous Congress of the different Nations of Indians settled in this Government, was to be held at Cagnowago, the 5th Inst. in Presence of Brig. Gen. Burton, our worthy Governor: I had the Curiosity to follow thither, where he went, attended by all the Commanding Officers of the different Corps in the Government, and other Officers of the Garrison. At the Approach of his Barge, the Indians, who had hoisted up in several Parts of their Fort, Union Flags, and red Flags, saluted him, with a discharge of Pateraroes, and Volleys of small Arms. The whole Village, Men, Women, and Children, shewed the greatest Demonstrations of Joy at his Landing; at which Time a Company of Warriors, with English Colours flying, and Officers at their Head, formed a double File, through which the Governor, attended by Capt. Clafe, the Indian Director, and other Officers, marched, and went to the Council-Hall, where, after the usual Compliments, I saw with the highest Satisfaction, the Chiefs of the different Tribes, and Nations assembled, take up War-Belts, with great Readiness, heartily promising for their Tribes to join our Indian Friends, so that Numbers of them are soon to set off for Sir William Johnson's."

The Publick are desired to be careful in receiving Pence; as, at this Juncture, there are Abundance of the bad kind now current among us.

Friday Evening last the Harriot Packet, Capt. Robinson, sailed with the Mail for Falmouth.

PHILADELPHIA, May 31.

Yesterday a Law was passed by the GOVERNOR and ASSEMBLY, granting FIFTY-FIVE THOUSAND POUNDS for his MAJESTY'S Service.

Since our last the following Particulars came to Hand from Fort-Henry, in Berks County, viz.

"That on the 23d Instant, about One o'Clock in the Morning, the Commanding Officer there received Advice, that the Indians had murdered some White People about three Miles from thence; upon which he ordered an Officer and 15 Men to go to the Place, where they found Jacob Baker's House burnt, his Wife and Sister killed and scalped, and two Boys were missing: That a Son of Casper Schenebels, and a Son of Nicholas Wolfe's, were both killed within two Miles of the Fort: That at Day-break he went out with 24 Men, but could see nothing of the Enemy, and by the Badness of the Weather lost their Tracks; but that one of his reconnoitring Parties having discovered six Indians, at about a Mile's Distance, he was going immediately out again in Pursuit of them,

with 22 Soldiers, and some Countrymen, who were to take six Days Provision with them: That on the 24th, about 3 o'Clock in the Afternoon, a Woman was shot through the Neck by a Party of four Indians, who were pursued, and fired on by some of our People; and that about two Hours after, three of the Enemy crossed the Highway, and were also followed and fired at by our Men, but we have no Account of any of them being taken or wounded. It is likewise said that the Indians, in their Retreat, met with and wounded several of the Inhabitants badly."

WILLIAMSBURG, May 25.

This Day were executed at the Gallows near this City, pursuant to their Sentence, Bartholomew Roberts, William Abney, and Robert Barnard, for Forgery; and Littleberry Thompson, for Murder. They all behaved very composedly, and with seeming Resignation to their unhappy Fate. The counterfeiting and passing our Paper Currency being attended with the most destructive Consequences to the Credit of the Colony, and large Quantities of it being at this Time in Circulation, it is to be hoped that all concerned in this base and baneful Traffick will take Warning from the untimely End of those who have now suffered.

L O N D O N, April 3.

LORD Clive having repeatedly been requested by the Proprietors of the East-India Stock, to take upon him the Direction of their Affairs in Bengal, and to proceed thither, has refused accepting that Service: His Reason therefor is, that a Difference is subsisting between him and Mr. Sullivan, the present Deputy-Chairman of the Company: Whereupon a Reconciliation was proposed: but on the 28th of March, Lord Clive sent a final Answer to the following Purport, that having considered in the coolest Manner, and without Prejudice, that he can place no Confidence in one, who in his Opinion, has acted, and does continue to act, upon Principles diametrically opposite to the true Interest of the India Company; That, upon the whole, in Case the Proprietors think it for their Advantage that Mr. Sullivan should remain at the Head of the Direction, he could not accept the Service: But in Case the Proprietors should not think it necessary to continue Mr. Sullivan in such Authority, he was willing and ready to accept their Service, even supposing the next Advice should pronounce their Affairs in Bengal, to be in as desperate a Condition as ever they were: That should a Direction be settled with whom he could possibly co-operate, every Thing will be easily adjusted, since he had no interested Views in going abroad.

Sunday the Purser of the Royal George, Capt. Scott, came to the India House with the agreeable News of the above Ship being arrived safe at Plymouth from Bengal. She sailed from thence the 12th of October, and brings Advice, that all Things there were in a perfect State of Tranquillity; that the outward bound Ships were all arrived, and that the Earl of Effingham sailed five Days before the Royal George, and is therefore hourly expected.

It is expected that Admiral Cornish is at the Cape by this Time, as he sailed from Bengal the Beginning of February.

East-India House, April 4.

By the Company's Ship Royal George, which arrived at Spithead from Bengal on the 1st Inst. the Court of Directors have received Letters from that Presidency to the following Purport: That the Disputes between the Company's Servants there and the reigning Nabob, Cossim Aly Cawn, had been productive of such Animosities and Jealousies on the Part of the latter, that it was judged highly necessary to use every Means to allay them. For this Purpose Messrs. Amyatt and Hay, two Gentlemen of the Council, were deputed to wait upon the Nabob with Instructions to endeavour to adjust the Differences in an amicable Manner. They accordingly arrived at Mongheer, the Place of his Residence, on the 12th of May, and had many Conferences with him, in which he evidently shewed a great Averseness to an Accommodation upon the Terms offered to him. About this Time a Supply of 500 Stand of Arms, going to Patna, was stopped by the Nabob's Officers, and other Acts of Hostility were committed; and Affairs being come to an Extremity, a War with Cossim Aly was unavoidable. Messieurs Amyatt and Hay were recalled, and Measures were taken at the Presidency, to carry it on in the most effectual Manner. Mr. Amyatt having taken Leave of the Nabob the Twenty-fourth of June, and received the usual Passports, he set out in Boats for Calcutta, accompanied with Messrs. Amphlet, Wolaston and Hutchinson; Lieutenants Jones, Gordon, and Cooper; and Doctor Crooke, (Messrs. Hay and Gulton remaining with the Nabob as hostages.) As the Boats were passing the City of Moorshedabad, they were attacked the 3d of July by a Number of Troops, assembled for that Purpose, on both Sides the River, and some of the Gentlemen were killed in the Boats. Mr. Amyatt immediately landed with a few Seapoys, which he ordered to fire, and endeavoured to make the Enemy's Troops understand that he was furnished with the Nabob's Passports, and had no Design of committing any Hostilities; but the Enemy's Horse advancing, some of the Seapoys fired, notwithstanding Mr. Amyatt's Orders; and a great Con-

fusion ensuing, that Gentleman, and most of the small Party who were with him, were cut to Pieces.

By the said Letters it further appears, that Mr. Ellis and his Council at Patna, having with the Approbation of Capt. Carlstair, agreed to attack that City early in the Morning of the 25th of June, it was accordingly executed and carried; they were in entire Possession of that City for four Hours, the Moorish Governor and most of his People having fled as far as Cutwa; that he there came to a Resolution to return and attempt to regain the City, and having got in at the Water side Gate of the Fort, he succeeded in dispossessing our Troops, owing to the Seapoys and Europeans being mostly dispersed in plundering: That upon their retiring into the Factory, on account of the Dispiritedness of the Men, and a great Desertion among the Seapoys, it was found impracticable to make any Stand there; and a Resolution was therefore taken to proceed to Sujah Dowla's Country; that they accordingly crossed the River the 26th in the Evening, and met with no Obstruction until they passed Churpa; that then they were attacked on the 30th by the Phousdar, with about 2000 Men, whom they easily routed; but he being that Evening joined from Budgepore with four or five Hundred Seapoys, and five or six Field-Pieces, he attacked the Party on the next Evening, the 1st of July, and entirely routed them, the Europeans having quitted their Ranks at the first Onset; that in the whole there were about fifty Europeans killed, and about 8 or 9 Officers, amongst the last Captain Carlstair, who was killed by a Cannon Ball in the Morning of the 1st; that on the second Mr. Ellis, with the Officers and private Men, were taken Prisoners, and by the last Advices were all at Mongheer, excepting Capt. Wilson, Ensigns Mackay and Armstrong, Mr. Anderson, Surgeon, and Mr. Peter Campbell, who then remained Prisoners at Patna.

Upon these and other Acts of Hostility against several of the Company's Settlements committed by Cossim Aly, it was determined to declare War against him, and to restore the former Nabob, Meer Jaffier, to the Subahship, upon his entering into a new Treaty with the Company. War was accordingly declared, and an advantageous Treaty was concluded, the most material Articles whereof are a Confirmation of his former Treaty, and also of the Provinces of Burdwan, Nidnapoor, and Chittagon, granted by the late Nabob Cossim Aly, engaging to give thirty Lacks of Rupees to defray the Expences and Loss accruing to the Company from the War, and engaging also to reimburse the Amount of private Persons Losses.

Meer Jaffier set out a few Days after to join the Army under Major Adams, which was then on its March towards Moorshedabad. The first Action which happened, was on the 6th of July, opposite to Cutwa, on the Cossimbuzar Side of the River. The Major having crossed the Army the Night before, in the Morning came up with a large Body of the Enemy's Troops, who were strongly posted to oppose his Progress to the City; and having attacked them, they were routed, after a small Resistance, and with an inconsiderable Loss on our Side. A detached Party, under the Command of Capt. Long, at the same Time possessed themselves of the Fort of Cutwa, on the other Side of the River; and all the Artillery they had there, as well as what they had brought into the Field, fell into our Hands. In this Action Mahomed Tuckey Cawn, who, it is said, commanded the Attack on Mr. Amyatt's Party, was mortally wounded, and died a few Days after.

The good Effects of this Success were displayed in the easy Conquest that followed of the City of Moorshedabad, which the Army entered with a trifling Opposition the 24th at Night. Here the Major established and proclaimed the Nabob Meer Jaffier in due Form, and halted some Days to refresh the Army.

On the 28th of July, the Major continued his March towards Mongheer; and on the 2d of August, having arrived near a Place, called Sooty, at the Head of the Cossimbuzar River, a very obstinate Engagement ensued with a numerous Army of the Enemy's best Troops and Artillery, who

there occupied a very strong and advantageous Post. The Stand that they made was resolute and uncommon for Troops of this Country, having closely engaged our Forces for Four Hours; however, by the Intrepidity and good Conduct of Major Adams, and the remarkable Bravery of the Officers and Men, the Enemy sustained a total Defeat. The Loss on our Side was not so considerable as might have been expected from so severe an Action, consisting only of Six Officers and Forty Europeans, and 222 Seapoys and Black Horse, killed and wounded. On the Side of the Enemy, a great Number of Men were killed and wounded, 23 Pieces of Cannon, and about 150 Boats laden with military and other Stores taken; amongst these last were found all the Artillery and most of the Patna Detachment's Stores; and within some Days after the Action, between 60 and 70 of the Men who were taken Prisoners at Patna, and had been engaged by foul Means and fair to serve the Enemy's Guns, returned to their Colours.

Immediately after this Battle the Major advanced with the Army near to Rajamul; about 3 or 4 Miles from which Place the Enemy had thrown up a strong Entrenchment from the Hills to the River, and for the forcing of which it was judged most proper for insuring the Safety of the Troops to carry on regular Approaches. Every Thing having been accordingly prepared, the Works were begun upon the 29th of August, and continued till the 5th of September, when the Major resolved upon an Assault, which was executed with little Loss, and their whole Works fell into our Possession on that Morning. This Success we have great Reason to believe, will be decisive of the Fate of the War, as the Enemy seemed to repose their chief Confidence in the Strength of these Works, and now by the Loss of them are deprived of all Supplies of Provision from the Province of Bengal, which is entirely secured to us.

Major Adams, in his Letters, where he gives an Account of his several Engagements with the Enemy, has given just Praises to Major Carnac, Major Knox, and other Officers who have distinguished themselves, as well as to the Officers and Troops in general for their gallant Behaviour. To Major Carnac he ascribes particular Merit, for the vigorous Attack which he led against the main Body of the Enemy in the general Action of the 2d of August, and which made the first Impression, contributing thereby in great Measure to the Victory we had obtained. The same Justice is due to Major Adams, which he has done to the Officers and Troops under his Command, and the highest Praise is due to him from the Company for his good Conduct in this Campaign, which has been attended with extraordinary Difficulties and Fatigues, on Account of the rainy Season and the Badness of the Roads; and in which, by his Ability in forming the Plans of Attack in such a Manner to take every Advantage the Situation of the Enemy admitted, he has insured the Success of his Operations with the smallest Loss of Men possible; and to which most valuable Qualification, he adds a Coolness and Intrepidity unshaken in the midst of Action.

Governor Vansittart writes to the Directors of the East-India Company, that as the Friends of the Gentleman Prisoners with the late Nabob Cossim Aly, would be anxious to have a certain Account of them, he transmitted the Copy of a Letter to Major Adams, from Messrs. Ellis and Hay, dated at Patna the 4th of October last, mentioning, that the Number of Prisoners was 49, who were taking Measures for the Purchase of their Deliverance: On the Major's nearer Approach towards Patna, that Officer was also endeavouring to effect so desirable an Event. The Governor adds, as Messrs. Ellis and Hay take Notice of the Death of Capt. Turner only, it was presumed all the rest were well. Governor Vansittart afterwards advised the Reduction of Mongheer, on the 11th of October, by the Major, without the Loss of one Man before the Town.

Governor Vansittart further acquaints the Court of Directors, in a Letter dated the 8th of October 1763, That if the War should not be brought to a successful End, he will stay in Bengal till the following

lowing Year at all Risks, although it is the Opinion of the Physicians, he is very incapable of going through another hot Season; but if the Troubles should be so far quieted, that he can leave the Company's Possessions in Safety, he hopes to be in London about September next.

The Court of Directors having a due Sense of the gallant Behaviour and great Services of Major Carnac, as noticed in Major Adams's Advices, have unanimously agreed to restore to him the Command of the Company's Forces in Bengal.

April 5. This Day his Majesty went in State to the House of Peers, and gave the Royal Assent to the following Bills, viz.

The Bill for granting to his Majesty a certain Sum out of the sinking Fund, for the Service of the present Year.

The Bill for altering the Duties on Beaver Skins.

The Bill for granting certain Duties on Goods in the British Colonies, and to make perpetual an Act for encouraging the Trade to the Sugar Colonies.

And to several other Bills to repair Roads, enclose Lands, &c. &c.

NEW-YORK, June 4.

Extract of a Letter from London, dated March 24.

Yesterday the House of Commons finished their Debates on the Bill depending in Parliament for taxing America, conformable to their Resolutions of the 10th Instant. Inclosed are the Votes of said Day, and also those of the 22d and 23d Instant, by which appears the Determinations of the Committee (of the whole House) thereupon.

The Well-wishers to America have used their utmost Endeavours to lessen the Taxes first proposed; in which they have, in some Measure, happily succeeded, and in other Respects fallen far short of what they attempted; particularly,

1st, By not being able to reduce the Duty of One Pound Two Shillings on foreign white Sugars, or to obtain a Drawback on them, when re-exported from the Colonies.

2dly, Not being able to reduce the Duty of 3d per Gallon on Melasses, to 2d per Gallon, though the House divided thereon.

Lastly, Not being able (as yet) to obtain a Liberty of importing directly, Wine, Fruit and Oil from Spain and Portugal. As it now stands, Wine must come to England, and pay Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Ton Duty, and Ten Shillings more when imported into America.

On the other Hand, the 13th Resolution, by which all German Linens, and East-India Calicoes, both white and printed (which include Mullins also) were to be advanced (by the Drawbacks being suspended) to 20 at 43 per Cent.

This was the Debate of Yesterday, from the Sitting of the House till Midnight; and at which all the Americans in and about this City attended, and several were examined at the Bar.

The principal Arguments of the Opposition to that Part of the Bill's passing, was obliged to be founded on the Practicability of the Americans supplying themselves from Germany, St. Eustatia, &c. notwithstanding the Government might take every Measure in their Power by Cutters and Custom House Officers, to prevent it; and if that could be prevented, the Americans would be under the Necessity of manufacturing themselves. These two Points were so fully proved by Witnesses at the Bar, that the House was unanimously of Opinion, to confirm so far of the 17th and 18th Resolutions, as will amount to a Duty of 2 and a Half per Cent. on foreign Linens exported from hence after the 10th of May, 1764; and 5 per Cent. on Mullins and Calicoes, white or printed, exported from hence after the 1st of March, 1765; therefore it will be necessary to transmit your Orders for the latter, as soon after the Receipt of this as possible, to avoid the said 5 per Cent. Duty; as to Linens, the short Time fixed by the Act prevents it.

It may not be improper to observe, that the Ministry, as well as the whole House, appear determined, at any Expence or Trouble, to attempt to put a Stop to illicit Trade, and to give every Encouragement to divert the Americans from manufacturing. These two Points will be most certainly attended to with the utmost Vigilance; and the former should be particularly regarded by the Merchants in America.

The Act for the Bounty of Eight Pounds per Ton on Hemp, is now passing the House, and shall be forwarded as soon as printed.

The 15th Resolution relating to the Stamp Duty, will certainly pass next Session, unless the Americans offer a more certain Duty. Had not WILLIAM ALLEN, Esq; been here, and indefatigable in opposing it, and happily having made Acquaintance with the first Personages in the Kingdom, and the greatest Part of the House of Commons, it would inevitably have passed this Session. All the Well-wishers to America are of Opinion, that as the Tax in itself is an equitable one, and the least injurious that can be proposed, the several Assemblies should signify their Assent and Desire to that Tax, under the present Exigencies of the State, and the Necessity of the Case, by which they avoid every Appearance of an Infringement of their Liberty, and shew their Inclination to pay that Obedience to a British Parliament, which has the Power to make every Part of its Dominions submit to such Laws as they may think proper to enact; by this Means they will prevent a Precedent from internal Taxes being imposed without their Consent, which will inevitably be the Case next Session, if they withhold their Assent to the Stamp Tax.

We hear that on Wednesday last an Anchor of 1400 and a Half, made at Mr. Hawthorn's Sterling Iron Works, was delivered in this City, for one of His Majesty's Sloops here. The Anchor was seen by several Merchants and Masters of Ships, and much liked, and is supposed to be the largest that was ever made in this Government. It is hoped the Merchants in these Colonies will encourage the Improvement of this valuable Manufactory, seeing it is arrived to so considerable a Perfection.

PHILADELPHIA, June 7.

By a Person from Berks County we are informed, that the Woman shot through the Neck by a Party of four Indians (as mentioned in our last) was since dead: That the two Children missing from Jacob Baker's, were found on the Broad Mountain, by one of our Parties, killed and scalped: That two young Men had been since murdered by the Enemy: And that the Number killed, on the Thirtieth of last Month, in that County, amounted to Nine.

Our Advices from Carlisle, of the 31st ult. are, that Information had been received there from Fort Loudoun, of

one Brown being lately killed at the Mouth of Aughwick by the Indians, and his Sister made Prisoner by them: That Captain Shelby, with a small Party of Volunteers, having been ranging in the Great Cove, heard the Hallowing of a Number of the Enemy, supposed to be about Twenty; upon which he alarmed the Inhabitants, a great many of whom, it is said, were repairing to the Forts.—That a Man from Augusta County, in Virginia, advised, that three Persons had lately been killed near Stanton, in that County, by the Indians: And that it was reported there was a considerable Number of them between Bedford and Fort Cumberland.

ANNAPOLIS, June 14.

We are informed by the Virginia Rider, That an Express came last Thursday to Col. Fairfax, from Winchester, with an Account, that on the Friday before, Six or Seven Families were cut off by the Indians at Cedar-Creek, which he says is not above 7 or 8 Miles from that Town: And a Man driving a Carriage loaded with Liquors and some Dry Goods, from Alexandria, for the South Branch, having a Negro Lad with him, was kill'd by the Enemy, and the Lad taken Prisoner. There was a Draught made out of the Militia at Cameron last Saturday, to go to the Frontier; and another larger Draught was to be made on Tuesday last from a General Muster, for the same Purpose.

We mentioned in our last, that Capt. Christie, in the Lion, for London, had had a bad Passage: The following is part of a Letter from a Gentleman who went Passenger, which will give an Idea of their Distress: "LONDON, March 29, 1764. —We met with a very hard Gale of Wind about 150 Leagues off Cape Henry, which forced us to cut away our Main and Mizzen-Masts; had all our Water on Deck, Provision, Binnacle, and Two Hands, wash'd over board; our Steerage Hatch stove down with a Sea, and our Tiller broke in the Rudder Head, with several other Losses."

Last Thursday Noon, one Balsar Wall, a German, Butcher, of this Place, having a Horse who had slipp'd his Shoulder, not knowing how to swim himself, very imprudently went into the River from a Point in this Town to swim him as long as he could swim, in order to cure him: Poor Man, he completed both; being very unhappily Drowned, with his Horse, a few Yards from the Shore. And on Saturday his Body was found, and Decently Interr'd.







HEADS of an ACT of PARLIAMENT passed this Session for granting certain Duties in the British Colonies and Plantations in America, &c. and for improving and securing the Trade between the same and Great-Britain.

WHEREAS it is just and necessary, that a revenue be raised in America, for defraying the expenses of defending and protecting, and securing the same:

From and after 29 Sept. 1764, the following rates and duties shall take place on the several species of Foreign goods, here enumerated, imported into any of his Majesty's plantations in America; viz.

On foreign white or clayed sugars, 1 l. 2 s. per Cwt. [instead of 1 l.]
Indigo 6d. per lb. [instead of 2d.]
Coffee 1 l. 19 s. 9d. per Cwt.
Madder wine 7 l. per ton.
Portugal and Spanish wines 10 s. per ton.
Wrought silks, Bengals, and stuffs, mixt with silks or herba, 2 s. per lb.
Calicoes 2 s. 6 d. per piece.
Cambricks 3 s. per piece.

Coffee and Pimento, of the growth of the British colonies, imported from thence to other places, except Great-Britain, Coffee 7 s. per Cwt. Pimento (Jamaica pepper) 2d. per lb.
The Act 6 George II. (for the better securing and encouraging the trade of his Majesty's Sugar colonies in America) shall continue in force till the 30th of Sept. 1764; after which it shall be perpetual, subject to the alterations following:

Foreign molasses and syrups imported into the British colonies, shall pay 3 d. per gallon [instead of 6 d. as heretofore; which was seldom or never paid; but much of those commodities daily smuggled.]

The importer refusing to pay the duties on wines, the officer shall seize the same, and publicly sell them to the best bidder, and deduct the duties and charges. If they shall not bring sufficient to pay the duty and charges, they shall be staved and split.

The Monies arising by the several Duties before granted, and upon sugars, &c. shall be paid into the Exchequer; and be reserved towards defraying the charges of protecting the British colonies in America.

The exporter of wines from this kingdom to the British colonies in America, shall be paid a drawback of the duties on importation; except 3 l. 10 s. per ton, granted by an Act of the last Session; and also the alien's duty: He first giving bond and security for the due exportation and landing of the same; conditioned to produce a certificate thereof from the proper officer, within 18 months.

No part of the old subsidy shall be repaid for any foreign goods exported as aforesaid; except for wines, white calicoes, and muslins: And upon the exportation of white calicoes or muslins, neither the moiety of the old subsidy, nor the third part of the net duties thereon, granted by Act 11 and 12 William III. and 3 and 4 Anne, shall be repaid, until 1 March. 1765, upon exportation of such white calicoes and muslins, as were sold on or before 25 March preceding, at the India House, the same drawbacks shall be allowed as are now payable.

Where goods entered for exportation to parts beyond the sea, in order to obtain a drawback not allowed by this Act, shall be carried to any British plantation in America, such drawback shall be forfeited, and double the amount thereof, together with the value of the goods. To the oath upon depositions, for such goods as shall be entered for exportation to other places beyond the sea, than to the British American plantations, shall be added these words, "Any British colonies or plantations in America."

Foreign rum or spirits imported into any of the British colonies in America, shall be forfeited, together with the vessel, &c. [They were, before, allowed to be imported on paying 9d. per gallon.]

No sugars shall be imported into Ireland, but such as shall be shipped in Great Britain, and carried directly from thence.

The exporter of rum, spirits, panicles, molasses or syrups, from the British colonies in America, as of the growth thereof, shall produce and deliver to the proper officer before clearing, an affidavit of the quality of the goods, and nomination of the packages, &c. The officer shall grant a master of the vessel a certificate thereof; and shall transmit a copy of such affidavit to the Secretary's Office for the same, on penalty of 5 l.

On arrival of the vessel at the port of discharge, the master shall deliver the certificate to the proper officer, and the oath of the identity of the goods, on penalty of 100 l. if goods found on board not certified for, &c. shall pay the same duties.

Where any such goods, not included in the certificate, shall be imported without intending a fraud, they may be admitted to entry, paying the usual duties.

Bond and security shall be given pursuant to the Act 12 c. 2. in case of lading any enumerated goods, that any molasses and syrups, on board, shall be brought to the office of the British plantations in America, or to Great-Britain; of which report shall be made at the port of arrival. If enumerated goods laden on board without bond given, shall be forfeited with the vessel.

The master, before sailing from the port of lading, shall give a certificate of his having given bond; which, upon completing his voyage, he shall deliver up at the port of discharge, on penalty of 100 l.

British Vessels with any British American goods, or foreign molasses or syrups, discovered near the British American

coasts, not producing a certificate as required by Law; or not producing one of the port of arrival, shall be forfeited.

The bond for non-enumerated goods shall be in force for one Year after the Voyage; when, if no Fraud appear, it shall be given up.

Coffee, and other enumerated goods of the British American plantations, shall be imported under like securities and penalties, as those in Acts 12 and 25 Car. II.

Bond and security shall be given before lading any iron or lumber of the British American plantations, conditioned to land the same, if for Europe, in Great-Britain; and to produce a certificate thereof within 18 months; and if for any of the British American plantations, within 6 months; and if for any other place in America, Africa, or Asia, within 12 months. Where the goods perish, or are taken, the bond shall be discharged.

No goods shall be shipped in one British colony to be carried to another, without a Surrender, and taking out a proper ticket; which shall be produced at the port of discharge; on forfeiture of the goods. The goods shall also be forfeited, if they do not agree with the ticket. A vessel discovered near the coast shall be seized, and the goods, for which no ticket is produced, shall be seized.

No vessel shall be cleared out for any of the British colonies in America, unless the whole cargo be shipped in this Kingdom; and where any European vessel is discovered near such coasts, the goods for which no such ticket is produced, shall be seized; salt, Madeira wines, &c. horses, provisions, or linens, from Ireland, excepted. The penalty on counterfeiting, &c. any affidavit, or certificate, shall be 500 l.

Foreign vessels found at anchor, or hovering on the coasts of any of the British American dominions, and not departing, unless distressed, within 48 hours after notice, shall be forfeited, together with the goods, except French fishing vessels off Newfoundland.

British vessels found standing into, or coming out from the coasts of St. Pierre and Miquelon, or hovering, &c. on the coasts, or with goods on board from thence, &c. shall be forfeited, together with the goods; and the master, &c. shall forfeit also treble value.

Concealed goods found on board, after report made by the master, and not comprised in his report, shall be forfeited; and the master, being privy to the fraud, shall forfeit treble the value.

If customs goods be either laden on board, or landed, before the duties are paid, or prohibited goods be imported into, or exported out of, any of the British colonies in America, the persons concerned therein shall forfeit treble the value; together with the boats, carriages, and cattle employed. An Officer receiving any bribe, &c. conniving at a false entry; making a collusive seizure; or being guilty of other fraud in his office; shall forfeit 500 l. and be disabled from serving the King in any office. And persons giving, or promising any bribe, &c. to such officer, in order to betray his trust, shall forfeit 50 l.

Penalties and forfeitures in America, may be recovered in the Courts of Record there, or Court of Vice Admiralty; and the net produce shall be paid, one third to the King, one third to the Governor, and one third to the Prosecutor. But seizures made at sea by the King's ships are to go, one moiety to the King, and the other to the Prosecutor; subject nevertheless to such distribution, as his Majesty, by order of Council, or proclamation, shall make.

Where the seizure shall not answer the expence of condemnation and sale, or a verdict be given for the claimant, the charges, with approbation of the commissioners, may be defrayed out of the customs in America.

No claims shall be admitted, till security to answer costs be given, to the amount of 60 l. and in default, ship and goods shall be condemned.

Where ship or goods are seized for any cause of forfeiture, the owner shall prove the matter in dispute.

In trials upon information, in America, where a probable cause of seizure appears, the Judge shall certify the same on the record; and the defendant shall have no costs nor action; and in suits, where no information shall be commenced and brought to Trial, and the Court shall certify there was a probable cause of seizure, the plaintiff shall have but 2d. damages, and no costs; and the defendant be fined not more than 1 s.

FLORENCE, February 27.

THE Spanish and Neapolitan Ministers have caused Bread to be distributed to the Populace during four Days, on account of the Marriage of the Infanta of Spain with the Archduke Leopold. Our Government has obliged those who had amassed great Quantities of Grain to bring it to Market, and sell it at a reasonable Price, that the Poor may eat.

Naples, March 13. The Famine increases. Turkey Corn, Beans, and Lupines, are employed in making Bread, and the People crowd to the Places where it is delivered, and by their Numbers have occasioned some Disturbances. For Five Days past the Churches have been filled with Persons imploring Heaven to put a Stop to the public Calamity. A great Number of Women and Girls walk the Streets in Procession, barefooted, their Hair loose, and with Halsters about their Necks. The Head and Blood of St. Januarius have likewise been exposed, and public Prayers ordered.

Frankfort, March 27. This Day the Archduke Joseph was unanimously elected King of the Romans. The Three Ecclesiastical Electors assisted in Person on this Occasion. The Elector of Mentz presided. The King of the Romans will make his public Entry the 29th, and will be Crowned the 3d of next Month.

Florence, March 24. The Government of Naples have seized Five Ships, laden with Corn, destined for this State: And at present there are armed Neapolitan Vessels cruising in the Channel of Piombino, to intercept any Vessels with Corn for whatever Port they are destined.

L O N D O N.
March 24. A Ship from Virginia, about 250 Tons, was seen overfet near St. David's Head; she had false Gallies, and a long Round House; a Letter was taken up, directed for Captain Bellenden; no further Particulars, as the Ship's Stern only was above Water; Tobacco and Staves appeared adrift.

March 29. The Claim of a Noble Lord to the Island of St. Vincent, after a solemn Hearing, which took up Three Days, before the Privy Council, has been adjudged invalid, for this, among other Reasons, that the first and most essential Conditions of the Grant were never complied with by his Lordship's Noble Ancestor, who, instead of landing there, clearing a certain Quantity of Land, and placing thereon a certain Number of white People, never so much as attempted to land, after misferrying at St. Lucia. It is in Consequence of this Determination, that St. Vincent is mentioned with the other Islands, in the late Proclamation for the Sale of our West-India Conquests.

April 3. Information having been given, that several of his Majesty's Subjects have been for a considerable Time, and are now, detained in France as Hostages for the Payment of Ranfom Bills, which have not yet been satisfied: Notice was given in the Gazette of last Saturday, that in Case such Ranfom Bills are not forthwith discharged, Prosecutions will be commenced in his Majesty's Court of Admiralty against all Masters, Owners, and others, unjustly refusing or neglecting to pay the Sums of Money stipulated for the Release of those unfortunate Persons, who have suffered so long Imprisonment.

It is reported, that a deservedly respected Nobleman has declared, that provided he goes to the East-Indies, and is allowed a proper Number of Ships and Forces, he will engage to bring Home (and obtained by honourable Methods) as much Specie and Effects, as after paying the full Charges and Expences of the Expedition, will be sufficient to discharge and pay off the whole National Debt.

April 14. The M^d Dowell, from Maryland for Glasgow, is entirely lost on Tucker Rock, S. E. of the Point of Ireland: The Crew were saved by a Coasting Vessel.

The Duke of Cumberland Packet Boat, Capt. Goodridge, from New-York, is arrived at Falmouth with a Mail.

Monday Evening a Gentleman going along the Poultry lost his Hat, but could not perceive any Person near him but a Baker with a Basket on his Shoulder: A Person looking out of the Window, called to the Gentleman to stop the Baker, when a little Boy was found in his Basket with three Hats, all of which he had snatched off Persons Heads as they passed along.—This is an old Way of Robbing revived.

Thursday a Servant at a Public-house in Paddington, having some Words with his Master, and swearing in a most reproachful Manner, dropped down in a Fit, and expired in a few Minutes.

Yesterday was held a Court of Directors of the East India Company, when Thomas Rous, Esq; was elected Chairman, and Henry Crab Boulton, Esq; Deputy Chairman; upon which Mess. Sullivan, Thornton, Smith, Rooke, and Boyd, withdrew from the Court, with an Intention (as it is supposed) to disqualify themselves from acting in the Direction.

This Event will probably be attended with important Consequences to the Company's Affairs, as the chief Obstacle to their resuming the Benefit of Lord Clive's Services by his going abroad seems to be hereby removed.

Whitehall, March 31. The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Robert Melvill, Esq; Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over the Islands of Grenada, the Grenadines, Dominico, St. Vincent, and Tobago, in America, and of all other Islands and Territories adjacent thereto, and which now are, or heretofore have been dependent thereon.

St. James's, April 10. The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint George James Brune, Esq; to be Governor and Commander in Chief of the Bermuda or Summer Islands in America, in the room of William Popple, Esq; deceased.

PHILADELPHIA, June 14.

Late on Wednesday Evening, the 6th Instant, the Rev. Doctor SMITH, Provost of the College of this City, arrived in perfect Health, having come in the Halifax Packet, in about 6 Weeks from Falmouth. The Day following, the Professors of the College, in their proper Habits, and many of the principal Gentlemen of the City, gave him a most cordial Welcome at his House; and on Tuesday last the Trustees of the College received him at the College, and, after perusing the Papers and Accounts which he laid before them, they did, by the Mouth of their President, return him their unanimous Thanks, for the great Zeal, Ability and Address, which he hath shewn in the Management of the Collection, carried on in Conjunction with Sir James JAY, for this College, and that of New-York; by Means of which, about Thirteen Thousand Pounds Sterling will come clearly, to be divided between the two Seminaries.

Extract of a Letter from Williamburg, May 19.
An Express is just arrived to the Governor, with an Account that the Indians have done a great deal of mischief on Patuxent Creek; they came to Cook's Fort, and imitated the Cry of wild Turkeys; upon which one of the Garrison said, as the Turkeys were so plenty, he would take his Gun and see if he could not kill two or three; but on his Way to the Place where the Cry proceeded from, he saw a Deer, and thought he had better make sure of that, but he had no sooner fired his Rifle than he had four Guns fired at him; the Ball of one went thro' his Hat, and another

another thro' the Skirts of his Coat: He endeavoured to load again, but they came running towards him, which obliged him to throw away his Gun, and make for the Fort, but they cut him off from that, so he then took immediately down to the Inhabitants, and, after a twelve Hours Chase, he got clear of them. How many People they have killed, I have not yet learnt.

From Shippenburgh we have Advice, that the young Woman, who was lately made Prisoner at the Mouth of Aughwick, made her Escape the next Evening after she was taken: That on Sunday, the Third Instant, the Indians killed one William Crow, about 15 Miles from Shippenburgh, and carried off his Wife and four Children, Prisoners: That as a Boy was milking a Cow, about a Mile from said Crow's, he saw an Indian crawling towards him, upon which he went into the House, took a Gun, and fired at him, about 80 Yards Distance, which made the Fellow stagger, when another immediately came up, and helped the wounded One off: And that this Party of Indians was said to consist of twelve.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Pitt, June 1, 1764.

The Corporal and four Men, who went with the last Returns to Ligonier, are not yet returned, and I am in some Pain about them, as the Savages begin now to discover themselves round the Skirts of the Woods.—On the 27th of May, in the Morning, a Soldier of the 42d Regiment was fired at, as he was standing Centry, upon the Point of Grant's Hill; this Centry was detached from a Corporal's Guard, which was out that Morning to cover the Ploughs at Work in Captain Philips's Field; the Centry was mortally wounded, he made his Escape, but died in about two Hours after he came into the Fort.—That Party of Indians (Nine in Number) remained yelping on the Point of the Hill, till the Picquet was more than Half-way up to them, and then they ran off into the Woods, and the Picquet returned into the Fort.—At Night, between the Hours of Nine and Ten, the whole Garrison heard fourteen Death Halloo's on the other Side of the Allegheny River.—On the 28th, in the Morning, two Indians were seen upon the Point of Grant's Hill; and in the Afternoon of the same Day, five of the Enemy were seen by the Picquet in the Face of the Encampment Hill.—On the 29th a Shot was heard towards the Two Mile Run, not far from the Road leading to Ligonier.—The 30th, in the Afternoon, two Indians were again seen upon the Point of Grant's Hill, just above the Ligonier Road; and late in the Evening, two Horses, with Bells, and some Indians with them, were seen on the opposite Side of the Allegheny.—All these Circumstances put together, make me imagine that the Savages are assembling to infect the Communication, though, I believe, not in such Numbers as to dare to molest the Troops coming up against them.—The Commanding Officers at Ligonier and Bedford, have had Notice of the above.—We are very easy here, not imagining it is the Power of all the Savages to molest us.

Our Advices from Carlisle, of the Fourth Instant are, That a Man was found dead and scalped, in the Road between Loudoun and Shippen's Town: That at Bedford one Man had been killed, and another carried off: That at Fort Littleton one Man was wounded: And that the Roads were much infected by the Enemy.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Cumberland, June 5.

On the 26th ult. a large Body of Indians fell on a Party of White People, working in a Field near Fort Dinwiddie, in Augusta County, Virginia, when they killed Fifteen, and wounded and took Sixteen more; they then attacked the Fort, and fired six Hours successively on it, but could not prevail.—This Day I received an Express from Col. Stephens, who informs me, that on the Fourth Instant Captain Nimrod Abby, and a Man of the Virginia Volunteers, were taken Prisoners on the South Branch of Patowmack.—The same Day a Negro Fellow, belonging to one Lynch, was taken as he was driving a Waggon; the Horses were killed, and the Waggon broke to Pieces.—Also, at the same time, a Man, his Wife, and Child, were carried off from Cedar-Creek, within ten Miles of Winchester; and it is supposed, by the great Number of Tracks discovered that there must be three or four large Bodies of the Enemy now down among us; the Inhabitants are chiefly gone away, or going.

Extract of a Letter from Virginia, June 4.

"The Situation of our Frontiers is truly distressing.—The Indians killing and captivating daily.—About eight Days past, upwards of forty Persons were killed at the Pastures, on the Frontiers of Augusta County.—We were hopeful our Troubles were in some Measure over; but, to our Surprise, the Indians came on Friday last, about seven Miles from me, and took one Day's Wife, and four Children. Next Morning, about Sun-rise, four Families going to a Fort with Horses loaded, the Indians Way-laid them, and killed and captivated 21, whose Names were Lloyd, and his Family, Clonper, Jones, Thomas, &c. This Morning, about Two o'Clock, I was informed that about Sun-set Yesterday, six Families were cut off near the Narrow Passage. Two Companies of Men are gone after the Enemy, to re-take the Captives, if possible, of which there are as yet no Accounts."

Extract of a Letter from Fort Loudoun, June 5, 1764.

"Last Week several Indian Tracks were seen in the Woods betwixt this Place and Juniata. Some few of the Inhabitants, who had gone to their Plantations on that Creek, to sow Corn, were attacked by a Party of Indians; one of whom was killed, but on the others returning the Fire, the Indians went off; they carried a Woman with them, that they had taken the Evening before.—On the First of this Month a Man at Mr. Armstrong's Plantation, about Half a Mile from this Fort, who went in the Morning to take Care of his Cattle, was fired on, and shot thro' the Arm, but did not see those who fired on him.—Next Day, about six Miles below this Post, a Man was killed and scalped, his Wife, and four small Children, carried off.—Parties followed their Tracks to the Mountain, but there lost them.—This Day, about Eleven o'Clock, one of the Inhabitants came to inform me, that about four Miles down the Creek, that passes thro' this Place, three Families were cut off, and their Habitations burnt.—I immediately sent an Officer with a strong Party, along with a Number of the Inhabitants, armed, to endeavour coming up with the Indians, or to make Discoveries. He is just returned, and acquaints me, that three Families, consisting of 23 Persons, were killed, their Houses burnt down, and that several of the dead Bodies were found in the Ruins, almost burnt to Ashes, which he buried; he afterwards made a large Circuit in the Woods, without discovering any Track of the Enemy; but found a few Things that belonged to the Killed, which the Indians had taken away. Some of the Inhabi-

tants are still in Pursuit, but am afraid there is little Probability of Success, as the Tracks were very indistinct.—One Lad escaped; he says the Indian Party was about Twenty; that they fired several Shot after him; and that he saw his Father and Mother knocked down with Tomahawks, before he ran off. These Alarms have intimidated the Inhabitants extremely; they are returning from their Plantations in Crowds to this, and every other little Post in the Neighbourhood, in the utmost Distress. I shall do every thing in my Power to support them, and alleviate their Misery."

Several Persons were likewise made Prisoners.

Extract of a Letter from Carlisle, June 9.

"Twice this Week have I had Occasion to write of the sundry Depredations committed in this County; the last, near Loudoun, was a heavy and bloody Stroke.—The Enemy, being closely pursued, killed their Prisoners on the Flight, to the Number of Six or Seven, then scattered, as usual, and made their Escape.—You will readily guess at the present Situation of our miserable and unhappy People, and the piercing Applications I must endure from every Quarter, crying for Help."

ANNAPOLIS, June 21.

A Death Warrant is gone down to Calvert County, for the Execution of Three Negroes, lately condemned for Poisoning their Master, Mr. William Hamilton Smith, whose Death we mention'd about a Month ago.

There came in from England, in the *Munificence*, Capt. Grundill, into Patuxent, a Steerage Passenger, one Richard, or Richardson, or some such Name, who imported a large Quantity of Counterfeit New-Jersey Six Shilling, and Three Shilling Bills. This filly Blockhead almost as soon as he Landed, was very lavish with his Paper Money, which first caused him to be suspected; tho' it is said his Roguery is but very badly executed. He is in Jail in Calvert County.

A few Days ago, a valuable Negro Man in *Queen-Anne's* County, Fishing in a Canoe, and being Fuddled, fell overboard, and was Drowned.

Sundry People having lately come to Town with Paper Currency of this Province, in order to exchange it at the Office for Bills of Exchange; it may not be amiss to inform the Public, That the Commissioners are not, by Act of Assembly, to exchange the Currency till after the 29th Day of September next.



another thro' the Shirts of his Coat: He endeavored to load again, but they came running towards him, which obliged him to throw away his Gun, and make for the Fort, but they cut him off from that, so he then took immediately down to the Inhabitants, and, after a couple Hours Chase, he got clear of them. How many People they have killed, I have not yet learnt.

From Shippensburg we have Advice, that the young Woman, who was lately made Prisoner at the Mouth of Aughwick, made her Escape the next Evening after she was taken: That on Sunday, the Third Instant, the Indians killed one William Crow, about 15 Miles from Shippensburg, and carried off his Wife and four Children, Prisoners: That as a Boy was milking a Cow, about a Mile from said Crow's, he saw an Indian crawling towards him, upon which he went into the House, took a Gun, and fired at him, about 80 Yards Distance, which made the Fellow stagger, when another immediately came up, and helped the wounded One off: And that this Party of Indians was said to consist of twelve.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Pitt, June 1, 1764.

The Corporal and four Men, who went with the last Return to Ligonier, are not yet returned, and I am in some Pain about them, as the Savages begin now to discover themselves round the Shirts of the Woods.—On the 27th of May, in the Morning, a Soldier of the 42d Regiment was fired at, as he was standing Centry, upon the Point of Grant's Hill: this Centry was detached from a Corporal's Guard, which was out that Morning to cover the Ploughs at Work in Captain Phillips's Field; the Centry was mortally wounded, he made his Escape, but died in about two Hours after he came into the Fort.—That Party of Indians (Nine in Number) remained yeeping on the Point of the Hill, till the Picquet was more than Half-way up to them, and then they ran off into the Woods, and the Picquet returned into the Fort.—At Night, between the Hours of Nine and Ten, the whole Garrison heard fourteen Death Halloo's on the other Side of the Allegheny River.—On the 28th, in the Morning, two Indians were seen upon the Point of Grant's Hill; and in the Afternoon of the same Day, five of the Enemy were seen by the Picquet in the Face of the Encampment Hill.—On the 29th a Shot was heard towards the Two Mile Run, not far from the Road leading to Ligonier.—The 30th, in the Afternoon, two Indians were again seen upon the Point of Grant's Hill, just above the Ligonier Road; and late in the Evening, two Horses, with Bells, and some Indians with them, were seen on the opposite Side of the Allegheny.—All these Circumstances put together, make me imagine that the Savages are assembling to infect the Communication, though, I believe, not in such Numbers as to dare to molest the Troops coming up against them.—The Commanding Officers at Ligonier and Bedford, have had Notice of the above.—We are very easy here, not imagining it is the Power of all the Savages to molest us.

Our Advices from Carlisle, of the Fourth Instant are, That a Man was found dead, and scalped, in the Road between Loudoun and Shippens's Town: That at Bedford one Man had been killed, and another carried off: That at Fort Littleton one Man was wounded: And that the Roads were much infested by the Enemy.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Cumberland, June 5.

On the 26th ult. a large Body of Indians fell on a Party of White People, working in a Field near Fort Dinwiddie, in Augusta County, Virginia, when they killed Fifteen, and wounded and took Sixteen more; they then attacked the Fort, and fired six Hours successively on it, but could not prevail.—This Day I received an Express from Col. Stephens, who informs me, that on the Fourth Instant Captain Nimrod Ashby, and a Man of the Virginia Volunteers, were taken Prisoners on the South Branch of Pastumack.—The same Day a Negro Fellow, belonging to one Lynch, was taken as he was driving a Waggon; the Horses were killed, and the Waggon broke to Pieces.—Also, at the same time, a Man, his Wife, and Child, were carried off from Cedar-Creek, within ten Miles of Winchester; and it is supposed, by the great Number of Tracks discovered that there must be three or four large Bodies of the Enemy now down among us; the Inhabitants are chiefly gone away, or going.

Extract of a Letter from Virginia, June 4.

The Situation of our Frontiers is truly distressing.—The Indians killing and captivating daily.—About eight Days past, upwards of forty Persons were killed at the Pastures, on the Frontiers of Augusta County.—We were hopeful our Troubles were in some Measure over; but, to our Surprise, the Indians came on Friday last, about seven Miles from me, and took one Day's Wife, and four Children. Next Morning, about Sun-rise, four Families going to a Fort with Horses loaded, the Indians Way-laid them, and killed and captivated 21, whose Names were Lloyd, and his Family, Clonper, Jones, Thomas, &c. This Morning, about Two o'Clock, I was informed that about Sunset Yesterday, six Families were cut off near the Narrow Passes. Two Companies of Men are gone after the Enemy, to re-take the Captives, if possible, of which there are as yet no Account.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Loudoun, June 5, 1764.

Last Week several Indian Tracks were seen in the Woods betwixt this Place and Juniata. Some few of the Inhabitants, who had gone to their Plantations on that Creek, to sow Corn, were attacked by a Party of Indians; one of whom was killed, but on the others returning the Fire, the Indians went off; they carried a Woman with them, that they had taken the Evening before.—On the First of this Month a Man at Mr. Armstrong's Plantation, about Half a Mile from this Fort, who went in the Morning to take Care of his Cattle, was fired on, and shot thro' the Arm, but did not see those who fired on him.—Next Day, about six Miles below this Post, a Man was killed and scalped, his Wife, and four small Children, carried off.—Parties followed their Tracks to the Mountain, but there lost them.—This Day, about Eleven o'Clock, one of the Inhabitants came to inform me, that about four Miles down the Creek, that passes thro' this Place, three Families were cut off, and their Habitations burnt.—I immediately sent an Officer with a strong Party, along with a Number of the Inhabitants, armed, to endeavour coming up with the Indians, or to make Discoveries. He is just returned, and acquaints me, that three Families, consisting of 13 Persons, were killed, their Houses burnt down, and that several of the dead Bodies were found in the Ruins, almost burnt to Ashes, which he buried; he afterwards made a large Circuit in the Woods, without discovering any Track of the Enemy; but found a few Things that belonged to the Killed, which the Indians had taken away. Some of the Inhabi-

tants are still in Pursuit, but am afraid there is little Probability of Success, as the Tracks were very indistinct.—One Lad escaped; he says the Indian Party was about Twenty; that they fired several Shot after him; and that he saw his Father and Mother knocked down with Tomahawks, before he ran off. These Alarms have intimidated the Inhabitants extremely; they are returning from their Plantations in Crowds to this, and every other little Post in the Neighbourhood, in the utmost Distress. I shall do every thing in my Power to support them, and alleviate their Misery.

Several Persons were likewise made Prisoners.

Extract of a Letter from Carlisle, June 9.

"Twice this Week have I had Occasion to write of theundry Depredations committed in this County; the last, near Loudoun, was a heavy and bloody Stroke.—The Enemy, being closely pursued, killed their Prisoners on the Flight, to the Number of Six or Seven, then scattered, as usual, and made their Escape.—You will readily guess at the present Situation of our miserable and unhappy People, and the piercing Applications I must endure from every Quarter, crying for Help."

ANNAPOLIS, June 21.

A Death Warrant is gone down to Calvert County, for the Execution of Three Negroes, lately condemned for Poisoning their Master, Mr. William Hamilton Smith, whose Death we mention'd about a Month ago.

There came in from England, in the *Munificence*, Capt. Grundill, into Patuxent, a Steerage Passenger, one Richard, or Richardsen, or some such Name, who imported a large Quantity of Counterfeit New-Jersey Six Shilling, and Three Shilling Bills. This filly Blockhead almost as soon as he Landed, was very lavish with his Paper Money, which first caused him to be suspected; tho' it is said his Roguery is but very badly executed. He is in Jail in Calvert County.

A few Days ago, a valuable Negro Man in Queen-Anne's County, Fishing in a Canoe, and being Fuddled, fell overboard, and was Drowned.

L O N D O N, April 24.

IT is astonishing, that (notwithstanding the Crisis of the Poor, and imminent Complaints of the Dearness of Provisions) those who have it in their Power do not exert that Power to put a Stop to the Exportation of Wheat, before it be too late. For these six Months past, the Exportation at the Ports, instead of diminishing, has increased daily. At Lynn, in Norfolk, it is very common to see thirty, forty, or fifty Wagon Loads of Wheat delivered in a Morning; and this is not a tenth Part of the Grain that is brought there by Water; which is exported with as much Expedition as the Wind, Tide, and Shipping will admit of; and this being no inconsiderable Port, they raise here at a Stand for the latter. Now, if the many other Ports in the Kingdom export as much Wheat in Proportion, and with as much Expedition, as this does, it will, in a few Weeks, be impossible to rectify this Grievance, till the next Crop, and perhaps not then, if we should not have a very favourable Harvest; so that (according to the old Proverb) *when the Seed is sown, they'll reap the Scabbe Durr*.

The Integrity, Brown, from Casco Bay to London, founded at Sea the 17th of March, in Lat. 59° 16', Long. 54° 43'. The Crew were taken up by the Calcutta from Virginia to Glasgow.

Yesterday there was but a thin Market at Smithfield, and Cattle sold somewhat dearer than on Monday. One Butcher purchased a small House-Lamb, which weighed above 20 lb. but remarkably fat, for which he gave 55 s.

It is reported, that the Dutch Agents have given large Orders for Guns, Pistols, Swords, &c. for the Use of their Forces going to the East-Indies; all to be furnished with the utmost Expedition.

A considerable Quantity of Plate, Furniture, &c. the Property of a late Stickler for Liberty, has for these several preceding Days, been falling at the Royal Exchange.

Large Orders are gone to Cork and Dublin, for Beef, Pork, and Butter, which it is hoped will in some Measure reduce the exorbitant Price of Provisions in this City, &c.

March 24. It is with the greatest Satisfaction we can assure the Public, that from the great Attention our most gracious Sovereign has for the Good of his Subjects, the Use of Man is soon like to be purchased of its Proprietors, and annexed to the Crown of Great-Britain. We need not remind our Readers how often, and in what a Variety of Shapes so important a Measure, both in the Hon. House of Commons, and out of it, has been in no Manner of Purpose recommended for above thirty Years past, altho' the fatal Effects arising from this notorious Seat of Smuggling have so glaringly disgraced and impoverished the Nation.

The Russian Ministers at Ratisbon and Hamburgh, are engaging a great Number of German Families, Manufacturers, &c. to go and settle in the North-East Part of Russia; as soon as they enter, a Man has 6 s., a Woman 5 s., a Child 3 Shillings heavy Money, allowed them daily for their Maintenance, and they are sent to Lybeck at the Expence of Russia's Expence, where they embark for Peterburgh.

Yesterday arrived here a Mail from Lisbon, in 16 Days, by which we have Advice of the Arrival there of 32 English Ships, all laden with Corn from London.

The new Treaty of Commerce between this Court and Russia is far advanced, and will be, it is said, very advantageous to the two Nations—though the English Colonies of America are now in a Condition to furnish us with many Articles which we have a long Time imported from the Northern Countries.

About Three Weeks ago an Officer of the Regiment of Champagne being at Mals at Douay in French Flanders, a Burglar happened to tread upon his Dog, which so enraged the Officer, that he beat the Man severely; and, on his making Resistance, killed him on the Spot. This Outrage so incensed the Inhabitants, that they gathered about the House where the Officer lodged, demolished the Windows, laid his Baggage, and threw it out into the Street; broke his Post-chaise, and ham-string'd his Horses, and afterwards fell upon the Officer, and drag'd him through the Kennel, till he died. The Officers on Duty taking the Alarm, went to Arms, secured all the Gates, fired upon the Townspeople, and killed Nine, wounded many more, and soon dispersed the mob. This affair being properly represented, is now under Consideration at Court, and it is thought the Regiment will be broke.

The Distemper among the horned Cattle has very much abated, which has been effected by hanging Four or Five Onions about the Neck of each Cattle directly after they are taken ill, and will not eat. On the 22d ult. the Parliament of Rouen issued an Arret, enjoining all Jesuits within their Jurisdiction to depart the Kingdom of France within the Space of one Month, unless they could prove their having abandoned the Society before the 12th of February 1764, or their having taken the Oaths prescribed before the 22d of March 1764, even if they should offer to make them now. This Remittance cannot be supposed to have any Relation to the Affairs of Poland, since it is said, that the Courts of Peterburgh and Berlin have already taken sufficient Measures, in Conjunction, to fix that Crown upon the Head of the Count Poniatowski. It is therefore imagined that these Four Millions are not designed to buy Coffee and Sherbet, but have some Object more alarming to those that lie within the Reach of his Ottoman Highness. Achmet Effendi is charmed with the Manners, as well as dazzled with the Glory of his Prussian Majesty, and finds something truly oriental in them.

Edinburgh, April 2. Yesterday Morning the great solar Eclipse was observed here with great Distinctness. The Sky was remarkably clear and serene, and the Sun in full Brightness, when the Eclipse began, which was about Nine Minutes after Nine in the Morning. The middle or greatest Obscuration, was about 24 Minutes before Ten, and the Eclipse ended about 7 Minutes after 12. During the Eclipse, the Thermometer fell 17 Degrees and a Half. Being exposed to the Sun before the Eclipse began, it rose from 65 to 75. At the Time of the greatest Obscuration, it fell to 55 and a Half; and at the End of the Eclipse, it rose again to 61. The Churches did not meet till after Eleven.

Cork, April 13. Arrived the Burford, of 64 Guns, Capt. Loggie, from Plymouth; she is one

of the Ships destined to take on board the Troops for the West-Indies.

PROVIDENCE, June 11.

Tuesday last Capt. Larcher, in the Sloop Wind-for, arrived here from the Grenades; but having had a long Passage, brings nothing new from thence. He informs, that in his outward bound Passage, he took up a Man at Sea, who belonged to a Vessel commanded by one George Allen, bound from Cape-sair to Barbados having by some Accident fallen overboard: He had been in the Water near an Hour and a Half, during which Time his Captain never put the Vessel about, or took any other Pains for his Preservation, than throwing an old Barrel after him, depending on Capt. Larcher's coming up, who, at that Time was at least two Leagues a-stern, by which inhuman Neglect, the poor Fellow was so far spent when he was taken up, that it was with the utmost Difficulty his Life was preserved.—[Masters of Vessels cannot take too much Pains in saving the Lives of their People, when under such unfortunate Circumstances; yet, there is much Reason to fear there are some, who through Negligence, or too great a Regard for their own Interest, omit discharging such Offices of Humanity in the Manner they ought, by which no doubt, some perish, who might be saved, if proper Measures were taken, as this recent Instance may serve to demonstrate.]

NEW-YORK, June 18.

On Monday Evening last, the NEW-YORK LIGHT-HOUSE, erected at Sandy Hook, was lighted for the first Time. The House is of an Octagon Figure, having eight equal Sides; the Diameter at the Base, 29 Feet; and at the Top of the Wall, 15 Feet. The Lantern is 7 Feet high; the Circumference 33 Feet. The whole Construction of the Lantern is Iron; the Top covered with Copper. There are 48 Oil Blazes.

The Building from the Surface is Nine Stories; the whole from Bottom to Top 103 Feet. This Structure, was undertaken by Mr. Isaac Cremo, of this City, and was carried on with all the Expedition that the Difficulty attending to and from the Occasion could possibly admit of; and is judged to be masterly finished.

PHILADELPHIA, June 21.

And by a Gentleman from Cumberland County, since the above Date, we are informed, that Capt. Lewis, with a Party, pursued, and came up with, the Enemy, who lately did so much Mischief in Augusta County, Virginia, when he engaged them, killed a Frenchman, and two Indians, and rescued some of our People they had Prisoners; who told him, that the Frenchman slain commanded the Party; that there was another Frenchman with them; and that from the Twenty-second of last Month there had been One Hundred People killed or carried off by the Indians, belonging to the Government of Virginia.—He also informed us, that Crow's Wife (mentioned in our last to be taken by the Enemy) had escaped from the Indians, and was returned; and said the Indians that took her and Children were only Three, tho' their Party did consist of Five, but they imagined the other two to be killed, as they had not seen them for some Time: That two of our Soldiers,

It is reported, that the Dutch Agents have given large Orders for Guns, Pistols, Swords, &c. for the Use of their Forces going to the East-Indies; all to be furnished with the utmost Expedition.

A considerable Quantity of Plate, Furniture, &c. the Property of a late Stickler for Liberty, has for these several preceding Days, been selling at the Royal Exchange.

Large Orders are gone to Cork and Dublin, for Beef, Pork, and Butter, which it is hoped will in some Measure reduce the exorbitant Price of Provisions in this City, &c.

March 24. It is with the greatest Satisfaction we can assure the Public, that from the great Attention our most gracious Sovereign has for the Good of his Subjects, the Use of Man is soon like to be purchased of its Proprietors, and annexed to the Crown of Great-Britain. We need not remind our Readers how often, and in what a Variety of Shapes so important a Measure, both in the Hon. House of Commons, and out of it, has been to no Manner of Purpose recommended for above thirty Years past, altho' the fatal Effects arising from this notorious Seat of Smuggling have so glaringly disgraced and impoverished the Nation.

The Russian Ministers at Ratibon and Hamburgh, are engaging a great Number of German Families, Manufacturers, &c. to go and settle in the North-East Part of Russia; as soon as they enter, a Man has 5 s., a Woman 5 s., a Child 3 Shillings heavy Money, allowed them daily for their Maintenance, and they are sent to Lubeck at the Expence of Russia's Expence, where they embark for Petersburg.

Yesterday arrived here a Mail from Lisbon, in 16 Days, by which we have Advice of the Arrival there of 32 English Ships, all laden with Corn from London.

The new Treaty of Commerce between this Court and Russia is far advanced, and will be, it is said, very advantageous to the two Nations—though the English Colonies of America are now in a Condition to furnish us with many Articles which we have a long Time imported from the Northern Countries.

About Three Weeks ago an Officer of the Regiment of Champagne being at Maf at Douay in French Flanders, a Burglar happened to tread upon his Dog, which so exasperated the Officer, that he beat the Man severely; and, on his making Resistance, killed him on the Spot. This Outrage so incensed the Inhabitants, that they gathered about the House where the Officer lodged, demolished the Windows, laid his Baggage, and threw it out into the Street; broke his Post-chaise, and ham-string'd his Horses, and afterwards fell upon the Officer, and drag'd him through the Kennel, till he died. The Officers on Duty taking the Alarm, went to Arms, secured all the Gates, fir'd upon the Townsmen, and killed Nine, wounded many more, and soon dispersed the rest. This Affair being properly represented, is now under Consideration at Court, and it is thought the Regiment will be broke.

The Distemper among the horned Cattle has very much abated, which has been effected by hanging Four or Five Onions about the Beast's Neck directly after they are taken ill, and will not eat. Those Onions draw the Infection out, and look the next Day as if they had been boiled. This Remedy is to be repeated several times, and the Onions which have been used, are to be buried in a deep Hole. In a few Days after, the Cattle are taken with a Running at the Nose, which carries off that Distemper. It is also proper at that Time to hang up some Onions in the distemper'd Cattle's Stables.

April 7. On Wednesday Evening the Thanks of the Society of Arts, &c. in the Strand, were given to Lord Southwell, for communicating a Piece of Handkerchief, made by some of our American Indians, of a Weed called Silk Grass. A Manufacture, the Ingenuity of which was very much admired.

April 10. Yesterday Morning several Thousand Journey-men Silk Weavers went in Procession from Spitalfields, and waited on his Majesty at the Queen's Palace in St. James's Park, with a Petition, representing the miserable Condition to which themselves and Families are reduced, by the clandestine Importation of French Silks. They waited before the Court-yard, and two Gentlemen, belonging to the said Manufacture, had the Honour to be introduced to his Ma-

jesty's Presence, and present their Petition which his Majesty received in the most gracious Manner, and gave for Answer, That they might depend on his Care and Protection. As they went along they distributed a great Number of the following Hand-Bills:

To the PUBLIC.

"The Policy of our natural Enemies the French is of late become so prevalent in this Kingdom, encouraged and supported by many base Artifices amongst his Majesty's Subjects dwelling in these Kingdoms, that the Silk Manufacture, of such Consequence to this Nation, in all Probability is at the Brink of Ruin, by the Encouragement given to our once perfidious Enemies, in buying and exposing to Sale, and consuming the Produce of their Manufactories, and by such illicit Practices Hundreds of us, who have served his Majesty in the late War by Sea and Land, together with helpless Families, are out of Employ, and reduced to the lowest Ebb, therefore are under the indispensable Obligation of taking this Step in presenting a most humble Petition to his Most Sacred Majesty, that he will be most graciously pleased to order a speedy Enquiry into the Decay of a Manufacture so valuable and extensive in its various Branches, and of such Consequence to his Majesty's Revenues, and the Nation in general: At the same Time we most humbly hope for the Approbation of every Well Wisher to his Most Sacred Majesty, our Country, and happy Constitution, and beg Leave to subscribe ourselves yours,

"The Journeymen Silk-Weavers."

A few Days since died at her Lodgings in Piccadilly, Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor, aged 131, being born in the Year 1633.

On the 22d ult. the Parliament of Rouen issued an Arret, enjoining all Jesuits within their Jurisdiction to depart the Kingdom of France within the Space of one Month, unless they could prove their having abandoned the Society before the 12th of February 1762, or their having taken the Oaths prescribed before the 22d of March 1764, even if they should offer to take them now. In Case of old Age or Infirmary, Application shall be made to the Clerk of the Parliament.

The distinguished Honours paid to Achmet Effendi at the Court of Berlin, and the frequent Couriers that pass and re-pass between that City and the Ottoman Porte, being to diffuse a certain Degree of Anxiety into the Mind of the Ministers at Vienna, and even to disturb the Tranquillity of her Imperial Majesty. This Anxiety has been increased by News received from Holland of a Remittance of Four Millions of Florins, sent by his Prussian Majesty to Constantinople, by the Way of Amsterdam. This Remittance cannot be supposed to have any Relation to the Affairs of Poland, since it is said, that the Courts of Petersburg and Berlin have already taken sufficient Measures, in Conjunction, to fix that Crown upon the Head of the Count Poniatowski. It is therefore imagined that these Four Millions are not designed to buy Coffee and Sherbet, but have some Object more alarming to those that lie within the Reach of his Ottoman Highness. Achmet Effendi is charmed with the Manners, as well as dazzled with the Glory of his Prussian Majesty, and finds something truly oriental in them.

Edinburgh, April 2. Yesterday Morning the great solar Eclipse was observed here with great Distinctness. The Sky was remarkably clear and serene, and the Sun in full Brightness, when the Eclipse began, which was about Nine Minutes after Nine in the Morning. The middle or greatest Obscuration, was about 24 Minutes after Ten, and the Eclipse ended about 7 Minutes before 12. During the Eclipse, the Thermometer fell 17 Degrees and a Half. Being exposed to the Sun before the Eclipse began, it rose from 65 to 73. At the Time of the greatest Obscuration, it fell to 55 and a Half; and at the End of the Eclipse, it rose again to 61. The Churches did not meet till after Eleven.

Cork, April 12. Arrived the Burford, of 64 Guns, Capt. Loggie, from Plymouth; she is one

of the Ships destined to take on board the Troops for the West-Indies.

PROVIDENCE, June 11.

Tuesday last Capt. Larcher, in the Sloop Wind-sor, arrived here from the Grenades; but having had a long Passage, brings nothing new from thence. He informs, that in his outward bound Passage, he took up a Man at Sea, who belonged to a Vessel commanded by one George Allen, bound from Cape-spear to Barbados having by some Accident fallen overboard: He had been in the Water near an Hour and a Half, during which Time his Captain never put the Vessel about, or took any other Pains for his Preservation, than throwing an old Barrel after him, depending on Capt. Larcher's coming up, who, at that Time was at least two Leagues a-stern, by which inhuman Neglect, the poor Fellow was so far spent when he was taken up, that it was with the utmost Difficulty his Life was preserved.—[Masters of Vessels cannot take too much Pains in saving the Lives of their People, when under such unfortunate Circumstances; yet, there is much Reason to fear there are some, who through Negligence, or too great a Regard for their own Interest, omit discharging such Offices of Humanity in the Manner they ought, by which no doubt, some perish, who might be saved, if proper Measures were taken, as this recent Instance may serve to demonstrate.]

NEW-YORK, June 18.

On Monday Evening last, the NEW-YORK LIGHT-HOUSE, erected at Sandy-Hook, was lighted for the first Time. The House is of an Octagon Figure, having eight equal Sides; the Diameter at the Base, 29 Feet; and at the Top of the Wall, 15 Feet. The Lantern is 7 Feet high; the Circumference 33 Feet. The whole Construction of the Lantern is Iron; the Top covered with Copper. There are 48 Oil Blazes.

The Building from the Surface is Nine Stories; the whole from Bottom to Top 103 Feet. This Structure, was undertaken by Mr. Isaac Curo, of this City, and was carried on with all the Expedition that the Difficulty attending to and fro on the Occasion could possibly admit of; and is judged to be masterly finished.

Wednesday the Halifax Packet, Capt. Boulder-son, sailed with the Mail for Falmouth.

Saturday last, the Coventry-Frigate, Archibald Kennedy, Esq; Commander, sailed for Halifax.

PHILADELPHIA, June 21.

Our Advices from Carlisle of the 11th Instant are, That the Distress in the upper Parts of that County increased daily, the Indians being often heard yelling and hallooing, in their frightful Manner, among the Hills, and through the Settlements, dispersed in small Parties of two or three together; that they had fired at several of our People; and some of them were seen not far from Fort Loudoun: That the Country was evacuated intirely (excepting two or three Families) from Shippensburg to Loudoun: And that from the Frontiers of Virginia, all their Accounts were most melancholy, respecting the miserable Situation of the Inhabitants there, from the Barbarity of the Enemy.

And by a Gentleman from Cumberland County, since the above Date, we are informed, that Capt. Lewis, with a Party, pursued, and came up with, the Enemy, who lately did so much Mischief in Augusta County, Virginia, when he engaged them, killed a Frenchman, and two Indians, and retaken some of our People they had Prisoners; who told him, that the Frenchman slain commanded the Party; that there was another Frenchman with them; and that from the Twenty-second of last Month there had been One Hundred People killed or carried off by the Indians, belonging to the Government of Virginia.—He also informed us, that Crow's Wife (mentioned in our last to be taken by the Enemy) had escaped from the Indians, and was returned; and said the Indians that took her and Children were only Three, tho' their Party did consist of Five, but they imagined the other two to be killed, as they had not seen them for some Time: That two of our Soldiers,

in Shearman's Valley, saw two Indians making a Blind on the Road with Bushes, in order to lie behind it; that one of them seeing our People, got behind a Tree, but the other not perceiving the Soldier, one of them had a fair Shot at him, and imagined he shot him thro' the Body; upon which they went to their Officer, and told him what had happened, who sent a Party to the Place, where they found a great deal of Blood, and a Bit of Fat, supposed to come out with the Ball.

ANNAPOLIS, June 28.

We hear, that lately a great Number of People have Died in Talbot County, especially Negroes, of a malignant Distemper, supposed to have been brought in by a Vessel with Servants from Ireland; but that it is now in some measure abated.

On Tuesday last Week, one Robert King, a Man who had a Wife and Six Children, having been Drinking too much at George-Town in Frederick County, complain'd that he was too Hot, and very foolishly stripp'd and plunged into the Water to cool himself; but was immediately Drowned. His Body was taken up about 10 or 12 Minutes after.

Monday last the Festival of St. JOHN, was observed here by the Ancient and Honourable Fraternity of FREE AND ACCEPTED MASONS, with great Order and Decency.
