Review:

"Show Boat"

Last weekend, the Dept of Speech and Theatre presented "SHOW BOAT," a lively musical by Jerome Kern and Oscar Hammerstein II. The musical traces the lives of five principle couples from the heyday of river showboats in the 1880's until 1927. Captain Andy and Parthy are the parents of Magnolia, the leading lady, who falls in love with and marries a riverboat gambler, Gaylord Ravenal. Magnolia confides in her friend Julie, who is forced to leave the Show Boat with her husband Steve when her mixed racial origins are exposed. Frank and Ellie, a comedy acting team, and Joe and Queenie, a servant couple, add other dimensions to the play's basic plot.

Janet Officer as Magnolia and Carroll Kline as Ravenal head the cast of fine performers. Kline's beautiful singing easily compensated for the occasional stiffness in his acting (such as in the scene with his daughter); this stiffness was only occasional, however, and in other scenes, such as his first, he appeared to

be quite the suave and debonair drifter. Steady theatre-goers should hardly have been surprised at Officer's exceptional performance, as her invariably fine acting has become a hallmark of the Dept. I, for one, was surprised, however to hear the clear, lovely singing voice which complemented her acting. With such a fine command of both singing and acting (not to mention dancing), musicals are clearly her element.

Julie and Steve(particularly Steve) are primarily "acting parts" rather than "singing parts." Lisa Lafferty as Julie was an excellent actress and, as her number "Bill" proved, a good singer too. She succeeded in developing the more complex nature of her character, admirably keeping pace with the changes that Julie has to exhibit. Matt Ball, one of the finest actors in the Dept, played opposite Lafferty as her husband Steve. The high emotion which Ball packed into his part was masterfully conveyed-particularly in the scene with the Sherriff, where he was splendid.

According to the script, Steve dissappears after the first act, and his dissappearance is not accounted for (though rumour has it he became a barker for a tent of Hoochie-Koochie girls), but Matt Ball's appearance on stage was striking, if brief.

LouAnn Evans and Marc Corbliss as the less serious team of Ellie and Frank succeeded in lending humour and continuity to the events of the play. Evans was charming-she was naturally funny and did not allow her character to deteriorate into a "airhead" stereotype because of the genuine feelings she portrayed convincingly. Her number "Life Upon the Wicked Stage" was quaint and entertaining. She is also a competent dancer, as is her partner, Marc Corbliss. Corbliss as Frank did not, at first, appear to be an outstanding character, but as the show progress, he emerged as one of the strongest and steadiest players in the cast. It was his deliberately understated style, not any lack of talent, which made him seem undistinguished in the first few scenes. His talents were multiple: he could sing well, dance very well, and act effectively without flaunting his humorous character. Corbliss definately "grew on" his aud audience, with his consistent, and winning performance.

Hal Fox played the henpecked Capt Andy, who is plagued by a wife with "a mean disposition. Thus, Fox was able to draw on practicle experience, adapting it to the stage in a "memorable" performance. Actually, Fox had one of the best developed characters: his love for his daughter and his materialistic interest in profits were conveyed with equal believability. His completion of the SHOW BOAT play was an especially successful scene. Kelly Moran as his complaining and shrewish wife Parthy was also excellent. She stayed in character beautifully-much to the delight and amusement of the audience.

Bernice Parks and Carl Parker

as Queenie and Joe, the black servant couple, were two undeniable assets to the show. Parks is gifted with an easeful, natural stage presence. Her ballyhooing and her witty repremanding of Joe highlighted the abundant comic relief in the play. Parker was also a fine actor-he, more than anyone, conveyed the impression of aging in his last scene. His superb rendition of "Ol' Man River" was enchanting, both because of his rich singing voice and the feeling that backed it. It was Parker as Joe who reminded the audience in the last scene that 50 wearying years had passed.

All of the characters owed much to the great chorus that supported them; the orchestra, too, under the direction of Jon Baumann was also excellent. The dancing, choreographed by Claudia Palumbo, was delightful, particularly the wedding scene, which featured the limber antics of Alan Pleasants and Michael Taylor, along with the spunky but graceful movements of Pam Merit. Even the "bit part" actors were good—Judy Fair, Cindi Stefun, Dean Hudson, and Ray-

Bobcats Take Classic

The Frostburg State men's basketball team won the Fifth Annual Bobcat Classic final last Satruday in a thrilling 75–73 game. This is the third time that the Bobcats have won the Classic, and this year's event was, without any doubt, the most exciting tournament held at Frostburg. All four games were decided by no more than 3 points.

The four teams that took part in the tournament were Frostburg, John Jay College, Lehman College, and Salisbury State College. John Jay and Lehman Colleges are both located in New York.

The opening game of the Classic was a 78-77 thriller between Salisbury and John Jay. The game wasn't decided until the last seconds, when John Jay pulled ahead with a free throw.

The second game of Friday night saw Frostburg facing Lehman College. This game certainly gets the nail-biter award, as it wasn't until the final buzzer that Frostburg managed to capture a victory. With three minutes left in the game, Frost-

burg held a comfortable 8 point lead. But, with the aid of several fouls, Lehman whittled the lead down to two points, and then, with 48 seconds left, tied the game at 47-47. Frostburg brought the ball in bounds with 9 seconds, missed a shot, and in the scuffle for the rebound Phil Walter got control and hit a 5 foot jump shot at the buzzer. Frostburg recorded the win,

Album Review

Neil Young is known for his versatile style. Young has writtenhard rock n' roll songs, love songs and even country ballads. He is also known for his inconsistency from album to album, from song to song as his name ranges from mediocre to excellent.

On his last few albums; Comes a Time, Rust Never Sleeps, and Hawks and Doves, Neil was able to appeal to a younger crowd along with his old faithfuls. Of course, these albums were superb. They were consistent and strong. Reactor however is a severe disappointment. First, their is no acoustic guitar on this album, a bad sign, because Young's acoustic songs are almost always excellent, while the electric stuff is more hit or miss.

Cosmic Capers

The Week of December 7-13

This week the moon grows to full, passing through the star groups of Pisces, Aries and Taurus. Thursday's full moon is called the Moon Before Yule or Long Night Moon. This is the

full moon closest to the first day of winter. The moon in the latter part of the week will have a high path across the sky, being nearly overhead in the late evening hours. The planet Venus continues its dominance in the western dusk, appearing as a brilliant starlike object that sets just before 8 p.m.

Now featured at the Frostburg State College Planetarium is "The Christmas Star and Other Wonders of the Winter Sky" with free public showings on Tuesdays at 7:30 p.m. and on Sundays at 1:30 and 2:30 p.m.

Starting with a survey of the current evening stars, the pro-

gram examines the Star that led the Wisemen to the manager. The Planetarium is in the front lobby of Tawes Hall.

There will be a meeting of the Cumberland Astronomy Club at the LaVale Public Library (National Highway) on Friday, December 11 at 7:30 p.m. This meeting, open to the general public, will feature a survey of current sky happenings, a videotape on alien life possibilities and a talk on "Astronomical Theories for the Star of Bethlehem."


The Week of December 14-20

As the moon glides into the morning sky this week, the planet Venus reaches its greatest brilliance in the western dusk. Appearing as a brilliant star-like object, Venus has been known to cast shadows. Through a small telescope or high powered binoculars, Venus can be seen as a tiny crescent.

Early this week is the Geminid meteor shower, but unfortunately the moonlight gets in the way, lighting up the sky and making the meteors less conspicuous. A meteor shower occurs when the Earth passes through the orbit of a comet; the Earth is then littered by tiny pieces of spacedust, most about the size of a pinhead. Like most meteor showers, the Geminids is best seen after midnight, when the Earth and the pieces of spacedust collide head-on.


The meteors appear to be coming out of the star group Gemini — look towards the east in the early morning hours for the best view; up to 50 meteors may be seen each hour.














GYMNASTICS ACTION: (above) Linda Koelliker moves through her uneven bar routine, (below) Steph Reindollar on the beam.

In the championship game, Frostburg faced John Jay. At one time in this gaem Frostburg led by 22 points. But John Jay came back strong, and pulled to within 1 point with just 12 seconds remaining in the game. The game was clinched when Steve Liller tossed in 3 points in the last 7 seconds, thus holding Frostburg's lead and victory. The final score in the championship game—Frostburg 75, John Jay 73.

On Monday, the Bobcats lifted their record to 5-1 with a 75-71 win over California (PA) State. This was the 5th straight victory for the team. The victory was led by Liller with 24 points, McLister with 16, and Porter with 13. Freshman Frank Neitzel came off the bench, in the second half, and scored 8 points to spark the team toward the win

Gymnastics Invitational Held

The first annual Frostburg State College Women's Gymnastics Invitational was held last Sunday, and the Frostburg team opened up their 1981-82 season with a third place finish. The meet was attended by seven other Division III teams from as far away as Massachusetts. The teams were: Georgetown University, Indiana (PA) University, Keene College, Lock Haven State College, University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown, Ursinus College, and Wilson College. The winner of the meet was Keene College with a score of 123.7, vollowed by Indiana (PA) University with 115.48, and Frostburg with a 113.8.

Individually, Frostburg was led by senior Becky Sharp. Sharp was the highest all-around member of the team, as well as scoring the highest standing in an individual event. Overall, Sharp finished fifth in the all—around competition with a score of 29.45. In the individual

events, Sharp finished fourth in the floor exercise (8.1), and sixth on the balance beam (7.0).

Another outstanding member of the Frostburg squad was Linda Koelliker. Koelliker finished seventh in the all-around (28.85), and placed seventh on the balance beam (6.85 and tenth in the floor exercise (7.6).

The meet was controlled throughout by Keen College, who took first place (determined by totaling the score of the top four scores) in three of the four events. The four events in the meet were the vault, the uneven parallel bars, the balance beam, and the floor exercise. Frostburg's scores were high enough to earn a second place in the floor exercise (30.65) and the balance beam (25.5).

Frostburg showed good talent throughout the meet, and should be able to call on that talent to carry them through their season. The team's next meet is on December 12 at the University of Pennsylvania.

Men's Cross Country

Clad in gloves, shorts and longjohns, and extra shirts, Frostburg's men's cross country team braved 25 degree weather and less-than-desirable (for most people) conditions of Lake Michigan's shore to earn a respectable 16th place finish at the NCAA Division III National Championships, held November 21 in Kenosha, Wisconsin. Although more than pleased with the season's outcome, Coach Bob Lewis didn't see this race as the team's best performance. "I felt the qualifying meet was better because we were so intent on the nationals," Lewis commented, referring to the Bobcats' 4th place finish at the regionals the week before. "I told them that I'd take a swim in Lake Michigan if they made the top ten," Lewis said with a wry

grin. Maybe he was better off that they didn't.

The race was run on four inches of snow and ice-just what sophomore Bob Rimkis likes—and he placed 43rd out of 185 runners while finishing 1st for Frostburg. "He ran his best race at the right time," Lewis said of Rimkis, who had been slowly improving all season from a side injury. Sophomore John Arias, named the team's Most Valuable Athlete for the season, was 71st overall and 2nd for Frostburg. Runners John Herfing, Dwain Thomas, Bill Avev. Jack Kiley, and Rich Pomerov filled out the Bobcats' seven competitors. Thomas, a junior in his first season of college cross country, was named Most Improved for the year.

Most of the 22 complete

teams (individual runners also qualify) that competed from among the nations 233 Division III teams were from the Midwest and Northeast. North Central College from Illinois won the meet, Brandeis University in Massachusetts was second, and Fredonia State College in western New York took third. Fredonia will be the site of next year's nationals, which Lewis and the Bobcats, who will all be returning, are already looking forward to. Should they qualify, they can probably expect much of what they met this vear-Fredonia's cross country course is located on the edge of Lake Erie!

Expressing his gratification for a job well done, Coach Lewis thanks all of the team for their efforts during the 1981 season.

SGA Update

The Elderly Assistance Program, implemented in mid-October, was designed to create a bond between the students of FSC and the surrounding community. 
SGA started a campaign to beautify the campus, so the newly-formed Beautification committee began by looking into plans for the architectural landscaping of the area in front

Instead of abolishing this option entirely, the senators recommended to College Senate that this program be accepted with the following revisions: the program will be pass/Fail, and student may take only 4 classes pass/fail in his or her college career, and pass/fail classes may not by used for students major or minor. These revisions were accepted and the new pass/fail option will go into effect beginning the Fall semester of 1982. Many other issues have passed though the senate for while the students have worked on.

The SGA, held a meeting on Oct. 21 to discuss problems about the food in Chesapeake. Response to this meeting was very good. Also, the food service contract for the cafeteria is now being reviewed by an SGA committee, who is looking for possible descrepancies in the contract. We will leave no stones unturned for the 3 years that the food service has been contracted.


