vine Will, were fultable to a Life exercised in every law able Pursuit: His long Refidence among us made him thoroughly acquainted with our Confti-tution and Interests, and his benevolent Disposition induced him invariably to exert all the Influence his Station, at Governor, gave him, and every Means which his own Good Senfe could fuggest, to promote the Public Good. He was a Pattern of So briety and Regularity; a fincere Lover of Truth and Justice; and a most religious Observer of his Word. His Example introduced and established a Habit of Sobriety and Civility among us. That he was a Man of fine Parts and Understanding, and that his Administration was just, mild, and e-quitable, his Enemies (if such a Man could have a ny) dare not deny. In private Life he was an amiable Companion; in his Conversation, affable, chearful, and instructive, but never assuming; and in his Frienosh p, warm and fincere. He was one of the best of Husbands, Fathers, Neighbours, and Masters. In a Word, his Death is universally and jufly lamented, as one of the greatest Misfortunes which could have happened to us; and his Memory must always be rever'd by every true Friend of MARYBAND.

From a late WESTMINSTER JOURNAL. "HE Inflability of Fortune, or the unfatif. factory Seene of Greatness, or the Incertainty of continuing in Possession of any of those Bodearments, that contribute to the Base, the Pleasure, or the Ornament of Life, will never fail to excite many melancholy Confiderations in the Mind of the contemplative Man; and can never want a fufficient Force to open all the Springs of Sorrow, when this Infirm ty of our Nature deprives the World of the truly noble, good, and virtuous Part of it's inhabitants. Such Reflections as thefe are continually arising from the common Spectacle of Mortality, even among the inferior Part of Mankind: But when the glorious Ray of Royalty is extinguished; when it's gorgeous Robe is radely stripped off by the undistinguishing Hand of Death; and when what we, too indelicately, call Happiness, suffers a total Eclipse; how awful, how iamentable is the Scene !

The Lives of good Princes are of infinite more Importance to the Felicity of Mankind than those of other Men; but they are equally precarious; The Cordage of the nobleft Heart is of the fame Mechanism with the vital Texture moving in the Breast of the meanest Peasant; it is equally frail, and equally perishable: Death waves his ebon Sceptre without Diftinction ; like an oriental Tyrant, he causes an ind feriminate Destruction, regardleft of every Thing that can render the Object defireable and meritorious, even in the Eye of Cruelty: Therefore, why should we complain of Mortality F

Poor, Britain ! dear, maternal Land! what art thou still mournfully drooping in Sack cloth and Ash of How low has the harsh Hand of Calamiry laid thee in the Dust? How visibly has Grief crawled, like an irficious Worm to prey upon thy Cheek? Alas when FREDERICE, thy ever to be regretted Favourite, funk to the Tomb; was not thy Cup overflowed with the bitter Draught of Affliction! But now the Female Majesty of Denmark is fied, now every Virtue, that shone con-spicuous as the Sun, in thy own Louisa, is too untimely fet, how are thy Sorrows augmented ?

Look at thy inconfolable Monarch: Like the magnificent Oak, flourishing in all it's State, he had long reigned the Glory of the Plain; affording, beneath his ample Shade, Security and Protection from the Wind, and the Shower: But now the citel Axe of Death has difmembered him of his two fairest Branches: Though, grant, gracious Heaven I that the royal Root may continue unimpaired; that other Stems may give an equal Shew of Prosperity; and that the Majestic Tree may long extend it's honorary Arms for the Protection of the royal Plants.

To lose the Heir Apparent to the Crown; a Prince truly amiable in the Eyes of all Mankind; from whom Britain formed the fond Hope of a Reign equally anipicious with that of his royal Father ; in whom every Englishman predicted the happy Continuance of Liberty, Plenty; and Happinels, in their most pleasing and alluring Garbs: This was a Stroke of Severity, deeply felt by a tender Parent; this was a Blow too violent not to thrust Britannia to the Ground. To fee her na tural Ally deprived of it's greatest Ornament in a Stadtholder; to fee the whole United Provinces weeping for the Death of ORANGE; and to find all those Schemes, concerted by that excellent Prince for the Promotion of the general Happinels of Europe, fruftrated by fuch an Accident; must make Britain fenfibly participate the Woes of her naval Sifter: Walle the Remembrance of an obe dient Son in Law, endeavouring to put into Exe cution fuch Measures as should be conducive to the Interest of that Family, from whence his illus trious Confort was descended; to find this widowed Daughter liable to be enveloped by that Cloud of Artitocracy, which her Confort was attempting to diffel; and to fee the young Heir of NASSAU, and the Honour of the greatest Republic in the Universe, exposed together to the common Danger of French Corruption, and Dutch Venality; must create the greatest Concern, Care, and Anxiety, in the Breast of the Friend, the Father, and the Grandfather, fo conspicuous in his Britannic But to have these two excessive Losser followed by another of equal Confideration, it renders the Load too opprelive to be borne; for, by the Death of her Danish Majesty, this triple Scene of Grief, in less than the small Course of one Year, makes the full Measure of our Missortunes compleat, and renders the Lofs infurmountable, both to the British King, and the British People. As the dear Wife, the tender Parent, and the gracious Queen, Denmark and it's Sovereign must be shrouded in the Veil of Sorrow: As the dutiful Daughter, the Friend of England, and the amiable Lady, Britain and it's Monarch offer to her Memory the kind Tear of Affection, and

the chafte Sigh of Honesty. If we look upon this Lofs in a philosophical Light, every Man, who has the Welfare of Society at Heart, must be sensibly afflicted with it : But if we consider it in a political Sense, every Englishman is more intimately concerned in fuch a Mif fortune, than the Native of any other European Country not immediately subservient on his Daniff Majesty. For the Interest of the Northern Nations are, within this last Century, become a very material Object of political Confideration: They make up one of the three particular Ballances of Power, on which the Security of all Europe is dependent; and they ought to be carefully attended to : Because Ruffia, Sweden, and Denmark, are all of them extremely serviceable to the Maritime Powers, whose Interest it is to support the Independency of those Nations; and particularly to influence Denmark from the Interest of France, which we were not able to do during the Continuance of the late War. But this is a Matter which would take up too much Time, at prefent, in a proper Explanation.

THEY write from Paris, that the Lord Mar-fhal, Envoy Extraordinary from the King-

of Pruffis, continues to confer frequently with the French Ministry, and they will have it that there is a very important Negotiation on the Tapis between the Courts of Verfailles and Berlin, relative to the Electron of a King of the Romans. Jan. 21. Commodore Coates is appointed Captain of the Wager Man of War, and Com-mander of a Squadron of Men of War, which are to fail to the West Indies to relieve Commodore

Jan 22. We hear that the Truffees for the

Colony of Georgia, will fpeedily affign over their Property to his Majesty.

Feb. 13. We hear from Dover, that last Sunday one Roft, belonging to Col. Stuart's Company and one Harbit, of Col. Whitmore's, both of the Third Regiment of Guards, were brought before Edmund Barham, Eiq; Agent for the Pacquets at Dover, for deferting from their Regiment, with an Intent to embark for Calais for the French Service. They were decoyed from London by one Darby, who is taken into Custody on suspicion of being an Agent for the French.

We hear the Parliament will certainly be up the 27th of March, and that his Majefty's Departure for his German Dominions is fixed for the 30th.

Feb. 22. On Thursday a Man meanly dreffed threw himself into the Canal in St. James's Park. He was observed by several Persons who ran to his Affistance, and one of them, with some Difficulty, got him out; but before a Surgeon could be had he expired. Several Summons for the Court of Confcience were found in his Pockets; from whence it is imagined he belonged to that Court. He was carried to St. Martin's Bonehouse in order to be owned.

Feb. 24. We have an Account that the Sue perb, a Spanish Register Ship, from La Vera Cruz, for Cadiz, was loft the rft Inftant, at Concle near

Cadiz, and 50 of the Crew perified.

It is currently reported that the Lieutenant of a British Man of War at Lisbon, was lately seized by Order of his Portugueze Majedy, and afterwards transported to Brazil, for carrying the current Coin of that Kingdom clandeslinely on board of the Ship to which he belonged. This figuregling Practice has been long connived at by the Portugueze Ministry, and was generally carried on by the Monks and Friars, whom, as Ecclesiatics, no body is allowed to fearch.

We hear the Advantages arising by the Import of Gum Seneca into this Kingdom, has induced the Dealers in Silks, Linens, &c. to apply for an Act of Parliament, that it shall be imported in Bri-

tish Ships only.

Feb. 25. We have an Account that the Neptune, a new Man of War of 64 Guns, built at Genoa, coming from thence was loft. The above Ship was computed to be worth 200,000 l.

Yesterday an Officer of the Army was found dead in the Field between Marybon Bason and the Sign of the Angel. Upon inspecting the Body a Wound made by a Sword was discovered under the right Breast, out of which a little Fat had spurted, with some Blood, but there was a copious bleeding at the Mouth. The Corpse was quite warm about one o'Clock in the Asternoon. Two Boys, who were at play in the Fields, heard a Gentleman fay to the Officer, "Against my Will you force me to fight you." Who this Gentleman was is not yet known, as he took Care to

make his Escape, though it is remoured, but on what Foundation we know not, that he is a noble Lord. By the Papers found in the Officer's Pocket, he appeared to be Captain Gray of the first Regiment of Guards,

Between Six and Seven last Saturday Evening, a foul Chimney took fire in Newgate, which occafioned great Mirth among the Prifoners, who ridi culed the Firemen, and flattered themselves they were in a fair way to be fet at Liberty; but happily they were very foon deceived. A Cafe of this kind happened about two Years fince, when the Fire broke out at a House adjacent to the Poultry Compter, which proved a Means of Deliverance to

many of the Prisoners.

Feb. 26. The Cargo loft in the Superbe, from Vera Cruz, for Cadiz, confifts as follows, viz. 1,500,000 Dollars regiltered, 700 Serons of Cochi neal, Julap, Jeiuits Bark and Indigo, 3300 Hiles, 1500 Kentals of Copper, 6000 Logwood, 23 Bra hilletta, 320 Chelts of Sugar, 123 Serons of To-bacco, and 30 Serons of Cocoa. Fifty of the Crew out of 230 were preserved, and l'art of the above Cargo will be faved.

From the Hallifax Gazette, March 23, 1752. By our last Advices from Chignecto, the Commander of his Majesty's Forces, Capt. Collier, of Lascelles's Regiment, died there the Beginning of

this Month.

We have also an Account from thence of the Death of Monfieur La Jonquier, late Interdant-General of New France, in an advanced Age, at Quebec. He was reputed an experienced Sea Officer, and was an Admiral commanding the French Fleet, taken by Lord Anson, and Sir Peter Warren, in 1747, and remained some Time a Prisoner in England.

The Winter paft has proved the severest, and the Frost the most intense that hath ever been known to the oldest Inhabitants in the Province : Notwithstanding which we have the Pleasure of affuring the Public, that this Harbour hath not been froze up, or encumbered io much with Ice,

as to interrupt it's Navigation.
BOSTON.

March 10. By a Letter from Capt. Macarty, late Master of the Brig Lion, of this Port, dated in Liverpool December to. 1751, we are informed, that on the 27th of October last, four Days after he left this Harbour (bound for Barbadoes) in a Calm, the Vessel fprung a Leak, and in 38 Hours was full of Water ; that he then cut away her Masts to prevent her oversetting, and continued on board for 21 Days, when he and his People were taken ou by the Speedwell, John Thornton Master, from Virginia, and carried to Liverpool.

By Capt. Turner in 3 Days from Hallifax, we have the melancholy News, that Capt. Sherburne, of this Town, who in a large Schooner, richly laden, sail'd for Hallifax a few Weeks ago, was cast away on the first Instant, on an Island near Cape Sambrough, and the Vessel and Cargo lost. The People all escaped with their Lives, except a Negro Man, who was drowned; but the Master having received much Hurt, died foon after he got on Shore. The reft of the People having continued on the Island five or fix Days, were taken off by a fishing Boat, and carried to Hallifax. N E W - Y O R K, March 16.

A few Days ago the Plantation of Mr. Cordava, was over run and destroyed by the Wild Negroes; -who murdered him in a barbarous Manner, cutting him into Pound Pieces; they then took his Wife, and a Child at her Breaft, and after firipping her flark naked, fet her up as a Mark to shoot at with the Child in her Arms, but one of the Chiefs releating, he intreated with the rest for her, and she was again set at Liberty .-A few Days after, a Duel was fought here, between one Mr. Crawford, a Scotchman, and a Dutchman, both Officers in this Place, wherein the former was sun through the Body; fince which the latter absconds, tho' the Governor makes strict Search after him, and demands him dead or a-

April 13. The Ship Indian King, Capt. Troup, of this Port, bound from the Bay for London, was coming through the Windward Passage, about the End of last February, when the Captain finding himself extremely ill, and no Doctor on board, and him Vessel hand to produce the captain finding himself extremely ill, and no Doctor on board, and his Veffel having received some Damage, he put back to Jamaica, were, three Days after their Arrival, Capt. Froup died; and Capt. Smith, late of a New York Sloop, being then there, the Charge of the Ship was given him, and he arry ved with her Yesterday Morning, at Sandy-Hook. About fix Days ago, they met with a violent Gale of Wind, which obliged them to throw some of

their Guns overboard. Capt. Troup was a Man of an excellent Temper, kind, affable, and brave; he was Commander of a Privateer during the late War, where he often fignalized himfelf; as he alfo did lately in the Bay; and his Death is justly lamented by all that knew him.

We farther hear, that Capt. Smith, having some Time before been with a Flag of Truce to St. Domingo, found there a great Number of English Prisoners, which had been taken and brought in at fundry Times; he, on his Return to Jamaica, gave an Actount thereof to the Commodore of

the English Ships at Jamaica, who thereupon immediately ordered four English Men of War to sail for St. Domingo, to demand them.

ANNAPOLIS.

Last Tuesday Evening was interred the Remains of his Excellency SAMUEL OGLE, Efq; in the Church in this City; his Coffin was covered with black Velvet, and the Pall supported by five Gen tlemen of the Council, and the prefiding Judge of

the Provincial Court.

Thursday Morning last we had a Thunder Gust here, and another in the Evening, accompanied with a very high Wind. In the Morning it was very violent in Prince George's County, about 17 Miles from hence, where one John Ray, standing at the Door of his House, was kill'd by the Light ning in an Instant, and the Hair of his Body, on the left side, singed from his Head down to his Foot. About half a Minute after, a Walnut Tree, rear the House, was split in Pieces thereby; as was alfo, about a Minute after that, a large Sycamore, about 100 Yards distant; and 10 or 12 other Trees were likewise struck by it, within a Quarter of a

We hear of confiderable Damage being done the same Day by the Violence of the Wind, in different Parts of the Province: Near Kent Island, a Vessel belonging to Mr. William Addams was over fet, and the People on board narrowly escaped drowning. In Prince George's County, a Gentle-man had seven Buildings blown down, and much

other Damage done.

Last Saturday was interred here the Body of Mr. John Mackubin, aged 88 Years; he was bortl in this County, and, as he died merely of old Age, was a remarkable Inflance of the Healthfulness of the Place.

Beardless Youth and toothless Old Age are the Dupes to FLATTERY, which they receive as a Lady does her Lover, with seeming Coyness, but with secret Satisfaction; otherwise, the Flatterer is the most aukward Villain alive, borrowing the Mask of Friendship to so much Disadvantage, that three Fourths of the World can see Deugn and Falshood through it: But whoever is weak enough to swallow his Adulations, may be said to light a Candle for a Robber to plunder him by.

FORWARD Men are the worst Vermin in Society: When once they get Footing in your House, 'tis harder to dislodge them than a Colony of Rats, and they become more troublesome than a Mouse in your Pantry, and as familiar as a Flea in your Chamber: Give a Man of this Character his Christman Dinner, and you'll have the Pleasure of his Company the Year round: He declares himself an Enemy to Compliments and Ceremony, but a Friend to good Fellowship; the former leads him into Impertinence, and the latter renders him Proof against Affronts; so that 'tis impessible to get rid of him, unless peradventure by introducing him to a more opulent Acquaintance.

CHOLKRIC and QUARRELSOME Men are like Fire and Air, too juring Elements, whose Contact produces Contention: The choleric Man is a Nation divided against itself; his Resson sits tottering on its Throne, and his Passons are hourly ripe for Rebellion: If he is married, his Wife may be compared to a Galley in a tempessuous Sea. The quarressome Man is industrious to give Affronts; the Choleric, equally so to receive them: An imaginary Contradiction awakens the Resemment of the latter, but the former will tread upon your Toe

the latter, but the former will trend upon your Toe to propagate Mischief.

The nury Fellow is passionately fond of Secrets, nor can you oblige him more than by making him your Consident: His Curiosity for Secrets is like a sickly Appetite, he swallows them greedily and differences them the next Moment: You may know him by his excessive Complaisance; and prodigious Memory after so great is the former, that he will at any Time neglect his own Business to perform yours; and so tenacious the latter; that he can re-

count to you the feveral Marriages, Issues, Deaths, Burials, and Christenings, that have reach'd his Bars for seven Years before. In his Neighbourhood he is a kind of necessary Evil, employed, or employing himself in every Thing; at Marriages a Bridesman, at Christenings a Sponfor, at Featts a Carver, and at Funerals a Bearer; a Gazette for the Living, and for the Dead a Passing Bell.

H A G U E, January 5.

UR last Letters from Italy intimate, that according to all Appearance the Affairs of the Kingdom of Corfica, which begin again to grow ferious, will afford a great deal of Employment, and give much Chagrin to the Republic of Genoa. It is furprizing that that State, which manifeltly perceives that this rebellious Island will never cordially fabriit to its Dominion, to which the Inha-bitants have an inveterate and hereditary Avertion, has not, by Sale or Exchange, parted with it, as it has had the fairest Opportunity of doing fo. Some speculative People, who reason upon this Subject, think, that notwithstanding the seeming Endeavours of the Marquis de Cursay, and M. Chauvelin, to induce thete turbulent People to behave with the Submission and Obedience which the owe to they Republic, there is a fecret Understanding between France and some of the Genoele Senators; and that this is the prime Source of the Disturbances which are continually arising in that Island, and which, 'tis evident, are scarce possible to be remedied any otherwise than by changing its Master. The Reasons which these thinking People give for advancing Notions that may appear to strange to those especially who have great Confidence in the Sincerity of his Most Christian Mojesty, are, that France has apparently the Possession of this Island very much at Heart, and, in all Probability, to make a Marriage Portion for Madam Henrietta, or one of the other Daughters; and that the excites thefe continual Troubles in Corfica, with a Defign that the Genoese should be in fuch Manner difgusted with and weary of them, that having but little Grounds to hope for main-taining their Authority there, they should be induced to expose the Island to Sale. For a Prepofition of this Nature, these Politicians say, his Most Christian Majesty is impatiently waiting, in order to make himfelf absolute Master of it; in the mean Time, fay they, these Matters being well considered, it must have been a false Alarm which France gave the Senate, when that Crown threatened to recall its Troops from the Island; the best Thing the Republic could have then done, would have been to have taken her at her Word: By that Means, it would at once have feen, that the Council of Verfailles really thought of nothing less than of abandoning a Country, which it secretely looks

upon as a Conquest which can scarcely escape it.

Per, (in Hungary) Dec. 12. At all Times the Jews have been hated in this Kingdom, by the Populace; but more in this Town than essewhere, as the Roman Carholic is the only Religion publickly exercised here. As this Hatred exposed them to continual Insults, the Magistrates were obliged to take them under their special Protection, and decree severe Penalties against any that should injure them, in any Shape whatever. These Orders were renewed about three Years ago, but within these few Months the Mob have begun to pay no Respect thereto, and let slip no Opportunity to modest the Jews. Their Insults were not confined to the poor, ragged, despicable Israelites, but reached also the most opulent; insomuch, that a rich Trader, thinking himself and his Servants were in Danger, had Recourse to the Civil Magistrate, for a more ample Protection; which was granted him, but attended with very sad Consequences; for on the 21st of last Month, at sive in the Evening, one of this Jew's Domestics being insulted in the Street by a Chimney-Sweeper, the Magistrate's

Officers fell upon the Rascal, and drubbed him foundly; but as they did not secure and commit him to Prison, he afterwards ran about the adjacent Streets, imploring the Affistance of all zealous Christians: Upon which the Mob immediately affembled, and surrounded the House of the Jew Merchant, the grand Guard of the City not being able to prevent them. Their first Exploit was breaking all the Windows, with a Volley of Stones; after which they forced open the Door, beat and abused the Merchant and his Wise, who are both pretty far advanced in Years, plundered the House thoroughly, and tore all his Books and Papers. This being over, they were preparing to play the same Pranks at the Houses of other Jews, when the Governor sent a Detachment of Soldiers, to keep the Peace; who fired upon the Rioters, and dispersed them. Some of them were taken in their Beds the same Night, and committed to Prison.

LONDON, January 9.
An Extrael of a Letter from Utreebt, dated Ja-

nuary 1. " The Electoral Court of Cologne is, at length, fer out for Munich; every Thing is on that Account in the more melancholy Situation at Bonn, as the Inhabitants of that City can but very indifferently, if at all, fubfift without its Presence; feveral creditable Tradelmen have already withdrawn themselves in order to go and settle elsewhere, having no Prospect of gaining a Livelihood by a Court which very seldom resides there, and which, according to all Appearance, will continue to travel from one Place to another fo long as the Blec tor shall live and continue in Health, which probably will not be many Years, feeing that Prince is greatly aged, infomuch, that those People who have not feen him this last eight or ten Years would not now know him. The Occonomy of his Houshould likewise is very much changed; his Court is no longer the same where Benefactions used to be difperfed with Profusion; but there is now nothing more of that, excepting among Mulicians and Players, who entirely engross the Favour and Ex-pence of his Serene Electoral Highness, which increases for, and is made upon them every Day more than others. It is now no more the splendid, nor political Court, it ouce was thought to be. One may reft affured, that France holds it in Bands fo firm, that neither the Elector's Journey to Munich, nor any other Measure that has been taken to bring him into the falutary Views of the Court of Great Britain, can yet make him change his Senti ments. If, fays a Person in a sensible Letter from Cologne, the Elector suffers himself to be persuaded to make the Tour of Munich, it is as well from the Aversion which he has for his Residence at Bonn, as from the Pleasures which he will enjoy, in once again vifiting the Territories of his Ancellors, for which he has always expressed a ftrong Affection. Another Reason, perhaps, of his leaving fo frequently his own Dominions, may be, the Misunderstanding which there is between his Serene Electoral Highness and his Chapter, an Instance of which was very recently given, when the Elector expressed his Defire of celebrating the Birth of the Duke of Burgundy, by a Te Deum to be fung in the Cathedral at Munster, and by a Discharge of the Cannon of that City, it was refufed him; but, in order to make a Shew of preferving the Episcopal Authority, that Ceremony was performed in the Chapel of a Convent of Friars, where very few People affilled." Extrast of a Letter from Bourdeaux, dated Ja.

nuary 15. " The Accounts we receive from St. Domingo of the Damage done to our Plantations by the late Hurricane, are every Day more dismal; the Ef fects of it have been general all over the Island, and the Indigo Plants, though very low, hath fuffered greatly, which added to the other Misfortunes it had already fustained, makes the Crop of that Commodity more scanty than can be imagined; and it is computed, that the whole Quantity made at this Time does not exceed a Quarter Part of what used to be made. They had several Ships a loading for this and other Ports, but fo few Goods, that they must be detained much longer than usual, which is the Reason that none have lately arrived, though generally expected at this Time, and when they come, I apprehend the Quantity of Goods will Be very unequal to the Demand which used to be very brifk in the Spring; fo that upon the Whole, the Price of our American Products must keep rifing fome Time longer." Jan. 20. Thuriday last Mary Daily, prayed the Peace against Thomas Mears, and swore as

follows:

He came boldly through my Room, and I might have been murdered, and nobody the wifer; and then a Woman came in bodily through the

Room: I'll tell you her Name by and by, but I am justly in a Hurry. I had a bit of Fire at the Bottom of the Grate, but it would not light a Candle. He called me an old deftauding B—, and then he threatned to knock me down; and I hope your Worship will let me have good bodily Bail or Goal for my Life: For I will take a thousand bodily corporal Oaths, that my Life is in Danger from that Snake there, for a Snake he is."

On Friday last a pretty fingular Instance happened to a Gentleman in Westminster, as he was standing at the Door of his own House; a Person plainty dress'd, with a Box in his Hand, came up to him, and told he came from the City, and was desired to deliver it to him. Upon which the Gentleman answered, that he supposed he was mistaken, for that he had no Connection in the City; but the Person insisted upon leaving it, and added, that he was sure he was not mistaken; he carried it down into the Kitchen, and took his Leave. Upon opening the Box, there were found a Letter, written in great Variety of Hands, to prevent a Discovery, and two Playhouse Bills, in which something seem'd to be wrapp'd: On opening the Bundle, eight Guineas were carefully conceal'd, and in the Letter was wrote, "Sir, The enclosed is yours, honestly yours, ask no Questions, and you shall never know from whom this comes."

Feb. 26. Various are the Accounts of the Caufe of the Duel fought near Marybod. Some fay that the Quarrel was occasioned by a Game at Cards; others, that the Dispute happened concerning the Character of a most eminent Personage, from whom the noble Lord had received fome Indignity, and of whom he therefore did not speak with due respect. A Gentleman who inspected the Wound, and understands the Sword, was of Opinion that it was not given fairly, as the Sword entered a little below; and backward of the Right pap, and came out again under the Ribs of the left Side. The two Boys who were at Play in the Fields, were the only Persons who saw the whole Transaction; and the elder, who is about eleven Years of Age, fays, that after the Captain had wounded his noble Antagonist twice in the left Arm, he was willing to defift; but that the Nobleman answered, he was determined one of them should die: That his Lordthip then pressed the Captain very hard, who thought to tire him out by itanding on the Defenfive; and that in a kind of retreating he unawares came to the Brink of a Ditch, where his Foot flipt, and his Lordship, with one Longe, put an End to tre Quarrel, and to the Life of his Antagonist: That his Lordship then fled. He likewise says, that he pursued him, crying out Murder; his Lord ship, threatened to kill him if he proceeded far-ther, and that he answered, he did not doubt but he could do that, as he had already committed Murder : However, that my Lord did not choose to stand a Parley, and soon outstripped him. Some aver, that the Captain sent his Lordship the Challenge; but others report, that his Lordship's Challenge, with his Name subscribed to it, was found in the Captain's Waiftcoat Pocket. The Accounts of this melancholy Affair differ, more or less, according as the Relators are prejudiced in behalf of one or the other Antagonist; but till the whole be cleared up by a judicial Tryal, it will be but Charity not to judge too feverely of the Liv-ing. Captain Gray was the Brother of Sir James Gray of the County of Northumberland.

Extrast of a Letter from Charles-Town, in SouthCarolina, dated April 2, 1752.
"Last Sunday arrived here I wenty six Lower
Creeks, Ten Upper Creeks, and Eleven Cherokee
Indians. This Vista was unavanated to some of Indians. This Vifit was unexpected to fome of them as well as to ourselves. The two Creek Nations were at Peace with one another; but the Lower Creeks at implacable Enmity with the Cherokees. As foon as thefe met, they drew in Order of Battle at the old School House, where the Creeks lay before the Arrival of the others, and with much ado were prevented from Bloodfed. On this the Cherokees, being much inferior in Number, betook themselves to the Protection of the Government, and were secured in the Guard-House. The Governor attempted a Reconciliation between them; and a Kind of Truce was made between them Yesterday : And the Creeks promifed that they would not follow the others in two Days. About an Hour before Sun-fet the Cherokees fet out by Way of the Path (the only Road which leads up between the two Rivers) and about Miles out of Town were intercepted by the Lower Creeks, who kill'd three on the Spot, the rest they pursued, and it is imagined that five only have escaped, tho' there is not Certainty of more than one. After the Battle the Lower Creeks made off to Ashley Ferry, where they arrived, and cross'd over near Midnight, but whether with one, three, or no Prifoners, is not certain, fo various and uncertain are the Accounts. Some Soldiers are fent after them, but there is little Probability

of their coming up with them.

I went to fee the Dead; one old Man had his Throat cut; but I could find no Wound he had befides; one was fhot through the Body, and his Head was cut off; and the third fhot through the Arm, and through the Body, and all three scaled."

On the Faithfulnefs of DOGS.

MONGST the Animal Part of the Creation, there is none generally looked upon or treated with fo much Contempt as Dogs; and yet, we find recorded in different Ages, and from various Countries, such remarkable Instances of their Loyalty and Faithfulness to their Masters, as to cause them to celebrate their Memories in a particular Manner. We find the Story of Tobit's Dog recorded in Scripture: Some we find are diffinguished by affording them a particular Bury-ing place, and others honoured with Epitaphs, or Inscriptions, to remember their former Services.

I remember, Mr. Pope, in a Letter to one of his Friends, speaking of a favourite Dog of his own, introduces the great Regard several great Men have had for their faithful, and favourite Ones; and in particular, he mentions that famous Story of Ulaffer's Dog Argus, in the following Lines.

" When wife Ulyffer, from his native Coaft, Long kept by Wars, and long by Tempelts toll; "Arriv'd at last, poor, old, difguis'd, alone;
"To all his Friends, and e'en his Queen unknown: " Chang'd as he was, with Age, and Toils and

" Furrow'd his rev'rend Face, and white his Hairs, " In his own Palace fore'd to afk his Brend; . " Scorn'd by those Slaves, his former Bounty fed:
" Forgot of all his own domestic Crew, "The faithful Dog alove, his rightful Master knew, "Unfed, unbous'd, reglected on the Clay,

" Like an old Servant, now cashier'd he lay

" Touch'd with Refentment of ungrateful Man, "And longing to behold his antient Lord again.
"Him when he faw, -he rofe, and crawl'd to meet,
"('Twas all he cou'd) and fawn'd, and kifs'd his

" Seiz'd with dumb Joy, -then falling by his Side, " Own'd his returning Lord, look'd up, and dy'd!

Upon reading the foregoing, the following Story occur'd to my Memory; which, befide giving us an Example of Fidelity, in one of that Species of Animals full mentioned, does at the fame Time, lead us, to wonder at, and pity the Blindness of those poor People, who are led by Ignorance into so much Stupidity, as to degrade themselves below the Beatle that people. the Beafts that perifh.

the Beafs that perish.

A Gentleman that liv'd in a Town, near the famous City of Saint Ildephanso, in the Province of Castile, and Kingdom of Old Spain, having had his Life preserved by Means of a faithful Flouse-Dog; in Gratitude to his old Servant (when he died), order'd him to be buried in a neighbouring Field; and as a further Acknowlegement, and to keep in Remembrance his singular Deliverance; caus'd a large monumental Stone to be put over him, with these Letters inscribed thereon, A Y. P. A. Near to this Place was a Well of famous Water, which was free for all the Inhabitants of the Town; for which Reason, it was especially frequented by the poorest Sort: It happened, that one Day a Peassant going there to draw Water, and observing a Corner of the Stone, took the Pains to gratify his Curiosity, by moving away the Rubbish, and over grown Weeds, and thereby discover'd the Form of it: But endeayouring to remove the Stone, he found it too heavy for him to execute; and observing the Letters engraven on it, he imagined it figuished something more than it, he imagined it figuified fomething more than it, he imagined it figuified fomething more than ordinary; whereupon, at his Return home, he acquainted fome of his Neighbours of the Difcovery, who sgreed to go with him to the Place, and give their Opinion; which accordingly they did; but notwithflanding their various Conjectures, relating to what might be the Signification of the four Letters, they would not determine without the Opinion of the Vicas of the Parish, (who in course was esteem d a learned Man.) The Rev. Priest embraces the Occasion, but chooses to take with him a Companion of the same Crast, who

(though inferior in Dignity) was as learned as himtell: They came to the Spot of Ground that was to be the Subject, by which their two great Menwere to prove themselves so learnedly; but it was some Time before they gave any Sign of it, 'til at last, they both agreed that some Saint, had undoubtedly been buried there, and in fine, the Vicar gave Proof of his being the Learnedest of the two, and fays to his Companion; " Brother! I have found it out; don't you remember to have heard talk of Father Anthony, the Hermit, whose Life and Miracles are published by a samous Author of the Order of Saint Francis?" "I well remember (says the Priess) to have read of him, and by the same Account, his Hermitage stood somewhere hereabout, and this certainly must have where hereabout, and this certainly, must have been his Burial place": Why right, (says the Vicar), for observe the Letters correspond to " the Description given of the Inscription put upon his Tomb Stone, and they are only these sour;
A. Y. P. A. and must fignify no other, than
these Words: Aqui Yace Padre Antonio: Here
lies Father Anthony." Upon which great and
learned Discovery, they returned home to consult of the Matter; which ended in a Refolution, to acquaint the Bishop of the Diocese of the whole Affair; which they accordingly did, and the Report of a new discovered Saint, soon spread over the whole Province; upon which, the poor Peo-ple (particularly, those who lived near the Place), repaired there to pay their Devotion to the Saint'; and many of them that used to setch of the Water of the Well, immediately remember'd what Fayours they had formerly received, by the Miracles wrought upon them in drinking the Water, which they now justly acknowleded, to proceed from the Saint's being buried near the Well; and therefore, as Tokens of Acknowlegement for the fame, they carried, one, a Representation of a Leg, for having had his Leg healed by Means of said Water; another of an Eye, and a third of a Hand or Arm, all imitated in sine white Wax, adorned with sine Ribbons, to hang up near the Saint's Tomb. At last came an Answer from the Bishop, with Orders to the Vicar, to inclose the said Rusial place and to the Vicar, to inclose the faid Burial place, and erect a Chapel to fay Mass in, but not remove any Thing, 'til he should visit the Place himself: The Vicar punctually complies with the Bishop's Orders; and the Bishop, in the mean While, makes great Application to his Holiness at Rome, to forward Dispatches for the Canonization of the Saint; ward Dispatches for the Canonization of the Saint; and in order thereto, the Bishop went himself, and had some of the Bones dug up, which were carried in a solemn Procession to the High (or Parish) Church, to be deposited there: Some were jent to Rome, and others sold at a wast Price as extraordinary Relicks. But whilst they were thus busily employ'd in raising great Sums by the sew Saint's Bones, and laying Schemes for raising more; a very unfortunate Accident happened from an old Inhabitant of the Town, who being one Day present where the Vicar, and some other great Don, were discoursing on this extraordinary Discovery; very bluotly says, "Gentlement permanent permanent for I remember well, when I was a Boy, to have heard my Father, and some of his Neighbours in Conversation, talk about one Senior Don Alonzo Perera, of this Town, who being one Night assaulted by some Villains near his own House, had certainly been murdered that not his Done come to his Assaulted.

had not his Dog come to his Affiliance, and released him from their cruel Defign; for which kind Office, when the Dog died, his Master had him buried in that very tame (Prade or) Meadow; and, I remember to hear them say further, that it was near the Well of good Water; and more particularly, I remember to have heard mention made of a Stone put over him with some Letters, signifying the Dog's

he left a certain Sum, to be paid yearly out of his Estate to the Sexton of the Parish for keeping the faid Place of Interment in Repair: All which (he told them if they were dubious of) they might find recorded (doubtless) in the Archieves of the Town. The Vicar, with the Chief of the Town, went to the Office directly, and after a little Exa-mination, found what the old Gentleman or Don had told them to be Fact; and the Inscription thereon recorded, of the four Letters, to fighify; Aqui Yare Pobre Adonis; or, Here Lies Poor Adonis, which was the Name of the faithful Dog, whose Sepulchre they mistook for that of Father Anthom's; and by which unlucky Accident, the Pope, the Bishop, and the Vicar, lost a good Revenue, and the poor People an idle Day in the Year; which, otherwise, they would have had in going

to pay their Devotion to the new Saint.
This Story is related by Father Feije, in the toth Vol. in Quarto, of his famous Works, entituled, El Theatro Critico; or, The Critical Theatre; published in the Year 1749, for which his Book was kept some Months in the Inquisition; but as the Story was so notoriously known, they thought it bell not to detain the Book any longer.

These Books are, (or are about to be) translated into English; wherein the foregoing Story must appear, if the Author has not consented to let

the Inquisition blot it out.

GIBRALTAR, Jan. 14.

After he had been there fome Hours, the English Consul brought the Governor's Order, for him and his Officers to be conducted to a Prifon fomething less irksome than the Dungeon. where the under Officers and Sailors flill continue, and are obliged in the Day time to work at the Fortifications. The Christians established at Te-

tuan charitably supply the Prisoners with Provisions, or they would perish with Hunger.

Genea, Jan. 22. The Master of a Dutch Ship just arrived from Toulon reports, that Orders had been received there from Court, to assemble the Sailors who are to man the Ships which are upon the Stocks in that Port, and which were very foon to be launched. They write from Leghorn, that the two Hamburgh Ships which carried the Pre-fents fent by the Magistracy of that City to the Dey of Algiers, and Members of the Divan, were

fafely arrived at that Port.

Kleseker, who was fent by the Magiltrates of that City to get the Rigour of the Arret for Breaking off all Commerce with the Hamburghers fof tened, giving an Account, that the Negotiation with that Court had had so happy a Beginning, that he flattered himself with being able, in a short Time, to give fuch other Advices concerning the fame, as would fully as fwer the Hopes and Expectations of his Fellow Citizens, and particularly some Members of the Magistracy, who in case of this Negotiation not succeeding, would have been in Danger from the Populace, who threaten'd an Infurrection: Though we are informed, that there are other Letters from Madrid which positively at fure, that Count Vaugrenant had been able to ob tain nothing in Favour of the Hamburghers of the Spanish Ministry, who gave him to understand, that the King had just Rea ons to be diffatisfy'd with the Conduct of that little Republic, and that it was necessity it should be humbled."

The above Advices from Hamburgh do not, indeed, tell us the Conditions upon which Spain proposes to give the Merchants of the City the Li berty of trading again in its Dominions: If any they have obtained, it's prefumed they are hard e nough; and that they must in the first Place abso-lutely break with the Regencies of Barbary, which is an Article that greatly perplexes, fince it either exposes, on the one Hand, the Commerce of the Hamburghers to infinite Dangers from thele Pyrates, or, on the other, obliges them to be at vast Expences in keeping on Foot a much greater Number of Men of War, to secure their Navigation in the Mediterranean, than at prefent they have Occasion for. The same Advices from Hamburgh add, that how favourably soever M. Kleseker, or any other Person, may have written upon this Af fair, the Citizer's are ferfible they must rely entire ly upon the Courtely of the Court of Spain, and that the Commerce of that Kingdom is fo important an Object to them, that every Thing elfe is nothing compared with it."

S. I. R. Thas been long ago, and universally agreed upon, that there is no Medium in Matrimo. ny, but that those who are wedlock'd are either very bappy, or very miserable. Marri-age is one of the most important Actions of our Lives, and a considerable deal of our Ease and Quiet hangs upon it; it would not therefore be un necessary to examine a little, whence that Concord and Harmony we observe amongst some, and that Discord and civil War as conspicuous amongst othera, have their Origin: I, who am an Old Batchelor, and likely to continue fo, for some serious fober Reasons helt known to myself, will not pretend to dive into Hymeneal Mysteries, because lie mey be reasonably objected that a blind Man is not a Judge of Colours; but fall, for the Good of the Publice communicate a few Remarks made by an Old uxorious Fellow of my Acquaintance, who loves his Wafe no better than the deferves.

Can answer Love, and render Rich Parents have a large Power over their Children, but are to act as Parents, not as Tyrants 1 and Children as Children, regarding the Approbation and Counfels of their Parents, left they precipitate themselves into innumerable Calamities. But above all, let him beware, who with an over wife, plodding, Posterity Head, imposes upon the Inclinations of his Children; let him take Care that he is not industricully laying the Groundwork for altern Scenes of Milisty and Morror, which he may justly look upon himself as the Author of He who disposed look upon himfeif as the Author of. He who dilpofes of his Daughter as he would of his Horfe, to the highest Bidder, will justly fall under the Cessive and Odiam of every thinking Person. Nor in he

lefs culpable who marries a Woman for the Sake of her Acres; and should it be his Hap to suffer Pe nance, and he heartily gall'd with the conjugal Yoke, he merits not our Pity, but the anxious Days and comfortless Nights which tread upon the Heels of such fordid Matches. I'm afraid that those who are wholly actuated by Interest, often lose their Meracity in the Pursuit of it; for who in his Senses, should he overhear a young Spark talking raptu-roully to one who might be his Grandmother, would conclude, that the Prospect of possessing her amiable fweet Person, as he would have her believe forsooth, had inspir'd him with such Eloquence; and not rather that he was inwardly mov'd with the View of possessing a fair Estate, and losing his comfortable Rib the first severe Weather. What Opinion would you have of his Ingenuity, who could discover in a walking Skeleton all the Charms of a blooming Hebe, and Lillies and Rofes in the Cheeks whole Furrows had been long over run with the yellow Crocust and give Eyes full and (wimming to her, whose Eyes were so far funkt in their hollow Sockets that they feem'd to play at Bo-peep with Daylight! and a Set of Ivery Teeth to a venerable hoary Penelope, who possibly posses fed one faking Stump to chew the Cud with.

You may think it impossible, that one whole Glass tells her every Day, Memonso mori, could be fo palpably imposed on; there have been Instances in the World of it's being fo, and that is sufficient to prove the Truth of it. Why Women are oft ener imposed on than Men, is pretty obvious : E. very one must admit that they are the most virtu ous Part of the Creation, and unless corrupted by us (to our Shame be it fpoken), innocent, fraudlefs, and inoffentive; never deligning Harm, they dread none, which renders them an eafier Prey to the in-

Every Thing pleads loudly in their Favour, and condemns us; 'tis ungenerous to exercise our Cunning against their unguarded Innocence; and all the mean evalive Subterfuges that are used upon these Occasions, rather aggravate than extenuate

Difparity in Minds is another Foe to consubial Agreement; two Fiddles fet to different Keys make but wretched Music, and crease Sounds jarring and diffenent; fo those of austere rigid Sentiments will badly relife she giddy thoughtless Notions of o. thers, for which Reason I would not have a grave Reliow marry a Coquety nor a volatile Spark a Prude; nor should he who says little and hates Noise, wed a conceitedly wife Woman, for he will never be able to pay due Regard to her rich Conceptions, or enter into the Life of her poignant Repartees; but perhaps be fo great a Bear as to impole Silence, and Time when the look'd for nothing but Wonder and Admiration, which possibly the may take as an Affront; and when once Wit and Prerogative get together by the Ears, conjugal Love is kick'd out of Doors, and Peace and com-mon Decency follow after. Philosophers are of Opinion, that Thurder in the Upper Regions proceeds from the two Contraries, Fire and Water; and it is not unlikely, that our terrefirial matrimonial Thunder has often it's Source from a fimilar Opposition in Minds. Both Sexes should attentively confider those whom they intend as Partners for Life e Pictures, upon a flight View, or at a Diftance, may please the Beholder, which, upon a more intimate Survey, will appear defective; one Light may reflect a thousand Beauties, while another discovers as many Imperfections: Even common Report is not to he relied on's for altho' Fame is fometimes in the Right, yet the often plays the Curi and backs when the fprings no Game; therefore, Time and Convertation ate the best Touth. ftones to try the Veracity or Faility of Characters. It would feem harfh to allege that few are reasonably in Love, and yet it is too true: Ruby Lips, black Eyes, and dimpled Cheeks, have ruin'd Thoufands; which is apparently the Reafon why a foolth Fair-one has more humble Se vante, than a and be preciously kitled; with the Freezick top

Woman of tolerable Beauty with a great Share of good Sense. Fine Features are fine Things to look at, but fandy Foundations to bui'd Efteem upon. Sickness pales the Vermilion Lips, and dulls the brilliant Eye; and the blighted Puffule deftroys the dimpled Power; but neither wan Difeafe, not eating Time, eradicate the nobler Beauties of the Mind. Some are to unconfcionable as to be Eyethot with a certain Je ne feay Quoy, as they term ir, at the first Rencounter, and furrender at first Summon ; I would not have the Fair be proud of these sudden Conquests, for 't's to be imagined that such Je ne seay Quoi Lovers, who began their Efteem for they don't know what, will foon drop it again for fome fuch important Reasons.

Those who are engaged for Better and Worfe, ought to be highly careful how they offend one another in the minuteft Circumftances, From mere Trifles have rose warm Debate, and Family Differences. It is far better to overlook small Faults, than to take Notice of them; or if they are to be mentioned, it ought to be at least with Mildness and Good-humour, for there is fomething fo haugh ty and proud in our Composition, which badly bears Contradiction or Reproof, and tho' felf-convicted, makes us fide against Reason, when oppofed with Warmth and Ill Nature: This is one of Nature's hereditary Foibles, and should not be treated with Corrolives, but with Lenichts. Aftability and Good Nature are the only Specific, either to promote a lasting Harmony, or to re-se-cure it when in a departing Condition. Every Fault a Hufband may commit is not rafhly to be fpoke of, nor entrufted to tattling Goffips; the whom you rely upon perhaps has a she Friend she must unburthen to, that Friend a Confidant that the must communicate to, that Confidant another that the would be willing to oblige : fo that in 24 Hours it becomes a Secret in the Mouths of a hundred; and the Refule is, that he who finned before with Fear and Caution, grows now impudently careless, and fins at Mid Day; it was a good Saying of Chrysippus. who being sold that one of his Friends reproach'd him in private; Age (figs he), but chide him not; for then be will do it as much in public.

Jealouly has always been justly held the Bane of Marriage; when once it diffuses it's Venom thro' the Mind, Peace and Content are exil'd. The rankled Soul industriously hunts for Tortures, and becomes inventive how to distract herself: Mere Accidents are premeditated Designs, and kind-Words or Looks are construed into deep Deceits. A thousand wild Fears sush upon the wretched Mind which, never had any Cause for Existence, fave in the frantic Fancy; and even the fad Affurance of their Fears were Peace to what they feel.

Tis a general Opinion, that this Whirlwind of the Soul arifes from too much Love, which Conjecture feems to me highly unnatural, and I am afraid that it is produced from a worse Cause, which is a Defect in ourselves; I mean that Suspicion which does not proceed from any Affurance of Crimes committed, but that which the Headfiring Mind will have to be fo without any evident Reason. Our Dispositions are often discovered by what we doubt in others. Suspicion without Cause, either intimates what our Actions have been, or what our Intentions are in the common Occurrenof Life. We observe honest Men are least afraid of Impolition, and, in Trade, none will fo foon fufpect as the unfair Dealer. But whether Jealouly proceeds from a Superfluity of Love (which I feared or from a Defect in ourselves, a Passion, which raifes fuch a Tempelt in the human Breaft, cannot be fufficiently guarded against.

As the Law has provided sgainst Incontinency, I chute to say little upon that Head, only remark in General, that Crimes are of a paler or deeper Dye, according to their Confequences; and if the Commission of a Crime in one sex, either through Cultom or otherwife, is more hurtful and prejudici. al than in another, we must regard it as such.

O the Privileges granted by his Proffian Ma jesty to the Afiatic Company established here in May laft, the Principal of which were, Exemp tion from Customs and Duties for 21 Years; Ware houses at the King's Expence; Liberty to raise what Men they please, either for Sea or Land Service, throughout East Friesland, and the Duchy of Cieve; the Company to be the sole Judges of their Servants; the Power of making Treaties of Aluance, offerfive and defensive, with any Prince or State in Asia; the King restrains himself from making use of either Ships or Men belonging to the Company; a Power to r pel Force with Force; immediate Access to his Majesty; his Majesty's powerful Protection; his Majetty has lately been ple-fed most graciously to make perpetual, instead of 21 Years, the Article of Exemption from Du ties and Customs; and has further granted the Li berty of transporting their Goods through all his Dominions, and of fettling Warehouses and Magazines, and making Sales in any Part of his Dominions, free of all Duties and Customs.

Naples, Feb. 21. We hoped Mount Vesuvius was intirely filled, but that bituminous Matter begins to flow afresh, and very copiously. Among other furprizing Particulars of thefe Eruptions, there is a Bottom in the Neighbourhood, where the Sulphur and Bitumen are accumulated to the

LONDON, February 10. Extrad of a private Letter from Rochelle, dated February 1 1752

"We have at present in our Port five large Vessels, beloiging to the East India Company, very richly la en with the Manufactures of this Kingdom; which, together with four others daily expected, and those five that are at present in the Harbour of Breft, will fail for the East Indies, as foon as Weather will permit, under Convoy of three Men of War floutly armed. The Presents of his most Christian Majetty to the new King of Golconda are on board the Concord, and confift of the King's Picture richly fet with Jewels, five Gold Watches of exquitite Workmanship, one of which requires winding but once a Year, fix large Bales of Gold Brocade from Lyons, and a Gold Snuff Box, fet with eighteen of the finest and largest Brilliants that could be procured."

According to some of the Accounts brought by the Swallow Packet from India, the English and French do not live in a very neighbourly Manner; the former having fet up a Flag staff at a Place not far from Pordicherry, M. Dupleix defired it might be removed, as being upon the French Boundary, as he pretended; and this not being complied with, he ordered it to be beat down with Cannon, which was accordingly done. It is also said, that a Detachment of the Garrison of Pondicherry had given due Correction to some of the People called Marattes, for some Insults or Depredations committed

Advices from Madrid fay, that the last Dispatches fent from thence to London import, that the Spanish Court is willing to consent that the English fhall cut Logwood in the Bay of Campeachy, provided our Veffels keep always within certain Limits to be fixed there; and that the faid Court would speedily appoint Commissaries to enquire into the Prizes illegally made by her Guarda de la Costas, which the English estimate at near 100,000 l - Which Affair, according to Spanish Speed, may possibly be settled in a Year or two.

A Bill is ordered into Parliament for amending an Act of last Sessions for correcting the Kalendar. Feb. 22. We hear from Lifbon, that a Demand has been made by that Court on the British Mer-chants refident there, to produce their Books, in order, as it is prefumed, to be thereby informed of the Nature and Advantages of that Trade, by knowing what Sums of Money they remit home to England on that Balance. Upon Receipt of this News, the Portugal Merchants here waited on the King with an authentic Account of the Affair. when his Majesty was most graciously pleased to promise to consider their Case; and we hear that my Lord Tyrawley will be fent Ambassador on the Occasion.

There are no less than thirty Sail of Ships now fitting out to the River for the Greenland Fishery, the Success of which will be of the greatest Advantage to Great Britain.

The Right Hon: the Lords of the Admiralty have been pleased to order the Hon. Commodore Edgcombe to fail in the Deptford Man of War to

Algiers, to relieve Commodore Keppel.
Feb. 25. The Neptune, a new Man of War of 60 Guns, built at Genoa for the Service of his Catholic Majefly, coming from thence for Cadiz; and an English Merchantman, and a Swede, were loft near Cadiz, on the first Instant, N. S. in the same Storm that the Superbe, the Spanish Register Ship, was loft; and not one Man belonging to the English Ship or Swede were faved.

Admiral Knowles, Governor of Jamaica, does not fet out for that Place till April next; and Edward Trelawney, Efq; the prefent Governor, will not fet out for England till his Arrival there.

Yesterday there was a very smart Press below Bridge for Sailors, which are to be put on board feveral Men of War which are lately put into Commission; but where they are destined is not made public.

We are affured, that the Proprietors of the Bri-

Extract of a private Letter from Paris, Feb. 29. " By the last Dispatches from the Duke de Mirepoix, we learn, that his Excellency has had a Conference with the British Ministry, and reprefented to them, That the King could not defift from his Claim concerning the Restitution of the Prizes made before the Year 1744, fince his Ma-jefly thought he had clearly enough explained the Grounds of it. Upon which they made Answer to his Excellency, That his Britannic Majesty did not conceive how such Restitution could be requi red of him, as there is not the least Mention made of it in the Treaty of Aix la Chapelle; and befides, it is a long while fince Judgment has been given on those Prizes, and the Produce thereof divided among the Captors .- Is this one of the Caufes of preffing Seamen?

The Diffurbance that has happened lately at Lifbon, is faid to have been chiefly owing to difcretion, and a boifterous Behaviour in fome, who fancy that in other Countries the Laws may be eluded, or transgressed, not only with as much Impunity, but with as little Decency and Decorum as at home. - At prefent they are fenfible of their MiRake.

Extract of a private Letter from Paris, March 4. " The Brush Commissaries have lately made a Push towards determining the Affair of Limits in America, and in particular the Islands in Dispute between the two Crowns; but our Commissaries have turned a deaf Ear to the Expedients proposed for adjusting that Affair, giving the others to understand, that there is a material Article which must be previously settled; viz. the French Prizes

made during the War between England and Spain; and as the British Court does not feem to be of a pliant Temper in either of these Affairs, we con-tinue our haval Preparations, that we may be ready to decide all Differences by the Mouth of our Cannon, if no other Expedients can be found.

The last Advices from Madrid fay, that though Mr. Keene has made no Progress in any material Point of his Negotiation, his Excellency has never. theles had fresh Affurances that his Catholic Ma. jesty had fent very precise Orcers to the Guards Costas in the West Indies, to be more cautious for the future in vifiting and taking English Ships, his Intention being, that all those who are not clearly convicted, or justly suspected, of carrying on a contraband Trade, be immediately released, &c."

March 6. We learn from Genoa, that the Reduction of the People in the Bifagno, has not proved fo easy a Matter as was at first imagined; that on the contrary, many remain still in Arms, and have published feveral feditious Papers in the Nature of Manifestoes, in which amongst other Things they fay, that the Luxury and Excess of the Nobi lity is a plain Proof, that they are more able to supply the Necessities of the State, than laborious Peafants, and industrious Mechanics; and that it vecomes them to do it, because their prefent Diftreffes are the Fruits of their past Intrigues; in which the common People had no Share.

They write from Paw, in the Principality of Bearn near the Pyrenees, that they have had a feverer Winter than for many Years paft; that the Ice and Show covering the Earth to such a Depth, that the Wolves not being able to reach any Thing to subfift upon, were driven by Hunger to fall upon the adjacent Villages, in Troops of an hundred, and an hundred and fifty at a Time, and have devoured Women, Children, and even armed Men, of whom they left nothing but the Skull and the Hair; fo that the whole Country is at prefent in Arms against those terrible Enemies, of whom they have had the good Fortune to destroy great Numbers.

March 14. By Letters from Fort St. David's, brought in the Dragon, Capt. Kent, we are informed that the Nabob in the Interest of the English Company, who is faid to be a near Relation of the late Nabob of Golconda, had called upon the Company for Twenty thousand Rupees, towards paying his Troops, which with some of our Forces lay encamped and intrenched under Fort St. David's, not being strong enough to meet the French, and the Army of their new Ally. We also hear that M. Dupleix, the French Governor General, had fent Notice to the Dutch in a little Settlement or Factory fituate within the Territories ceded to the French by the new King of Golconda, that they had no Right to remain there, and defired they would depart. In Consequence of which Summons many of the Dutch packed up their Effects, and embarked in a large Vessel, which unfortunately foundered at Sea, and all the People in her perished.

His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbuty, the Lord High Chancellor, the Duke of Dorfet, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; Duke of Grafton, Lord Chamberlain; Duke of Marlborough, Lord High Steward; Earl Gower, Lord Privy Seal; the Duke of Newcastle, and the Barl of Holderness, Secretaries of State; Marquis of Hartington, Master of the Horse; the Duke of Leeds; the Earl of Lincoln, Auditor of the Exchequer; Lord Anson, First Lord of the Admiralty; and the Hon-Henry Pelham, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and First Lord of the Treasury; the Lord Chief Justice

Lee, and the Master of the Rolls. Kingston, in Jamaica, February 29, 1752. We are affured that there are a great Number of Sailors that have been pyratically taken, now in the Havannah and Cuba, lying in Jail, in a most necessitious Manner; as also that there were two French Vessels taken, and brought into St. afters of wnom Liberty, and their Vessels and Goods fold. Upon which they not only receiv'd Satisfaction, but Promifes of better Behaviour for the future.

LONDON, February 10. Extrast of a private Letter from Rochelle, dated February 1 1752

"We have at present in our Port five large Vestels, belonging to the East India Company, very richly la en with the Manufactures of this Kingdom; which, together with four others daily expected, and those five that are at present in the Harbour of Breft, will fail for the East Indies, as foon as Weather will permit, under Convoy of three Men of War floutly armed. The Presents of his most Christian Majesty to the new King of Golconda are on board the Concord, and confift of the King's Picture richly fit with Jewels, five Gold Watches of exquifite Workmanship, one of which requires winding but once a Year, fix large Bales of Gold Brocade from Lyons, and a Gold Snuff Box, set with eighteen of the finest and largest Brilliants that could be procured."

According to some of the Accounts brought by the Swallow Packet from India, the English and French do not live in a very neighbourly Manner; the former having fet up a Flag staff at a Place not far from Pordicherry, M. Dupleix defired it might be removed, as being upon the French Boundary. as he pretended; and this not being complied with, he ordered it to be beat down with Cannon, which was accordingly done. It is also said, that a Detachment of the Garrison of Pondicherry had given due Correction to some of the People called Marattes, for some Insults or Depredations committed

Advices from Madrid say, that the last Dispatches fent from thence to London import, that the Spanish Court is willing to consent that the English fhall cut Logwood in the Bay of Campeachy, pro-vided our Vestels keep always within certain Limits to be fixed there; and that the faid Court would speedily appoint Commissaries to enquire into the Prizes illegally made by her Guarda de la Costas, which the English estimate at near 100,000 l. -Which Affair, according to Spanish Speed, may possibly be fettled in a Year or two. Extrad of a private Letter from Paris, March 4. " The British Commissionies have lately made a Push towards determining the Affair of Limits in America, and in particular the Islands in Dispute between the two Crowns; but our Commissaries have turned a deaf Ear to the Expedients proposed for adjusting that Affair, giving the others to un-derstand, that there is a material Article which must be previously settled; viz., the French Prizes

made during the War between England and Spain; and as the British Court does not seem to be of a pliant Temper in either of these Affairs, we continue our haval Preparations, that we may be ready to decide all Differences by the Mouth of our Can-non, if no other Expedients can be found.

The last Advices from Madrid fay, that though Mr. Keene has made no Progress in any material Point of his Negotiation, his Excellency has never thele's had fresh Affurances that his Catholic Ma. jesty had fent very precise Orders to the Guards Costas in the West Indies, to be more cautious for the future in vifiting and taking English Ships, his Intention being, that all those who are not clearly convicted, or justly suspected, of carrying on a contraband Trade, be immediately released, &c. "

They write from Paw, in the Principality of Bearn near the Pyrenees, that they have had a feverer Winter than for many Years past; that the Ice and Snow covering the Harth to such a Depth, that the Wolves not being able to reach any Thing to subfift upon, were driven by Hunger to fall upon the adjacent Villages, in Troops of an hundred, and an hundred and fifty at a Time, and have devoured Women, Children, and even armed Men, of whom they left nothing but the Skull and the Hair; fo that the whole Country is at prefent in Arms against those terrible Enemies, of whom they have had the good Fortune to destroy great Numbers.

March 14. By Letters from Fort St. David's, brought in the Dragon, Capt. Kent, we are informed that the Nabob in the Interest of the English Company, who is faid to be a near Relation of the late Nabob of Golconda, had called upon the Company for Twenty thousand Rupees, towards paying his Troops, which with fome of our Forces lay encamped and intrenched under Fort St. David's, not being strong enough to meet the French, and the Army of their new Ally. We also hear that M. Dupleix, the French Governor General, had fent Notice to the Dutch in a little Settlement or Factory fituate within the Territories ceded to the French by the new King of Golconda, that they had no Right to remain there, and defired they would depart. In Consequence of which Summons many of the Dutch packed up their Effects, and embarked in a large Veffel, which unfortunately foundered at Sea, and all the People in her perished.

His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor, the Duke of Dorfet, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; Duke of Grafton, Lord Chamberlain; Duke of Marlborough, Lord High Steward; Earl Gower, Lord Privy Seal; the Duke of Newcastle, and the Earl of Holder nels, Secretaries of State; Marquis of Hartington, Master of the Horse; the Duke of Leeds; the Earl of Lincoln, Auditor of the Exchequer; Lord Anion, First Lord of the Admiralty; and the Hon. Henry Pelham, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and First Lord of the Treasury; the Lord Chief Justice Lee, and the Master of the Rolls.
