Editorially Speaking

There is a subject here on campus that is constantly under criticism and discussion by upperclassmen. It is that subject of education courses and their value in actual teaching. There seems to have been built up on the part of students a general attitude of negativism toward any course with the label education.

This is not entirely without foundation. Many times the student finds himself confronted with the same or similar material in all education courses. Many times the student feels that the course is theory-laden and barren of practical implications.

The story of experience is that the value of these courses is not to be realized until applied in the field of actual classroom teaching. But even then perhaps revision of the course oerings in education is necessary. At any rate an evaluation is needed.

This evaluation should not come only from the administration and college faculty, but also, and even primarily, from those who have had the opportunity to reap any possible benefits. This implies evaluation by the students doing practice teaching and by recent graduates now active in the teaching profession. This "looking at ourselves" could be a test of the students of the students. This important in the Margin ourselves" could be a test of the students. ing at ourselves" could be a test of the value of the present set-up and a guide-post for suggestions for any probable improvement.

It is realized that the program at STC is determined by the state. But the fact still remains that an evaluation of education courses as they now exist is needed. Through this a more complete student understanding of the education program should ensue.
