FSU will celebrate the achievements of its May 2010 graduating class during the University's 136th commencement ceremonies **Saturday, May 22**, in the Harold J. Cordts Physical Education Center's Main Arena on the FSU campus.

President Dr. Jonathan C. Gibraltar will confer degrees on graduates during two exercises. The College of Business and the College of Education ceremonies will start at 10 a.m. and the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences will present degrees at 2 p.m.

Lauren Garrity, College of Business; **Hannah Byler**, College of Education; and **David Valenta**, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, are the featured student speakers.

Garrity, of Lusby, Md., will graduate as an accounting major with a minor in business administration. She has accumulated a 4.0 grade point average and is a member of the Beta Gamma Sigma International Business Honor Society. As an intern of Accurate Bookkeeping Inc., she excelled in payroll preparation, financial transaction entry and reconciliation and physical inventory and stocking. Garrity has accepted a position with the Department of Defense Naval Acquisition Intern Program and plans to pursue an MBA degree.

Byler, of Grantsville, Md., will graduate as an elementary education major. As a recipient of the Perry Smith Jr. Scholarship and the

Foundation Awards for Faculty Achievement

The 2010 FSU Foundation Awards for Faculty Achievement will be presented at the Honors Convocation **Friday, May 21**, at 7:30 p.m., in the Pealer Recital Hall of the Performing Arts Center.

In addition to the FSU Foundation faculty awards, **Dr. Megan Bradley**, an associate professor of psychology, will be recognized as the recipient of a 2010 Regents' Faculty Award for Teaching (see separate story). These faculty members serve as models for the evening's stars: 34 graduating seniors receiving departmental honors, 12 master's degree candidates awarded graduate program honors and 24

undergraduate students recognized for graduating with honors in general education.



Dr. Robert Kauffman, the recipient of the Faculty Achievement Award for Academic Accomplishment, joined the Recreation and Parks Management faculty

in the College of Education in 1992. He has consistently distinguished himself with his many contributions to the field of recreation, especially in the areas of boating and safety. His publications include articles, book chapters, wall charts, educational videos and, most recently, a textbook titled "Career Development in

Recreation, Parks and Tourism: A Positioning Approach." Kauffman has been the recipient of many awards, including the 1999 Faculty Achievement Award for University and Community Service and the President's Award for Outstanding Service on the National Level from the American Canoeing Association. He is a two-time recipient of the Golden Quill Award from the American Camping Association for outstanding film and literary contributions to the field. In addition, he has received over 17 grants for a total of \$904,000, and, in the past five years, has given presentations at 17 national or international conferences. He is past president of the Faculty Senate and presently serves as chair of his department.



Dr. Mary Mumper, associate professor of chemistry, is the recipient of a Faculty Achievement Award for University and Community Service. During her 12 years

at FSU, one of her most notable activities has been her service as chair of the University Health Professions Advisory Committee. In this capacity, she advises pre-health students, works closely with students planning to apply to medical or dental schools and reviews scholarship applications. As a result, FSU biology and chemistry majors have a higher acceptance to professional schools than is true of any other school in the University System of Maryland. In her role as advisor to the Pre-Professional Medical Society, Mumper encourages students to serve, organizing blood drives and raising money for Relay for Life. In June 2009, FSU was awarded University of the Year by the Regional American Red Cross due to this work. Additionally, Mumper has been an FSU representative on the Council of

University System Faculty, served as chair of the chemistry department, was a member of the Academic Standards Subcommittee and the FSU Strategic Planning Steering Committee and is vice chair of the Faculty Senate. Finally, Mumper serves the community through her work with the Frostburg House and Garden Club to beautify the City of Frostburg.



Dr. James C. Saku, professor of geography since 1996, is a recipient of the Faculty Achievement Award in University and Community

Service. As advisor to Gamma Theta Upsilon, an international geography honor society, Saku encouraged students to participate in Earth Day/Focus Frostburg activities and organized a cleanup of the Piney Dam Reservoir. Saku also is a faculty mentor for the FSU Honors Undergraduate Research Opportunity Scholarship program and serves as a freshman ORIE instructor/advisor. His faculty governance service includes membership on the Faculty Concerns Committee, Graduate Council,

University Undergraduate Curriculum Review Subcommittee, University Council on Retention and the Affirmative Action and Equal Opportunity Advisory Group. In fall 2007, Saku was appointed coordinator of the African American studies minor. During his tenure, he initiated a revision of the curriculum and invited distinguished speakers to campus for presentations. Finally, Saku is active in the community, serving as financial secretary of the Knights of Columbus, Frostburg Council; a board member of the Frostburg Interfaith Food Pantry; and a soccer coach for the Frostburg Rangers American Youth Soccer Organization, Casselman Valley AYSO and Bishop Walsh Middle School JCP.

The Faculty Achievement Awards are sponsored by the alumni and friends of FSU through their generous contributions to the 2010 Annual Fund Campaign. Faculty members serving on the Faculty Development and Sabbatical Subcommittee of the Faculty Senate select the recipients. In addition to the respect of their colleagues, recipients receive a plaque and a cash award of \$1,000.

FSU, Anne Arundel Form Partnership

FSU's Engineering Bachelor's to Be Offered at Arundel Mills Higher Education Center

Students living in the Anne Arundel County area of Maryland will now be able to earn a bachelor's degree in engineering from FSU without having to leave home, thanks to a new partnership between FSU and Anne Arundel Community College.

FSU will offer its bachelor's degree in engineering, with a concentration in electrical engineering, in collaboration with AACC through its University Consortium at the AACC Regional Higher Education Center at Arundel Mills, one of six such centers in the state of Maryland. FSU's program will build on AACC's engineering preparation program, and offer engineering and upper-division courses through a combination of methods – on site at Arundel Mills, by interactive video and online.

The agreement was signed May 6 by President Jonathan Gibraltar and AACC President Martha Smith after the additional program location received approval from the University System of Maryland and the Maryland Higher Education Commission. The result is a pathway from an associate's degree to a bachelor's degree in engineering through the AACC University Consortium.

"The partnership with Anne Arundel Community College reflects an important opportunity for students to be able to complete their bachelor's degrees in engineering from Frostburg State University while having access to the incredibly strong industry base of high tech and engineering companies in that part of the state of Maryland," Gibraltar said. "It is a partnership that is good for both institutions, good for the students and good for the state of Maryland as we increase the number of science, technology, engineering and math graduates through this program."

The collaborative program will serve the state of Maryland's economic development and Anne Arundel County-area students. The Arundel Mills center's proximity to Fort Meade, as well as the influx of positions through the Base Closure and Realignment Commission, is leading to expanded opportunities in disciplines related to science, technology, engineering and mathematics, called STEM disciplines. Many of the positions moving to Maryland as the result of BRAC require high levels of skill in these disciplines.

"This proposal is a fine example of responding to the goals of the University System of Maryland to increase the number of graduates in the STEM areas and to increase access

and affordability," said USM Chancellor William E. Kirwan in his letter to Gibraltar approving the partnership.

FSU Establishes Minor in Sustainability

Minor Will Be Implemented in Fall 2010

As part of its ongoing efforts to respond to workforce needs and uphold its commitment to environmental education, FSU will offer a minor in sustainability studies to degree-seeking students. The interdisciplinary minor, which will be implemented this fall, will be housed in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences with a steering committee from participating departments. It is designed to encourage students to explore environmental, economic and social equity issues relating to sustainability in modern societies. It will focus on helping students find real-world answers and solutions, with an emphasis on interaction among individuals, government agencies and businesses that are impacted by or depend on sustainability trends.

"I'm very pleased FSU has established a minor in sustainability," said President Jonathan Gibraltar. "The University already offers a variety of great courses and majors that focus on environmental education. This new minor complements the strengths of those areas and also ensures that our students will have the knowledge they need to be ready to take advantage of 'green collar' jobs. This academic focus on sustainability is also very much in line with FSU's overall commitment to becoming a more sustainable campus with academic programs that respond to the world's problems."

The sustainability studies minor will largely use existing courses from many departments and incorporate two new courses that will be created for the minor: SUST 155, an introductory-level course that will introduce students to sustainability; and SUST 455, a capstone experience for students in the minor. The minor core courses will help students develop skills such as acquisition and summarization of information, critical evaluation, working collaboratively and written and oral communication.

“This offers a truly interdisciplinary minor that will appeal to students in all the disciplines,” said Dr. Sydney Duncan, assistant professor of English and member of the advisory group that leads the “Learning Green, Living Green” sustainability committee who advocated for the new minor. “The focus courses allow students to select classes that best fit their interests, and the variety of choices of electives from each of the required three areas will instruct students in various aspects of sustainability that the students may not have encountered before.”

Gingerich Named Safety Coordinator



FSU has hired **Lawrence Gingerich** to help lead its efforts to become a safer and more sustainable campus. His responsibilities will include chairing

FSU’s sustainability initiative, “Learning Green, Living Green, (LGLG)” and taking charge of FSU’s Institutional Occupational Safety, Health and Environmental effort.

Gingerich brings over 25 years of experience to the position, including recently serving as an interim director of environmental health and safety for Ohio University. While at Ohio, Gingerich was involved in the development of a composting system and aided in securing the required Ohio EPA permits for its installation. He has also worked as an industrial hygienist for Battelle Columbus Operations Laboratory Decommissioning Project and a corporate industrial hygienist for American Electric Power. Additionally, Gingerich built and ran his own environmental safety and health consulting firm. His areas of concentration include industrial hygiene, occupational safety and environmental work.

“I hope to, with the aid and cooperation of the LGLG committees, move forward on the initiatives that have been outlined in FSU’s Climate Action Plan and to bring forth some new ideas as well,” Gingerich said,

noting his personal interest in the environment has included building his own solar collectors for his home and enjoying the outdoors.

Gingerich has a bachelor’s degree in botany from Ohio University and a master’s degree in biology from West Virginia University. He is also a certified industrial hygienist, a certified safety professional and a certified lead assessor.

Preventing Sexual Harassment Refresher

Points of Pride FSU Makes Princeton Review Green Guide

FSU has been recognized in a new publication designed to “recognize the impressive environmental and

sustainability programs at universities and colleges across the country.” The Princeton Review, with the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC), has published “The Princeton Review’s Guide to 286 Green Colleges,” the first free, comprehensive guidebook focused on institutions of higher education that have demonstrated an above-average commitment to sustainability in terms of campus infrastructure, activities and initiatives.

Released on Earth Day (April 22), the guide, based on a survey of hundreds of colleges nationwide, profiles the nation’s most environmentally responsible campuses. The guide looks at an institution’s commitment to building certification using USGBC’s LEED green building certification program, environmental literacy programs, formal sustainability committees, use of renewable energy resources, recycling and conservation programs, and much more.

Noted among FSU’s achievements were its Learning Green, Living Green Sustainability Initiative. Also highlighted were its charter membership in the American College and University Presidents’ Climate Commitment (ACUPCC), its Energy Star purchasing policy and the installation of high-efficiency lighting and low-flow showerheads that is saving electricity and water and close to \$40,000 in utility costs as of the time of the Princeton Review survey. Attesting to the wide range of factors examined, other accomplishments listed included E=(LG)², the student-written, student-edited publication on sustainability, the only one of its kind; the Sustainable Energy Research Facility, an off-grid building in the planning stages; participation in the national RecycleMania competition; and the various environmental studies programs available.

“For the past few years, Frostburg State University has been evolving as a campus with a true commitment to sustainability,” said President Jonathan Gibraltar. “The Learning Green, Living Green committee has truly embraced this, and we are seeing sustainability integrated throughout the fabric of the University. As we implement our climate action plan and construct new buildings, we will see even greater results as we seek to reduce our carbon emissions to zero. I am so pleased that we have been recognized by Princeton Review for our efforts.”

“Our research has shown that students and their parents are becoming more and more interested in learning about and attending universities and colleges that practice, teach and support environmental responsibility,” said Robert Franek, senior vice president and publisher, The Princeton Review. “In fact, 64 percent of the nearly 12,000 college applicants and parents who participated in our recent College Hopes and Worries Survey said having

information about a school’s commitment to the environment would impact their decision to apply to or attend it.”

The Princeton Review noted that another unique aspect of this guide is that it provides important information on schools that have dedicated environmental studies curriculums. “By many accounts, there are going to be a lot of job opportunities related to the environment and sustainability,” Franek said.

Bradley Honored With Award for Teaching

The USM Regents’ Faculty Award is the highest honor that the board bestows to recognize exemplary faculty achievement. Bradley’s honor marks the third time in the past four years that an FSU faculty member has been honored by the regents.

“Dr. Bradley is an exceptional teacher and scholar whose efforts reflect her deep commitment to her students,” said President Jonathan Gibraltar. “She has developed as a campus, state and national leader in pedagogical innovation.”

Bradley’s nomination touted her innovative efforts to improve student learning, in particular her leadership at FSU in the Regent’s Course Redesign Initiative, intended to increase efficiency and excellence in instruction. FSU’s General Psychology course was redesigned as part of the initiative, with results showing improved student learning and reduced cost to the University. That course is listed as an “exemplar” project by the National Center for Academic Transformation. Bradley has also shared her experience and expertise in course redesign in workshops for faculty in the University System of Maryland, as well as for NCAT, and she serves as an NCAT Redesign Scholar, assisting faculty across the country who are working on course redesign.

She was also praised for her innovative approaches to student mentoring, research and service learning. She is one of the two certified FSU peer reviewers for Quality Matters, an organization that seeks to ensure that faculty teaching online and hybrid courses are following national standards of “best practices.”

Bradley has also integrated service learning into her courses to enhance student comprehension. She has developed a model of “Community-Based Authentic Learning” that strengthens the relationship of the University and the community.

Relay for Life Raises Over \$43,000

With 68 teams, 883 registered participants and more than 1,000 people in attendance, FSU’s Relay for Life event has raised \$43,680 as of May 5. The two-day event was held April 23 and 24. Monies raised will support the American Cancer Society with cancer research and possibly finding a cure.

FSU’s Relay takes a whole year to plan. With many hours dedicated by students, faculty and staff and community members, Relay is one of the biggest events held during the school year. The event begins with a lap from members of the FSU community who are cancer survivors. Following the first lap by the survivors, the volunteers from the more than 60 participating teams begin the marathon walk with at least one member from each team on the track for the length of the relay. Luminaries that honor survivors and those lost to cancer circled the entire stadium track, with more on the bleachers spelling out “HOPE.”

Staking Our Claim FSU Students Benefit from ‘Love Affair’



Mel Malchenson of Hagerstown, who established a scholarship to FSU for Tri-State area education students, claims she’s had a 30-year love affair with FSU, but the romance nearly ended before it started.

The first day she arrived in 1979, she almost turned around and went

home, she said. Her father, who had just moved her and her belongings into Gray Hall on campus, encouraged her to stay for just a week. He knew she would get over the fear that often gripped her in new situations.

“The mountain worked its magic on me,” she said; she never looked back.

Now, 30 years later, Malchenson has two master’s degrees from Frostburg, in 1981 and 1993, has been a member of the Alumni Association Board of Directors for the past two decades, chairs the Old Main Society and, with her family, has established the Ethel Hollinger Malchenson Scholarship Fund in memory of her mother.

Malchenson, who has movement and mobility problems caused by cerebral palsy, credits her parents with raising her as a person with a disability, not a disabled person. They expected as much out of her as they did her brothers and sisters, right down to the chores they all did around the house.

It was her experience living with her disability that encouraged her career choice as a special education teacher.

In addition to her desire to work with children, “I wanted also to prove that somebody with a disability could ... make a contribution to society,” she said. She thought she could serve as a role model.

She began her career teaching special education first in Grant and Wood counties in West Virginia, then in Frederick County, Md., for 17 years, then moved into guidance counseling for the next 10. She retired in 2003.

Her Frostburg love affair began with her second master’s degree and continued through her third. She moved in full-time over the summers, then took courses during the school year, traveling to Frostburg from Frederick once a week after school, getting home at midnight. All the while, the mountain – and the people there – continued to work magic.

“I feel a closeness to the entity of the University, the quality of the University, the personhood of the University. When I picture the University, I picture a collage of people who very much worked together to make me who I am,” she said with a catch in her voice.

As the years have passed and she has increased her volunteerism and philanthropy, her devotion has grown.

The scholarship, created in memory of her mother soon after her mother’s death, supports education students from Washington County, where she grew up, and Frederick County, where she had her career, and neighboring counties in Pennsylvania. Since it was established in 1992, more than \$31,000 has been contributed to the fund. Malchenson has made a \$15,000 pledge to FSU’s current campaign, Staking Our Claim: The Campaign for Frostburg, to benefit the fund.

Her parents grew to share her devotion to the University with which they had no other connection. Her father passed away earlier this year.

“My parents very much embraced my love for Frostburg,” she said.

She sets goals to reach certain giving levels each year, and her latest effort has been to help the FSU Foundation encourage people to remember FSU in their estate plans, the role of the Old Main Society. She has written FSU into her will.

FSU Ranks First in Recycling Efforts

Thanks to progress made in recycling, FSU ranked first among USM institutions in numerous [Recyclemania](http://www.recyclemaniacs.org) 2010 categories. Additionally, FSU broke into a top-10 list for the first time by ranking seventh overall out of 223 institutions in the paper recycling contest.

Recyclemania is a friendly, 10-week competition among colleges and universities to see who can reduce and recycle the most on-campus waste. The competition begins every spring in late January and runs for 10 weeks. During this time, colleges submit weekly weights for recycled goods and municipal waste to be included in overall rankings.

The Per-Capita Classic contest of Recyclemania determines which school can collect the largest amount of recyclables per person. Within this category, FSU ranked 29th out of 346 institutions. The Grand Champion contest determines a winner based on an institution’s ability to demonstrate waste reduction and recycling. Within this category, FSU ranked 31st out of 267 institutions. 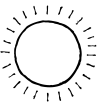
