NEW-YORK, September 22.

Proceedings of the Army under General AMHERST, from the Time they embarked at Oswego (on the 10th of August) to the happy Reduction of MONTREAL, the 8th of September following, viz.

THAT, arriving the first Night after they set off, at the River Sable, they continued there till Noon the next Day, when they pushed forward and got to the River l'Assomption; thence they proceeded to Bay Niora, from thence to Isle Cauchon, Isle Cheverill, and on the 16th landed on Point Auberie. At 11 this Night (the French Brig lying about 15 Miles off) Colonel Williamson, and the five Row Gallies, together with the Grenadiers and Light Infantry, were dispatched to take her, which they did at Eight in the Morning of the 17th, after a smart Fire: In this Affair we lost a Serjeant of Artillery, and two private Men; the French had 3 killed, and 12 wounded; and we took 100 Prisoners. The Brig mounted Twelve 14 Pounders. Embarking from this Point, we arrived at Oswegatchie, and encamped on a Hill to the Eastward of the Fort, where we remained till the 18th, when we rowed down towards Isle Royale. Here our new-acquired Brig anchored within Cannon Shot of the Enemy's Battery, when a Cannonading began; and while they were thus employed, our Light Infantry and Grenadiers got below the Fort. At Noon, a Party was ordered to cut a Road to the Point on the Eastern Shore, which is about 700 Yards from the Fort. At Five o'Clock this Day, Commodore Loring, and our two other Vessels, went down to assist the Prize, where they amused the Enemy, while our Works were going on, on the Western Side; 20th of August, at Day-break, a Captain and 2 Subalterns from each Regiment, and 160 Men, went to make Fascines. At Noon, Colonel Murray, 6 Captains, 6 Subalterns, and 300 Privates, went to take Post at the East Side of the River, below the Fort; and the Fascines being got ready, a Battery was erected. The Enemy continuing their Cannonade, our Ships hauled off from their Battery, it blowing hard, and very rainy. At 12 on Friday the 22d, we marched below the Fort, and our Rear joined us in their Boats between Twelve and One in the Morning of Saturday.

The 23d, at Day-break, our Batteries began to fire. At Ten our Vessels were ordered down: Capt. Phips, in the Mohawk, led, and ran close along Side the Fort, where he brought to, with a Spring on his Cable, and kept up an incessant Fire of Great Guns, and Small Arms, which silenced the Enemy much; but their Shot at length cut the Cable of the Mohawk, who drove down with the Stream, and being much damaged, and in Want of her Anchor, was forced to run a-ground. Our Men in this Affair behaved extremely well. Commodore Loring, in the Onondago, and Captain Sinclair, in the Williamfon (the French Brig that was) bore down between 10 and 11, but too late to assist the Mohawk; however, they ran close to the Fort, poured in their Broadfides, and Small Arms from the Tops; our Batteries going at the same Time, and the Enemy not idle with their Artillery and Musquetry, made very pretty Music. At Three o'Clock, Captain Sinclair's Brig being disabled, was obliged to fall below the Fort, and the Commodore getting a-ground close to it, was sunk by the Enemy, whose Fire raked him, and dismounted his Guns. In this Condition he was obliged to surrender, being wounded withal, and the French attempted several Times to go on board to hoist a White Flag, and carry our People on Shore; but they were as often disappointed, for our Battery Guns drove their Boats into the Air, while their Crews went to the Bottom. At Six o'Clock, Lieut. Penning, with a Party of Grenadiers, in two Whale-Boats, set off from the Grand Battery, and proceeding through a Fire of Grape Shot and Small Arms, as thick as Hail, got safe on board the Onondago, and hoisted the English Colours, but, to his Misfortune, found her full of Water. In this Exploit he lost six Grenadiers, and had several wounded. Our Ships being entirely disabled, our Mortars and Haubitzers played all the Night following, every Shell falling within the Island, which though small, was extremely well fortified all round, to the Water's Edge, and commanded by M. Paulheau. We have had Abundance of Rain lately.

Sunday, August 24. All our Mortars continued playing very smart: No Likelihood of recovering the Commodore's Ship. The Mohawk was molt horribly torn.

August 25. All Night our Mortars played. Another new Battery, which was begun Yesterday, will be ready to open To-night; and our two Vessels are getting ready with all Expedition, to go up and cover the Boats intended for a general Storm To-morrow. The Enemy kept a brisk Fire Yesterday, and this Morning. About 4 P. M. the French beat a Parley, and at Seven our Grenadiers took Possession. The Enemy had about 80 killed and wounded; and we had near 50 killed and wounded. The 26th and 27th, employed in destroying our Batteries, and repairing the Damages of the Fort.

28th. Still employed in repairing the Fort, and endeavouring to weigh the Onondago, and moved our Camp to Abbey Picquets Island.

29th. Employed as before.

30th. This Day arrived a Party of French Indians, who report General Murray's being near Montreal, with a large Fleet of Frigates.

31st. Set off from Abbey Picquets Island, and proceeded down the River for Montreal. The Stream this Day was pretty strong. We landed at Eve, and waited till September 1st, when we put off again, and passed the Rapids, or Long Falls, and encamped 3 Leagues from Lake St. Francis.

Tuesday, September 2. Received Orders, in case of an Attack, to land, and charge any Enemy that presented themselves to us, and the Party to landing, to make an obstinate Resistance, as they might depend on being supported.

September 3d. Being bad Weather, lay by all Day.

September 4th. Set off, and crossed Lake St. Francis, and about 11 o'Clock arrived at the Town of Gaspey. Here we passed large Falls, and lost an Officer and 85 Men, at Bloody Point, and a great Number of Boats. About 2 o'Clock we passed the Cedar Town, and at 11 at Night landed on L'Isle Perrot, close to Montreal Isle. The Country very thick settled. This Island has 500 Families on it.

September 5. Lay by all Day to repair our Damages. Great Numbers of the Inhabitants took the Oaths of Allegiance, and are put in peaceable Possession of their Farms. No Soldier to plunder on Pain of Death. The Indians Yesterday took near 400 Prisoners off the Island of Montreal; and the Indian Sachem, who commanded the Party, told them, that tho' they were in their Power, they had Orders from the English General not to kill any of them, but carry them to their Farms, adding that the French used to bid them kill all. On this Occasion the Indians killed but one Man, who attempted to run away.

About 5 o'Clock this Day (September 5) Lieutenant Elliott arrived from Col. Haviland, with an Account of L'Isle Sorelle being taken; and at 7 o'Clock Lieutenant Crofton arrived from General Murray, when Orders were given out to embark at Day-break. 6th of September the General beat at Day, and the General himself embarked Half an Hour after, the Army rowing by the right four Columns. At 11 o'Clock we landed on the Island of Montreal (nine Miles from Town) fixed

our Bayonets, and formed: We marched directly for the Town, along a most delightful Road, very thick inhabited. About 4 o'Clock we arrived before the Walls of the Town, where we formed in Battle Array, expecting General Levy, with his Army, to come out. Some Skirmishes happened between the Enemy's Troop of Horse, and our Light Infantry. We lay on our Arms all Night, getting our Cannon up.

September 7. Were posted in proper Columns. This Day we learned that Monsieur Levy's Regulars were on an Island the other Side of the Town, to prevent Mr. Murray's landing. About eight o'Clock a Flag of Truce came from the City, demanding a Suspension of Arms till they should hear from France; but the Answer they got was, *They should have till 12 o'Clock to consider*; and accordingly they began to capitulate. We lay upon our Arms all Night.

September 8th. General Murray's Army landed, and the General, and several of his Officers, came to our Camp. About the same Time arrived at our Camp, Major Christie, from Col. Haviland's Army. The Capitulation being finished the Grenadiers and Light Infantry marched into the Town, commanded by Col. Haldiman, in the following Order of Procession, viz.

I. A Twelve-pounder with a Flag; and a Detachment of Royal Artillery.

II. The Grenadiers of the Line, commanded by Col. Massie.

III. The Light Infantry of the Line, commanded by Col. Amherst, each with a Band of Music before them. And the eldest Ensign in General Amherst's Army to take Possession of the Colours of the eight French Regiments.

September 9th, 1760. Camp before Montreal. The Colours of Shirley's and Pepperell's Regiments, lost at Oswego (in 1756) was marched out of Montreal by a Detachment of Grenadiers, and a Band of Music; and carried down the Right of our Line, to Head Quarters, where they were lodged.

General Orders; Camp before Montreal, September 9, 1760.

Parole,—King GEORGE, and—CANADA.

THE General, with infinite Pleasure, the Success that has crowned the indefatigable Efforts of his Majesty's Troops, and faithful Subjects in America. The Marquis de Vaudreuil has capitulated; the Troops of France, in Canada, have laid down their Arms, and are not to serve during the War; the whole Country submits to the Dominion of GREAT BRITAIN. The three Armies are intitled to the General's Thanks, on this Occasion; and he assures them, that he will take the first Opportunity of acquainting his Majesty with the Zeal and Bravery, which has always been exerted by the Officers and Soldiers of the Regulars, and Provincial Troops, and also by his faithful Indian Allies.

The General is confident, when the Troops are informed that this Country is the King's, they will not disgrace themselves by the least Appearance of Inhumanity, or by unsoldier-like Behaviour, in taking any Plunder, more especially as the Canadians become now British Subjects, and will feel the good Effects of HIS MAJESTY'S PROTECTION.

Saturday last Major M'Clellan arrived here from Montreal, which Place he left the 13th Instant, in full Possession of General AMHERST, and the Army under his Command.

Besides the Contents of the above Journal, we are told, that as soon as the Army commanded by General Amherst landed on the Island of Montreal, most of the Peasants laid down their Arms, and left Monsieur Vaudreuil and Levy to obtain the best Terms they could for them; that our Indians, under the Command of Sir William Johnson, behaved so well, that they were looked upon to be

L O N D O N.

A Letter from the Chief Mate of the Francis, of 18 Carriage Guns, six Pounders, Capt. Onslow, from Liverpool to Africa, dated Island of Teneriffe, April 17, 1760.

I NEED not doubt your being surprized at this unwelcome News of the Ship Francis being wrecked, on the 21st of March, on the Island of Fortaventura, one of the Canary Islands, and 23 of our People lost.

That Day we had a good Observation, in the Latitude of 29 Degrees and 28 Minutes N. and Longitude of 20 Degrees and 40 Min. W. from the Meridian of London, by my Account; but, although I reckoned to be to the Westward, I was curious enough to get my Draught of the Coast, and at that Time the Captain came, and asked me, if I had the American Pilot, my Answer was, no; he then called me into the Cabin, and shewed me his Draught; at the same Time he gave me a strict charge to have a good Look-out kept that Night; I then went on Deck: The Captain called down Mr. Hull (second Mate) and also shewed him the Draught, and bid him to have a good Look-out kept that Night, for tho' we reckoned to be to the Westward of the Islands, yet we might be deceived: Mr. Hull answered, There shall; then went on Deck. The Captain, at or about Five o'Clock, ordered the Spritsail to be handed, which was done; then we had a pleasant Breeze at N. E. the Ship going eight Knots, and having been going 7 and a 1/2 and 8 Knots for two or three Days before. At Eight o'Clock I went to Bed, Mr. Hull having the Watch on Deck; and about Eleven in the Night was awaked by Mr. Hull, calling to the Captain, Here is the Land on our Larboard Bow; on that I got out of Bed as fast as I could; but before I could get out, the Ship struck; then the Captain was close at my Back, and we both run on Deck together—but alas too late! for at that Time the Ship was close in the Breakers, and not a Pistol-shot from the dry Rocks; and was laid down almost on her Beam-ends; then Orders were given to cut away the Masts, which was done in four or five Minutes, and the Lee Guns were hoisted over-board as many as we could come at; but she lying so low, most of them were under Water, so that we could not come at them. In that Condition she lay, and all Hands got on her Broadside; but the Breakers made so common a Road over us, that it was with the greatest Difficulty that we held ourselves. About Three o'Clock she broke in two or three, and only the Larboard Quarter and Quarter Deck were left together, and that was breaking up by little and little, so that there was but a few Boards of the Quarter Deck left, when the Deck parted from the Quarter. At that Time I believe there were about fifty People on the Deck when it parted and drove in towards the Shore. I was soon after washed over-board, and was over for some Time struggling for Life, but how long I cannot tell: I got on the few Boards of the Deck that were left together, and all the People I could then see, stood holding themselves by the Wheel, and did not appear to exceed 25 in Number; I joined them; and in a short Time the Breakers drove us ashore, where most of us that were left got on the Land, but with great Difficulty; it was then about Four o'Clock.

At Day-light, when we gathered together, we found our 58 Men reduced to 35, and amongst those that suffered were my two poor Brothers, which gave me greater Concern than all that had happened; and to make our Misfortune more complete, we found that we were on a desolate Part of the Island, and only three Men that were Shepherds near us, one of whom went with the Captain and Doctor as a Guide to the Governor's

House, which was 60 or 70 Miles off over the Mountains, and nothing but hard Rocks; they carried their Provisions on their Backs, which was Bread that had drove ashore from the Wreck, all soft with salt Water, raw salt Beef, and salt Water to drink, and in the Night lay on the hard Rocks, with nothing to cover them but a Shirt and a Waistcoat on their Backs. They arrived the second Day in the Evening: The Captain received a Contusion in his Leg amongst the Rocks, and as soon as he got to the Governor's he was seized with a Fever, which rendered him insensible of Pain for two or three Days. A Schooner was hired to carry us to this Island (Teneriffe) where we arrived the 4th Instant. The Goods that were saved are but a small Quantity, and given into the English Consul's Hands, to dispose of for the Benefit of the Under-writers.

This Misfortune happened for Want of a Look-out; the People all tell us, that Mr. Hull (one of the Persons lost) was asleep on the Deck when the Helmsman called out Land a Head; he then went forward, and afterwards came aft, and called the Captain (as I mentioned before) but then the Ship was with her Stem on the Rocks.

NATHAN DICKINSON.
July 5. We hear that Orders are given for 16 Transports to be got ready as soon as possible at Sheerness, which are to sail for Gibraltar, with Provisions and Stores for the Use of that Garrison; and that several Men of War will be sent with them, and Recruits to complete the Regiments there.

Orders have been sent to Chatham, to expedite the building of two 80 Gun Ships, in the Dock-yard there; pursuant to which an additional Number of Hands are employed, and the Keel of a new 70 Gun Ship has been laid, which is also to be built with all Expedition.

A French Privateer is taken by the Esther Cutter Tender, and sent into the Downs.

The Manderony, a French Privateer, is taken off the Texel, by the Hind Man of War, Captain Bond.

July 8. There are many curious Furs brought Home as Presents from Canada, particularly a sable Muff and Tippet, which cost, in that Country, 50 Guineas; and a Carpet of exquisite Workmanship, and of Variety of Colours, composed of dyed Grass, manufactured by the Nuns at Quebec; which Carpet is to be presented to his Majesty.

July 12. The Active Man of War, which arrived at Plymouth last Saturday, took, in her last Cruise, the Menette Privateer of Bourdeaux, of 4 Guns, 8 Swivels, and 64 Men, but the foundered soon after she was taken, and 3 Englishmen were drowned. She also took the Prince Noir, of Reden, with Provisions for Cayenne.

His Majesty's Ships Shannon, Favourite, Kennington, Squirrel, and Active, were all cruising on the Coast of Provence, Genoa, &c. as we learn by Letters of the 23d of June. The Active Man of War took a French Privateer of 14 Guns, and sent her to Barcelona.

St. JOHN'S (in ANTIGUA) August 16.
We hear from Guadaloupe, that Col. Crauford, of the Royal Welsh Volunteers, is appointed Governor of that Island; and that his Regiment, consisting of 1400 Men, may be expected there shortly.

Yesterday an English Flag of Truce returned hither from Martinico, and by her we learn, that the Captures made by the Enemy, have not, for some Time past, been so numerous as heretofore. The French gave out, that two Ships of the Line, and four Frigates, were arrived from France; but a Dutchman, who had been at Fort-Royal, declared, there were only two Frigates, and two Store Ships there. The Store Ships brought out some dismounted Dragoons.

BASSETERRE (in St. Christophers) August 9.
The Boscawen, Captain Simms, brought into

the Road of Basseterre, on Wednesday last, the Hirondelle, a French Sloop, laden with Sugar, &c.

Yesterday arrived in the Road of Basseterre in this Island, two Schooners bound to Martinico from St. Eustatius, loaded with Provisions and dry Goods, and taken by his Majesty's Ship Temple, Lucius O'Brien, Esq; Commander.

Aug. 13. On Saturday last, about Two o'Clock in the Morning, a severe Shock of an Earthquake was felt in this Island.

Upon the 9th Instant arrived in the Road of Basseterre in this Island, a Sloop bound to Martinico from St. Eustatius, with Provisions and dry Goods, taken by his Majesty's Ship Arundel, James Innes, Esq; Commander; and upon the 10th, a French armed Schooner, loaded with Sugar and Coffee, bound to Coracoa from Martinico, and taken by his Majesty's Ship Temple, Lucius O'Brien, Esq; Commander, and his Majesty's Ship Griffin, Thomas Taylor, Esq; Commander.

August 20. The Privateer Boscawen, Captain Simms, brought, on Sunday last, into the Road of Basseterre, two Prize Pettiaugers.

And Yesterday was brought into the same Road, a Schooner called the Little Hannah, bound from Martinico for St. Eustatius, laden with Rum, Coffee and Sugar. She was taken by the Pitt, Captain Williams, and the Young Boscawen, Captain Lightfoot.

August 23. Upon the 21st Instant, arrived in the Road of Basseterre in this Island, a Sloop with Coffee, Flour, and other Goods, taken out of the Grenades by his Majesty's Ships Temple, Lucius O'Brien, Esq; Commander, and Griffin, Thomas Taylor, Esq; Commander. Those Ships have lately battered down some Forts at the Grenades, and taken out eight Vessels; but we are not yet well informed of the Circumstances.

August 27. Two Prize Schooners and a Sloop have been brought since our last into the Road of Basseterre. They are Part of the Vessels cut out of the Grenades, by his Majesty's Ships Temple and Griffin.

September 6. The Privateer Sloop Pitt, Capt. Williams, has brought into the Road of Basseterre, a Schooner and a Sloop, bound from St. Eustatius for Martinico.

Yesterday arrived in the Road of Basseterre in this Island, his Majesty's Ship Griffin, Thomas Taylor, Esq; Commander, and brought in two Schooners, laden with Sugar, Coffee, and Provisions, which were cut out of the Grenades, by the said Ship, and his Majesty's Ship Temple, Lucius O'Brien, Esq; Commander.

B O S T O N, September 22.
Captain Lord, in a Sloop bound to this Place from St. Martin's, was taken on the 27th of August last, about 60 Leagues East of Bermuda, by a French Privateer Schooner, Monsieur Nicolai, Commander, and having ransomed his Vessel, got into Martha's Vineyard, from whence he came by Land last Wednesday Morning.

We have Advice, that Capt. Fleet, in the Brig Duke, bound from hence to Jamaica, was taken the 18th of June, on his Passage thither, by two French Men of War from Martinico, bound to Brest, and after taking the People on board one of their Ships, immediately burnt his Vessel. Three Days after they took Capt. Movalt, in a Ship from Philadelphia for Jamaica, who ransomed his Vessel, and proceeded on his Voyage, after taking two of Capt. Fleet's Hands on board, who are arrived in said Vessel at Jamaica, from whom we have the above Intelligence.

Tuesday Evening arrived here, Capt. Bourn, in but 17 Days from Quebec, and Yesterday Captain Small, in 18 Days from thence.

Captain Bourn spoke with Captain Tinkham, in a Ship bound up to Quebec, eight Days ago, who had been from London 6 Weeks: Nothing but War was talked of there.

PORTSMOUTH (in New-Hampshire) Sept. 12.
Extract of a Letter from Captain Bumbury (who sailed from this Port last June) dated at St. Croix, August 2, 1760.

"I take this Opportunity (by the Way of New London) to acquaint you of my Misfortune, being taken in the Snow General Townshend, the 10th of July, by a French Frigate, bound to Bourdeaux, in the Latitude 31 : 23 N. and Longitude of 57 Degrees West: They took out several small Stores, and threw off all the Hoops and Shingles from Deck, took out 40 Quintals of Fish, and shot one Horse; and about four Hours after took all my Hands on board the Snow, and sent a Prize Master and five Frenchmen on board us, with Orders to proceed to Martinico. In two Days after we parted from the Frigate, the Prize Master bore away for St. Croix, and told me his Reason for so doing, was, that he was afraid of our Frigates that were cruising off Martinico. On the 22d of the same Month we made the Land, about Seven o'Clock in the Evening, which the Prize Master took to be the Island of Anigada; at Twelve o'Clock it bore W. by N. two Leagues: I then told the Prize Master, unless he made more Sail, we should not get into St. Croix next Day, on which he immediately ordered two of his Men up forward, and two abaft, to let a Reef out of the Topails. I at that Time gave Mr. Meserve a Hint of my Design, and desired him to assist them, and take the Helm, while the Prize Master and the other Frenchmen went forward to hoist the Fore-top-sail: I took this Opportunity to go aft, where, with a Spike Nail, I made three Attempts before I broke open the Prize Master's Chest, which lay on the Larboard Side of the Quarter Deck; out of which I took all the Aims, which were only one Pair of small Pocket Pistols, that had no Bullets for them, and one Pair of large Pistols, one of which was loaded; I directly loaded the other, and new primed them both; I then went down into the Cabbin, and after taking twelve Cartridges out of the Box, hove the rest overboard, and went up on the Quarter Deck, close to the Barricado, where I found the Prize Master and three of his Men coming aft to hoist the Main-top-sail; I told them not to advance, or make any Resistance, if they did I would immediately blow their Brains out; telling them in the Main-top, not to come down for I would do the same to them, upon which, advancing upon them, they retreated off the Lumber, before the Windlafs: I then ordered Mr. Meserve to steer in for the Land, which appeared to be the Virgin Guard, though I told the Frenchmen it was Antigua, and that if they behaved well they should not go to Goal: I ordered them to haul up the Fore-sail, and hoist the Boat out, and directed the Prize Master, his Mate, and another Frenchman, to go into the Boat; and made the others go aft, and take their Officer's Chest, and their own Things, into the Boat; then called those down out of the Main-top, and ordered them in the Boat, which I soon cast off, bidding them to follow me: We then wore the Snow, and made all the Sail we possibly could for St. Croix, where we arrived safe in the Afternoon of the 23d of July."

NEW-YORK, September 25.

Camp before Montreal, Sept. 9, 1760.

"I have the Pleasure to tell you that all Canada is subjected to the King of Great-Britain. Yesterday the Capitulation was signed, and our Troops took Possession of the Town; there are many Articles, which as I have not seen, I cannot tell you, the material ones are, the Inhabitants to enjoy their Property and Religion, on taking the Oath of Fidelity to his Majesty, and becoming good Subjects, which they in general seem very free to do. The Right of nominating a Bishop to be in the King of England, though strongly insisted on to be the Right of the French King. The Regular Troops (of which there are 8 Battalions) to be Prisoners of War, and to bind themselves not to serve against his Majesty, nor his Allies, during the War. This severe Article, and what they look upon as an Indignity, they strove hard to ward off, but could not; and were obliged to comply, though the Officers say to their Ruin; and were told by the General, that the barbarous and inhuman Manner in which they had prosecuted the War, was the Reason such Terms, which military Men call hard, were imposed on them. We have not had a Gun fired at us since entering the Country. The Militia in general refused to fight, and the General forbid any Depredations on them, so that little Harm has been done them by the Army, not even by the Savages, not more than would have been done by such an Army in our own Country: I entirely like such a Regu-

lation, though I think it much better Treatment than they deserve, or had Reason to expect. Such a glorious Conquest with so little Loss is almost unparalleled; I think our military Toils in America are now finished, for a Time at least. I have not been in Town yet, there being an Order, that no Person go in till the Affairs of the Stores, Magazines, &c. are settled. I cannot yet give you an Account of the Town, of the Ladies, the Nuns, &c. all which I defer till I may have the Pleasure of seeing you. This happy Event that puts the finishing Stroke to our Conquests in America, happened on the same Day of the Month and Week as that which was the first important favourable Action of the War in America, viz. that with Mr. Diekau, at Lake-George, and makes it a memorable Day."

Sept. 29. Since our last arrived here from Albany, the Prisoners that were taken at Fort-Levi, on Isle-Royale, in the River St. Lawrence, with their Commander, Monf. Pouchet.

We hear that General Amherst set out for Quebec, a few Days after the Surrender of Montreal, in order to view that Place.

From Albany we learn, that after the City of Montreal had surrendered, upwards of 300 Ladies of Distinction, implored the Protection of General Amherst, who was pleased to order proper Care to be taken of them, and gave them all their Jewels, Rings, &c.

PHILADELPHIA, October 2.

By Captain Cobourn, from St. Christophers, there is Advice, that on the 30th of August they had a violent Gale of Wind there, in which some Vessels were drove ashore: And that at Montserrat a Ship belonging to London, with 400 Hogheads of Sugar on board, and a Bermudian Sloop, were also drove ashore; the first said to be intirely lost.

From Montreal we learn, that Monsieur Vaudreuil, late Governor, and Commander in Chief of Canada, with all the regular Troops, the Merchants and Citizens of Montreal, and all Persons belonging to Old France, were to be sent home immediately: And that the Peasants, born in Canada, and having Possession of Lands, are to remain, on their taking the Oaths of Fidelity, but not to trade with the Indians on Pain of Death.

ANNAPOLIS, October 9.

By the last Post from the Northward, we had Advice of the Death of Mr. EDWARD DORSEY, an eminent Attorney, of this City, one of our Common Council, and a Representative for Frederick County. This Gentleman went from home in May last, for the Recovery of his Health, had been as far as Boston, and on his Return, Died at New-Port on Rhode-Island, the 20th of last Month.

Tuesday last a Writ was issued, directed to the Sheriff of Frederick County, to elect a Representative for that County, in the room of Mr. Edward Dorsey, deceased.

LONDON, July 22.

TO the Accounts already published of the Dutch Treachery and intended Cigety in the River of Bengal in the East-Indies, we add, from good Authority, that they intended to have put their Scheme in Execution when all the European Vessels had left the River; a Day certain being fixed for their Departure, it was supposed they failed according to Appointment, but very providentially the Wind becoming contrary, and there being some Goods and Stores unshipp'd, they waited for Orders for shipping thereof; which the pretended Friends being acquainted with, came up the River with Dutch Colours, in a great Measure unprepared for a Sea Engagement, but in every Respect prepared for a Landing; Boats, Arms, and Men being ready for that Purpose: Upon finding their Mistake, that the Ships bound for England were not failed, they would have attacked and run down the River again, but the Vigilance of the Commanders of two of the Company's Ships prevented it, by shooting a Stern of them; in doing which one of our Ships took two Boats, which were going on Shore with Orders to the Dutch Commandant; these People were immediately sent ashore to the English Factory, and there declared the Orders given to, and Intention of the Dutch Squadron, the Number of Men they had on board, and the Quality and Quantity of their Cargoes. Upon this, General Clive caused his Troops immediately to be assembled, then sent off to the Dutch Commodore to demand his Business, with other Particulars, forbidding him to attempt landing any of his Cargo or Men; as he, by his Duty, could not suffer such Proceedings: The Commodore gave some evasive Answer, and made some frivolous Excuses, and promised not to land any Troops, nothing more than some Gentlemen, &c. amounting to about eighty in Number; declared they had but a small Quantity of Salt-petre, and that not intended for Sale, though it afterwards appeared their Ladings consisted of little else. Under these Disguises they landed near 1100 Europeans, in which Number must be included about 380 regular Forces, all completely arm'd and officer'd, even the Irregulars; soon after which their whole Force on Shore was attacked by a Number of English, about 350, and obliged to submit with great Loss: The Sea Engagement happened at the same Time, both which Cannonades were the sharpest ever known in that Quarter of the World. The Dutch were not permitted to land one Ounce of Salt-petre or Stores.

Letters from America mention the gallant Behaviour (in the late Action near Quebec) of an Irish Serjeant of Bragg's Regiment. The poor Fellow, it appears, had received a Shot in the Breast which rendered him unable to retreat into the Capital with the Rest of the Troops, he accordingly was left in the Field of Battle, and near him was an English Volunteer lying on the Ground, who had received a dangerous Wound in the Leg. Not long after the Engagement, the savage Indians, as is their Custom, began to scalp and strip the dead, and six of these Wretches approached the Volunteer, with an Intent to serve him in this inhuman Manner, the Serjeant collected what Strength he could, and with his Halbert levelled two of them at one Blow; and, weak as he was, killed another soon after, when the three remaining savage Cowards took to flight. The Serjeant seeing Part of a French Regiment near, he called to them in English, and begged their Assistance from barbarian Indians; he was luckily understood by the commanding Officer, who humanely ordered him and the Volunteer to be taken Care of, and the next Day sent them to Quebec to protect them from the Resentment of the Canadians, who had vowed Vengeance against the Serjeant.

In some of the Papers, it is said that General Clive can realize 1,200,000 l. in Cash, Bills and Jewels; and that his Lady has a Casket of Jewels, estimated to be worth at least 200,000 l.

General Clive being sensible what Obligations he lay under to Colonel Laurence, under whom he first learned the Art of War, by Means of which he laid the Foundation of his immense Fortune, and desirous of giving that experienced Officer a Proof of his Generosity, has prevailed upon him to accept an Annuity of 500 l. per Annum, which sets the military Skill of the one, and the Honour and Gratitude of the other, in the highest Point.

On Friday there was a Meeting of the Commissioners for the Longitude at the Admiralty-Office, when they examined Mess. Harrison's Instruments, and we hear that 500 l. was granted, and that a proper Trial is to be made of them.

The Free-Masons Lodge at Stockholm have presented the Orphan-House in that City, with 10,000 Dollars.

July 9. M. Maubert, in the Brussels Gazette, tells a long Story about Quebec, in which he insinuates, that our Government is well acquainted with that Place being in the Hands of the French, and that our Gazette has sunk the most material Part of the late Affair; and concludes with assuring us once more, that the French have actually taken it.

The following curious Paragraph dated Paris June 28, is faithfully translated from the Utrecht Gazette: "Last Tuesday we received Advices from Canada; they import, that M. de Vaudreuil, Commandant of our Troops in that Part of America, had been timely informed of the March of the English towards Montreal; that he attacked them with Success, and totally routed them; and that Brigadier Gen. Murray, Governor of Quebec for the English, having issued from that Town with Part of his Garrison, in order to succour Montreal, was likewise beaten. In short, after these important Advices, there is no Doubt but that the English must soon evacuate all Canada. We are assured of the Truth of these Facts." The Writer of the Utrecht Gazette could only mean to expose the French by inserting such Stuff, if he really received it from Paris, as in the very same Paper he has inserted the Account of the Raising the Siege of Quebec, published in the London Gazette.

BOSTON, September 29.

Last Friday being appointed to be observed as a Day of general Rejoicing for the entire Reduction of CANADA: At Noon his Excellency the Governor, accompanied with the Lieutenant-Governor, the Gentlemen of the Council, and several other Gentlemen of the Town, preceded by the Troop of Horse Guards, and guarded by the Company of Cadets, went from the Province House to the Council Chamber, when his Excellency received the Compliments of the Gentlemen on this happy Occasion: After which, on a Signal given, the Guns at Castle William were discharged to the Number of 63, which were followed by the Guns of several Ships in the Harbour. The Troop of Horse Guards, the Regiment of Militia, and the Company of Cadets being drawn up before the Council Chamber performed their rejoicing Fires. From thence his Excellency, with the Lieutenant-Governor, the Gentlemen of the Council, several Members of the House of Representatives, and many of the principal Gentlemen of the Town, guarded by the Company of Cadets, went to Faneuil Hall, where a public Dinner for 150 Persons was provided. After Dinner his Excellency and the Company went to the Concert Hall, on the Invitation of the Managers, and were entertained with a Concert of Music. In the Evening his Excellency, &c. went to the Council Chamber, when, upon a Signal given, the Guns of the Batteries were fired, to the Number of 30, and fine Fire-works were played off from a Scaffold erected in King-street, before the Council Chamber;

in the Intervals of which his Majesty's Health, and many other loyal Healths, were drank: The Gallery of the Council Chamber was adorned with transparent Painting; the whole Town was illuminated; there were two large Bonfires erected, with Scaffolding 5 Stories high, on the two principal Hills of the Town, and another of the same Structure on a Hill in Charlestown; and there was a great Variety of Fire-works (besides the public) played off in different Parts of the Town. In short, there were all possible Expressions of that universal Joy which this happy and glorious Event has diffused through this loyal and grateful People.

At the Illumination last Friday Evening, on Account of the Reduction of the City of Montreal, and with that the Reduction of all CANADA, in several Windows in Town were presented to View some ingenious Representations; and from the illuminated Scenery at the Balcony of the Court-House, were exhibited the following Designs. On the Front, facing King-street, in the Middle, Britannia sitting; on the Left-Hand, Fortitude; on the Right, Minerva: Behind, Neptune and Mars in Attendance. At a little Distance, Victory introducing Peace. Britannia, a Female Figure, representing France, prostrate, her Sword broken, and subjecting a Map of Canada at the Feet of Britannia. Behind France a Group of Figures representing Cruelty, Deceit, Craft, and Envy, blasted by a Flash of Lightning from Jupiter, who sits above, with the Scales of Justice suspended by one Hand, and on the other his Thunder Bolt.

On the South End of the Balcony, the Portrait of Mr. Secretary PITT, holding a Bow, Virtue guarding him with her Shield, and Apollo beaming down into his Bosom. At a Distance, France attempting to bind America, but transfixed with a Dart, and the Shackles broken asunder. Beneath, this Motto,

Pro Libertate, existens.

On the other Side of the Balcony, two Obelisks, with Trophies: One, to the Memory of General Wolfe, a Motto, Pallas te hoc Vulnere, Pallas Iasmolas—

The other, in Honour of General Amherst; above, Presenti tibi maturos largimur honores.

And in the Garden of Mr. Sheriff Greenleaf, which was also very beautifully illuminated with Lanthorns, &c. was a transparent Painting, representing his Majesty King GEORGE; under him, on the Right, Mr. Secretary PITT; on the Left, his Excellency General AMHERST; below all was the City of Montreal, with the French Flag struck, and the English one flying on the Walls of that Place; on one Side of which was seen France in Tears; represented by a Female Figure, wrapped in a Shroud, adorned with Flower de Lucies, and sitting on the Ground in a dejected Posture, weeping; at her Feet this Inscription, CANADA REDUCED; and over all, a Representation of the Sun, shining in it's full Lustre.

Another Account of the same Garden.

Among other Demonstrations of Joy on this happy Event, one Gentleman's Seat was particularly distinguish'd, by having a great Number of Lamps rang'd on each Side of the Pleasure-Garden fronting his House. Those in the main Walk, leading to the Front Gate, were so dispos'd as to form a handsome Arch of Fifteen Feet high, and above a Hundred in Length; these with another Range on the Top of the Palisades, and bounding the large Terras Walk, reflecting their Light among the Trees of the Garden, and meeting the Illumination from the Windows of the House, made a very brilliant Appearance, which was very agreeably heightened by a great Concourse of Ladies and Gentlemen who amus'd themselves by walking the Garden the whole Evening. At the upper End of the Court-Yard was rais'd in an Arch Twelve Feet high, a Piece of transparent

Painting: In the Semicircle was fixed a Representation of his present Majesty in his Royal Robes, with his Crown placed on a Velvet Cushion; underneath was the Bust of Mr. Pitt on the Right, and General Amherst on the Left; below these was a Figure of a Woman sitting on the Ground with a dejected Countenance, the Tears flowing from her Eyes, and a French Flag fallen by her Side; before her Face was drawn the Island and Forts of Montreal with the British Flag triumphing on the Walls; below which was wrote in Capitals, CANADA REDUCED; over all these was elevated a fine Representation of the SUN in his brightest Lustre, an Emblem of the Glory of the King of Great Britain, and the Wisdom of his Administration.

Extract of a Letter from St. Kitts, August 21.

"One of his Majesty's Ships of 74 Guns, and a Frigate have silenced two Batteries at the Grenades, and cut out 13 Sloops and Schooners, deeply loaded. The Enemy have not been so harassed in these Seas since the War, as they have been within this Month past. Commodore Douglas constantly keeps his Ships employed in cruising for the Enemy's Privateers, and many are taken, which renders the Navigation to the West Indies, since the Arrival of that Gentleman, much more secure than has been experienced."

We hear that the Honourable Commodore Lord Colvill has appointed the Winchester Man of War, Captain Hale, to convoy the Mail Ships from Portsmouth Home. — She is daily expected at Piscataqua from Halifax, for that Purpose. — The Crown is also expected at Piscataqua from Halifax, to load with Mails.

Extract of a Letter from New-Provident, July 28.

"A few Days ago two of our Turtlers returned from a Voyage to the Florida Shore, where they met with a pretty extraordinary Adventure, which I shall relate to you. A few Days before they left that Shore they were surprised at seeing a good many Indians approaching in Canoes; towards whom they fired several Shot, not with an Intent to hurt, but to deter them from coming nearer: The Indians nevertheless advanced, and at last displayed English Colours. This appeared more singular still, but our Turtlers resolved instead of firing mischievously, to let them come near, and see the Event. As the Indians approached, some of them at last spoke pretty good English, said they were Subjects of the same King, and were going to War against their old Enemies the Indians of Florida. They proved to be 19 Eucheas, and had with them a Spaniard, who had been their Prisoner 6 Months, and was to serve them as Pilot on their Road, to have his Liberty if he was faithful, or otherwise to be put to Death; after staying some Time on board the Vessels, and behaving very orderly, they went away towards the South West, in Quest of their Enemies. They had not been gone long, before they fell in with the main Body of the Floridians, whom they surprised and fell upon like a Torrent, killed many, and took 11 Prisoners, without any Loss on their Side; the rest took to their Pans, and fled South-westerly. Thus did Vengeance for once fall heavy on those Blood-thirsty Mercenaries who have made numberless Sacrifices of our unhappy Countrymen, that have had the Misfortune to be Shipwrecked on that Shore.

"After the Eucheas had settled Matters so as to go on with their Operations, they went on board a new Spanish Schooner, which was lying near the Keys, where they had the Engagement, with only one Spaniard on board (the rest of the Crew, five in Number, being out a fishing) which they burnt; they then put both their Spaniards on Shore, and left two of their Number to guard them, proceeding after the Fugitives, but the Indian Guards inconsiderately going to sleep at one Time, the Spaniards took their Arms, and put an End to their Labours, and came off with every Thing that could be useful to them, on board our Vessels, where they related the Affair of the Engagement and burning of the Schooner as aforesaid. Soon after our Vessel met with a Spanish Schooner, with whom the two Spaniards went to Cuba.

"Most of the Flags of Truce and Monto-Christi Traders that were sent in here, are condemned: Some Spaniards have been discharged with Costs."

WILLIAMSBURG, October 3.

This Week came to Town from New-York seven Soldiers of the Virginia Regiment, who were taken Prisoners at the Defeat of Major Grant before Fort Du-Quegne. They were sent from the Mississippi to Old-France, and having been exchanged for French Prisoners, were brought from England by the Mercury Man of War.

The Wolfe Privateer is returned from a Cruise, and has brought in a Spaniard and Dutchman.

L O N D O N.

Cover at Kensington, July 11, 1760.

Present the King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, an Extract of a Letter from his Majesty's Envoy at the Court of Turin, to the Right Hon. William Pitt, Esq; one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, dated the 18th of June last, representing, That he had just received Advice of a Vessel being arrived at Marseilles from Syria, with the Plague on board: That upon opening the Hatches, three Persons dropt dead, and several others were taken very ill, and that 3 other Vessels failed in Company with the above mentioned one from the Levant; but as they have not been heard of for some Time, it is apprehended their Crews are all dead. And whereas a Quarantine of 40 Days is at this Time subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean; his Majesty in Council doth therefore Order, that the said Quarantine be duly and punctually complied with, &c. Gazette.

N E W - Y O R K, October 6.

LAST Monday Night one Mr. Pearson, a Mate belonging to his Majesty's Ship the Mercury, now in this Harbour, having been in Company with a lewd Woman, in a House near the College, in this City, got his Pocket picked of his Money, and suspecting the Woman of the House to be concerned in the Robbery, swore if she did not return him the Money, or find him the Woman that stole it (the having absconded directly) he would be her Death that Minute; but the denying any Knowledge of the Affair, Mr. Pearson immediately drew his Sword, and stabbed her in the Body, of which Wound she died last Thursday. The Coroner's Inquest being summoned, they brought in their Verdict, Wilful Murder. Mr. Pearson is now confined on board the Mercury.

Monday last arrived here the Regiment of Highlanders commanded by Colonel Fraiser. Friday last a Number of Canadians, that were taken at Isle-Royale, in the River St. Lawrence, by General Amherst, embarked on board a Sloop for Albany, in order to return to Canada, they having taken the Oaths of Allegiance to his Britannick Majesty.

We learn by the Post from Albany, that all the Provincial Troops which went from Crown-Point to Isle au Noix, &c. were returned back to that Place, by Order of General Amherst, after having got within four Miles of Montreal; 'tis said they will soon be dismissed, with Leave to return to their respective Homes.

Since our last, great Part of Col. Montgomery's Highlanders, who lately arrived here from South-Carolina, and went up to Albany, returned hither from above, on their Way to Halifax.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, October 9.

Our last Advices from Montreal, are of the 20th ult. when the French Prisoners were embarked, in order to go down to Quebec.

Yesterday John Bruleman was executed here, for the Murder of Mr. Robert Scull, formerly mentioned in this Paper.

Extract of a Letter from Fort-Bedford, dated September 26, 1760.

"I am sorry I have no better News to communicate, than the fresh Instance of want of Sincerity and Humanity in the Cherokees, who, instead of fulfilling the Terms of the Capitulation of Fort-Laudoun, by conducting the Garrison to Fort Prince George, as they had engaged to do, fell upon them unawares, butchered the Commanding Officer in the most cruel Manner, killed all the Officers, except Capt. Stuart, put to Death 25 Soldiers on the Spot, and dispersed the rest (above 200) amongst the Towns, to be Slaves or Sacrifices. They are now gone against Fort Prince George; it is thought they reserved Capt. Stuart, in order to make use of him towards the Surrender of that Garrison; but the Little Carpenter purchased him of the Indian that had him, and has brought him, with three other white Men, to Col. Byrd. You may depend upon this as Fact. The Express that passed here Yesterday, in his Way to Fort Pitt, brought me a Letter from Major Irwin, dated the 15th Instant, at Sayer's Mill, where Col. Byrd is now encamped, waiting for Orders from Williamsburg. It is thought they will kill all the Prisoners they now have, if the Garrison of Fort Prince George does not surrender, and that if it does they will put the whole to Death, when they have them in their Power. God keep them out of their Hands."

A N N A P O L I S, October 16.

Friday last came on the Election of a Representative for this County, in the Room of PHILIP HAMMOND, Esq; Deceased, when JOHN HAMMOND, Esq; was unanimously Chosen to succeed his Father.

Yesterday his Excellency the Governor, put an End to the Session of Assembly, and prorogued it to the second Monday in March next, after passing the following Laws:

1. An Act for easing the Inhabitants of this Province, from the great and unequal Burthen of the additional Land-Tax.

[By this Act, the several Taxes, Fines, Forfeitures and Penalties, imposed by the 40,000 l. Act, passed in 1756, are continued for two Years. Commissioners named and appointed to meet at the Paper Currency Office on the first Monday of August 1762, to lay a Tax on Lands to make up the Deficiency, if any, that shall then happen. All Officers who have received any Part of the late burthened Tax of Seven Shillings and Sevenpence a Hundred Acres, are obliged to refund the same on Demand, to the several Persons who have paid it; provided that it be demanded at the respective Dwelling-Houses or Offices of the said Officers.]

2. An Act continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for the speedy Recovery of small Debts out of Court, before one Justice of the Peace.

3. An Act continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for the Gauge of Barrels, for Pork, Beef, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, and Tare of Barrels for Flour or Bread.

4. An Act continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for relieving the Inhabitants of this Province from some Aggrievances in the Prosecution of Suits at Law, and for continuing the Supplementary Act thereto.

5. An Act continuing an Act, entitled, A Supplementary Act to the Act, entitled, An Act ascertaining the Height of Fences, to prevent the Evil occasioned by the Multitude of Horses, and restraining Horse Rangers, within this Province; and to redress the great Evil accruing to this Province by the Multiplicity of useless Horses, Mares, and Colts, that run in the Woods.

6. An Act to augment the Salaries of several Inspectors.

[By this Act, an Addition of Five Pounds per Annum, is made and allowed, to each of the Inspectors of Princess-Anne-Town and Maddox's Warehouses; and to the Inspectors of Robsboth and Colebourn's Creek Warehouse; in Somerset County: And the same Addition to the Inspectors of Benedict Warehouse, in Charles County. To continue the Duration of the Inspection Law.]

7. An Act continuing an Act, entitled, An Act to remedy some Evils relating to Servants.

8. An Act for increasing the Allowance of Grand and Petit Jurors who shall attend the Provincial Court, to limit Costs with Respect to Witnesses, and granting them an Allowance for itinerant Charges.

[By this Act, every Grand Jury who shall attend the Provincial Court, are to be allowed 6000 lbs. of Tobacco: Every Petit Juror, 48 lbs. of Tobacco per Day during his Attendance, besides the Quantity of 96 lbs. of Tobacco to every full Jury who shall pass their Verdict in any Cause. Itinerant Charges for each Grand and Petit Juror 48 lbs. of Tobacco per Day. Every Witness summoned to a County Court, who lives in another County, to be allow'd 24 lbs. of Tobacco for every Day's itinerant Charges. All payable, as other Public Levies, at the Rate of 12 s. 6 d. per Hundred, and to be allowed in the Public Journal.]

THURSDAY, October 23, 1760.

By the Halifax Packet, arrived at New-York on the 13th Instant, in a short Passage from Falmouth, we have the following Advices, viz.

FRANKFORT, July 18.

THE Castle of Dillenbourg surrendered on the 16th to the French. The Garrison consisted of near 250 Men, who are made Prisoners of War. This Siege lasted longer than the French expected, and has cost them many Men.

Rome, July 5. The Corsican Malecontents have published a Manifesto, of which the following is an Extract:

"We have made War against the Republic of Genoa for thirty Years, and the Justice of our Cause is known to all Europe. That Power is the greatest Enemy we ever had; it seizes Ships under our Flag, sets the neighbouring Nations against us, interrupts our Commerce, and tyrannizes over us. Accordingly, all such of our Countrymen as are inclined to fit out Privateers, being first furnished with suitable Commissions and Authority for so doing, are enjoined to fall upon the Subjects of that Republic. At the same time we protest, that we shall observe an inviolable Respect for the rest of the Powers of Europe."

From the LONDON GAZETTE.

From Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Saxenhausen, July 18. Advice having been received by Prince Ferdinand, That a Body of the Enemy, consisting of some Battalions and light Troops, were advanced on the Left of our Army towards Zeigenhain, his Serene Highness detached the Hereditary Prince on the 14th Instant with six Battalions, two Hanoverian, and four Hessian, Elliot's Regiment (which was just arrived) Luckner's Hussars, and two Brigades of Chasseurs, to oppose that Corps. On the 16th the Hereditary Prince engaged them near the Village of Erxdorff. The Action was very warm for some Time, but in the End the Enemy was entirely defeated. Two Battalions of Royal Baviere, three of Anhalt, together with the Commander in Chief, Major General Glaubitz, and the Prince of Anhalt Cothen, were made Prisoners of War. Six Pieces of their Cannon were taken, and all their Arms, Baggage, &c. Elliot's Regiment signalized themselves greatly upon this Occasion. The main Army of the French, under M. Broglie, still remains encamped upon the Heights of Corbach.

Head Quarters of the King of Prussia at Leubnitz, near Dresden, July 23.

By AUTHORITY.

"The City of Dresden having been invested on the 13th, the same Day the King caused the Governor, General Maquire, to be summoned to surrender the Place, and offered him an honourable Capitulation, and Liberty for himself and Garrison to march out freely; assuring him, that if he could accept this Offer, he should receive no Injury, nor the City any Damage. General Maquire rejected this Capitulation, and made Answer that he would defend the Place to the last Extremity. We were therefore obliged to employ Force; the suburbs were carried, and Batteries were begun to be erected. The Governor no sooner saw us masters of the Suburbs, than he set Fire to them with his Artillery, and burnt the Houses, which, during the former Siege, General Schmettau thought might be spared. Our Works, however, were not discontinued; the Batteries were erected, and they began to fire on the 18th, the heavy Cannon not arriving till the Day before.

"As these Batteries were very near the Works, and some of them even at the Side of the Fosse, the random Bombs set Fire to the Houses next to the Ramparts; which it was not easy to prevent, though the King had expressly ordered, that the Artillery should not play on the Town, but wholly on the Ramparts. However, the Conflagration

would not have become general, had not our Gunners perceived four Pieces of Cannon on the Tower of the Church of the Cross, which fired on our Batteries. Some Bombs which were thrown to silence them, set Fire to the Tower. The Fall of the Steeple communicated the Flames to the neighbouring Houses, and a high Wind arising, spread them so far, that a considerable Quarter of the Town has been burnt. However, the Castle, the Arsenal, the Roman Catholic Church, and the greatest Part of the City are saved.

"This Misfortune, nevertheless, justly excites the Compassion of every one, and Nobody's more than the King's; but it is not to be ascribed to our Troops. We spared the City but too much, especially after the Examples of the contrary which the Enemy gave us at Zittau, Schweidnitz, and Custrin, Towns reduced to Ashes without Necessity, without any End to serve, and partly without any Effect. Saxony, therefore, must blame only her own Allies, and the Imprudence of Firing from the Steeples, and the strange Measures of the Austrian Generals, who made no great Haste to succour a Town that can be supported only by the Presence of a superior Army, and which they, nevertheless, thought proper to defend in the same Manner as if it had been a regular Fortrefs, and which of Consequence was wantonly exposed to the Disaster that has just befallen it.

"The King having decamped on the 8th from Bautzen to turn towards Dresden, it was not till the 19th, the Day on which the Fire began, that Marshal Daun appeared again with his Army, which he had strengthened by large Detachments drawn from the Corps under Laudohn and Beck. He took his Camp between the Villages of Schoenfeld and Weissig, a League from Dresden. As, after the Return of the grand Austrian Army, the Duke of Holstein, who occupied the Posts of Nauendorf and Weissen-Hirsch, with a detached Body of Forces, to straiten the Town on the other Side of the River, would have been surrounded by the Enemy's superior Number, the King ordered him to cross the Elbe. Marshal Daun having by this Means a free Communication with Dresden, and having come and encamped with his Army at the Place called the Barns; having also built two Bridges of Boats on the Elbe, and there being no longer any Hope of succeeding in the Siege, the King resolved on the 21st to raise it.

"In the Night between the 21st and 22d, Marshal Daun sent 16 Battalions through the Town of Dresden, who at Three in the Morning made a general Sally on the Troops that formed the Siege, doubtless with a View to seize our Artillery. But this Design succeeded ill. They indeed at first carried off some Picquets of the Regiment of Anhalt-Bernbourg; but they were soon repulsed with Vigour, and pursued to the Town with the Loss of upwards of 1000 Men. We made, on this Occasion, 200 Prisoners, among whom are General Nugent, and several Officers; and we did not lose one Piece of Cannon.

"After drawing off all the Artillery employed in the Siege, the Head Quarters were transferred Yesterday from Gruna to Leubnitz, and the Army came and encamped here. However, we are still in Possession of the Suburb of Pirna, the Great Garden, and the Camp of Plauen. General Lasce is still encamped between Gros-Seidlitz and Dohna; the Army of the Empire behind Maxen; and Marshal Daun at the Barns, on the other Side of the Elbe."

Hamburg, July 22. General Laudohn is not gone to join Marshal Daun, but has drawn nearer to the Oder, with about 35,000 Men, and has taken Possession of Neumark, Parckwitz, and Steinau. It is said, that his Patroles have advanced even to the Gates of Breslau and Glogau.

Prince Henry is in the Neighbourhood of Mese-ritz, in the Polish Territory. His chief Object seems to be the hindering the Junction of the Rus-

sians with General Laudohn. General Goltze being detached by his Royal Highness with a considerable Force, has taken Post near Kloster-Paradys.

Frankfort (upon the Oder) July 24. Part of the Russian Army has entered Silesia; but the Amount of the Corps is not known. Prince Henry is following them, in order to prevent, if possible, their Junction with the Austrians under Laudohn, which is well known to be their principal Design.

Saxony, July 25. As soon as Marshal Daun arrived at Dresden, he poured into that City 36 Battalions of fresh Troops, and planted 109 Pieces of Cannon, to supply the Place of those which the Enemy had dismounted. Two Days before the raising of the Siege, the Prussians brought up 12 additional Mortars to play upon the Old Town, which is reduced to a Heap of Ashes and Ruins. The Suburbs met with the same Fate.

Paris, July 25. There is a Talk of sending 10,000 Men immediately towards Normandy, but it is not said how they are to be employed. However, there are certain Circumstances which seem very much to engage the Attention of the Public.

FROM THE LONDON GAZETTE.

Translation of a Letter from his Serene Highness Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, to his Majesty.

S I R, Warbourg, August 1.

"I have the Honour of acquainting your Majesty with the Defeat of the Reserve, under the Chevalier de Muy, who having passed the Dymel at Stadbergen, extended his Corps down the Banks of that River, in order to cut me off from Westphalia, whilst M. de Broglie was advancing with his main Army towards my Camp at Kalle, and Prince Xavier with his Reserve, on our Left, towards Cassel. Hereupon I determined to leave General Kielmansegge with a Body of Troops at Cassel, for the Protection of that City, and to march myself with the Army, the Night of the 30th, in order to pass the Dymel between Liebenau and Dringelberg; which was happily executed. The Hereditary Prince, who had passed the Dymel on the 29th, to go and reinforce General Spörcke (who was posted since the 28th between Liebenau and Corbeke) reconnoitred the Position of the Chevalier de Muy, who from the 30th in the Morning was in Possession of a very advantageous Camp, between Warbourg and Ochsendorff. It was agreed, that the Prince and M. Spörcke should turn the Enemy's Left, whilst I advanced with the Army upon their Front; which was done with all possible Success; the Enemy being attacked almost in the same Instant by M. Spörcke and the Hereditary Prince, in Flank and in Rear. As the Infantry of the Army could not march fast enough, to charge at the same Time, I ordered my Lord Granby to advance with the Cavalry of the Right. The English Artillery got up on a Gallop, and seconded the Attack in a surprizing Manner. All the Troops have done well, and particularly the English. The French Cavalry, though very numerous, retreated, as soon as ours advanced to charge them, excepting only three Squadrons, that kept their Ground, but were soon broke. A Part of the English Cavalry then fell upon the Enemy's Infantry, which suffered extremely; and particularly the Regiment of Lockman Swifts. I ordered an Attack to be made on the Town of Warbourg, by the Legion Britannique; and the Enemy finding themselves thus attacked upon their two Flanks, in Front and in Rear, retired with the utmost Precipitation, and with the Loss of many Men, as well from the Fire of our Artillery, as from the Attacks of the Cavalry. Many were drowned in the Dymel, in attempting to ford it. The Enemy's Loss in Men is very considerable; I cannot exactly ascertain it; but it is supposed, that they have left Fifteen Hundred Men upon the Field of Battle; and the Amount of the Prisoners we have made, probably exceeds that Number. We have taken ten Pieces of Cannon, with some Colours. The

Loss on our Side is very moderate, and falls chiefly upon the brave Battalion of Maxwell's English Grenadiers, which did Wonders. Col. Beckwith, who commanded the Brigade, formed of English Grenadiers and Scotch Highlanders, distinguished himself greatly, and has been wounded in the Head.

My Lord Granby, with the English Cavalry, has contributed extremely to the Success of the Day. I charge Captain Fawcett, his Lordship's Aid de Camp, with this Letter, to be delivered to your Majesty, and to give your Majesty a more particular Account of the Action, from his own Mouth, till I can have the Honour of laying at your Majesty's Feet a more extensive and circumstantial Relation. Magdebourg, August 2. The King having remained before Dresden till the 20th of July, without being able to bring M. Daun, or Lasci, or the Army of the Empire, to a Battle; and his Majesty being unwilling to do further Damage to that City, which he could not believe in Form, retired with his Army towards Kesseldorf, where he remained till the 30th. That Day, his Army filed off towards Meissen, where the Head Quarters were established. But several Motions indicate, that he intends to march again towards Silesia.

Head Quarters of the King of Prussia at Daulwitz, August 2. On the 29th we left Leubnitz. Yesterday we passed the Elbe, without Molestation, and came to this Place. Tomorrow we shall probably begin our March again for Silesia. Marshal Daun has also put his Army in Motion, and is advancing by Bischofswerden towards Bautzen.

The King has left 15,000 Men under General Holsen in the entrenched Camp of Schleitzow. The Austrians under Lasci have taken Post at Reichenberg, and the Army of the Empire at Kesseldorf.

Vienna, August 2. On the 26th ult. the old Fortress of Glatz was taken Sword in Hand. The new One surrendered at Discretion. The Magazine, of which our Troops have made themselves Masters there, was immense. We lost at the Siege 4 Officers, and 64 Men; and 7 Officers, and 138 Men, were wounded.

Hamburg, Aug. 8. After the Taking of Glatz, General Draskowitz advanced towards Neiss, as well to straiten that Place, as to facilitate the Junction of the Russians, who are advancing by Kalisch and Militz, towards Breslau.

Hagbe, Aug. 12. The last Letters from Hambourg advise, That Prince Henry of Prussia had made several Motions since the 1st Instant, which indicated a Design of marching to the Austrians under General Laudohn, and attacking them, before they can effect a Junction with the Russians.

Magdebourg, August 9. We are informed, that on the 30th of July General Laudohn advanced with his Army up to Breslau, and summoned several Times the City to surrender, adding terrible Menaces in Case of a Refusal. Major Gen. Taentzien, Governor of the Place, having constantly refused to capitulate, Laudohn began the First of August to throw Bombs and Granades into it, whereby the Royal Palace, and Part of the City, from Albert-street to the New-market, were reduced to Ashes. During this Bombardment the Croats advanced to the Pallisades, but were driven away by the Fire from the Ramparts. The next Day Gen. Laudohn again summoned the Governor to surrender, and was answered as before. The same Day, and the Third, he made several Marches and Counter-marches, but attempted nothing further against Breslau. The Fourth he retired, marching by the Way of Lissa and Schweidnitz. It is said General Laudohn had no heavy Artillery, and no more Bombs than what he spent against the City, otherwise he would have done it more Damage.

Havelberg, August 10. The Austrians continue to block up Neiss and Schweidnitz.

About 4 or 5000 Russians have got into Pomerania, have invested Cottin, Corlin, and Belgard, and demanded large Contributions from those Places. They give out that they shall be joined soon by a considerable Corps, sufficient to undertake the Siege of Colberg.

The King arrived the Day before Yesterday at Bautzen, upon whose Approach the Austrians retired, first setting Fire to their Magazine, whereby a considerable Part of the Town suffered greatly.

Paris, August 3. Letters from Petersburg advise, that Count Soltikoff has a little delayed the Execution of his Plan, through the Want of Provision and Forage; and for Fear of augmenting the English and Prussian Party in Poland, he has acted, by Express Orders from the Czarina, with the utmost Caution in Polesania, and consequently has retarded his Marches.

Utrecht, August 12. They write from Stralsund, that the Swedish Army will immediately begin its March against the King of Prussia's Dominions. It will consist of 22,000 fighting Men; 6000 are to cover Pomerania, and 16,000 are to fall upon the Prussians; the whole of whom, in that Dutchy, does not amount to 5000.

Amsterdam, August 14. The French found in the City of Munden (which they carried Sword in Hand, the 1st Inst.) 12,000 Sacks of Flour, 350,000 Rations of Oats, 15,000 lb. Weight of Gun-powder, besides 30 Wagon Loads of Provisions belonging to the English, much Equipage, and many Pieces of Cannon. They took, at the same Time, upon the Fulda, 30 Boats, laden with Provisions and Ammunition. The Garrison consisted only of 350 Men, who were made Prisoners of War.

Havover, August 8. Three Battalions of English Guards arrived on the 30th ult. at Bremen. We expect four more Regiments of Infantry from England very soon.

Prince Xavier of Saxony, at the Head of a Body of French Troops, has made himself Master of Cassel, Munden, Gotingen, and Eimbach, and is actually going to lay Siege to Hamelen.

Yesterday the Horses in the King's Stables, the Mint-Office, and large Sums of Money taken out of the Electoral Chamber and the War-Office, were removed to Zell. The

French entered Elmbeck Yesterday. Prince Ferdinand has caused all the detached Corps to join his Army; hence we conclude that a general Action may soon happen. The Privy-Councillors are still in this City.

Utrecht, August 15. Letters from Hanover advise, that the French Troops which had got into Elmbeck, have been expelled by Luckner's Corps. From another Quarter there is a Report, that the Reserve of the French Army, under Prince Xavier of Saxony, has advanced as far as Hanover. A Confirmation of both Events was waited for.

King of Prussia's Head Quarters at Buntzlau, in Silesia, August 7. The Army quitted Daulwitz the 3d Instant, and arrived here this Day, having marched 40 Leagues in five Days. By this rapid March the King is got into Silesia before Marshal Daun, tho' that General was at Bautzen the first Instant, which shews that it was not owing to the prudent Marches of the Marshal that his Majesty did not last Month penetrate into this Province, but to Reasons which did not depend upon the Enemy. It may be imagined what Difficulties we had to surmount, when it is considered that the Army, encumbered with above 2000 Waggon, passed the Elbe, the Spree, the Neiss, the Queiss, and the Bober, at the same Time that the Austrian Army was on one Side of us, under General Reid, near Bautzen; General Lasci's Corps behind us; and that of General Beck in Front. However, none of these different Corps dared to attack us; and, on the other Hand, we surprised several of the Enemy's little Posts, and took a great many Prisoners. We took 100 from General Beck's Corps when we passed the Neiss at Burkenbruck, and obliged that Corps to make a precipitate Retreat towards Braunau. Major-General Krokow, who was detached this Day with some Dragoons and Hussars, is sending in Prisoners every Moment, from the Parties of Beck and Laudohn, which are over-running the Low Country of Silesia, and raising heavy Contributions.

Prince Henry having, by Means of a forced March, obliged General Laudohn to raise the Siege of Breslau, is returned against the Russians, to prevent their penetrating further into Silesia.

Head Quarters of the Allied Army at Warburg, August 10. Our Army keeps in the same Situation, and that of Marshal Broglie is encamped over-against us, within the Distance of very little more than Cannon shot. Though the two Armies are separated by the Dymel, that Rivulet is fordable almost in every Part. We are employed in fortifying our Camp, though we doubt whether the French will dare to attack us. General Sporken occupies the same Camp. Stadberg is a Post which is alternately occupied by our Troops and the Enemy; but we have to well guarded the Avenues to it, that the French cannot become Masters of it without Loss.

L O N D O N, July 29. Sunday Night an Express arrived at the Earl of Holderness's Office, with an Account, that the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick having attacked the Left Wing of the French Army, had made six whole Battalions Prisoners of War; they were commanded by Count Glaubitz, and the Prince of Anhalt Coethen, who are also taken, as well as their Cannon, Tents, and Baggage. Elliot's Light Dragoons behaved with the greatest Bravery in this Affair.

The Malecontents of Corfica, who have by a Manifesto, dated the 20th of May last, declared War both by Sea and Land against the Genoese, have fitted out Privateers, which have already taken seven Vessels laden with Merchandize, and two others with Cattle, destined for Bastia.

July 31. By Letters from Germany, we are told, that General Elliot, and Lord Pembroke, the Colonel and Lieutenant Colonel of the Light Horse, had an Invitation to Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters, the Day of the Engagement, which coming on very suddenly, that Corps was commanded by Major Erskine of that Regiment. The Hereditary Prince of Brunswick went through the Ranks uncovered, and thanked all the Officers and Soldiers for their Bravery.

August 2. It is acknowledged in Letters from Vienna, that never any War cost so many Men, as the present; the single Archduchy of Austria hath already raised 36,000.

All the Letters from France advise, that the Ministry are made very uneasy by the Difficulties that attend the supplying of their Colonies with warlike Stores and Provisions, which are daily solicited with the utmost Importunity.

August 5. The Transports with the Guards on board, were seen on Friday last, off Yarmouth. Copy of a Paragraph in a Letter from the Earl of Pembroke to Field Marshal Lord Viscount Ligonier, and sent by his Lordship to the Countess Dowager of Pembroke:

Saxenhausen Camp, July 20, 1760.
"Having before troubled your Lordship with a Letter, signifying the Honour the Duke [Prince Ferdinand] had done me, in sending for me to Camp from off the March before the Regiment, to order me to act here as Major-General, by which I had the Misfortune to miss being with the Regiment which did so wonderfully; only beg Leave now to inclose Part of this Day's Orders, hoping the very great Merit of my Friend Erskine will not be overlooked."

Saxenhausen Camp, July 20, 1760.
"His Serene Highness orders it to be publicly testified to the whole Army, how much he is charmed and satisfied with the good Conduct and Valour of the Corps that fought on the 16th Instant, under the Orders of the Hereditary Prince."

"The Praises his Serene Highness gave of them to the Duke were such, that nothing can be said in Addition to them."
"His Serene Highness therefore gives his best Thanks to those brave Troops, and particularly to Elliot's Regiment, which was allowed by every Body present to have done Wonders."

"His Serene Highness the Prince could not enough commend to the Duke the Bravery, good Conduct, and good Countenance, with which that Regiment fought."
"His Serene Highness desires much to be able to find Means to acknowledge to Major Erskine principally, who was at the Head of that Regiment, and led it so gallantly, as well as to the Officers and Men, his real Satisfaction, and to have it in his Power to do them Service. He desires those Gentlemen to furnish him with an Opportunity of doing it, and he shall seize it with Pleasure."

It is said that the Marshal de Broglie sent a Message to Prince Ferdinand of Brunswick, complaining that Elliot's Regiment refused to give Quarter when it was asked; and that the Prince replied, that that Regiment being lately rail-

ed, was unacquainted with the Laws of Arms, but that they would soon know better; and that he would give proper Orders, to prevent such Behaviour for the future.

August 2. We hear that Press Warrants are granted throughout England, to empress Men for his Majesty's Land Service, occasioned by the late Draughts sent to Germany. And that there is the warmest Press for the Sea Service, on the River, ever known.

Extract of a Letter from Quiberon Bay, July 16.
"Yesterday we had an Account, that on the 8th Instant his Majesty's Ship the Dragon, who with some other Ships, is watching Port-Louis, chased a very rich French Vessel into a River near that Port. The Batteries at the Entrance prevented the Boats pursuing up the River. Capt. Hervey with his own Ship ran in and engaged a Battery, drove them from their Guns, and knock'd their Guard House down. In the Night he himself landed with his Boats, and just at Day-light surprised Twenty of their Guard, threw the Guns into the Sea, burnt the Guard-House, brought off the Ammunition, and sent his Boats up to bring away the Vessel; but being dry ashore, they could only destroy and burn her. He brought off four small Barks and Thirty Prisoners. We hear that the Troops on that Coast are much harass'd by the Commanders different Movements from Place to Place."

August 7. There are now a great Number of Transports lying in Readiness to take in the Troops at Portsmouth.

Admiral Pocock is soon expected Home from the East-Indies.

We are well informed, that Captain-Lieutenant Basil, of Elliot's Light Dragoon, and the Horse he was mounted on, received nine Balls in the late Engagement with the French: He lived about an Hour afterwards, and before he expired, had the Satisfaction of seeing his Regiment victorious, with the French Prisoners; and then, like another W O L F E, declared he died satisfied.

August 9. A Letter from on board one of his Majesty's Ships, cruising off the Isle of Oleron, July 18, says, "We have certain Advice, that all the flat bottomed Boats in France are fitted out. A Spaniard, that came from Nantes, has taken an Oath, that there are six of them ready for sailing; and says they have three Kells, are as broad and long as a 50 Gun Ship, and carry 22 Twenty-four Pounders. He and his Mate have taken their Oath, that they saw one rigged in the Form of a Ship, and the others as Galliot Hovs. They likewise inform us, that there are 50 Sail of small flat bottomed Boats fitted out at Havre-de-Grace. I believe they are intended for Ireland. They draw only ten Feet Water when in."

We hear that several Men of War, which were ordered to be laid up, will be again put into Commission, and that Orders are given to finish those on the Stocks as soon as possible.

They write from Madrid, that two Bomb Vessels were ordered to join the six Men of War said to be destined against the Algerines; and that his Catholic Majesty was about making a numerous Promotion of General Officers.

We hear from Quiberon Bay, that Admiral Boscawen has taken Possession of an Island near the River Vannes, which is about a Mile long, and Half a Mile broad, and on it has erected two or three Tents for the Use of the Sick, and has planted a Garden with all kinds of Vegetables for them.

August 12. It is said there is Advice, that the Forces which sailed from hence, are landed at Stade.

Notwithstanding the great Advantages just gained over the French, it is reported that they are in Possession of the City of Cassel. The French, upon meeting with a Resistance from the Troops in that City, immediately fired into it with red hot Balls, which set Fire to several Houses; upon which Prince Ferdinand sent them Orders to surrender the City, rather than have it destroyed by such inhuman Proceedings.

August 14. We hear a Regiment of Foot, and several Independent Companies, will soon sail for Quebec.

There is Advice that the French Squadron which engaged Admiral Pocock, in the East-Indies, is safely arrived at the Cape of Good Hope; where they received a fresh Supply of Provisions and Stores from the Dutch.

August 16. On Wednesday his Royal Highness the Duke of York set out for Portsmouth.

Some Independent Companies are going to be sent to Guadaloupe. Thursday last Major-General Stanwix arrived from America, and Yesterday waited upon his Majesty; at Kensington, and was most graciously received.

The last Letters from Vienna positively assert, that General Faquet's strong Box was found among his Baggage. Among many other Letters written with the King of Prussia's own Hand, they say, there is one in which his Majesty tells Faquet, that he should find the utmost Difficulty in supporting himself, during this Campaign, against so many powerful Enemies; and that what grieved him most, was the Loss of so many brave Generals, and the Ruin of almost all his Cavalry, which he could not replace.

It is expected that Colonel Clive will soon be made a Peer.

August 19. Saturday last the Earl Marshal of Scotland, late Minister from his Prussian Majesty to the Court of Spain, was introduced to his Majesty, and was most graciously received.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, August 17.

"Thursday last, but returned again, Admiral Hawke in the Royal George; and on Friday sailed again for the Bay, to relieve Admiral Boscawen, who is daily expected here."

An Act for encouraging a Collection and Publication of the Laws of this Province.

WHEREAS the Reverend Thomas Bacon has, with great Pains and Application, made a Collection in Manuscript of the several Acts of Assembly of this Province; the Publication whereof may be of great and general Utility; in order, therefore, that so useful a Work may meet with due Encouragement, and that the said Thomas Bacon may be the better enabled to proceed thereon, it is prayed that it may be Enacted:

And be it Enacted, by the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary, by and with the Advice and Consent of his Lordship's Governor, and the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly, and the Authority of the same, That the Honourable Benjamin Tooker, junr. Richard Lee, Benedict Calvert, Daniel Dulany, and Stephen Bordley, Esquires, and Colonel Edward Lightman, John Hammond, Matthew Tilghman, Charles Carroll, and William Murdock, Esquires, or a Majority of them, shall be and are hereby appointed a Committee to inspect, examine into, and consider of the said Collection, and they are hereby required to compare the same with the original Laws, as they shall find them recorded in the Secretary's Office, or in any other Office or Place in this Province where Records are kept, for which purpose they shall and may, from Time to Time, as they shall see convenient, have Recourse to the said Offices and Places, and free Access to the Records thereof, and shall also carefully examine and enquire, whether any Laws in Force or Use are omitted to be inserted in the said Collection, or any contained therein which are not in Force or Use; and having finished their Examination and Enquiry into the said Collection as aforesaid, shall lay the same, together with their Remarks and Opinion thereon, before the next General Assembly which shall thereafter happen, on or before the third Day of the Session; and in Case the said General Assembly shall approve thereof, then it shall and may be lawful for the said Thomas Bacon to proceed to the Printing and Publishing the same.

Provided nevertheless, and it is hereby Enacted and Declared, That all the Laws heretofore made, and more especially such, the Force or Existence whereof have been any ways questioned or disputed, shall remain, continue, and be in the same State and Condition, to all Intents, Constructions and Purposes whatsoever, as if the said Collection and Publication had never been made; and that no Law whatever, or any Part thereof, shall be repealed, abrogated, or made null or void, or receive any additional Force or Strength thereby. And for Encouragement of the said Thomas Bacon, and the better to enable him to Print and publish so useful a Work, Be it Enacted by the Lord Proprietary, by and with the Advice and Consent of his Lordship's Governor, and the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly, That there shall be allowed to the said Thomas Bacon, in the next public Journal of this Province, the Sum of Three Hundred Pounds Current Money for fifteen Copies of the said Collection, cast off on good Paper, in large Folios, and with a fair Copy, and Delivering the same, well Bound in half Skin and Lettered, to the Persons hereafter named; that is to say, one Copy thereof to his Excellency the Governor or Commander in Chief for the Time being, one to each Clerk of the two Houses of Assembly for the Use of their

respective Houses, one to the Clerk of the Provincial Court for the Use of the said Court, and one to the Clerk of each County Court for the Use of their respective Courts; which Sum of Three Hundred Pounds, after the same is collected, shall be by the several Sheriffs immediately paid to the Commissioners or Trustees for Emitting Bills of Credit, and the said Commissioners or Trustees are hereby required to keep a separate Account for the said Sum of Money, and shall pay the same to the said Thomas Bacon, upon his producing to them a Certificate from his Excellency the Governor or the Commander in Chief for the Time being, and from each of the Clerks above named, certifying that they have respectively received the said printed Copies well Bound and Lettered as aforesaid.

And be it further Enacted, That the said Committee, or a Majority of them, shall, and they are hereby required to meet at the City of Annapolis on the first Tuesday in April next, or on the Day following, to begin their said Examination and Enquiry, and shall and may adjourn from Time to Time as they find convenient, until they have finished the same; and for their Trouble in attending for the Purposes aforesaid, each of the said Committee shall have and receive the same Wages respectively as are allowed by Law to Councillors and Delegates serving in General Assembly, besides itinerant Charges, and no more; to be allowed to them in the Journal of Accounts of this Province.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Sachsenhausen, July 21.

WE have received the following authentic Relation of the Action near Epsoford of the 16th Instant, between the Troops, under the Command of the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, and those of the Enemy under Major-General de Glauibitz. Upon Advice that a Detachment of the Enemy, consisting of six Battalions, and the Regiment of Berchini, under the Command of Major-General de Glauibitz, was advancing towards Ziegenhain, and was actually encamped at Walberg; his Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince, was detached from Sachsenhausen the 15th at Night, for Fittlar, towards which Place six Battalions of the Army had already filed off. He marched early the next Morning to Zween, where General Luckner with his Regiment of Hussars, as also Elliott's Regiment of Light Dragoons (that were just arrived) joined him. They continued their march, and arrived that Evening at Treysa; but M. de Glauibitz had already marched from Walberg and encamped at Epsoford. Our Troops being fatigued, passed the Night at Treysa, and marched the 16th to Speckwinkel, where Major Fridrichs was posted with his Chasseurs, and to which Place Colonel Freytag had advanced with one of his Brigades. Our Infantry did not arrive till eleven in the Morning. The Hereditary Prince himself went forward and reconnoitred the Enemy's Position, and found their Camp placed at the foot of the Mountains, with their left extending to a Wood before Epsoford, with the Village of Ersoford before their Right; he took with him five Battalions, placed the Foot Chasseurs, and a Brigade of Chasseurs on Horseback at

the Head of an advanced Guard, and made a Detour of near two Leagues across the Woods, Mountains, and the Village of Wolskuter, in order to gain the left Flank of the Enemy, who thinking themselves very secure, were surprised in their Camp, and had only Time to place two Battalions upon their Flank; but these, after the first Attack made upon them by the Chasseurs, were routed by the second Regiment of Hessian Guards, the Colonel of which, M. Nauradt, was wounded at the first Discharge. Four Pieces of Cannon played from the Wood upon the Camp, and five Battalions immediately drew out, and wheeling about pushed the Enemy, who had scarce formed themselves behind their Camp. While this passed, General Luckner, whom the Prince had left in a Bottom before Speckwinkel with the Cavalry, and a Battalion of Bahr (Hanoverian) got up the Heights upon the first firing, and attacked the Right of the Enemy; (where M. de Glauibitz had placed Berchini's Regiment) and received a general Discharge from all the Musquetry of those that could get to their Arms, as well as from the Artillery that was ready to play. The Enemy was put to Flight, and passed a Wood which was behind them; the Rear Guard only shewing some Appearance of Resistance. All their Baggage, Artillery, and Tents, were taken. They retired by Langenstein, to which Place Bath's Battalion pursued them. From thence having thrown themselves into another Wood, the same Battalion passed through Langenstein, and posted themselves upon the Stone Bridge that is over the River Ohme.

During this Time, the Cavalry had got up to our Right, and keeping close to the Side of the Enemy, had cut them off from the Road that leads to Amenebourg; and it being impossible for our Infantry to follow them, the Hereditary Prince took with him Elliott's Regiment of Light Dragoons, got together some Hussars, and passed in Pursuit of them in the Wood, which they had reached on the other Side of the Ohme; and finding them again on their march in the Plain, in their Way to Niederkleyn, he charged and broke through them four or five different Times; at last separated 500 Men from the Body, surrounded them, and obliged them to lay down their Arms. Not satisfied with this, he marched against the Remainder of the Enemy's Infantry, which had thrown itself into Niederkleyn, and had fixed themselves near a Wood, surrounded them, and summoned them to surrender, which was accordingly done. Berchini's Regiment was likewise, either entirely taken, or cut to pieces by Luckner's Hussars.

Among the Prisoners of the greatest Note, are Major-General Glauibitz himself, and the Prince of Anhalt, who is a Brigadier; Count Heissenberg and Count Muschinski were killed by the same Cannon Ball. On our Side, the brave Colonel Freytag was dangerously wounded; M. Derenthal, Prince Ferdinand's Aid-de-Camp, received a Shot in his Thigh; M. Walmsden, Major of Brigade, had his Horse killed under him, and M. Normand, Major-General Bahr's Aid-de-Camp, had his Head taken off by the last Cannon Shot the Enemy fired. Our Losses has, upon the whole, not been very considerable. Our Trophies are nine Pieces of Cannon (almost all of which we owe to the Intrepidity of Elliott's Regiment, which, for its first Appearance in the Field, has done Wonders) five Pieces of Artillery, and a Haubitze. Major-General Bahr, and M. de Bichaulen, had the Honour to command the Infantry under the Prince's Orders, which shewed throughout the whole as much Courage as Good will, to march on and engage, though harassed and almost exhausted by the fatigues of their march.

Copy of a Letter from the Marquis of Granby to the Earl of Holderness.

My Lord,
IT is with the greatest Satisfaction, that I have the Honour of acquainting your Lordship of the Success of the Hereditary Prince, Yesterday Morning. General Sporcken's Corps marched from the Camp at Kalle to Liebenau, about Four in the Afternoon of the 29th; the Hereditary Prince followed, the same Evening, with a Body of Troops, among which were the two English Battalions of Grenadiers, the two of Highlanders, and four Squadrons of Dragoons, Cope's and Conway's. The Army was under Arms all Day on the 30th; and, about Eleven at Night, marched off in six Columns to

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Arbenau. About Five the next Morning, the whole Army assembled, and formed on the Heights near Oshelke. The Hereditary Prince was, at this Time, marching in two Columns, in order to turn the Enemy's left Flank; which he did, by marching to Donkelbourg, leaving Klein-Ederon his Left, and forming in two Lines, with his Left towards Dassel, and his Right near Grimbeck, opposite to the left Flank of the Enemy, whose Position was, with the Left to the high Hill near Oshelke, and their Right to Warbourg, into which Place they had flung Fischer's Corps. The Hereditary Prince immediately attacked the Enemy's Flank; and, after a very sharp Dispute, obliged them to give way; and, by a continual Fire, kept forcing them to fall back upon Warbourg. The Army was, at this Time, marching with the greatest Diligence to attack the Enemy in Front; but the Infantry could not get up in Time; General Waldegrave, at the Head of the British, pressed their March as much as possible; no Troops could show more Eagerness to get up, than they showed. Many of the Men, from the Heat of the Weather, and over-straining themselves to get on, through morosity and very difficult Ground, suddenly dropped down on their March.

General Moxley, who was at the British Cavalry that was formed on the Right of our Infantry, on the other Side of a large Wood, upon receiving the Duke's Orders to come up with the Cavalry as fast as possible, made so much Expedition, bringing them up at a full Trot, though the Distance was near five Miles, that the British Cavalry had the Happiness to arrive in Time, to share the Glory of the Day, having successfully charged, several Times, both the Enemy's Cavalry and Infantry.

I should do Injustice to the General Officers, to every Officer and private Man, of the Cavalry, if I did not beg your Lordship would assure his Majesty, that nothing could excite their gallant Behaviour on that Occasion.

Captain Phillips made so much Expedition with his Cannon, as to have an Opportunity, by a severe Cannonade, to oblige those who had passed the Dymel, and were formed on the other Side, to retire with the utmost Precipitation.

I received his Serene Highness's Orders Yesterday in the Evening, to pass the River after them, with the 12 British Battalions, and 10 Squadrons; and am now encamped upon the Heights of Wilda, about four Miles from Warbourg, on the Heights of which their grand Army is encamped.

M. de Mux is now retiring from the Heights of Volk-mussen, where he lay under Arms last Night, towards Wallshagen. I cannot give your Lordship an Account of the Loss on either Side. Captain Faucitt, whom I send off with this, shall get all the Intelligence he can upon this Head before he sets off. I am, &c. GRANTBY.

P. S. Saturday Morning Six o'Clock. As I had not an Opportunity of sending off Captain Faucitt to soon as I intended, I opened my Letter to acquaint your Lordship, that I have just joined the grand Army with my Detachment.

Rome, July 5. The Minister of Portugal having demanded an Audience of the Pope, the 2d Instant, it was refused him, because a Courier arrived a few Hours before from Cardinal Acciajoli, with Advice, that he had been obliged to leave Lisbon. Soon after another Courier arrived at the House of the Portuguese Minister, who immediately ordered all the Portuguese to quit Rome. It is computed there are 2000 of them in this City.

Cardinal Corsini having undertaken to compromise Matters, the Minister, and all that are dependent on the Crown of Portugal, are not yet set out; and Yesterday Morning a Courier was sent away to Lisbon with a Plan of Accommodation. In the mean Time it is agreed that the Portuguese shall suspend their Departure from hence for three Months.

The Neapolitan Troops still encamp on the Confines of the Ecclesiastical State, and the King of Sardinia's Army is encamped on the Banks of the Po.

Hamburg, July 11. All our Vessels which were detained in the Ports of France have been released.

Constantinople, June 18. The Plague has not been at Aleppo for 12 Years; at present it carries off every third Person. This is not the only Calamity which that City labours under. Numerous Gangs of Villains infest its Neighbourhood, who rob and murder all that come in their Way. The Basha's Lieutenant being sent in Pursuit of them with his Troops, they defeated him, and took him Prisoner, and after cutting off his Ears and Nose, sent him back to Aleppo.

According to Letters from Smyrna of the 10th of June, the Plague makes equal Havock in that City. All the Europeans of Fortune have fled to the Country.

Strasburg, the Capital of Wirtemberg, July 23. Our Troops began to be in Motion this Day. A Body of 12,000 Foot and Horse, with a Train of 40 Pieces of Cannon, will march through the Countries of Hohenlohe, Anspach, and Wurtzburg, into Saxony. They are to act as a separate Corps, under the Command of the Duke our Sovereign, who heads them himself, in Support of the common Cause, at his own private Expence.

Hannover, August 14. The Garrison of Osnabrug being composed only of Invalids, was ordered to evacuate that Place, and the French have accordingly taken Possession of it. A Detachment of the Garrison of Wesel has also taken Possession of the County of Bentheim, after seizing the Castle, where they took 70 Prisoners.

Things have been pretty quiet upon our Frontiers since General Luckner obliged the French to retire from Embeck. The Enemy's Troops and ours alternately occupy Nordheim. Our Hunters Yesterday attacked a Detachment of the Enemy near Nordheim, dispersed them, and took 300 Prisoners, with 10 Officers. The Corps de Reserve under the Command of Prince Xavierus of Saxony, retreated the 6th Instant, as far as Adelepfen, near Munden.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Warbourg, August 12. After the Defeat of the Corps commanded by M. de Mux the 21st of July near Warbourg, the Remains of which fled to Corbach, Marshal Broglie came and encamped with the main Army opposite Warbourg, with his Head Quarters at Oberhilling. M. de St. Victor, with 2000 Volunteers, was posted in the Wood of Sallabourg, which fills up the Corner formed by the Dymel and the Weiser. Prince Ferdinand gave Orders to drive them from thence, on which Account M. de Donop marched there the Day before Yesterday in the Evening, and attacked them Yesterday at Seven in the Morning, with so much Success, that after about an Hour's Engagement, he defeated and dispersed the whole Corps,

took three Pieces of Cannon, and above 200 Prisoners; and the Number of the Slain was very considerable.

The Count de Lutace, after having occupied the Town of Claßel, which we had evacuated, afterwards passed the Defile of Munden, and encamped with 20 Battalions, and 30 Squadrons, at Dransfeld, half Way on the Road to Gottin-gen. General Luckner is at Embeck. On the 9th he killed the Enemy upwards of 50 Men, and took 37 Prisoners, and among them five Officers. The 10th he attacked a Detachment near Salzerhalden, 64 of whom he left dead upon the Spot, and took 80 Prisoners, among whom were seven Officers. Yesterday near Nordheim he forced a Detachment of 332 Horse, under the Command of M. Vander Meer, to lay down their Arms, and surrender Prisoners of War. These Successes are, we hope, the Preludes to some decisive Stroke.

The March of the Wirtemberg Troops has met with some Obstacles. The Duke refused to march unless he was allowed to share in the Contributions which were to be raised in the Territories of the House of Brunswick, &c. which it was not thought proper to consent to; but he has Leave to plunder the flat Country, and to appropriate to himself whatever he can get by that Means; which seems to satisfy his Serene Highness. His Troops were to arrive the 19th at Meinungen, where they are to begin their Exploits.

L O N D O N, July 29.

Friday Afternoon fresh Orders were issued for eight Men more of each Company of the three Regiments of Foot Guards, to get immediately ready to follow those who went off in the Morning for Gravesend, in order to embark for Germany.

The whole Reinforcement intended to be sent will amount, it is said, to 10,000 effective Men, exclusive of Commission and Non-commission Officers, and Drums.

The Rope-houses and Store-houses, that were consumed by the late dreadful Fire at Portsmouth, are to be forthwith rebuilt on a new Plan, drawn up by an experienced Engineer, for their greater Security.

The Utrecht Gazette tells us, in an Article from Naples, "That on the 16th of June, about Four in the Afternoon, under the Sea of Portici, within Sight of Naples, there was a most terrible Earthquake: The Waters divided, and the People saw the Bottom dry, during the Space of two Minutes."

Letters by Yesterday's Mails advise, that they work Night and Day at Dunkirk in fitting out, at the Expence of the Government, a small Squadron of Frigates, to cruise in Concert.

August 5. We hear that General Elliot, who trained, by indefatigable Industry, the brave Fellows that have just done him and their Country so much Honour, at Embsdorf, will have the late Sir John Cope's Regiment of Dragoons; that Lord Pembroke will get Elliott's Light Horse; and that Major Esikine will succeed Lord Pembroke, as their Lieutenant-Colonel.

August 7. A Swedish Man of War of 36 Guns, coming from Seville, was accidentally burnt and blown up, in the Bay of Cadix.

August 9. By Accounts from all Parts of the Kingdom, there never was a greater Plenty of all Kinds of Grain.

From May 1, 1756, to July 25, 1760, 122 Vessels, belonging or consigned to the Port of Liverpool, have been taken by the French; 24 of which have been retaken, seven ransomed, three restored, two sunk, and one stranded.

The Behaviour of Elliott's new raised Regiment of Light Horse, the very first Time they were called upon, pleads more forcibly in Favour of a National Militia, than any Thing that has been, or that could be said in the Senate. It is certain that the highest Commendations are due to the Commanding Officer, who, by the most admirable Discipline, has in so short a Time rendered those Heroes an Over-match for French Veterans; but as it would be doing them the utmost Injustice to impute their Intrepidity entirely to Discipline, so it should follow (notwithstanding the Insinuations and Sneers of many Gentlemen of the Army and others, whose Interest it is to oppose it) that as our Countrymen in general already possess the most essential Constituents in the Character of a true Soldier, the Militia of these Kingdoms, properly disciplined, will prove as able, as they have shewn themselves willing, to repel any foreign Invasion; and we make no Doubt, had it had the same Opportunities, it would ever now have rivalled in Reputation the Swiss Militia, which few regular Forces have attacked with Impunity.

It is rumoured in Holland, that in Consequence of a secret Convention between the Courts of Vienna and Versailles, the Empress Queen is to cede to France, at the End of the War, in Consideration of the Assistance received from that Crown, not Ostend, and Newport, but the Duchy of Luxembourg.

August 12. Advertis from the Allied Army say, that within the Compass of six Weeks, some Thousands of French Deserters have gone over to the Allies.

August 19. Orders are sent to all the Officers appointed for the Custody of the French Prisoners of War in England, to keep a strict Watch over them.

August 23. There does not remain above Six Hundred Thousand Pounds unpaid of the Eight Millions subscribed to the last public Loan to the Government; and between Two or Three Millions of this Subscription were paid in many Months before the Payments became due, and this at a Time when our Enemies gave out that we were quite destitute of Money.

K I N G S T O N (in JAMAICA) September 6.

On Sunday last arrived at Port-Royal, his Majesty's Sloop of War Port-Antonio, — Gedoin, Esq; Commander, from a Cruise, and brought in three Prizes.

Thursday arrived at Port Royal, sent in by his Majesty's Ship Boreas, — Uvedale, Esq; Commander, a Polacco from Marfeilles, bound to Cape François; Captain Uvedale has also burnt, in the Mole of St. Nicola, a large French Sloop Privateer, mounting 14 Guns, and 150 Men, commanded by that Miscreant Fernandez (who inhumanly murdered Captain Stiles, as mentioned in a former Paper) the Wretch and his Crew made their Escape on Shore.

Same Evening was sent in by the Renown, — Mackenzie, Esq; Commander, a small French Sloop Privateer. And off the West End of this Island, another French Sloop Privateer is taken by the Cerberus, — Webber, Esq; Commander. B O S T O N, October 13.

Extra of a Letter from Lisbon, August 12, 1760.

"Last Friday was posted up at the Corners of the principal Streets in Lisbon, a Placart, commanding all Romans, the Subjects of the Pope, to retire out of this Kingdom before the End of next Month. In short, a Rupture is declared openly between this Court and the Court of Rome, and all Correspondence is stopt."

By a Gentleman, who came to Town last Wednesday, in 17 Days from Quebec, and 12 from Montreal, by the Way of Crown-Point, we learn, that Mr Vaudreuil and Levy, and all the French Regulars with their Officers, a Number of Merchants and other Inhabitants at Montreal, and Parts adjacent, that had not complied with the Articles of Capitulation, were gone from thence with their moveable Effects for Quebec, where a Number of Transports are provided, in order for a general Embarkation from thence to France. — That Major Elliot was appointed to command at the Bay of Chaleurs and Gaspee, and other Places down the River, and was to proceed thither with a Number of Troops to take Possession; the Capitulation including in it, as we hear, not only all Canada, but likewise all the Territories thereon depending. — And, that Major Rogers, with a large Body of Rangers, were gone out upon a distant Expedition towards Lake Superior.

We hear that the Antelope Man of War, Capt. Webb, has taken a French Frigate of 36 Guns, near the Streights of Belleisle; she was laden with Fish, and bound to France.

N E W - Y O R K, October 20.

Friday last the Ship Britannia, Captain Tillet, arrived here from Philadelphia: He sailed from thence the 30th ult. and in 3 Days after took in a Pilot at Sandy Hook, but the Wind being then contrary could not get up; and on the 7th Instant was drove to Sea, in a violent Hurricane at N. E. which continued almost without Intermission for 6 Days; most of which Time the Britannia was on her Beam Ends; when the Cargo shifted and the Chain Bolts were drawn out of the Sides without any Sail set. The 10th, the Height of the Gale, Capt. Tillet saw a large Ship with only her Fore-mast standing, but she being to Windward could not speak with her: The 13th he spoke with Captain Budden, in a Brig from Lisbon, loaded with Salt, for Philadelphia, who, in the same Gale, lost all his Masts, Boat, and Caboufe, and had two Men washed overboard. Captain Tillet supplied him with every Thing he wanted, helped him to raise Jury-Masts, took him in Tow for 36 Hours, and would have seen him safe into the Capes of Delaware, had not his Hawser broke, when he left him in Lat. 36, Lon. 71, steering his proper Course.

The several Companies of Colonel Montgomery's Highland Regiment, who lately returned from Albany, embarked on Thursday last, and fell down Yesterday, to proceed for Halifax.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, October 22.

Sunday last Captain Dingee arrived here from Jamaica. On the 6th Instant he met with a violent Gale of Wind off of Cape Hatteras, in which his Ship was thrown on her Beam Ends, which obliged him to throw over board some of his Guns, and he received considerable Damage in his Cargo.
