

Berman: Photographs, Paintings & Installations

The Department of Visual Arts will present a lecture by photographer and installation artist Michael Berman on Friday, Feb. 3, 6 p.m. in Fine Arts room 132. Following the lecture, a reception will be held in the Stephanie Ann Roper Art Gallery for Berman's newest installation. The installation can be viewed in the Roper Gallery from Sunday through Wednesday from 1 to 4 p.m. The final day for this event is Wednesday, Feb. 22.

Berman's work is a record of his wanderings of the borderlands of the Southwest and Mexico. He is attracted to un-peopled places where he walks and photographs.

Berman's work is firmly rooted in both the contemporary and the classical tradition. His classically executed black and white photographs participate in and extend the romantic tradition of Western landscape photography. He avoids the spectacular, however, in favor of small and unnoticed scenes or vast empty views. The photographs reveal both the complexity and abstraction of nature, while the installations seek to find a place for man within it.

For seven years, Berman has photographed El Gran Desierto, the 6,000-square-mile swath of desert along the Southwest Arizona and Sonora border.

drive his aging father to Mecca for the traditional pilgrimage. From the start, the journey promises to be difficult, as Reda and his father have nothing in common. They are separated by culture, language and religion. Reda is a modern young man who does not speak Arabic and cares little about his father's deep sense of religion. Through Italy, Serbia, Turkey, Syria, Jordan and Saudi Arabia, Reda and his father interact minimally and the grandiose settings and often desolate landscapes reflect this uneasiness. As their journey progresses, their adventures and misadventures bring father and son closer, forcing mutual recognition and reconciliation. In Mecca, where the filmmaker received rare permission to shoot, Reda's father disappears in the crowd of pilgrims, never to return. The film challenges preconceived ideas about Islam. (France, 2004, 108 Minutes)

'Vagina Monologues' to Highlight Month's Events

FSU will present Eve Ensler's Obie Award-winning play "The Vagina Monologues" on Friday and Saturday, Feb. 17 and 18, at 9 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall. All proceeds will benefit the Family Crisis Resource Center in Cumberland and the Dove Center of Garrett County. The play is being performed as part of V-Day, a campaign to stop violence against women and girls around the world.

This is the fifth year FSU has marked V-Day. Through campaigns, local volunteers and college students, annual benefit performances of "The Vagina Monologues" are produced to raise awareness and funds for anti-violence groups within their communities.

The V-Day College Campaign strives to empower women to find their collective voices and demand an end to the epidemic levels of violence and abuse on their campuses, in their communities and around the world. Through benefit productions of "The Vagina Monologues" on or around V-Day (Feb. 14), they raise money and awareness to stop violence against women and girls.

In 2005, more than 2,500 V-Day events took place in the U.S. and around the world. To date, V-Day has raised over \$30 million and educated millions about the issue of violence against women and the efforts to end it; crafted international educational, media and PSA campaigns; reopened shelters; funded safe houses in Kenya, South Dakota, Egypt and Iraq; and funded over 5,000 community-based anti-violence programs. Spring Writers' Series Kicks Off with Poetry

FSU's Center for Creative Writing and Department of English promise a lively beginning to the spring visiting writers' series with a reading from poet BJ Ward on Thursday, Feb. 9, at 7:30 p.m. in Lane University Center 142.

With poems such as "Upon Hearing that Baseball is Boring to America's Youth," "Sex with Emily Dickinson" and "Roy Orbison's Last Three Notes," Ward's work ranges from pop culture spins to

meditations on morality, music and myth. His poems have earned him high praise from many reviewers, including from Pulitzer Prize winning poet Stephen Dunn, who said, "In poems that both honor and transcend his blue

collar roots, BJ Ward blends poignancy and humor with downright good storytelling and takes his place among the bright up-and-coming voices of his generation."

Ward's most recent book of poetry, "Gravedigger's Birthday," was a finalist for the Paterson Poetry Prize. His two earlier volumes are "17 Love Poems with No Despair" and "Landing in New Jersey with Soft Hands."

The recipient of a 2003 Pushcart Prize for Poetry and a 2003 Distinguished Artist Poetry Fellowship from the New Jersey State Council on the Arts, Ward has been featured on National Public Radio's "The Writer's Almanac," the New Jersey Network's "State of the Arts," and Poetry Daily, as well as in publications such as "TriQuarterly," "Poetry," "Painted Bride Quarterly," "Puerto Del Sol," "Mid-American Review," "Long Shot," "Natural Bridge," "Kimera," "I Lore," "The Sun," "The Hiram Poetry Review," The New York Times, "Spitball,"
"The Paterson Literary Review," "LIPS" and a host of other journals. In 2002, one of his poems ("For the Children of the World Trade Center Victims") was cast in bronze and acquired as part of the permanent collection at Grounds for Sculpture, an outdoor sculpture museum in Hamilton, N.J. He teaches at Warren County Community College in northern New Jersey.

Ward's reading will be followed by a reception, sponsored by the Office of Student and Community Involvement, and a book signing. The event is free and open to the public. For more information, call the Center for Creative Writing at x4024.



Faculty Artist Series Sets Clarinet-Piano Recital

FSU's Faculty Artist Series will feature clarinet instructor Mark Gallagher and guest artist Michael Adcock in a recital of clarinet and piano music on Sunday, Feb. 19, at 3 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall.

The program includes "Vier Stücke für Klarinette und Klavier, op. 5" by Alban Berg, "Sonate für Klarinette und Klavier, f-moll, op. 120, no. 1 by Johannes Brahms, "Deuxième Sonate pour Clarinette et Pianoforte, op. 28" by François Devienne and "Drei Romanzen für Klarinette und Klavier, op. 94 by Robert Schumann.

Gallagher made his New York recital debut performing with violinist Sylvia Rosenberg at Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall and is also a winner of the Artist International Competition in New York City. An active chamber musician and co-founder of I Venti Semplice, Dr. Gallagher has performed throughout the United States and Europe, with a recent concert tour of the Netherlands which included a live national radio broadcast from the Concertgebouw. Dr. Gallagher has recorded with the Albany Records label and can be heard on the Eastman "American Music" Series.

In addition to a busy performance schedule, Dr. Gallagher is an active teacher and clinician, lecturing on occupational health issues for musicians and the Alexander Technique.

Winner of the 1998 Lili Boulanger Memorial Award, pianist Adcock has cultivated a versatile career as both a soloist and frequent chamber music collaborator. Adcock made his Carnegie Recital Hall debut in December of 1998, and his career has taken him to France, Italy and Australia, as well as a performance with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra.

A former Artist-in-Residence at the Aspen Institute on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, Adcock recently completed the Doctorate of Musical Arts at The Peabody Conservatory, where he was also an adjunct member of the theory and chamber music faculties. Adcock resides in Washington, D.C., where he maintains an active performance and teaching schedule, in addition to being a member of The Washington Conservatory of Music

CoB Earns AACSB Int'l Accreditation

FSU's College of Business has joined a select number of business colleges worldwide in earning accreditation from AACSB International – The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business.

FSU is one of nine schools of business recently added to AACSB's roster of accredited institutions, bringing the total to only 515 internationally, fewer than 10 percent of schools worldwide that have achieved this designation.

"AACSB accredits excellence, rather than just requiring us to meet minimum standards," said FSU's dean of the College of Business, Dr. Danny Arnold. "It's an external validation of quality."

"AACSB accreditation represents the highest achievement for an educational institution involved in management education," adds John J. Fernandes, president and chief executive officer of AACSB International. "The faculties, deans, directors and administrative staffs of our newly accredited schools are to be commended for their role in earning initial accreditation."

Accreditation with AACSB International involves applicant schools undergoing meticulous internal review, evaluation and adjustment - a process that can take from three to seven years. During this period, schools develop and implement a plan intended to meet the 21 AACSB standards that ensure high quality of management education. FSU's business faculty toiled for the past five years through the candidacy process to achieve accreditation, and worked the previous five years to qualify for candidacy, Arnold said. The College of Business made changes over the past years in everything from its vision statements, to its curriculum to its methods of evaluating students.

"Dean Arnold and the faculty, students and staff of the College of Business have demonstrated levels of excellence that have earned them this coveted distinction," said Dr. Catherine R. Gira, FSU President. "The University is indebted to them for their dedication and leadership."

"Earning AACSB accreditation requires a great deal of dedication from the entire educational institution," said Jerry Trapnell, chief accreditation officer of AACSB International. "Schools that go through the process not only meet a multitude of standards of excellence, but also make a commitment to continuous improvement. Every five years they will be required to undergo a rigorous peer review to maintain their accreditation."

Consider Teaching an Honors Seminar

Faculty and administrators: Enliven your teaching and share your expertise with our upper-level Honors students. The Honor Program Advisory Group is looking for Honors Seminars (IDIS 491) for summer and fall 2006. Honors seminars allow for interdisciplinary exploration of a topic and experimentation with pedagogy. The format of the seminars has varied. For some seminars, one instructor has led the class and used guest lecturers to incorporate interdisciplinary perspectives. Other seminars have been team-taught. Some have been offered exclusively as Honors Seminars. Others have been co-listed as upper-level courses in a department.

Proposals for summer 2006 and fall 2006 seminars are due by **Feb. 5** and should be sent to Honors Program Advisory Group c/o Maureen Connelly (Honors Program, 19 Braddock Road).

When a seminar is offered exclusively for Honors students, the faculty member's department can be reimbursed in order to provide contractual or overload support.

Guidelines for Proposals:

Proposals must include a syllabus with course description, readings and activities, assignments, objectives, grading criteria and policies. In addition, the proposal should include a statement providing evidence of how the course meets the following criteria for Honors courses:

- The course should demonstrate Honors quality
- The course should incorporate activities that foster independent inquiry and critical thinking
 - The syllabus must include writing

assignments appropriate to the course (for example, lab reports, data analysis, essay examinations, etc.) and clear standards for evaluating these assignments.

- The course should incorporate multiple perspectives within or outside the discipline. Critical thinking about the topic or discipline (its assumptions, methods, etc.) is considered to be a fundamental aspect of an Honors course.
- Integrative/interdisciplinary elements are seen as fundamental aspects of Honors Seminars. Teamteaching of the seminars is therefore encouraged. In lieu of team-teaching, provisions should be made for the use of guest lecturers and other resources outside the discipline of the instructor.
- Proposals should also include a statement from the faculty member's department chair agreeing to the reassignment of the individual to the seminar for the proposed semester.

The catalog description is: IDIS 491 – Honors Seminar Course Description: An interdisciplinary study of a particular topic. Activities emphasize student discussions of assigned readings, oral and written reports. Topics vary each semester. Course may be repeated.

Prerequisites: Participation in the University Honors Program and junior or senior standing or permission of the instructor(s).

Honors Seminar Course Objectives

The Honors Seminar course is intended to perform numerous functions for both the individual student(s) and the overall FSU Honors Program.

- The course may allow for the participation of departments and faculty unable to offer Honors variants of lower division GEP courses.
- The course is intended to help integrate the students' lower division Honors course work by emphasizing the interdisciplinary nature of in-depth topic investigation.
- The course is intended to address an overall limitation in traditional education the tendency to approach content and methodology from the perspective of a single and seemingly separate disciplinary perspective.

We see the following objectives as common to all Honors Seminar courses. Specific objectives vary with the subject of the seminar:

- To foster an in-depth understanding of a specific topic;
- To explore the methodologies and perspectives currently used to understand this topic;
- To foster an awareness of the commonalties and differences in various disciplinary approaches;
- To foster an appreciation of the complexities and limitations of existing knowledge bases;
- To facilitate the students' development of critical thinking and abstract thinking;
- To foster the students' ability to direct their own learning and develop the characteristics of life-long learners.

John O'Rorke, Political Science, attended the Northeastern Political Science Association's annual meeting in Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 16-19. While at the conference O'Rorke presented on "Training Students to be Successful in On-line Learning Environments," and served as chair/discussant for a panel on "Innovative Topics and Techniques in Teaching." O'Rorke was reappointed as section chair for Teaching, Learning, & the Profession for the 2007 conference.

Dr. Mohammed Eltayeb, a member of the Department of Engineering at FSU, has become the seventh FSU recipient of the Henry C. Welcome Fellowship, an incentive program designed to help colleges and universities attract and maintain a diverse faculty.

Awards are made to new, full time, minority faculty members whose appointments will improve the diversity of their institutions. The \$20,000 award from the Maryland Higher Education Commission is paid over a three-year period and is designed to assist the fellow with research or other academic development through a variety of means.

Eltayeb completed his undergraduate degree at the University of Khartoum, Sudan, and graduated with honors. He then earned his master's degree in electrical engineering at the University of Akron, Ohio, where he served as a graduate teaching associate. Eltayeb went on to earn his Ph.D. in electrical and computer engineering from The Ohio State University.

In addition to serving as a graduate teaching associate at the University of Akron, Eltayeb also taught at The Ohio State University as a graduate teaching associate and then as an assistant professor in the Department of Electrical Engineering.

Eltayeb teaches a variety of courses including digital logic design, electronics and instrumentation, physics, computer organizations and other electrical engineering courses.

Previous Welcome Fellows at FSU are *Harlowe Hodges*, assistant professor in the FSU Department of Visual Arts, *Dr. Trina Redmond*, assistant professor of psychology, *Dr. Carole G. Parker*, who teaches graduate-level courses in the Department of Business Management, *Dr. Baxter B. Wright*, professor of Social Work, *Dr. Jean Marie Makang*, assistant professor or philosophy, and former FSU history professor *Gersham Nelson*.

The fellowship is in honor of the late Dr. Henry C. Welcome, a prominent Baltimore physician and former member of the Maryland State Board for Higher Education, predecessor to the Maryland Higher Education Commission.




AustraLearn New Summer Programs
