CES Series Offers Exciting Spring Season

CES Presents Esperanza Spalding Quartet



Jazz enthusiasts are in for a treat when jazz vocalist, bassist and composer Esperanza Spalding performs with the Esperanza Spalding Quartet at Windsor Hall **Sunday, Feb. 8**, as part of FSU's Cultural Events Series Jazz Club sponsored by Kauffman Music. Patrons have the option of a 5 p.m. Supper Club or 6:30 p.m. concert only.

Blessed with tremendous talent, a multilingual voice that been described as "part

angel and part siren" and a natural beauty, Spalding might be the hope for the future of jazz and instrumental music. While singing and playing the bass interchangeably, she adds a kind of interpretive dance to the mix, making her performances memorable and fresh, while introducing jazz to younger audiences. Critic Ed Morales describes Spalding's music as "a sprawling collage of jazz fusion, Brazilian and even a touch of hip-hop."

Born and raised in Portland, Ore., by the time she was 5, Spalding had taught herself to play the violin and was playing with the Chamber Music Society of Oregon, made up of musicians of all ages. She stayed until she was 15 and left as concertmaster.

Home-schooled as a child, Spalding continued her education by enrolling in Portland State University's music program at age 16. Ultimately, this led to her enrollment in the Berklee School of Music, which opened many doors for her. Almost immediately on graduation at age 20, she became one of the youngest people to join the faculty at the Berklee School as an instructor. In 2005, she received the Boston Jazz Society scholarship for outstanding musicianship.

Spalding has recorded two albums: "Junjo" (2006) and "Esperanza" (2008). Her music may be heard on her Web site, www.esperanzaspalding.com.

The Esperanza Spalding Quartet performance begins at 6:30 p.m. Concert goers may prefer to purchase a Supper Club ticket, which entitles them to dinner plus a concert. The Supper Club option provides the ticket holder with a special table with preferred seating for the performance and a choice of a specially designed meal from Kozy Kettle featuring one of two entrees - eggplant parmesan or chicken and beef marsala. Staking Our Claim FSU Foundation Launches \$15 Million Campaign

Steering Committee Named to Lead "Staking Our Claim" Fundraising Effort

The FSU Foundation Inc. recently launched the public phase of its comprehensive \$15 million campaign, Staking Our Claim: The Campaign for Frostburg. Designed to support the mission of FSU, this fundraising effort comes at a critical time in the history of the institution and Western Maryland. Nearly \$8.5 million has already been committed as of the end of 2008.

Staking Our Claim is named in recognition of the tenacious community of coal miners and other local citizens who struggled to found State Normal School No. 2 more than 100 years ago. It has three areas of focus: Student Enrichment, Academic Enrichment and Regional and Cultural Enrichment, all integral parts of the mission of the regional comprehensive university that grew from that Normal School for teachers.



A steering committee of alumni and community leaders has been named to quide the effort. It is chaired by **Quincy Crawford** of Annapolis, Md., a 1965 Frostburg graduate who is the

retired President and CEO of First Financial Group, the largest privately held financial planning firm in the Mid-Atlantic region. Crawford, a leader in industry affairs, has been the recipient of numerous honors over his career, including the 2004 FSU College of Business Alumnus of the Year.



He is joined on the steering committee by Carl "Buck" Belt Jr. of Cumberland, Md., Mary Clapsaddle of Arnold, Md., and Kenneth **Oldham** of Germantown, Md.

Belt is a Western Maryland business and community leader. He is President of the general contracting firm Carl Belt Inc., whose reputation for quality and well-managed projects has continued to grow under his leadership. He has also expressed his community commitment through his involvement with numerous charitable and civic organizations in Allegany County.

Since the University's history is an essential part of this fundraising effort, two new leadership annual giving societies have been created in honor of two past University presidents who played significant roles in FSU history, Nelson P. Guild and Lillian C. Compton. Guild led the institution through an exceptional period of growth and expansion in enrollment, facilities and new program development through the 1970s and '80s. The Nelson P. Guild Society recognizes annual donations of \$2,500 to \$4,999. Compton played a critical role in saving what was then Frostburg State Teachers College from closure in the 1940s. The Lillian C. Compton Society denotes yearly contributions of \$5,000 or more.

Safety Message 1 Walk Safety – Like a Penguin

The sidewalks at FSU are often icy this time of year (no matter how carefully cleared!). Keep the following safety tips in mind when walking around campus.

- Assume all wet, dark areas on pavements are slippery and icy.
- Avoid shoes with smooth soles and heels. Wear shoes or boots that provide traction on snow and ice, e.g., boots of non-slip rubber or neoprene with grooved soles.
- Be careful getting into and out of your car. Use the vehicle for support.
- Walk in designated walkways as much as possible. Look ahead. You may need to travel along a grassy edge if you're going uphill on a snow- or ice-covered sidewalk or driveway.
- Point your feet out slightly like a penguin. Spreading your feet out while walking on ice increases your center of gravity.
- Bend slightly and walk flat-footed with your center of gravity directly over the feet.
- Extend your arms out to your sides to maintain balance.
- Keep your hands out of your pockets. You can break your fall with your hands if you slip.
- Watch where you are going and go slowly.
- Take short steps or shuffle.
- Wear a heavy, bulky coat that will cushion your fall.
- Avoid landing on your knees, wrists or spine. Try to fall on a fleshy part of the body, like your side.
- Try to relax your muscles if you fall.
