President's Message.

WASHINGTON CITY, DEC. 5. The President of the United States this day communicated by MR. EDWARD COLES his private Secretary, the following MESSAGE TO CONGRESS: Fellow Citizens of the Senate, and of the House of Representatives,

The embarafiments which have prevailed in our foreign relations, and fo much ema primary duty, in meeting you, to communicate whatever may have occurred, in that branch of our national affairs.

The act of the last fession of Congress sconcerning the commercial intercourse betreen the United States and G. Britain and France and their dependencies," having invited, in a new form, a termination of their slicks against our neutral commerce, copies of the act were immediately forwarded to our ministers at London and Paris; with a ly attention of the French and British goveraments.

By the communication received thro' our minister at Paris, it appeared, that a knowledge of the att by the French government, was followed by a declaration that the Berlin and Milan decrees were revoked, and would rease to have effect on the first day of November enfuing. These being the only known edicts of France, within the description of the act, and the revocation of them being fuch that they ceafed, at that date to violate our neutral commerce ; the fact as prescribed by law, was announced by a pro-clamation bearing date the 2d of November.

It would have well accorded with the conciliatory views, indicated by this proceeding on the part of France, to have extended them to all the grounds of just complaint, which now remain unadjusted with the United States. It was particularly anticipated that, as a further evidence of just dispositions towards them, restoration would have been immediately marle of the property of our citizens feized under a misapplication of the principal of the reprifals, combined with a misconstruction of a law of the U. States. This expectation has not been fulfilled.

From the British government no communication on the subject of the act has been received. To a communication from our minister at London of the revocation, by the French government, of its Berlin and Milan decrees, it was answered that the British system would be relinquished as soon as the repeal of the French decrees should have actually taken effect, and the commerce of neutral nations have been restored to the condition in which it stood previously to the promulgation of those decrees. This pledge although it does not necessarily import, does not exclude the intention of relinquishing, along with the orders in council, the practice of those novel blockades which have a like effest of interrupting our neutral commerce. And this further justice to the United States the blockades in question, being not more self more than a recompense for those contrary to the established law of nations, privations and losses resulting from forther than a recompense for those than a recompense for those contrary to the established law of nations, than inconfistent with the rules of blockade reign injustice, which furnished the formally recognized by Great Britain herself, could have no alleged basis, other than the plea of retaliation, alleged as the basis of the orders in council. Under the modification of the original orders of November 1807, into the orders of April 1809, there is indeed scarcely a nominal distinction between the orders and the blockades. One of those illegitimate blockades, bearing date in May 1806, having been expressly avowed to be still unrescinded, and to be in effect, comprehended, in the orders in council, was too diffinelly brought within the purview of the act of Congress, not to be comprehended in the explanation of the requilites to a compliance with it. The British government was accordingly apprifed by our minifter near it, that fuch was the light in which the subject was to be regarded.

On the other important subjects depending between the United States and that government, no progress has been made, from which an early and satisfactory result can be

In this new posture of our relations with those powers, the consideration of congress will be properly turned to a removal of doubts which may occur in the exposition, and of difficulties in the execution, of the

The commerce of the United States, with the north of Europe, heretofore much vexed by licentious truifers, particularly under the Danish flag, has latterly been visited with fresh and extensive depredations. The mealures purfued in behalf of our injured citizens not having obtained justice for them, a

the Danish government is contemplated. The principles which have been maintained by that and the friendly professions of his Danish majefty towards the United States, are valuable pledges in favour of a successful issue.

Among the events growing out of the state of the Spanish Monarchy, our attention was imperiously attracted to the change, developing itself in that portion of West Florida, which, tho' of right appertaining to the United States, had remained in the possession or Spain, awaiting the result of negotiations for its actual delivery to them. The Spanish authority was subverted; and a situation produced, exposing the country to ulterior events, which might essentially affect the rights and welfare of the Union. In such a conjuncture, I did not delay the interpoview that its object might be within the ear- sition required for the occupancy of the territory west of the river Perdido, to which the title of the United States extends, and to which the laws, provided for the territory of Orleans, are applicable. With this view, the proclamation, of which a copy is laid before you, was confided to the governor of that territory, to be carried into ffect. The legality and necessity of the course pursued, assure me of the favourable light in which it will present itself to the legislature, and of the promptitude with which they will supply, whatever provisions may be due to the essential rights and equitable interests of the people thus brought into the bosom of the American family.

Our amity with the Powers of Barbary, with the exception of a recent occurrence at Tunis, of which an explanation is just received, appears to have been uninterrupted, and to have become more firmly established.

With the Indian tribes, also, the peace and friendship of the U. States are found to be so eligible, that the general disposition to preserve both continues to gain strength.

I feel particular satisfaction in remarking that an interior view of our country presents us with grateful proofs of its substantial and increasing prosperity .- To a thriving agriculture, and the improvements related to it, is added a highly interesting extension of useful manufactures; the combined product of professional occupations, and of household industry. Such, indeed, is the experience of economy, as well as of policy, in these substitutes for supplies heretofore obtained by foreign commerce, that, in a national view, the change is justly regarded as of itgeneral impulse required for its accomplishment. How far it may be expedient to guard the infancy of this improvement in the distribution of labour, by regulations of the commercial tariff, is a subject which cannot fail to suggest itself to your patriotic reflections.

It will rest with the consideration of congress, also, whether a provident, as well as fair encouragement, would not be given to our navigation, by such regulations as will place it on a level of competition with foreign vessels, particularly in transporting the important and bulky productions of our own soil. The failure of equality and reciprocity in the existing regulations on this subject, operates, in our ports, as a premium to foreign competitors; and the inconvenience must increase, as these may be multiplied, under more favourable circumstances, by the more than countervailing encouragements now given them, by the laws of their respective countries.

Whilst it is universally admitted that a well instructed people alone can be permanently a free people; and whilst it is evident that the means of diffusing and improving useful knowledge form so small a proportion of the expenditures for national purposes, I cannot presume it to be unseasonable to invite your attention to the advantages of

further and more formal interpolition with superadding, to the means of education provided by the several states, a seminary of learning, instituted by the nagovernment in relation to neutral commerce, tional legislature, within the limits of their exclusive jurisdiction; the expense of which might be defrayed, or reimbursed, out of the vacant grounds which have accrued to the nation within those limits.

Such an institution, though local in its legal character, would be universal in its beneficial effects. By enlightening the opinions; by expanding the patriotism; and by assimilating the principles, the sentiments and the manners of those who might resort to this temple of science, to be re-distributed, in due time, through every part of the community; sources of jealousy and prejudice would be diminished, the features of national character would be multiplied, and greater extent given to social harmony. But above all, a well constituted seminary, in the centre of the nation, is recommended by the consideration, that the additional instruction emanating from it, would contribute not less to strengthen the foundations than to adorn the structure, of our free and happy system of government.

Among the commercial abuses still committed under the American flag, and leaving in force my former reference to that Subject, it appears that American citizens are instrumental in carrying on a traffic in enflaved Africans, equally in violation of the laws of bumanity, and in defiance of those of their own country. The same just and benevolent motives which produced the interdiction in force against this criminal conduct, will doubtless be felt by congress, in deviling further means of suppressing the evil.

In the midst of uncertainties, necessarily connected with the great interests of the United States, prudence requires a continuance of our defensive and precautionary arrangements. The fecretary of war and fe-cretary of the navy will fubmit the state-ments and estimates which may aid Congress, in their enfuing provisions for the land and naval forces. The flatements of the latter will include a view of the transfers of appropriations in the naval expenditures, and the

grounds on which they were made.

The fortifications for the defence of our maritime frontier, have been profecuted according to the plan laid down in 1808. The works, with some exceptions, are completed, and furnished with ordnance. Those for the security of the city of New-York, though far advanced towards completion, will require a further time and appropriation.

This is the case with a few others either not completed, or in need of repairs.

The improvements, in quality and quantity made in the manutactory of cannon, and of small a ma, both at the public armories, and private factories, warrant additional confidence the competency of these resources, for supplying the public exigencies.

These preparations for arming the militia having thus far provided for one of the ebjects contemplated by the power vefled in congress, with respect to that great bulwark of the public fafety; it is for their confideration, whether further provisions are not requifite, for the other contemplated objects, of organization and discipline. To give to this great mass of physical and moral force, the efficiency which it merits, and is capable of receiving; it is indispensable that they should be instructed and practised in the rules by which they are to be governed. Towards an accomplishment of this important work, I recommend for the confideration of congress the expediency of inflituting a fyflem, which shall, in the first instance, call into the field, at the public expense, and for a given time, certain portions of the commissioned and non commissioned officers.

The instruction and discipline thus acquired would gradually diffuse through the entire body of the militia that practical knowledge and promptitude for active fervice, which are the great ends to be purfued. Experience has left no doubt, either of the necessity, or of the efficacy of competent military fkill, in those portions of an army, in fitting it for the final duties, which it may have to perform.

The corps of engineers, with the military academy, are entitled to the early attention of congress. The buildings at the seat fixt by law for the present academy, are so far in decay, as not to afford the necessary accommodation. dation. But a revision of the law is recommended, principally with a view to a more en-larged cultivation and diffusion of the advan-tages of such institutions, by providing pro-fessorships for all the necessary branches of

military instruction, and by the establish of an additional academy at the feat of vernment or elfewhere. The means by war, as well for defence, as for offence how carried on, render these schools of more scientistic operations an indespensable of every adequate fystem.

Even among nations, whose large star armies, and frequent wars afford every opportunity of instruction, these establishments are found indispensable, for the du tainment of the branches of iniliary fci which require a regular course of study experiment. In a government, happily out the other opportunities, feminaries, w the elementary principles of the art of can be taught without actual war, and out the expense of extensive and standing mits, have the precious advantage of un an effential preparation against external ger, with a scrupulous regard to internal s ty. In no other way, probably, can a pro-on of equal efficacy for the public defebe made at so little expense, or more co-tently with the public liberty.

The receipts into the treasury during year ending on the 30th of Sept. laft, (an mounting to more than eight millions an half of dollars) have exceeded the curr expenses of the government, including interest on the public debt. DOCUMENTS

ACCOMPANYING THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

From the National Intelligencer.

From among the voluminous mais of documents, accompanying the Message of the Prefident, we have felected the following which appear to us particularly intereffing :

From the Secretary of State to Governor Claiborne,

Department of State, OCT. 27, 1810.

SIR, From the enclosed Proclamation of the Prelident of the United States, you will perceive his determination to take possession of the territory therein specified, in the name and behalf of the United States ; the confiderations which have confirmed him to refort to this necessary measure, and his direction that you, as governor of the Orleans Territory, shall execute the same. Of this Proclamation, upon your arrival at Natchez, you will, without delay, cause to be printed as many copies, in the English, French and Spanifli languages, as may be deemed necelfary, and you will cause the same to be extenfively circulated throughout the faid ter-

You will immediately proceed by the neareft & belt route to the town of Washington in the Millifippi Territory. From the Secretary at War you will receive an order to the officers commanding the feveral frontier polts to afford you fuch affiftance in paffing the Wildernels and in descending the West ern Waters as you may require. And, as defpatch is very deficable, you are authorifed, in case your horses should fail, to procuse others at the public expence. After having made at Washington the necessary arrange ments with Gov. Holmes and with the commanding officer of the regular troops, you will without delay proceed into the faid territory, and, in victue of the Prefident's Proclamation, take poll flion of the lame in the name and in behalf of the U. States.

As the diffriet, the possession of which you are directed to take, is to be confidered as making part of the Territory of Orleans, you will, after taking pollefiion, lose no time in proceeding to organize the militia, to prefcribe the bounds of parifhes, to establish parish courts, and finally to do whatever your legal powers applicable to the cafe will warrant and may be calculated to maintain order, to secure to the inhabitants the peaceable enjoyment of their liberty, property and religion, and to place them, as far as may be, on the same footing with the inhabitants of the other diffricts under your authority. As far as your powers may be inadequate to these and other requisite objects the Legislature of Orleans, which it is understood will foon be in fellion, will have an opportunity of making further provisions for them, more especially for giving by law to the inhabitants of the faid Territory a just share in the representation of the General Assembly ; it being defirable that the interval of this privation should not be prolonged beyond the unavoidable necessity of the case.

If contrary to expectation, the occupation of this Territory on the part of the United States should be opposed by force; the commanding officer of the regular troops on the Miffifippi will have orders from the Secretay at War to afford you upon your application, the requilite aid, and should an additional force be deemed necessary, you will draw from the Orleans Territory, as will Governor Holmes from the Mifliflippi Territory, mili tia in fuch numbers, and in fuch proportions from your respective territories as you and Governor Holmes may deem proper .-Should, however, any particular place, however small, remain in possession of a Spanish force, you will not proceed to employ force, against it; but you will make immediate report thereof to this department.

You will avail yourself of the first favourable opportuny that may occur to transmit to the feveral governors of the Spanish provinces in the neighbourhood, copies of the Prefident's Proclamation with accompanying letters of a conciliatory tendency.

To defray any reasonable expenditures which may neceffarily attend the execution of these instructions, the President authorises you, having due regard to economy, to draw for a fum not exceeding in any event 20,000 dollarz.

For the confidence which the Prefident justly has in your judgment and discretion he is persuaded that in the execution of this truft, as delicate as it is important, your department will be temperate and conciliatory. Such a line of conduct towards the inhabitants is prescribed as well by policy as by jus-

You will, it is expected, be fully fenfible of the necessity, not only of communicating every important event that may occur in the progress of this business, but of transmitting a letter, whatever may be its contents, by every mail to this city.

Confidering moreover, that under the seculiar and imperative circumflances a fa bearance on the part of the United States ccupy the territory in question, and tierri guard against the confusions & contingenci which threaten it, might be confirmed min dereliction of their title, or an infentibility the importance of the stake : confident that in the hands of the U. States it wi not cease to be a subject of fair and friend regotiation and adjustment : confidence. ally, that the acts of congress, though co templating a prefent policifion by a foreign authority, have contemplated also an event tual pofferiion of the faid territory by the U nited States, and are accordingly fo frame as in that case to extend in their operation to the fame 1

Now be it known, that I, James Madifer President of the United States of America in pursuance of these weighty and unco-considerations, have deemed it right and re quisite, that possession should be taken of the faid territory, in the name and behalf of the United States. William C. C. Cal borne, Governor of the Orleans Territory of which the faid territory is to be taken a part, will accordingly proceed to execute the fame ; and to exercise over the faid territor the authorities and functions legally apper taining to his office. And the good people inhabiting the fame, are invited and enjoined to pay due respect to him in that character; to be obedient to the laws; to maintain order ; to cheriff harmony ; & in every mances to conduct themselves as peaceful citizens under full afforance, that they will be protected in the enjoyment of their liberty, pro-

THE officers of this Society shall be a Prelident, Secretary, Treasurer and Board of Managers. There shall be eight managers, and the prefident of the Socky shall e ez ofició president of the Board.

I la cafe of a vacancy in the board of masagers, they shall, at their next meeting, elect a person to supply it; and an appointment, fo made, thall continue until the next meeting of the Society.

rour managers, with the prelident, or, in his absence, five managers, shall be quocommitted to them-Any Smaller number. to be agreed upon by the Board, shall be authorifed to execute their refolves.

When the prefident is absent at any meeting of the board of managers, or in case of a vacancy in that office from whatever cause, the managers shall appoint a chair-man, who shall have and execute, pro tempore, the powers of the prefident.

Whenever by death, refiguration, or other-vile, a vacancy shall happen in either of the offices of President, Treasurer or Setertary, the board of managers shall fix a day for the meeting of the Society, in order to make a new appointment, and shall are due notice thereof. Until the meeting thall have taken place they are authotiled to appoint, pro tempore, a person to the office, who strall possess all the powers and discharge the duties of the office.

All elections shall be made by ballot. The fecretary shall keep in a book provided for the purpose, the names of all the names of the Society, and is the same book shall record its proceedings, and such of the proceedings of the board and managers, as may be directed by them to be recorded.

. The treasurer shall receive the contributions of the members, and such other contrihatims in money as the charitable may be lisposed to make to the Society. Per thall my the orders of the board of managers which orders shall be figned by the President, or in case of his absence, or a vacancy in the office, by the Chairman appointed in the miner herein betore provided. He fi-all

managers, shall give to them information with respect to the funds of the Society.

9. It shall be the duty of the board of managers to provide, as far as the funds of the Society will enable them, for the relief and comfort of the poor of the City of Annapolis, and to adopt fuch rules as may be found expedient in order to ensure a faithful application of the funds of the Society, to the purpoles of its inflitation. They shall receive and dispose of all contributions, not in money, which shall be

offered to the Society. O. Under the direction of the board of managers there shall be opened a Soup House. The soup to be distributed to the poor in fuch quantities as the Managers may authorife-. The perfons entitled to it, shall receive tickets from the Managers, figned by the President. There shall also be prepared tickets for sale, and authorifing the holders of them to receive, for the time limited in them, a certain quantity of foup. The price of faid tickets to be fixed by the managers, and the funds ariling from the fale of them to be applied as the other funds of the Socie-

1. For as much as to provide for the relief and comfort of the indigent is the defire of this Society, and nothing can contribute thereto, in a greater degree, than holding out inducements to labour, it shall be a part of the duty of the hoard of tranagers to receive and deposit, in some pro-per place, for sale, articles, the produce of the labour and exertion of the poor, & to purchase raw materials to be wrought up by them, for which they are to be paid out of the proceeds of the fale; and it is earnestly recommended to the charitable and humane to Supply themselves, out of the fame, with the articles of which they

may be in want, when there to be had. 2. The primary object of this Society is to fupply the wants of the poor in cloathing, fuel and victuals, but an additional inducement to this affociation is to encourage them to industry and qualify them to become valuable members of Society, and to this end to provide for their instruction in the rudements of uteful knowledge. Whenever therefore the funds of the Society in its oppose will authorife it, a School thall be established for the education of those children, who without aid from the benevolent, have not the means of obtaining fuch instruction, and into which shall be admitted others, upon the payment of fuch fums by their parents or guardiane, as it shall be thought that they can afford to pay. And in order to obviate the evils which might arise from a knowledge, by the inftructor of the scholars who are taught gratis, no person shall be admitted into the school without a ticket from the board of managers, directing them to be received, and the managers are enjoined not to make it known upon what terms the faid tickets were obtained.

13. In affociating for the purpole of fuccoring indigence, the Society feel it be their duty not to lessen the motives to duftry and exertion, and to discountena ce, as far as it possesses the power every species of vice. The funds of the Society shall not therefore be burthened with the fupport of any person able to work, who shall be known to refuse employment upon reasonable terms, or to have employed what it receives from the funds of this Society in the procuring of the means of intoxication, or in any other vicious indulgence. When known, the person guilty of such conduct shall receive no surther aid, and the tickets which they may have obtained shall be forseited, until in the opinion of the board of managers, a reformation has taken place, and except in cafes

4. The regular meeting of the Society shall be holden on the first Saturday in January and July, and the members prefent at any meeting shall be a quorum for the trans-acting of any business of the Society.— The Board of managers to have the power to call a meeting whenever they think

By a return of the criminals in the State Prison at New-York, on the 30th Oct. laft, there were confined thererein at that perind, 498. There had been received fince its firft eftablifhment in 1797 to the 30th Oct. 1810, 2272 prifuners, of whom 599 had been discharged by pardon, 53 only of whom were ever returned for subsequent offences. This is a mild philosophy triumphing by example over the fanguinary codes which too long have difgraced many parts of the U. S. All punishments have a twofold object in view, the prevention of crime by intimidation and the reformation of offenders; when these objects fail, the mode of punishment becomes no longer uleful. If a man be fune by his vices deep into public contempt, life to him is but a burden ; he is to himfelf a living testimony of his own degradation, and he emerges deeper into crime to feek that death which his coward hands forbid him to embrace. On the contrary, folitary confinement and hard labour give him time for reflection on his past life, and mures him to the habits of industry, at the same time, it gives him an opportunity, by a virtuous course of living, to avoid his former errors and regain the character which he had forfeited by his impious ways.
