Legislature of Maryland.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

TUESDAY, NOV. 27, 1810.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The further supplement to the act for amending, and reducing into system, the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, &c. the bill to appoint Thomas Harris, junior, of the city of Annapolis, trustee for the sale of the real estate of John Kid ditto, the bill to repeal the act for the more effectual preservation of the breed of wild deer in Dorchester county, the bill for the benefit of Alexander and John McKimzie, the bill annulling the marriage of Ezekiel Walker, the further additional supplement to the act for direct descent, the bill for the relief of Margaret Wedner, and the resolution in favour of William Bruce, were sent to the Senate.

Mr. Randall delivers a bill, entitled, A further supplement to an act, entitled, An act to incorporate companies to make several turnpike roads through Baltimore county, &c. for other purposes; which was read.

Mr. Randall delivers a petition from James Wilson, of Baltimore county, praying a special act of insolvency. Mr. Bland delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, praying for a law to unite Holliday-street, to change the name of Backstreet, and to extend Orange alley, and Mr. Randall delivers a petition on the same subject; which were read and referred.

Mr. Brooke delivers a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to authorise the drawing of a lottery in Frederick-town for the purpose of paving Market-street in said town; which was twice read, passed, and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Jump delivers a petition from Thomas Salisbury, of Caroline county, praying the location of a road running through his lot may be changed, and Mr. Randall delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, praying that the criminals may be employed on the post-road from Baltimore to Philadelphia; which were read and referred.

On motion of Mr. Archer, the following message was agreed to, and sent to the Senate.

Gentlemen of the Senate,
We return you the bill, entitled, An act to make valid a deed from Robert Gilla Hampton to William Gilbert, and hope, upon reconsideration, you will pass the said bill. We transmit you herewith the said defective deed, by which it will appear that the purchase money has been paid by Gilbert to Hampton. We think that this is one of those cases in which the legislature might with safety, and ought in justice, to interfere. It is indeed true, that by an application to the chancellor, this defect in said deed might be remedied, but the great expense of a suit in chancery has hitherto deterred him from an application to that court, as he is a very poor man, and the property conveyed, as will appear by a reference to the deed, is so small in quantity, that a suit in chancery would ex- haust more than the value of the land. We cannot discover any impropriety in the inter- ference of the legislature in a case situated as this is. It has certainly been hitherto the practice of the legislature, in many instances, to make valid defective conveyances, where no objections were made by parties interested, and we can discover no reason why the gene- ral assembly should deviate from a practice, which, in cases circumstanced as the present is, cannot but prove salutary to the people of this State.

The bill for the relief of George Jones, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Warfield, Leave given to bring in a bill to regulate and confine the duties of constables.

The bill to authorise the sheriffs and col- lectors of the several counties of this State to complete their collections, and the bill to au- thorise a lottery to raise a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned, were read the second time and passed.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from Willi- am Maxwell, of the city of Baltimore, pray- ing a special act of insolvency; which was read and referred.

On motion of Mr. T. B. Hall, the fol- lowing order was read and agreed to.

Whereas it is requested by Zebulon Hol- lingsworth, Esq. that commissioners be ap- pointed to take the depositions of certain wit- nesses who are unable to attend at the bar of this house; therefore, Ordered, That John Gill, notary public of the city of Baltimore, Unit Angier, of Kent county, and John Moores, of Harford county, be and they are hereby appointed commissioners, with full power to examine and take the depositions, on oath or affirmation, of any witnesses who may be brought before them, or either of them, on the part of the said Zebulon Holling- worth, Esq. or of this house; the depositions so taken to be by them, or some one of them, certified and transmitted to this house, on or before the tenth day of December.

The house, according to the order of the day, proceeded to the second reading of the bill to prevent fraud, which being read through- out, the question was put, Shall the said bill pass? Determined in the negative, yeas 14, nays 44.

The bill to confirm an act passed at Nov- session, 1809, to alter all such parts of the declaration of rights, constitution and form of government, as make it lawful to lay an equal and a general tax for the support of the Christian religion, was read the second time and passed.

Mr. Eccleston delivers a petition from An- thony Thompson, of Dorchester county, praying an appeal by him from Dorchester county court to the court of chancery may be reinstated; which was read and referred.

On motion of Mr. Bland, Ordered, That the bill to confirm to Lewis Grant Davidson, of the city of Baltimore, the surname of Davidson, be recommitted for amendment.

Mr. Bland delivers the said bill as amend- ed, which was twice read and passed.

Mr. Mackubin delivers a favourable report on the memorial of Frederick Green; which was read.

The house adjourns till to-morrow morning.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 28, 1810.

THE house met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill to authorise the sheriffs and col- lectors of the several counties of this State to complete their collections, the bill to confirm an act passed at November session, 1809, to alter all such parts of the declaration of rights, constitution and form of government, as make it lawful to lay an equal and a general tax for the support of the Christian religion, the bill to confirm to Lewis Grant Davidson the surname of Davidson, and the bill authorising a lottery to raise a sum of money for the pur- pose therein mentioned, were sent to the Se- nate.

Resolved, That the person or persons hav- ing a majority of ballots of all the attend- ing members of both branches of the legi- slature, shall be the director or directors of said bank.

The house, according to order, proceeded to the second reading of the bill for the va- luation of real and personal property within this State, and after making some progress therein, on motion of Mr. Stevens, the same was postponed until to-morrow.

The clerk of the Senate delivers the supple- ment to the act to authorise the drawing of a lottery in Frederick-town for the purpose of paving Market-street in said town, and the bill to confirm an act passed at Novem- ber session, 1809, to alter and abolish all such parts of the constitution and form of government as require a property qualification in persons to be appointed or holding offices of profit or trust in this State, and in persons elected members of the legislature or electors of the Senate, severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. And the following message:

The clerk of the Senate delivers the bill to confirm to Lewis Grant Davidson, of the city of Baltimore, the surname of Davidson, endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be en- grossed.

The house adjourns till to-morrow morning.

Resolved in the affirmative, yeas 55, nays 10, and sent to the Senate.

The clerk of the Senate delivers the bill to lay out and open a road from the Franklin paper mill on Gwinn's Falls to the new Li- berty road, the further additional supplement to the act to direct descent, and the bill for the relief of Margaret Wedner, severally en- dorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The resolution in favour of Mountjoy Bayly, endorsed, "dissented from." And the following message:

Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,

Mr. Dorsey delivers a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to an act, entitled, An act respecting the equity jurisdiction of the county courts; which was read.

Mr. Bowles delivers a bill, entitled, An act to pay the civil list, and other expenses of civil government; which was read.

On motion of Mr. Perry, the following resolutions were read:

WHEREAS it is an object of great importance to effect an adjustment of the western limits of this state, by mutual compact, between the commonwealth of Virginia and this state:

Resolved, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorized to appoint three commissioners on the part of this state,

to meet such commissioners as may be appointed for the same purpose by the commonwealth of Virginia, to settle and adjust the mutual compact between the two governments, the western limits of this state, the dividing line and boundary between the state and the said commonwealth; and this state, & the said commonwealth, to the commissioners appointed as aforesaid, to be required to report their proceedings in view of their appointment and authority, to the general assembly of this state, at their session after the same shall have been concluded, for confirmation or rejection.

Resolved, That the governor of this state be requested to transmit without delay to the governor of Virginia, a copy of the foregoing resolve, in order to its being laid before the legislature of that commonwealth, and the same time to communicate the with this general assembly that a similar resolve may be passed by the general assembly of Virginia.

The bill authorizing the levy court of Charles county to sell and dispose of the land therein mentioned, was read the second time and passed.

On motion of Mr. Dorsey, Leave given to bring in a bill to repeal the act for the speedy conveyance of public letters and packets, and for other purposes, and the supplements thereto.

Mr. Wilson delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Worcester county, praying that a certain alley in Snow Hill may be laid out; which was read and referred.

The bill annulling the marriage of George Kock and Juliana his wife, was read the second time and will not pass.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill concerning justices of the peace, and after rejecting several amendments proposed thereto, on motion of Mr. Hillary the question was put, That the further consideration of said bill be referred to the next general assembly? Resolved in the affirmative, yeas 34, nays 11.

The house adjourns till to-morrow morning.

BEING apprised of the actual indigence of several particular families in this City, and feeling for the distress of many worthy objects of charity, I had fixed in my mind to propose to the Friends of Humanity in Annapolis, and its vicinity, some mode by which an eleemosynary society should be instituted, for the purpose of discovering such citizens poverty and distress as it became the province of benevolence to give instant relief to. How grateful it was then to my sensibility to read the communication of Benevolus in your last paper, concurring in sentiment as fully with my views, can only be evinced by my ready exertions to promote the desired and necessary end.

"The heart that bleeds for others wea Shall feel each selfish sorrow less, The breast that happiness bestows, Reflected happiness shall bless."

When we seriously contemplate the cause of our being, and the munificent motives that move Omnipotence, in his wisdom, to create a rational and intelligent, free to choose eternal happiness as the reward of a pious obedience to his will, or eternal punishment for a wilful disobedience to his righteous commands, and survey the inequalities and distresses which many are exposed to and really sustain, we must conclude, that God requires of us faithfully to engage that faculty of mercy, with which we are endowed, to alleviate the sufferings of our fellow-beings in distress, by such beneficence as our respective means will allow. And if we turn our eyes to the sacred Scriptures of eternal and immutable truth, we find them so replete with gracious exhortations to the exercise of that infinite attribute to all who have claims to participate in his blessing, and so explicit in high and treasurable promises of recompense for our readiness to bestow it, that the obligation of bounty is established beyond a doubt. "When the son of man shall come in his glory, and all the holy Angels with him, then shall he sit upon the throne of his glory; and before him shall be gathered all nations; and he shall separate them, one from another. Then shall the King say unto him on his right hand, come ye blessed of my Father, inherit the Kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was an hungered, and ye gave me meat; I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink; I was a stranger, and ye took me in; naked, and ye clothed me; I was sick, and ye visited me; I was in prison, and ye came unto me; and as much as ye have done it to one of the least of my brethren, you have done it to me." Such being the language of Scripture, it is most conspicuously our duty, as professing Christians, and citizens who have received at least the name of charity, in this season of the greatest want of necessities, to devise some plan for the relief of indigence and humanity to execute, in discovering the names and abodes of such "poor and needy" citizens, whose poverty and want cry for our charity to allay their pangs; I would propose an interview with Benevolus, in order to suggest a method that may tend to effuse our mutual wishes in the certain and constant amelioration of worthy objects of charity's wants.

NEW-YORK, NOV. 27.
LATEST FROM LISBON.
Yesterday afternoon arrived at this port
the sail failing ship Canton, capt. Brown, in
23 days from Lisbon. From captain Brown
we learn, that on the 11th Nov. the French
and English armies were not more than six
leagues from Lisbon, and that a great and
desperate battle was expected soon to take
place. The outposts of the two armies were
said to be within hail of each other. Lord
Wellington had been created earl of Bufaco,
after the name of the town where the bat
tle of the 27th of Sept. was fought, and
general Buresford knighted. Gen. Romana
had joined the earl of Bufaco with an army
of between 10 and 12,000 men, and col
Frant had retaken Coimbra and made 5000
prisoners, many of whom were wounded in the
late action at Bufaco. Some of the prisoners
had arrived at Lisbon and were to be sent to
England. A number of gun boats and gun
boats were lying about 20 miles up the Ta
gus, opposite the town of Villafranca, and
the French were continually playing upon the English
who had possession of that place. On the
23d Oct. a shot thrown from one of the
gun boats killed a French general by the
name of Marfena. Skirmishes took place daily
between the French soldiers and English sol
diers. The latter had possession of the town
of Allandra, about a mile from Villafranca.
Twelve sail of the line, several frigates and
ships of war, and about five hundred trans
porters in Lisbon roads. Several regiments
of British soldiers were landed at Lisbon a
few days before the Canton sailed, and many
more were daily expected. Mr. Green acted
as American consul at Lisbon in the place of
Mr. Jarvis.
The people of Lisbon, as well as the Bri
tish army, were in the highest spirits. Capt.
B further adds, that the day he failed (the
11th) it was reported that Massena was on the
march.
By the above arrival we have received
Lisbon Gazettes to the 11th of Nov. from
which we have made the following translati
ons.
Translated for the N. Y. Evening Post.
LISBON, OCT. 29.
Extract of a Despatch from Marshal Gene
ral Lord Wellington to his Excellency Don
Miguel Pereira Forjaz
Most Illustrious & Excellent Sir,
The enemy continue to occupy the same
positions (in front of this army) which I
sent to your excellency in my former de
spatch of the 20th inst. that they then occu
pied. I have however detached some troops
towards Santarem, general Loison having on
the 23d marched to that place with the divi
sion under his command; and it appears by
letters from the officer commanding at A
lentejo, dated on the 24th inst. that an e
nglish corps of infantry and cavalry entered
Alentejo on that day.
The accounts which I have received from
the prisoners and deserters, who have been
brought to this army, all agree in confirm
ing the statements of the difficulties and miserie
which the enemy suffer by reason of the
want of provisions of every kind.
They also state that the enemy were col
lecting and preparing materials to construct a
bridge over the river Tagus, but though we
have a good view of that river, of the dif
ferent points of the position which the army
occupies, and have officers and several indi
viduals employed on the left bank of the river,
for the purpose of observing the motions of
the enemy, I have not hitherto been able to
ascertain the place where they are at work,
nor what part of the river they can
cross the bridge, should they succeed in con
structing it.
The enemy, at the same time appear desir
ous to obtain or collect boats, and for that
purpose they endeavoured on the 24th inst.
to lodge a party of militia from Chamufca,
by bringing on them with artillery, in order to
obtain possession of some boats which were
moored at that place, but the attempt did not suc
ceed. Towards Ramallal and Obidos the
movements of the enemy's detachments are
observed and confined to such a degree, that
in reality, they are in possession of no more
ground than that on which their army is posted.
By the last despatches from general Silve
ira, dated on the 17th inst. it appears that e
very thing remained quiet on the northern
frontiers, nor had that general then heard or
received any intelligence of the march of
the troops in Castile.
The partisans had become more bold
and enterprising than formerly, and had for
med a junction in the vicinity of Valladolid
at the beginning of the month of October to
the number of 1500, for the purpose of tak
ing a convoy of money, arising from the
contributions which the enemy had imposed
upon the country; but their design failed.
The last news from Cadix is to the 4th inst.

"Our political situation is very critical,
as the enemy are but six leagues from us.—
Strong hopes are nevertheless entertained that
he cannot penetrate further. A battle is
momentarily expected, which will for a time
decide the fate of Portugal. In all the af
fairs of our outposts and skirmishing, the Earl
of Bufaco, (late Lord Wellington) has so far
decidedly gained the advantage, and inspired
the people with great confidence of his abili
ty to keep the enemy at bay."
Extract of another letter, dated October 30.
I have been twice lately at headquarters
of the British army, they are well supplied
from this city, and are supposed 90,000
strong. The French division under Loison,
has fallen back on Thomas—Massena's force
is stated at 60,000, and are said to be in
want of provisions—Still people here are fear
ful he will make good his retreat, without a
general action.

President's Message.

WASHINGTON CITY, DEC. 5.
The President of the United States this day
communicated by MR. EDWARD COLES
his private Secretary, the following
MESSAGE TO CONGRESS:

Fellow Citizens of the Senate, and
of the House of Representatives,
The embarrassments which have prevailed
in our foreign relations, and so much em
ployed the deliberations of Congress make it
a primary duty, in meeting you, to commu
nicate whatever may have occurred, in that
branch of our national affairs.

The act of the last session of Congress
"concerning the commercial intercourse be
tween the United States and G. Britain and
France and their dependencies," having invi
ted, in a new form, a termination of their
effects against our neutral commerce, copies
of the act were immediately forwarded to
our ministers at London and Paris; with a
view that its object might be within the ear
ly attention of the French and British go
vernments.

By the communication received thro' our
minister at Paris, it appeared, that a knowledge
of the act by the French government, was
followed by a declaration that the Berlin and
Milan decrees were revoked, and would
cease to have effect on the first day of No
vember ensuing. These being the only
known edicts of France, within the descrip
tion of the act, and the revocation of them
being such that they ceased, at that date to
violate our neutral commerce; the fact as
prescribed by law, was announced by a pro
clamation bearing date the 2d of November.

It would have well accorded with the con
ciliatory views, indicated by this proceeding
on the part of France, to have extended
them to all the grounds of just complaint,
which now remain unadjusted with the Uni
ted States. It was particularly anticipated
that, as a further evidence of just dispositions
towards them, restoration would have been
immediately made of the property of our ci
zens seized under a misapplication of the
principal of the reprisals, combined with a
misconstruction of a law of the U. States.
This expectation has not been fulfilled.

From the British government no commu
nication on the subject of the act has been
received. To a communication from our
minister at London of the revocation, by the
French government, of its Berlin and Milan
decrees, it was answered that the British system
would be relinquished as soon as the repeal
of the French decrees should have actually
taken effect, and the commerce of neutral
nations have been restored to the con
dition in which it stood previously to the
promulgation of those decrees. This pledge
although it does not necessarily import, does
not exclude the intention of relinquishing,
along with the orders in council, the practice
of those novel blockades which have a like ef
fect of interrupting our neutral commerce.

And this further justice to the United States
is the rather to be looked for, inasmuch as
the blockades in question, being not more
contrary to the established law of nations,
than inconsistent with the rules of blockade
formally recognized by Great Britain herself,
could have no alleged basis, other than the
plea of retaliation, alleged as the basis of
the orders in council. Under the modifica
tion of the original orders of November
1807, into the orders of April 1809, there
is indeed scarcely a nominal distinction be
tween the orders and the blockades. One
of those illegitimate blockades, bearing
date in May 1806, having been expressly
vowed to be still unrescinded, and to be ef
fect, comprehended, in the orders in council,
was too distinctly brought within the purview
of the act of Congress, not to be compre
hended in the explanation of the requisites to
a compliance with it. The British govern
ment was accordingly apprised by our min
ister near it, that such was the light in which
the subject was to be regarded.

On the other important subjects depending
between the United States and that govern
ment, no progress has been made, from
which an early and satisfactory result can be
relied on.

In this new posture of our relations with
those powers, the consideration of congress
will be properly turned to a removal of
doubts which may occur in the exposition,
and of difficulties in the execution, of the
act above cited.

The commerce of the United States, with
the north of Europe, heretofore much vexed
by licentious cruisers, particularly under the
Danish flag, has lately been visited with
fresh and extensive depredations. The mea
sures pursued in behalf of our injured ci
zens not having obtained justice for them, a

further and more formal interposition with
the Danish government is contemplated. The
principles which have been maintained by that
government in relation to neutral commerce,
and the friendly professions of his Danish ma
jesty towards the United States, are valuable
pledges in favour of a successful issue.

Among the events growing out of the
state of the Spanish Monarchy, our
attention was imperiously attracted to the
change, developing itself in that
portion of West Florida, which, tho'
of right appertaining to the United
States, had remained in the possession
of Spain, awaiting the result of nego
tiations for its actual delivery to them.

The Spanish authority was subverted;
and a situation produced, exposing the
country to ulterior events, which
might essentially affect the rights and
welfare of the Union. In such a con
juncture, I did not delay the interpo
sition required for the occupancy of
the territory west of the river Perdido,
to which the title of the United States
extends, and to which the laws, pro
vided for the territory of Orleans, are
applicable. With this view, the pro
clamation, of which a copy is laid be
fore you, was confided to the governor
of that territory, to be carried into ef
fect. The legality and necessity of
the course pursued, assured me of the
favourable light in which it will pre
sent itself to the legislature, and of
the promptitude with which they will
supply, whatever provisions may be
due to the essential rights and equita
ble interests of the people thus brought
into the bosom of the American family.

Our amity with the Powers of Bar
bary, with the exception of a recent
occurrence at Tunis, of which an ex
planation is just received, appears to
have been uninterrupted, and to have
become more firmly established.

With the Indian tribes, also, the
peace and friendship of the U. States
are found to be so eligible, that the
general disposition to preserve both
continues to gain strength.

I feel particular satisfaction in re
marking that an interior view of our
country presents us with grateful
proofs of its substantial and increasing
prosperity.—To a thriving agriculture,
and the improvements related to it, is
added a highly interesting extension of
useful manufactures; the combined pro
duct of professional occupations, and
of household industry. Such, indeed,
is the experience of economy, as well
as of policy, in these substitutes for
supplies heretofore obtained by foreign
commerce, that, in a national view,
the change is justly regarded as of it
self more than a recompense for those
privations and losses resulting from fo
reign injustice, which furnished the
general impulse required for its accom
plishment. How far it may be ex
pedit to guard the infancy of this im
provement in the distribution of labour,
by regulations of the commercial tariff,
is a subject which cannot fail to suggest
itself to your patriotic reflections.

It will rest with the consideration of
congress, also, whether a provident, as
well as fair encouragement, would not
be given to our navigation, by such re
gulations as will place it on a level of
competition with foreign vessels, par
ticularly in transporting the important
and bulky productions of our own soil.
The failure of equality and reciprocity
in the existing regulations on this sub
ject, operates, in our ports, as a pre
mium to foreign competitors; and the
inconvenience must increase, as these
may be multiplied, under more favour
able circumstances, by the more than
countervailing encouragements now
given them, by the laws of their re
spective countries.

Whilst it is universally admitted that
a well instructed people alone can be
permanently a free people; and whilst
it is evident that the means of diffusing
and improving useful knowledge form
so small a proportion of the expendi
tures for national purposes, I cannot
presume it to be unseasonable to invite
your attention to the advantages of

superadding, to the means of education
provided by the several states, a semi
nary of learning, instituted by the na
tional legislature, within the limits of
their exclusive jurisdiction; the ex
pense of which might be defrayed, or
reimbursed, out of the vacant grounds
which have accrued to the nation with
in those limits.

Such an institution, though local in
its legal character, would be universal
in its beneficial effects. By enlighten
ing the opinions; by expanding the
patriotism; and by assimilating the
principles, the sentiments and the
manners of those who might resort to
this temple of science, to be re-distri
buted, in due time, through every part
of the community; sources of jealousy
and prejudice would be diminished, the
features of national character would
be multiplied, and greater extent given
to social harmony. But above all, a
well constituted seminary, in the cen
tre of the nation, is recommended by
the consideration, that the additional
instruction emanating from it, would
contribute not less to strengthen the
foundations, than to adorn the struc
ture, of our free and happy system of
government.

Among the commercial abuses still com
mitted under the American flag, and leaving
in force my former reference to that subject, it
appears that American citizens are instrumen
tal in carrying on a traffic in enslaved Afri
cans, equally in violation of the laws of hu
manity, and in defiance of those of their
own country. The same just and benevolent
motives which produced the interdiction in
force against this criminal conduct, will
doubtless be felt by congress, in devising fur
ther means of suppressing the evil.

In the midst of uncertainties, necessarily
connected with the great interests of the
United States, prudence requires a continu
ance of our defensive and precautionary ar
rangements. The secretary of war and se
cretary of the navy will submit the state
ments and estimates which may aid Congress,
in their ensuing provisions for the land and na
val forces. The statements of the latter will
include a view of the transfers of appropria
tions in the naval expenditures, and the
grounds on which they were made.

The fortifications for the defence of our
maritime frontier, have been prosecuted ac
cording to the plan laid down in 1808. The
works, with some exceptions, are completed,
and furnished with ordnance. Those for the
security of the city of New-York, though
far advanced towards completion, will require
a further time and appropriation.

This is the case with a few others either
not completed, or in need of repairs.

The improvements, in quality and quantity
made in the manufactory of cannon, and of
small arms, both at the public armories, and
private factories, warrant additional confidence
in the competency of these resources, for
supplying the public exigencies.

These preparations for arming the militia
having thus far provided for one of the ob
jects contemplated by the power vested in
congress, with respect to that great bulwark
of the public safety; it is for their consi
deration, whether further provisions are not re
quisite, for the other contemplated objects,
of organization and discipline. To give to
this great mass of physical and moral force,
the efficiency which it merits, and is capable
of receiving; it is indispensable that they
should be instructed and practised in the rules
by which they are to be governed. Towards
an accomplishment of this important work, I
recommend for the consideration of congress
the expediency of instituting a system, which
shall, in the first instance, call into the field,
at the public expense, and for a given time,
certain portions of the commissioned and non
commissioned officers.

The instruction and discipline thus acquired
would gradually diffuse through the entire
body of the militia that practical knowledge
and promptitude for active service, which are
the great ends to be pursued. Experience
has left no doubt, either of the necessity, or
of the efficacy of competent military skill,
in those portions of an army, in fitting it for the
final duties, which it may have to perform.

The corps of engineers, with the military
academy, are entitled to the early attention
of congress. The buildings at the seat fixed
by law for the present academy, are so far in
decay, as not to afford the necessary accom
modation. But a revision of the law is recom
mended, principally with a view to a more en
larged cultivation and diffusion of the advan
tages of such institutions, by providing pro
fessorships for all the necessary branches of

military instruction, and by the establish
ment of an additional academy, at the seat of
government or elsewhere. The means by
war, as well for defence, as for offence,
how carried on, render these schools of
more scientific operations an indispensable
of every adequate system.

Even among nations, whose large stan
dards, and frequent wars afford every op
portunity of instruction, these estab
lishments are found indispensable, for the du
tainment of the branches of military sci
ence which require a regular course of study
experiment. In a government, happily
out the other opportunities, seminaries, w
the elementary principles of the art of
can be taught without actual war, and w
out the expense of extensive and standing
mies, have the precious advantage of un
an essential preparation against external
ger, with a scrupulous regard to internal
ty. In no other way, probably, can a pro
portion of equal efficacy for the public defen
be made at so little expense, or more con
sistently with the public liberty.

The receipts into the treasury during
year ending on the 30th of Sept. last, (and
amounting to more than eight millions and
half of dollars) have exceeded the cur
rent expenses of the government, including
interest on the public debt. For the pur
of reimbursing at the end of the year 3,750,0
dollars of the principal, a loan, as authori
by law, had been negotiated to that amount
but has since been reduced to two millions fe
hundred & fifty thousand dollars, the reduc
being permitted by the state of the treasury
in which there will be a balance remaining
the end of the year, estimated at 2,000,0
dollars. For the probable receipts of the ne
year, and other details, I refer to sta
ments which will be transmitted from
treasury, and which will enable you to jud
what further provisions may be necessary
the ensuing years.

Referring for future occasions, in the cou
of the session, whatever other communication
may claim your attention, I close the presen
by expressing my reliance, under the blessi
of Divine Providence, on the judgment
of patriotism which will guide your measures,
a period particularly calling for unit
councils and inflexible exertions, for the w
fare of our country, and by assuring you
the fidelity and alacrity with which my o
operation will be afforded.

TUESDAY, DEC. 4, 1810.

THE house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The bill authorizing the levy court of Charles county to sell and dispose of the land therein mentioned, and the resolution in favour of Aquila Jones, were sent to the committee.

The speaker laid before the house communications from the clerks of Allegany, Calvert, and Montgomery counties, relative to the attendance of the judges; which were read & referred.

Mr. Schley delivers a bill, entitled, An act to authorize a lottery for a certain purpose in Frederick county; which was twice read, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Groome delivers a petition from Randall and Joseph Couden, of Cecil county, praying that the state may be made a party to a suit brought by William Alexander against Joseph Couden, deceased, and Mr. Groome delivers a petition from John S. Moffitt, of Cecil county, praying a certain deed be confirmed; which were read and referred.

Mr. Bowie delivers a bill, entitled, An act to alter and amend all such parts of the constitution and form of government as prevent the election of the judges of the levy courts of the several counties of this state by the people, and Mr. Warfield delivers a bill, entitled, An act to regulate and confine the duties of constables within the city of Annapolis; which were read.

On motion of Mr. Dorsey, the question was put, That the house resolve itself into a committee of the whole on the bill concerning insolvency? Determined in the negative.

According to order, The house proceeded to the second reading of the said bill, which being read through, on motion of Mr. Bland, the further consideration thereof was postponed until to-morrow.

In the other counties of this state, where there are a greater number of voters in the county, or the county divided into a small number of districts, the present per diem of the judges and clerks of elections may not be more than a compensation for their services, but in Allegany county, which, from its extent, has been divided into six election districts, averaging not more than one hundred and fifty voters in each district, where the price of living is cheap, and where the taxes, which are already much higher than in any other county in the state, and which must necessarily be increased by the late high water taking away their bridges, rendering it necessary for them to be parsimonious in the public expenditures, the present per diem of the judges and clerks of elections is considered too high.

The delegation from that county, & nearly the whole of the people, whom we consider the best judges of what ought to be a compensation to the judges and clerks of elections for their services, being in favour of a reduction of the present per diem, we hope upon reconsideration you will pass the bill.

Mr. Forwood delivers a bill, entitled, An act to prevent the sheriffs of the several counties of this state from making sales of private houses for the reception of debtors, Mr. Dorsey delivers a bill, entitled, A further supplement to the act, entitled, An act relating to negroes, and to repeal the acts of assembly therein mentioned, and Mr. Bland delivers a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the president and directors of the Athenian Society; which were read.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 10, 1810.

THE house met. Present as on Saturday.

The proceedings of Saturday were read. The bill to lay out and open the road mentioned in Harford county, the bill to open and make public an alley in the town of Snow Hill, the bill for the relief of Abraham Fuller, the bill to lay out a road in Baltimore county, and the resolution in favour of Frederick Green, were sent to the committee.

Mr. Nabb and Mr. Bayly appeared in the house.

On motion of Mr. M'Pherson, Leave given to bring in a bill altering the mode of suing out writs on joint obligations.

Mr. Bland delivers a petition from the managers of the lottery to erect a female academy in the city of Baltimore, praying that managers may be appointed, Mr. Marriott delivers a petition from Margaret and

Harriet Hammond, praying they may be authorized to build a wharf at their ferry, and

Mr. Warfield delivers a petition from Robert Smith, of Anne-Arundel county, praying

he be supported out of the poor's house; which were read and referred.

Mr. Bland delivers an unfavourable report on the petition of Mary Quinlan; which was read and concurred with.

Mr. Bland delivers a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Michael Walker, of the city of Baltimore, and Mr. Marriott delivers a

bill, entitled, An act to authorize the levy of a sum of money for the purpose therein mentioned; which were read.

The bill for founding an academy in Harford county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

On motion of Mr. Bowles, the following resolutions were read.

Resolved, That so soon as the trustees of Harford county academy shall have completed the buildings for the reception of students, and the same being certified, under seal of the corporation thereof, to the treasurer of the western shore, then in that case shall be the duty of said treasurer, and he

The speaker laid before the house a letter from Zebulon Hollingsworth and Robert G. Bowles, stating that indisposition prevented their attendance this day.

Mr. Nabb delivers a petition from the commissioners of Talbot county, praying that a law may pass explanatory of their fees; which was read and referred.

On motion of Mr. Boyle, Ordered, That the bill to prevent the increase of banking companies, have a second reading on the 19th inst.

On motion of Mr. Bowie the following resolution was read.

Mr. Warfield delivers a petition from Thomas Meek, of Anne-Arundel county, praying a divorce; which was read and referred.

The report in favour of Henry Mitchell was read the second time, and the resolution therein assented to.

Mr. Street delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore and Harford counties, counter to the petition for the destruction of dogs; which was read and referred.

On motion of Mr. Archer, Ordered, That the speaker issue subpoenas for Thomas Kell and William Gwynn, to give testimony to this house on the part of the state against Zebulon Hollingsworth, Esquire, and that the said subpoenas be made returnable on the 20th inst.

On motion of Mr. Randall, the following order was read.

Ordered, That Sarah Carroll, and Elijah Bosley be permitted to be heard by counsel, at the bar of this house on Thursday next, respecting a bill, entitled, An act to confirm a road in Harford and Baltimore counties, therein mentioned.

And the question was put, That the house assent to the same? Determined in the negative.

RULES OF THE SOCIETY.

1. The officers of this Society shall be a President, Secretary, Treasurer and Board of Managers. There shall be eight managers, and the president of the Society shall be ex officio president of the Board.

2. In case of a vacancy in the board of managers, they shall, at their next meeting, elect a person to supply it; and an appointment, so made, shall continue until the next meeting of the Society.

3. Four managers, with the president, or, in his absence, five managers, shall be a quorum, and be competent to transact any business committed to them—Any smaller number, to be agreed upon by the Board, shall be authorized to execute their resolves.

4. When the president is absent at any meeting of the board of managers, or in case of a vacancy in that office from whatever cause, the managers shall appoint a chairman, who shall have and execute, pro tempore, the powers of the president.

5. Whenever by death, resignation, or otherwise, a vacancy shall happen in either of the offices of President, Treasurer or Secretary, the board of managers shall fix a day for the meeting of the Society, in order to make a new appointment, and shall give due notice thereof. Until the meeting shall have taken place they are authorized to appoint, pro tempore, a person to the office, who shall possess all the powers and discharge the duties of the office.

6. All elections shall be made by ballot.

7. The secretary shall keep in a book provided for the purpose, the names of all the members of the Society, and in the same book shall record its proceedings, and such of the proceedings of the board and managers, as may be directed by them to be recorded.

8. The treasurer shall receive the contributions of the members, and such other contributions in money as the charitable may be disposed to make to the Society. He shall pay the orders of the board of managers which orders shall be signed by the President, or in case of his absence, or a vacancy in the office, by the Chairman appointed in the manner herein before provided. He shall make a report at each regular meeting of the Society, of his receipts and disburse-

ments and when required by the board of managers, shall give to them information with respect to the funds of the Society.

9. It shall be the duty of the board of managers to provide, as far as the funds of the Society will enable them, for the relief and comfort of the poor of the City of Annapolis, and to adopt such rules as may be found expedient in order to ensure a faithful application of the funds of the Society, to the purposes of its institution. They shall receive and dispose of all contributions, not in money, which shall be offered to the Society.

10. Under the direction of the board of managers there shall be opened a Soup House. The soup to be distributed to the poor in such quantities as the Managers may authorize. The persons entitled to it, shall receive tickets from the Managers, signed by the President. There shall also be prepared tickets for sale, and authorizing the holders of them to receive, for the time limited in them, a certain quantity of soup. The price of said tickets to be fixed by the managers, and the funds arising from the sale of them to be applied as the other funds of the Society.

11. For as much as to provide for the relief and comfort of the indigent is the desire of this Society, and nothing can contribute thereto, in a greater degree, than holding out inducements to labour, it shall be a part of the duty of the board of managers to receive and deposit, in some proper place, for sale, articles, the produce of the labour and exertion of the poor, & to purchase raw materials to be wrought up by them, for which they are to be paid out of the proceeds of the sale; and it is earnestly recommended to the charitable and humane to supply themselves, out of the same, with the articles of which they may be in want, when there to be had.

12. The primary object of this Society is to supply the wants of the poor in clothing, fuel and victuals, but an additional inducement to this association is to encourage them to industry and qualify them to become valuable members of Society, and to this end to provide for their instruction in the rudiments of useful knowledge. Whenever therefore the funds of the Society in its operations will authorize it, a School shall be established for the education of those children, who without aid from the benevolent, have not the means of obtaining such instruction, and into which shall be admitted others, upon the payment of such sums by their parents or guardians, as it shall be thought that they can afford to pay. And in order to obviate the evils which might arise from a knowledge, by the instructor of the scholars who are taught gratis, no person shall be admitted into the school without a ticket from the board of managers, directing them to be received, and the managers are enjoined not to make it known upon what terms the said tickets were obtained.

13. In affording for the purpose of succoring indigence, the Society feel it to be their duty not to lessen the motives to industry and exertion, and to discountenance, as far as it possesses the power every species of vice. The funds of the Society shall not therefore be burdened with the support of any person able to work, who shall be known to refuse employment upon reasonable terms, or to have employed what it receives from the funds of this Society in the procuring of the means of intoxication, or in any other vicious indulgence. When known, the person guilty of such conduct shall receive no further aid, and the tickets which they may have obtained shall be forfeited, until in the opinion of the board of managers, a reformation has taken place, and except in cases of the most imperious necessity.

14. The regular meeting of the Society shall be holden on the first Saturday in January and July, and the members present at any meeting shall be a quorum for the transacting of any business of the Society. The Board of managers to have the power to call a meeting whenever they think proper.

N. B. By the articles of Association any person may become a member, upon paying ten dollars; that is five dollars on the first day of January and five on the first day of July, in each year.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in the Mississippi Territory, dated Fort Snodgrass Oct. 23, 1810.

DEAR SIR,

We last night received information that General Thomas is on his march from Brookster's Landing (the last fort in the Florida he took possession of) to Mobile. The principal inhabitants have put up their most valuable effects into the Fort for protection, and it will be defended by all the citizens as well as the military. The Fort is one of the best pieces of military work in the world of its dimensions, and, military gentlemen say, will be one of the hardest to get possession of. The general has no cannon, and of course it is uncertain the plan he will pursue—he is brave and desperate, and followed by men capable of any thing men can do. I have no doubt of a bloody scene on his reaching Mobile, as I am confident he will attempt some desperate movements. He acts under the authority of the Bay of Sarah Convention—their object appears now to add to their district, the districts laying between them & Pensacola—or in other words, all the districts of West Florida, and bring the whole under one general government. In this latter case they can raise at least 10,000 militia.—Any farther movements I will inform you of.
