



SATURDAY NIGHT TALKS

SWORD AND TROWEL.

Dec. 3, '05-(Neh. 4: 7-20.) In ancient times cities were invariably surrounded with walls and battlements, for protection and de-

fence. Constructed of earth, or brick, or stone those walls resisted the battering rams and scaling ladders of invading armies, and defended the inhabitants in the time of war. Such was Jericho, besieged and captured by Joshua. Babylon, taken with strategy by Darius, and nezzar with assault and famine.

These great generals are noted for their ability to tear down and despoil. Nehemiah, on the contrary, stands forth upon the pages of history as the builder, the architect, the military governor par excellence. He was both a soldier and a civil engineer, he could handle a sword and wield a trowel, he could direct military tactics and superintend stone masons, he could fight Horonite, Ammonite and Arabian, and he could manage a plumb line so that his stone wall would rise without the variation of a hair from the perpendicular.

Nehemiah is an example worthy of all imitation. The coat of arms of every earnest man is a sword and a trowel. Character building is no holiday task. It is hindered and opposed from the time the first course in the foundation is laid until the capstone is hoisted to its place. The descendants of Sanballat the Horonite, and Tobiah the Ammonite, and Geshem the Arabian, who attempt to hinder the work by ridicule, bribery and open opposition are a great host. Nothing will do for them but the sword. They have no object in life but to destroy every good work, and they are beyoud the pale of reason. Nothing but a display of arms, and the exercise of eternal vigilnace will keep them at a proper distance.

The man who builds a spiritual Jerusalem soon discovers that there are some things in this world that deserve no treatment but the sword. They can neither be reformed nor improved. They are incorrigible enemies of righteousness and must e exterminated.

Bure I must fight if I would reign. Increase my courage, Lord."

Nehemiah never would have besome famous as a builder if he had not first been famous as a soldier whose keen edged sword was more than a match for the vile machinations of his enemies. The time may come when all the hindrances to the world's progress can be removed by arbitration, but up to this hour civilization has advanced with the sword in one hand and the trowel in the other. He who takes a position must be prepared to defend it, for the obstructionists, critics, and foes to every advance movement are in large majority.

But the trowel is the complement

of the sword. To be a fighter only is as anomalous as to be a builder only. A fully developed man is constructive as well as destructive. He knows how to build up as well as tear down. A man who is always attacking things and firing broadsides at the existing conditions is a nulsance. What the world needs is men who can do things to make the world better, safer, more beautiful. If the Japanese do not improve the situation in the East so far as the inhabitants are concerned of the conquered countries, their military prowess will be of no account.

HOW TO SWEEP CARPETS.

Select a Good Broom and Use Short,

Quick, Snappy Strokes. Each stroke should swing from right to left, and at such an angle that you do not sweep directly from you nor at your left foot, but in an easy, comfortable position so the broom passes lightly and firmly over the nap and cleaness it without dig-ging into the pile, making any stroke difficult and often raising a cloud of

Occasionally reverse the direction of the strokes, making them from left to right, to give the arms a rest and prevent the broom from wearing down on one side. This should be done for only a few seconds at a time, for in aweeping from right to-left, you get the greatest amount of

be swept from the edges toward the center, but velvet should be brushed with the grain and in stripes from

In getting the dirt from the center of the floor after. It has been brushed into a pile, push the edge of the dustpan into the pile of the carpet and sweep the trash in carefully, taking up the line of dust that remains wih a small whisk. In taking the dirt from a velvet carpet when it has been brushed from one end almost to the other sweep it into most to the other, sweep it into a pan as is done with that in the center of a room. The end not cleaned should be brushed crosswise, the dirt collected in a pile near one corner and removed. With a really dirty room the best pian to lay the dust while sweeping is to sprinkle it lightly with coarse salt, that holds it down and brightens the colors. If this process is followed by quickly laying a piece of damp cheesecloth or muslin over the place where the dirt was sweet into the pan, every particle of lint and dirt will gather on it and the carpet will be thoroughly clean.

oughly clean.

Another way of brightening the colors and giving an extra cleaning to the carpet is with damp toaleaves. Scatter them over after all the water has been drained off so they are moiat. Then sweep well, and later, if desired, cover the broom with a cloth dampened with water and ammonia; or wet the rag in a bucket of water containing a dram of ox gall before wiping it over the carpet, to give an added brilliancy to the carpet.

to the carpet.

Cleaning carpeted stairways is more difficult than sweeping a big carpet, for the dust sattles in the corners and angles and is hard to get out. They should be brushed vigorously from side to side and then swept carefully with a regular stair which, so made that its points fit in all the curves and angles and readily take out the dirt. For cleaning the walls a lamb's wool duster fitted to the end of a long broom handle on which it revolves is excellent, for it may be rubbed over the most delicate paper and not bruise or mar it.

Revelations by the Anti-Treaty Riots of Clan Rule

POSITION OF THE MIKADO

Marquis Ito and Count Okums the Great Political Rivals—Do not Hesitate to Publicly Consure the Mikado—Sham Party Government—Constitutional Rights Illusory. The peace treaty having become the football of Japanese political parties, it would be interesting to point out exactly where the parties stand and for what they stand, but this is very difficult, says the New York Herald. There are out there two principal parties around which revolve a number of personal groups, seeking prominence and spoils when the opportunity presents. The Progressive party is led by Count Okuma, "the sage of Washeda." For a decade his cry has been "Russin in the Far East must be destroyed," and cruel must have been his awakening when apprised that by the

treaty signed on American soil Russia is only crippled.

The most powerful party, and the
one most numerously represented in
the Diet, is the constitutional party,
created and really led by the Marquis Ito. This party, the Sei-yu-kni,
awears by the constitution, which is
perhaps the most ineffective instrument that was ever devised as a palladium of popular rights. MarquisIto, who is said to have drawn up
the instrument with his own hand. the instrument with his own hand, chose as his model the sham constitution which Bismarck conferred upon Germany, and in putting the provisions of this document into Japanese he left out and weakened those which would seem to affect in however slight a measure the supremacy

of the monarchical principle.

We are often informed by Japanese statesmen that theirs is a constitutional country and that the power of veto is reserved to the people and is an inalienable right. They do not add, however, that the prosent Emperor has dismissed three or four parliaments that were not pliant to his will, and that up to the pres-ent he has done so with impunity After all is said, party government.

in Japan is a farce, or raccer a sham, and the elder statesmen who secured the confidence of the Mitado in the stormy days of the revolution and restoration of 1863 rule the country as unquestionably as ever did Grecian oligarchy or that coterio of Russian Grand Dukes of which we of Russian Grand Dukes of which we hear so much and know so little. Ito. Yaniayata, louye, Matsuksta and Hyashi, the Ambassador in London, are the names of these privy and most potent councillors, and in the name of the Emperor they rule the empire. These statesmen differ more or less in their party additations, but they one and all belong to the dutsuma, the Cho-Shin or one of the smeller affiliated clans of Santwara Japan which placed the Datporor on his throne a generation ago and have monopolized his attention and his confidence ever since. Their proone plank from which they dover depart reads "the supremacy of the Sat-Cho (a combination of Satauma and Cho-Shin) now and for all

It has been thought by many that one of the most potent chases of the Russian war was the necessity which the Southern clausmen felt of solidating their power, instead of consocrating it by the successful



Marquis 100, "Rismarck of Japan." leadership of a popular war. While the constitutional rights of the Japanese people are purely illusory and the restraints upon the power of the Emepror are ineffective, still the peo-ple of Japan have been discussing these matters for the last years, and

these matters for the last years, and in such a tone as suggested to the leaders of the clans the desirability of changing the subject.

For the Japanese are politically, at least, becoming more articulate. Ten years ago, when the Emperor returned to the capital after yielding to the Russian demand for the retrocession of the Liaotong Peninsuls, one hundred thousand people met him at the Shimbashi station, and one and all with heads bowed in respectful disapproval. 



USEFUL SAND CLAY RUAL-

Valuable Article by W. L. Spoon of These Roads in the South Mr. Spoon says: "The building of sand-clay roads has passed t imental stage, and it is no longer a question of doubtful procedure. The mportant things to be borne are thorough mixing to the saturation point, and then properly snap.n'

rolling the road. This mixing is usually done by the traveling public. This is a critical period in the con-struction of a sand-clay road, because care must be taken to secure an even amount of puddling, so that all the lumps of clay shall be broken and saturated with sand to a depth of 8 to 10 inches. If this can be done and the road is properly crowned as it dries, there can be no doubt about the result being eminently satisfactory. This mixing might be done by the use of plows and harrows when the clay is wet; but it is customary to let teams and vehicles accomplish it. It is true that the condition of the road be omes worse for awhile during the pudding operation; but after this is effected and sufficient sand has been added relief is permanent and then remains hard and firm.

"In many portions of the southern states the public roads are maintained by the old system or statue which has been reduced, by the efficlently of overseers to little better than worthless. The mud which it is customary to throw on the roadbed is often a detriment, as it is the worn-out material from the road that has been gradually accumulated in the ditches. There are many sand-bars and gravel beds along the streams and rivers of the Piedmont section where

unlimited quantities of good sa gravel may be found, a few loads of which would permanently heal the worst mudhole if it were to be first thoroughly drained. There is need of a general awakening along this line everywhere. An enormous waste of labor results, as stated, from the incompetency of many of the road overseers. Whether the overseers work statute labor, commutation labor, or hired labor, they should be able to so treat each particular case, deep sand or deep mud, as to effect a permanent cure."-Good Roads.

Oiled Roads of California. "The oiling of roads was begun in 1902, and there are now about 170 miles in use. The results have been, on the whole, highly satisfactory" says Good Roads There was much to learn concerning the action of the oil on the many varieties of soil found in the country, but the knowledge and experience acquired by the roadmaking officials warrant them in the stand they have taken that henceforth oil will be used on all roads where water can not be obtained at a nominal cost. In the first stages of the experimenting with oil sprinkling, there were objections by some people to this method of improving the highway, because of the fact that when the oil was first applied it rendered the road disagreeable to travel on, and had a tendency to soll vehicles and clothing. This, however, proved to only a temporary trouble as a few days, when the oil had been properly worked in and the surface smoothed and packed by thorough rolling, sufficed to harden the surface and keen it clean. It was soon realized that the inconvenience caused by the first application of oil was not nearly so great as was caused by the arst

"On grades, dykes should never be built to turn the water, and whenever it becomes necessary to carry water from one side of the road to the other it should be carried upder ground through a sluice or culvert. The top of the sluice must of necessity be near the surface of the road where grades exist.

WHISKY DESTROYING INDIANA

Decision, of the United States Court Seals the Winnebagocs' Doom. When the United States court, in a recent decision, declared that any in-

dian who had received his anothent of land could purchase all the whisky he wanted, it sounded the death knell of the Winnebago Indian tribe, in eastern Nebraska, on the Missouri river. Already besotted and degraded by lax morals, and cursed with an unquenchable taste for intoxicants, the Winnebagoes and Omahas were fast going the pace which led them further into debauchery; but the decision of the court, this in view always and work for it. by which the saloons are practically thrown open to them, will, in the opinion of those most familiar with the Indians, accelerate their descent and will in a few years, lead to the extermina-

tion of the entire nation. The Winnebagoes and the Omahas were the early friends of the pioneers of the trans-Missouri country, and alwars with the Sloux and Cheyennes. For years they were the most powerful tribes, with the exception of the Sioux, in the west, and they absorbed more civil.zation than any of the other

But along with the good of civilizaion, the Winnebagoes and Omahas also acquired a taste for whisky, until any member of the tribe would sell his very soul for a bottle of "forty rod;" the meaner the whisky the better the Winnebagoes liked it. And this state ias descended, with increased strength, to the present day Indian.

Years ago, before the love of whisky became a tribal vice with the Indians. most progressive tribes in the west. When their lands were divided into farms and allotted to them, each man receiving a deed to his property, these ribes (or rather tribe, for the Winneroes and Omahas early consolidated nto one tribe) were well to do and were pointed to by the Indians' Rights Association as an example of what ould be done with the red man by and treatment.

But when the Indians began to reelve money for their farm products, he "boot-leggers" recognized their harest was ripening and small saloons sprung up all around the reserve. It was unawful to sell an Indian whisky, but the profits were large and the emplation great. The Indians got the wh. ky and the "bootleggers" became wealthy.

Soon the profits of the whisky were not enough for the "bootlegger" and different schemes were resorted to in order to increase his profits. Indians were plied with whisky and while under its influence, gotten to sign orders on the Indian agent for cash due them; they were induced to sign deeds to their lands: immense bills of machinery, groceries, dry goods, etc., at fabulous prices, were sold the intoxicated savage, unto the tribe was almost des-

Altogether, the Winnebagoes and Omaha had reached a stage of degeneration rarely found in any people. And then came the order of the United States supreme court that any Indian who has received his allotment of land can purchase all the whisky he wants. if he can pay for it. Practical students of the Indian agree with Supt. Wilson when he says: "It means the utter anaihilation of the tribe."

The Sisseton band of the Sloux is mother tribe of Indians fast approaching poverty and extermination from the same cause, and the court's order will ilso hasten the time when this once powerful and wealthy people will be no

THE FIRST PRINCIPLES.

Healthy Bees, Good Crops, Proper .Kind of Hives Insure Success. The first rule, which has very appropriately been called "the golden rule of beekeeping," is that you must keep your colonies strong at all times, if you wish to get a good crop.

The second thought or rule, and one very closely related to the above is in relation to the queen. A good prolific young queen is necessary at all times. You should see to it that your queens do not outgrow their usefulness, a queen over two years old as a rule, becomes unprofitable, as the ways assisted their white allies in the | queen is the life of the colony, it is very essential that this matter be considered very carefully.

The hive is a very important matter. There have been many different hives put on the market, but after all has been said the Langstroth hive and frame gives the best satisfaction 1 and results of any in this climate.

Here are the points to consider in a hive: First, success in wintering; second, amount of comb honey obtained; third, ease and speed of manipulation. L. L. Longstroth, the father of lation. L. L. Metal Envelopes For Eggs.

Metal envelopes to protect eggs from being broken by the hen engaged in the task of sitting on them to hatch out chickens were among the curious exhibits at the World's fair. They were made of two sections of members joined, which constitute the transverse center, one portion overlapping the other, the two locked by a contrivance known as a bayonet joint. The parts are perforated to permit the circulation of air, and also to allow the heat from the hen's body to reach the eggs. When the hatching time approaches the envelopes are remov-

Advantage of Movable Hives. Bees in boxes or other hives where they have been left to their own caprices and have built their combs crosswise, diagonally or in a variety of zigzag courses are entirely out of the owner's control. Sooner or later they become filled with old comb, always containing much beebread and likely to be successfully attached by webworms. A noticeable feature of these old hives is the swarming propensity of the colonies. If it is worth while to have bees at all place them in movable comb hives so that they may be kept under control.-Farm & Field.

Honey in General Lee's Statue. Hundreds of pounds of honey have been found in the great equestrian statue of General Robert E. Lee at Richmond, Virginia. Both the horse and the rider are hollow and it appears that for two years bees have been going in and out at the parted lips and nostrils of General Lee and his steed. There is no way of getting inside the statue without damaging it and the bees will be left alone in their iron home.

German Asparagus Culture.


An account is given of German methods of growing asparagus in the region of Baden. It appears that the roots are planted 4-5 ft. apart in rows about the same distance apart. Stable manure is used in preference to commercial fertilizers and the ground kept mounded up around each hill 10 to 14 in. high. A fair crop is secured about the fourth year, but the field is at its best from 8 to 12 years after planting.

Weak Colonies Detrimental. Most bee keepers now agree that it

is a mistake to unite weak colonies in the spring. The theory that two or more weak colonies put together will make one good strong one looks ver reasonable, but it does not work in practice. Weak colonies can be united to advantage in the fall but not in the spring. They must have a queen and plenty to eat.-Farm & Field. Planting Strawberries.

Strawberry plants ordered from the nursery grower generally come bunched in lots of twenty-five and

fifty. If upon arrival the ground as all ready for setting, these may he opened as fast as required for planting, seeing to it that the roots are kept wet and the leaves not allowed to wilt or dry out. When brought out to sun and wind prior and in process of setting, keep the plants covered with a piece of old wet carpet or gunny sacking. Keep each variety carefully by itself. Especially should the choice be of staminate and pistillate varieties. Such must be planted in alternate rows, that the former may fertilize the latter. This method of planting is in general use with the large growers, as they get better recults than by the use of the staminate varieties alone, but for the limits of the farm strawberry bed we would advise the use of the staminate varieties only, as on the whole more satis factory For the sake of reference and future satisfaction, let the labels be carefully preserved and a stake or stakes driven down, marking the limits of each kind in a way that they can be easily recognized.

The point of sight in a picture is that point in the horizon toward which the most important lines converge. Every artist knows that it is essential that the eye be directed to the point of sight, in order that due proportion be maintained. It is possible to see very much of the beauty of a picture even though you do not know what "point of sight" means, but it is a more satisfactory enjoyment of the conception of the artist

We see this dim outline in the Garden of Eden -the promise made to the first human pair. He is prefigured in prophet, priest and king. A supernatural voice breaks the silence through the ages every now and then. A strange, mysterious form appears and disappears among the chosen people. Sometimes He has the appearance of a priest, as Abraham saw Him; sometimes as a soldier, as, with drawn sword He salutes Joshua; sometimes as a supernatural being He walks with the Hebrew worthies in the flery furnace. Noah, Abraham, Moses, Joshua, Jonah, are all types of Him, but all fall far short of the reality. The ark is an emblem of Him, the tabernacle is an



Wood Comes from the South-Graphite Tempered by an Alloy of Clay.

The lead pencil, as we know it today, is a product of several centuries, representing the labors, thought and genius of many thousands of people, conserved in processes, methods and systems, which require a thousand men and women to operate. In other words, it requires the service of a thousand people to produce one lead pencil, but in the same day the finishing touches are put upon the one pencil, this force will turn out 250,000 pencils.

The lead pencils, as its name would seem to imply, is not made of lead but of graphite. Originally it was made of metalic lead incased in wood -hence its name. But it was not until after the discovery of the famous Cumberland graphite mines in England, 1565, that graphite supplanted metallic lead in the pencil.

For two centuries the lead pencil industry was confined to England, but in 1761, when Casper Faber of the village of Stein, near Nuremberg, Bavaria, began in his village a small pencil plant, the industry gradually shifted into Germany, where it prospered to such an extent as to become a world's center, and remained such for about a century. Even to this day there are about 60 pencil manufactories in Nuremberg.

from Ceylon, Eastern Siberia, Bobe mia and Mexico. The ore is often found in quantity in other localities but it is so mixed with oxides of iron. silicates and other impurities, as to render it unfit for the manufacture of pencils. As it is the best graphite mined, it has to be treated by hand to free it from such impurities which are nearly always found in certain quantities. In cheaply made pencils these foreign elements are readily detected by the greasy or scratchy run of the pencil on paper. After the graphite has been broken in small bits and separated as nearly as possible from its impurities by hand, it pulverized and then placed in tubs water, allowing the impurities to precipitate while the graphite floats upon the surface. A centrifugal de-vice is often used by which the graphite is separated by dry process.

but this is not reliable and is little used in the making of good pencils After the water process, the graphite is filtered through filter presses when it is ready to be treated to the clay process. This process, which was discovered in 1820 by M. Conte, a French chemist, permits the manufacturer to produce pencils of different grades and adapted to many uses. As the graphite from the filter process would be too soft for ordinary uses the special clay introduced into it, having been treated to a similar process as the graphite, gives it the degree of hardness desired. The more clay in the graphite the harder the

are each provided with a supphire of The graphite, which is the essenemerald die, corresponding to the caltial part of the pencil, comes chiefly iber of the lead desired. The graphtte is forced through the die and leaves it in one continuous string. which is cut into lengths suitable for pencils, usually about 7 inches. The graphite is then ready for use.

After the cedar slats are kiln dried or treated by steam processes to expel all moisture, they are passed through automatic grooving machines, each slat receiving six semi-circular grooves into which leads are placed, brushed with glue and fitted to its mate. A skillful girl is able, by one swift movement of her fingers, to weep 15 of 20 leads into their sockets. A bunch of these leaded, mated slats is thrust into a hydraulic press when all superfluous glue is squeezed out and the bundles are locked and allowed to dry. The glued slats containing the leads are then run through molding machines which turn out the pencils in round, hexagon or flat shapes as desired. Preliminary to the varnish-coloring process the pencils are run through sanding machines. Both the sand-papering and coloring processes are automatic, the pencils being fed in quantities in hoppers. In the latter case they are carried one at a time through small coloring vats and discharged through an aperture of the caliber of the pencil and deposited in a slowly moving dry belt which carries them a sufficient distance, about 20 feet, to allow them to dry. They are then gathered from the receptacle into which they are deposited and the process is repeated -often ten or more times, according While the clay-graphite mixture is to the quality of finish desired. #### SALISBURY WANTS GAS.

There is undoubtedly a very strong sentiment in Salisbury in favor of the Council granting a gas franchise to some of the various companies apply That better service will be the fact that all of the parties asking for it are willing to pay liberally for the privilege. Our Council should go over the different proposit ons and takes the one that offers most for the city and at the same time protects the con sumers of gas. There have been rumors that some of the parties applying for the franchise were acting for the Electric Light Company. While there is not much credence given to these rumors, yet it will be well for the Council to investigate and see that the franchise is put in the hands of those who will give us competition and Lot a one power monopoly. The citizens of Salisbury would be at the mercy of any company that controlled both franchises. What we want is genuine competition and not a sham. The Council is entirely right in demanding that the parties give a bond large enough to guarantee the building of a plant by whoever obtains the right. One of the most important things to be considered is the price that the gas is to be furnished for. The city of Camsix and one half million feet. On the basis of six million feet, a difference of 5 cents per thousand would mean \$300 a year. If a company would agree to pay the city \$300 a year and fix the price of gas at \$1.25 per thousand, then this would not be any better proposition than furnishing it at \$1,20 and pay the city nothing for the privilege. It is well to bear in mind that whatever the company agrees to pay the city that this amount will eventu of the citizens of Salisbury who use the gas. In our judgement the council should give the franchise to the party that meets most satisfactorily the following conditions: First, comnetition: Second. a satisfactory bond building of a plant; Third, the best terms to the consumers of gas Fourth, the payment for the franchise to the city.

#### ANOTHER RICHMOND, IN THE FIELD.

Still another candidate for Speaker was brought out yesterday by Eastern Shore Delegates who were in the city in the person of Mr. Charles R. Disharoon, of Wicomico county. Mr. Disharoon has been Mayor of Salisbury several times and is well known in the county. He is said to be a solid, substantial man and to have the friendsnip of ex-Governor Jackson. Those who are urging him as a candidate assert that he would in all probability be supported by the Wi-comico county leader, and intimate that there is a strong probability of the forces now behind Dr. Richard S. Hill, of Prince George's county, switching to Disharoon in the cancus. if it is seen that only by so doing they can defeat Benson. Dr. Hill's principal difficulty is the opposition to him in his own county delegation, both air. Ray and Mr. Roberts being against him.-Thursday's Baltimore

Mr. Disharoon, would be an ornament to the Speaker's Chair, and a complicated political situation would be easily and ably solved by his serv



A housewife noted for the excellence of her cuisine gave the following for-Bake large, mealy potatoes in their

skins until nearly done. Take from the oven and cut a slice from the top. leaving the skin on one side to form a sort of hinge; with a fork pull out the underdone heart, and fill the hollow thus made with a tiny shaving of smoked bacon peppered and rolled tightly. Close the potato and put back n the oven to finish cooking.

For Cheese Souffe-Pour two cups of hot milk over two cups of soft read crumbs; add a cup of grated heese and three beaten eggs; bake as an omelet (this will make two), and when one side is done set it in the oven until brown. A much longer time is required in the cooking than for the ordinary omelet. It should puff to a thickness of at least two inches and be of a uniform golden brown.

An odd but especially delicious omelet is made by mixing six eggs, beaten, wo teaspoonfuls of melted butter, two of grated cheese, salt and pepper, with taragon, chives, and paraley chopped one. Put butter the size of a walnut in a pan and cook as an ordinary omelet, or finish in the oven as for a ouffle.

For curried eggs, cut one apple and one onion in thin rings and fry a golden brown in butter; sift into this a dessert spoonful each of curry powder and flour, and dilute with half a pint of water; lay in four hard boiled eggs, shelled and quartered. Serve in wall of boiled rice.

War Grows More Expensive But Fewer Are Shaughtered

HAS BECOME A SCIENCE

Battle of Waterloo Was One of the Bloodlest Contests of the Century -One English King Prevented from Waging War Because He Was Over \$2,000,000 in Debt.

It costs far more to killy man in modern than it did in ancient wartare. According to the best authorities of Russia and Japan, the conflict recently ended involved a total cost of \$1,500,-000,000. Of this the Russia is suffered a loss approximately \$1,000,000,000 and the Japanese \$500,000,000. The Russian casualties amounted to 400,000 and the Japanese to 200,000 men, says the New York Tribune. It may be estimated, therefore, that

every man who fell on either side in the recent struggle for supremacy in the far east represented an expenditure of \$2,500. It cost \$1,225 to vanquish one Russian, and Russia had to spend \$5,-000 to overwhelm one Japanese.

Although more money is spent today in war than in olden times, yet fewer are killed. The great guns of modern invention, costing thousands of dollars to construct and hundreds of dollars to fire, and the battleships, representing expenditures of from \$3,000,000 to \$5,-000,000 each, are less destructive to human life than the spears and arrows of the ancients. At the same time that men have devised more powerful engines of warfare, they have gone still further in inventing more nearly invulnerable methods of defense.

Some of the great battles and wars of the last century seemed bloodler than they actually were in comparison. The battle of Waterloo was one of the bloodlest of the contests of the century Of those who fought under Wellington and Napoleon in this battle, 35.8 per cent gave up their lives or were wound-The battle of Leipsic ranked next, with 25 per cent of casualties. On the field of Gettysburg the percentage was 20.6. Judging, by percentages, the battle of Moukden in the recent war was bloodler than any of these. Its percentage of casualties was 36.3. Taking some of the recent wars as a whole, the percentages have been: American civil war, 6.4; Franco-Prussian war, 10.7; Boer war, 19. A comparison of the cost of providing

a gun and firing it, as it has grown within the last century, gives a good impression as to the increase in the cost of warfare. It is said that in the time of the war for the overthrow of Napoleon Bonaparte, when solid shot were used, a 32-pound ball cost only five shillings, or \$1.25. At the time of the Crimean war, in the 50's, these had been replaced by 32-pound shells. The shells cost, ready filled for firing, \$5 The charge of powder and wadding cost \$3 more. A 68-pound shell, powder, etc., cost \$9.50. The cannons weighed from three to five tons, and cost from \$325 to \$475 each. A 12-inch gun, an inches larger than the great howitzers used by the Japanese at Port Arthur, costs the United States government \$11,000. It weighs from 54 to 60 tons, and each time it is fired the treasury is mulcted of \$440, or the cost of a can-

That war relatively cost less in the middle ages than today is indicated by the fact that one English king was prevented from going to war because he was a debtor for \$2,500,000 and could borrow no more.

Two or three centuries ago it was discovered that money for warfare could be secured more easily and in larger quantities by bonding the nation for it and taxing the people to pay the Interest. Wars began to cost more. In less than 300 years, Great Britain has spent on warfare \$6,795,000,000. The revolution of 1688 cost \$155,000,000; the War of the Spanish Succession, \$220,-000,000; the Spanish war, \$325,000,000; the Seven Years' War, \$535,000,000; the American War of Revolution, \$725,000 .-000: the war of the French revolution. \$2,360,000,00; the war against Napoleon; \$2,930,000,00... The Boer war cost Great

Britain in cash more than \$800,000,000. It is estimated that the wars of the nineteenth century cost the world \$17,-The debts of the chief nations of the earth aggregate more than \$34,000.000.

000. It is believed that three-tourths of this sum was swallowed up in warfare and preparations for it. Nearly all the sum represented by the debts of Great Britain, France and Germany was spent for warfare. These countries are spending annually in interest on their debts nearly \$390,000,000.
