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Choral Concert Revisits China, Debuts Emeritus' Work

The University Chorale and the Chamber Choir at FSU will celebrate and highlight the Chamber Choir's recent international tour in China and debut a new work by Jon Bauman, FSU professor emeritus, during a spring concert at 3 p.m. Sunday, May 4, in the Performing Arts Center's Pealer Recital Hall. Tickets are \$5, with free admission for children younger than 16, and are available for purchase at the door.

The program will include a selection of everything from jazz to American spirituals to folk songs, with several

select pieces the Chamber Choir sang at various locales in Beijing and Hunan Province, as well as new works chosen especially for the spring concert programming. The University Chorale will perform "Desiderata," a selection the group commissioned from Bauman, who taught theory and composition at FSU from 1970 to 2003 and directed the FSU Jazz Ensemble, as well as various other songs from a diverse group of artists.

Karen Soderberg Sarnaker, chair of the FSU music department, will conduct the concert, with Betty Jane Phillips on piano. During the FSU Chamber Choir's performance, Mark Gallagher, assistant professor of music, will also contribute his talents on clarinet in "Black is the Color of My True Love's Hair" by Rene Clausen, a song that was a favorite

among FSU's new friends and colleagues in China when the FSU Chamber Choir journeyed to Beijing and Changsha March 6 through 14. During the trip, the 26-member Choir gave a variety of performances at locations such as the Great Wall, the Temple of Heaven and Hunan Normal University, where FSU is laying the groundwork for educational opportunities and exchanges between the two institutions. The public will get a chance to revisit the Chamber Choir's memories of this once-in-a-lifetime experience and cultural exchange during the May 4 spring concert, when various photographs from the international tour will be projected onto the recital hall's wall prior to the performance.

The FSU Chamber Choir will also perform "The Conversion of Saul" by Z.

Randall Stroope; "In Time of Daffodils " by David Dickau, a work based on a poem by e.e. cummings; "With Lily in Your Hand" by Eric Whitacre; "Mouth Music" by Dolores Keene and John Faulkner; "Shenandoah," arranged by James Erb; "Usuli Boat Song" by Shui Jiang Tian, with Joshua Ruppenkamp as tenor; "Skylark," arranged by Teena Chinn, featuring Krystle Hutton as soprano, alto Rachel Dillon, Ruppenkamp as tenor and Ryan Bowie as bass; "Steal Away," once again featuring soprano

Hutton and Lane Conklin, tenor; and "John the Revelator" by Paul Caldwell and Sean Ivory.

The University Chorale members will also share their talents in a spirited program that includes "Fanfare for a Festival" by Ron Nelson; "Desiderata" by Bauman; "The Rose and the Gardener" by Eleanor Daley, featuring the Women of Chorale and Charlene Ferguson, student director; "Stars I Shall Find" by Dick Dickau, featuring the Men of Chorale and Bowie, student director; "Gershwin Showcase" arranged by Carl Strommen, featuring Hutton, soprano, and Bowie, baritone; and "Let Me Fly" arranged by Robert De Cormier, with Bowie serving as student director. Upcoming Changes to Financial Aid Process

The Financial Aid Office would like to notify all students about changes in the financial aid process for the 2008-2009 academic year. The Financial Aid Office will begin sending all financial aid award notifications to current students via email around the first week of June. Due to a change in federal regulations, every student will now be required to sign and return a form confirming that they wish to accept their loan(s) each year. This is a change from the 2007-2008 award year. No loans will appear as anticipated financial aid and no loan funds can be disbursed until the Financial Aid Office has received written confirmation from each student expressing his or her wish to have a student loan processed. A loan

confirmation form will be attached to your award notification email. Please complete this form and return it to the Financial Aid Office as soon as possible to avoid processing delays.

In addition to signing and returning a loan confirmation form to the Financial Aid Office, some students will also have to complete a new Master Promissory Note (MPN) for their loans due to recent changes in federal legislation and the banking industry. These students will be notified by the Financial Aid Office in the next few months. If you receive this notice, you must go onto the Financial Aid Office's Web site, choose a new lender, and complete a new MPN. You will need your FAFSA PIN and two references to complete this process. Please watch your mail and check your email for these and other important documents and announcements.

At the conference, seven students placed first in individual events, three students placed second and two students took third place. FSU also competed in the quiz bowl competition, placing sixth out of 17 schools. FSU placed second in the team field competition and placed second overall out of 18 schools.

with her sculpture of a river otter.
Tommy Baden, Kenton Sumpter, Seth
Stivala and Chris Cary placed first in
the obstacle course. Dave Kazyak placed
second in drawing, Tyler Brown placed
second in archery, Molly Bryden placed
third in the painting category and
Anthony "Amo" Oliverio placed second
in the game calling competition.

On Saturday, the team field competition and individual events were held. FSU worked cohesively to answer broadranging questions drawn from all aspects of wildlife fisheries management. The individual competitions were held immediately following the team competition. Events included radio-telemetry, trap shooting, obstacle course, orienteering, dendrology, archery and canoeing.

Students also had the opportunity to attend educational field trips on topics that included wildlife forensics, paddlefish management, non-game wildlife surveys, wetland management and wildlife law enforcement.

The Conclave serves as a keystone event for many members of the Wildlife Society, tying together much of the knowledge they have gained in their coursework at FSU. "Our members trained for months to prepare for this event and it all came to fruition during this competition," said Ammer.

Latta to Speak, Perform at AAUW Dinner

Greg Latta, FSU faculty member, Department of Physics/Engineering, and musician extraordinaire, will be the featured speaker/performer at the annual dinner meeting of the Frostburg Branch, American Association of University Women. The dinner will be at the Acropolis Restaurant, Frostburg, on Tuesday, May 6, at 6 p.m.

Dr. Latta is a mesmerizing singer, songwriter, and award-winning performer on the hammered dulcimer, banjo, guitar, Irish bouzouki, cittern, harmonica, recorder, Appalachian dulcimer, and concertina. A hammered dulcimer virtuoso and champion, he is a three-time winner of the Mid-Eastern hammered dulcimer championships and

has twice been a runner up in the National Hammered Dulcimer Championships held at Winfield, Kansas.

He performs an eclectic mix of carefully chosen Irish, traditional

and contemporary folk, Broadway, bluegrass, and original music. His repertoire includes original works, old coal mining songs, whaling songs, contemporary and traditional topical songs and children's songs, to name just a few.

Latta is a finger style guitar player who has played guitar nearly his entire life. He plays both 6- and 12-string guitars, and open tunings on the 12 string guitar are a particular specialty of his. He is also an award winning banjo player, having won second or third place five years in a row at the banjo competitions held in Friendsville, Md. His banjo style is a combination of traditional bluegrass, old-timey, melodic, and contemporary styles.

He has released two recordings, "Headed for Home" and "My Favourite Things." Dr. Latta is accredited as a Visiting Performer in the Maryland State Arts Council Artists in Education program. In addition to his stage performances and recordings, he is also host and producer of the popular radio show "Just Plain Folks", which can be heard Saturday afternoons on WFWM - 91.9 FM, the FSU public radio station.

Drive Safely in Rain and Fog

When it's raining, water that builds up on roadways can cause tires to lose traction or "hydroplane." Heavy rain and fog dramatically decrease your ability to see and be seen. While most people know to slow down in these conditions, there are other safety tips that will help to keep you:

Driving in the rain:

- Turn you lights on.
- Be sure wiper blades are in good condition.
- Slow down the roads are oil and grease covered.
- Make sure your tires are in good shape and inflated properly.
- Keep as much distance from the vehicle in front of you.
- If you pull off the road due to visibility, get off the road as far as possible.
- When pulled off the road, turn on your emergency hazard lights.

Driving in the fog:

- Use your low beam headlights or fog lights.
- Slow down and watch the road ahead of your headlights.
- Open your window to better hear the approaching traffic coming your way.

Now have a safe trip to your destination and watch for and give pedestrians the right of way.
