### ‘A Midsummer Night’s Dream’

University Theatre will present William Shakespeare’s “A Midsummer Night’s Dream” on **Friday, April 15**, and **Saturday, April 16**, and **Thursday through Saturday, April 21 to 23**, at 7:30 p.m., with a Saturday matinee on **April 16** at 2 p.m. in the Drama Theatre of the Performing Arts Center.

One of Shakespeare’s warmest comedies, FSU’s “A Midsummer Night’s Dream” is set in the roaring ‘20s jazz era of New Orleans, where deep in a bayou on a moonlit night, three stories of love and aspiration intertwine when love potions take hold in a fairy world and go feverishly awry.

### Annual Spring Choral Concert

The FSU Chamber Choir will present its Annual Spring Choral Concert, **Sunday, April 17**, at 4 p.m. at Emmanuel Episcopal Church at 16 Washington St. in Cumberland. The concert is part of the Betty Jane Phillips Memorial Concert Series and this year is dedicated to FSU voice instructor **Patricia Kelby**, who died last month.

Randall Stroope and “River Snow” by Ying Zhang featuring Jiagi Xu from Changsha, China.

The program will conclude with U2’s well-known arrangement of “MLK” arranged by Bob Chilcott featuring Darren Ross, Andre Wilson and Lane Conklin, tenors, and the lively gospel spiritual “Ask the Watchman” by Sean Caldwell and Taylor Ivory.

### Faculty/Guest Artist Series: Flute, Viola & Piano Recital

The FSU Department of Music will present an hour of music with the flute, viola and piano as part of its Faculty/Guest Artist Series. FSU faculty flutist **Pamela Murchison**, West Virginia Symphony Orchestra violist Anne Hamilton and Fairmont State University pianist John Morrison will perform in a program of 20th-century music. The recital will take place on **Sunday, April 17**, at 7 p.m.

The trio will open with the inviting “Concertino” by Ernest Bloch. They will next perform Howard Buss’ “Tennessee Suite,” told in four picturesque movements: “Mystic Dawn,” Treetop Capers,” “Cades Cove” and “The Trail to Abrams Falls.” Murchison and Hamilton will then perform the charming British work “Duo for Flute and Viola” by Sir Malcolm Arnold, and the recital will close with a taste of French music with the tonal and expressive “Prélude, Récitatif et Variations, opus 3” by Maurice Duruflé.

### MSO to Perform Verdi’s ‘Requiem’

The Maryland Symphony Orchestra, led by Conductor Elizabeth Schulze, will return to FSU to finish out the

Cultural Events Series season with a performance of Giuseppe Verdi’s 90-minute masterpiece, “Messa da Requiem,” featuring the FSU University Chorale and the Cumberland Choral Society. The two performances will be held on **Saturday, April 30**, at 8 p.m. and **Sunday, May 1**, at 3 p.m.

The large orchestra sound of the MSO will complement the classical “Requiem,” which is a Roman Catholic funeral mass written in remembrance of the Italian writer, Alessandro Manzoni. Written for four soloists, double choir and orchestra, the MSO will be accompanied by 120 choral musicians from the Cumberland Choral

Society and the University Chorale. Additional guest artists will include soprano Lisa Williamson, mezzo-soprano Maria Dolan Barnes, tenor Jonathan Hodel and baritone Eugene Galvin. This event will bring together some of the most talented musicians in Western Maryland to produce one of the most recognizable, enjoyable and emotionally charged music pieces of all time.

“Requiem” was first performed in 1874 in the church of San Marco in Milan, Italy, and was conducted by Verdi himself. Throughout the work, Verdi used vigorous rhythms, inspirational melodies and dramatic contrasts to express powerful emotions.
