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

ALICANT, Jane 27. Last Saturday a Moorish Vessel appeared within Sight of this Road, whereof the King's Galliots, who were there, having Intelligence, immediately hoisted Sail to give them Chace. Toulon, July 18. A Courier is just arrived here from Paris, with Orders to the Intendant of the Marine, to fend a Number of Vessels to Corfica, in order to bring head. bring back as Rattalions of the King's Troops.

Paris, July 24. Many confiderable Bankrupcies are talked of here. The most important one, is that of the Marquis Roux de Corfe, that Merchant of Mar-feilles fo confiderable, fo magnificent, who, in our last Quarrel with England, had declared War in his own Kame against that Kingdom. His Bankrupcy is computed at Twenty Millions.

It is now currently reported, in the Naval Depart-ment, that his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, will early next Spring fail with a Squadron of the Line to the Mediterranean, having one or Two Flags under his Command; with this Armament fome Transports will go out, to relieve the Garrisons of Gibraltar, &c. and it is even faid, that if the French will perfift in making a Stand on the Island of Corsica,

this Force will be properly exerted against them.

Several of the old large Ships of the Line, we hear, are determined to be cut down, in order to act next Spring, in a more ufeful Manner than Guard-Ships, &c.

York and Wedderburn shall fabricate, and it is assured, each of the Three Supervifors will be obliged to enter into Bond of 200,000 l. forfeitable, on Condition that either of them interferes with any Branch of Trade during their respective Supervisorships. The immense Profits and Sums of Money which might have been unfairly, yet undifcoverably made, by appointing a Secretary, have determined the East-India Directors to make no fuch Appointment; but they have hit upon a middle Mode, that is to fay, each of the Three Supervilors, is allowed to take out with him a Writer, or free Merchant, who is to act as a Secretary: So that the great Profits will now accumulate to the Supervisors themselves, Share and Share alike.

Great Altercations have lately passed in the News-Papers, between George Onflow, Esq. and Parson Horne, concerning a Sum of Money paid by one Mr. Burns, for a Place. Yesterday several considerable Bets were laid, at the West End of the Town, that War would be declared by the English against the French, before the First Day

of February next. The Rev. Mr. Horne, we hear, has declared he will not detain any Counsel to plead his Cause if Mr. Onflow should prosecute him, but is determined to claim the ancient Custom and Right of an Englishman, to plead his own Cause. Though Custom, Precedent, and some Law Statutes, are against it, yet it is said he will stand up for and endeavour to regain that noble Privilege to the People.

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

Fire broke out in this City, which raged with great Fury for 12 Hours. It burnt for near a Mile in Length, and as it happened near the Hippodrome, St. Sophia, and the Porte, it confumed a great Number of the principal Paand near 600 Houses. The Grand Signior was pre-

fent the whole Time, and mostly on Horse-back, giving away large Sums of Money.

VIENNA, July 26. This Morning, at Nine o'Clock, the Emperor arrived at the Castle of Sconbrun, in perfelt Health, from the Tour which he has made brough the different States of Italy.

WARSAW, July 29. Several Letters from Podolia, confirm the total Defeat of the Turks under the Senikier; the Trenches before Choczim were opened by the Ruffians the Day after the Victory. The Difarbances in the Ottoman Army encrease every Day.
A great Misunderstanding subsists between the Grand Vifit and his principal Officers; his Troops are filing of towards Bender. The Janizaries have mutinied, and murdered one of their Pachas.

The melancholy Situation to which this Kingdom is reduced is still the fame. The Confederates contimue to commit all Kinds of Excesses, the Consequences e which will long be felt by the Provinces where they are, or have been. According to Advices from Li-thuania, their Number is much diminished in that Grand Duchy, fince the Corps of the Sieur Bierzyniki was defeated by Col. Gallitzin. This Bierzyniki is the Person who carried off some Hundreds of the Troops in the Pay of Prince Radzivil. He is actually en the March towards Little-Poland.

By the last Letters from Constantinople we learn, that the Grand Signior has published and distributed to the Foreign Ministers there, a Manifesto, by which he declares War against all the Polanders, who favour the Views and Undertakings of Ruffia.

Names, Aug. 1. The Harvest has been very plentiful this Year in every Part of his Sicilian Majesty's Dominions.

Paris, Aug. 18. A Vessel, which arrived at Havre a few Days ago from St. Domingo, in the dead of Night landed several Passengers, who were received by Exempts, that were waiting in Post-Chaises to receive them with some Detachments of the Marechausse; the next Day the Veffel disappeared, and no Person was to be found that came from on board her. This Mystery, joined to the Silence of Administration on the Event, makes it conjectured, that the Prisoners were some seditious People from St. Domingo, whom the Governor had thought proper to fecure in that Manner; and fome Politicians carry their Suspicions so far, as to imagine they formed the entire Council of the Cape.

From the Frontiers of Podolia, July 20. According to several Advices received from the Neighbourhood of Kaminiec, the late Expedition of the Ruffians, on the other Side the Niester, has not been attended with better Success than their former one. We learn, in general, that the Ruffians passed that River the 13th, the Paffage of which was but weakly opposed by the Turks; that the Turkish Infantry were encamped in their Intrenchments about Choczim, which the Ruf-fians attacked, but that the Cannon from the Ramnans attacked, but that the Cannon from the Ramparts, and from the Turkish Foot, had killed a vast

Extract of a Letter from Paris, August 14. "It is faid that the King doth not think another Meeting of the East-India Company necessary, and many People are of Opinion, that the Ministry will persist in the Resolution of suspending the exclusive Privilege of that Company. A Report however prevails, that the States General of Holland have represented to the King, that good Policy required that his Majelly fhould support the Company, as the only Means to counterbalance the great Weight of England in the East-India Trade, which would soon be totally engroffed by the English, if private Persons attempted to carry it on upon their own Bottoms."

Letters from Gibraltar mention, that fince the enterprifing King of Morocco has taken the Portuguese Fortress at Mazagan, he has repaired the Baltions of that Place, and has encreased his Army to near 80000 Men; which observe the strictest Discipline, in Confequence of the Regulations introduced among his Troops, several of whom are Officers of confiderable Rank in his Service. The same Letters add, that the above Monarch daily employs feveral Thousand Persons in fitting for the Sea a numerous Squadron of Gallies, by which it is conjectured an undertaking is meditating by fome French, Spanish, and Irish Renegadoes, a-gainst some of the Powers who have Settlements in the

Extrast of a Letter from the Hague, August 22. " The French Ambaffador at this Court has prefented a Memorial to the following Purport: " The underligned has the Honour to communicate to your High Mightinesses, by order of the King his Master, that in Confequence of the Treat concluded with Republic of Genoa, the 15th of May, 1768, by which that Republic cedes to France the entire Sovereignty of Corfica, his Majesty, after having driven out the late Rebels to the faid Republic, took Possession of that Island, and united it to the other Dominions of his Crown, that all the Ports thereof would, for the future, be under the same Government as that of France, and under the fame Regulations in sespect to Trade with foreign Powers, and that it is the King's Orders, that that Island shall contribute, as much as possible, to increase the Union and mutual Service between France and Holland.

" After these Assurances, his Majesty flatters himfelf, that their High Mightinesses, in case any Ships should for the future appear under Corsican Colours, will look upon them as Pirates, and not suffer them to take refuge in the Ports of their Republic; the Regard that Sovereigns owe to each other, not permitting them to grant to Rebels an Afylum in their Domi-

fays, "Notwithstanding all the Arguments for and a-gainst dissolving the East-India Company, it is said, -that an Edict is in the Press for suspending their Trade for a Year, which feems to be a Prelude to their total Destruction."

Friday Night there was a numerous and respectable Meeting of the Electors of Westminster, at the Globe-Tayern in the Strand, when the Draft of a Petition to his Majesty was read, and unanimously approved of. It is confined to the Case of Middlesex; and the Prayer is faid to confift of a Request, that his Majesty would be graciously pleased to dissolve this Parliament, and call another as foon as possible. One of the Company took Notice of a Resolution in the Commons Journals, Vol. 13. P. 767. Anno 1701. 14 Will. III. which is in these Words: "Resolved, That it is the undoubted "Right of the People of England to petition or address the King, for the calling, sitting or dissolving of Parliaments, and for the redressing of Grievances."

And on Saturday the following was distributed as a Hand-Bill among the Electors of Westminster.

"To the eworthy independent Electors of the City and Liberty of Westminster.

"You have been called on by public Advertisements to meet in Westminster-Hall, on Tuesday next, the 19th Instant, at 11 o'Clock in the Forenoon, for the Purpose of considering on a Petition to his Majesty on the present alarming State of the Constitution. Every Method has been taken, and will be taken by mean Suggestions, false Representations, and unfair and undue Influence, to render this Meeting abortive. You are told, that you will not be joined by the fiber or sensible, that you will have no Men of Confequence among you, and that not one Half of the Electors of Westminster will sign such Petition—BE NOT DE-CEIVED; it is by such Insinuations the Enemies to our King and Country mean to effect their Purpose, and to keep you at home, by perfuading you that your Neighbour will not attend—Disappoint their wicked Endeavours—every honest Man will be with you, and remember that the honest Man is fober, fensible and great. Attend this Meeting, weigh well the Business of it, and then obey the Dictates of Honour, Confcience and Love of your Country, her gracious King, Laws and Liberties."

This Day at 11 o'Clock, the Electors of Westmin-ster, to the Number of about Seven Thousand, asfembled in Westminster-Hall, to petition his Majesty for a Redress of Grievances. At 12 o'Clock Sir Robert Bernard, Bart, was called to the Chair, which was placed on the Steps of the Court of Common Pleas. Robert Jones, Esq; moved for the Petition; he expatiated in a most sensible Manner on the present important Crifis, and then faid, he had been Chair-man of the Committee appointed to draw up the Pitition, and that in Confequence of their Directions he would present the same to Sir Robert Bernard, who would read it for their Approbation. Accordingly Sir Robert read it, and it was received with unanimous Applause. When the Question was put, whether they approved of that Petition, it was carried unanimously, and the Electors began immediately to fign it.

Mr. Almon moved, that the same Committee, who had drawn up the Petition, might be appointed to wait on a Number of Gentlemen, requesting them to attend his Majesty with the said Petition. This Motion was likewise unanimously approved.

Mr. Martin then moved, that the Thanks of the Hall be given to Sir Robert Bernard, Bart, And Mr. Almon also moved, that the Thanks of

the Hall might be given to Robert Jones, Esq; who had been Chairman of the Committee.

It is not a little remarkable, that the Chair for the Chairman had been originally placed on the Steps between the Courts of Chancery and the King's-Bench; but the Electors not liking that Situation, defired it might be placed on the Steps of the Court of Common Pleas, where, they faid, General Warrants were first condemned.

It is certain that there were at least 7000 Persons present, the greatest Part of whom were Gentlemen of considerable Property; and by Two o'Clock it was conjectured more than 2000 had figned.

The Purport of the above Petition was, to request that

his Majesty would dissolve the present Parliament, and call a new one as speedily as possible.

Immediately after the Surry Petition had been prefented to the King on Thursday, a Right Hon. Pay-master ridiculed the Petition in the Drawing-Room, and enquired of a certain popular Baronet, the Reprefentative of a neighbouring Borough, what were the Objects of it? The latter told him, it was confined to one Point, but complained of pernicious Counfellors, adding, at the fame Time, that he knew best whether be was included in that Number. The Paymaster said aloud, that a Friend of his had gone to the Place in Southwark, where the Petition was advertised to be figned, but could fee only Three Skins of Parchment, without any other Writing on them but Names, and was told that the Petition itself was in another Part of the County, fo that People figned without knowing for what. The Baronet told him, without knowing for what. The Baronet told him, his Friend had mininformed him; there never had been but one Skin in Southwark, and on that the Petition was most certainly written. The Paymaster persisted in the Charge, as he was told by a Person of Credit, a Friend of his. On which the Baronet told him, he had been misled, and that his Friend, auboever be was, would not to his, the Baronet's Face, assert so great a Falshood; and for the Paymaster's further Satisfaction, referred him to the Petition just delivered in, which confided of Five Skins of Parchment, on each of which he might now fee the Petition entered at Length. The Paymafter was filenced by this laft Argument, and the whole Circle of Auditors, who were numerous, were pleased with the spirited Manner in which the Baronet refisted the rough Attack of the Paymafter. It is hoped that no Attempt is ever made by fimilar Mifrepresentations to impose on the Royal Ear, by false Accounts of the Conduct and Sense of the People.

Foy, Master, from Spanish St. Domingo, bound in to this Port, being nearer the Land than they imagined, had the Missforture to the aground on Souran Beach, a little to the tune to run aground on Squan Beach, a little to the Westward of Shrewsbury Inlet, where the Vessel, being deeply laden, and a large Swell from Sea fetting right on upon the Beach, in a few Thumps went all to Pieces, and was intirely loft, with all her Cargo which was very valuable, confifting of Sugars, Maho-gany, &c. and upwards of 20,000 Dollars in Specie: our of the People only escaped with Life, viz. the Mate, Two Seamen and a Spanish Merchant, who were cast ashore on the Beach, where they found them-felves next Morning, but could give no Account how they got there: They were terribly bruised and man-gled, especially the Merchant, who was stark naked, had his Flesh miserably torn, and by lying so long in the Water, was like a dead Corps, and scarce any Skin left on his Back: The rest of the People, 14 in Number, were all unfortunately drowned, among whom were Mr. Campbel, Super Cargo of the Vessel, much lamented by all who knew him, and the Family of the unhappy Spanish Merchant, (consisting of his Wife, his Son, about & Years of Age, and his Daughter a young Lady, of about 16 or 17) who is by this distressfing Stroke of Providence at once deprived of all his Fortune and Family.—Twelve of the People, we hear are fince taken up and buried on the Beach.

HAVE understood, our late Emission of Money was regulated by so much Prudence, that it was deemed, upon an accurate Examination, to be unexceptionable in every Refinding out an Expedient, by which all clashing with the Act of Parliament might be

avoided; but it was happily found out, and, fince the Efficacy of it has been experienced, it may be again adopted with Safety. The Money, however, of this Emission, has proved to be very short of the Occasions of our Trade, and other Intercourse; a great Deal of it has been locked up from Time to Time, by some of the Possessor of it, til an Opportunity of making a convenient Purchase of Land or Negroes has brought it again to Light. I shall not enter into a Detail of the many Advantages, which would arise from another Emission: The eligible Fund to support its Credit, is what I shall take the Liberty fagefting. I have heard the annual Affeffments for the Support of the Poor, complained of as a great and increasing Burden in most Counties, and what is worfe, that the Expence incurred, on this Head, hat not answered the Purpose of it; the proper Objects of public Charity not having derived the Benefit from the Tax, Humanity would wish, and others, who are not the proper Objects of it, partaking of the Provision, which should be applied to the Relief, and Comfort of

The excessive Dearness of Labour, is also a common Topic of Complaint : It is really a Misfortune to the Vicious, when the Wages they receive for the Labour of one Day, will support them in Intemperance for Three Days. I have been informed, that the Wages of Labourers in England, are annually aftertained by the Justices in every County, and in Corporations by the corporate Officers; that it is the Duty of the Sheriffs to proclaim these Rates, and that all Labourers are compellable to serve by the Day, in the Time of Hay and Corn Harvest—How far similar Regulations may fait the Circumstance of this County. tions may fuit the Circumstances of this Country, I shall not undertake to say; but, surely, some better Provision, than now subsists, against the Exactions of Labourers, and for the Correction of the Dissolute and the mail deserves to be considered. We want Montain Labourers, and for the Correction of the Dinotite and Idle, well deferves to be confidered. We want Money—We want a better applied Provision for the Poor—We want Industry—Perhaps the Means of supplying the one, and, at the same Time, of promoting the other, in a considerable Degree, may be fallen upon. These I shall propose in sew Words.

Suppose the Sum wanted, in Addition to the Money.

Suppose the Sum wanted, in Addition to the Money lately emitted, to be 70,000 l. Currency, more or lets: This additional Sum being struck according to the Denominations of the late Emission, might be divided into Fourteen Parts, proportioned to the Num-ber of Taxables in each County, and delivered to Truftees to be appointed therein respectively, to be laid out by them in purchasing Lands, building Houses, and providing the proper Means for the Maintenance, Employment, and Correction of the Helpless, the Indigent, and the Idle. The Money thus distributed, might be repaid by the respective Counties, by an annual Assessment of a Part proportioned to the Sum received by each, and to the Number of Years to be prefixed for the Circulation of the Whole. A Person, or Persons being appointed for the Receipt of the Inor Persons being appointed for the Receipt of the Income from the annual Affeliments, to be his or their Duty, also, to let out the Money again, as soon as received, and applied for, at Four per Cent. The Debtors, who shall take up the Money on Loan, to discharge their Debts, in Dollars, or Gold at a settled Rate by the Ounce, should they not pay in Paper, and the Holders of the Paper to receive in Exchange for it, Dollars, or Gold at the same Rate, when the Period for sinklars, or Gold at the fame Rate, when the Period for fink-ing shall arrive; whatever may be the eventual Gain to the Public, to be subject to the Disposal of the Assembly.

If the new Money, on the Plan fuggested, would, immediately fall into general Use, my Proposition would stop here; but, perhaps, it would take up so much Time, before there would be an actual Circulation of it, that, in Order to supply our present Wants, it might be expedient to augment it to a larger Sum, of which a Proposition might be immediately let Sum, of which a Proportion might be immediately let out upon Loan at 4 per Gent. on proper Security, to such as should apply for it, and the Excess, so lent, might be such as thould come in, 'til the Sum left might be reduced to the above rescaled it with what we be reduced to the above 70,000 l. if, with what we now have, that should be deemed a competent Sum for the Occasions of a circulating Medium.

W A R S A W, July 31.

HE Karaman Pacha has beheaded the Seraskier, who after the Lofs of the Battle retired to Choc-zim, which the Grand Visir seems to abandon to its Fate. The latter still keeps his Position near Bender, from whence it is afferted he daily sends out a Detachment of 30,000 Men, to interrupt the Operations of the Ruffians, perfuaded that by this Means he will weaken the Enemy's Forces, and in the End vanquish them without coming to a decisive Battle.

Aug. 2. By a Courier just arrived from Kaminieck we lears that Choczim fill held out on the 24th ult. and that the Garrison was very numerous. Lieutenant General de Stoffelm directed the Siege, and four Batteries were continually playing against the Place. The grand Russian Army under Peince Gallitzin, and that commanded by General Romanzow, have taken such a Position that it is impossible for the Grand Visir, unless he puts himself between Two Fires, to march to lefs he puts himfelt between Two Fires, to march to the Succour of Choczim. We have received, by the Way of Vienna, a Copy of the Manifesto by which the Grand Signior declares War against that Part of the Polish Nation, which is in Friendship with Russia. The Porte therein stiles the Counts Krafinski and Po-

rawaski illustrious Men, and it appears that the latter has been in the Grand Visit's Army.

Aug. 5. Two Days ago we received a Letter from the Russian Army, dated the asth ult. which advises that the City of Choczim is not yet taken, because the Russians, being sure that it cannot hold out long, are unwilling to factifice a Number of Men to no good unwilling to facrifice a Number of Men to no good Purpose. The Garrison is in want of Subfiftence, and Water is cut off from them by a Battery commanded by General Rennenkamp. The Sallies made by the Turks have been unsuccessful; they have been repulsed with considerable Lofs. They have driven out of the Fortress a great Number of Horses and other Cattle, not having Provender for them.

MADRID, Aug. 4. We have received the most disa-greeable Accounts from several Provinces relating to greeable Accounts from several Provinces relating to the Harvest, which has turned out very poorly, especially in the Kingdom of Castile. This has considerably raised the Price of Bread, Oil, and other Provisions in Proportion. The Council of Castile have issued a rigorous Edick, forbidding the Exportation of Grain and Oil during the Course of this Year.

Extrast of a Letter from Rosseau, in Dominico, Oslober 2.

" On the 23d Ult. about an Hour after Sunfet (one of the darkest rainy Nights I ever remember) we were alarmed with the River's having broke its Banks. In a few Minutes the whole Town was under Water, and about Twelve Houses, with their Inhabitants and Merchandife, fwept into the Ocean. All the other Houses and Stores were filled with Water, and every Person trembling with Expectation of their impending Destruction, from whence there appeared neither Alternative nor Retreat. The Torrent was fo rapid that it was impracticable to go from House to House. Mr. Goold's new House, Mr. Judith's Store, on the Bay : Captain Sayer's Houfe, and Balthazar le Blanc's Houfe, are among those carried into the Sea, with every Thing that was in them. One of Mr. Louis le Blanc's Stores, with his Clerk, Cotton, &c. were swept away. In this horrid Scene about 30 People are loft. Our Lofs here is computed at 80,000 l. Currency, in Houses and Merchandise carried away; and in the several other Ports of the Island, to very near as much. Our general Diffress here is proportionably greater by the Inundation than yours by your late dreadful Fire.

N E W Y O R K, November 6.

The SPEECH of bir Excellency the Right Honourable NORBORNE Baron de BOTETOURT, his Majefly's Lieutenant and Governor-General of the Golony and Dominion of Virginia, and Vice-Admiral of the Jume, to the General Affembly, convened at the Ca-pitol, on Tuejday the 7th Day of November, 1769.

Gentlemen of the Council, Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,

HAVE again received the King's Commands to meet you in General Affembly for the Dispatch of the public Bufiness of this Dominion, and I hope I need not observe to you that this will be best done by Temper and Moderation.

I affure you that I shall obey my Royal Master's Commands with the truest Satisfaction, by concurring with you in such Measures as may best promote the Happiness of his Majesty's Subjects in Virginia.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgeffes, The King having been graciously pleased at our earnest Defire, to refer to his Board of Trade to reconfider the Boundary Line betwixt this Colony and the Cherokees, which had been agreed to by that Board, I am directed to acquaint you, that in Confequence of that Reference and Re-confideration, a Report has been made in Favour of a more extended Boundary, and that his Majefty will confent to the proposed Alteration, upon Condition that the Colony will make Provision to defray the Expence of the Negotiation neceffary for that Purpose.—I have it therefore in Comgelles, to enable him to carry into immediate and com-

pleat Execution, that very defirable Object.

The proposed Alteration, together with a Rate of the Expence which I am told will necessarily attend it, shall be immediately laid before you.

I must likewise beg your Attention to many alarming Reports which have been received from the Frontier Counties of this Colony: I will lay the whole be-

foreyou, with a State of every Thing which has been done in Confequence of those Accounts, and shall be fupremely happy it you can fuggest to me any Mode of Proceeding by which the facrea Laws of our Country may again recover that free Course, which can alone give Permanence and Security to this respectable Government.

Gentlemen of the Council, Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Burgesses,

I think myself peculiarly fortunate to be able to inform you, that in a Letter dated May the 13th, I have been affured by the Earl of Hillborough, tha this Majesty's present Administration have at no Time entertained a Design to propose to Parliament to lay any further Taxes upon America for the Purpose of raising a Revenue, and that it is their Intention to propose in the next Session of Parliament, to take off the Duties upon Glass, Paper and Colours, upon Consideration of fach Duties having been laid contrary to the true Princi

ples of Commerce.

It may possibly be objected, that as his Majesty's present Administration are not immortal, their Succesfors may be inclined to attempt to undo what the prefent Ministers shall have attempted to perform; and to that Objection I can give but this Answer: That it is my firm Opinion, that the Plan I have stated to you will certainly take Place, and that it will never be departed from, and so determined am I, for ever to abide by it, that I will be content to be declared infamous, if I do not to the last Hour of my Life, at all Times, in all Places, and upon all Occasions, exert every Power with which I either am, or ever shall be legally invest-ed, in order to obtain and maintain for the Continent of America that Satisfaction, which I have been authorised to promise this Day, by the considential Servants of our Gracious Sovereign, who, to my certain Know-ledge, rates his Honour fo high, that he would rather part with his Crown than preserve it by Deceit.

At the Departure of the Poft, a Report prevailed, that Choczim had opened its Grates to the Ruffians, and that Potocki, with a Number of Confederates, had furrendered themselves Prisoners of War;

BRESCIA, Aug. 20. A most dreadful Accident happened here the Day before Yesterday. The Lightening fell upon a Tower, in which were feveral Thousand Pounds Weight of Gunpowder, and blew it up into the Air with a horrible Explosion. Eight Palaces, and 97 other Houses, have been entirely defroyed by it, and more than 1800 Persons buried in the Ruins. About 300 have been dng out alive, but all more or less hurt. The rest were found crushed to Pieces. We cannot, as yet, form any just Estimate of the Loss occasioned by this melancholy Accident. but, according to Appearance, it cannot be lefs than 300,000 Venetian Ducats.

PARIS, Aug. 21. It is pretended, that the English have offered to reftore Canada, if the King of France will give up their Possessions in India, and prohibit all Commerce to their Subjects in those Parts.

DO Aug. 24. George Wood, the Person mentioned in Yesterday's Paper as charged with Murder and Piracy on board the Black Prince, arrived at London from New-York, in the Ship Dutchess of Gordon, with Martin Cow, William Bolton, and James Appleton, of his barbarous Companions; and as they are all well known upon the River and 201. Reward is offered for each, it is hoped they will foon be taken, that their

horrid Offence may be punished as it deserves. It having been represented to the King, that about Eight Months ago the Ship Black Prince, William Hawkins, Mafter, belonging to Mr. John Fowler and others, Merchants in Briffol, bound to Old Calabar on the Coast of Africa, having on board about 44 Per-fons, Boys included; that about Two Months after they left Briftol, being within a Week's fail from the Coast, about 30 of the Crew (most of whom are defribed in the Lift) mutinied, and bound the Captain and Chief Mate, and put them, together with the Second and Third Mates, the Boatfwain, Cooper, One Foreman Man, and the Cabbin Boy, and fome Neces-faries and Provisions, into the Ship's Boat, and sent them off; after which they changed the Name of the Black Prince to that of the Liberty, and painted her Head black; then failed for the Brazils, and coming to Siara, they fold Part of her Cargo; at which Place, while Part of the Crew were afhore, those on board cut the Cable, and after firing several Shot into the Town, gave Chafe to a Schooner, which however escaped from them; that soon after this, they tried the Cook, Allen M'Coy, by a pretended Court Martial, condemned and hanged him; and afterwards put into Crab Island, where seeing a Sail to Legward, they Crab Island, where feeing a Sail to Leeward, they chased her, but the People quitting their Vessel, and taking to their Boats, the Crew of the Black Prince did not board her, but sailed for the West-India Islands, and can ashore at Paris Trees, on the Island of Islands, and ran ashore at Petit Trou, on the Island of lisspaniols, where the Spaniords took Care of them, and helped in unloading the Ship; and all the Cargo, except the Iron, was taken out, and put under the Orders of the Courses.

They detained him 'til Evening, and then ordered him on board his own Veffel.

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

FROM THE LONDON EVENING POST.

In ADDRESS to the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Free-bolders of the County of Dewon, preparatory to the gene-ral Meeting at Exeter, on Thursday the 5th of October,

HE Sheriff having summoned a Meeting of the County in order to confider of a Petition for Redress of Grievances, I think it incumbent on me as a Lover of my Country in general, to lay before you a Transaction, which, I apprehend, gives juster Grounds of Complaint and Apprehension, than any Thing hi-Having long had Reason to ima-

therto made public. Having long had Realon to Imagine, that the Nation has been cruelly and fatally injured in a Way which they little suspect, I have ardently wished for the Day, when my imperfect Informations should be superseded by Evidence and Certains. That Day I states myself is at lest approach. tinty. That Day, I flatter myfelf, is at last approaching, and that the Spirit which now appears among the Freeholders, will bear down every Obstacle that may be thrown in the Way of open and impartial Enquiry I need not remind you, Gentlemen, of the universal Indignation and Abhorrence, with which the Conditions of the late Peace were received by the indepen-dent Part of the Nation. Yet fuch is the candid, unsuspecting Nature of Englishmen, that even those who condemned the Measure, did not attribute it to any worse Motive, than an unmanly Impatience under the Burdens of the War, and a blind headlong Desire to be relieved from them. They did not conceive that Persons of high Rank and unbounded Wealth, could be feduced by Gold to betray the Interests of their Country, and furrender Advantages, which the Lives of fo many Heroes had been willingly facrificed to purchase. Such a Supposition, unhappily for us, is at present far from incredible. The important Secret was disclosed to me in the Year 1764, during my Refidence in Paris. I will not trouble you with a Detail of the intermediate Steps I took in the Affair, which however, in proper Time, I shall most fully and readily discover. It is sufficient to say, that on the 10th of May 1765, by the Direction of Dr. Blackstone, I waited on Lord Halifay, then Secretary of States and waited on Lord Halifax, then Secretary of State, and delivered to him an exact Narrative of the Intelligence I had received at Paris, with Copies of Four Letters to and from Lord Hertford. The Behaviour of Lord Halifax was polite, but evalive. When I prefled him in a fecond Interview to enquire into the Truth of the Charge, he objected to all public Steps that might give an Alarm, and asked me whether I could point out to him any Way of profecuting the Enquiry in Secret, and whether in so doing, there was any Probability of his obtaining positive Proof of the Fact. I was not so much the Dupe of his Artifice, as to believe that he had any serious Intention of following the Clue I had had any ferious Intention of following the Clue I had given him, though his Difcourse plainly pointed that Way. It appeared by the Sequel, that I had judged right: For having Four Days after given a direct and fatisfactory Answer to both his Questions, he then put an End to my Solicitations. by a percentage Refusal

an End to my Solicitations, by a peremptory Refufal to take any Steps whatever in the Affair. It is here necessary to explain what I mean by enquiring into the Truth of the Charge. In the Summer of the Year 1764, an Overture had been made to Sir George Yonge, Mr. Fitzherbert, and several other Members of Parliament, in the Name of the Chevalier D'Eon, importing that he, the Chevalier, was ready to impeach Three Persons, Two of whom are Peers and Members of the Privy Council, of selling the Peace to the French. Of this Proposal I was informed at different Times by the Two Cantlemen abovements. at different Times by the Two Gentlemen abovementioned. Sir George Yonge in particular told me, that he understood the Charge could be supported by written as well as living Evidence. The Step that I urged Lord Halifax to take, was to fend for the Chevalier D'Eon, to examine him upon the Subject of this Overture, to peruse his Papers, and then to proceed acverture, to peruse his Papers, and then to proceed ac-cording to the Proofs. In such a Case, a more decisive Evidence than the Chevalier D'Eon could not be wished for. He had himfelf conducted the Negotiation on the Part of the Enemy, and was known to have in Pof-fession, the Dispatches and Papers of the Duke de Ni-This Gentleman, fo qualified and fo disposed to give Light into the Affair, did Lord Halifax refuse to examine; whether from an Apprehension that the Charge would not be made out, or, on the contrary, that it would, I leave you, Gentlemen, and every imperial Results to index

It must not be understood, that I can myself support a Charge of Corruption against the noble Lords named in my Information. My Complaint is of a different Nature, and against a different Person. I consider the Refusal of Lord Halisax as a wilful Obstruction of national Justice, for which I wish to see him undergo a suitable Punishment. Permit me to observe, Gentlemen, that such an Obstruction not only gives a temporary Impunity to Offenders, but it tends also to make partial Reader to judge. tary Impunity to Offenders, but it tends also to make that Impunity perpetual, by destroying or weakening the Proofs of their Guilt. Evidence of all Kinds is a very perishable Thing: Living Witnesses are exposed

to the Chance of Mortality, and written Evidence to the, not uncommon, Cafualty of Fire. In the prefent Cafe fomething more than these ordinary Accidents might with good Reason be apprehended. It stands upon Record, that the Count de Guerchy had conspired to affective the Charles of to affaffinate the Chevalier D'Eon, neither has this Charge hitherto been refuted or answered. This not succeeding, a Band of Ruffians was hired to kidnap that Gentleman, and carry off his Papers. Though this fecond Attempt failed, it does not follow that this second Attempt failed, it does not follow that these important Papers are still secure. I was informed by Mr. Fitzherbert, so long ago as the 17th of May 1765, that he had then Intelligence of Overtures making to the Chevalier D'Eon, the Object of which was, to get the Papers out of his Hands, in Return for a stipulated. Sum of Money. This Account I communicated the following Day to Lord Halisax, who still persisted in exposing these precious Documents to so many complicated Hazards. I say precious Documents, because if they should be unfortunately lost, the Affair must be for ever involved in Uncertainty, an Uncertainty, Gentlemen, which may be productive an Uncertainty, Gentlemen, which may be productive of infinite Mischiefs to the Nation, and cannot tend to the Advantage or Satisfaction of any but the Guilty.

Lord Halifax, in excuse for his Refusal, will proba-

bly alledge, as he did to me, his Perfuafion that the Charge was wholly Groundlefs. I need not observe how misplaced and frivolous such an Allegation is, when applied to justify a Magistrate for not examining Evidence. But I will suppose for Argument sake the Person accused to be perfectly Innocent. Is it not the Interest and the Wish of every innocent Man, to have his Conduct scrutinized while Facts are recent, and Truth of Consequence easy to be distinguished from Falshood? Is there any Tenderness in suffering a Stain to remain upon their Characters, 'til it becomes diffi-cult or even impossible to be wiped out? Will therecult or even impossible to be wiped out? Will therefore these noble Persons, if their Actions have been upright, will they, I say, thank Lord Halisax for depriving them of an early Opportunity of establishing their Innocence? Will they not regret and execrate his Caution, if the subsequent Suppression or Destruction of the Evidence should concur with other Circumstances to say on them the Sussicion of Guilt? Circumstances to fix on them the Suspicion of Guilt? How will Lord Halifax excuse himself to his Sovereign, for fuffering fo attrocious a Calumny to spread and take Root to the evident Hazard of his royal Reputation? And what Amends will he make to the Nation for the Heart-burnings and Jealousies which are the natural Fruit of such a Procedure? Yet these, Gentlemen, are the least of the Mischiefs that may be apprehended from his Behaviour upon the Footing of his

I will venture however to affert, that, as far as hitherto appears, the Weight of Evidence and Probability is on the contrary Side. Now supposing the Charge to be true, there can be no need of long Arguments to convince you of the Injury done to the Nation by fuffering fuch capital Offenders to escape. For what is this but to defraud us of the only Compenfation we can expect for the Lofs of fo many important Territories, a Loss rendered fill more grievous by the Indignity of paying a Pension, as we notoriously do, to the foreign Minister who negociated the ruinous Bargain? Yet even these Considerations are infinitely outweighed by the Danger to which the whole Nation must be exposed from the continued Operation of so much Authority, Influence, and Favour to their Prejudice, and above all from the Possibility that the supreme Government of the Kingdom may, by the Regency-Act, devolve to a Person directly and positively gency-Act, devolve to a Perion directly and politively accused of High Treason. Even the Encouragement that such an Impunity must give to suture Treasons, is enough to fill a thinking Mind with the most painful Apprehensions. We live in an Age, not greatly addicted to Scruples, when the open Avowal of domestic Venality seems to lead Men by an easy Gradation to Connexions equally Mercenary, with Foreigners and Connexions equally Mercenary, with Foreigners and Enemies.—How then can we expect ill-disposed Per-fons to refift a Temptation of this Sort, when they find that Treason may be detected and Proofs of it offered to a Magistrate without producing either Punishment or Enquiry? The Consequence of this may be our or Enquiry? The Consequence of this may be our Living to see a French Party, as well as a Court Party in Parliament; which, should it ever happen, no Imagination can sufficiently paint the calamitous and horird State, to which our late glorious Triumphs might simily be reduced. When I talk of a French Party in Parliament, I do not speak a mere visionary Language unsupported by Experience. The History of all Ages informs us, that France, where other Weapons have failed, has constantly had Recourse to the less alarming Weapons of Intrigue and Corruption. And how ef-Weapons of Intrigue and Corruption. And how effectual these have sometimes been, we have a recent and tragical Example in the Total enflaving of Corfica. I have been thus particular in enumerating the Evils

that may refult from the Refufal of Lord Halifax, not from a Defire of aggravating that Nobleman's Offence, but merely to evince the Necessity of a speedy Enquiry, while there is yet a Chance of it's not being wholly Fruitles. Though the Course of my Narrative has unavoidably led me to accuse his Lordship, Accusation is not my Object, but Enquiry, which cannot be disagreeable to any but those to whom Truth itself is disagreeable. In applicing this Point, I have historical agreeable. In purfuing this Point, I have hitherto been frustrated from the very Circumstance which ought to have insured my Success; the immense Importance of the Question. It has been apprehended,

how justly I know not, that any Magistrate who should commence an Enquiry, or any Gentleman who should openly move for it, would be deemed responsible for the Truth of the Charge, and subjected to the Penalties, if he could not make it good. This ination however did not deter me, tho single an exprotected, from carrying my Papers to the Speaker, to be laid before the late House of Commons. The Speaker was pleased to justify my Conduct, by allowant that was pleased to justify my Conduct, by allowing that the Affair ought to be enquired into, but refused at the fame Time to be instrumental in promoting the Enquiry himself. What then remained to be done? What, but to wait, though with Reluctance and Impatience, till a proper Opportunity should offer for appealing to the Public at large, that is, till the accumulated Errors of Government should awaken a Spirit of Enquiry, too powerful to be refifted or eluded? That this Spirit is now reviving, we have a sufficient earnest in the unanimous Zeal you have thewn for the Ap-pointment of a County Meeting. In such a Conjuncture to withhold from you so important a Truth, would no longer be Prudence, it would be to difgrace my former Conduct, it would shew that I had been actuated by fome temporary Motives, and not by a fleady and uni-form regard to a national Good. Indeed, the declared Purpose of your Meeting, is in itself a call upon every Freeholder to disclose whatever you are concerned to know. I obey this Call without Hesitation, submitting the Projecution of the Affair to your Judgment, in full Confidence that the Refuit of your Deliberations, will do honour at the fame Time to your Prudence, Candour, and Patriotifm.

OME Letters from Corfica advise, that the Inhabiants of the Pieve of Niolo had revolted against the French, and killed feveral of them : But that the Count de Vaux had fent a Detachment, which obliged them to fubmit, and had brought many of them Prisoners to Bastia. Other Letters say, that the Island is very quiet. The French have demolished the Fortifications of Oletta and some others. These Letters add, that the French have begun to root up the Woods of Chef-nut and Olive Trees, which they are determined to clear, and fow the Ground with Corn and Vegetables.

D N Sept. 4. They write from Teneriff, that the Portuguele Trade of those Islands is greatly interrupted by the Salletine Corfairs, one of which had taken a Bark laden with Salt and Wine, and carried her into the Island of Fedal.

It is worthy of Observation, that to the Sovereignty of Corsica, is annexed the Title of Sovereign of the Mediterranean Sea, fo that his most Christian Majesty has, from the Conquest of that Island, a Right to add that of King of the Mediterranean Sea, and though it was but a nominal Title when possessed by the Genoese, yet may, in the Possession of so powerful a Monarch, be considerably more, and have no small Weight with feveral European Powers.
