# FSU to Launch Student Health Initiative with AstraZeneca Contribution

Public Invited to Join Free Afternoon of Health & Wellness Activities

On **Sept. 5**, Frostburg State University and fitness star **Scott** Cole will introduce a science- and wellness-centered initiative to promote health practices and education among college students and the local community, thanks to a \$228,225 contribution from AstraZeneca Pharmaceuticals.

FSU's planned programming for "Creating Healthy, Informed, Lasting Lifestyles (CHILL)" includes preventative student health

screenings, smoking and substance abuse prevention and the development of a variety of campus-wide-activities and educational outreach efforts that encourage exercise and nutrition.

"Health and wellness are a huge part of the important life skills students develop while they're in college, and FSU is committed to expanding educational outreach in this area," said FSU President Jonathan Gibralter.

On **Sept. 5**, national wellness expert **Cole** leads a campus-wide workshop and discussion for students, faculty, staff and residents.

Cole will talk to FSU audiences from noon to 1 p.m. in FSU's Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall, located in the Lane University Center. A 2-mile, campus-wide walk led by FSU's health and physical education students follows Cole's presentation at 1 p.m. A Wellness Fair featuring various FSU offices and organizations will be held in the Lane University Center from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. The afternoon of health and wellness activities is free and open to the public.

Cole earned the title of National Aerobic Champion, starred in the topselling "Abs of Steel" video series, and created DVD programs "Millennium

# **New Programs:**

### **B.S. in Nursing Completion Program**

Registered nurses and current nursing students looking to expand their skills and advance their careers can now take advantage of a new learning opportunity at FSU. FSU has received approval from the Maryland Higher Education Commission and the Maryland Board of Nursing to offer a Bachelor of Science in Nursing completion program, presented in collaboration with Allegany College of Maryland.

FSU's long-term goal is to expand the program to offer a Master of Science in Nursing, with an emphasis on developing nursing faculty.

The program is open to those who have already been licensed as registered nurses or are eligible for a license and to students who are enrolled in an associate degree program that will lead to a license. Instruction will be presented using a blended format, which includes online offerings. Blended instruction maximizes a student's scheduling flexibility while still maintaining the student-faculty connection that is essential to academic success.

FSU was awarded \$250,000 from the Maryland Higher Education Investment Fund to develop its nursing program.

### **Information Technology**

FSU has been granted approval to offer a bachelor of science degree in information technology, an important component in its efforts to meet the workforce development needs of the region and the state of Maryland. The Information Technology program will be part of FSU's Department of Computer Science. A minor in information technology will also be offered.

Information technology differs from computer science in its focus. Computer science tends to be directed more purely on the design of a program, while information technology tends to be more of the bridge to the program's user.

These external skills are the purpose for the tracks - accounting, business, computer security, graphic arts and mass communication - which students in the program will choose. These are often technology-intensive disciplines that also require specialized knowledge in the field beyond the computer program

The program is designed to meet the standards of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology, and the University will be pursuing accreditation from that board.

### FSU Earns High Marks in Princeton Review's 'Green Rating' of colleges

FSU made the grade in having a green campus when it received a score of 85 in the Princeton Review's "Green Rating" of colleges. The Green Rating is a numerical score of 60 to 99 that the Princeton Review tallied for 534 colleges and universities based on data it collected from the schools concerning their environmentally related policies, practices and academic offerings. FSU's score of 85 is in the top half of that ranking, just 5 points short of the level of "Green Rating Honor Roll."

The Princeton Review created the Green Rating to help students identify schools that are committed to environmental issues in their practices, use of resources and academic and research programs.

# FSU Workshops Net National Certification on Residential PV Generation Systems

Area electricians, contractors, engineers and other interested parties will have an opportunity to expand their knowledge of photovoltaic (PV) generation systems, thanks to FSU's latest inroads in providing educational programs on renewable energy: FSU recently received approval from the North American Board of Certified Energy Practitioners (NABCEP) to offer workshops and entry-level certification exams on designing, installing and maintaining residential PV generation systems.

FSU is currently the only NABCEP-approved provider of PV workshops and certification exams in Maryland and throughout the region that covers Virginia, Washington, D.C., West Virginia, Pennsylvania and Kentucky. For information, visit www.nabcep.org.

### FSU English Professor LaFemina Nets Prestigious Pushcart Prize

Gerry LaFemina, an English professor at FSU, recently joined the ranks of some of America's most notable writers when he won the Pushcart Prize, an American literary award that recognizes the best writing published by small presses.

"It's a great honor to win one of these things," LaFemina said. "I've been nominated eight other times, so ninth time is the charm! I'm excited—it's been a great year for me as a writer, and this just adds to it."

LaFemina was honored for his poem, "Returning Home in the MG Just Before Dawn," a work that was published in the Summer 2007 issue of "The Chattahoochee Review," a nationally recognized literary magazine sponsored by Georgia Perimeter College.

"Returning Home in the MG Just Before Dawn" will be featured in "The Pushcart Prize XXXIII: Best of the Small Presses," which will be published in December.

LaFemina is the Distinguished Poetin-Residence at FSU, directs that school's Frostburg Center for Creative Writing and serves as assistant professor in FSU's Department of English.

He also in June attended a three-week forestry field techniques class with Allegany College of Maryland forestry faculty and students and two FSU students, where he began discussions toward more forest ecology and forestry collaboration with Allegany College. In July he led an FSU Arboretum workday for 35 students and staff of Upward Bound from Potomac State College. They removed invasive knotweed and planted native grasses and wildflowers.

On July 22 he gave an invited talk at the Hickory Environmental Education Center as part of the Natural Resources Careers Camp (NRCC) for about 30 students, counselors and camp directors.

McIntire was one of 50 U.S. college students selected from over 200 applicants for this 10-week paid internship. She is also a minor in sociology and hopes to pursue a Master's in Library Science degree after graduation. 



### Campus Emergency **Evacuation Procedures**

FOR STAFF: All employees shall be familiar with a primary and secondary evacuation route from each area within the building where they work. Evacuation routes are any clear hallway that leads to the stairs and the outside of the building.

When an alarm sounds, the employee shall immediately evacuate the building in safe and orderly manner to the nearest clear exit. DO NOT USE THE ELEVATOR.

Assist any individual requiring additional help. Instruct any other occupants of the building to evacuate the building immediately. Don't congregate near the exits.

When safely out of the building, contact University Police at x4222 by cell phone or from another building. The building shall not be re-entered until an "all clear" is given by University Police.

FOR FACULTY: Instructors should be familiar with a primary and a secondary evacuation route from each area of the classroom building. During the first class, faculty should share with students evacuation routes and tell them not to use the elevator in an emergency. This information should be repeated in a fire alarm sounds.

When an alarm sounds, the instructor must immediately release the class, telling the students to proceed in a safe and orderly fashion towards the nearest clear exit. The instructor should leave as well.

The instructor should assist any handicapped or mobility impaired individuals out of the building or to an enclosed stair tower where they will be protected from flame, smoke and gasses. If an impaired person is left in a stair tower, the University Police must be notified immediately after exiting the building.

If conditions permit, heat-generating appliances should be turned off. Doors and windows should be shut when

exiting the room.

Make sure students don't congregate near building exits. The building should not be re-entered until an "all clear" is given by a University Police officer.

Watch for other safety tips that pertain to your work place or your assigned task. Preventing employee injury is the responsibility of every employee.
