African American Studies Talk on Brown Decision

FSU will host a lecture on "The Brown Decision: Desegregation in Baltimore and Allegany County," presented by Maryland archivist Dr. David Taft Terry on Monday, March 29, at 7:30 p.m. in the Lane University Center Manicur Assembly Hall.

Terry's informative talk will discuss post-World War II desegregation in both Baltimore and locally in Allegany County. The event is free and open to the public.

Although schools were given one year to desegregate following the Supreme Court decision in May 1954, the Baltimore City School Board ordered immediate compliance, effective the following fall. Terry traces the relative ease of the transition to the decades prior to Brown v Board of Education. He examines Baltimore during the period of 1936 to 1955 and demonstrates that the struggle was being waged simultaneously in multiple walks of life, in the various spaces of existence, and by many of the same folk. Though subtle, indirect and non-coordinated, the multifaceted "attack" on discrimination brought about a call for an end to segregation and Jim Crow.

Terry is a Research Specialist at the Maryland State Archives, where he has researched Maryland history related to the Underground Railroad, lynching and racial desegregation in the mid-20th century. His forthcoming book will examine pre-1954 desegregation in Baltimore City and the Urban Upper South. He is also an adjunct professor of history at Morgan State University.

Local historian Al Feldstein will also have a display of memorabilia related to African Americans.

Former Asst. Secretary of Defense to Speak

Dr. Lawrence J. Korb, former United States Assistant Secretary of Defense in the Reagan administration, will give the presentation "A New National Security Strategy in an Age of Terrorists, Tyrants and Weapons of Mass Destruction" at FSU on Tuesday, April 20, at 2 p.m. in the Lane University Center's Alice R. Manicur Assembly Hall.

Korb is an expert on national security, arms control and the U.S. defense budget. He currently holds the positions of adjunct senior fellow at the Council on Foreign Relations and senior fellow at the Center for American Progress. Previously, he served as vice president and director of studies at the Council on Foreign Relations from 1988 – 2002. He was also a senior fellow in the Foreign Policy Studies Program and directed the Center for Public Policy Education for the Brookings Institution. He served as dean of the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs, University of Pittsburgh, from 1986 - 1988 and is a former advisor FSU's International Studies program.


Korb is a frequent contributor to foreign affairs and national security journals and guest columnist for several national newspapers. He is the author of many books including "A New National Security Strategy..." (2003); "American National Security: Policy and Process" (1993); "The Fall and Rise of the Pentagon" (1979) and "The Joint Chiefs of Staff: The First Twenty-five Years" (1976).

Financial Planning Certificate Program

Registration for the Spring-II term of FSU's Financial Planning Certificate Program (FPCP) is now open. Classes will commence on Saturday, March 27 and conclude on Saturday, May 15.

The course scheduled for offering this

term is "FPCP V: Employee Benefits and Retirement Income Planning" (Mornings; 9 a.m. – 1 p.m.). Registration will occur on a first-come, first-served basis. Program structure is flexible and allows students to take five of the six required courses in any order, with "Estate Planning" as the final course. FPCP is a noncredit program that can be completed in approximately 15 months. The program is being offered at the Frostburg main campus as well as the Hagerstown Center using interactive video (Distance Education) technology. Required courses are offered on a rotating basis in five eight-week terms, annually. Classes are held on Saturdays in order to accommodate the work schedules of students. Courses are taught at the junior or senior undergraduate level and the pace of each course is intensive. Completion of Frostburg's CFP Board-registered FPCP will fulfill the educational requirements and enable students to sit for the CFP ® Examination.

FPCP invites all working professionals in insurance, banking, investments, accounting, law and other finance-based businesses, current students in business, accounting, and economics, as well as individuals interested in switching careers to consider enrolling in the program. Financial planning is a rapidly growing field that serves the needs of individuals in all income groups.

Students Offer Free Tax Preparation Help

Free help preparing 2003 tax returns is available through the IRS-sponsored VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) Program at FSU.

Help with basic federal and Maryland income tax returns will be offered through early April by FSU's College of Business students who have been trained and approved by the IRS. Faculty members will oversee these student preparers.

The VITA program offers this assistance to taxpayers filing Form 1040EZ, Form 1040A, or a basic Form 1040 federal tax return. Volunteers will alert taxpayers to special credits and deductions for which they may be eligible.

Appointments must be made in advance by calling Joyce Middleton, VITA site co-coordinator, at x4154. Students will work Saturdays from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. in Framptom Hall (except for March 20 and 27). A drop-off service will also be available throughout the week.

Taxpayers arriving for an appointment should bring any tax packages mailed by the IRS and the state, Form W-2 from all employers, interest and dividend statements (Form 1099), a copy of last year's returns, if available, and any other relevant information about income and expenses. Taxpayer and dependent social security numbers and birth dates are also needed.

Safety Message

Use, Care of Personal Protective Clothing

Have you noticed your colleagues, associates or your laboratory neighbor wearing lab gloves and/or lab coats in the corridor, elevator, break area/room, at the copy machine, using the water fountain or in the lunch line.

Have you ever wondered what those gloved hands touched before they touched the water fountain button, the elevator call button, the copy machine controls, the door handle outside of the lab and the door handle to the rest room?

Have you been in a cafeteria or snack bar and someone wearing a lab coat reaches across your food tray? Do you wonder what may have dropped off the lab coat onto your food or into your beverage? It gives you something to think about. Possibly, you may have done the same thing. If your answer is yes, you can help yourself, your colleagues, your associates and your neighbors make FSU a healthier and safer workplace. The described scenario calls for a change in behavior that will be appreciated by everyone.

Safe Work Practices in Common Use Areas

Common use areas and items are elevator call buttons, door handles, copy machine controls, telephones, water fountain control levers, lavatory sink faucet handles, newspapers and magazines in break areas, etc. Gloved hands should not touch these surfaces. Being a thoughtful colleague neighbor requires the removal of our lab coat, gloves and apron, and washing your hands with soap and hot water before exiting the

laboratory or research area. Lab coats, gloves, aprons and shoe covers are personal protective clothing and are used to prevent contamination of the user's clothing, hands and areas outside the lab by biological, chemical, medical biohazard and/or radiological materials.

Lab coats, lab gloves, aprons and like clothing must be removed before leaving the laboratory and before entering common use/public use areas. This Personal Protective Clothing is to be properly stored or sent out for laundering. Home laundering of lab

coats, lab gloves and aprons puts your family members at risk of exposure to the hazardous materials that you and your associates were working with in your laboratory.

If you see a colleague in a common use/public areas wearing personal protective clothing, speak to him or her politely about your concern. Remember that only when we work together at FSU can we make a difference and improve our work environment.
