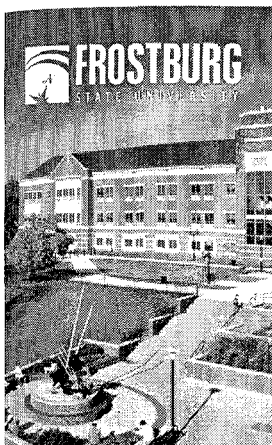

FSU Sponsors Poetry Reading by Chad and Jennifer Sweeney



The FSU Center for Creative Writing will present a reading by poets Chad and Jennifer K. Sweeney on **Monday, Feb. 15**, at 7:30 p.m. at Main Street

Books at 2 E. Main St. in Frostburg. The reading is free and open to the public.

Chad Sweeney is the author of three books of poetry, "Parable of Hide and Seek," "Arranging the Blaze" and "An Architecture." He edited the anthology "Days I Moved Through Ordinary Sounds: The Teachers of WritersCorps in Poetry and Prose" and was co-editor of "Parthenon West Review." His poems have appeared widely, including in "Best American Poetry" and "Verse Daily." He holds a master's in fine arts from San Francisco State University and is a doctoral candidate in literature and poetry at Western Michigan University, where he teaches poetry and serves as assistant editor of New Issues Press.

Jennifer K. Sweeney's first book, "Salt Memory," won the 2006 Main

Street Rag Poetry Award; her second poetry collection, "How to Live on Bread and Music," received the 2009 James Laughlin Award from the Academy of American Poets, as well as the Perugia Press Prize. Nominated six times for a Pushcart Prize, her poems have appeared in numerous journals, including "Southern Review," "Hunger Mountain," "Crab Orchard," "Spoon River" and "Passages North," where she won the 2009 Elinor Benedict Poetry Prize. She was awarded a grant from the San Francisco Arts Commission and a residency from Hedgebrook. Sweeney holds a master's in fine arts from Vermont College and serves as assistant editor for "DMQ Review."

FSU Alum's Works to Be on Display at FSU

"On Second Thought: Recent Works on Paper," an exhibition featuring work by FSU alumnus **Sam Shaffer**, will be on display in the Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery. The exhibition will open on **Friday, Feb. 5**, with an opening reception from 7 to 9 p.m. The show will be on display **through Wednesday, Feb. 24**.

The collection features Recent Works on Paper as the basis for Shaffer's upcoming show, which are a broad representation of the works he has made over the past year. In this

series, Shaffer has used scraps and images found on the floor or in some box. He has cut them out, pasted them together, moved them around, then moved them around some more. Combining drawing, spray paint and collage, he has made something free flowing and has looked for gestures – even awkward ones – that lead somehow from one image to the next. The images are emotional ones of circus scenes, artist friends, self-portraits and family portraits – sometimes ugly, sometimes beautiful – but always displaying motion, colors and textures and the touch of the hand on paper.

Shaffer graduated from FSU in 1978. He received a master's degree in fine arts (printmaking) from the Pratt

Institute. He is a winner of the Liqueatex Excellence in Art Award.

Blair A. Ruble, director of the Kennan Institute for Advanced Russian Studies of the Woodrow Wilson Center in Washington, D.C., and program director for Comparative Urban Studies at

Ruble has edited a dozen volumes and is the author of five monographic studies. FSU to Offer Writing Workshop for Veterans

FSU's Center for Creative Writing will offer an opportunity just for veterans, a chance to participate in a mixed-genre creative writing workshop. The workshop, open to student veterans and veterans in the local community, is free and requires no purchase of materials. The workshop will meet on Wednesdays from **Feb. 3 to May 5** from 5 to 7 p.m. at the center's home in the Lyric Building on Main Street in Frostburg.

The workshop will be led by local veteran and writer Clint Garner. The focus of the workshop will be to equip participants with some basic writing skills, tools and resources. Participants will discuss basic components and conventions of all three major creative writing genres (non-fiction, fiction and poetry), read successful works from each genre by veterans from various eras as well as discuss what makes them work and write original works of each genre. Participants will also have the chance to receive feedback from classmates and the instructor.

Be Heart Smart This February

According to the Centers for Disease Control, heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States. Lack of physical activity can lead to heart disease at any age. CHILL wants FSU to increase its heart health this month by staying active despite these frigid temperatures.

From Feb. 1 to March 1, CHILL will host a "Be Heart Smart" program to encourage Bobcats to keep track of their daily fitness activities by using the American Heart Association's Start! program. This free online program will allow participants to join the FSU

network and document the frequency and intensity of aerobic exercise.

Every participant is a winner! Each participant who accurately documents weekly required exercise, i.e., 2.5 hours a week of moderate-level aerobic exercise, will be eligible to receive a free CHILL T-shirt. This program is open to students, faculty and staff.

The Biggest Loser Returns to FSU

CHILL is bringing its "The Biggest Loser on Campus" program back to campus for the second year in a row.

"The Biggest Loser on Campus" is designed to promote student wellness by encouraging increased participation in aerobic activities and health programs on campus. During this two-month program, teams of four will be awarded points for completing tasks that aim to improve participants' overall well-being, including meeting with personal trainers, submitting nutritional analyses and engaging in campus programs.

This program rewards campus engagement and self-awareness, not weight loss. However, past participants noted that their shrinking waistlines were a benefit of their new diet, exercise and stress management techniques. In spring 2009, the top three teams lost a combined total of 114 pounds, and each accumulated multiple participation points by being involved in campus blood drives and walking in the annual Relay for Life event.

'Vagina Monologues' to Be Performed

FSU will present Eve Ensler's "The Vagina Monologues" at 7:30 p.m. on **Friday, Feb. 12, and Saturday, Feb. 13**, at PAC Pealer Recital Hall. The Vagina Fair will be held from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m., which includes the V-Day Scarf Sale, as well as displays from groups such as the Family Crisis

Resource Center. The event is part of V-Day, a global campaign to end violence against women and girls.

"The Vagina Monologues" dives into a range of emotions buried in real women's experiences. All proceeds will benefit the Family Crisis Resource Center in Cumberland and the Dove Center of Garrett County.

In 2009, over 4,200 V-Day benefit events produced by volunteer activists took place in the U.S. and around the world, educating millions of people about the reality of violence against women and girls. To date, the V-Day movement has raised over \$70 million and educated millions about the issue of violence against women and the efforts to end it; crafted international educational, media and PSA campaigns; launched the Karama program in the Middle East; reopened shelters; and funded over 11,000 community-based antiviolence programs and safe houses in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Haiti, Kenya, South Dakota, Egypt and Iraq. V-Day was named one of Worth magazine's "100 Best Charities" in 2001 and Marie Claire's "Top 10 Charities" in 2006. The "V" in V-Day stands for Victory, Valentine and Vagina.

As part of its 2010 V-Day Campaign, FSU will have its annual Scarf Sale **Feb. 1 through 4 and Feb. 8 through 11** in the Tawes Lobby at FSU and during the performances of "The Vagina Monologues." Proceeds will benefit both local centers.

The Clothesline Project, designed to "air out society's dirty laundry," will be held from **Feb. 8 to 11** with the Scarf Sale. Women and men are invited to create shirts that will be displayed during the performances of "The Vagina Monologues" as a visual representation of real stories of violence against women.

• David Sanford Graduate Student Scholarship

The recipient must be enrolled full time or part time as a graduate student, have previously been an undergraduate at FSU and have received a varsity sport participation letter. An FSU overall grade point average of 3.0 or better is required.

• F. Perry Smith Jr. Graduate Scholarship

The recipient must have completed his or her high school education or the equivalent in Allegany or Garrett counties in Maryland and be enrolled at FSU with an overall grade point average of 3.0 or better. The recipient must demonstrate financial need (complete and submit the FAFSA form).

• Howard and Audrey Naylor Graduate Scholarship

The recipient must be a certified teacher or eligible for certification and be admitted in good standing or eligible for admission to the M.Ed. Special Education program. The student must attend full time.
