'Meet Me at the Dance Hall' Theme of FSU Fall Dance Concert

The FSU Department of Theatre and Dance will evoke the elegant dance halls of the 1950s as the FSU Dance Company presents its Fall Dance Concert, "Meet Me at the Dance Hall," on **Friday**, **Nov. 13**, and **Saturday**, **Nov. 14**, at 7:30 p.m. in the F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre in the Performing Arts Center.

Choreographed and directed by *Jamie McGreevy*, the FSU Dance Company blends the classic stylings of artists such as Frank Sinatra, Ella Fitzgerald and Sammy Davis Jr. with contemporary dance techniques.

"From tap to modern, Astaire to Presley ... this is a dance experience not to be missed!" said McGreevy.

Design artists will transform the theatre into a once-elegant, now-worn, late-1950s dance hall fit with classical drapery, a smoky haze and a crystal ball. Audience members are encouraged to join the experience by dressing in their favorite styles from the late 1950s and the early 1960s.

"It was such transitional time especially in woman's fashions. Ladies were shifting from the 'dress for your man' silhouette to a freer and fun silhouette." said McGreevy.

The FSU Dance Company is a pre-professional collegiate performance company comprised of FSU students who range in academic standing from freshmen to seniors. The company is offered as part of the Dance Minor through the Department of Theatre and Dance.

CES at FSU Presents De Temps Antan in LIVE! at StarScape Performance



CES at FSU will present the foot-stomping musicians of De Temps Antan in a LIVE! at StarScape club performance on **Saturday, Nov. 21**, at 7:30 p.m. in Lane Manicur Hall.

The youthful Québecois trio includes the blazing fiddle of André Brunet, the brash accordion playing of Pierre-Luc Dupuis and the pristine voice and exquisite guitar of Éric Beaudry. Their high-voltage performances have been seen by audiences around the world. Together they exhibit boundless joie-de-vivre onstage with a sound anchored by the "tac-tic-a tac" of "les pieds," a form of seated clogging found in French Canada.

Dr. Mark Gallagher and Dr. Jay DeWire Present 'An Evening With Robert Schumann'

FSU's Department of Music will present clarinetist *Dr. Mark Gallagher* and pianist *Dr. Jay DeWire* in the Faculty Artist Series on **Saturday**, **Nov. 14**, at 7:30 p.m. They will be joined by guest artist *Dr. Brent Weber* on the saxophone.

Gallagher and DeWire's recital, "An Evening With Robert Schumann," will feature four incredible compositions by Robert Schumann, the German-born composer who is considered to be one of the best from the Romantic period. The evening will start with "Märchenerzählungen, Op. 132," a four-movement piece that opens with a dream-like march, progresses through a dramatic march to a dulcet duet and ends with remnants of the dream march. The program will continue with "Funf Stücke im Volkston, Op. 102," a five-movement piece that ranges from a mysterious to a somber piano riff. Then Gallagher and DeWire will perform "Fünf Lieder und Gesänge, Op. 127," a five-movement piece that differentiates itself by adding a vocal component to the work. The program will end with "Fantasiestücke, Op. 73," which is a three-movement piece that begins in a dreamy, fantastical manner then progresses to a rapid, passionate tune.

Gallagher is a professor of clarinet at FSU and an active teacher and clinician. Co-founder of I Venti Semplice, Gallagher has performed with the Washington Contemporary Music Forum, the Baltimore Chamber Orchestra, the New York City Ballet Orchestra and the U.S. Navy Band. He has performed at the Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall and is a winner of the Artist International Completion, which resulted in the award of a solo recital in Weill Hall. He has recorded with the Albany Records label and can be heard on the Eastman "American Music" Series.

DeWire, a frequent solo performer and member of the West Shore Trio, has appeared up and down the Eastern seaboard and is becoming known for his dynamic interpretations of 20th-century works and his "old world flair." He has recorded three live performance solo CDs, including a 20th-century concert that includes works by Ravel, Debussy, Bartok, Rzewski and Messiaen. DeWire has also recorded an all-Brahms concert featuring the recently discovered Gavottes, which he arranged and completed for concert performance. He was a finalist in the American Musicological Society (Mid-Atlantic Chapter) Writing Competition and has received numerous prizes, including the Brander Wyatt Morrison Prize.

FSU Students to Perform Guitar Studio Showcase

The FSU Department of Music will present a guitar ensemble recital on Tuesday, Nov. 17, at 7:30 p.m.

Patrick Sise is the guitar instructor. FSU students will perform solo works that they have been working on over the semester and the summer. Several composers will be included during the showcase, such as Leo Brouwer, Cuban composer and conductor; Fernando Sor, Spanish classical guitarist and composer; Matteo Carcassi, Italian guitarist and composer; Agustin Barrios, Paraguayan classical guitarist and composer; J.S. Bach, German composer and musician of the Baroque period; Juan Serrano, flamenco guitarist; Domenico Scarlatti, Italian composer; Nikita Koshkin, Russian classical guitarist and composer; and Mauro Giuliani, Italian guitarist, cellist, singer and composer.

FSU Named Military Friendly for Fifth Straight Year



Victory Media, which serves military personnel transitioning into civilian life, has named FSU to its coveted Military Friendly Schools list for the fifth year in a row. The Military Friendly Schools list honors colleges, universities and trade schools in the country that go above and beyond to embrace America's military service members, veterans and spouses as students and ensure their success on campus.

FSU recently renovated its Veterans Center, which serves as a base for student veterans and dependents of veterans and helps ensure that they receive the resources, representation and academic benefits they have

earned. The Veterans Center hosts the Veterans Services Office and the Student Veterans of America organization and offers a lounge, kitchen and outdoor area for veterans to use. The Veterans Center additionally performs community and alumni outreach through fundraisers and programs, including a National Roll Call ceremony on Veterans Day, **Wednesday, Nov. 11**, from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room (232).

FSU is also home to a chapter of SALUTE, the first national higher education honor society for student veterans and military service members. FSU offers its undergraduate education program at Ramstein Air Force Base in Germany.

The 2016 list of Military Friendly Schools was compiled through extensive research and a data-driven survey of more than 8,000 VA-approved schools nationwide. Each year, schools taking the survey are held to a higher standard than in the previous year via improved methodology, criteria and weightings developed with the assistance of an independent Advisory Board consisting of educators from schools across the country.

The Military Friendly website (<u>www.militaryfriendly.com</u>) features the list, interactive tools and search functionality to help military students find the best school to suit their needs and preferences. The colleges, universities and trade schools on this year's list exhibit leading practices in the recruitment and retention of students with military experience. The schools have world-class programs and policies for student support on campus, academic accreditation, credit policies, flexibility and other services for those who served.

FSU Foundation Opportunity Grant Serves as Heartbeat for Human Anatomy Courses

Peering upward from her seat, Hannah Tavik is carefully locating the mylohyoid muscle on her patient's neck using a metal pointer.

It's OK if she pokes around or feels for the muscle because this patient is actually a \$6,900 anatomically correct model paid for by an FSU Foundation Opportunity Grant.

The grant allowed the Department of Biology to purchase a three-quarter-scale muscular anatomy figure complete with internal organs and interchangeable genders. The grant also purchased a deluxe medical-grade disarticulated skeleton. One of the uses of the Opportunity Grants is to allow instructors to fund additional materials and classroom experiences.

About 130 students will use these models each semester across courses from Anatomy 211, Anatomy and Physiology 321 and 322 and Comparative Anatomy 427 and 527, said Dr. Karen Keller, an assistant professor in the Department of Biology.

The FSU Foundation previously purchased other models for the Human Anatomy and Physiology lab, Keller added.

Before, students would exclusively rely on pictures and online software to physically identify parts of the body. The software – A.D.A.M. – is a little like the board game Operation, but much more advanced and high-tech.

Keller is thankful Foundation gifts were able to provide the experience to students because she sees the difference in class.

"It makes a huge difference. I can tell by their test scores," Keller said. "I can tell when students email after they get into a professional school. They say, 'Thank you for making me learn this. I can do this now.""

FSU Students to Honor Fallen and Missing Vietnam Veterans

On Veterans Day, **Wednesday**, **Nov. 11**, FSU students, faculty, staff and community members will gather to read the names of the 1,015 Maryland residents who gave their lives or remain missing in action from the Vietnam War. The ceremony will commence at 1:45 p.m. in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). The event is free and open to the public.

Part of the Remembrance Day National Roll Call project, the event serves to mark Veterans Day as a special time of appreciation at FSU for individuals who have served, are serving or have fallen in service to the United States of America. The event has been organized by the FSU Veterans Services Office.

The ceremony will open with welcoming remarks from FSU Veterans Services coordinator *Danielle Dabrowski*, followed by a color guard from Farraday Post No. 24 American Legion in Frostburg and the performance of the national anthem by FSU staff member *Donna Sivic*. At 2 p.m. Eastern Time, a simultaneous nationwide minute of silence will be observed in conjunction with 84 other institutions from 33 states across the nation.

After the nationwide moment of silence, the Roll Call of names will begin. The names of the fallen and missing will be read by veteran FSU students and alumni, as well as other members of the FSU and local communities. Members of the community are welcome to participate. Those wishing to join the Roll Call should contact the FSU Veterans Services Center at <u>VAOffice@frostburg.edu</u> or 301-687-4409 for information and to reserve a time. The ceremony is projected to last until approximately 3:30 p.m., though it will continue until the final name is read and the colors are retired.

The Remembrance Day National Roll Call is sponsored nationally by the Veterans Knowledge Community of NASPA Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education. The Veterans Knowledge Community mission is to advocate for best practices to help student veterans transition to college and succeed.

"We want to rally campus communities across the nation to send a message to the troops currently serving – that we, as a national body of students, have not forgotten their sacrifices, or those of their fallen brethren," said Dr. Brett Morris, a retired Army officer and the National Roll Call coordinator.

Reminder From the Residence Life Office

This is the time of year when on-campus residents begin thinking about where they want to live for the second semester. The Residence Life Office reminds resident students that they have options for relocating, but that they are obligated by contract to remain in on-campus housing for the remainder of the academic year.

RAs in the residence halls have begun distributing Spring Housing Intention Forms to all residents in the traditional halls. Students are reminded that, when they signed their housing contract, it was for the entire 2015-2016 academic year, as long as they are enrolled at FSU during that period. Therefore, housing contracts are automatically cancelled for those who graduate, transfer or withdraw from the University. A student who is studying abroad is released once the International Office confirms the student's participation in the program. Also, anyone doing an internship or student teaching outside the local area is granted a release on confirmation of his or her site assignment.

Students considering a move to Edgewood Commons may be released from their RLO contract to do so, since Edgewood Commons is considered on-campus housing. They remain assigned to a space in the traditional halls until an Edgewood staff person notifies the Residence Life Office that all necessary paperwork is completed.

Study Abroad in New Zealand, Summer 2016
