LONDON, May 26.

**A**MONG the many Prisoners now in a certain Goal Eastward, there is a poor Taylor for Two Guineas and a Half (which was half what he owed to the World when imprisoned) but rather than allow him his Liberty to get Bread for himself, Wife, and Family, his hard-hearted Creditor has already paid him 9 l. in Groats for his Maintenance. Quere, Has his Creditor any Love or Compassion for his Fellow-Creatures, or to his own Interest? Or is not Pride and Revenge his predominant Passion?

Before the unfortunate Mr. Sampson received Judgment, he addressed the Court as follows:

"My Lords,  
"After having voluntarily pleaded Guilty, I humbly wait to receive Sentence of the Law. Great as my Crime is, his Majesty's Mercy is still greater; and if in my past Conduct any Circumstances have happily happened, by which I have (under God) been the Means of saving the Lives of any of his Majesty's Subjects (and with Truth I can say that I have saved above 200 from perishing) I hope those Circumstances will, in some Measure, recommend me, a truly sincere Penitent, to his Royal Mercy; and if it shall be his gracious Pleasure to save that forfeited Life, which before had been the Means of saving many others, the Remainder of it shall be spent in a Manner becoming the Situation, of one sensible of that ineffable Blessing. My Lords, I applied to the Court last Session to put off my Trial, in order that I might be able to lay many favourable Circumstances before this Court, that might incline your Lordships to Mercy; but, being advised that those Circumstances were more proper to be laid before his Royal Majesty, I confessed that Guilt, which in Conscience I could not deny. Your Lordships are Men, you feel as Men, and, perhaps, may now feel Compassion for an unhappy Youth truly penitent, and not yet Twenty Years of Age. Permit me, my Lords, to add, that if your Lordships, who are now proceeding according to strict Law, shall be pleased to render me any compassionate Services, that Obligation to myself and my worthy Relations (now involved in my Sufferings, but not in my Guilt) will never be forgotten. But my Lords, if after all, the bitter Cup of Justice is not to be removed from me, I humbly submit to thy Will, O God, in whom I trust."

On Sunday Night, at near Eleven o'Clock, one of his Majesty's Messengers, dispatched from the Secretary of State's Office, came to Newgate, and brought a Respite, during the King's Pleasure, for Michael Sampson, who on his own Confession was convicted of Forgery, and received Sentence of Death, at the last Session at the Old Bailey, and was one included in the Death Warrant, to suffer with the other seven Malefactors Tommorrow. This joyful News was immediately reported to the unfortunate Youth, (who was then at his Devotions) and as soon as he could recover himself from the Extacy of Joy for his Deliverance, he glorified God, blessed his most Gracious Majesty, and prayed for his worthy, humane, and generous Friends.

This Person was the principal Means of saving the Crews of two Vessels, the one bound to Ireland, where he went to settle Business; the other to England on his Return, when the Commander of each had given up all Hopes of saving Ship, Cargo, or Passengers.

BOSTON, August 20.

In the Antigua Gazette of the 4th of July, is the following interesting Article of Intelligence, which plainly evinces the Designs of our West-India Friends to subvert our Distillers in New-England, and to promote their own, which unless timely remonstrated against in Parliament, will most assuredly take Place, viz. "That in a late Assembly of the Governor and Council of the Island of Jamaica, a Motion was made and approved, to prefer a Memorial to the British Parliament, setting forth, that in the present declining State of the Sugar-Islands, nothing could tend more effectually to restore the West-India Trade from ruin, than putting a Stop to the farther Distillation of Rum in the British Colonies of North-America, commonly called New-England Rum; which, together with large Quantities imported from the French Islands, has so sunk the Demand for that Produce, as to threaten a total Dissolution to the whole Trade."

Extract of a Letter from Jamaica.  
"I am sorry to tell you, that by the late Orders received here for forwarding in the Officers of the High of War to be Custom House Officers, and by a Seizure of two made in Consequence thereof, the Spaniards are so terrified, that they will not run the Risk of bringing either Money or Goods to traffic with us; so that a Pistol is now rarely to be met with; and, in a very short Time, this Island, which always abounded with Spanish Coin, and remitted such Quantities of it to England, will have no other Currency than Paper Money. The Spaniards will very soon be supplied with Linens, Woollens, Silks, Cutlery, &c. from the French and Dutch Territories, who will probably know how to set a true Value on this Branch of Trade, and take Care to keep it. We are quite at a Loss to know what Harm Spanish Money ever did in England, or where is the Mischievous Mother Country, in supplying the Spaniards with the Manufactures of Great-Britain."

NEWPORT, August 20.

It is with Pleasure we hear some of the principal Merchants in Boston have come into a Resolution to curtail many Superfluities in Dress; and that upwards of fifty have already signed a certain Agreement for that Purpose. Lace, Ruffles, &c. are to be entirely laid aside: No English Cloths to be purchased but at a fixed Price; the usual Manner of expressing their Regard and Sorrow for a deceased Friend or Relative, by covering themselves in Black, is also in the List of Superfluities, and no Part thereof but the Crape in the Hat is retained; instead of which, a Piece of Crape is to be tied upon the Arm, after the Manner of the military Gentlemen.

NEW-YORK, August 27.

Two English Men of War are gone from Jamaica for Turk's-Island, to destroy the Works lately erected there by the French.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Shafter, dated August 22, 1764.

"The Morning of the 8th Inst. the Army went off from hence; and in the Evening arrived at Fort Erie, which is on the North Shore, about two Miles above the Rapids, at the Entrance of the Lake. The 9th they set out about 10 o'Clock, and proceeded along the North Shore about 6 Miles, where they remained all Night, waiting for the 17th Regiment, which was detained by having lost some of their Boats in going up the Rapids. Early on the Morning of the 10th, they stood across the Lake to the South Shore. I left Fort Erie the same Day at 10 o'Clock, since which Time have heard nothing from them; though we have Reason to think they are a considerable Way on their Journey, the Weather having been pretty favourable since they went off."

"The Schooners Victory and Boston, sailed from Fort Erie, for Detroit, the 9th, in the Night; the two others are expected in every Day. I purpose to proceed with them to Detroit, and hope to arrive there as soon as the Army."

PHILADELPHIA, August 30.

On the 18th Instant two Men were taken up at Elizabeth-Town, and committed to Goal there, for passing a Number of Counterfeit TWENTY SHILLING BILLS of this Province. One of them goes by the Name of Harman Rosecrans, the other by that of John Hannah; they had paid for three Horses in these Counterfeit Bills; are dated May 1, 1760. [Described in the Maryland Gazette of the 26th of July last.]

Mr. Hugh Munro, of the Island of St. George, one of the Western Islands, acquaints his Correspondent here, in a Letter of the 30th of June, that there was brought from the North Side of that Island a Brig of about 120 Tons, deserted by her Crew, and by what had appeared of the Cargo, it consisted of Boards, a few Hogheads Staves, some small Beams and Shingles upon her Deck, and in the Hold, and supposed to be bound to the Leeward Islands; her Fore-mast sprung; her Main-mast cut about 5 Feet above the Board; the Rudder torn out of the Iron.—The Vessel has a Mermaid Head, and a new Anchor never stocked (the only one found on board) marked T D 94. Weight 7. 0. 14. her two Pumps, fore and aft, in a Line close by the Main mast; and that it appeared, from many Circumstances, that the People had been taken out of Sea by another Vessel.—Mr. Munro offers to act in Behalf of the Owners, provided they transmit him a Power of Attorney, with sufficient Proofs of their Property.

Extract of a Letter from Niagara, July 26.

"Provisions are issued out this Day for 1717 Indians, and more daily coming in."

Extract of a Letter from Fort Ontario, August 7.

"I sailed from Niagara Yesterday, in Company with Sir William Johnson, who has settled Matters with the different Tribes of Indians to his Satisfaction, tho' not a Man of the Delawares or Shawanese came near him; but he received a Letter from them, in which they told him, that as the other Nations had condescended to make Peace, they would likewise agree, out of Pity to their Brethren the English, and not from any Fear they were under from them, for in that Respect they despised them.—There are between 3 and 400 Indians gone with Colonel Bradstreet, who threaten these haughty People.—The Letter from the Indians to Sir William, was wrote by Major Smallman, who is a Prisoner with them."

Our Advices from the Frontiers are as follow, viz.

Carlisle, August 15. Last Friday the Troops marched from this Place, having with them a large Number of Waggon and Pack-horses, with Ammunition, Provision, &c.—An Indian was seen and fired at on Saturday, about Ten or twelve Miles above Shippenburgh, who, it is thought, was there as a Spy, watching the Road.—We have had no Mischief done since that in July.—The Woman supposed, some time ago, to be carried off by the Indians, was found murdered in a Thicket, a little Way from where they took her.—The Lad found alive in the School, and said to be since dead, is, we are informed, yet alive, and in a likely Way to recover.

August 14. By a young Man from Conococheague, we are just now informed, that Indians are seen in that Settlement almost every Day; and that on Friday last, two Men were pursued by four of them, near Justice M'Dowell's, and with great Difficulty escaped.

August 17. Some time last Week three Indians were seen in the upper Part of Marsh Creek, York County, when one Hugh Dinwiddie fired at, and wounded one of them, of which Wound, we hear, he has since been found dead.—A young Woman, Daughter of one James Dylart, going home from Sermon at the Big Spring, last Sunday, about 10 or 12 Miles from hence, was met with, murdered, scalped, and left naked, by the Enemy.—This has alarmed that Settlement, who were chiefly gone home to their Places, and will, we are afraid, make many again fly; especially as there are so many Accounts of Indians being seen in small Parties almost every Day, in one Part or other of the County.—A Number of young Men from the upper Part of this County, are forming a Company, to go out as Volunteers with Colonel Bouquet; and another Company is expected to come from the East Side of the River.

August 18. The main Body of the Army left Loudoun about the Middle of this Week; the Train is to be there this Night.

August 22. A Fellow was taken near Shippenburgh, supposed to be a French Spy, and committed to Goal.

August 23. The above mentioned Fellow was examined by Colonel Armstrong, and some other Magistrates, and sent, under a proper Guard, to Colonel Bouquet.

ANNAPOLIS, September 6.

On Tuesday next the Provincial Court for September Term, will begin here.

The 27th of this Month, will be Three Years, since the Dissolution of the last Assembly, and Issuing Writs for the Calling the present; so that a Dissolution and New Election may be soon expected.

L O N D O N, June 13.

**T**HIS Morning the Right Reverend Richard, Lord Bishop of London, was enthroned at St. Paul's Cathedral, between 10 and 11 o'Clock, during the Time of Divine Service.

After the first Lesson, the Choir proceeded to the Chapter House in St. Paul's Church Yard, from whence they returned in the following Order through the West Door, the Organ playing the while: Two Virgins came first, who were followed by the young Gentlemen of St. Paul's; next came the Vicars Choral, Mr. Savage, as Almoner, and after him the Minor Canons; then the Prebends and Residentiaries. Two Virgins then preceded some Officers belonging to the Commons, who were followed by his Lordship and his Chaplains. On their Arrival in the Body of the Church the Choir divided, and his Lordship passed between them up to the further Stall on the right Hand of the Choir, where he was seated, and the following Instrument read by Dr. Taylor:

"I John Taylor, Chancellor of Lincoln, by the Authority to me committed, do induce, install, and enthrone you, the Right Reverend Father in God Richard, by Divine Permission, Lord Bishop, into the Bishoprick and Episcopal Dignity of London; and the Lord preserve thy going out, and coming in, from this Time forth for evermore, and mayest thou remain in Justice and Sanctity, and adorn the Place to you delegated by God. God is powerful, and may he increase your Grace."

After which, he returned in the same Order to his Seat, when Te Deum, and the rest of the Service, and an Anthem was performed, which being ended, they returned to the Chapter-House in the same Manner as above related, where the Prebends, Minor Canons, &c. acknowledged Canonical Obedience in the Words following:

"Right Rev. Father in God, I acknowledge all Canonical Obedience, due to you as Bishop of London."

June 15. This Week a Ship-master discovered the following Trick had been played him by a Person whom he had brought over-Board from America. He put on board some very heavy Trunks, and on landing at Cowes pretended to receive a Letter which required his immediate Attendance in London: He accordingly borrowed 30l. from the Captain, giving his Note for that and his Passage-money, to be paid in Town; but never having been heard of since, the Captain was anxious to enquire into the Nature of the Security left in his Hands, and ventured to open one of the Trunks, which was only filled with Rubbish; another proved loaded with the same Commodity, and the whole was discovered to be an arrant Bitch, calculated to cheat an honest unsuspecting Man out of his Property.

June 18. It was on Saturday reported, that a Memorial is preparing to be dispatched to our Ambassador at Madrid, touching the Behaviour of the Spaniards, in excluding the English from the Benefit of cutting Logwood in the Bay of Honduras, and to demand an Explanation.

Since the Report of the Spaniards late Proceedings in the Bay of Honduras, some People entertain Fears about their Friends not yet removed from the Havannah, as the next Step may perhaps be a speedy Order for the English to depart, without having Time to settle their Affairs, or remove their Effects from that Island. We now see the blessed Effects of suffering so many Ship-loads of Irish Provisions to be transported among the Spaniards, since they may, in all Probability, be treasured up to support them in another Siege, and consequently fight us with our own Weapons.

It is said that the Fortifications of the Havannah, and in general every Place of Strength in the Spanish West-Indies, are in a better State of Defence, thoroughly repaired, and well garrisoned, than before the late War; so great has been the Vigilance and Attention of the Court of Madrid, towards the Concerns of the Monarchy in that Part of the World.

Some Letters, just received from Jamaica, mention, that, for some Time past, the Spaniards have complained of the extreme Rigour exercise

by the British Cruizers in the West-Indies, on such of their Vessels as have been detained on Account of what they call illicit Commerce. The English Merchants are no less dissatisfied; it being notorious, that no kind of Trade whatsoever can be carried on between the two Nations, but must of Necessity be greatly advantageous to the former; and it is to this Account the late Behaviour of the Spaniards, and their Resentment in driving the English from the Bay of Honduras, is to be placed.

B O S T O N, August 27.

We hear the French Fishing Vessels are very numerous on the Banks, that the English have Orders not to molest them in that Business; but that they are not allowed to cure their Fish at any other Place than the Islands of St. Peter's and Miquelon; that four French Frigates were lately arrived at those Islands, and that an English 40 Gun Ship, and a Frigate, were gone to see what were the Designs of the French at those Places.

N E W P O R T, August 27.

In a very thick Fog, about 8 o'Clock last Tuesday Evening, the Brig Charming Abigail, Capt. Brenton Wanton, bound in here from the West-Indies, ran ashore just without Castle-Hill. As it is a Sandy Beach, it is probable that neither she nor her Cargo would have been much damaged, had it not been occasioned by her Anchor, which she had out, the Fluke of which pierced a Hole through her Bottom. Her Lading was Melasses, about 8 or 9 Hogheads of which, we hear, is lost. The Vessel is like to be got off.

The Sloop Rainbow, Captain Ignatius Battar, arrived here last Saturday from Kingston, in Jamaica, which Place he left the 14th of July; and on the 25th, between Hispaniola and Cuba, his Mast was struck by Lightning, which entering at the Top, shivered it down almost to the Deck. One of the Men received a severe Shock, the Violence of which pitched him into the Hold; but, what was very surprizing, he suffered no Injury. Capt. Battar afterwards put into Cape Nicola, to refit.

P R O V I D E N C E, August 18.

Last Sunday Morning, about four o'Clock, this Town was alarmed by the Cry of Fire, which proved to be in a very valuable Store of European and other Goods, belonging to Mr. James Green, Merchant. The Discovery providentially being seasonable, and the Efforts of the Inhabitants spirited, the Destruction was happily confined to a small Portion of the Building, which, had a few Minutes elapsed, would have become general, in spite of all Opposition: Nevertheless the Damage done the Goods was considerable. But what is most alarming and shocking to Humanity is, the moral Certainty of its being wilfully perpetrated by some abandoned Miscreant, in order, as is supposed, to avail himself of the universal Confusion attending such Disasters, and thereby unsuspected to plunder and carry off the Goods.

N E W Y O R K, September 3.

The Public will no Doubt receive, with great Satisfaction, the News of Sir William Johnson's safe Return to Fort Johnson, on the 19th of August, from Niagara; where he has been making Peace with many Nations of Indians; in which we can venture to assure our Readers, he has succeeded beyond Expectation.

SIR William Johnson, Bart. gives this public Notice, that the following Persons have been delivered up to him by the Indians at the late Congress he held with them at Niagara, and that they are now on their Way to his Excellency General Gage, at New-York, where their Friends may apply for them, viz. Benjamin Shepherd, of Connecticut. Abigail Chapman, of New-England, but taken at Cushietunk, Pennsylvania. An Infant Child of Abigail Chapman. Sarah Carter, a Girl, taken in Pennsylvania; Elizabeth Carter, her Sister, John Duncan, a Boy, taken at Leckawickse; Sarah, his Sister, in Pennsylvania. Ezra Trim, a Boy, taken at the same Place. Peter Up de Graave, and Catherine, his Sister, taken at Cushietunk. Sarah Otter, and Joannah, her Sister, taken near Cushietunk. Abraham Baldwin, a Boy, taken at Wyoming, in Pennsylvania, born in New-England. All taken by the Delawares last Year, and delivered up by the Chenussios, who purchased some, and procured the rest from the Delawares.

Sarah Barnett, Lena Barnett, Hose Barnett, taken at Goblin-town, Carolina, 7 Years ago, by the Shawanese, and delivered up by the Hurons, with whom they long resided.

There are several other Prisoners (some of them related to the foregoing Persons) yet amongst the Delawares and other Nations, who are to be restored very soon; for the Performance of which, the Chenussios have delivered up two of their Chiefs to Sir William Johnson, as Hostages.

P H I L A D E L P H I A, September 6.

We hear that Ten Deputies from the Delawares, Shawanese, Hurons of Sandusky, and other Indians of the Countries between Lake Erie and the Ohio, met Col. Bradstreet, at Presque Isle, on his Way to their Country, with the Forces under his Command, and in the most submissive Manner begged for Peace;—which he granted them on Terms to the Purport following.

1. That all the Prisoners in their Hands should be delivered to him at Sandusky in 25 Days.

2. That they should renounce all Claim to the Posts and Forts we now have in their Country; and that we shall be at Liberty to erect as many more as we think necessary to secure our Trade; and that they shall cede to us for ever, as much Land round each Fort as a Cannon Shot can fly over, on which our People may raise Provisions.

3. That if any Indian hereafter kill any Englishman, he shall be delivered up by his Nation, and tried by the English Laws, only to have Half the Jury Indians.—And if any one of the Nations renew the War, the rest shall join us to bring them to Reason.

4. That six of the Deputies should remain with him as Hostages, and the other four, with an English Officer, and one of our Indians, should proceed immediately, to acquaint those Nations with these Terms of Peace, and forward the Collecting of the Prisoners, to be ready at the Day appointed.

'Tis said that the Colonel has told them, that if this Peace is not confirmed by their Chiefs, no other will be granted them; and that if they continue the War, they shall find their Country filled with Warriors immediately, who will cut them off from the Face of the Earth.

He has not discontinued his March, but proceeds from Presque Isle to Sandusky.

It seems the Motion of two Armies at once towards their Country, viz. That under Colonel Bradstreet, from Niagara; and that from this Province, under Colonel Bouquet, has greatly intimidated those People; who at first haughtily stood out, and refused to meet Sir William Johnson at the Congress of Niagara.—We wish the easy Terms they have obtained, without having suffered for their late Perfidy, or made any adequate Restitution or Satisfaction for the Robberies and Murders they committed, may not encourage them more readily to engage in fresh Hostilities, on every little Occasion.

Camp at Loudon, August 25, 1764.

"On the 16th Instant Col. Reid marched from hence with a large Convoy for Fort Pitt, and we hear he arrived at Stony Creek the 23d, without any Interruption.

An Express is just arrived from the Commanding Officer at Fort Bedford, and brings the following Particulars, viz. That on the 23d Instant, about Two o'Clock in the Afternoon, one Martin Macdonald, and three other Pack-horse Men, going up with Goods for the Settlers, went on the 22d after Col. Reid's Convoy, and that when they came to the Shawanese Cabins, near the South East Foot of the Allegheny Mountain, they saw some Indians, who fired on them at a Distance; on which they made off through the Woods to the Camp, leaving one Horse loaded behind them. That Yesterday, on his Return from the Convoy, he saw the Body of Isaac Stimble, killed and scalped, on the Road, near Curry Bridge, and perceived the Tracks of Savages (having Horses with them) pointing towards Denning's Creek. That on this Alarm Capt. Leis, with a few Men of the Garrison, and some Inhabitants, went out, and found the Body and Tracks, as related by Macdonald, but could not prevail on the Inhabitants to pursue the Enemy, as by their Tracks they were supposed to be about Forty.

"Mr. Swaine, the Grand Suttler, was encamped at the Foot of the Allegheny Mountain, and two of his Hands were missing.



We are also informed, by a Person just arrived from Virginia, that four Men were killed, a few Days ago, twelve Miles above Winchester."

ANNAPOLIS, September 13.

On the first of this Month, towards Evening, a Thunder-Gust arose and came directly over Lingans, where the Lightning Struck a Barn belonging to John Saffle, containing Wheat, Rye, and Straw, and in an Instant set it all in Flames; but happily, the Wind favouring, the close adjacent Dwelling-House was saved.

We have lately had some cooler Weather than has been usual here so early in Autumn, which in several Places on this Shore, has brought on Frosts, that has ruin'd a good deal of Tobacco and some Corn.

PETERSBOURG, June 12.

**T**HE Treaty concluded here between the Empress of Russia and the King of Prussia, on the 11th of April, is in Substance as follows:

By Article 1 and 2. A Treaty of defensive Alliance, and a mutual Guaranty are agreed to, after reserving the Liberty of concluding other Treaties not contrary to the present.

3-9. In Case of a foreign Attack, 10,000 Infantry, and 2000 Cavalry are promised 3 Months after the first Requisition, to be continued till a Cessation of Hostilities. If these are not sufficient, Means to be concerted to employ additional Forces. The Troops to be paid and furnished with Ammunition by the Party assisting: Provisions and Quarters to be furnished by the assisted. The Troops to receive Orders from their own General; and to have their own Religion and Laws.

10. No Peace, &c. to be concluded without mutual Consent.

11. In Case of War on the Part of the assisting Party, it shall be exempted from furnishing its Quota, or shall be at Liberty to withdraw its Forces, after two Months Notice.

12. A free Commerce between the two States.

13, 14. The Treaty to be in force eight Years, and renewable before the Expiration, according to Circumstances. Ratifications to be exchanged in six Weeks.

By a secret Article it is engaged to maintain Poland in its Right of a free Election, and to prevent all hereditary Succession.

LONDON, June 19.

Col. John Henry Christian de Stumpel is just come from Germany with his Officers: His Majesty granted him, the 10th of February last, 20,000 Acres of Land in the Province of Acadia and of New Scotland, between the two Rivers of St. John and of St. Croix, any where it will be most agreeable to him to settle a Colony, and to build a City for Commerce, which shall be called by the Colonel's Name, Stumpelburgh, and which he will fill with Artificers and Traders, whom he has brought with him.

June 23. It is said that Mr. Wilkes has purchased a handsome House and Gardens at Paris, as intending to reside there the Remainder of his Life.

It is said a large Box of oriental Diamonds, valued at about 100,000*l*. makes Part of the Cargo of the rich Prize the Sanissima Trinidad, lately arrived from the East-Indies.

L'Amphion, a French Man of War of 50 Guns, and the Frigate Licorne of 30 Guns, sailed from Brest the 11th Inst. to protect the French Fishery on the Banks of Newfoundland.

It is said that some fresh Instructions will be speedily sent to the Commanders of our Vessels in the West-India Stations, in Consequence of some Complaints made here.

It is also said, that there remains a Point of Consequence still to be settled between us and the French, which is that of adjusting the Sum to be paid for maintaining the French Prisoners during their Confinement here, and which the French have deferred settling till they are informed whether their Stages are to be allowed to be left at Newfoundland after the Fishing Season is over, or whether they are to be removed.

We have good Authority to assure our Readers, that the Spanish Ambassador, as far as he can consistently do it, till he hears from the King his Master, condemns and disavows the Proceedings of the Spanish Governor in Respect to our Settlers at the Bay of Honduras: And we can also affirm that Dispatches on this Head have been sent to our Ambassador at Madrid; as well as Remonstrances to the Earl of Hertford at Paris, in Consequence of France being Guaranty for the Spaniards true Observance of the late Treaty.

June 26. On Saturday 12 large Brass Mortars, mounted on Iron Beds, together with a large Quantity of military Stores, were shipped at the Tower for the Grenadoes.

Yesterday the Right Hon. William Pitt was at Court, where he continued some time; and afterwards set out for Hayes.

Last Monday, Mr. Arnold, Watchmaker, in Devereux Court, Temple Bar, waited upon his Majesty with a curious Repeating Watch, set in a Ring, which was made by his Majesty's Command: Mr. Arnold had the Honour of being introduced to their Majesties, the Princess Dowager of Wales, and the Prince of Mecklenburgh, who were all graciously pleased to show their Approbation to so excellent a Piece of Mechanism.

June 28. Yesterday the Court of Common-Pleas was moved to increase Issues on the Return of the Distingas, issued at the Suit of Mr. Beardmore's Clerk against the Earl of Halifax, when the Court was pleased to order 500*l*. Issues on the alias Distingas; it appearing, by Affidavit, that this Action has been commenced for near twelve Months, and no Appearance yet entered for the Defendant.

Monday Evening the 14 Journeymen Printers, who some Time since obtained a Verdict against the King's Messengers, for false Imprisonment, received their Money of Messieurs Carrington and Blackmore, two of the said Messengers, in Manner following; 13 of them who had 200*l*. Costs and Damages, received 120*l*. each, and one of them, who had 300*l*. decreed him, received 170*l*. and to pay their Attorney.

June 30. Yesterday Lord Baltimore's House, Park, &c. was sold; it was put up at 15,000*l*. and knocked down at 23,900*l*. to Mr. Masterman, Attorney, in Chancery-Lane; the real Purchaser is not as yet declared, tho' it is strongly rumoured that it is bought for one of the great Officers concerned in the Havana Expedition. It is said Lord Baltimore refused 30,000*l*. for it some Time since by private Contract.

July 2. Last Friday Morning died at Bath, RALPH ALLEN, Esq; universally lamented.

July 6. According to Advices from Spain, the Naval Forces of that Kingdom are equipping with the greatest Diligence in all their Ports, but these Preparations are said to be intended against the piratical States of Barbary.

NEW-YORK, September 20.

The white People mentioned in our last, that were delivered up to Sir William Johnson, at Niagara, arrived here last Monday, from Albany, and are now in a Room in the Barracks at this City. Benjamin Shepherd was taken the 4th of September last, at Wyoming, in Pennsylvania, by the famous Capt. BULL, now in our Goal, in Company with Daniel Baldwin, and Jane, his Wife, Abraham Baldwin, John and Daniel Howell, and one Isaac Halsey. The Indians burnt Daniel Baldwin, and his Wife died of Hunger at the Seneca Town last Winter: John Howell attempted to make his Escape, but was found dead in the Woods, having lost his Way; Daniel Howell got off; Abraham Baldwin was murdered, and Shepherd would have been murdered also, had not Capt. BULL persuaded the Indians to the contrary; however BULL, with his own Hands, gave him a severe whipping.

Shepherd says there are yet a great many Prisoners at the Indian Towns, among them a Daughter of one Emanuel Confolo, that lives near Delaware, who was taken the War before last.

PHILADELPHIA, September 13.

Camp at Lancaster, August 29, 1764.

"A large Convoy of Waggon and Pack-horses march To-morrow, with the Remainder of the Army, under the Command of Colonel Boquet, excepting a Garrison left at this Post.

"The 27th Instant an Express brought Letters from Presque Isle, giving an Account that the Indians had sent for Peace in their usual Manner.—At the same time those Savages continue skulking on the Frontiers, and murder every defenceless Person they can catch in an unguarded Minute.

"Yesterday we received the following Copy of a Letter, directed to the Commanding Officer at Fort Cumberland.

Winchester, August 22, 1764.

"I have just now received certain Intelligence, by Thomas Smith, Baker, of this Town, and a Man of Veracity, who says, that about Twelve o'Clock this Day, he saw the Bodies of John Miller, and three others of his Family, lie dead, scalped and mangled, within a Mile of George Bowman's, and about Twelve Miles Distance from this Town. I am apprehensive that there are several small Parties of the Enemy near our Quarters, and by this Intelligence you may probably fall in with some of them in their Return. You will please to forward this, by Express, to the Commanding Officers of Hampshire, not omitting shewing it to the Commanders of the several Posts as they pass.

"P. S. Just now have received an Account of three more, taken from Slover's Town; and two others fired at by the Indians.—As this Express sets off, another Man killed at Slover's Town, and three taken Prisoners."

A Letter from Carlisle, of the 29th ult. mentions their having received certain Advice there, of seven Persons being killed, near Winchester, on the 23d of that Month, by the Indians: That the Enemy had been lately seen in different Parts of Cumberland County; and that two of them are said to have appeared within a Mile of Carlisle on the 26th of last Month.

Another Letter from the same Place, of the Fourth Instant, advises, that the first Division of our Army was arrived safe at Pittsburgh; the Rear receiving a few random Shots from the Enemy near the Fort.

ANNAPOLIS, September 20.

Last Tuesday arrived here the Ship Nancy, Capt. James Thompson, from Rotterdam, (but last from Portsmouth) with 290 Palatines.

LONDON, June 16.

**W**EDNESDAY last Mr. Pitt came from his Seat at Hayes, to Lord Temple's House in Pallmall, and on Thursday there was a Council at the Queen's Palace, in St. James's Park, but it is not known whether Affairs are quite in so bad a State as to require able Men to retrieve them immediately, though it may be, that when Matters are run into so much Confusion, that it's present Directors can stand it no longer, they will leave the Augean Stable to be cleared by their Successors.

We hear his Majesty has been pleased to appoint James Macpherson, Esq; (who tho' upwards of 70 Years of Age, so gallantly distinguished himself as a common Soldier in one of the Battalions of Highlanders, at the Siege of Quebec) to be Secretary-General to the Province of West Florida; and Saturday that Gentleman set out for Portsmouth, in order to embark with his Excellency Governor Johnstone for that Place.

June 26. We are informed that public Business of all Kinds is entirely at a Stand, and that a Change is certainly expected in the Administration: It is hoped it will be such a one as will put an End to our intestine Divisions, and restore Dignity to our Country.

'Tis said a Scheme is on Foot to raise an equal Land-Tax throughout the Kingdom, which will produce an almost incredible Increase to that Branch of the public Revenue.

June 28. They write from Berlin, that the King of Prussia granted, on the 29th ult. a Patent to the Sieur Teegel, Privy Counsellor of Commerce, to re-establish an East-India Company at Embden.

We hear that 1600 Marines are to be immediately raised; for which Purpose a great Number of Parties are recruiting in various Parts of the Kingdom.

Letters from Toulon of the 4th Instant advise, that the Ship-Wrights had left off working on the Men of War Le Languedoc, Le Bourgoignon, and Le Marcellais, which have been on the Stocks a long Time; the Cause of which is not known, but it was not for Want of Timber, there being plenty in the Magazines: The Workmen are chiefly employed there in building and fitting out Le Hirondelle, a Bark, Le Hector, Le Souveraine, and Le Sultan, a new Frigate of 30 Guns, but having few Hands, the Work goes on very slow.

We hear that some Peers will shortly be advanced to higher Dignities.

Yesterday Morning the Right Hon. William Pitt came from his Seat at Hayes, to Lord Temple's House in Pallmall. At Noon he attended his Majesty's Levee at St. James's, and was there a considerable Time. After Dinner he set out again for Hayes. From the Circumstances of his going to Court, and his having been in Town last Week, the Report continues to gain Ground, that a Change in the Administration is certainly on the Carpet. All good Men wish it were accomplished; for 'til it is, there are no Hopes of putting the Affairs of our Country on a proper and respectable Footing, which the very critical Situation of Things both at home and abroad, so urgently Demands.

Lord Sandwich was also at the Levee, but he did not stay.

The Right Hon. George Grenville, who is, at present, first Lord of the Treasury and Chancellor of the Exchequer, is gone down to his Seat at Wootton in Bucks.

It was Yesterday Morning reported, that Orders have been very lately sent to the Governor of Newfoundland, to admit no French Ships of War within a certain Latitude of those Seas, except in Cases of Distress. This is imitating the Spaniards at the Havannah, who are extremely jealous even of Merchants Ships.

The Report still continues, that a Squadron of Men of War will speedily be put into Commission; and that the Commissioners of the Victualling-Office have received Orders to prepare accordingly.

It is confidently asserted, that our Ambassador at a certain Court will shortly return to England.

June 30. We hear that some fresh Instructions are shortly to be sent to the Earl of Rochford, Ambassador at the Court of Spain.

It is reported that two noble Baris will shortly resign, with Pensions of 1000l. per Annum each.

Advices from Lisbon mention, that Four Thousand Tons of naval and military Stores have been lately shipped for the Portuguese Settlements in the Brazils. Orders are also sent over to build, at St. Salvador, five Men of War of the Line, and to put every Place of Strength on the Frontiers in a proper State of Defence.

Thursday Evening the Hon. Thomas Boone, Esq; Governor of South Carolina, arrived in Town from thence, but left from Portsmouth; and Yesterday he waited on his Majesty at St. James's, and was graciously received.

July 6. The late Ralph Allen, Esq; of Bath, has left upwards of 40,000l. in Legacies, and amongst them 1000l. to the Right Honourable William Pitt.

PHILADELPHIA, September 30.

Fort Cumberland, August 28, 1764.

"On the Twenty-second Instant a Party of Indians in Virginia, at Stover's Town, took three Scalps, and two Prisoners, being a Woman, and a Child of four Years old, which they tomahawked and scalped, after carrying it two Days. On the Twenty-fourth a Party was sent from the South Branch, and another from Patterson's Creek, in order to cut them off on their Return. Lieutenant Stinson, of Capt. Macdonald's Company, with 25 Men, set out upon this Intelligence, on Braddock's Road, and was advanced as far as the Forks of the Road beyond the Little Meadows, when they came up with two Indians, one of whom they killed and scalped, and mortally wounded the other, who, it is said, was found dead the next Day. They likewise retook two Horses, and all the Indians baggage, together with the Wearing Apparel of one Mrs. Gibbons, whom they killed the 25th, within a Mile of this Garrison, where she was found this Day. On the 26th Capt. Macdonald went to reinforce his Lieutenant, and met him at Savage River. A few Minutes before the Captain came up, the Lieutenant fell in with a Party of Indians returning from the Inhabitants, being ten in Number; but the Indians discovering our People, immediately took to a Laurel Swamp, before they had Time to have one fair Shot at them; notwithstanding they fired several times, but killed nor wounded none. They retook the White Woman which the Enemy had made Prisoner at Stover's Town, and all their Baggage. Upon this Capt. Macdonald immediately detached an Officer, and 20 good Woodmen, with Orders not to touch the great Road, until they came to the Forks, over the Crossing of the first Youghiogony, where they were to remain all the Night, and examine the Road for Indian Tracks; and just as they came to the Road, they saw two Indians coming towards them, one riding, the other walking, leading a Horse; but they likewise feeling our People, took directly to the Woods, leaving their Horses behind them; the Party fired several Shot after them, but they did not give one Fire in Return. Captain Macdonald returned Yesterday with the Scalp and Prisoner."

Camp at Fort Bedford, September 5, 1764.

"The Pack-horses and Escort that went to Fort Pitt with Provisions, returned Yesterday; and this Day the second Convoy begins to file off for that Post."

"The following Letter is just arrived from the Commanding Officer at Fort Cumberland.

Fort Cumberland, September 3, 1764.

"A great Number of Indians have been seen upon the South Branch of Patowmack, and done much mischief. Captain Macdonald is gone with his Company of Militia to

Way-lay them, when they go back, and I hope to send you good News within eight Days."

ANNAPOLIS, September 27.

This Day his Excellency the Governor, in Council, was pleased to issue his Proclamations, Proroguing the General Assembly of this Province (which stood prorogued to Tuesday next) to Saturday the 17<sup>th</sup> Day of November.

On Monday next the Commissioners of the Paper Currency Office will begin to give Bills of Exchange for the sinking the Paper Money of this Province: And Then—

September 15, 1764.
