Extract of a Letter from Carlisle, June 20.

"We are yet in Suspense whether the Indians will carry the War into our inhabited Parts; but that they certainly intended it, is to me beyond any Doubt.—About the 14th Instant a Man, who went out to catch a Horse at Ligonier, was killed, or carried off, almost in View of that Garrison.—An Indian, who has a white Woman to Wife, is now on his Way, with some white People, flying from Patowmack, and says, the Indians have acquainted him with their Intentions, viz. That they design to carry the War to as great an Extent as they can, in which a great many Tribes are joined: That they are to attack the Inhabitants in the Season of Harvest: That they are to burn and destroy all Sorts of Provision: And that they are determined to make no Prisoners, but kill all that fall into their Hands.—This Account I have from different People, who talked with the Indian at Shippensburg.—The Country is in great Distress, occasioned by the People leaving their Plantations."

In a Letter from Shippensburg, of the same Date with the above, it is said the Inhabitants are in the greatest Consternation there, expecting the Enemy soon in the Valley, as they had heard of some People being killed at Bedford.

By several Letters from Fort-Bedford, of the 18th Inst. we have the following Particulars, viz. That the poor Farmers, who had left their Places, and come into the Fort, had returned to their Plantations again, at the Risk of their Lives, for the Preservation of their Crops, in order to prevent starving in the Winter: That the Enemy, ever watchful for such Opportunities, had struck a severe Blow on Denning's Creek, where three or four Families were murdered and scalped on the 17th and 18th: That it was not known what Course the Indians would take next, but that it was absolutely necessary for every one to be on his Guard: That some who left the Garrison were returned, lamenting, from their fatal Experience, that they did not, as they had been advised, go to each others Plantations in Bodies, and not by Two's and Three's: That a Dog (belonging to one James Clark, who had gone with another Man to plough their Corn, about twelve Miles from the Fort) came into the Garrison wounded; upon which a scouting Party went out, and returned with a Spear they found sticking in the Body of said Clark, who was scalped, and inhumanly mangled; but were afraid to hunt for the other Man, as they perceived a Number of Indian Tracks in the Woods: That a Man and his Wife, who lived about eight Miles from Bedford, had just come in, and informed, that being in a Corn Field, near their House, they heard a Gun go off, when a Cry ensued, and soon after six Guns more were fired, which obliged them to set off, for the Fort: And that about an Hour after they got in, their House was seen in Flames, and it was feared, all that were in it destroyed.

Extract of a Letter from Pittsburgh, June 16, 1763.

"We are informed by a Prisoner, who had been amongst the Shawanese Indians, that, in making his Escape from them, he overtook Mr. Calhoon, and nine of his Men, who traded at Tuskerawas; also two Men of Alison & M'Crea's, who were driving Horses loaded with Skins from the Lower Shawanese Town, who told him, that the Delaware Indians had informed Mr. Calhoon, that St. Dusky was surprised and taken by the Indians, the Garrison and all the Traders there murdered, except Lieutenant Pauley, the Officer, who commanded, whom they made Prisoner: That Detroit had been besieged ten Days before this happened: That Mr. Crawford, a Trader at Meamy River, was taken Prisoner, with one of his Men: That the Indians had killed six other Men who were in Company with him, coming down the River with Skins: That the Delaware Indians desired Mr. Calhoon to leave that Place immediately, lest he should be killed by the Indians who began the War; then seized his Goods, and disarmed him, and the Rest of his Men, and sent two Indians to conduct them to this Place, who brought them by unfrequented Roads to Beaver Creek, about 30 Miles from this Fort, where they led them into an Ambuscade of Six Nation Indians, who attacked them, and he believed killed the whole Party of white Men, as he saw none escape but himself; however, at different Times, within

three Days after, Mr. Calhoon, and two of his Men, arrived here, who also, with great Difficulty, made their Escape; the rest of the Party, eight in Number, were all killed by the Indians.—The 7th Instant Mr. Wilkins, and an Express from Venango, arrived here, who brought Letters from Presque-Isle, informing us, that a large Quantity of Provisions, from Niagara to Detroit, escorted by about One Hundred Men, was attacked within 18 Miles of Detroit, in the Night, by a Party of Indians, who destroyed all the Provisions, and killed 67 Men of the Party. Detroit is the only Garrison we have beyond this that can make any Defence. The rest of our Garrisons to the Westward, I think, before this Time are all massacred. Since the 29th of last Month every Person here, fit to carry Arms, has undergone the severest Military Duty; and, by the Care of the Commander, and the rest of the Officers, the Fort is now in a good Posture of Defence. Not a Man goes without Gunshot of the Fort, who is not fired at by the Indians. What Number there is of them about us we are ignorant of, as the Commander will not suffer the Men to expose themselves to the Danger of the Enemy, except in the Defence of the Fort. Yesterday we had one Man killed, who ventured a little farther from a Party which was out for Forage than he had Orders; and last Night the Indians had the Impudence to fire pretty briskly for some Time upon our Centries in the Fort. The Garrison in general are all in good Spirits, and I think they need not be under any Apprehensions that the Indians will be able to take the Place."

Extract of another Letter from Pittsburgh, of the same Date.

"We have Alarms from, and Skirmishes with, the Indians every Day; but they have done us little Harm as yet.—Yesterday I was out with a Party of Men, when we were fired upon, and one of the Sergeants was killed; but we beat off the Indians, and brought the Man in with his Scalp on.—Last Night the Bullock Guard was fired upon, when one Cow was killed.—We are obliged to be on Duty Night and Day.—The Indians have cut off above 100 of our Traders in the Woods, besides all our little Posts.—We have Plenty of Provisions; and the Fort is in such a good Posture of Defence, that, with God's Assistance, we can defend it against 1000 Indians."

Extract of a Letter from Winchester, in Virginia, June 22.

"Last Night I reached this Place, I have been at Fort-Cumberland several Days, but the Indians having killed 9 People, and burnt several Houses near Fort-Bedford, made me think it prudent to remove from those Parts, from which, I suppose, near 500 Families have run away within this Week.—I assure you it was a most melancholy Sight, to see such Numbers of poor People, who had abandoned their Settlements in such Consternation and Hurry, that they had hardly any Thing with them but their Children. And what is still worse, I dare say there is not Money enough amongst the whole Families to maintain a fifth Part of them till the Fall; and none of the poor Creatures can get a Hovel to shelter them from the Weather, but lie about scattered in the Woods."

A Letter from Fort Bedford, of June 20, mentions a Scouting Party being just come in, and brought a Confirmation of three Houses being burnt, and 7 People killed, but not scalped, viz. Three Men, 1 Woman, and 3 Children.

ANNAPOLIS, July 7.

Last Week, at Prince-George's Court, a Negro Fellow was Condemn'd, for Poisoning his Master: It is said, that he Tried the Goodness of his Medicine, by first giving some of it to one of his own Children, who soon after Died.

By a Man who came to Town last Friday, from Winchester, we are informed, That Fort-Ligonier is burnt to Ashes by the Indians. He says, an Express came in there the Sunday before, with the News; and that near 40 People had been killed at Ray's-Town, with many more dismal Accounts. It is to be hoped, these Accounts are exaggerated; but certain it is, that the People on the Western Frontier, are in a most distressed Situation.

wretched Post, till the Savages set it on Fire with their Arrows, when he found Means to slip out, and travelled here in six Days, without Provision, having left the Rest of his poor People behind, who were so far exhausted, that it was impossible for them to come on.—Vernage was destroyed before he came there, and every Soul perished.—Just now came in a Soldier from Presque-Ile, who affirms that the Place was attacked, and had been defended for two Days, when the Indians undermined the Block-House, on which the Garrison capitulated, with Liberty to come here; but the Indians fell upon them, and, as he supposes, massacred them all.—We credit his Account, as we have had former Examples of their Inhumanity.—The last Accounts of Detroit are, that the Garrison makes a noble Defence.—The Indians put in Practice the following Piece of Treachery there; they proposed a Treaty, and sent in two of their Chiefs.—Our People sent out two Officers to them, on which they came in great Numbers, desiring Admission, but were refused.—They then fired on the Guards, and our People returned the Compliment, and killed 40 of them on the Spot.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Bedford, dated June 25, 1763.

“Last Night a young Man, who went out in Pursuit of a Hawk, but a few Paces from him, was taken in View of the Garrison.—A Party went out in Search of him next Morning, and found the Place where the Indians lurked, in Sight of the Fort.

“Took. This Morning a Party of the Enemy attacked fifteen Persons, who were mowing in Mr. Croghan's Field, within a Mile of the Garrison; and News is brought in of two Men being killed. Eight o'Clock; Two Men are just brought in, alive, tomahawked and scalped more than Half the Head over.—Our Parade just now presents a Scene of bloody and savage Cruelty; three Men, two of which are in the Bloom of Life, the other an old Man, lying scalped (two of them still alive, though Any thing feigned in the most fabulous Romance, cannot parallel the horrid Sight now before me; the Gashes the poor People bear, are most terrifying.—Ten o'Clock; They are just expired.—One of them, after being tomahawked and scalped, ran a little Way, and got on a Loft in Mr. Croghan's House, where he lay till found by a Party of the Garrison.”

The following is an Extract of a Letter from Fort Pitt, dated June 25.

“Every Day we see more or less of the Indians.—We have had two Men killed by their own Folly, in leaving the Party contrary to Orders; one killed by Accident, taking down his Gun on an Alarm; and one wounded in the Flank, by a Shot from the opposite Side of the Ohio.—The Enemy have killed some Cattle, and driven off all our Horses.—A Party of Delawares appeared in Sight of the Fort, three of which came down, and desired to speak with Mr. McGee, who went out to them; when they let him know, that there was a great Body of Indians, of different Nations, ready to attack us, but that they had prevailed with them not to do it, till they had spoke to us, and desired we would go off.—The Commanding Officer let them know, that he had Men, Ammunition and Provision enough, to defend the Place against all the Indians in the Woods; and that Troops were marching to attack them in their Towns; upon which they altered their Tone, and said, Their Nation would hold fast the Chain of Friendship.

“They then told us that our small Poles were cut off; that Vernage was taken, and Mr. Gordon, the Officer that commanded there, made Prisoner, but put to the Torture every Night till he died.

“This Morning English Peers, of the Royal Americans, with Part of his Garrison, arrived here, being separated from the rest in the Night.—The Enemy attacked his Post, and set it on Fire, and while they watched the Door of the House, he got out on the other Side, and the Indians continued firing a long Time afterwards, imagining that the Garrison was in it, and that they were consumed with the House.—He touched at Vernage, found the Fort burnt to the Ground, and saw one of our Expresses lying killed on the Road.

“Mr. Price received an Account from Mr. Christie, who commanded at Presque Isle, that the Brig from Detroit, had passed by there, on her Way to Niagara for Provision; that the French did not fight for us; that the Ship lay opposite one Side of the Town, to cover it; that Captain Campbell, and Mr. McDougal were sent out to the Indians, on their approaching the Garrison, to know what they wanted, but that the Indians killed them two of their Chiefs at Hallago for their safe Return: That the Indians then attempted to force the Gate; upon which Major Gladwin ordered the Troop to fire, and killed Forty of them: That the Enemy had been about the Fort for three Weeks, when the Brig left it, and they were 2500 strong: That they attacked the Brig, coming down Detroit River, wounded the Major, and lodged a great many Shots in the Vessel: And that Sir Robert Doyne, and Captain Robinson, with two others, were killed, while they were founding the Lake.

“Mr. Price is afraid that Presque Isle is taken, as the Indians that attacked his Post came from there, or that Way.

By the last Account, the Indians will be all here in a Day or two, to make an Attack on this Place; if they are not afraid, and come on boldly, they will be well treated.—I have not but my Clashes off since the first Alarm.

“Ligonier was attacked the last by the Savages, for a Day and Night, but was beat off; this we had from an Indian.—We killed one of the Scotchmen from the Fort, who had trusted himself a little too soon.

“Four o'Clock in the Afternoon; Just now came in one of the Soldiers from Presque Isle, who says, Mr. Christie fought two Days; that the Enemy fifty times let Fire to the Block-house, but that they as often put it out: That they then undermined the House, and was ready to blow it up, when they seized Mr. Christie's Tomb, who accepted them, on. That he, and his Garrison, was to be conducted to this Place.—The Soldier also says, he suspected they intended to put them all to Death; and that on leaving a Woman (some say, he impaled they were murdering her; upon which he and another Soldier came immediately off, but knew nothing of the rest: That the Vessel from Niagara was in Sight, but believes she had no Provision, as the Indians told them they had cut off Little Niagara, and destroyed her Barrels: And that he thinks by what he saw, Vernage had capitulated.”

From Cumberland County our Accounts, in general, are most melancholy; the poor Back Inhabitants coming continually into Carlisle from their Places, having hardly any Thing with them but their Children.—We have not as yet heard of any Murders in that County; but Indians have been seen in it, supposed to be committing, and viewing the Situation of the distressed People there.

In a Letter from Fort Augusta, dated June 30, it is said, that a Person was arrived from the West Branch of Susquehanna, who informed, That all the Indians there were moving off; that one of them might be expected at that Fort again in a few Days; and that he was afraid to return among them.—The Women of the above says, from the best Information he could get, a general War with the Indians was like to ensue.

IN ASSEMBLY, July 6, 1763, A. M.

THE House resumed the Consideration of the Governor's Message, which, with the several Letters of Intelligence standing in, was again read, and after some Time spent therein,

Resolved,

That it be recommended to the Governor and Provincial Commissioners, to take into the immediate Pay of this Province, any Number of the Back Inhabitants, and others, not exceeding 700 Men, exclusive of those already in the Service of the Government, to be divided, stationed and employed in protecting the Frontier Inhabitants within the purchased Parts of the said Province, during the Time of Harvest, or until the next Meeting of this House.

Resolved,

That if the Money now remaining in the public Treasury, should prove insufficient to defray the Expence of raising the aforesaid Number of Men, this House will, with the Assent of the Governor, supply the Deficiency at their next Meeting.

ANNAPOLIS, July 14.

Tuesday last, Capt. John Lewis, in a Ship from London, went into Capeside, having had Nine Weeks Passage. Capt. Rigby sail'd with him, and they parted Company about Five Weeks ago. The Captains Spencer, Grayson, &c. were just ready for sailing, and may be daily expected. Capt. Richardson arrived last Week, after a long Passage, and is gone into Patuxent.

We have had repeated Reports, which we with may prove False, That Col. Thomas Croft, with his Family, and Neighbours, are cut off by the Indians: Their Plantations, according to the best Information we can get, lie about Three Degrees West of Chesapeake Bay, in Frederick County, in Maryland; and the Colonel was one of the Representatives for his County.

This Morning we received the following very melancholy Letter, which we cannot avoid giving the Public:

Mr. GREEN,

Alexandria, July 12, 1763.

I CAME from London County, to this Place last Night, and am sorry to inform you, that I think the People, both on the Frontiers of Virginia and Maryland, are now, or will be soon, in the most deplorable Situation. My Reason for thinking so, with all the News I could collect concerning the Back Inhabitants, and Indians, I will now send, for the Judgment of yourself, and the Public. The following is a true Copy of a Letter sent from the County-Lieutenant of Frederick, to the Colonel of Loudoun County, which I think is alone sufficient to alarm the People of this Colony:

“Sir,

Winchester, July 12, 1763.

“We have received certain Accounts of several Parties of Indians having appeared in different Parts of Hampshire and this County, but their Numbers are not yet certain: A great Number of our People have been scalped and taken Prisoners in both Counties within these two Days: Many have already deserted their Plantations in this County, and Hampshire is entirely abandoned, except by some who have betaken themselves to Fens, where they must fall a Sacrifice unless speedily relieved. As we are not able to defend ourselves, and the few remaining in Hampshire, without Assistance from the neighbouring Colonies, I think necessary to call upon you for a Detachment of your Militia, of at least One Hundred and Fifty Men, properly officer'd and supply'd with Arms and Ammunition, and that you march them to this Place immediately. I am, Yours &c.

JOHN HITE.

“To Col. Francis Lee, or in his Absence, to the Commanding Officer in Loudoun County.”

I enclose the English that brought this Letter from Winchester to Loudoun County, and he informs me, that he was employ'd as an Express from Fort-Commodore to Winchester, which Place he left the 9th Instant, and that upon the 11th of the same, he was lying on the Road, when a Party of Indians, who had been just kill'd, and was there in the greatest of Death, with their Beavers hanging over her Head, his Companion made a Proposal, to knock her on the Head, to put an End to her Agony, but this Express apprehending the Indians were near at Hand, and not thinking it safe to do any Thing, rode off, and left the poor Woman in the Situation they found her: He also inform'd me, that there have been two Indians taken Prisoners within four Miles of Winchester, and that they enquire'd, there has been Five Hundred Indians, for a Fortnight past, about the South Branch of Potomac; and that they waited there in Expectation to be join'd by Five Times that Number. It is very certain that the County of Hampshire is quite deserted, and that many of the Inhabitants in Frederick County are in the same Situation; it is no less certain that the People in Winchester are under the strongest Apprehensions of a Visit from the Indians, and that Capt. Robert Patterson is gone with a Party of eight Men, to know, if possible, the Disposition of the Indians, and their Number. His Return is waited for with the greatest Impatience, as they are sensible of his Activity and Knowledge of the Woods, and expect from him some Intelligence.

There has been Indians seen on the Blue Ridge, and Col. Croft's being cut off, in talk with these Confederates. Those Indians who have appeared on the Ridge, have done as much, and are supposed to be a Party sent from the main Body to reconnoitre the Country, before they fall upon the Back Inhabitants, which they have put off, 'tis imagined, for a few Days, that they might perpetrate their lawless upon the People, in the Time of their Harvest. From the Fact of Circumstances, the beginning of last War was not in alarming or affecting. What a shocking Confirmation it is, to see the Harvest Fields abandoned, Plantations deserted, and the poor wretched Inhabitants obliged to fly, or to be scalp'd in Sleep? I hope that the Legislature and Individuals of this Colony, as well as your Province, will exert themselves, and do their utmost, to relieve their Back Inhabitants, and put a Stop, as soon as possible, to the Law of the Indians, a People who make Revenge their daily Passion, and who, Experience tells us, are deliberate in their Revenches, pointed in the Execution of them, and interpret in whatever they attempt. And the Day before Yesterday an Indian was seen near Small's Mill, about 25 Miles from Frederick-Town, and pursued, but he got off.

The NORTH BRITON, N^o. 45.

THE King's Speech has always been considered by the Legislature, and by the Public at large, as the Speech of the Minister.

This Week has given the Public the most abandoned Instance of Ministerial Effrontery ever attempted to be imposed on Mankind. I am in Doubt, whether the Imposition is greater on the Sovereign, or on the Nation. Every Friend of his Country must lament that a Prince of so many great and amiable Qualities, whom England truly reveres, can be brought to give the Sanction of his Sacred Name to the most odious Measures, and to the most unjustifiable, public Declarations, from a Throne ever renowned for Truth, Honour, and unfulfilled Virtue. I am sure, all Foreigners, especially the King of Prussia, will hold the Minister in Contempt and Abhorrence. He has made our Sovereign declare, *My Expectations have been fully answered by the happy Effects which the several Allies of my Crown have derived from this salutary Measure of the Definitive Treaty.* The Powers at War with my good Brother, the King of Prussia, have been induced to agree to such Terms of Accommodation as that great Prince has approved; and the Success which has attended my Negotiation has necessarily and immediately diffused the Blessings of Peace through every Part of Europe. The infamous Fallacy of this whole Sentence is apparent to all Mankind: For it is known, that the King of Prussia did not barely approve, but absolutely dictated, as Conqueror, every Article of the Terms of Peace. No Advantage of any Kind has accrued to that magnanimous Prince from our Negotiation, but he was basely deserted by the Scottish Prime-Minister of England. He was known by every Court in Europe to be scarcely on better Terms of Friendship here, than at Vienna; and he was betrayed by us in the Treaty of Peace. What a Strain of Insolence, therefore, is it in a Minister to lay Claim to what he is conscious all his Efforts tended to prevent, and meanly to arrogate to himself a Share in the Fame and Glory of one of the greatest Princes the World has ever seen? The King of Prussia, however, has gloriously kept all his former Conquests, and stipulated Security for all his Allies, even for the Elector of Hanover. I know in what Light this great Prince is considered in Europe, and in what Manner he has been treated here; among other Reasons, perhaps, from some contemptuous Expressions he may have used of the Scot: Expressions which are every Day echoed by the whole Body of Englishmen through the southern Parts of this Island.

The Preliminary Articles of Peace were such as have drawn the Contempt of Mankind on our wretched Negotiators. All our most valuable Conquests were agreed to be Restored, and the East India Company would have been infallibly ruined by a single Article of this fallacious and baneful Negotiation. No Hireling of the Ministry has been hardy enough to dispute this; yet the Minister himself has made our Sovereign declare, *the Satisfaction which he felt at the approaching Re-establishment of Peace upon Conditions so honourable to his Crown, and so beneficial to his People.* As to the entire Approbation of Parliament, which was so vainly boasted of; the World knows how that was obtained. The large Debt on the Civil List, already above half a Year in

Arrear, shews pretty clearly the Transactions of the Wifster. It is, however, remarkable, that the Minister's Speech dwells on the entire Approbation given by Parliament to the Preliminary Articles, which I will venture to say, he must by this Time be ashamed of; for he has been brought to confess the total Want of that Knowledge, and Precision, by which such immense Advantages both of Trade and Territory, were sacrificed to our inveterate Enemies. These gross Blunders are, indeed, in some Measure set right by the Definitive Treaty; yet, the most important Articles, relative to *Cessions, Commerce, and FISHERY*, remain as they were, with respect to the French. The proud and feeble Spaniard too does not RENOUNCE, but only DESISTS from all Pretensions, which he may have formed, to the Right of Fishing—where? only about the Island of NEWFOUNDLAND—till a favourable Opportunity arises of insisting on it, there, as well as elsewhere.

The Minister cannot forbear, even in the King's Speech, insulting us with a dull Repetition of the Word OECONOMY. I did not expect so soon to have seen that Word again, after it had been so exploded, and more than once, by a most numerous Audience, hissed off the Stage of our English Theatres. Let the Public be informed of a single Instance of Oeconomy, except indeed in the Household! Is a Regiment, which was completed as to its Complement of Officers on the Tuesday, and broke on the Thursday, a Proof of Oeconomy? Is the Pay of the Scottish Master ELLIOT to be voted by an English Parliament, under the Head of Oeconomy? Is this, among a Thousand others, one of the convincing Proofs of a firm Resolution to form Government on a Plan of strict Oeconomy? Is it not notorious, that in the Reduction of the Army, not the least Attention has been paid to it? Many unnecessary Expences have been incurred, only to increase the Power of the Crown, that is, to create more lucrative Jobs for the Creatures of the Minister. The Staff indeed is broke, but the discerning Part of Mankind immediately comprehended the mean Subterfuge, and resented the Indignity put upon so brave an Officer, as Marshal Ligonier. The Step was taken to give the whole Power of the Army to the Crown, that is, to the Minister. Lord Ligonier is now no longer at the Head of the Army; but Lord BUTE in Effect is: I mean, that every Preferment given by the Crown will be found still to be obtained by his enormous Influence, and to be bestowed only on the Creatures of the Scottish Faction. The Nation is still in the same deplorable State, while he governs, and can make the Tools of his Power pursue the same odious Measures. Such a Retreat, as he intends, can only mean that Personal Indemnity, which, I hope, Guilt will never find from an injured Nation. The Negotiations of the late inglorious Peace, and the Excise, will haunt him wherever he goes; and the Terrors he must be in, of the just Resentment he must expect to meet from a brave and insulted People, and which must finally crush him, will be for ever before his Eyes.

In vain will such a Minister, or the foul Dregs of his Power, the Tools of Corruption and Despotism, preach up in the Speech that Spirit of Concord, and that Obedience to the Laws, which is essential to good Order. They have sent the Spirit of Discord through the Land, and I will prophesy, that it will never be extinguished, but by the Extinction of their Power. Is the Spirit of Concord to go

Hand in Hand with the PEACE and EXCISE through this Nation? Is it to be expected between an insolent EXCISEMAN, and a Peer, Gentleman, Freeholder, or Farmer, whose private Houses are now made liable to be entered and searched at pleasure? Gloucestershire, Herefordshire, and in general all the Cyder Counties, are not surely the several Counties which are alluded to in the Speech. The Spirit of Concord has not gone forth among them, but the Spirit of Liberty has, and a noble Opposition has been given to the wicked Instruments of Oppression.

A despotic Minister will always endeavour to dazzle his Prince with high-flown Ideas of Prerogative and Honour of the Crown, which the Minister will make a Parade of firmly maintaining. I wish, as much as any Man in the Kingdom, to see the Honour of the Crown maintained in a Manner truly becoming Royalty. I lament to see it sunk even to Prostitution. What a shame was it to see the Security of this Country, in point of Military Force, complimented away, contrary to the Opinion of Royalty itself, and sacrificed to the Prejudices and to the Ignorance of a Set of People, the most unfit, from every Consideration, to be consulted on a Matter relative to the Security of the House of HANOVER? I wish to see the Honour of the Crown religiously asserted with regard to our Allies, and the Dignity of it scrupulously maintained with regard to Foreign Princes. Is it possible such an Indignity can have happened, such a Sacrifice of the Crown of ENGLAND, as, that a Minister should already have kissed his Majesty's Hand on being appointed to the most insolent and ungrateful Court in the World, without a previous Assurance of that reciprocal Nomination which the meanest Court in Europe would insist upon, before she proceeded to an Act otherwise so derogatory to her Honour? But Electoral Policy has ever been obsequious to the Court of Vienna, and forgets the Insolence with which Count COLLOREDO left England. Upon a Principle of Dignity and Oeconomy, Lord STORMONT, a Scottish Peer of the Loyal House of Murray, kissed his Majesty's Hand, I think, on Wednesday in the Easter Week; but this ignominious Act has not disgraced the Nation in the London Gazette. The Ministry are not ashamed of doing the Thing in Private; they are only afraid of the Publication. Was it a tender Regard for the Honour of the late King, or of his present Majesty, that invited to Court Lord GEORGE SACKVILLE, in these first Days of Peace, to share in the general Satisfaction, which all good Courtiers received in the Indignity offered to Lord Ligonier, and on the Advancement of—? Was this to shew princely Gratitude to the eminent Service of the accomplished General of the House of Brunswick, who has had so great a Share in rescuing Europe from the Yoke of France; and whose Nephew we hope soon to see made happy in the Possession of the most amiable Princess in the World? Or, is it meant to assert the Honour of the Crown only against the united Wishes of a Loyal and Affectionate People, founded in a happy Experience of the Talents, Ability, Integrity, and Virtue of those, who have had the Glory of redeeming their Country from Bondage and Ruin, in order to support, by every Art of Corruption and Intimidation, a weak, disjointed, incapable Set, of—I will call them any thing but Ministers—by whom the Favourite still Meditates to Rule this Kingdom with a Rod of Iron.

A Letter from a Gentleman in Town to his Friend in the Country, occasioned by a late Resignation.

*Cadit & Ripheus, justissimus ille
Qui fuit in Teucris, & servantissimus æqui.*

My dear SIR,

YOU will by this Time have heard of Lord Bute's Resignation, an Event that has astonished the Publick.

I fancy I cannot more agreeably gratify your Curiosity, than by informing you of the Opinions, or rather Conjectures that are formed on this Occasion. His personal Enemies triumph at his Retreat, and boast that they have driven him from the Administration by their Spirited Opposition; but it does not appear they have much Reason to vaunt, as not a single Person of their Party has been admitted into Government.—The Friends of the late Minister affirm, that his Resignation is in Consequence of a Resolution early taken, and invariably adhered to by this extraordinary Person; who seeing the Nation involved in a consuming War, which, for various Reasons, no Minister but himself would put an End to, thought himself called upon, not only as the Friend of his Sovereign, but as the Friend of his Country, to undertake the difficult and dangerous Task of making Peace: This he happily accomplished, and made a Peace which speaks for itself. In the Prosecution of this great Work, his Life has been often Threatened, and sometimes in Danger, from an exasperated Multitude: His Character has been attacked with a Virulence, till now unknown: His Relations, his Friends, the Place of his Nativity, have been reviled, and every possible Method taken to discredit him with the Publick, and to ruin him with the King, his Master. This Storm he endured, and persevered with invincible Constancy, till the Peace was ratified and approved by Parliament, and the Business of the Session brought to a Conclusion: Then he resigned, leaving the new Ministry, supported by a great Majority in both Houses, and not obstructed by those Prejudices which had been so industriously raised up against him.

It is reported, that his Lordship was determined to the immediate Execution of his Purpose by the declining State of his Health, greatly impaired by the Anxiety and Fatigue of Business. This Opinion of his having early taken a Resolution to retire, is confirmed by the Mildness of his Administration, and his total Neglect of the Libels against him. He has accordingly Retired, without Place or Pension, disdaining to touch those tempting Spoils which lay at his Feet.

Viewed in this Light, the Conduct of the late Minister shines with a Splendor of Generosity and Disinterestedness that must strike every unprejudiced Mind, and even soften the Rage of Prejudice itself. The Minister of the greatest Kingdom in the World, who voluntarily resigns, retires, and becomes a private Man, without Rank, Place, or Revenue, surely presents to Mankind an uncommon Spectacle; AN OBJECT OF VENERATION! And every serious and reflecting Person must necessarily regret, that this noble Lord found his Countrymen in such a Disposition with regard to him, to require so extraordinary an Effort of Magnanimity to do them Service.

The Turbulence of Free States is a common Theme of Declamation, and seems a Defect, in some Degree, inseparable from Liberty. I am afraid, that this Country has now given an Instance of this Disposition, which may lead future Ministers and future Sovereigns to Views of Government very

different from those of the late Minister, and the present King. His Majesty, since his Accession to the Throne, has voluntarily surrendered Part of his Prerogative, and Part of his Revenue, for the Sake of Freedom. He hath set before his Subjects an uniform Example of every private Virtue; and yet, to confess the Truth, Faction has been able to diminish the Popularity due to this excellent Prince.

—Hic Pietatis Honos?

I am unwilling to draw a Conclusion so severe against the Age in which we live, but it seems unavoidable.—The King is too virtuous for his People! Their Ingratitude to him is a Proof, that they neither have in themselves, nor respect in others, those Qualities which distinguish him among Monarchs, and among Men. Perhaps (I am afraid it is more than Perhaps) they would be better Subjects if their Sovereign was not so good; and it is no Prophecy to say of those headlong Times, that some hard ruled King, as Shakespear calls Henry VIII, will one Day arise, and more than Revenge the Wrongs of his Predecessor. Such are the Sentiments that I hear from judicious and quiet Men, who searching into the Character and Conduct of the King, and his late Minister, can find nothing to justify the Violence of Opposition, nothing to excuse that most injurious Jealousy of an Intention to attack Liberty, by establishing a general Excise. For my Part I am fully satisfied, that Liberty is in no Danger but from the Growth of Licentiousness, the Arrogance of Faction, and the Temerity of seditious Men, working on the Passions of their Fellow Subjects.

Whoever considers some late Proceedings of a very publick Nature, can be at no Loss to judge from what Quarter the Constitution is in Danger. A single Corporation erects itself into a Tribunitial Court, condemns the Procedure of Parliament, and gives imperious Council to the King. The more I contemplate the Temper of the Times, and the sort of Spirit that has prevailed for a Twelve-month past, the more melancholy are my Conclusions. A Patriot King, and a Patriot Minister have been described in the Writings of the Learned, and held up as Objects of Admiration and Desire: I am afraid this Country has beheld them both, and has not known them. What real Cause of Jealousy or Discontent has been given during the late Administration? Has Germany been the Idol of the Sovereign? or the Aggrandizing of his own Family, the Object of the Minister? Have Party Distinctions been kept up, that the Minister might govern by a Party? No: The Opposition itself have been weak enough to exclaim against the wise and benevolent Plan of their Sovereign, who chose to be the King of his People, and not the Leader of a Party.

Amazing! that those very Persons, who, when in Office, were always ready to receive every one who would lift with them, should presume to mutiny against their King, and distress his Administration, because he received into Favour the independent Country Gentlemen of England, renouncing their antient Prejudices, and avowing Allegiance to their native Prince. These are Facts which admit of no Denial, and lead me still more sincerely to lament the Loss of that Constitutional Minister, who has now resigned: I call him Constitutional, because he was not forced upon the King by a prevalent Faction, but Chosen by his Master, and therefore liable to the Check and Controul of Parliament, which a Minister is not, who seizes Government at the Head of a Party, and will be supported even in the worst Measures, by the Party whom he leads. But the late Minister, besides being in this remarka-

ble Sense a Constitutional Minister, had some acknowledged Qualities that rendered him the least dangerous to Liberty, of all those who have ever held his Office: He had not been bred in the School of Corruption: his delicate Nature was shocked even at that Degree of it which the Necessity of the State requires. Former Ministers corrupted Individuals, to make them swerve from their Duty; now I am afraid, whoever is Minister, must use some Influence with Men to make them adhere to it. Disinterested and sincere, the Earl of Bute was apt to think too well of Mankind, and to lay a greater Stress upon Principle than this Age admits of. His House was a School of Temperance and Regularity; there were neither Routs nor Revels, nor Rioting, nor Gaming there: No Man can complain, during his Administration, of a Promise broken, or of Hopes given, and not fulfilled. No inferior Person, in any Department where he has served, who does not passionately regret the Loss of so easy, so kind a Superior.—Such is the Minister whom this Country has lost for ever; who, in a most perilous Hour, entered on Administration, and in the Midst of all his Cares and Anxieties for the State, has been traduced and persecuted in a Manner unheard of, and even incredible to Posterity. Amongst other good Qualities not denied him, he is said to possess a firm Belief of Religion; else, he had Reason enough to say with Brutus, "Virtue, I have worshipped thee as a Substance, and I have found thee but an empty Name."

A Conference with the Deputies of the Six-Nations of Indians, in the Council-Chamber, at Hartford, in the Colony of Connecticut, on the 28th Day of May last.

PRESENT, the Governor, Council and Assembly of the
said Colony.

THE Deputies after being taken by the Hand, and bid welcome into the Government, seated themselves; then Saquayenquaraghta arose and delivered a Speech, which, from the Interpreter, was taken as followeth, viz.

terpreter, was taken as follows:—
BROTHERS, We were sent hither by the
 Chiefs of all the Six Nations, and it has pleased God that we
 are arrived safe at this Place, to see you. Brothers, We are
 Deputies from all the Chiefs, and we understand that you are
 all Sound within, and we give this to clear your Eyes that
 you may see, and open your Ears that you may hear, and we
 cleanse your Hearts that you may entertain cordially what we
 shall speak to you. *A Belt of Wampum from the Deputy of*
the Ojibwegas.

Returned the Compliment to them, that they would open
their Eyes, and cleanse their Throats, that they might speak
freely.

BROTHERS, We have no Writing of it, but we have a Tradition, that God, the Maker of all Things hath given to the Six Nations our large Country to dwell and subsist in, and made them a strong People, and our Nations have of old appointed a Fire-Place at Onondago, by that Means united together, and so became a strong and powerful Confederacy; afterwards they saw, at Albany, a White People, and found Means to enter into a Conference with them, and made a Silver Chain, a strong Chain of Friendship, which they and we have from Time to Time brightened and kept clean, and at this first Interview liked you so well, that we gave you Room for you to Settle upon our Land, and you are since become very Numerous and Prosperous, for which we are very glad and rejoice: And Brothers, we have been very helpful, assisted one another against our Enemies, and by the Help of God, we have gained Superiority over them: And Brothers, you will excuse us; we have no Records of former Proceedings, but hint at such Things as were done formerly by our Forefathers, and have nothing further to offer on this Head.

Now we are come to another Head.
BROTHERS, We have heard grievous News this Winter, that you were about to come with Three Hundred Families to Settle on our Lands, which was very astonishing to us, and that you designed to build Forts and strong Places on our Lands, and for that Reason our Sachems considered upon it and have sent us down to this Place; by that Means we are come down here to acquaint you with what News we hear that you have got a design to Settle on the Susquehanna River, and claim the Land to the West-Seas; and we have heretofore given away Land to the white People, but of the Sale of this Land the Six Nations know Nothing that they have ever given it away or sold it to any; and what little we have left we intend to keep ourselves; we know not of any such Sale, and if any such Thing hath been, it must have been done in a separate Manner and not in a general Meeting or Council of the Six Nations, as hath been the usual Manner of their buying or selling their Lands.

BROTHERS, Our Custom is not to keep any Thing Secret, we have heard that one Lydia, at Albany, has endeavored to purchase some Lands at Sufquehannah, and it is not the Manner of the Six Nations to keep any Thing in the Reserve, he was up among the Nations to obtain it, but we have heard that he has since got a Deed from the Indians, which he obtained from them singly, or one by one, and that from Stragglers and such as we knew nothing of. We have often sold Lands to the white People, but then it was done by the consent of the whole, in some general Meeting, and this in Land which we have reserved for ourselves, as we have but little left, and we are surprised at such a Measure being taken to obtain a Deed without our Knowledge or Consent.

We have been told that Lydias has reported that he paid a great deal of Money for this Land which we know nothing of and this is the hunting Ground which we depend upon for our Support, and are not willing by any Means to part with it. *Then the speaker professes a Brand-Bell which he would have you take this*

with it. [Hand.] Brothers, we would have you take this
hold in his Hand.] Brothers, we here present you with
Matter into serious Consideration; we here present you with
the Emblem of the Six Castles belonging to our Nations,
and through it the Road or Path through which we come to
strengthen our Covenant Chain. Brothers, seriously take it
into Consideration, and think how you would like it to have
Lands taken from you in an unfair and injurious Manner.
You are a praying People, better acquainted with Books and
Learning than we, and must needs know better what is
Right; to have your Lands as we may say Stolen from you;
surely you could not like it to be treated in such a Manner,
to have your Lands taken from you that you depend upon
for your Support. Brothers, Take it seriously into your Con-
sideration, how strong our Union used to be formerly, when
we were, as it were united under one Head, and were one
Body and Blood, and happily united in our Affections.
Brothers, As I have told you before, that we have been sent
here by our Chiefs to let you know what we have heard
about your Design of entering on our Lands, and we deliver

in this Belt to shew the Minds of the Confederate Nations, that you do not encroach on our Lands which we have reserved and design to keep for our Children to the latest Posterity, and will not part with; they are such as we set by and will not Sell. Brothers, If you proceed to encroach on our Lands we shall not be easy, but will return home to our Places, and apply ourselves to the King our Father to obtain Justice, and I myself will go, and on my going out of the House will return home and leave you to consider on it. And now I have said all I have to say.

The Governor directed the Interpreter to tell them, that he was able to give them a satisfactory Answer, and desired they would stay till the Beginning of the Week, at which Time they should have an Answer.

To which they answered, that their Chiefs directed them to make no Delay, but as soon as they had made their Speech they were to return; but the Governor desired they would stay for an Answer; then they withdrew.

At the Council-Chamber, in Hartford, May 30, 1763, Present as above.

The Governor made Answer to the foregoing Speech in the Words following, viz.

WE heartily welcome you to this Place, and are glad to see you safe arrived, and that you are sent by your Chiefs to brighten the Covenant Chain made by our Forefathers: You tell us your Chiefs think we are not all Sound within, and give a Belt to clear our Eyes to see, open our Ears to hear, and make our Hearts clean, that we may understand the meaning what you speak to us.

cordially receive what you speak to us.
BRETHREN, We are sorry your Chiefs think we are not
Sound within, we assure you our Eyes are clear, our Ears
are open, and we cordially receive you as Friends, and kind-
ly receive your Message. Brethren, we rejoice with you that
God has prospered the Great King GEORGE, our common
Father, so that your and our Enemies are subdued, and now
we hope we shall live in Peace and Friendship as long as the
Sun and Moon shall endure.

BRETHREN, You tell us the News you have heard, that
 we were about to come with 300 Families to Settle on the
 Sufquehannah-River, which was very astonishing to you, and
 we are desirous to build Forts on your Lands.

that we deign to build Forts on your Lands.
BROTHERN, We assure and tell you, this Government, has not given any Orders for any such Settlement; we are no Ways concerned in that Matter, only as Friends to you have endeavoured to prevent the People from going to Settle those Lands. We have indeed been told, that a Number of particular Persons, some living in Connecticut, some in Massachusetts, some in New-York, and some in other Governments, were about to Settle on those Lands, but we advised them not to proceed in their Attempts, and lately I received Orders from the King our common Father, commanding me to use my Authority and Influence to prevent the People from attempting to settle on those Lands till the Matter should be laid before the King: In Obedience to his Majesty's Commands, I acquainted the Chief Men among them with the King's Orders, and advised them to lay aside the Prosecution of the Settlement for the present; and furthermore, I have now the Satisfaction to acquaint you, that I am well informed those People have had a Meeting, and have in Testimony as well of his Majesty's Care, as their ready Submission and Acquiescence in his Orders, unanimously agreed, that no Person whatever, of their Company, shall enter upon, or make any Settlement on any of those Lands until his Majesty, our common Father's Pleasure be known in that Matter.

ter. BROTHERN, Seeing we as your Friends, and agreeable to the King's Orders, have taken so much Care to prevent those Settlements which are so grievous to you, and have now given you Accounts that the Attempt are stop'd, we think you will be fully Satisfied, and inform our Brothers, your Chiefs, and your Nations of this, and rest easy and quiet. We assure you of our cordial Friendship, and wish you a safe Journey Home, and desire you to present our kind Compliments to the Sachems of the Six-Nations. Farewell.

To which the Deputies of the Six-Nations replied as follows, viz.

BROTHERN.
 WE have heard with Attention what you have said,
 and are well pleased with the same, and we hope
 you will endeavour to prevent any more People from making
 Purchases of us; and as to those Lands we talked about,
 we do not at present design to part with them, but if ever we
 do, it shall be to those Purchasers of your People before any
 others, if they desire it. We are to receive no Presents on
 this Occasion, but as to your Offer to discharge our Expenses
 while in this Town, we gratefully accept and acknowledge
 the same, and heartily bid you
 Farewell

L O N D O N, May 6.

BY some English Sailors which carried over the Comet Frigate to Brest, and which was bought on the French King's Account, we learn, that they have about 20 Sail of the Line in that Harbour, besides Frigates. There is not a single one in the King's Yard as yet.

Letters from Paris of the first of May advise, th^y by their last Accounts from the Port of Brett, the Ship Tonnant was soon to fail for Toulon; and that on the 17th inst. the Beaufort sailed from Brett for the West-Indies, with the following Ships of the Line, viz. the Royal Louis of 110 Guns, the Minotaur of 74, the Scepter of 74, and the Accablant of 64; and the best following Brigades, viz. Thetis, Héros, &c.

On Tuesday last Mr. Wilkes, being removed on a Habeas Corpus to the Court of Common-Pleas, Westminster-Hall, to answer to the Charge against him, spoke to the Court as follows.

The Speech of JOHN WILKES, Esq; now a Prisoner in the Tower, on Account of High Treason, when brought up to the Court of Common-Pleas, Tuesday, May 3, 1763, before the Right Hon. Sir Charles Pratt, Lord Chief Justice, and the Rest of the Judges of the Court.

MY LORD,

MY LORD,
I AM happy to appear before your Lordship and this Court, where LIBERTY is so sure of finding Protection and Support; and where the LAW, the Principal and End of which is the Preservation of LIBERTY, is so perfectly understood. LIBERTY, my Lord, has been the governing Principle of every Action of my Life; and, actuated by it, I have always endeavoured to serve my gracious Sovereign, and his Family, knowing his Government to be founded on it. But as it has been his Misfortune to have employed Ministers, who have endeavoured to cast the Odium and Contempt, arising from their own tyrannous and corrupt Measures, on the sacred Person of their Sovereign and Benefactor; so mine has been the daring Task, to rescue the Royal Person from ill-placed Imputations, and fix them on the Ministers, who alone ought to bear the Blame, nay, the Punishment, due to their unconstitutional Proceedings.

For this Proof of my Zeal, and Affection to my Sovereign,
I have been imprisoned, sent to the Tower, and treated with
- Disgrace - not ungracified, even on SCOTTISH Rebels.

But however these Ministers may now strive to destroy me; whatever *Persecutions* they are now meditating against me; yet to the World I shall proclaim, that Offers of the most advantageous and lucrative Kind have been made to seduce me to their Party, and no Means left untried to win me to their Connection: Now, as their Attempts to corrupt me have failed, they aim at intimidating me by *Prosecution*; but as it hath pleased God to give me *Virtue* to resist their Bribes, so I doubt not but he will give me *Spirit* to surmount their Threats, in a Manner becoming an *ENGLISHMAN*; who would suffer the severest Trials, rather than associate themselves with Men who are Enemies to the *LIBERTY* of this Country. Their Bribes I rejected; their Menaces I defy; and I think this the most fortunate Moment of my Life, when I appear before your Lordship, and this Court, where Innocence is sure of Protection, and *LIBERTY* can never want her Friends and Guardians.

Friday, May 6. This Morning John Wilkes, Esq; lately committed clofe Prisoner to the Tower of London, by a Warrant of Commitment from the Secretaries of State, was brought up to the Bar of the Court of Common-Pleas, where (as soon as the Court was seated) he made the following Speech.

MY LORD,
FAR be it from me to regret that I have passed so many more Days in Captivity, as it will have afforded you an Opportunity of doing, upon mature Reflection, and repeated Examination, the more signal Justice to my COUNTRY. The LIBERTY of all Peers and Gentlemen, and what touches me more sensibly, that of all the middling and inferior Classes of People who stand most in Need of Protection, is in my Case this Day to be finally decided upon: A Question of such Importance as to determine at once whether English Liberty be a Reality or a Shadow. Your own free-born Hearts will feel with Indignation and Compassion all that Load of Oppression under which I have so long laboured. CLOSE IMPRISONMENT, the Effect of premeditated Malice; all Accusations for more than two Days denied to me; my House ransacked and plundered; my most private and secret Concerns divulged; every vile and malignant Infusion even of High Treason itself, no less indolently than falsely circulated, by my cruel and implacable Enemies, together with all the various *Insolence of Office*, form but a Part of my unexampled ill Treatment. Such inhuman Principles of *Star-Chamber Tyranny* will, I trust, by this COURT, upon this solemn Occasion, be finally extirpated, and henceforth every innocent Man, however poor and unsupported, may hope to sleep in Peace and Security in his own House, unviolated by *King's Messengers*, and the arbitrary Mandates of an 'overbearing' SECRETARY OF STATE.

SECRETARY OF STATE. The Nation
I will no longer delay your Justice. The Nation
is impatient to hear, nor can be (sate or happy), till that is
obtained. If the same Persecution is after all to carry me
before another Court, I hope I shall find that the genuine
Spirit of MAGNA CHARTA, that glorious Inheritance, that
distinguishing Characteristic of ENGLISHMEN, is as religi-
ously revered THERE, as I know it is HERE, by the great
Personages, before whom I have now the Happiness to stand;
and that I shall find (as in the ever-memorable Case of the
imprisoned Bishops) an independent Jury of free-born EN-
GLISHMEN, who will persist to determine my Fate as in Con-
science bound, upon constitutional Principles, by a Verdict
of Guilty or Not Guilty. Ask no more at the Hands of my
COUNTRYMEN.

After which the Court proceeded to give their Opinion and Mr. Wilkes was ordered to be discharged. He then addressed himself to the Court in the Words following.

My LORDS,
GREAT as my Joy must naturally be at the Decision which THIS COURT, with a TRUE SPIRIT OF LIBERTY, has been pleased to make concerning the untoward and *unreasonable Seizure of my Person*, and all the other consequential Grievances, allow me to assure You that I feel it for *as far as sensibly on my own Account*, than I do for THE PUBLIC. The Sufferings of an Individual are a trifling Object, when compared with the *WORLD*, and I should blush to feel *less myself* in Comparison with Considerations of a Nature so *transcendently Superior*.

"I will not trouble you with my poor Thanks. Thanks are due to You from the whole English Nation, and from ALL the Subjects of the English Crown. They will be paid You, together with every Testimony of Zeal and Affection to * THE LEARNED SERJEANT, who has so ABLY and so CONSTITUTIONALLY pleaded my Cause, and in mine (with Pleasure I say it) THE CAUSE OF LIBERTY. Every Testimony of my Gratitude is justly due to you, and I take Leave of THIS COURT with a Veneration and Respect, which no Time can obliterate, nor can the most grateful Heart sufficiently express."

A Copy having been taken of the following Letter, which was sent OPEN to the Earl of Halifax, to be forwarded to Paris, we take the Liberty of presenting it to our Readers.

MY DEAREST POLLY, Tower, Sunday, May 1.
I HAVE got Half an Hour's Leisure to pay my Compliments to you, and to relieve you from the Anxiety you will, from the kind Affection you bear me, be in at hearing of my Commitment to this Place. Be assured that I have done nothing unworthy of a Man of Honour, who has the Happiness of being your Father. You shall never in future Life blush for me. I am only accused of Writing the last North-Briton, yet my Sword has been taken from me, all my Papers have been stolen by Ruffians, and I have been forcibly brought here. I have not yet seen my Accusers, nor have I heard who they are. My Friends are refused Admittance to me. Lord Temple, and my Brother, could not be allowed to see me Yesterday. As an Englishman, I must lament that my Liberty is thus wickedly taken away, yet I am not unhappy, for my Honour is clear, my Health good, and my Spirit unshaken, I believe indeed, invincible. The most pleasing Thoughts I have are of you; and the most agreeable News I can hear, will be the Continuance of your Health.

I beg you not to write a Word of Politics.

A propos, my dear Girl, can you get me made *Membre du Parlement de Paris*, for ours has lost all their Privileges? Yours has a few left.—My best Compliments to Madame—, I hope to kiss her Hand by the End of June, and that we shall all make our Tour together, and laugh at all the Follies and Rogueries of this Country.—Continue to love me, and believe me, with the greatest Warmth of Affection,

Your obliged Father, JAMES WILKES.

Though Mr. Wilkes be discharged, on Account of his being a Member of Parliament, from his Imprisonment in the Tower; yet he is not freed from the Accusation against him. The Point before the Court of Common-Pleas, was not the Proof of his Guilt, but the Nature of his Offence, whether it deprived him of his Privileges as a Member of Parliament, which extend to all Cases, except Treason, Felony, and Breach of the Peace. The Warrant of the Commitment accuses him not of High Treason, but of Writing and Publishing a Libel. But a Libel in the Sense of the Law, is only a high Misdemeanor (though in arbitrary Reigns it has been held to be more) and at most has a Tendency to disturb the Peace.

Mr. Wilkes, however, had been scarcely discharged, when a Gentleman of Eminence in the Law stood up, and told my Lord Chief Justice, that he had just received a Note from the Attorney and Solicitor-General, to intreat his Lordship would not give Mr. Wilkes Leave to depart till their coming, which would be instant, as they had something to offer against his Plea of Privilege. But this Motion was laughed at by the whole Court, as the Question was decided, and Mr. Wilkes already discharged.

We are informed that Mr. Wilkes's Franks have been Charged, in Violation of the Privilege of Parliament.

May 7. Yesterday Morning, at Four o'Clock, a terrible Fire broke out at the House of the Right Honourable Lady Viscountess Dowager Moleworth, in Little Brook-street, Grosvenor-square, which burnt furiously for some Time, and at length entirely consumed the same. Lady Moleworth, and two of her Daughters, who lay in the same Room with her, were unhappily burnt to Death; and another of her Ladyship's Daughters jumped out of a Window, and broke her Thigh, which, we are informed, was obliged to be cut off Yesterday. The Governor's to the young Ladies was likewise burnt, and one of the Maid Servants jumped out of a two Pair of Stairs Window, but pitching on the Spikes of the Iron Rail, was immediately killed. A Footman also threw himself out of the Window, and fell into the Area, and was carried to the Hospital, where he soon after died. Other of the Servants are said to be missing.—It is reported the Fire broke out in Captain Moleworth's Apartment, occasioned by burning a Candle all Night in the Room. The Captain was saved by getting over a Wall by help of a Ladder. It was near Half an Hour before any Engines came, as the Watchmen were gone off their Stands, and the second Floor and Garrets were in Flames before any Engines began to play. One unhappy Circumstance is said to have attended, that her Ladyship had the Key of the House Door constantly brought to her every Night; and when the Fire was first discovered by some of the Servants, they went to her Ladyship's Room, which was in Flames, and consequently could not get the Key, which chiefly occasioned the melancholy Circumstances before related.

BRIDGE-TOWN, (in BARBADOS) June 2.

Last Monday Afternoon three Frenchmen, under Pretence of going on board a Vessel that was to sail that Evening, prevailed on two Negroes to take them off; but as soon as they got over the Bar, one of them displaced the Boy at the Helm, and bore away to Leeward: On this, one of the Negroes jumped over-board, swam on Shore, and soon alarmed the Wharf: They were immediately pursued, and by the Vigilance of a white Man in a Speight's-Town Boat, belonging to Mr. Ford, were brought back, and are now under Confinement in our Goal. They were fired at as they passed the Fort, but proceeded with an undaunted Resolution till they were overtaken.

CHARLES-TOWN, (in South-Carolina) June 14.

From Fort Prince-George, Keeshowee, we are informed of the Great Warrior's Return to the Nation, with some Frenchmen, some Ammunition, and some Brandy: That the Northern Indians have been troublesome to the Cherokees,

about the Upper-Towns, Valley, and Middle-Settlements, and have killed and scalped Eight of them, two of which were Sons of Attakull-kulla; whereupon he was gone out with a Party of 60 Men to take Satisfaction; and, that being convinced no Trade would be sent from hence to the Over-hills, he intends, upon his Return, to make Application to Governor Fauquier for a Trade from Virginia: And that about 30 Creeks have lately been at Toogoulou, laying in Wait for some Augusta Traders to the Over-hills, from one of whom (John Walker) they took four Keggs of Rum, and some other Things, as he was going up; and from another that was returning, his Horses and Leather; the last they gave a pretty severe Correction to. The Reason they give for this Conduct is, that those Traders steal whole Drovers of Horses from them.

Extract of a Letter from the Havana, May 13.

"The King's Ships and Prizes are all fitted out and ready for the Sea.—The Count de Aranga is appointed Governor of Cuba, and was to sail from Cadix the beginning of April.—Admiral Kepple, hourly expected from Jamaica, it is said, will proceed for England, and not wait for the Garrison, the Destination whereof is not known here. A few Days ago one of the Murderers of Mess. Boyd and Read of Philadelphia, was tried by a Court-Martial, and sentenced to be hanged, his Head cut off, and put on the most conspicuous Place, viz. the Land Port Gate, and his Body cast into the Sea, without Benefit of Clergy, which Sentence was approved of by the General, and put in Execution two Days afterwards.—Quarter-master Fraser, formerly a Serjeant of the Royal, and the first Man that entered the Moro at the Storm, was likewise hanged some Days ago, for killing a Soldier whom he suspected of being too free with his Wife."

ANNAPOLIS, July 21.

We have the Pleasure of acquainting our Readers, That Col. Cresap, and his Family, were not cut off by the Indians a few Days ago; but if he has not speedy Relief, it is feared he will be soon. By a Letter from thence (the Old-Town, which is about 15 Miles on this Side Fort-Cumberland) we are informed, That on the 13th Instant Six Men who were at work in the Wheat Field, were fired on by Five Indians, who killed one of the Six, but on being fired at by one of the White Men, and seeing others coming to engage them, retired without scalping him. That on the 14th five Indians crept up to, and fired on, about 16 White Men, who were about a Hundred Yards from the Colonel's House, and wounded one Man; but on the White Men's returning their Fire, the Indians fled, some of them being wounded, as the Blood they lost showed, and were pursued about a Mile. That on the 15th, as Mr. Samuel Stanbury Welder was going to his House, which is about 300 Yards from the Colonel's, with four Men and several Women, some Indians rushed on them from a Rising Ground; when the People saw them, they ran towards the Colonel's, hallowing, whereupon 16 or 18 Men who were there, went to meet the Indians, and firing on them, killed one, who was left, and wounded others, as appeared by the Blood which fell from them as they ran off; but Mr. Welder was killed by a Shot from the Indians. When the Indians run off on the 14th, they left three Bundles behind them; and when they fled on the 15th, they left three of their Guns, a Pistol, and other Things, and, by some particular Mark on one of the Guns, it is known, that these Indians were some of the Party that passed by the Old-Town in the Spring, when they told Col. Cresap they were going to make War on the Cherokees.

Last Wednesday Capt. Peter Butler, of Frederick-Town, Maryland, called on his Company of Militia, and in a few Hours they raised 20 Men, with Money to Pay them, to Range on the other Side Comochesqua, from Fort-Fredrick to the Temporary Line, to protect the distressed Inhabitants in gathering in their Harvest.

Another Company of Rangers, consisting of 40, were likewise raised in another Part of that County, for the same Purpose. The Gentlemen thereabouts have shown a noble Spirit. In a Letter from a Gentleman in Virginia, dated the 18th, he writes, "I have been at Lord Fairfax's since I saw you, and only returned this Day; while I was there, we were alarmed every Day with Accounts of the Indians being in that Neighbourhood, which occasioned many of the Inhabitants to leave their Plantations, and retire with what Effects they could carry, into the most convenient Forts. The Militia of the Five Frontier Counties have been drafted and sent up into Frederick and Hampshire, and many Gentlemen have gone out Volunteers."

Since our last, a good many of the Tobacco Ships have arrived from London, at different Parts of the Province.

With Capt. Love, came in Passenger, the Hon. DANIEL DULANY, Esq; Recorder of this City, and Secretary of the Province, who arrived safe at his House in Town on Monday last.

EDMUND KEY, Esq; Barrister at Law, came in with Capt. Ridgely, and landed below, near his Father's.

On Monday last, towards Evening, Mr. Edward Brown, of Kent-Island, was found Dead on the Road near his House, with his Skull Fractured. He parted with one of his Neighbours a few Minutes before, in seeming good Health, and whether his Horse flung him, or he was taken in a Fit, he being a very Courteous Man, cannot be known: He was a Man well esteemed in his Neighbourhood, and has left a formidable Family.

quehannah, fled from Danger, and brought their Families, and little else, down the River in Canoes. Some escaped by Land in almost as great Distress, having nothing to support them but a few Cattle, for which they can hardly find Range in the inner Parts of the County, where they fled for Shelter. Their Neighbours, among whom they reside, must suffer greatly, and be oppressed, while they strive to accommodate such Numbers as crowd in among them. They cannot see any of them perish for Want, while they are able to relieve them. Above a Thousand Families are driven from their Houses and Habitations, and all the Comforts and Conveniences of Life. Of these a great Number are so very poor, as to have neither Money nor Credit to purchase the Necessaries of Life. Many Farmers on our Frontiers, and in other Places, live comfortably, who, for many Months in the Year, can command no Money, and as soon as such Persons are driven from their Plantations, they are poor and distressed beyond Expression. Many of these very Families that now suffer, were a few Years ago exposed to the same Losses and Distresses. They lost all their worldly Substance, and some their dearest Friends and Relatives. They were obliged to seek a Shelter among us, and endured Poverty and Hardships for some Years. They gladly returned to their forsaken Habitations as soon as there was any Prospect of Safety; and many of them, with the Help of Friends, or even burdened with Debts, were scarce able to begin the World anew; how hard then and discouraging is their Condition, to be again reduced to extreme Poverty, and all the Dangers of an Indian War? They are Men, and we should, for this Reason, pity their Distresses; they are our Christian Brethren; they are our Fellow Subjects; their Distresses are our Distresses; for they are a Part of this flourishing Province; all these tender Connections call forth our Sympathy, and Bowels of Compassion. It is our Interest as well as our Duty to encourage them to stay in Cumberland County; or even to return to their forsaken Dwellings, if it can be done in Safety. For if that County be deserted, where shall we make a Stand? Shall Lancaster or this City be the Frontiers of this Province? Our Governor and Assembly have granted Men for their Protection, and it is to be hoped the Charity of good Christians will not be wanting to enable the most needy and distressed to find the Necessaries of Life, until we see how these Calamities will end. Our excellent King, and the English Government, will never oppress nor do what is unjust, even to the most barbarous and savage Nations, and if reasonable Terms will not satisfy them, we are able to correct their Insolence, and bring them to Reason; so that we have Cause to trust in God, that this Storm will soon blow over."

"We are informed that Mr. ADAM HOOPS, in Compassion to these Poor Sufferers, ordered Fifty Pounds to be put into proper Hands to be distributed among them: And the Society for the Relief of poor and distressed Presbyterian Ministers, and their Widows and Children, on the 13th Instant, sent One Hundred and Fifty Pounds to some Ministers and Gentlemen in and near Carlisle, and ordered it to be distributed, without Partiality, or any regard to religious Distinctions, among such of these Sufferers as were unable to support themselves and their Families; but as these Sums are not sufficient, it is hoped, from the well known Charity of this Province, that others will have Compassion, and contrive Ways to relieve these Distresses."

ANNAPOLIS, July 28.

Last Sunday in a Thunder Gust at Chesnut-Ridge, in Baltimore-County, there fell Hail as large as small Bullets.

The same Day a Sloop belonging to the Elk-Ridge Iron Works, was overset at the Mouth of South River, but the People were all happily saved.

Saturday Evening last, as a Vessel was on her Passage from Chester-Town for this Place, one of her Crew fell overboard and was Drowned.

Frederick-Town, July 19, 1763.

EVERY Day, for some Time past, has offered the melancholy Scene of poor distressed Families driving down, through this Town, with their Effects, who have deserted their Plantations, for Fear of falling into the cruel Hands of our Savage Enemies, now daily seen in the Woods. And never was Panic more general or forcible than that of the Back Inhabitants, whose Terrors, at this Time, exceed what followed on the Defeat of General Braddock, when the Frontiers lay open to the Incursions of both French and Indians. Whilst *Cocconcheague* Settlement stands firm, we shall think ourselves in some Sort of Security from their Insults here. But should the Inhabitants there give Way, you would soon see your City, and the lower Counties, crowded with Objects of Compassion, as the Flight would, in that Case, become general.—Numbers of those who have betaken themselves to Forts, as well as those who have actually fled, have entirely lost their Crops, or turned in their own Cattle and Hogs to devour the Produce, in Hopes of finding them again, in better Condition, should it hereafter appear safe for them to return.—The Season has been remarkably fine, and the Harvest in general afforded the most promising Appearance of Plenty and Goodness, that has been known for many Years. But alas! how dismal an Alteration of the Prospect!—Many who expected to have sold and supplied the Necessities of others, now want for themselves, and see their warmest Hopes defeated, the Fruits of their honest Industry snatched from them by the merciless Attacks of these bloody-thirsty Barbarians, whose Treatment of such unhappy Wretches as fall into their Hands, is accompanied with Circumstances of infernal Fury, too horrid and shocking for human Nature to dwell upon, even in Imagination.—We were so sensible of the Importance of *Cocconcheague* Settlement, both as a Bulwark and Supply to this Neighbourhood, that on repeated Notice of their growing Distress, Captain *Baile*, on Wednesday last, called the Town Company together, who appeared under Arms on the Court-House Green, with great Unanimity.—Just as the Drum beat *To Arms*, we had the agreeable Satisfaction of seeing a Wagon, sent up by his Excellency (whose tender Care for the Security of the Province, raised Sentiments of the highest Gratitude in the Breast of every one present) loaded with Powder and Lead: Articles of the greatest Importance, at this critical Juncture, when the whole Country has been drained of these necessary

Articles, by the Diligence of our Indian Traders, who had bought up the Whole for the Supply of our Enemies, to be returned, as we have dearly experienced, in Death and Desolation upon us.—A Subscription was then set on Foot, and cheerfully entered into, in Consequence of which, twenty stout young Men immediately enlisted, under Mr. Peter Grosb, to march immediately to the Assistance of the Back Inhabitants, and with other Volunteers, already there raised, to cover the Reapers, in Hopes of securing the Crops.—Had not the Governor's Supply arrived so seasonably, it was doubted whether the whole Town could have furnished Ammunition sufficient for that small Party, Half of which marched backwards, in high Spirits, on Thursday, and the Remainder on Friday Morning.—And on Sunday, Subscriptions were taken in the several Congregations in Town, for sending up farther Assistance.—On Sunday Afternoon we had the Pleasure of seeing Mr. Michael Cresap arrive in Town with Mokofins on his Legs, taken from an Indian whom he killed and scalped, being one of those who shot down Mr. Welder, the Circumstances of whose much lamented Murder, and the Success of Col. Cresap's Family, you no Doubt have received from other Hands.—Money has been cheerfully contributed in our Town, towards the Support of Ten Men to be added to Col. Cresap's present Force, as we look upon the Preservation of the *Old Town* to be of great Importance to us, and a proper Check to the Progress of the Savages.—But notwithstanding our present Efforts to keep the Enemy at a Distance, and thereby shelter the whole Province, our Inhabitants are poor, our Men dispersed, and without a Detachment from below, it is to be feared, we must give Way, and the foundation break in upon the lower Counties.
