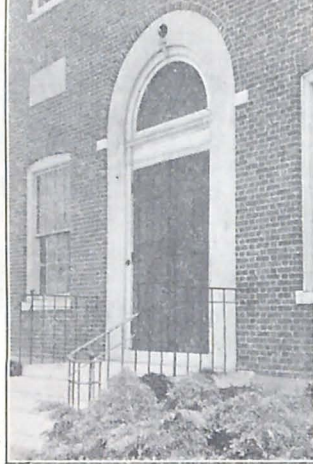

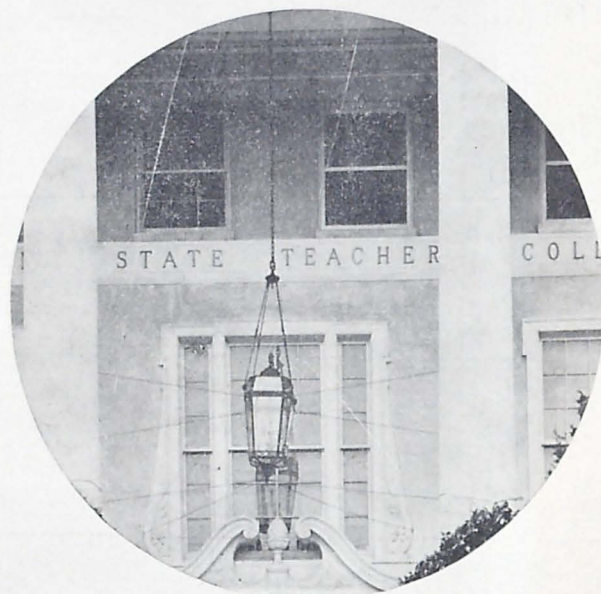

II. A well trained faculty.

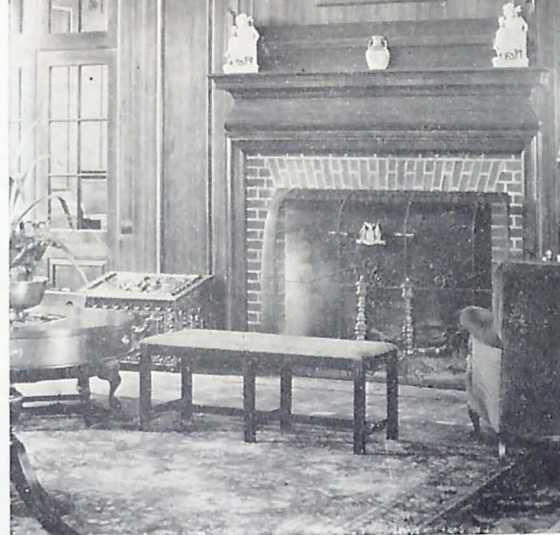
- A. Approximately 30% of college instructors at STC have doctors' degrees.

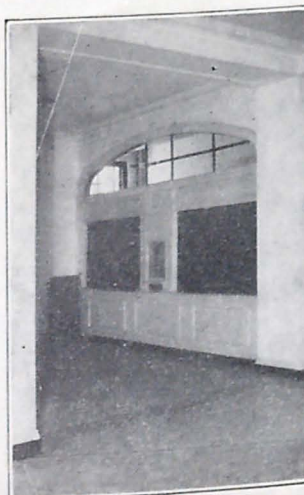


"GOOD CHEER" THE FIREPLACE

Greetings and turning of shovel of earth by Hon. William S. Gordy, Jr., former State Comptroller.

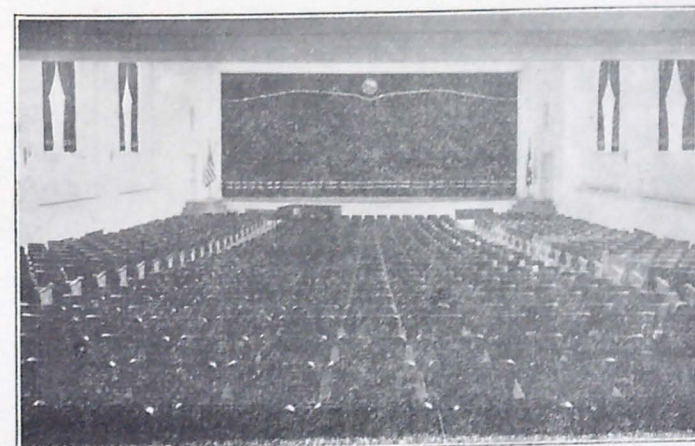
