S I R,

I AM persuaded no Man, in whose Breast one Spark of Virtue glimmers, hath read the Addresses of the Council, and of the House of Assembly, of the Island of Jamaica, to their late Governor, Colonel TRELAWNY, and that great good Man's Answers, but has, in some Degree, felt that conscious Glow of Veneration, which exalted Merit naturally commands, and reverberated in his Imagination, the grateful Applause of the Inhabitants of Jamaica.

Tho' we have not basked in the Sunshine of his Virtues; yet, like those northern People, who but barely see the glorious Luminary of Light and Life upon the Skirts of their Horizon; we ought to rise up and pay some Tribute of Admiration, to those all cheering Rays which are reflected upon us.

Happy, thrice happy, those favoured People, who felt his Meridian Splendor: How different is the Fate of such, who live under a lowering Sky, where an inhospitable Gloom, depresses the sprightly Flow of Soul! Where fullen and forbidding Clouds, damp each joyous Propensity! Where the devouring Tempest sweeps with unrelenting Ravage! Where the very Moon, whose Nature should be mild and gentle, appears full of Malignity and Terror, and whose inflamed Countenance, produces sought, but a baneful and injurious Influence! But stop, whither is my Imagination carrying me? What have we to do with the Horrors of Iceland? I confess, a poetical Enthusiasm has warped me from my Subject.

I propose to consider *this* Address, and the Answers to them, as characterizing a Governor, who is a Pattern to, and ought to be exemplified by, all those who may be placed in that eminent and important Station.

By these Addresses, and their Answers, TRELAWNY, THE EXCELLENT, is placed in three exemplary Views.

First. By a Ready and prudent Administration, he supported the Honour of his Majesty's Crown, and the true Interest of his Country.

However weak and wicked Minds may reason, it is an irrefragable Truth, and worthy of all Mens Acceptation: that the Glory and Honour of his Majesty's Crown, is inseparably united with the real Interest of the British Dominions: And let him be accursed who impiously endeavours to establish a Distinction.

TRELAWNY THE EXCELLENT, was truly sensible of this political Indivisibility. Let us hear him speak.—"May this Island flourish throughout all Ages!" He tells them, he is warmed for their Security; their Harmony; their Happiness; not by Motives of Affection only, but he wishes it as a BRITON. "I consider (says he) the vast Importance of this Island to his Majesty's Crown, and the public Interest of my Country." No Encomiums can equal the native Merit of these Sentiments: They are ambrosial Gales to the virtuous Patriot; and may they waft him to the Throne of GEORGE THE JUST, to receive those Honours from the best of Kings, which are due to one of the best of Governors. And may they be Whips of Scorpions for such as would tinge the royal Ear, with ungrounded Jealousies, and undeserved Repentment.

TRELAWNY THE EXCELLENT, exerted the Powers derived upon him, from his Royal Master, to secure and extend, as far as his Sphere of Action would permit, *The British Plantations in America*. Animated with Patriot Vigour, his Example inspired the Inhabitants of Jamaica, with that Spirit and Unanimity, which brought about the Reduction of the Wild Negroes, who had, for so many Years, ravaged the Inhabitants, and kept them in continual Terror. It was under the Government of TRELAWNY THE EXCELLENT, that Men began to lie down in Peace and Security, and enjoyed the Fruit of their Labours with unalloyed Satisfaction: It was under his

wife and righteous Administration, that Plantations were cultivated, where the Foot of Safety had never trod; and that every Man possessed Life and Property, with an unprecarious Tenure.

TRELAWNY THE EXCELLENT, neither struggled for, nor exerted unconstitutional Power. He thirsted for no Prerogative; but the Privilege of being the most conspicuous Patriot. He thought it more noble, to leave behind him a Plenitude of immortal Fame, than to amass and carry off a Load of infamous Treasure. He left his Government with the universal Acclamations of the People, and with a most honourable and indelible Testimony of their grateful Affections. He saw the silent Tear steal down the Cheeks of those he honoured with his private Friendship, who knew him, a Man, replete with all the Virtues of Humanity.

Secondly. The Administration of TRELAWNY THE EXCELLENT, was sanctified by Justice, and adorned with Moderation.

Life and Property, are in some Respects, within the Province of a Governor. In Regard to the One, Compassion, consistent with public Safety, forms the Character of the real Pater Patrie. In the Other, Impartiality and Integrity, ought to be inviolably supported; whilst the Administrator of Justice, acts with inflexible Adherence to those Principles; tho' his Judgment should err, it cannot be deemed any just Stain upon his moral Character.

Let us again hear TRELAWNY, THE EXCELLENT, speak: "That I have always inclined well; That I have acted to the best of my Capacity, with Justice, with Integrity, is most certain; but my Share of Abilities, has not been equal, I am sensible, to the Importance of the Office." How forcibly his Virtues strike! how engaging his Modesty!

The Assembly, with very masterly Delicacy, pay their grateful Applause to the Moderation of his Conduct, amidst those Party Divisions, which had taken Place during some Part of the Time he sat in the Seat of Government; and say they, "By your prudent Endeavours, Harmony and Unanimity were restored; and you have thereby left behind you, a Monument of Gratitude, in the Heart of every dispassionate Man in this Community."

Tho' these Addresses, and the Answers to them, are Patterns of real Eloquence; and tho' they must, I think, warm every Reader who has any moral Relish; there is no Part of them, in which the Drefs or the Sentiments, so pleasingly charm me, as that from which we have taken the last Quotation.

The best constituted Governments, the most righteous Administration, cannot always secure that private Concord, and preserve that Interchange of social Benevolence, which so much contributes to the public Welfare of the Community. Ambition, Envy, and Opposition of Interests, will arise, whilst Men are Men. But the Ruler of a People, so circumstanced as the Colonies and Plantations are, may soften these Tumors, and even dispel them; and tho' it be a nice and difficult Undertaking, it is a most lovely and glorious Endeavour. To the immortal Honour of TRELAWNY, THE EXCELLENT, he has left behind him a Trophy of this Godlike Victory. To govern the Passions of Men, and turn the wayward Torrent, into the smooth gliding Stream of general Benevolence and public Tranquility, is the Work, I had almost said, of a Deity. How different this from the Man, who enters into the unworthy Contest, meanly lifts himself a Combatant, endeavours to widen the social Breach, and like an hired incendiary, adds his Brand to the Public Conflagration!

The Third and last View, in which I propose to consider this EXCELLENT MAN, as placed by the Addresses, is, his receiving them when in a private Station, and whilst another Gentleman filled the Chair of Government.

This is a convincing Proof of his genuine Merit,

and an incontestible Mark of unbiassed Truth in his Favour. Unawed by Power, unbribed by the Seductions of Hope or Fear, they offer the Tribute of conscious Gratitude to the Man, not to the Governor. Highly honourable to all Parties! This surely, is the Love of Virtue, for her own Sake! Addresses to the Source of Power and the Fountain of Honour are common, and have been frequently, a ceremonious Prostitution of Truth and Honesty.

I have seen an Address, which Gulliver's Yaboo, would have blushed to have made to an As.

Let all Addressors hence learn, who is a proper Object to be addressed; and may those who unworthily expect, or wish for Addresses, have such as they deserve; and may those who deserve it, have One, in all Respects, opposite to the Address of the Assembly of Jamaica, to TRELAWNY, THE EXCELLENT.

I conclude with this PRAYER.

May the supreme Father and Friend to Mankind; influence the Hearts and Understandings, of all the Governors in the British Colonies and Plantations, to emulate the Example of Colonel TRELAWNY, and by that Means, worthily to represent the best King upon Earth, His August Majesty, King GEORGE THE SECOND, whom GOD long, long, preserve. Amen, and Amen.

BRITANNICUS.

BARCELONA, September 26.

FOR these three or four Months past, the Barbary Corsairs did not appear on our Coasts; but last Week an Algerine Man of War, with five Xebèques, were descried off Tortosa. A Catalan Bark, laden with Timber for Carthage, suddenly perceived their Shallops making up to her, manned with 300 Hands, armed for a Descent, and had but just Time enough to take Shelter under the Cannon of St. George's Tower. They followed the Bark thither, and as the Fire from the small Arms in the Shallop was seconded by the Guns of the Xebèques, they might have taken the Bark, and even beat down the Tower, had not the Commandant thereof plied them very briskly four Hours successively with his Cannon, which were laden with broken Iron, as well as with Ballets. At last, after losing a great Number of Men in the Shallops, the Barbarians thought fit to sheer off, and even abandoned a Ship which they had in Tow. Don Bartholomew Chafallon, Governor of the Tower, has acquired a great deal of Honour in defending that Post, and was extremely well seconded by his Son. A Barrel of Powder, which accidentally blew up and burnt several Soldiers, had like to have killed them both.

Paris, October 16. The Map lately published by Mr. Bauche, of the new Discoveries Northward of the South Sea, is of so much the more Importance, as the English and Dutch, to facilitate their Voyages to the East Indies, have for above 250 Years been making prodigious Efforts to find the shortest Cut either by the North East, along the Northern Coast of Tartary, or more Northward thro' the Straights discovered in the Northern Parts of North-America, but after all to very little Purpose, their most expert and hardy Navigators having gone no farther than a little beyond Nova Zembla, North-Eastward; and the English, who will have it, that there is a Passage from Hudson's Bay into the South Sea, after all their Expence and Hazards, have not been able to find it; and if they should, there would still be 500 Leagues to the nearest Extremity to the South Sea as hitherto known; and whether this Space be Land or Water, is not yet determinable. As to the Eastward Course, the Distance betwixt the most Eastern Course of Nova Zembla, and the most Eastward Part of the frozen Sea, is not less than 700 Leagues, and from thence to Japan, is 800 more; in short, the Northern unknown Part of the South Sea, which lies betwixt Japan and California, is above 2000 Leagues in Extent. The new Discoveries in this Map, confirm the

the Conjecture, that Asia and America are joined to the Northward by a Chain of Mountains and shall low Sea.

St. JOHN's, (Antigua) November 24.

On the 13th Instant, about One in the Morning, a Brigantine belonging to Barbadoes, bound from Virginia to Barbadoes, Alexander Rolland, Master, unfortunately ran upon some Rocks, near the North Side of Barbuda; one of the Hands was drowned, and the Vessel and Cargo entirely lost. 'Tis imagined this Misfortune was occasioned by strong and unobserved Currents, since by their Reckoning, they found themselves a considerable Distance from that Island.

Very early last Sunday Morning, the 19th Instant, a Duel was fought at Friget Bay, in St. Christophers, by Matthew Mills, Esq; late of London, Merchant, and Mr. John Barbot, an Attorney at Law, of that Island, when the former was unfortunately killed on the Spot.

December 22. About five o'Clock this Morning, a pretty violent Shock of an Earthquake was felt here, which lasted near a Minute, attended with a rumbling and rushing Noise.

CHARLES-TOWN, (South Carolina) Jan. 15.

The Snow Sally, Morton Neal, Master, bound for Lisbon, (the first Vessel loaded this Season with Rice) came up Yesterday from the Road to stop a Leak then happily discovered.

We hear from George Town, that the Barn of George Gabriel Powell, Esq; with his whole Crop of Rice, Provisions, &c. was burnt a few Days ago. And

From Santee, that Mr. Daniel Horry, has made 60 Barrels of Rice this Crop, on a Piece of Land which he had neither planted, nor given himself any Trouble about, 'til he found the Grain fit to cut; while he lost, in the late Hurricanes, almost all he did plant.

ANNAPOLIS.

On Tuesday Evening, last Week, one Mr. Thomas Wilkins, of Kent County, Ship Carpenter, an elderly Man, and of good Repute, going out into the River to Anchor a Boat which he had built, having a Canoe along Side, by some Accident fell overboard and was drowned, in very shoal Water.

On Saturday last, a little Boy about 8 Years of Age, playing in the Street, was fell upon and bit on the Back, in a terrible Manner, by an unruly ill-natured Dog, who would in all Probability have kill'd him, if immediate Help had not come to his Relief. [The late wholesome Bye Law of the Corporation relating to Dogs, will, it is to be hoped, soon lessen the Number of those fierce and dangerous Animals in Town, who are now grown so numerous and troublesome, that it is become hazardous for quiet inoffensive Persons to walk the Streets in the Night.]

From a late LONDON MAGAZINE.

Importance of securing a healthy OFFSPRING.

THE Strength, Health, and manly Beauty of the *English*, have been justly the Admiration of Foreigners; thro' the happy Temperature of our Air, and other special Blessings of Providence, no Nation has been able to rival us. When Milton was at Rome, who was very remarkable for a fine Face, and the exact Symmetry of his Limbs, the Marquis of Villa revived an old Observation; *Non Anglus, hercule Angelus*. But we are now no longer the same People, nor deserve the same Esteem; our Vices have consumed our Strength, and deformed our Beauty.

A sickly Frame may be originally induced by Hardships or Intemperance, but chiefly by the last; I suppose it has not often happened, that immoderate Exercise or inclement Seasons have injured a regular Man, provided he took necessary Precautions; but it is impossible a Course of Vice should not spoil the best Constitution that was ever formed: And did the Evil terminate here, it would be a just Punishment for the Folly of the Sufferer; but when once a Distemper is contracted and rivetted in the Habit, the same is entailed on all Posterity. Stupid beyond Expression certainly is the Man, whom neither Freedom from Pain, nor a Life of Tranquillity, can persuade to Sobriety; nor the most excruciating Distempers, and a Curse on all succeeding Generations, can deter from Debauchery!

This last is, I think, the most weighty Consideration; for whatever ludicrous Pretence a Prodigal may contrive for squandering away his own Health or Fortune, he can find none for ruining those of others: And suppose a Man did not injure his Circumstances, but only his Constitution, and then leave a wretched infirm Offspring; is not this Man culpable? Is he not accountable for the Misery he was Author of? Are the Children small, consumptive, ferocious, or deformed, is it not an Evil? Are they unfit for the Business and Bufile of the World, is it not a Misfortune? If Children are born certainly unhappy, had it not been better they had never been born? For Non-existence is preferable to Misery.

In our matrimonial Contracts, it is amazing so little Regard is had to the Health and Form of the Object; our Sportsmen know the generous Racer cannot be bred out of the spondered Jade, nor the sagacious Spaniel out of the fearling Cur. This is settled upon immutable Laws: If then, our Dogs, our Cocks, our Horses, &c. are so much valued for their Strength and Beauty, ought not our Children to be much more so? Suppose a Gentleman should marry a Lady with 4 or 5000 *l.* of sickly Constitution, and descended of unhealthy Parents, whatever his private Fortunes were, can he be said to have acted wisely? Fix the Thing in every Point of View, and his Conduct is not justifiable: If Intemperit induced him, he surely will be disappointed, because a distempered Family is expensive? If mere Love was his Motive, he will find Cause to repent; for acrimonious Juices naturally sour the Temper, and good Humour is the very Essence of Conjugal Felicity. Of these Ladies, I have seen some so void of natural Affection, that the Death of a kind Husband and only Son, attended with Advantage, has proved Matter of Joy and Pride. Pany, ferocious Women are generally libidinous, and sometimes fertile; and should our supposed Gentleman have half a Score of Children, his House would be converted into an Infirmary, his Family always sick or dying; and should one or two of the numerous Issue languish into Life, and struggle thro' Corruption, they would be unfit for Employ, rotten Members, and pernicious to Society. If he is a Man of Understanding, this must fill his Mind with painful Reflections, he will silently wish he had married a Lady of sound Make, and fine Disposition, with only so many Hundreds, or nothing

at all, whose Sons might have been serviceable to their Country, and an Honour to human Nature.

The *Jews*, by the positive Direction of the Almighty, were forbid to have any Manner of Commerce with the Diseased; and indeed, to this, all flourishing Kingdoms have had a special Regard. Wise Law-givers have actually prohibited the Marriage of morbid People. This is an Evil of a complicated Kind, a natural Deformity and political Mischief, and therefore requires a national Consideration; for if some Method be not taken to stop the growing Ill, first the Suppression of Vice, and afterwards unhealthy Cohabitations, in a Century more, it is vastly to be feared, our Island, whose Inhabitants once naked, and in a Manner unarmed, repelled the bravest Legions, headed by the Conqueror of the World, will become an Hospital of Invalids, and their Lives and Fortunes a Prey to the first Invader.

Ministers of State, that have invented the most ingenious Methods of exa'ging Money, have been held in Esteem; but that Politician who can find out a proper Remedy for this Complaint, will deserve a Monument, will be stiled *Pater Patria*, and receive the Blessings of all future Generations.

ACCOUNT of a remarkable SHIP WRECK.
[From the Gentleman's Magazine.]

IN June 1695, the Ship *Mary*, one Jones Master, with 22 Men, among whom was Mr. Thomas Adams, Author of this Account, sailed from Spithead for the West Indies. They took their Departure from the Needles about 8 at Night; the Captain asked Adams if he could steer, he answered yes, Adams having been bred to Sea; and took to the Helm, but the Captain directed the Course; upon which he said, that sailing several Years from Pool in the smuggling Trade, they always took their Way from Peverel Point for Guernsey, and objected to the present Course, affirming that it would unavoidably bring them upon the *Caskets*. The Captain not only gave him very abusive Language, but beat him for his Impertinence. He stood the usual Time at the Helm, and then retiring to the Fore Castle, the Mate, one Hutchins, being informed by the Captain what had passed, came to him, and upbraided him with his Arrogance to the Captain. Adams repeated his Assertion, and insisted that without the greatest Caution, they must be very soon upon the *Caskets*; the Mate corrected him for his Presumption in pretending to know better than the Captain. — But at break of Day, Adams being upon Deck, discovered the *Caskets* just before them; and alarming the Ship's Company, cried out that they must all be lost. Accordingly in a few Minutes after, about three o'Clock in the Morning, they struck against the high Rock, and stove in all the Bows of the Ship; the Water entered in Abundance, and the Vessel sunk in about half an Hour. They who were in the Forepart of the Ship, got upon the Rock, but the rest, to the Number of eight, who were in the hind Part, sunk directly, and were no more seen. Adams, and 13 more who were on the Rock, had not Time to save any Thing out of the Ship for their Subsistence; and the Place afforded them none, nor even any Shelter from the Sun Beams. The first Day they went down the Rock, and gathered Limpets, (a Shell Fish which grows to the Rock) but finding that they increased their Thirst, they eat no more of them. The second Day they got several Things to chew, to create Moisture in their Mouths. The third Day they killed the Dog, which had swam ashore, and eat him, or rather chew'd his Flesh, to allay their Thirst, by which they were so pressed, that the Want of Victuals was not regarded. The Sense of their desperate State had much alter'd their Tempers; they spent Day after Day in Prayers for Deliverance; went

from one Part to another of the Rock making Signals for, and looking out for a Vessel, fancy'd they saw some, but none came near. Their Flesh wasted, their Sinews shrunk, their Tongues cleaved to the Roofs of their Mouths — and nine Days had passed in such melancholy Circumstances as no Tongue or Pen can describe; on the Tenth, they agreed to cast Lots that two of the Company should die, in order to preserve the rest a little longer, and each wished he might be of that Number: When the two Men were marked out, they were very willing and ready to stick themselves, as it had been determined, that the Living might put a Tobacco Pipe into the Wounds, and suck so many Gulps of Blood, each, to quench their Thirst. — But tho' the Necessity was so pressing, they were unwilling to have recourse to this dreadful Extremity, and resolved to stay one Day more, in Hopes of seeing some Ship. Then the Lots were cast again, and fell upon the same two Men, who performed their Parts with Resolution, and the rest with Equity; for the highest in Command now was as humble as the lowest, and none took more Gulps than another. This Method revived them a little, but soon after they came to the same Distress as before; they continued to pray, hold up Signals, and look out for a Vessel as long as they had Strength, and at last on the 14th Day, laid themselves along in a Sort of a sloping Cavity of the Rock, having hung a Piece of a Shirt out on a Stick. This been seen, they were found by a Ship's Crew of Guernsey, one Taskerd, Master, bound from that Island to Southampton; who putting out his Boat, call'd to them to come one at a Time, and he would take them in; but their Bodies were too weak to stir from the Place, and their Lips and Tongues too parched and dry to utter a Word. They with Difficulty waved their Hats, which being observed, they were all brought on board the Ship, when each had a Glass of Cyder and Water to drink, and were much refreshed; but two of them eagerly getting a Bottle, drank too much, of which one dy'd in half an Hour, and the other in an Hour after him. This Relation was taken from Mr. Adams's own Mouth, at his House at Lymington, May 19, 1744, who is about 76, and the only one living. But there is yet another remarkable Circumstance which should be mentioned. It was with the greatest Reluctance that Taskerd brought his Ship in Sight of the *Caskets*, which was out of his Course; but he was very much importuned by his Son, who had two Dreams that there were Men in the Condition above mentioned on the *Caskets*. The Father refused him on the first Dream, and was angry with him, nor had he complied on the second, if there had been a favourable Wind to go on his own Course; which immediately came about after he had taken the poor Creatures on board; ten of whom he soon brought alive to Southampton, where great Care was taken of them, which they very thankfully received, and continually acknowledging the Mercy of the Almighty, at last recovered their Strength, and led afterwards sober Lives.

PETERSBURG, October 9.

WE hear from Moscow, that divers Incendiaries have suffered the terrible Punishment due to their Crimes; some have had their Flesh torn off with Pincers, and others were burnt alive with a slow Fire. They add, that the Ringleaders of the late Insurrection of the Peasants in the Neighbourhood of Moscow, will also speedily be put to Death in the most cruel Manner that Barbarians can devise.

Lisbon, Sept. 26. On the 24th Instant we had one of those most melancholy and shocking Shows, which our Court of Inquisition have sanctioned by the Denomination of *Auto de Fe*, that is to say, *Acts of Religion, of the Force of Faith*.

Two Men and one Woman, who were not so happy as to be perfectly reconciled to the Principles of the Christian Religion, and who had renounced it,

and turned back to their original Profession of Judaism, were burnt alive.

—Divers other Persons who were convicted of several Misdemeanors, underwent such Punishments as were thought adequate to the Nature of their Crimes; and as the Notion of Witchcraft is strenuously maintained by some powerful Persons in our Country, five Women, who have been convicted of holding a too familiar Correspondence with the Devil himself, or at least with some of his infernal Ministers, have renounced, in the most solemn Manner imaginable, all such Contractions as they have been supposed to enter into with any of that impious Crew; and nothing surely was ever drawn up in such solem and particular Terms, as the Interrogatories on which these poor deluded Wretches were publicly examined.

Dublin, August 16. Saturday last the Roman Catholic Clergy of the several Chapels in this City, read at their Altars a Paper signifying, that all such Persons of their Communion, as may hereafter be engaged in Riots and Tumults, and disturbing the Peace of this City, should be for ever excommunicated; and exhorted an immediate Reformation.

Last Week several Felons, nefarious Villains, and Vagabonds, were sent from Newgate in Hackney Coaches to be transported for the Plantations in America, for their several notorious Crimes, amongst whom was M^r G U I R E, that notorious Forger of Bank and other Notes, by whom Numbers of innocent and reputable Persons have been great Sufferers. Query, Doth it answer the Purpose of the Law, or the Satisfaction of the Public, to have these Miscreants carried in Coaches to the Water Side, who should be exposed in the most public and infamous Manner, and all their Names published? Query, May not many of these Wretches have Jail Distempers and other Disorders, as well as Vermin upon them? Query, Is it reputable or safe to go into Coaches after these Miscreants, who may leave the Drags of their Distempers and their Lice and Fleas behind them? And Query, Should not all Hackney Coaches and close Carriages be prevented from carrying Transports and dead Corpses? But Bribery and Corruption may do much to evade the Justice of the Law: But, if any Person will discover the Number of any Coach, who shall carry any Delinquents, or dead Bodies, their Numbers shall be inserted in this Journal without any Expence, for the Good of the Public. [And what if we should add another Query, viz. Whether, as every Town and Parish is obliged to maintain its own Poor, why every Kingdom should not maintain or hang their own Rogues and Vagabonds, and not send them among the honest and industrious People in the Plantations, to corrupt their Morals, rob 'em of their Properties, and often deprive them of their Lives; and, finally, to put the Public to the Trouble and Charge of hanging them out of the Way?]

From the London Magazine, for October last.

Extra of a Letter from Colchester, dated August 18, 1752.

Perhaps you have heard, that a Chest was seized by the Custom House Officers, which was landed near this Place a Fortnight ago: They took it for Smuggled Goods, tho' the Person with it produced the King of France's Signature to Mr. Williams, as a Hamburg Merchant. Our People not satisfied with the Account Mr. Williams gave, opened the Chest, and one of them was going to run his Hauger in, when the Person to whom it belonged clapt his Hand upon his Sword, and desired him to desist (in French) for it was the Corpse of his dear Wife. Not content with this, the Officers plucked off the Embalming, and found it as he had said. The Man, who appeared to be a Person of Consequence, was in the utmost Agonies while they made a Spectacle of the Lady. They sat her in the High Church, where any Body might come and look on her, and would not suffer him to bury her, 'til he gave a further Account of himself. There were other Chests of fine Clothes, Jewels, &c. belonging to the deceased. He acknowledged at last that he was a Person of Quality, that his Name was not Williams, that he was born at Florence, and the Lady was a Native of England, whom he had married, and she desired to be buried in Essex; that he had brought her from Verona, in Italy, to France by Land, then hired a Vessel for Dover, then discharged the Vessel there, and took another for Harwich, but was drove hither by contrary Winds. This Account was not enough to satisfy the People; he must tell her Name and Condition, in order to clear himself of a Suspicion of Murder. He was continually in Tears, and had a Key of the Vestry, where he sat every Day with the Corpse: My Brother went to see him there, and the Scene so shock'd him he could hardly bear it, he said it was so like Romeo and Juliet. He

was much pleased with my Brother, as he talked both Latin and French, and (to his great Surprise) told him who the Lady was, which proving to be a Person he knew, could not help uncovering the Face. In short, the Gentleman confessed he was the Earl of Rosberry's Son, (the Name is Primrose) and his Title Lord Delamere; that he was born and educated in Italy, and never was in England 'til two or three Years ago, when he came to London, and was in Company with this Lady, with whom he fell passionately in Love, and prevailed on her to quit the Kingdom and marry him; that having bad Health, he travell'd with her all over Europe; and when she was dying, she asked for Pen and Paper, and wrote, "I am the Wife of the Reverend Mr. G——, Rector of Th——, in Essex; my Maiden Name was C. Cannon, and my last Request is to be buried at Th——." The poor Gentleman who last married her, protests he never knew 'til this Confession on her death Bed) she was another Man's Wife; but in Compliance with her Desire he brought her over, and should have buried her at Th—— (if the Corpse had not been stoppt) without making any stir about it. After the Nobleman had made this Confession, they sent to Mr. G——, who put himself first in a Passion, and threatened to run her last Husband thro' the Body; however he was prevailed on to be calm; it was represented to him, that this Gentleman had been at a great Expence and Trouble to fulfil her Desire; and Mr. G—— consented to see him; (they say the Meeting was very moving, and that they addressed each other civilly.) The Stranger protested his Affection to the Lady was so strong, that it was his earnest Wish not only to attend her to the Grave, but to be shut up for ever with her there. Nothing in Romance ever came up to the Passion of this Man. He had a very fine Coffin made for her, with six large Silver Plates over it; and at last was very loth to part with her to have her buried: He put himself in the most solemn Mourning, and on Sunday last, in a Coach attended the Corpse to Th——, where Mr. G—— met it in solemn Mourning likewise. The Florentine is a genteel Person of a Man, seems about 25 Years of Age, and they say a sensible Man; but there was never any Thing like his Behaviour to his dear, dear Wife, for so he would call her to the last. Mr. G—— attended him to London Yesterday, and they were very civil to each other, but my Lord is inconfolable; he says he must fly England, which he can never see more. I have had this Account from many Hands, and can assure you it is Fact. Kitty Cannon is, I believe, the first Woman in England that had two Husbands attending her to the Grave together. You may remember her, to be sure; her Life would appear more Romantic than a Novel."

In the Gazetteer of the 9th, we had the following Particulars, relating to the same Affair. The Person called the young Florentine is the eldest Son of the Earl of Rosberry, a Scotch Peer, against whom a Statute of Lunacy has some Time been taken out; his Title is Lord Delmany, not Lord Delamere, as it was printed in the Letter. Some of the Circumstances related are not true in Fact, tho' the Letter writer from Colchester might be mistaken. Lord Delmany was born and educated in Scotland, and never had been abroad 'til within these four Years. When he came to London, he saw and fell in Love with the celebrated Kate Cannon, actually married her, and carried her abroad with him. His Lordship, in order to conceal his Name and Quality from the World, in his Concern in this extraordinary Affair, endeavoured to pass for a Florentine, and would speak nothing but French or Latin, of which he is a great Master: He pretended to be incapable of speaking English, and had almost accomplished the Desire of the deceased, without discovering himself. The World may put what Construction they please upon this odd Incident; but such an Instance of Tendernefs, as it is seldom to be met with, ought not surely to be ridiculed, as he knew nothing of her previous Marriage.

L O N D O N.

Sept. 29. There happened lately a very odd Affair, at a Village in Surry; a Ragman driving an Ass, which was some Distance before him, there stood a Basin of Julep, at an Apothecary's Door, which the Ass drank up; he had scarce finished when the Apothecary seized and detained him 'til his Driver came up, to whom he complained, his Ass had drank a Basin of Julep, which cost him a Crown, and insisted on his paying for it, which the Ragman refusing, he took him before a Justice, whom he informed of the Affair, and desired his Worship would oblige the Ragman to give him Satisfaction. The Justice after searching his Statute Books, paused for some Time, and at last told

them it was an Affair he could not well decide himself, and referred them to a boozing Cobler, in the Neighbourhood, who he said, understood these Matters as well as any Man in England. Both Parties agreed to stand by Crispin's Decision, and he was sent for; the Justice immediately informed him on what Account, and the Cobler seemed pleas'd with his Office, but desired if he was to act as a Justice, he might sit in his Worship's Chair. The Justice complied, and the Cobler being seated, the whole Matter was laid before him; Pray, Sir, said the cobbling Magistrate, did the Ass drink the Julep at one Draught? which was answered in the Affirmative. Very well, replied the worshipsal Crispin, did the Ass sit down? he was answered No. Why then said he, I can decide this Affair immediately. It is a Custom among Toppers, that any Man may drink once standing for Nothing; therefore you, Ragman, go about your Business. The Case being given against the Apothecary, so enraged him, that he cursed the new Justice, who made him pay for his Oath, and advised him to put the next Julep he made out of the Ass's Way. A famous Punster on reading this facetious Paragraph, declared that this Julep was Julapium Asmaticum.

N E W Y O R K.

December 18. We hear from Elizabeth Town, that an odd Sect of People have lately appeared there, who go under the Denomination of Regulators; there are near a Dozen of them, who dress themselves in Women's Cloaths, and painting their Faces, go in the Evening to the Houses of such as are reported to have beat their Wives; where one of them entering in first seizes the Delinquent, while the rest follow, strip him, turn up his Posteriors, and flog him with Rods most severely, crying out all the Time, *Woe to the Men that beat their Wives*; —It seems that several Persons in that Borough, (and 'tis said some very deservedly) have undergone the Discipline, to the no small Terror of others, who are any Way conscious of deserving the same Punishment. 'Twere to be wished, that in order for the more equal Distribution of Justice, there would arise another Sect, under the Title of Regulatorix, who should dress themselves in Men's Cloaths, and flagellate the Posteriors of the Scolds, Termagants, &c. &c.

P H I L A D E L P H I A.

February 6. Saturday last Captain Ragg, late of the Snow Triton, bound to this Place from London, arrived here from Charles Town, in South Carolina, from whom we have the following Account of the Loss of the said Snow, viz. "That on the 30th of September she left Gravesend, and met with hard Gales of Wind, and high Seas, which caused her to labour and strain much, and make some Water: That on the 22d of October, being in the Latitude of 45. 44 North, and Longitude 26 West from London, she sprung a Leak, which obliged them to keep her before the Wind, to get both Pumps to work; but she made so much Water, that with both Pumps they could scarce keep her from sinking: That they continued pumping all that Day and Night: That on the next Day it blew very hard at N. E. and imagining the Vessel had started a Plank in the Forebold, as they could not hear any Water come in abaft, they hove over board what Goods were in their Way, in order to lighten the Ship, and find out the Leak: That they found the Water about six Inches over the Step of the Foremast, and fell to Work, and bail'd with Buckets, at the same Time keeping both Pumps constantly going, but could not get the better of the Water: That they then cut up a Part of her Ceiling, where they thought the Water rush'd in, and thrust Beef down between the Timbers, thinking it might get into the Hole, but it had no Effect: That after this they quilted a Sail with loose Hemp, and got it over the Snow's Bows, hoping some of it might get into the Leak, but that also was to no Purpose: That finding it impossible to come at the Leak, and no Probability of keeping her along above Water, they resolved to make the Islands of Tercera, or St. Michaels, in order to run her ashore, to save their Lives; but it blew so strong from the North to the North East, with Showers, and being obliged to keep her constantly before the Wind, not daring to hawl up one Way or other, on Account of keeping both Pumps at work, they past the Islands: That at last, they resolved to endeavour to keep her above Water, 'til they should reach Madeira, having often from four to five Foot Water in her Fore Hold, and frequent

The Tragical Story of LUDOVICO CARANTANI, a Milanese, and his two Daughters.

THERE is no Species of domestic Tyranny so iniquitous and oppressive, as that which unreasonable Parents frequently exercise over their Children, in popish Countries, by forcing them into a State of Life to which they have no Call. If Children ought ever to be left to their own free Choice, it is certainly when the shutting them up for Life in a Convent or Monastery is under Consideration; for God requires the Consecration of the Heart, and to him that Oblation alone which is pure and voluntary, is an acceptable Sacrifice.

The following Story affords a striking Example of the fatal Consequences of such Compulsion, and is too well attested to admit any Doubt of it's being so.

Ludovico Carantani, a Native of *Varese*, a City in the *Milanese*, had only two Daughters by a Wife who had brought him a considerable Fortune: But that paternal Affection which ought to have been divided between them, was confin'd to the eldest, whose Name was *Victoria*; tho' she was not near so amiable as *Olympia* her younger Sister. This capricious Preference was evident even in their Infancy. *Victoria* enjoy'd all the Careless of her Father, nor could her Sister obtain the least Token of his Tenderness or Affection. Her Mother's Love indeed made her some Amends for this Indifference; but Death having deprived her of this Consolation, she was exposed to numberless Contradictions, and suffered continual ill Treatment. *Victoria*'s Beauty, and the Fortune which she might expect from the Wealth and Partiality of her Father, soon drew about her a great Number of Suitors; and *Carantani*, that he might marry his Favourite with the greater Advantages, was determined to sacrifice to her Interest the Happiness of *Olympia*, whom he accordingly put into a Convent, and caused a Report to be spread that she had resolv'd upon a religious Life. This Report gain'd Credit; the Number of *Victoria*'s Lovers increased, among whom were Gentlemen of the best Families in the Country.

The Father already congratulated himself upon the Success of the Scheme. As he had always treated the amiable *Olympia* with Severity, he was persuaded that she would be soothed by the Tranquility of a Convent, and think herself happy to have escaped the Rudeness and Neglect which she had suffered at home. Nor was he altogether mistaken; for at the Solicitation of several of her Relations who were Devotees, and had been gain'd by her Father, she consented to take the Habit of a Novice or Probationer in the Monastery of *San Martino*. But there is a Time of Life when Nature speaks a Language very different from that of monastic Devotion. *Olympia*, altho' young, lively, and of a Complexion naturally amorous, was on the Point of becoming the Victim of her Father's Ambition, and her own Inexperience; but on the very Day of the Ceremony, she saw, amongst the Company assembled as usual on these Occasions, an amiable Cavalier, who made a deep Impression upon her Heart. Immediately the Thoughts of a Convent became intolerable: And she reflected with Horror upon the Sacrifice which she was about to make, of all the Advantages which she might promise herself in the World.

The Nuns and her devout Relations, who soon perceived the Alteration, endeavoured in vain to bring her back to her first Resolution. All the Answer that they received from her, was, that her Circumstances being equal to those of her Sister, she had no Inclination to sacrifice herself to her Ambition, or to the Partiality of her Father; that her Design was to marry, and that she entreated them to prevail upon her Father to give her to a young Cavalier of a very good Family, by whom she knew she was beloved.

It is easy to imagine the Astonishment of *Caran-*

tani, when he was acquainted with a Resolution which quite frustrated the Scheme he had form'd for raising the Fortune of his dear *Victoria*. He earnestly entreated the Nuns and his Kin(women, to redouble their Endeavours to make *Olympia* alter her Resolution. But these Endeavours only enflamed her Passion, and increased her Disgust for a monastic Life; nor did she conceal her Sentiments even from her Father, who came frequently to see her, in order to discover the Effect of the Remonstrances of her Friends; to these he added his own; but perceiving that this Expedient did not succeed, he had Recourse to Menaces, and assured her, that "if she did not resolve upon a religious Life, he would take her home again, where she might expect to be the most wretched of Women."

Olympia, who knew her Father's Unkindness by a long and cruel Experience, did not doubt but he would keep his Word. Yet she endeavoured to mollify him by the most tender and pathetic Expostulations; but neither Arguments, Entreaty, nor Tears made the least Impression upon his Heart.

As by this Change in *Olympia*'s Resolution, the Match of her *Victoria* was in danger of being broken off, her Lover growing cold and indifferent, in Proportion as her Fortune became precarious. *Carantani* was so much enraged, that the next Time he visited *Olympia*, he told her in a Transport of Fury, that "if she did not take the Veil as soon as her Noviciate expired, he would put her to Death with his own Hand." If I die, it shall not be by your Hand, reply'd his amiable Daughter calmly. I have often represented to you my Aversion to a monastic Life, yet you command me to sacrifice myself to the Fortune of my Sister, and to that extensive Fondness which you have always shown for her; and if it be impossible for me to prevail upon you to retract this Command, you shall be obey'd, since my Obedience will spare you the Crime which you threaten to commit against me; but you and my Sister will have perpetual Cause to regret the cruel Sacrifice which you oblige me to make you. She added, that he might whenever he thought proper, order the necessary Preparations for the Ceremony: After which she withdrew. *Carantani*, who probably did not know to what Lengths Despair might carry a young Maid, when Love has once seized on her Heart, pleas'd himself with the Thoughts of having made her change her Resolution. He went with an Air of Triumph to carry the News to *Victoria* and her Lover, who were then together. They exulted greatly upon it, and now thought themselves happy.

As the Time appointed for *Olympia* to take the Veil was now near, Signor *Carantani* made all the usual Preparations, and, as if he thought the unhappy Victim knew not to whom she was to be sacrificed, he took Measures for solemnizing the Marriage of his eldest Daughter at the same Time.

On the Day preceding that which was fix'd for this double Ceremony, *Olympia* thought it her Duty to make a last Effort to soften her Father, and if possible divert him from so barbarous a Sacrifice. For this Purpose she again reasoned, she expostulated, she entreated, but *Carantani* was equally deaf to the Voice of Reason, Nature, and Religion; he continued inflexible in his Purpose, and confirmed his Threatnings by the most horrible Oaths. *Alas my dear Father*, said the amiable *Olympia*, with a Look of unutterable Tenderness and Grief, consider well what you are about, consider that to me your Answer is either Life or Death, and be assured that if you sacrifice me to my Sister's Fortune, you will repent when it is too late; the Phantoms that now mislead you will vanish at once; you will perceive with Horror the Effects of your Delusion, and feel the Pangs of Remorse when they are aggravated by Despair; but further Conversation will only ratify my Destruction by increasing your Resentment; permit me therefore to withdraw, and do not give your final Answer 'til Tomorrow; but remember, that if I perish you will be wretched, and that in refusing Mercy to your Daughter, you

give Sentence against yourself. With these Words she left the Parlour.

Carantani, whose Eyes the last Sentence might have opened disregarded it as one of those wild Menaces which are usually the last Resource of a Passion increased by Opposition, and exasperated by Despair. The Preparations for *Victoria*'s Marriage engross'd his Attention, and he thought of nothing but how to render it splendid and magnificent. The Relations who were invited to this double Ceremony, were already assembled in the Church of the Convent, and *Olympia* was dressed in her richest Apparel and most splendid Ornaments, which at these Times are put on only to be renounced for ever with the greater Solemnity. The dreadful Moment arriv'd, in which this blooming Victim was to be conducted to the Altar: Then knowing that she had no farther to hope, yet concealing her Despair, she asked Leave of the Nuns who were about her, to go up into her Cell under Pretence of recollecting herself for a few Minutes, and meditating in private upon the important Affair which she was about to transact. This was readily granted, and *Olympia* went up, not into her Cell, but into a Garret which was over it, and after having deplored her Misfortunes, and prayed to God for Pardon, she fastened to one of the Beams a Cord, which she had taken from one of the Nuns who had used it for a Girdle, put it about her Neck, threw herself from a little Bench on which she stood, and in a few Minutes expired.

In the mean Time the Company, who had been almost an Hour assembled in the Church, waited with Impatience for the Beginning of the Ceremony. The Abbess was acquainted with it, who was equally surprized at the Delay, and asking the Nuns the Reason of it, was informed of *Olympia*'s Request: They waited almost an Hour longer, but still *Olympia* did not appear. They then went to seek her in her Cell, but there she was not to be found, other Parts of the Convent were searched, but without Success. At length, after much Time spent in a fruitless Enquiry, one of the Nuns thought of going up into the Garret. What a mournful! what a horrid Spectacle was there!—The unfortunate *Olympia* hanging in the fatal Cord with which she had put an End to her Life.

Seized with Horror at the ghastly Sight, she ran precipitately down Stairs, and rushing into the Choir where the Nuns were assembled, she filled them with Terror and Astonishment, by her Outcries and Lamentations. The Alarm soon spread itself from the Choir to the Church, where all the Relations with the utmost Consternation received the News of the sudden Death of the unhappy *Olympia*, the most shocking Circumstances of which the Abbess prudently concealed. At first they would not believe it; they demanded a Sight of her, and going out of the Church in a Body, the Ladies and *Carantani* himself (this being being granted to Fathers) entered the Church, standing the Resistance of the Abbess. What a Spectacle was this for a Father, a Mother, for a whole Family! One of the most beautiful young Women, the Victim of a violent Despair, all the Horror of which was yet visible in her Countenance!

Great as *Carantani*'s Obduracy had hitherto been, he now burst into Tears, and became frantic with Despair. He accused himself too late as the Murderer of his Daughter, and stung with this tormenting Thought, which was but too much the Suggestion of Truth, he fled from the Convent, and even from the City, with the greatest Precipitation. He mounted his Horse with a Design to conceal his Shame, his Grief, and his Remorse, in the Obscurity of a Country Seat. But Heaven design'd him for a public Example. He had scarce rode six Miles, when his Horse taking fright, threw him, and his Foot hanging in the Stirrup, he suffered a Death yet more dreadful than that of his unhappy Daughter. Dragg'd by his Horse, which ran full Speed, every Limb was broken, and his Body covered

covered with Wounds and Bruises. But Divine Justice seemed to extend itself even to his Carcase after he was dead, the Head and Arms of which were at length entirely torn off; nor did the Horse stop 'til he got home. Who can conceive the Horror and Consternation of his Family, when they saw the Horse furiously galloping, and dragging after him the torn and bloody Trunk of *Victoria*, who was an Eye Witness of this dreadful Event, could not sustain the complicated Calamity, which was thus heaped upon her, on the very Day in which she expected to have been made completely happy: The Death of her Sister, and of her Father, attended with uncommon Circumstances of Horror, and the Loss of her Lover, who refused to enter into an Alliance with a Family which suicide had dishonoured, made so deep an Impression upon her Mind, that she died two Days after, and closed that Series of disastrous Events, which afford an ever memorable Instruction to Parents with Respect to their Conduct towards their Children.

TWO Algerine Ships are just brought into our Port taken by the King's Squadron off the Straights of Gibraltar. There are 42 Pieces of Brass Cannon on board these Vessels, and we have a considerable Number of Slaves, amongst whom are four Renegades, who are delivered to the Inquisition.

Genoa, October 27. The Master of a Pink arrived here from Barcelona reports, that the Algerine Corsairs, who are cruising in great Numbers in the Spanish Seas, took a Cataline Bark on the 13th Instant, laden with Wine, and made 30 Slaves, amongst whom were 6 Women and 2 small Children.

Hanover, October 27. The Treaty for satisfying the Elector Palatine's Demands on the Emperors and the Maritime Powers, has been concluded and signed on the following Articles.

I. The Compensation is fixed at 1,200,000 Florins Holland Money, of which Sum the Emperors is to pay 500,000, and the remaining 700,000 are to be discharged by the King of Great Britain, and the States General, according to the Propositions observed in the late Treaties: The Payment to be at three Terms: The first of 600,000 and the two others quarterly, of 300,000 each.

II. The Privilege *de non appellando*, as to the Duchy of Deux Pons, is granted to his Electoral Highness, together with the Reversion of the Fief of Othenau, after the Extinction of the Male Line of the House of Biden.

III. His said Electoral Highness shall concur with other Electors on the Affair of an Election of a King of the Romans, conformable to the Usages, Laws, and Constitutions of the Empire.

IV. Shall also concur with them for settling Articles of Capitulation for the King of the Romans, in case he lives to be the Emperor.

This Negotiation has been conducted in perfect Intelligence with the Princes who had interested themselves in it. The Elector of Cologne stirred in Pursuance to a Convention with the Palatine Court. The King of Prussia made the first Overtures of this Accommodation. His most Christian Majesty took Part in it as a Guarantee of the Constitutions of the Empire, and as desirous to procure an equitable Satisfaction to his Allies.

L O N D O N.

October 10. By the last Letters from Yarmouth, dated the 7th Instant, we hear that the Peggy Sloop of War had been there for ten Days past. She has paid a Visit to the French Busses; since which they have kept their proper Distance. They never appeared there in such Numbers, and are crowded with Men. The Vulture Sloop of War was just arrived to protect the Fishery.

The following Piece of News, which though whisper'd about at Paris, I do not give for absolutely authentic; 'tis, however, there privately talked, that the King, being extremely dissatisfied with the Obstinacy of his Parliament, has resolved to put an absolute Stop to their Proceedings against the Clergy, as well to prevent his Royal and despotic Authority from being infringed, as to put an End to the domestic Dissentions of his Kingdom, which become every Day more serious than other.

"I am the less inclined to give Credit to the above Piece of News, as there is but little Probability of the King's executing so rigorous a Resolution, his most Christian Majesty not having the Courage and Resolution necessary for so extraordinary a Step, for the taking of which there is Need of the Firmness of a Lewis the XIVth, and of a Richelieu, as it would, in all Likelihood, occasion a very extraordinary Commotion amongst the People; the very Idea of which is alone capable of making Lewis the XVth tremble."

October 30. It has always been a fundamental Maxim in Politics, *to make Peace with Sword in Hand*; and therefore 'tis not to be wondered at, that the Spaniards made no Peace with England at Aix la Chapelle, but only consented to a Cessation of Hostilities, with a mental Reservation on their Part, to renew Hostilities as they should see Occasion; as our West India Merchants have since felt to their Cost. This was the very Quintessence of Policy, as England had the Sword in Hand, but Spain had not, both she and France being utterly incapable of coping with us at Sea: Therefore, as fair and generous Adversaries, we could not take Advantage of the Spaniard's Weakness, to cram our own Terms down his Throat; but honestly and humanely bid him rise, and take a Breathing, and recruit his exhausted Spirits, and give us Notice when he would be at Leisure to settle the Points in Dispute, which we scorned to press upon him in his Distress. And now, it seems we are at the Eve of reaping the Fruits of our Patience, Generosity and Candour. We shall soon see all Disputes adjusted by a definitive Convention: Search and Vift will never more be heard of in the American Seas, but every British Vessel will be empowered to command the Winds, and Storms, and Currents, and know to a Hair's Breadth her Distance from the Spanish Coasts; all which Articles, and some others which we have no Notion of at present, could not be extorted in the Year 1748, but may now be easily obtained, as Spain has already made so great a Progress in raising a formidable Navy, which in Conjunction with the French Marine may in a little Time convince us, that without well disciplined Militia, our Floating Castles are not a sufficient Defence.

November 7. The East India Company has received the melancholy News, that the Prince, one of their Ships, being off the Coast of Brazil, at the Distance of 150 Leagues, a Fire broke out in her, and the Flames spreading, in spite of all Endeavours to the Gunner's Room, she blew up. Of all the Hands on board, none have been saved but the Lieutenant, the Pilot, the Master's Mate, the Boatswain, and 7 Sailors. The last 8 had the good Fortune to seize upon a little Boat, into which they received the Lieutenant, who did not commit himself to the Mercy of the Waves, 'til he had courageously discharged all the Duties of his Post, and there remained no Hopes of saving the Ship. This Officer with great Difficulty did swim to the Boat, and prevailed with those that were in it to take in likewise the Pilot and Master's Mate, who had also leapt into the Sea after him. Notwithstanding the great Distance from the Shore, and the other Hardships they had to struggle with, they landed safely on the Coast of Brazil, from whence they got a passage to Portugal; and it is from Lisbon they have sent this Account of their Disaster. Several Presents for the Nabob of Golconda had been put on board of this Ship. Captain Morin, who had the Command of her perished in the Flames, in attempting to visit the Hold, where the Fire first began.

November 21. Saturday, about Noon, Mr. Halfey, one of his Majesty's Messengers, arrived at the Earl of Holderness's Office, with an Account that the Yachts, under Convoy of Lord Anson, sailed from Helvoetsluys on Friday Morning last, between Nine and Ten o'Clock, and that he saw the Men of War and Yachts, when he left the Packet, at Harwich. At Four o'Clock, Mr. Turner, another of his Majesty's Messengers, arrived with an Express, that his Majesty landed at Gravesend about Two o'Clock. As soon as the Express arrived the Princess Dowager of Wales, the Prince of Wales, and Prince Edward, and the Princess Augusta, came in Chairs from Leicester House to St. James's, and the rest of the young Princes in a Coach, to wait the Arrival of his Majesty, who came there in perfect Health about Five o'Clock. The great Tenderness and Affection with which he received the Princess Dowager, and his Grandchildren, was very affecting. After staying about an Hour they returned to Leicester House, amidst the Acclamations of the People, who testified their Joy of his Majesty's happy Arrival.

The same Evening the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord Chancellor, and the rest of the Lords of Regency, waited on his Majesty, and delivered up their Commission.

His Majesty left Hanover on the 8th Instant, at Seven in the Morning, lay that Night at Osnaburg, the following at Holten, and the 10th arrived at Utrecht about Four in the Afternoon. His Majesty alighted at M. Pouchaud's, his Agent at that Place, where the Stairs and Antichamber were crowded with the principal Persons of that City, who expressed the highest Respect to him, which was returned with the usual Goodness and Affability.

At Five his Majesty set out in a Yacht for Maylandnice, which he reached about Seven next Morning, and immediately proceeded to Helvoet.

Lord Anson gave a grand Entertainment on board his Ship at Helvoet, in Honour of his Majesty's Birthday, at which were present many Persons of Distinction of different Nations.

This Day the Sheriffs of this City will wait on his Majesty at St. James's, to know his Pleasure when he will be waited on with a congratulatory Address from the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council, on his safe Arrival in his British Dominions.

We hear that on his Majesty's receiving the City Address, the Lord Mayor, the two Sheriffs, the Recorder, and Chamberlain, will have the Honour of Knighthood conferred upon them.

By Letters from the Hague we have Advice, that their High Mightinesses the States General have made a Negotiation for two Millions of Guilders, to their entire Satisfaction, by Way of Contract, with Mr. Gerrit Blauw, Merchant, in Amsterdam, in order to reduce to three per Cent. that Capital which is now running at four per Cent, and we hear, besides that, they will pay of above five hundred thousand Guilders to reduce the Capital of their Debt.

Letters from Bombay make Mention of an Engagement between Capt. England, Commander of one of the Company's Grabs, and Angria the Pirate, who had three Grabs and several small Vessels, Capt. England having only a single Grab, fought him four Days and four Nights, and got clear into Bombay.

N E W - Y O R K.

Feb. 26. Friday last arrived here Capt. Devereux, in 16 Days from St. Augustine, who has brought with him 17 Englishmen, belonging to Vessels that were cast away the 23d of October last on the Florida Shore, amongst whom are Capt. Ball, late of a Sloop of this Port, and the Mate of Capt. Fones, of Rhode Island; from the former of which, we have the following Advice, viz. That soon after his Vessel struck in the Storm, she went to Pieces, and with much Difficulty, they all got ashore on the Martiers, except one Man and a Boy which were drowned; but the Key at that Time being overflowed, they were obliged to make Lodgments on the Trees 'til the next Day, when the Tide fell: Their Boats were both stove in the Storm, but most of the Pieces coming ashore, happily on the same Key they applied themselves to fit one up, and in 15 Days after, they got her in a Condition to put off; during all which Time they had nothing to subsist on, but one small Hog, which accidentally swam ashore to them, and began to be very feeble and weak; but fearing to fall into the Hands of the Indians, they chose rather to put off to Sea, without Sustenance, faint as they were; and happily for them, fell in the next Day with a Spanish Ship bound from Campeachy to the Havannah, who took them all up, used them kindly, and carried them all into the Havannah, except one, who was so far gone with Hunger, that he died soon after they were taken up. At the Havannah they got a Passage to St. Augustine, in a Schooner, who touching in her Way at the Florida Coast, Capt. Ball got Intelligence of the following Vessels lost at that Time.

Capt. Raymond, in a Ship for Bristol, and Capt. Patrick, in a Ship for Liverpool, who saw also two Sail more come ashore where he did, and all lost. Capt. Dean, in a Boston Brig, and Capt. Crawford, in a Brig for Glasgow, which last saw three Ships more come ashore, one Bottom upwards, another sunk, with her Masts out of Water, and the two Sides of the third. Capt. Edwards, of Philadelphia; Capt. Moodie, in a Ship for London; a French Snow from Mississippi, and a French Man of War of 40 Guns, of which last all the Men either perished or were cut off by the Indians; another large Ship, and a Snow unknown, with Capt. Fones, of Rhode Island, and Capt. Ball, of New York, making in all 18 Sail. Capt. Fones and his Crew, were those taken up by Capt. Palmer, and carried to the Havannah (as mentioned some Time ago in this Paper), and Capt. Moodie's Ship was the Vessel met with by Capt. Ramsey, in the Gulf; for it seems, that after she struck they had let go her Anchor, and took to their Boat.

Capt. Ball acquaints us, that while he was on board the Schooner, on the Florida Coast, he was informed by an Indian King, that in the same Storm, an English Sloop had been drove ashore on his Part of the Coast; that he had used the Men kindly, and sent a Number of his People to assist in getting her off, and fit her for the Sea again; but that when she was ready to sail, the English conspired to run away with his People; which being discovered by an Indian Boy, who served as a

Linguist, a few executed, the Indians swam ashore, executed off: The English well his Kindness to and the Loss of his Lives should not

A few Days before two 60 Gun Ships arrived there from New York; and that there, in order to Bay.

On Saturday last, died, at his Plantation, on the North Side of Severn, Capt. PHILIP JONES, in the 80th Year of his Age: He was for many Years in the Commission of the Peace: From the natural Milanesi of his Temper, he made a good Master to those under him, and was so strict a Predestinarian, that when any Sickness affected himself, or Family, he had no Confidence in human Aid, asserting, that every Man was destin'd at a certain Time to die, of Consequence never would apply to a Physician. [Quere, Whether this odd Whim did not contribute to lengthen his Years to Fourscore.]

We have certain Advice of the safe Arrival in England, of the Neptune, Capt. Judd, who was currently reported to be lost.

Last Night, a Man (whose Name is to us unknown), one of Capt. Noyes's Mates, coming down the Bay from Gunpowder, in a Schooner, fell overboard off the Mouth of Magathy River, and was drowned.

GIBRALTAR, October 28.

THE Number of Dutch which are returned
from Fez with Capt. Steenis, are 250, for
the Ransom of whom 150000 Pistres are to be
paid. By an unforeseen Accident they had like
to have been long detained Prisoners at Fez: The
Emperor speaking to the Dutchmen, said, *I am*
inclined to make Peace with your Nation and the
English, provided it be upon the Footing it was in
the Time of Muley Ismail my Father, and in that
Case I consent that you immediately return to Tetuan:
Then addressing himself to the Priests, ask'd how
much they offered for their Liberty: who answer-
ed, that they would give what the Emperor pleas-
ed: That the Prince not liking the Answer, said,
with some Vivacity: *That is not what I ask, I*
want to know what you will offer; but they not
daring to fix upon a Sum, answered him as they
had done before; which put the Emperor in such
a Passion, that he said, Take all these Dogs from
before me, I will hear them say no more, and carry
them to be put in Chains. The Dutch Prisoners, it
is easy to imagine, were terribly frightened at this
Sentence; but through the Application of Mr.
Steenis to the Bashaw Limmuty, Prime Minister to
the Emperor, the Dutch were permitted to quit
Fez the 11th of this Month, and arrived at Tetu-
an the 22d.

Marshall, November 7. The Master of a Ship

arrived a few Days ago from Alexandria, reports,
that he met off the Isle of Pontellaria three Alge-
rine Xebecs, which after obliging him to bring
to and produce his Passports, continued their Route
to join another Vessel of their Nation mounting 30
Pieces of Cannon: That the next Day he met 4
Maltese Galleys, who were in Pursuit of the Cor-
sairs; and that having a few Days after put into
the Gulph of Palma, he was there informed that
the said Galleys had not only taken the Ship of
30 Guns, but also two others.

Frankfort, November 11. Letters from Erford
by the last Post advise, that on the third of this
Month there had happened at Ilmenau, in the
Principality of Hennenberg, a terrible Fire, where-
by the Castle, the Church, and most of the Hou-
ses of that Place, had been reduced to Ashes.

Madrid, October 31. Most of the Ships of the
Line, which of late the King has ordered to be
built, are in a Condition to be equipped. The
Royal of 114 Guns, the St. Ferdinand, the Phœ-
nix, and the Thunder, of 80 Guns each, are of
Oak, and built in this Kingdom. The St. Philip,
the Tyger, Princessa, Infant, Galicia, and Queen
of 70 Guns each; as also the Dragon, Conqueror,
Fort, and the New Spain, of 60 Guns, are of Ce-
dar, and all built at the Havanna. Hitherto it was
the prevailing Opinion in Spain, that Cedar was
the best Timber for Shipping; and therefore the
Government always got most of the Ships of the
Royal Navy built at the Havannah: But Mr. Ruth,
the Englishman, whom the King has made Direc-
tor of his Yards and Docks, does not adopt the
vulgar Opinion: On the contrary, he pretends that
Oak is abundantly preferable to Cedar in all Re-
spects; and it seems his Sentiments have prevailed,
as the Court appears determined to have the King's
Ships constructed for the future in old Spain. Out
of the three Ships which Mr. Ruth lately put on the
Stocks at Carthagea, two have been launch'd;
viz. the North and Asia, of 60 Guns each; they
have likewise finish'd in that Port a Frigate of 20,
and a Packet Boat of 14 Guns. There are three
Ships of the Line, and three Frigates on the Stocks
at Cadiz. They are also building three Men of
War in Galicia. This Monarchy, by the Aug-
mentation making in her Marine, seems to aim at
the Title of a Maritime Power. It is reckoned
that we have at present, in the several Ports of this
Kingdom, 18 Ships of the Line of Battle and fe-
veral Frigates in Readiness to put to Sea on the first
Notice; and it is confidently given out, that be-
fore the End of the Year the King's Navy will
consist of 64 Ships from 60 Guns upwards, and 28
Frigates. Enough to give England Hopes of a
Good definitive Convention with Spain.

LONDON.

An Extract of a Letter from Amsterdam, da-
ted October 12.

"You must not be surpriz'd, Sir, that I so fre-
quently mention to you the Affairs of Turkey:
They are at this Time the grand Subject of the
most serious Conversation, especially since the Talk
of the Election of a King of the Romans has, in a
great Measure, ceased: I will therefore add to
what has been already said upon that Topic, that
if the Courts of Vienna, Petersburg, and Poland,
are under some Disquietude, in regard to what
passes at Constantinople, the Ministry of Versailles
are not less anxious about the Consequence thereof,
hoping to gain as much, or more, by this Revolu-
tion, than they have lost by the Alliances of Pe-
tersburg and Madrid. For what a fine Game
would not France have to play, though she had no
other Assistance than two or three of the most pow-
erful Princes of the Empire, if unhappily, the
Porte should attack any of it's Christian Neigh-
bours. But, besides, Sweden would scarce fail,
upon such an Occasion, to fall upon Russia, and
that would be sufficient, in case of War, France
would, indeed, be too powerful. It is that which
at present employs the Court of Versailles, and
which

which makes it look with a Kind of Indifference upon the Turn which the other Affairs of Europe may take.

Nov. 11. The last Letters from the Hague acquaint us, that the French East India Ship, lately burnt upon the Coast of Brazil, was worth 300,000 l. and that the Effects of Monsieur Dupleix amounted to 40,000 l. at least.

Extract of a Letter from a Person of Distinction at Paris, dated October 26.

"The Joy which the Recovery of the Dauphin occasioned throughout the Kingdom, is a little disturbed by the Apprehension of meeting with fresh Troubles upon the re-assembly of the Parliament. People here look with the most sensible Chagrin and Bitterness upon the unaccountable Change of Conduct in the Ministry, who have embraced, with more Partiality than ever, the Party of the Enemies of the Royal Authority. They heretofore favoured the Cause of the Parliament. The superseding their Arrêts, which was not at all expected, causes every Body at Paris to murmur. What sad Conduct! say they: Could any Thing be worse imagined? The Licentiousness of the Clergy was going to be effectually curbed, and it is now more countenanced than ever! Why should the supreme Head of the State oppose Measures so well taken to subject a haughty Body, which so manifestly interferes with the Power of the Sovereign? Shall we never then have the Happiness of other People? Shall we for ever sigh under the tyrannical Yoke of spiritual Despotism? It is designed that we should not be permitted to make Use of the Reason with which we are endued; which is, nevertheless, a vain Effort. Our Eyes being happily opened, will not be easily shut again. The Aurora has pierced through the Darknets with which we were enveloped. Broad Day will entirely dissipate it. The Clergy will be obliged to renounce their System, and if the Court is blind enough to adopt it, we shall scarcely be so blind as to follow it.

"Thus People reason here, where they are a little more easy in Regard to the Conduct which the Court may possibly pursue during the Remainder of the Vacancy of Parliament; because it is at Fountainbleau, where it commonly forgets the most important Affairs of State, in Order to give itself up to Pleasures, to which the Welfare and Happiness of the Subjects is for the most Part sacrificed. Is it for this People have Kings given them?"

Extract of a Letter from Paris, December 1.

"Things have still as gay an Outside, and as gloomy an Inside as ever. If Appearance and Expectance be any Signs of Wealth, no Country in the World so rich; if Riot and Dissipation prove the Absence of Care, no Nation so satisfied as this: But at the Bottom it is otherwise: Financiers, Lawyers, and Bankers, have vast Estates, but the Bulk of the People are necessitous: Shews delight the populace for an Hour, but when that's over they grumble.

"At present the Edict of Regulation is impatiently expected, and the very Rumour of it expresses a Kind of Awe. But it is to be feared, that like the Report of a Cannon, it will at first make us start, and then laugh. This is the French Humour.—These are, however, serious Men, who see this Affair in a true Light, and are convinced that, according as it is well or ill managed, it may prove of the greatest Service or Destruction to France.

"It happens a little melancholy, that our great Men should have, at this critical Juncture, another delicate Affair upon their Hands. The Business of Corsica has cost France both Abundance of Pains and Abundance of Money. To serve no Purpose think you?—that was never intended. Our Advices from Genoa and Leghorn agree the Inhabitants are in Arms, the Regulation rejected, and that Things cannot go worse. But in Spite of all this the Marquis de Curfay affirms he has succeeded perfectly well, our Concerns never went better.—Some smile at this, and believe him."

St. JOHN'S (Antigua), November 24.

Very early last Sunday Morning, the 19th Instant, a Duel was fought at Friget Bay, in St. Christopher's, by Matthew Mills, Esq; late of London, Merchant, and Mr. John Barbot, an Attorney at Law, of that Island, when the former was unfortunately killed on the Spot. The Occasion of this Duel is not yet known; but it is reported they went to the Place (which is about a Mile and a Half from Basseterre), where they took the Distance of only ten Feet, and discharged their first Pistols without any Damage: Mr. Mills's second Pistol missed Fire (occasioned, as 'tis imagined, by his having forgot, in his Hurry, to prime it), and Mr. Barbot, with his second, concluded the fatal Catastrophe, by wounding him in the Breast, of which he died in a few Minutes; and

Mr. Barbot, immediately, made his Escape off the Island in a small Canoe.

This worthy Gentleman is greatly lamented by all who had the Pleasure of his Acquaintance; nor is it to be wondered at, since it may truly be said, he has scarce left his Equal in that Island. He was a Man of Learning and Abilities, without the Affectation of being thought so; of a generous, humane, and benevolent Heart, ready to assist every worthy Object that he knew to be in Distress; a Father to the Fatherless, and a kind Friend and Benefactor to all that stood in Need of him; inasmuch that his own Family were not the only Sharrers of the good Fortune God had blessed him with, for by his unbounded Charity and Benevolence it was diffused among many. He was a most affectionate and indulgent Husband, a tender Father, and a steady Friend, and above all, a true Lover of his Country. To his Equals he behaved with Complacency and Good Humour, and to his Inferiors, courteously and mild, without seeming to value himself in the least upon his Rank and Fortune; for Pride and Haughtiness were Strangers to his Heart. He was a cheerful pleasant Companion, never presuming in Conversation, but, on the contrary, diffident of his own Abilities, and would give up a Point with Good Humour, rather than make his Company uneasy. He was punctual to his Word, and steadily honest in all his Dealings; of no particular Party, but always ready, by his friendly Interposition, to heal any of the public Wounds, and to reconcile private Disputes and Animosities.—To sum up all in a few Words, —He possessed the Cardinal Virtues in a Degree rarely to be met with; —no Wonder, then, such a Man should be greatly lamented! His having, lost his Life by the Hands of a Man so much his Inferior in every Respect, is a stinging Reflection. O! that he had paused one Moment, and permitted his own Good Sense to have interposed, he must have determined that to refuse a Challenge from such a Man, could have been no Dishonour to him.

HALIFAX, (in Nova Scotia), Jan. 20.

T R E A T Y,

Or, Articles of Peace and Friendship renewed, between his Excellency PEREGRINE THOMAS HOPKINSON, Esq; Captain General and Governor in Chief, in and over his Majesty's Province of Nova-Scotia or Accadia, Vice Admiral of the same, and Colonel of one of his Majesty's Regiments of Foot, and his Majesty's Council, on Behalf of his Majesty; And

Major JEAN BAPTIST COPE, Chief Sachem of the Tribe of Micmock Indians, inhabiting the Eastern Coast of the said Province, and Andrew Hadley Martin, Gabriel Martin, and Francis Jeremias, Members and Delegates of the said Tribe, their Heirs, and the Heirs of their Heirs, for ever; begun, made and concluded in the Manner, Form, and Tenor following, viz.

I. IT is agreed that the Articles of Submission and Agreement made at Boston, in New-England, by the Delegates of the Penobscot, Norridgewalk, and St. John's Indians, in the Year 1725, ratified and confirmed by all the Nova Scotia Tribes, at Annapolis Royal, in the Month of June 1726, and lately renewed by Governor Cornwallis, at Halifax, and ratified at St. John's River, now read over, explained, and interpreted, shall be and are hereby, from this Time forward, renewed, reiterated, and for ever confirmed, by them and their Tribes; and the said Indians for themselves, and their Tribe, and their Heirs aforesaid, do make and renew the same solemn Submissions and Promises for the strict Observance of all the Articles therein contained as at any Time heretofore hath been done.

II. That all Transactions during the late War, shall, on both Sides, be buried in Oblivion with the Hatchet; and that the said Indians shall have all Favour, Friendship, and Protection shewn them from this his Majesty's Government.

III. That the said Tribe shall use their utmost Endeavours to bring in the other Indians to renew and ratify this Peace, and shall discover and make known any Attempts or Designs of any other Indians, or any Enemy whatever, against his Majesty's Subjects within this Province, so soon as they shall know thereof; and shall also hinder and obstruct the same, to the utmost of their Power. And, on the other Hand, if any of the Indians refusing to ratify this Peace, shall make War, they shall, upon Application, have such Aid and Assistance from the Government for their Defence, as the Case may require.

IV. It is agreed that the said Tribe of Indians shall not be hindered from, but have free Liberty of Hunting and Fishing as usual: And if they think a Truck-House needful at the River Chibenaquadie,

or any other Place of their Resort, they shall have the same built, and proper Merchandize lodged therein, to be exchanged for what the Indians shall have to dispose of; and that in the mean Time the said Indians shall have free Liberty to bring for Sale to Halifax, or any other Settlement within this Province, Skins, Feathers, Fowl, Fish, or any other Thing they shall have to sell, where they shall have Liberty to dispose thereof to the best Advantage.

V. That a Quantity of Bread, Flour, and such other Provisions as can be procured, necessary for the Families and proportionable to the Numbers of the said Indians, shall be given them Half yearly for the Time to come; and the same Regard shall be had to the other Tribes that shall hereafter agree to renew and ratify the Peace upon the Terms and Conditions now stipulated.

VI. That to cherish a good Harmony and mutual Correspondence between the said Indians and this Government, his Excellency Peregrine Thomas Hopson, Esq; Captain General and Governor in Chief, in and over his Majesty's Province of Nova Scotia or Accadia, Vice Admiral of the same, and Colonel of one of his Majesty's Regiments of Foot, hereby promises on the Part of his Majesty, the said Indians shall, upon the first Day of October yearly, so long as they shall continue in Friendship, receive Presents of Blankets, Tobacco, some Powder and Shot; and the said Indians promise once every Year, upon the said first of October, to come by themselves or their Delegates, and receive the said Presents, and renew their Friendship and Submissions.

VII. That the Indians shall use their best Endeavours to save the Lives and Goods of any People shipwreck'd on this Coast, where they resort, and shall conduct the People saved to Halifax, with their Goods, and a Reward adequate to the Salvage shall be given them.

VIII. That all Disputes whatsoever that may happen to arise between the Indians now at Peace, and other his Majesty's Subjects in this Province, shall be tried in his Majesty's Courts of Civil Jurisdiction, where the Indians shall have the same Benefits, Advantages and Privileges as any others of his Majesty's Subjects.

IN FAITH and Testimony whereof the Great Seal of the said Province is hereunto appended, and the Parties to these Presents have hereunto interchangeably set their Hands, in the Council Chamber at Halifax, this Twenty-second Day of November, 1752, in the Twenty-sixth Year of his Majesty's Reign.

B O S T O N.

January 29. On the 7th Instant died, at Sutton, in the County of Worcester, Deacon Samuel Lilley, in the 88th Year of his Age, who left behind him 113 Children, Grand Children, Great-Grand Children, and has beside out lived 32 of his Posterity. He had 20 Grand Children, and 33 Great Grand Children by one Son.

February 13. Last Wednesday Night between Eleven and Twelve o'Clock, a terrible Fire broke out in Marlborough Street, which burnt with great Violence about three Hours, in which Time the Dwelling Houses of Dr. John Cutler and Dr. Edward Ellis were almost entirely consum'd, with considerable of the Household Furniture and Cloaths, it not being discovered 'til it had got to such a Height as that some of the People were in Danger of their Lives; another small Dwelling House was likewise consum'd with most of the Things therein; likewise three Barns and a Blacksmith's Shop of Mr. Selion's were entirely destroy'd; several other Houses were in great Danger; but by the Vigilance of the People, and being a very rainy Time, it was prevented spreading any further: As the Dwelling Houses were large and commodious, the Loss must be very great: A young Lad was very much bruised, by the Falling of Part of a Brick Wall. A Horse was burnt to Death in one of the Stables.

The neighbouring Town of Charlestown was so kind as to bring over their fine Water Engine, which was of great Service in suppressing and preventing the Progress of the Fire.

The next Morning several People walking amongst the Rubbish happen'd to slip in the Vaults, and were very much burnt, one Lad to such a Degree that his Life is despair'd of.

The same Night the following Adventure happen'd at Providence in Rhode-Island; viz. A Negro Fellow belonging to Mr. John Brown of Newport, being sent to work at a Distill House there, was displeased at it, and thereupon apply'd himself to Dr. Gibbs to purchase him, but being refused, he threatened to be avenged; accordingly after the Family were in Bed, the Negro found Means to get into the Kitchen, where he made three or four Fires on the Floor, the Noise of which awak'd some

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some of them, who went down to see what the Matter was, but the Negro had placed himself at the inner Door with a Knife in his Hand, and swore if any one molested him he would kill 'em; they run immediately up Stairs, open'd the Windows, and cry'd Fire, which alarmed the Neighbourhood; the Negro finding himself detected, took the Opportunity while they were extinguishing the Fire to get out at a Window, and in his Way meeting with a Lad cut his Throat in a terrible Manner, but having a thick Handkerchief round his Neck prevented his cutting the Windpipe, so that he is like to recover; after which the Negro made to a Vessel, pull'd off his Cloaths, and threw himself into the River and was drowned: The next Day his Body was taken up, and given to the Surgeons to be anatomiz'd.

ANNAPOLIS.

On Thursday last died in Worcester County, the Rev. Mr. PATRICK GLASGOW, the very worthy Rector of Allhallows Parish, in that County.

Sunday last, died, after a short Illness, at his House on Patuxent River, near his Father's Iron Works, Mr. RICHARD SNOWDEN, junior, who was justly and greatly esteem'd, and his Death is much lamented by all who had the Pleasure of his Acquaintance.

Last Week arrived in Wye River, the Ship Sally, Capt. Patrick White, from London.

Robert Willson, in the Brigantine Grove, belonging to Mr. Galloway, who left London the 10th of January, and brings Advice, that all the Ships from this Province who could reasonably be expected to be arrived, were safe arrived, except Capt. Hugh Coulter, in the Thistle, who run ashore on Rye Bar, and was lost, but the People all saved.

C A D I Z, November 14.

SEVERAL Vessels have failed within these three Days from the West Indies. There is nothing determined in relation to the Departure of the Galleons. It is generally thought they will not put to Sea for some Time, the King having just granted Permission for sending eight Register Ships to America; these, however, will not fail before next June. It is no longer a Doubt that the Squadron, which failed about two Months ago from Carthagena, was bound to the West Indies, to put a Stop to the contraband Trade on the Coast of the Caraccas.

Petersburg, Nov. 17. Letters from Astracan advise, that Prince Heraclius, who had been so often mentioned on Occasion of the Troubles in Persia, hath gained a compleat Victory over Schach Doub, and obliged him to fly, with the broken Remains of his Army, towards the Frontiers of the Grand Mogul's Dominions. We wait for the Particulars of this Event.

Brussels, Dec. 10. Last Friday a Fellow was executed here for a Robbery on the Highway, who as soon as the Rope was put about his Neck, threw himself off the Ladder. A Surgeon's Apprentice soon after slept up the Ladder, and cut him down, in order to carry off the Body to be dissected. The Students of Louvain ran up to the Gibbet with the same Design; this occasioned a smart Battle, in

which the Surgeons prevailed, and brought away the Body to their Apartments. On taking the Cord from his Neck, they observed the Man to breathe, and bled him; and after pouring a little Wine down his Throat, he was carried to the Hospital, where he is still alive. On Saturday Night he opened his Eyes, and began to speak pretty distinctly. The Thing is the more remarkable, as the Man was so broke by the Torture, that he could scarce walk to the Place of Execution.

May the divine Providence long preserve your Majesty to reign over these Kingdoms; and may there never be wanting a Succession of Princes in your Royal House, formed by your great Example, to continue the Blessing of civil and religious Freedom to latest Posterity.

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as they heard five Guns fir'd, with a Round House, a large Mast that rak'd much aft, and new Gaff and Mainfall; and in two Days after, another Scout returned, with Advice, that a lofty short Ship was added to their Number, supposed to be a Prize also, and that they all stood away for Truxillo (a Place on the Continent, about 50 Leagues from the Bay), where they intend to remove their Port Mahoo Settlement, as that Place don't seem to suit a Spanish Constitution; and are fully resolv'd to fortify, and make it a Terror to the Baymen, as 'tis right in their Way between that and the Musquito Shore. Capt. Quereau left in the Bay, Capt. Griffin, in a Ship from Bristol, a Boston Ship, a Brig and a Sloop from Rhode Island; the Captains Shoals, Mann, Phoenix, and Colgan, who arrived there the Day before he sailed, all of it is Port. Capt. Quereau had a narrow Escape from a Galley, off the Southern Fore Keys, who chased him for some Time; but the Wind began to blow so hard, as soon obliged him to give over the Chase, by which Means he got clear.

Last Friday Night Capt. Smith arrived here from Coracoa, but last from Port Royal in Jamaica, in 4 Weeks, by whom we learn, that Jeremiah Leyscraft, in a Sloop from this Port, was taken at Rio de la Hatch, by a Spanish 40 Gun Ship, and carried into Carthagena; that the Spanish Men of War and Settees, were so thick on the Main, the Coracoa Traders dur'd scarcely put out their Heads for fear of being taken; and that a Spanish Ship of 30 Guns, was gone down to Port Mahoo, where he waited for another of the same Force from the Havannah, and both intended to scour the Bay, and take every English Vessel they can meet. Capt. Smith, about a Week ago, spoke with Capt. Curby, in a Ship from London, for South Carolina; and in Lat. 36, off of the Capes of Virginia, took up a new London built Yawl, with 4 Oars, a Rudder, and Tiller.

In Capt. Smith is come Passenger, Capt. Warren, late of a Rhode Island Brig, who, on the 29th of January last, N. S. was cast away on the Plate Wreck; Vessel and Cargo entirely lost; but by taking to their Boat, sav'd their Lives, and were next Day taken up by Capt. Collins, of Rhode Island, who carried them safe to Jamaica. Capt. Warren informs us, That Capt. Manchester, of Rhode Island, was cast away on the Caucasus, some Time in January, and was taken off by a Bermudian who was there, who said, that eight Vessels had been cast away at that Place, some Time before. Capt. Warren also informs us, that while he was at Jamaica, Capt. Holbrook arrived there from London, who was brought to off of Porto Rico, by a Spanish Brig, the Captain of which came on board, and after rifling him of several Things of Value, dismissed him with saying, he intended to have given an Order upon a Gentleman at Jamaica, to make Restitution for every Thing taken; but chose to embrace the next Opportunity by the first of his Countrymen he could meet with, and did not doubt but he would soon have it in his Power to perform his Promise, as he intended to visit all that came that Way.

Extra of a Letter from Charles Town, in South Carolina, dated Jan. 19, 1753.

"There never was less to load Vessels than this Year; yet never so many Vessels here as now. Corn is at 25 s. Currency (nearly equal to 6 s. York Money) per Bushel, and like to rise. A Cargo or two of that Article, if cheap with you, would make you Money. We are supposed to fall short of Provisions by 30,000 Bushels."

Feb. 12. By private Letters from Philadelphia, we have an Account, that a Set of Regulators, in Imitation of those of Elizabeth Town, lately appeared in that City on the following Occasion: An Inhabitant of that Place, having quarrell'd with his Wife, horse whip'd her severely; whereupon those Regulators sent for him privately, and after securing him in a proper Manner, flagellated his Posteriors with Birchen Rods, 'til the Blood trickled down his Heels; they then dismiss'd him, with Orders not to horse whip or beat his Wife any more: The poor Fellow afterwards applied to a Justice; but what Satisfaction he may get, we can't learn; However, one of the Letter Writers observes, that tho' the Man has suffered enough in Conscience, yet the Woman had more than enough to ballance it.

Feb. 19. Last Thursday Night we had a very violent Storm at East, which swelled the Tide to a greater Height than was ever known here, and deluged a considerable Part of the Broad Street, to such a Degree, that like the Venetians we might have paid our Neighbours a Visit by Water. The Damage received by the Shipping and Wharfs, was very considerable; and a new Brig near laden with Flax Seed, bound for Ireland, was by the

Fury of the Storm, impell'd out of the Harbour, with neither Anchors or Sails on board, and drove ashore on Staten Island, but is since got off, without much Loss: Most of the Cellars and Stores on the Wharfs were full of Water, and much of the Commodities in them destroy'd.

We hear also, that this Storm has been severely felt in the Country round us, where great Damage has been done to Fences, &c.

A Jew Pedlar went into a House where he offered his Goods for Sale, but the good Man being out, and all his Family, except his Wife, who told the Pedlar that she could not buy any Thing, for her Husband had got the Key of the Money: The Pedlar then finding that the Woman was entirely alone, offered to make her a Present of a Piece of Callico upon Condition of her giving up her Charms to him: The Bait was very alluring, for the Thoughts of sporting with a young Man, and having a new Gown in the Bargain, made her readily yield to his Desires; he accordingly gave her the Callico, and after taking a Repast in the Banquet of Love, went about his Business; but had not gone far before he met with her Husband, and having some Knowledge of him, said, "Sir, I have sold your Wife a very cheap Piece of Callico, and on six Months Credit;" with that the poor Man stood amaz'd, and said, "I wonder at my Wife's ill Conduct in running me in Debt, when she knows that I have a considerable Sum of Money to pay in a few Months Time, and can't tell how to make it up." He then persuaded the Pedlar to go back and take his Piece of Callico, which he readily consented to, and when they came to the House, he order'd his Wife to give the Pedlar his Callico again, which she did, after privately concealing a Coal of Fire in it; the Pedlar took the Callico and put it up in his Pack (which was a Wallet slung across his Shoulders) so march'd off, pleas'd with the Thoughts of his Success; but to his sweet Meat he soon found four Sauce; he not suspecting the Cheat, jogg'd along 'til he met with a Countryman, who seeing his Pack on Fire (and which was then ready to blaze) cry'd, "Hey Friend, from whence came you?" from Hell, replied the Pedlar; "so I perceive," says the Country Man, "by the Flames at your Back." The Pedlar then look'd behind him, and to his great Surprise found all his Goods on Fire, which made him stamp and stare like a mad Man, and curse his Folly for cuckolding the poor Man.

March 5. Last Wednesday Evening the Snow Young Lodowick, Capt. Vardil, of this Port, arrived here from the Virgin Islands; and the next Morning, by a high Gale of Wind at West, she was forced from her Anchors, drove out of the Harbour, and hove ashore on a Point of Rocks at Corlaer's Hook; and the Wind continuing all that Day to blow very violent, no Assistance could be given her; she continues to lie in a bad Condition, full of Water, but as all possible Endeavours have since been used, 'tis hoped the Vessel and great Part of the Cargo will be saved.

Two Sloops also at Anchor, were forced out of the Harbour at the same Time, and drove to a considerable Distance into a shoaler Water, where they rode it out.

On Wednesday, the 14th of February last, a German Stocking Weaver of this City, coming from Albany a foot, was overtaken and robb'd on the High-lands, by three Footmen, who told him they were travelling the same Way: They kept him Company near three Miles, before they attempted any Thing; when coming to a lonely Place, they bid him stand and deliver; and whilst one of them held a Knife to his Breast, the others search'd his Pockets, and took from him his Pocket Book, with upwards of 22 Pounds in Cash, besides some Papers of Value; and then made off into the Woods.

Yesterday arrived here the Captains Shoals, Man, and Colgan, all in 28 Days from the Bay. By them we have an Account, that 4 Weeks before they sailed, two Spanish Craft came in there, on Pretence of looking for some Spanish Runaways, but were discovered to be Pyrates; whereupon, their Arms and Ammunition were seiz'd and carried off by Capt. Griffiths of Bristol, and their Crews by another Ship bound home. We hear also, that the Sloop Cedar, Capt. Lawrence of this Port, was cast away the 12th of January last, on the Grand Key, and only some of the Sails and Rigging saved. Capt. Phoenix left the Bay some Time before them, to touch at Jamaica: Capt. Burger, bound to this Port, and two Rhode Island Vessels, failed in Company with them. The Vessels left in the Bay, were the Captains Bowen, Farlong, and Jones of this Port, and Capt Stoddard of Rhode

Island. Capt. Green, in a Brig, and Capt. Guilford, in a Sloop, from this Port, arrived just before they sail'd; and a Sloop unknown was going in. In coming thro' the Gulf, they took up a Canoe with 4 Spanish Negroes on board, who ran away from the Havannah; one of them died about three Days since.

Capt. Robert Leonard, late Master of the Sloop Diamond of this Port, came Passenger in Capt. Shoals from the Bay; who on the 24th of November last, was taken in Sight of the Bay, by two Spanish Brigs, from Campeachy, of 14 Carriage and 28 Swivel Guns each, one with 46 and the other 58 Men, among whom were several Renegadoes, who used Capt. Leonard in a very barbarous Manner, by cutting him in several Places, for not striking as soon as desired: Capt. Leonard ran his Vessel ashore, but the Spaniards soon got her off, and carried her away: In a short Time after they landed Capt. Leonard at Point Castile, from whence he travelled to Black River, where he got a Passage to the Bay; John Smith, Michael Flanagan, and Alexander Horne, Seamen, the Spaniards kept; and to 4 others of the Crew they gave a Raft, on which they made a Shift to get to Rattan, and from thence in a Canoe escaped to the Main, and afterwards went down to the Bay.

ANNAPOLIS.

On Thursday last, four Men on Horseback, attack'd Mr. Peter Wrenth on the Frederick County Road, beyond Bladensburg, as he was travelling home from this Place, with his Waggon, and robb'd him of what Money he had about him; but it happen'd not to be much, for he had paid away the chief Part of his Money in Town: It is said they abus'd him, and cut him over the Head; but we have since the Pleasure to hear, that the four Men are taken, and committed to Prince George's County Goal.

On Monday was seen night, a small Boat in Chester River, having three Men in her, was overset, and two of them drowned.

One Night last Week, when it was very dark and windy, three Men being on board a small Sloop in Choptank near Oxford, in giving or paying out the Cable, something gave way, and the Cable draw'd one of them betwixt the Windlass and Deck, and crush'd him to Death; the other two were wounded, and thinking their Companion to be knock'd overboard, let his Body lie under the Windlass 'til next Morning.

A few Days ago a melancholy Accident happen'd in Talbot County to Master MATTHEW WARD TILGHMAN, a very hopeful Youth, eldest Son to Mr. MATTHEW TILGHMAN, one of the Representatives for that County: He was running just behind a Cart, when one of the Wheels run over the end of a Piece of Wood, which flung it round with such Force that it broke out of his Left, of which he soon after died.
