An ACT for the Ordering and Regulating the Militia of this Province, for the better Defence and Security thereof.

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E it Enacted, by the King's most excellent Majesty, by and with the Avice and Consent of His Majesty's Governor, Council and Assembly of this Province, and the Authority of the same, That from and after the End of this present Sessions of Assembly, the Militia of this Province shall be mustered, exercised according to these Directions and Instructions following, wix. That every Colonel, Lieutenant Colonel, Major or Captain of Horse or Foot, already commissioned, or hereafter to be commissionated by his Excellency the Governor of this Province, for the Time being, shall have Power to enlift such and so many inhabiting within this have Power to enlift such and so many inhabiting within this Province, not hereafter excepted, in their several and respective Divisions between Sixteen and Sixty Years of Age, as they shall think fit, by as equal Proportions of the said Inhabitants as possible they can, to be of the Militia or Train-Bands of this Province; which said Persons so enlisted, they shall muster, exercise and train, in and at such Places, and at such certain Times, as to them shall seem meet, and as the Service, Safety or Desence of this Province shall require, or as his Excellency the Governor of this Province, or Commander in chief, for the Time being, shall see Cause to order; and that every such Colonel, Lieutenant Colonel, Major or Captain shall give Notice or Summons upon every Major or Captain shall give Notice or Summons upon every Training or Mustering, to every Person so enlisted as aforesaid, within his respective Division or Limit, at the Head of his Company, or at the House of the Party, by an Officer of his Company, or Warrant under his Hand, to appear at such Time and Place as he shall appoint for such Training or Mustering: And that if any Man, after such Notice given, and Summons as aforefaid, shall neglect to appear at the Time and Place appointed, as aforefaid, or that refuses, when he hath so appeared, to be enlisted into the Militia and Train-Bands aforefaid, or that being to enlitted, shall not, from Time to Time, as he shall be summoned or warned as aforefaid, appear and bring with him One good ferviseable Guarant, with Six Charges of Powder, fhall far dery fuch Offence, (if a Free-Man) forfeit and pay the Sum of One Hundred Pounds of Tobacco, and if a Servant, letten or hindered by his Mafter, Miftress or Overseer, then fuch Mafter, Miftres or Overseer, then such Mafter, Miftres or Overseer, then such Hundred Pounds of Tobacco for every Servant so letten or hindered as aforesaid; for the Use of the Troop or Foot-Company to which he belongs, to purchase Drums, Colours and other Necessaries for the said Troop or Company as the Field-Officers of the said Militia in that County, or any Two of them, shall direct.

Provided, That this Clause be not construed to coun-

tenance any Officer to prefs Arms or Amunition for any further Expedition or Service than Training; but that upon all fuch Occasions they shall be supplied out of the County Magazine or Store; all which Forseitures shall be heard, adjudged and determined by the Colonel, Lieutenant-Colonel or Major, or any Two of them; and an Account thereof kept in Writing by the Clerk of such Troop or Company; which said Colonel, Lieutenant-Colonel, or Major of such County, or any Two of them as aforesaid, is hereby, and thorized and empowered to award Execution against the Body, Goods and Chattels of such Persons so neglecting, refusing or failing as aforesaid; and that upon occasion of all such Executions, the respective Clerks and Sherists of each respective County within this Province, shall issue out and serve Execution without Fee or Reward.

And for settling the Horse-Forces, That a Captain of enance any Officer to press Arms or Amunition for any

ferve Execution without Fee or Reward.

And for fettling the Horfe-Forces, That a Captain of Horfe in each respective County, for making up of his Troop, shall enlist his Number of Men out of the Inhabitants of the faid County, according to such Instructions as he shall, from time to time, receive from the Governor of this Province, or the Colonel of the County, for the Time being.

Provided always, That such Troopers shall ride their own Horses, and that no Person shall be a Trooper without he be the Owner of a good serviceable Horse, which shall pass Moster; and that such Troopers, in Consideration of their great Pay, hereafter to be allowed, be bound and obliged to find themselves with good, able and sufficient Furniture for their Horses, and likewise to find themselves with Swords.

and themselves with good, able and sufficient Furniture for their Horses, and likewise to find themselves with Swords, Carbines, Pistols, Holsters and Ammunition; and if any Trooper shall neglect or refuse, upon Notice given them, to appear or muster at the Time and Place appointed, as aforesaid, by each respective Captain of Horse, accoutred as aforesaid, tequired as aforesaid, shall forfeit and pay One Hundred Pounds of Tobacco; to be levied as aforesaid, to the Use of the Troop, for purchasing of Trumpets and Colours and other Necessaires, as the Commander shall think fit; and that all such Troopers, so and in Consideration aforesaid, at all such Times as they shall be out a Ranging, shall find their own Provisions; but when in actual Service, to be found Provisions at the Charge of this Province, to be paid by the Public; And if it shall happen that any Trooper's Horse shall be killed in the Service, then the said Trooper to be paid for the said Horse, by the Public, and not otherwise.

That all Persons in Holy Orders, Delegates, Magistrates and Constables, shall, in their proper Persons be exempted from being compelled to muster and train, either in Horse or Foce, during such Time as they officiate or bear such Office as aforesait.

Provided, That this Clause shall not extend to such Perfons as already have or shall hereafter accept of Commissions for Military Service, from the Governor of this Province, for the Time being, so as to discharge such Persons from their respective Charges mentioned in such their several and respective Commissions.

And be it Enatled by the Authority aforefaid, That all Negroes and Slaves whatfoever, shall be exempted the Duty

Be it Enasted, by the Authority aforefaid, That from henceforth, all fuch necessary Charges of such War, and Soldiers

Province, by their Representatives in a General Assembly,
or out of the Public Treasure of this Province, and no

Be it further Enasted, by the Authority aforefaid, That
from henceforth the Commissioners of each respective County, shall Yearly and every Year, win. between the Twenty Ninth Day of September, and the Twenty Fifth Day of December, nominate and appoint Two honest and substantial Men of their County to be Press-Masters for the Year enfuing; and if any One die or depart the County, or be lame or fick within that Time, that then the next Justice of Peace to nominate and appoint another in his Stead, that if Occasion require, they, and no other, shall impress Victuals and other Things given them in Charge to be Praid'd by Warrant from his Excellency the Governor or Comby Warrant from his Excellency the Governor or Commander in chief, for the Time being. Disability, receive a Yearly pension, to be raised out of the
public Levy of this province, during the Time of such his

also be allowed a competent pension to the Wise during her
Widow-hood, and the children till they be of Years able to

The same justice of peace to whom such Certificate as aforesaid shall be made, shall immediately iffue out a Warrant to the constable of the Hundred where such party liveth, to apprehend him, and bring him before himself or some other Justice of the peace of the same county, there to render a sufficient Excuse, if any he hath, for such his Refusal or Non-appearance, as aforesaid; and if the Justice of peace shall not find the Excuse of such party in luch case to be reasonable and sufficient, then he shall immediately commit such person to the custody of the Sherist of such county, there to remain until he shall shall surety to appear at the next provincial court to be held for this province, there to be proceeded against according to the due course of Law; and if thereupon he shall be convict of such obstinate Resulal or Disobelience at aforesaid, he shall be fined and imprisoned according to the Directions of the Justices of the provincial court.

HE important Memorial delivered to the States General on the 13th past by Colonel Yorke was as follows.

High and Mighty LORDS,

" Notwithstanding the repeated Proofs which the King my Master hath given all Europe of his fincere Defire to preserve the public Peace, and notwithstanding the great Pains he hath taken to prevent the Tranquility of his Allies from being disturbed by War, and to remove every Ground of it from this Part of the World, he finds himself at length threatened with the Prospect of a War being kindled in his own Kingdoms.

" I am commanded to communicate to your High Mightinesses the Advices, which his Majesty receives from all Quarters, of the prodigious Preparations that are making in France for a Descent on the British Isles. That Crown instead of doing. Justice to England for her Claims, founded on the most solemn Treaties, hath added Insolence to Injustice, and, even in the Representations it hath thought proper to make, used Expressions that are equally inconsistent with common Decency and the particular Respect due to Sovereigns. This nath been observed by your High Mightinesses, as well as by all Europe. You have likewife feen with what Moderation the King caused these Remonstrances to be answered : But an Example so worthy of Imitation appears not to have made the least Impression on the Ministry of Versailles France still continues to pursue with the same Oftentation her ambitious Projects. Her Armies are already in Motion on all Sides; a formidable Embarkation is preparing; and the Port of Dunkirk that Monument of our Neighbours ill Faith, is restoring to its ancient State, notwithstanding the strongest and most amicable Representations made by the Ambassadors of the King and the States-General. The Registers of your High Mightinesses are an Evidence that this is a notorious Breach of Treaty, and a manifest Aggression. It is supported by 120 Battalions that are in Motion. The Coasts towards the Ocean swarm with Troops. The Roads to Flanders, Normandy, and Brittany are continually covered with Carriages laden with Cannon, warlike Stores, Arms of all kinds, Provisions, in short, all the Apparatus of some great Enterprise : And to remove all Doubt about their Destination, the French Ministers at the several Courts of Europe speak publicly of invading Great-Britain and Ireland.

" The Wisdom of your High Mightinesses renders it unnecessary for me to represent how much your Republic is concerned in the Defence of Great-Britain and the Protestant Succession in his Majesty's illustrious House, which France hath more than once attempted to overturn. There is already the strongest Proof that this Attempt will foon be renewed: Prudence requires that it be

feafonably prevented. "The King is not frightened by these threatening Appearances: But he is determined to take every Precaution to prevent their Effect. He places his Confidence in the Divine Providence, in the Justice of his Cause, and the Fidelity and Bra-very of his Subjects. At the same Time the Love he bears to his People, his Attention to their Safety, and the Prefervation of their Liberty and Religion, and his Defire to protect all his Coaffs from the Rayages of the Enemy, are so many powerful Motives which obliges him to demand the Succours of 6000 Men, with which the United Provinces are bound by Treaty to furnish him, for the De-

fence of his Kingdoms.

"His Majefty hath had fo many Proofs of the Republic's Fidelity in fulfilling her Engagements, and of her invariable Friendship for his Royal Perfon, that he cannot entertain the flightest Doubt but that the 6000 Men will be immediately got ready to embark, and his Majesty will without Delay fend the necessary Shipping for carrying them over."

From the St. James's Evening Poft.

The following is an Account of the late Engagement between the Orford and the Esperance Men of War, translated from a Letter wrote to the French Court by the Viscount de Bonville, late Commander of the Esperance, and dated from Plymouth, November 23 .-- If the Particulars are not all true, the Dishonour of misrepresenting Facts must fall upon the Viscount.

HE 11th Instant at ten in the Morning, being then between 70 and 80 Leagues West of Ushant, I descried a Ship at about three Leagues into the N.N.E. and foon after three others, all in Sight. Suspecting they might be an English Squadron, and having but 20 Guns mounted, viz. two 24 Pounders, twelve of 18lb. and ten 9 Pounders, in a Ship pierced for 70 Guns (two thirds of my Cannon having been retrenched, as also 200 Sailors, on Account of Transporting Troops to Louisburg) I bore away to the S. S. E. the Wind being

After a Chace of fix Hours, the first of those Ships being come within Gun Shot under my Stern, fired upon me with her Chace-Guns. She was followed by the 3 other Ships at a great Distance, crowding all the Sail they could. At four in the Afternoon, being along fide of me within Musket-Shot, the Engagement began between us two, and lasted five Hours with a dreadful Fire of Cannon and small Arms on both Sides. Tho' so far dyermatched, I attempted several Times to board her; but the Sea running very high, my Rigging and Sails torn in Pieces, the Ship hardly manageable, I could only turn my Broadfide to her, and keep up as near as possible to her. In those five Hours I fired between 400 and 450 Cannon In fhort I Shot, and about 8300 Musket Shot. fought five full Hours, Broadfide and Broadfide, with the English Ship, the Orford of 70 Guns, viz, 28 of 32lb. Ball, 20 of 18lb. and 16 nine Pounders. Tho hattered and torn in Pieces, and ready to fink by the terribe Fire of that Ship, and tho from the very Beginning without a chance of maintaining the fight; I would not firike to any but the Admiral, and in the midft of the quadron, maintained the fight till nine in the Evening, when the Admiral came alongside of me, and the other two under my Stern, within half a Gun Shot, Numbers of Ships are getting ready.

fome Vollies of which I received. Being then at By Advice received from Barcelona, there are the Mercy of the Waves, incapable of governing fix Frigates, from 30 to 50 Guns, failed from the Ship, having all my Sails and Tackle destroyed, eleven Shot between Wind and Water, and the Deck covered with dead and wounded Men, I flruck my Flag, and furrendered, when just ready to go to the Bottom; which I told the Admiral by the Speaking-trumpet: Then the fire ceased on every fide, and he fent his Long Boat to take me in.

The Condition in which I furrendered, did not admit of the English profiting by the Prize; for judging it impossible to put my Ship, which fix Pumps could hardly keep above Water, in a Con-dition to reach a Port, they resolved to take out the Men immediately, and fet her on Fire. I have loft all that I had in her, notwithstanding the Generofity of the Admiral, who gave a particular Charge, to take care of all my Effects and restore them to me. He had even forbid to take any Thing from the Ship's Company, but it feems there was hardly Time enough to fave the Mens

The Orford was not in much better Condition than my Ship; for as foon as the arrived at Plymouth, they were obliged to bring her up into the

His Majesty has therefore judged it necessary, to acquaint the House of Lords, with Intelligence of such high Importance to the Sasety and Well-being of these Nations; and, at the same Time, to inform them, That, in Pursuance of the Advice and Assurances of his Parliament, he has augmented his Forces by Sea and Land; and taken proper Measures and Advice and Affurances of his Parliament, he has augmented his Forces by Sea and Land; and taken proper Measures and Precautions for putting his Kingdoms in a Posture of Defence, against so unjust and desperate an Enterprise, projected in Revenge for those just and necessary Measures, which have been taken for maintaining the Righta and Possessions of his Crown and Subjects, in North-America. That in order further to strengthen himself, his Majesty has made a Requisition of a Body of Hessan Troops, pursuant to the Treaty lately made with the Landgrave of Hessa-Cassel, to be forthwith brought over hither; for which Purpose Transports are ordered.

His Majesty, trusting in the Divine Protection, and in the His Majerty, truiting in the Divine Protection, and in the good Affections, Zeal and Fidelity of his People, which he has so often experienced, is determined to neglect no Means of Defence; but to exert all the Force which God has put into his Hands, to repel so daring an Attempt; and his Majerty doubts not of the Support and Concurrence of the House of Lords, in taking all such Measures as may be conductive to an End so effential to the Honour of his Crown, the Preservation of the Protestant Religion, and the Laws and Liberties of these Kingdoms.

Paynter arrived here in 29 Days from Jamaica, and informs us, That a few Days before he left that Island, three French Prizes were fent in there by his Majesty's Ship the Princess Amelia, and another Man of War of 20 Guns ; that two of them were Guineymen, having, between them, nigh 1000 Slaves, and a confiderable Quantity of Gold Dust on board, and were esteemed very valuable Prizes. On the 24th of April, Captain Paynter faw two large Ships lying under Cape Nichola; but it being hazy Weather, they did not discover him. The next Day, about 15 Leagues from the Cape, he was brought to by his Majesty's Ship the Princess Amelia of 60 Guns, and Greenwich of 50, and a Lieutenant from the Amelia coming on board of Major Prather's, and the Nottoway Captain, gave

his Sloop, acquainted him that Admiral Townshend had ordered them out in Search of two French Men of War that some Time before had cruized off that Place, and that one of them mounted 74, and the other 64 Guns. Captain Paynter then told him where he had feen the two Ships the Day before, when the Lieutenant immediately dismissed him, and went on board his own Veffel. Captain Paynter fays, the Frenchmen were not fo formidable as the Lieutenant imagined, being in. formed the next Day, by the Master of a Sloop he came up with among the Keys, that the two Veffels he faw were French Frigates of 36, or 40, Guns each, and that he saw them coming out of Heneaga some Days before, where they landed Hogs to breed, and took off others for the Use of their Ships.

OUR Majesty having been graciously pleased to acquaint your two Houses of Parliament, that a Design hath been formed by the French Court to make an hoftile Invasion upon Great-Britain or Ireland; we, your Majesty's most duti-ful and loyal Subjects the Lord-Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave to express our Ab-horrence of so unjust and desperate as Enterprize, projected in Revenge for your royal and gracious Protection of the Trade and Commerce of your People, and the necessary Desence of the undoubted Rights and Possessions of your Crown.

With Gratitude and unfeigned Loyalty, we most humbly affure your Majesty that the Citizens of your faithful City, united in Duty and Affection to your facred Person and Government, will exert their utmost Power, and hazard their Lives and Fortunes, to support and defend your Majesty, and the Protestant Succession in your Royal Family not doubting but by the Zeal and Loyalty of your Majesty's Subjects, conducted by your known Wisdom and Courage, with the Affistance of the Divine Providence, you will be able to defeat all

the Defigns of your Enemies.

To which Address his Majesty was pleased to return this most gracious Answer.

THANK you for this very loyal and dutiful Address. I have the firmest Alliance on the affectionate Affurances you give me, of " exerting yourfelves to the utmost in Support of my Government; and the City of London may always depend upon my Favour, Countenance and Protection; and my conflant Care to de-fend the Rights and Possessions of my Crown, and promote the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom."

[Strange Phanomenon this, that Honey, that best of Medicines, should produce such dreadful Effects! however, we have this Consolation, that the Death was as mild as the Cause, and may be truly said to

bave been a fweet One.]
WILLIAMSBURG, May 28.
On Thursday the 20th several Gentlemen of the Affociation, under Col. Peyton Randolph, met at Fredericksburg, to the Number of 130; and at a Council of War held next Day, the following Gentlemen were chosen Officers, viz. Captains, War-ner Lewis, Bernard Moore, Charles Carter, Rich-ard Eppes, Nathaniel West Dandridge, and John Syme: Aids de Camp, Presley Thornton, and Charles Osborne. In the Afternoon an excellent Sermon, fuitable to the Occasion, was preached to them by the Reverend Mr. M'Daniel, of King-George County, from the 2. Samuel x. 12. " Be of good Courage, and let us play the Men for our People, and for the Cities of our God: And the Lord do that which feemeth him good." They afterwards subscribed to certain Articles for their good Government amongst themselves, which they agreed shall be to them as a Law, and obliged themselves to abide by them accordingly. day laft NEW-YORK, May 31.

Extract of a Letter from Albany, dated May 25, 1756.

"Yesterday Evening an Express arrived here from Oswego, but have not Time to learn the Contents. The same Evening another Express came in from Fort William Henry, and by a Letter from Col. Whiting we have the following Account, viz. That Lieutenant Rogers (Brother to the famous Captain Rogers) arrived there with a French Prisoner, and one Scalp. The Prisoner, among other Things, informed them, That, that Day 250 French and Indians were to march from Crown-Point, to cut off the Waggoners that were employed in transporting Provisions from Fort Ed-ward to Fort William Henry.

" Two Hundred and Fifty Men, under the Command of Captain Rogers, were immediately fent to wait for them on their Landing. The utmost Expedition is used in transporting Provisions both by Land and Water: General Winslow, accompanied by Col. Gridley, and a Number of other Officers, arrived here on Saturday last from Boston, and the Forces are daily marching up in great Numbers.

" Last Week a general Court Martial was held We hear that an Offer has been made to the in the Citadel on 17 Deferters, 15 of which were Acadians here, to supply them with Vessels, &c. condemned to be hanged; the other two to receive

were executed, the other reprieved. The other eight were sent the same Day to Schenestady, and are all to swing this Day, unless the General out of his Clemency will reprieve them."

Extra® of a Letter from Ofwego, dated May 17.

"I arrived here three Days ago, after a tedious Time, occasioned by the large Train I was with, consisting of 200 Whale-Boats, and 200 Battoes, all which are here now safe, with their Cargoes, excepting two Whale-Boats, and two Battoes, that were lost at the Falls, twelve Miles from hence, and four Men drowned in them. On my Arrival I heard, that a few Days before, a Party of In. I heard, that a few Days before, a Party of In-dians came on some Ship Carpenters cutting Tim-ber not 300 Yards from the Town, and before a Party could be turned out, killed and carried off Twelve: They were purfued by the Party, but they could not get Sight of them: Our People found one killed, which they scalped, and threw his Body into the River, besides several Blankets shot thro, Knives, Muskets, &c. by which it is thought Tome more of the Enemy have been killed. About 8 o'Clock this Day, we heard a firing up the River, which we took to be an Attack on one Lieutenant Blair, who went up this Morning to the Reefs, with 24 Men, two Miles off, for a Guard to the Battoes at that Place; upon which Numbers of People, with a few Mohawks, ran from the Town that Way. The Firing fill con-tinued; and foon after a Man came in with an Indian Scalp, and brought Word, that Blair's Party was attacked by a Party of French and Indians, himself and one Soldier killed; upon which upwards of 500 Battoe Men were fent different Ways into the Woods. We foon further heard, that a brave Mohawk, who went out on the Alarm, with fome Battoe Men, was killed by a French Indian, after he (the French Indian) had received a Wound in his Thigh, the Mohawk attempting to take him alive, and by that Means he loft his Life; but a Battoe Man that flood next to him foon dispatched the French Indian, and scalped him; another they found dead, which they scalped also; two more they are certain are killed, as they saw them drawn off. Lieutenant Blair, tho' a young Gentleman, not more than 18 or 19, behaved like a brave Soldier; for being wounded the first Fire, he begged his Men to Tarr All, and fight on, for he was a dead Man, and that they might foon exped Affistance; foon after he received another Ball in his Throat, when he immediately fell. The Ser-jeant, with the Men, bravely maintained their Ground, till they were relieved by Numbers, on whose Approach the Enemy soon made off, and the Woods being now green, our People stood no Chance in following them. Another Soldier is mortally wounded, one flightly, and a Ship-Carpenter, who went out without any Fire-Arms fome Time after the Attack, was shot in the Leg, the Bone not hurt. Our People have brought in feveral Blankets, Knives, small Arms, &c. by which we hope they have had a warm Reception. They had not Time to scalp our Dead. Lieut. Blair, the Mohawk, and Soldier, were interred this Afternoon, with all the Honours of War.

We are bufy getting the Veffels here ready for the Lake, and hope to be out in eight Days. As yet little is done to the new Ones, and will not, till we are reinforced, that we may have a firong Guard to cover our Men in the Woods. At the Falls (12 Miles from hence) a good flockaded Fort is building, to defend that País. Plenty of fresh Beef and Fish, the latter of which, in three Hawls of a Seine, filled a Battoe, fo hope foon to

have a very healthy Garrison."

General Johnson set out from the Flats the 19th Instant for Onondaga, distant from the Flats 60 Miles, there to hold, 'tis faid, the most important Treaty with the Indians that has been held for fome Years past, as on the Success of it, 'tis likewife thought, the future Friendship of all the ladian Tribes will, in a great Measure, principally depend: That the General before he left the Flats spoke with some Indians there who told him, that Numbers of the French and Indians were daily gathering together at Ofwegatchi, with an Intest to attack fome Place thereabouts.

Thirty-fix Bilanders, laden with Powder and other Warlike Stores, arrived fome Days ago at Calais, and they talked of fending Part of them from

Paris, April 2. The Orders and Instructions given by the British Court to General Braddock, for his Conduct in America, having been found among the Effects of that General, after the Defeat of the Body of Troops he commanded, its pretended that they will be annexed to the Manifesto

Berlin, April 9. five in the Asternoon, there was so violent a Shock, that five in the Afternoon, there was so violent a Shock, that most of the Inhabitants run out of Town; between eleven and twelve at Night the Earth quaked again during five Minutes. After a short Interval came another Shock, and then fourteen more fuccessively. All the Night long the Priests and Friars were employed in Preaching to the People and hearing Confessions in the Streets and Squares, and nothing was heard but fighing and groaning among the Multitude. The 28th was the fatal Æra of the Ruin of the City: One cannot think without Horror of that tremendous Day: Churches, Public Edifices, private Houses, all were fuccessively overthrown. At this dismal Spectacle the Magistrates opened the Prisons, and set at Liberty all Persons that were not detained for capital Crimes. The Vicar General, in the Bishop's Absence, gave the Nuns Permission to leave their Cloysters. Happily, in the common Calamity, no more than 14 or 15 Souls perished. All the Inhabitants are actually dispersed in the Fields under Tents and Booths. The Governor has sheltered unwards of 600 Persons in his The Governor has sheltered upwards of 600 Persons in his Country-House, and maintains them at his own Expence. passed without some Shocks of an Earthquake."

" On Saturday the 22d Inftant, the Court-martial which met here on Wednesday, was dissolved. By their Sentence, 15 Soldiers belonging to his Majesty's 44th, 48th, and 50th Regiments, and the Independent Companies, were condemned to die for Desertion. On Monday following, seven of them in white Shirts and Caps, under a ftrong Guard, with their Bayonets fixed, were marched from the Provoft's to the Head of the 48th Regiment, which was under Arms in the Front of the Camp. The poor Criminals were attended by the Chaplain of the Regiment, and Mr. Ogilvie, the Minister of the Place; they behaved very decently, and confessed that their Crimes deserved the Punishment they were going to receive, and begged of their Fellow-Soldiers, to observe the Leap they were going to make into Eternity, and to take Warning by them to avoid the like Punishment; exhorted them to stand faithfully to their Colours, in fo discreet a Manner, as affected the Spectators very much. Just before they were to mount the Cart under the Gallows, one of them, a young Man, who had fome Circumstances in his Favour, was presented with a Pardon from the General, which so affected the poor Creature, that he fell down on the Ground almost overcome with Joy. The other eight were fent under a Guard to Schenectady, in order to be executed at the Head of the 44th Regiment. And we hear that the General has ordered great Rewards to be given for the Apprehending of Deferters, and that all such as do not immediately return to their Regiments, or deliver themselves up to some Magistrate, will cer-tainly suffer Death without Mercy. And that this will extend to Battoe-Men as well as Soldiers."

A Letter from Albany, dated the 24th of May fays, the Soldier that was reprieved here this Day, was born in Philadelphia; his Name Talbert. Only four out of the Eight that were fent to Schenectady, were hanged, the General having fent a Reprieve for the Reft .-- To-morrow a Grand Council of War fits here.
