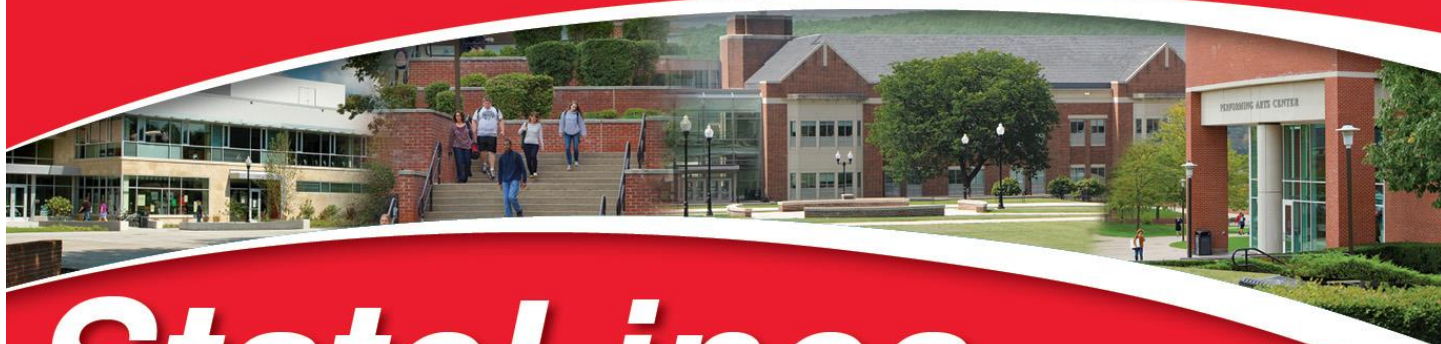

Frostburg State University Bobcats to Celebrate Homecoming



Past, present and future FSU students are invited to celebrate Homecoming Weekend on the campus they can all call home. **From Thursday, Oct. 20, to Sunday, Oct. 23**, FSU will host a variety of exciting events, including a pep rally, a comedy performance, special ceremonies and athletics.

The celebration will kick off on Thursday with a **Retired Employee Luncheon** in the Gira Center at noon. Later that evening, the Bobcat spirit will continue with the announcement of Homecoming King and Queen at the **Pep Rally** in the Main Arena of the Cordts PE Center at 7 p.m.

In addition, the Department of Theatre and Dance will host performances of **"Around the World in 80 Days"** in the Drama Theatre on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings. The show begins at 7:30 p.m. with tickets on sale at the Performing Arts Center box office.

Friday morning begins with the **Career Expo** in the Lane University Center and campus-wide, from 9 a.m. to noon, an opportunity for students and alumni to network within their fields of interest. From noon to 4 p.m., Robert Ladislav Derr's art exhibit, **"Keep an Eye On,"** will be on display in the Stephanie Ann Roper Gallery and remain open during those hours throughout the weekend. The **Bobcat Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony and dinner** will take place that evening at 5 p.m. in Lane Manicur Hall. Then Friday night at 8 p.m., award-winning actor and comedian **Chris Tucker** will perform in the Cordts PE Center Main Arena to provide sidesplitting entertainment. Tickets, starting at \$5 for students and \$20 for general admission, can be purchased at the Lane Center box office or at <http://ces.frostburg.edu>.

FSU's busy Saturday starts with **tailgating** at 8 a.m. in the Stadium Lot with free parking on a first-come, first-served basis. Giveaways and refreshments will be available at the Alumni Tent. The **Alumni Welcome Center** will be set up with kid-friendly refreshments, games and activities, and there will be a table where alumni can update contact information or leave a note for fellow alumni from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the lobby of the Lane Center. The **Jim Anderson Memorial Baseball Brunch** will also be held that morning, from 10 a.m. to noon, in Lane Manicur Hall. **"Solar Superstorm,"** a 40-minute multimedia presentation, will be on view in the Gira Center's Multimedia Learning Center at 10 a.m., 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. The show costs \$1 for adults and is free for children 18 and younger.

Later that morning, a **walking campus tour**, starting at 11 a.m., will allow alumni to get up close and personal with the buildings they grew to love and the new ones they have yet to know. The first of the athletic events, a **Volleyball Tri-Match** among FSU, Goucher and St. Mary's of Maryland, begins at 11 a.m. in the PE Center Main Arena. The **Accounting Alumni Luncheon**, sponsored by the FSU Accounting Association and the FSU Alumni Association, will take place in the Lane Center South Addition at noon. A **baseball locker room ribbon-cutting ceremony** will occur in the PE Center at 12:30 p.m., officially introducing the team's new state-of-the-art facility and honoring individuals who have sponsored lockers.

The **Bobcat football team** then hosts Christopher Newport University with kickoff at 1 p.m. Bobcat Stadium will continue its full schedule with the **women's and men's soccer teams** hosting Marymount University at 5 and 7 p.m., respectively.

On Saturday night, the **Frostburg Finale** will take over the Lane Center from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Tickets cost \$10 for students and \$15 for alumni. The multi-faceted event features a DJ, karaoke, "dueling piano bar," photo booth, snacks and a cash bar. An ID is required for entry. In addition, the **Student Homecoming Dance**, hosted by the Student Homecoming Committee, will take place from 11 p.m. to 2 a.m. in the PE Center Main Arena. Tickets go on sale **Oct. 10** at the Lane Center box office.

The celebration comes to a close on Sunday, starting with the **Alumni Association Board of Directors meeting** at 9:30 a.m. in Gira Center room 397. All alumni are welcome and encouraged to attend. The PE Center will continue to host many events, including the **men’s basketball alumni game** at 10 a.m., the **women’s basketball alumni game** at 11:30 a.m. and the **volleyball match** against Marymount University at 3 p.m. Additionally, **field hockey** will host Christopher Newport University at Bobcat Stadium starting at 11 a.m.

To wrap up Homecoming, the Student Government Association will host its **Big Event** to clean up the streets of Frostburg. Those interested in participating should meet in the lobby of the Lane Center at noon on Sunday.

FSU’s Homecoming Weekend Takes Off With Comedy Performance by Chris Tucker



At the start of this year’s FSU Homecoming weekend, CES at FSU will present a stand-up comedy show from award-winning comedian and actor Chris Tucker. The 8 p.m. performance on **Friday, Oct. 21**, will take place in the Main Arena of FSU’s Cordts PE Center.

Tucker first rose to prominence as a regular performer on “Russell Simmons’ HBO Def Comedy Jam” and in the 1995 cult classic “Friday,” but he is perhaps best known for his role as Detective James Carter in the popular “Rush Hour” film series. In addition to his international comedy tours, he has starred in the films “Money Talks,” “The Fifth Element” and “Silver Linings Playbook.” His latest stand-up special, “Chris Tucker Live,” released on Netflix in 2015, is the first project produced through his company, Chris Tucker Entertainment. Tucker will next appear in the upcoming Ang Lee film, “Billy Lynn’s Long Halftime Walk.”

Thuyacontha will be accompanied by *Joseph Yungen* on the piano.

For her selections, Thuyacontha, a soprano, has chosen “Allegro,” “Recitativo” and “Larghetto” from “Motette: Exultate, Jubilate” (“Rejoice, Be Glad”), a religious solo motet Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart wrote for the castrato Venanzio Rauzzini in 1773; Allerseelen (“All Souls’ Day”), an art song for voice and piano, by Richard Strauss; “Auf dem Schiffe” (“On the Boat”) by Johannes Brahms; “Fleurs” (“Flowers”) by Francis Poulenc; and “Les filles de Cadix” (“The Girls From Cadiz”) by Léo Delibes.

After intermission, Thuyacontha will perform “Ah! Je veux vivre” (“I Want to Live in the Dream”) from “Roméo et Juliette” by Charles Gounod, “At the Well” by Richard Hageman, “Why Have You Stolen My Delight?” by Michael Head, “Jauchzet Gott in allen Landen” (“Exult in God in Every Land”) from “Cantata 51” by Johan Sebastian Bach; “Tornami a vagheggiar” (“Return to

Me to Languish”) from “Alcina” by George Frederic Handel; and “Quel guardo il cavaliere” (“That Look, Pierced the Knight”) from “Don Pasquale,” one of the great masterpieces of Italian comic opera, by Gaetano Donizetti.

Jazz Studies Program Presents First Annual Evening of Jazz

FSU’s Jazz Studies program will present its first annual Evening of Jazz on **Saturday, Oct. 29**, at 7:30 p.m. at the Lyric Theatre at 20 E. Main St. in Frostburg. The program will feature the following FSU student ensembles: Jazz Combo, Vocal Jazz Ensemble and Jazz Orchestra. Doors will open at 7 p.m.

The program will open with the FSU Jazz Combo led by director **Tom Harrison**. They will perform Thelonious Monk’s composition, “I Mean You,” and other jazz fusion classics. Jazz combo is made up of students **Wesley Mason**, violin; **Mirto Dorcil**, piano; **Corey Snowden**, guitar; **Grant Stryckning**, guitar; **Daniel Bedwell**, guitar; and **Matthew Heverly**, drum set.

Under the direction of **Dr. James Reddan**, the FSU Vocal Jazz Ensemble will perform a variety of music composed and arranged for vocal ensemble and rhythm section. Tunes will include the big band classic, “Tuxedo Junction,” made famous by the Glenn Miller Orchestra, as arranged by Kirby Shaw; Manhattan Transfer’s version of the doo-wop standard, “Boy From New York City,” and the original modern work “Words” by The Real Group.

FSU’s Jazz Orchestra, directed by **Dr. Brent Weber**, will present selections with a rock, funk and fusion twist. Their program will include the 1962 Herbie Hancock funk original, “Watermelon Man,” as arranged by Bob Lowden, “City” by jazz fusion pioneer Jeff Lorber, Buddy Rich’s version of The Doors’ “Soul Kitchen” and one selection from the current fusion jazz group Snarky Puppy.

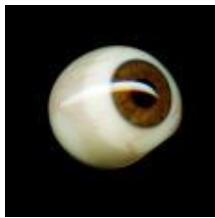
“Speaking OUT: Queer Youth in Focus” is a photographic essay that collectively explores a wide spectrum of experiences told from the perspective of a diverse group of youth ages 14 to 24 who identify as queer (i.e., lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender or questioning). Portraits are presented without judgment and/or stereotype by eliminating environmental influence with a stark white backdrop. This backdrop acts as a blank canvas to be filled with the each subject’s point of view handwritten onto the final print. With more than 65 portraits photographed over 10 years beginning in 2001, “Speaking OUT” provides a rare insight into the ever-evolving passions, confusions, prejudices, fulfillment, joys and sorrows voiced by queer youth.

Smith is an award-winning, nationally and internationally shown and published photographer who has spent the majority of her career taking photographs with a passion to share experiences. Although the subject matter varies, her innate vision to capture the life and energy of a scene takes precedence in every image.

'Keep an Eye On' Exhibit to Continue Through Oct. 30



FSU's Department of Visual Arts will host "Keep an Eye On," an exhibit by Robert Ladislav Derr, who translates the world around him through visual manifestations that leave viewers with a sideways glance, through **Sunday, Oct. 30**.

Student Bryan Whitmore to Discuss Cherokee Basketry Materials at Native Plant Meeting



The Western Mountains Chapter of the Maryland Native Plant Society will present guest speaker **Bryan Whitmore**, a graduate student in FSU's Department of Biology, at its next regular meeting to be held at FSU on **Tuesday, Oct. 18**, at 7 p.m. in Compton 327. This event is free and open to the public.

During his presentation, titled "Sustaining the Plants Used in Cherokee Basketry," Whitmore will focus on adaptations of the plants used for Cherokee basketry as the forests of the Appalachian Mountains change. Traditionally, the Cherokee used rivercane to make baskets, but due to its decreasing availability, they turned to new materials, including white oak and Japanese honeysuckle. Natural plant dyes were made from bloodroot, yellowroot, black walnut and butternut. Whitmore will discuss decade-long projects that have

focused on methods to increase the sustainability of these resources, specifically for Cherokee artisans on the Qualla Boundary of Western North Carolina.

Whitmore, of Hagerstown, Md., has an undergraduate degree in wildlife biology with a minor in forestry from FSU. He has worked for Green Ridge State Forest as part of the SILVAH-oak inventory team for the past few summers. His research is on the fire-adapted white oak with **Dr. Sunshine Brosi**.

Sierra Club's Josh Tulkin to Speak on Clean Energy



In celebration of Campus Sustainability Month, Sustainability Studies and the FSU Foundation Environmental Lecture Fund will sponsor a presentation by Josh Tulkin, the director of the Sierra Club, Maryland Chapter, on **Tuesday, Oct. 18**, at 7 p.m. in Compton 226. Tulkin will speak on "Clean Energy at the Crossroads: The Shaping of Maryland's Energy Future ... and What You Can Do." This event is free and open to the public.

As director of the Maryland Chapter, Tulkin oversees the organization's campaigns, fundraising and membership. Under his leadership, the Sierra Club has played a key role in the passage of the Maryland Offshore Wind Bill, the expansion of the Maryland Wildlands Program, the adoption of the 2015 Fracking Moratorium and the 2016 Pollinator Protection Act. Fall Philosophical Forum on Existentialism



A Fall Philosophical Forum featuring a discussion of existentialism and the project of "who you are" is being hosted by FSU's Department of Philosophy on **Tuesday, Oct. 25**, at 7 p.m., in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). Members of the campus and local community are invited to join the conversation with Dr. David R. Cerbone, professor of philosophy at West Virginia University.

Cerbone's presentation, "On Trying (and Failing) to Become Who You Are: Rabbi Zusya's 'Query of Queries' as a Pathway to Existentialism," will be an extended reflection on a parable from Hasidic

Judaism ascribed to Rabbi Zusya of Hanipol. This parable raises deep and difficult questions about the project of becoming "who you are." Zusya's query makes listeners feel called upon individually to take up that project and challenges the conceit that we have at any point succeeded in that task. Cerbone will make connections to the ideas and work of Kierkegaard, Heidegger, Beauvoir and Sartre.

Cerbone's individual, ongoing research focuses on the phenomenological tradition and Wittgenstein and early analytic philosophy. He is also the author of "Understanding Phenomenology," "Heidegger: A Guide for the Perplexed" and "Existentialism: All that Matters."

Each year, the children’s picture book that most embodies the attributes of compassion, love and courage is highlighted with an award from the Children’s Literature Centre at FSU. The 2016 award winner is “Stick and Stone,” written by Beth Ferry and illustrated by Tom Lichtenheld.

“Stick and Stone” shows the world that it is possible for people to become friends even when the odds are against them. The goal of the story is to make children recognize the power of friendship.

The annual award, first established in 2012, is designed to encourage and support an author and illustrator in the early years of his or her career, particularly someone who has published in the United States in the previous three years.

Ferry has published two additional children’s stories: “Land Shark” and “Pirate’s Perfect Pet.” She has three stories awaiting publication, “Swashby and the Sea,” “The Scarecrow” and “Sealed With a Kiss.”

Winning authors and illustrators are invited to attend the annual CLC Book Award Banquet held in Frostburg on the first Saturday of October. The winner is also asked to speak about his or her work as it relates to the award’s theme.

The nominating committee, made up of CLC staff members, FSU’s Department of Education Professions faculty members and practicing professionals in the area of children’s literature, carefully consider nominations and choose the winning book based on its literary and artistic merit, inspiration of compassion, love and courage, date of publication and location.

Discover the History of FSU With the Honors Program

As part of the FSU Honors Program’s new and enhanced slate of upper-level seminar courses, students in the spring 2017 semester will have the opportunity to earn honors credit while diving headfirst into the archives of FSU’s history.

IDIS 491 Frostburg State’s Archives and “the Sixties” will allow participating students to conduct in-depth research into student life and activism on the University’s campus during some of the most pivotal moments of the 20th century. Throughout the course, students will explore the defining social and political movements of the era, from the Anti-(Vietnam) War Movement to the African-American Civil Rights Movement. Then, as a critical look back in time through the past of this institution, students will conduct archival research in the Lewis J. Ort Library to uncover the impact that these cultural and political events had on what was at the time Frostburg State College. This seminar is the first of its kind, and a rare opportunity for students to deepen their understanding of the events that shaped FSU’s history.

The seminar will be led by *Dr. Greg Wood*, an associate professor in the Department of History and director of the Honors Program.
